

## University Profile

From its beginning as "The Seminary West of the Suwannee" in 1857, Florida State University has grown to stretch across 347 acres of rolling oak and pine-covered hills to comprise a campus which has educated millions of students over the last century.

Florida State University has boasted a heritage of service and scholarship since the beginning when the legislature passed an act authorizing two state colleges — one east (now University of Florida) and one west of the meandering Suwannee River.

Starting with a 130-member coed enrollment in 1857, the Seminary survived the Civil War, reconstruction, radical social changes, and a variety of name changes to emerge in 1909 as the Florida State College for Women.

It was helped back into coed status in 1947 by a legislature anxious to open up the state's educational resources to thou-


sands of degree-seeking ex-GI's from World War II. It also was granted a new name "Florida State University." The University's expanse and complexity today contrast vividly with its beginning. Sixteen schools and colleges within the University serve more than 29,000 students who are enrolled in the 276 graduate and undergraduate degree programs and live and work among 1,300 faculty and 2,600 staff members. About 5,000 degrees are awarded every year.

In the past several years, the University has joined an elite group of universities in the United States which produce more than 200 doctoral graduates annually. Emphasis on graduate research and study at the University continues to grow, and today more than 4,000 graduate students pursue a variety of degrees.

Student life at Florida State University also offers young people ample opportunity to acquire leadership skills and to apply their classroom learning in student government, residence hall government, Greek social organizations, honors programs, departmental organizations and more than 200 other registered student organizations active on campus. The FSU Artist Series, the Distinguished Lecture Series and outstanding music, theater and dance production provide enjoyable evenings for the entire community.

Being a student at Florida State University means stepping into a tradition of more than 130 years of higher education. From its Flying High Circus to its Supercomputer Computations Research, Florida State provides a panorama of excitement, blending the educational and social sides of campus life.





# 1994 Outlook

With the precision of an automobile assembly line preparing for a new model year, the Seminole softball team is retooling for the 1994 season. Like cars rolling off the line, head coach Dr. JoAnne Graf annually produces nationally ranked teams. As Graf can attest, you don't coach at this level for 16 years and make four consecutive trips to the College World Series by having rebuilding years. When you're JoAnne Graf, you simply reload.

Despite the loss of seven seniors, Coach Graf has the Seminoles ready to make another run at Oklahoma City. The FSU lineup will feature new faces at six positions. Gone are pitcher Toni Gutierrez, catcher Leslie Adams, first baseman Heather Conway, shortstop Cindy Gordon, rightfielder Susan Buttery and centerfielder Leslie Barton.

Last year's squad broke or tied five team records and set six individual marks. If the Seminoles are to maintain the program's winning ways, some untested talent is going to have to step to the forefront.

"We lost a lot of talent and leadership," commented Graf. "Its going to be hard to replace experience. You can teach players how to play, but you can't teach experience. We're going to have to go through the ups and downs, and the pressure situations that a season brings. Its going to take some time to get the new kids to gel and for the team to play as a unit."

With two of the three starting pitchers from last year's squad returning, the pitcher's position will be looked toward to provide experience.

Rebbeca Aase and Marla Looper return for their senior years on the hill. The duo combined with Toni Gutierrez to shatter the NCAA record of 72 scoreless innings established by the University of Connecticut in 1992, by blanking opponents for 124 2/3 consecutive innings last season.

A third-team All-American last year, Looper will anchor the rotation. After transferring from Crowder College for her junior season, Looper compiled a 20-1 mark on the strength of a conference leading 0.42 ERA, ranking fourth nationally.

Aase, the NCAA record holder with 50 consecutive victories, begins the campaign with a 53-3 career record. She completed 17 of 18 starts in '93, going 17-2 and posting a 0.51 ERA.

Freshman Kristy Fuentes has looked impressive in preseason drills and will be called upon as the third pitcher in the rotation.

Wendy Braye, a freshman from Arvada, CO will fill out the battery. Called a "pure catcher" by Graf, Braye was one of the most highly recruited players in the country last season. Braye also possesses good power and should add punch to the batting order. Another freshman, Windy Weltz will back-up Braye behind the plate.

Four players with experience return in the infield although only one, All-American Lisa Davidson, was a full-time starter at a position. Davidson, will be counted on for both her defensive skills at second base and her offensive power. The MVP of the ACC Tournament had 21 extra base hits last season, including four homeruns.

After sharing time at third last season, Jen Olow and Laurie Shepard look to find permanent homes for themselves in '94. Olow will take over the hot corner and Shepard, a former high school shortstop, returns to that position in 1994.

Heather Feltmann is pencilled in as the starter at first base this year. A sound defensive player, Feltmann did not make a single error while playing in 16 games at first last season.

The outfielders will be a relatively young group but they boast plenty of speed, enabling them to cover lots of ground. Last season's ACC Rookie of the Year, Shamalene Wilson is back for her sophomore campaign and will play either left or center field. Wilson will be the lead-off hitter and her speed on the basepaths makes her a dangerous weapon. Last season, Wilson stole 25 bases while she was only caught stealing once.

