



To accomplish this goal, FSU has developed an academic environment which facilitates the academic success of student-athletes. Student success is encouraged through competent academic counseling, career exploration, planning and placement and academic assistance through tutorial programs and mentors.

The program operates on a "proactive" rather "reactive" approach. At Florida State, the academic staff does not wait for an academic crisis to occur. They gather important background information and build an academic profile on all student-athletes to assess their needs in advance. Coaches also stay informed on the daily progress of each student athlete.

The academic support services are located in the state-of-the-art University Center and are on the sixth floor of the \$126 million facility. It includes private study carrels, a tutorial study area and a computer lab outfitted with 16 new IBM computers and laser printers. In addition, athletic sky boxes are utilized for group and individual tutorial instruction.

FSU offers 16 Schools and Colleges with 99 undergraduate degrees and 75 post-baccalaureate degrees.



Mark Meleney Director, Athletic Academic Support Programs

Mark Meleney became Florida State's Director of Athletic Academic Support Programs in 1997 and brings 12 years of advising experience to the position. Over the past five years, Meleney has played an integral role in the development of a comprehensive program of student athlete support, which in 1996 won the "Program of Excellence" award from Athletic Management Magazine.

A native of Iowa, Meleney began his college education at Buena Vista College, where he earned varsity letters in football and baseball. Upon transferring

to Florida State, he earned Bachelor's degrees in Management and Finance in 1986 and received a Master's in Athletic Administration from FSU in 1997. He is currently pursuing his Ph.D. in Athletic Administration. Meleney oversees an academic staff comprised of five academic counselors, and administrative assistant, several graduate assistants, individualized learning specialists and a cadre of about 70 tutors and mentors. Meleney and his wife Sarah are the parents of a five-year-old daughter, Montana Shea.

Matt Schmauch is the academic counselor for the Lady Seminole softball team.
Schmauch, a native of Allen Park, Mich., has been a member of the FSU Academic Support staff since the fall of 1997. He earned a bachelor's degree in finance from Florida State in 1995 and went on to receive a master's degree in athletic administration from FSU in 1996. A former student-athlete himself, Schmauch was a member of the Seminole swimming team from 1994-96 after transferring from the University of Florida. During his career, Schmauch was an Atlantic


Coast Conference finalist while achieving ACC Honor Roll and Academic All-American status. An active member of the FSU athletics department, Schmauch was involved with the Say "No" to Drugs program and was also a member of the Student Athlete Advisory Board. He also served as an intern with the Seminole Boosters while pursuing his master's degree.

In addition to working with the softball team, Schmauch is also the academic counselor for the women's basketball and men's and women's swimming and diving teams. Schmauch's duties include coordinating support services for the student-athletes including assigning tutors, assisting in course and major selection, teaching study skills and advising about eligibility requirements while monitoring their day-to-day academic responsibilities in an effort to ensure they maintain progress toward their degrees. Schmauch also actively participates in the recruitment process of all prospective student-athletes. In addition, Schmauch serves as the Eligibility Coordinator, Admissions Coordinator and as the liaison to the NCAA Clearinghouse for the FSU Academic Support Program.

# Support Services

#### STRENGTH AND CONDITIONING

The Strong Shall Survive is the motto of the strength and conditioning staff at Florida State. It is also this philosophy that has made Seminole athletes in all sports among the strongest, fastest and fittest anywhere. At Florida State, the strong not only survive, they win too!

Strength training and conditioning is an important part of any athlete's performance on the field. At Florida State, every aspect of a student-athlete's training is taken very seriously. Strength and conditioning coach Kevin Fitzgerald, who is in his first season working with the FSU softball team, customizes programs for each of the softball players, beginning with pre-conditioning before the season gets underway. He monitors the athletes in sport specific training which includes conditioning and strengthening the major muscle groups used in softball.

Fitzgerald, a 1994 graduate of Florida State, worked with the Seminole football and tennis teams while completing his degree in nutrition and fitness. During that time, he helped design and implement a computerized weightlifting program for the football and tennis teams while also supervising FSU's staff of student volunteers in the weight room.

Fitzgerald took a position at Notre Dame upon graduation from Florida State. He worked with most of the Irish's 26 varsity sports during his two years in South Bend. Fitzgerald moved on to Vanderbilt, where he was responsible for the strength and conditioning programs for men's basketball, tennis, soccer, track, cross country and golf.

Fitzgerald, who returned to his alma mater in December of 1999, is a certified strength and conditioning specialist. He works with the FSU football and baseball teams along with his responsibilities with the Seminole softball program.

FSU takes pride in customizing the programs to help student-athletes reach their maximum potential.

#### WEIGHT ROOM

The Tully Gymnasium weight room recently took on a whole new look following a complete renovation in 1996. The facility, which was expanded by 2,000 square feet, is now 3,500 square feet in size fresh with a new stereo system, drop ceiling, lighting and mondo rubber flooring.

Over \$140,000 worth of new exercise equipment was added to the Lady Seminole weight room, including 16 cardiovascular pieces such as Life Fitness, Stairmaster and Textrix. All Florida State women athletes train in the state-of-the-art facility.

#### MEDICAL CARE AND TREATMENT

An athlete can expect to receive the best care and treatment possible with the athletic training team at Florida State. Prior to competition, all FSU student-

athletes undergo screening in order to detect any potential injuries. If a problem is detected, the athlete may be placed on a prevention care system which may include any kind of treatment from icing to exercising.

Though the prevention of injuries is the main objective, some injuries are unavoidable. Rehabilitation is another component of the Florida State training room. The FSU athletic training staff will work with the athlete and provide an intense rehabilitation


schedule that will allow the athlete to successfully rehabilitate after an injury. Some injuries and illnesses may be referred to the Seminole team physicians at the Tallahassee Orthopedic Center, who, for many years, have worked in conjuction with the FSU athletic training staff in successfully rehabilitating athletes after an injury. Nutrition counseling and drug testing are also responsibilities of the athletic training team which is dedicated

to providing the best care possible for all FSU studentathletes.

Head Women's Athletic Trainer Robin Gibson handles the athletic training duties for the Lady Seminole softball team. Gibson, a 1985 graduate of San Diego State, is in her 13th year at Florida State. She began working at FSU as a graduate assistant in 1986 and worked with women's basketball for one season. She became a full-time member of the Seminole athletic training staff in 1988 -- the same year she began handling the training duties for the softball team. Gibson was elevated to the Head Women's Trainer in 1990 and became the Associate Director of Sports Medicine in 1998. She oversees a staff of 15 fulltime and student trainers who handle the athletic training duties for all FSU's women's sports which comprises more than 200 studentathletes. Gibson is a licensed athletic trainer in the state of Florida and is a long-time member of the National Athletic Trainers' Association.

#### PERSONAL DEVELOPMENT

Fostering the development of personal growth is a fundamental component of the NOLES program. These support programs ensure that the student-athlete will be provided opportunities to focus on personal growth issues such as values clarification, goal setting, fiscal planning, decision making and personal responsibility. Programming

focuses on helping student athletes develop a healthy lifestyle while they are at Florida State and habits that will benefit them for life.

#### CAREER DEVELOPMENT

Preparing for life after college sports is a major focus of the NOLES Career Development program. The program is designed to work cooperatively with the University's Career Services to acquaint students with the job search process, provide networking opportunities and ultimately assist with job placement. This program places

a priority on the development of the total person, with the goal of developing individuals who will have rewarding careers and productive lifestyles after they leave Florida State.

#### COMMUNITY SERVICE

Serving the community is the focus of our Seminole Spirit program. Student-athletes are challenged to give service to our community and individuals who are in need. With a clearly defined program of service, student-athletes are given the opportunity to develop the foundation for a lifelong commitment to volunteerism. The Seminole Spirit Student-Athlete Speakers' Bureau enables student-athletes to improve their speaking skills, develop effective communication and impact the lives of others through their service as role models in our community.

#### LEADERSHIP DEVELOPMENT

The Florida State University Department of Athletics is committed to developing programs of excellence that foster leadership development. The foundation of the leadership development program are the Seminole Leadership Institutes that are held four times a year. These Institutes offer student-athletes the opportunity to learn skills that will benefit them as students, as athletes, and as they pursue their goals after leaving Florida State. The Institutes are based on building communication skills. Students have the opportunity to use the values and work ethic taught by athletic participation as the framework for their leadership development. The Institutes attract outstanding guest speakers who challenge Seminole student-athletes to achieve their greatest potential and use their leadership skills to positively influence others.

The Student-Athlete Advisory Council (SAAC) serves as the advisory board to the NOLES program and the athletics administration. The prestigious board, comprised of two representatives of each athletic team at FSU, also recommends programming and serves

as a liaison between student-athletes and the athletics administration. The Advisory Council plans and implements various events for student-athletes and serves as the department's most visible ambassadors. The SAAC hosts the annual Golden Nole banquet and plans such events as orientation for incoming studentatheletes and the back-to-school picnic.



Student Development Director Pam Overton was presented with the first annual Dr. Gene Hooks Award for the outstanding CHAMPS program coordinator as chosen by the Division I-A Athletics Directors.

## NCAA InFormation

The following information is provided by the Florida State Office of Compliance for prospective student athletes. It is intended as a guideline to introduce some of the rules governing NCAA athletic involvement.

## WHO IS PERMITTED TO RECRUIT FOR FSU?

Only Florida State University coaches who have successfully completed the NCAA Recruiting Rules Examination on an annual basis may be involved in the recruitment process. Representatives of our athletics interests may not make any recruiting contacts. This includes letters, telephone calls or face-to-face contact on or off campus with a prospect or the prospect's parents.