Sophomores Tina Wood and Tabitha Doka and two freshmen, Myssi Caulkins and Stacie Symonds will battle for the other outfield positions.

The young squad will get tested often and early thanks to a national caliber schedule. The Seminoles will play in four tournaments, the South Florida Invitational, the Lady Seminole Invitational, the Pony Tournament and the Diamond Classic that feature the top teams in the country.

Graf will have her team ready for the demands of a top-notch schedule. "We have the physical talent to compete, but we'll have to learn how to survive the psychological challenges - the ups and downs - like learning how to rebound from a loss."


In addition to the ACC schedule, FSU will also play South Florida and UNC-Charlotte. Next year, with the addition of Maryland to the field, the winner of the ACC tournament will receive an automatic bid to Nationals.

The 1994 season will bring plenty of challenges but as Graf says, "I think this team is going to surprise a lot of people because people are going to underestimate them."

With a little fine-tuning, at the end of this model year Florida State may once again find itself in a very familiar place - Oklahoma City.

After fifteen years at the helm of the Florida State Softball Program, there are not many things that Dr. JoAnne Graf has not accomplished. Last season, the head coach notched her 700th win, ranking her 11th all-time in fast-pitch victories. Her winning percentage of .810 ranks second among active coaches. Last season Graf was named ACC Coach of the Year for the second year in a row after leading her team to its second consecutive conference title.

Under Coach Graf, Florida State has been to the NCAA College World Series in Oklahoma City four consecutive years and five of the past seven. In ten years of fast-pitch competition, Graf has directed the Lady Seminoles to eight regional tournament appearances. In her first five years at Florida State, she accumulated 219 wins playing the best slow-pitch competition in the nation and claimed two national titles.

Graf, who was voted the South Region Coach-of-the-Year in 1986, has seen 34 of her players selected to NCAA All-South Region teams. Last season, Lisa Davidson became the second FSU player to earn first team All-America honors. She was joined by Susan Buttery who was selected to the second team and Marla Looper who was tabbed to the third team. In 1987, FSU produced its first fast-pitch All-American in shortstop Tiffany Daniels. In 1991, Christy Larsen was named thirdteam All-American and in 1992, Toni Gutierrez was selected to the All-American second team.

A 1975 graduate of Florida State, Graf returned to her alma mater after two years at the University of North Carolina-Greensboro where she earned her master's degree in physical education. Graf also worked in the athletic department at UNC-Greensboro as head coach for the university's men's and women's swim teams and assistant softball coach.

Graf, who serves as director of the FSU softball camp each summer, is a former president of the Florida Collegiate Athletic Association and also served as a member of the NCAA Softball Committee. She chaired the NCAA Softball Advisory Committee for the South Region and was just recently elected to the All-American Committee of the National Softball Coaches Association.

Recently, Coach Graf became Dr. Graf after completing her doctorate degree in athletic administration at FSU in 1992.

Connie Clark - Assistant Coach Cal State Fullerton, '87 Fifth Year

Under the guidance of Connie Clark, nearly every Florida State pitching record has been broken in the last four years. A former All-American pitcher, Clark joined the Lady Seminole softball staff at the start of the 1990 season, bringing several years of national and international level teaching experience to Florida State. In her four seasons as pitching coach, Clark has tutored Christy Larsen, Toni Gutierrez and Marla Looper to the top of the NCAA statistics and the top of the FSU record books. Last season, one of Clark's proteges, Rebecca Aase, set the NCAA record for most consecutive victories with 50 and the FSU pitching staff set the NCAA mark for for most consecutive scoreless innings with 124.2.

After earning a Bachelor of Science degree from Cal State Fullerton in Physical Education in 1987, Clark worked as a private instructor at the Rod Carew Baseball School in California and conducted clinics in Tokyo, Japan; Auckland, New Zealand; and Shanghai, China.

While at Cal State Fullerton, Clark twice participated in the Women's College World Series and defeated Florida State 4-0 in the first round of the 1987 World Series. In 1986, she led the nation with a 0.18 earned run average pitching for the national championship Titan team. Her senior season, she finished third in the nation with 33 wins. She was

also named All-America and won the prestigious Broderick Award for Collegiate Softball Player of the Year.

A recognized clinician speaker on pitching, Clark is extensively involved in recruiting new athletes to FSU and coordinates the Florida State summer fast-pitch camps. Clark is currently working on her Master's degree in sports administration at Florida State.



Penny Siqueiros - Second Assistant Coach Florida State '93 First Year

After a celebrated softball career at Florida State, Penny Siqueiros returns to her alma mater this season as an assistant coach.

A shortstop on the Lady Seminole squad from 1989-1992, Siqueiros etched her name in the FSU record books in several categories. The Orlando, FL native holds the season records for most games played and runs batted in. She is also listed among the top five in ten FSU career records including runs, hits, runs batted in and batting average. Siqueiros helped lead the Lady Seminoles to three World Series trips during her tenure at Florida State

Siquerios' primary responsibility will be tutoring the outfielders and hitters in practice. She will also assist Dr. Graf and Connie Clark with recruiting.

A 1993 graduate of Florida State,

Siqueiros is currently pursuing a Masters Degree in athletic administration.