#### KEY TERMS YOU SHOULD KNOW

You become a prospective student-athlete if you have started classes for the ninth grade. Before the ninth grade, you become a prospective student-athlete if the college provides you (or your relatives or friends) any financial aid or other benefits that the college does not provide to prospective students generally.

A contact is any face-to-face encounter between a prospect or the prospect's legal guardian and an institutional staff member or athletic representative during which any dialogue occurs in excess of an exchange of greeting. NOTE: At the Division I level, athletic representatives (boosters) may not contact you for the purpose of recruiting. A college coach may contact you in person off the college campus beginning July 1 after completion of your junior year in high school.

An evaluation is any off-campus activity designed to access your academic qualifications or athletic ability, including any visit to your high school (during which no contact occurs) or the observation of any practice or competition in which you participate.

During your senior year, you can have one expense-paid official visit to a particular campus. You may receive no more than five visits. During your official visit, which may not exceed 48 hours, you may receive round-trip transportation between your home and the campus, and you (and your parents) may receive meals, lodging and complimentary admission to campus athletics events

#### PHONE CALLS AND LETTERS

Phone calls from faculty members and coaches (but not boosters) are permitted beginning July 1 after completion of your junior year. A college coach or faculty member is limited to one telephone call per week except when it is:

- During the five days immediately before your official visit to the university
- $\bullet \quad$  On the day of a coach's off-campus contact with you
- During the time beginning with the initial National Letter of Intent signing date in your sport through the two days after signing date

Letters from coaches and faculty members (but not boosters) are not permitted until September 1 at the beginning of your junior year in high school. A Division I university may provide you with the following printed materials:

- General correspondence, including letters, U.S. Postal Service postcards and institutional note cards
- Game programs which may not include posters and one Student Athlete Handbook can be provided only during official or unofficial visits to the university's campus
- NCAA educational information

- Pre-enrollment information subsequent to signing a National Letter of Intent with the university
- One athletic publication which may include only one color of printing inside the covers
- Official academic, admissions and student services publications published or videotapes produced by the institution and available to all students
- Schedule cards
- · Questionnaires which may be provided prior to your junior year
- Summer camp brochures which may be provided prior to your junior year.

#### ALUMNI AND BOOSTERS DO'S AND DON'TS

You may forward information about prospective student-athletes to the appropriate coaches.

You may have contact with a prospect regarding permissible preenrollment activities such as summer employment, provided the prospect has already signed a National Letter of Intent and the Compliance Office is aware that you are making these contacts in regard to employment.

You may have a telephone conversation with a prospect only if the prospect initiates the call. Such a call may not be prearranged by an institutional staff member and you are not permitted to have a recruiting conversation, but may exhibit normal civility. You must refer any questions about our athletics programs to an athletics department staff member/coach.

You may view a prospect's contest at your own initiative provided you do not contact the prospect or his/her parents. In addition, you may not contact a prospect's coach, principal, or counselor in an attempt to evaluate the prospect.

You may continue established family relationships with friends and neighbors. Contacts with sons and daughters of these families are permitted as long as they are not made for recruiting purposes or encouraged by Florida State University coaches.

You may not become involved in making arrangements to receive money or financial aid of any kind for a prospect or the prospect's family and friends.

You may not make contact with a prospective student-athlete and his/her parents when the prospect is on campus for an official or unofficial recruiting visit.

You may not transport, pay or arrange for payment of transportation costs for a prospect, and his/her relatives or friends to visit campus (or elsewhere).

You may not pay or arrange for payment of summer camp registration fees for a prospect.

You may not provide anything to a prospect, the prospect's family or friends without prior approval from the athletics' Compliance Office.

## 1999 in Review

#### GRAF GETS WIN #1000

Dr. Graf became the first coach in Division I history to win 1,000 Division I games and the first to win 1,000 at a single university with the 2-1 win over South Florida on May 6.

#### FSU WINS ACC CROWN ... AGAIN!

The Lady Seminoles finished the 1999 season with a clean sweep at the ACC Championships, going 3-0 in the tournament and winning their fifth straight title and seventh overall since joining the league in 1992.

Florida State started the tournament defeating North Carolina 2-1 in 10 innings. Danielle Cox kept the Lady Seminoles alive with an in-the-park homerun in the 7th inning to tie the game before Kimmy Carter hit a sacrifice fly to bring in Cox in the bottom of the 10th to advance FSU to the semi-final game. Leslie Malerich took the win, striking out eight Tar Heels and giving up only four hits.

Florida State then faced the Virginia Cavaliers



on Saturday in game five, scoring the lone run of the game in the first inning. Jen White went the distance against Virginia, striking out two batters and allowing five hits in the 1-0 shutout.

Virginia defeated top-seeded Maryland in the semi-finals, setting up a rematch with FSU in the championship game. The two teams

remained scoreless until the fifth inning when Becky Wallace came in to pinch hit and drove in Tami Post for the first run of the inning. Dana Bailey scored on a wild pitch and Becky Brock scored on a fielder's choice to give the Lady Seminoles the 3-0 lead. Stacy Venable took the complete game shutout to give the Lady Seminoles the 1999 ACC crown.

#### AND THE HITS KEPT COMING...

FSU had double-digit hits in 18 games in 1999. The Lady Seminoles averaged 7.32 hits per game, had 12 players with double digit hits for the season and had a season-high 16 hits against Michigan State. Thirteen of those 18 games were in the second half of the season.

#### LEADING THE WAY

Not only did Danielle Cox lead the Lady Seminoles in batting average (.432), runs (52), hits (98) and stolen bases (73) but she also led the ACC. The senior from Anniston, Ala., led the ACC in stolen bases (73) and in batting average (.432) in 1999.

#### STOLE THE SHOW

Danielle Cox and Dana Bailey are among FSU's best in stolen bases as

they now hold the third and sixth spots in the career record book. Cox finished her career with 93 while Bailey recorded 60, respectively.

#### NO RUNS FOR YOU

The FSU pitching staff held 18 teams scoreless in 1999. Jen White led the effort with seven shutouts while Leslie Malerich recorded four and Stacy Venable added two, including a 3-0 shutout victory in the ACC Championship game.

#### FROM COAST TO COAST

Danielle Cox led the team, ACC and the country in stolen bases with 93. She was also 18th in batting average (.432).

#### IN THE CLUTCH

Florida State had many clutch victories in 1999. Jen White took the first one for the Lady Seminoles with her two-run homer in the seventh inning to clinch



the win over UNLV. In a tight match with Auburn, Christy Cerecedes' sacrifice fly to right field scored the winning run in the 10th inning. Jackie Hirschfeld answered the call as she pinch hit in the bottom of the eigth inning and drove in the winning run against Florida International. Kimmy Carter also made the play in the ACC Tournament with a sacrifice fly to bring in Danielle Cox for the 2-1 win in the 10th inning against North Carolina.

#### CARTER STEPS IT UP

Kimmy Carter stepped it up -- and not just to the plate. The rookie had multiple hits in 11 games and was named ACC and SAA Player of the Week for May 11th. Carter had only one error in her 49 games and had five stolen bases. She is one of four players with two doubles in a game and was perfect from the plate against Utah.



### THE TRIBE VS. THE TOP 25

Florida State played 14 teams in 23 games in 1999 that were ranked in the Top 25 of the NFCA Coaches Poll. FSU took wins from Hofstra, Maryland (2), Massachusetts, Minnesota (2), Florida and South Florida (2). The Lady Seminoles also faced four of the Softball College World Series participants: DePaul, Arizona State, California and Southern Mississippi.

#### NOT A SINGLE ONE!

Freshman Leslie Malerich pitched her first no-hitter

as a Seminole with her win over Toledo on March 12.. The Merrillville, Ind., native struck out nine batters, walked two and gave up no hits in the 9-1 win. Toledo scored on a sacrifice after a walk and an error.

#### PICK OF THE WEEK...

Kimmy Carter, Stacy Venable, Danielle Cox and Jen White each earned ACC and SAA Player or Pitcher of the Week honors in 1999.

o Carter went 6-15 and added two triples and five RBI's. The right fielder led the team and ACC in triples with five and was third on the team with 19 RBI's. She appeared in 46 game.

o Venable nabbed the Pitcher of the Week honors after a 2-0 record, including a 2-1 win and complete game over South Florida. She had five strikeouts and gave up only one earned run.

o Cox and White swept the ACC weekly honors for March 16 after leading the team to a 5-2 record, including a 3-2 mark in the Tallahassee Democrat FSU Invitational.

#### RIPPIN' IT UP

Three Lady Seminoles really ripped it up at the plate at the end of the season. In the last 28 games, Danielle Cox had hits in 25 games while Christy Cerecedes and Dana Bailey had hits in 20 of those games. Bailey and Cox tied this season for the longest hitting streak at 10 games.

#### FROM FSU TO THE MAJORS

Danielle Cox finished her college career on May 16th and two days later, was in Columbus, Ga., with the Georgia Pride, a professional softball team. Cox is the sixth Lady Seminole to join the professional ranks. Assistant Coach Carrie Partlowe joined the Pride coaching staff as well.

#### WHAT AN HONOR

Senior Stacy Venable was one of 16 students-athletes in the ACC to be awarded the 1999 Weaver-James-Corrigan Postgraduate Scholarship. The selected student-athletes receive \$5,000 toward their postgraduate education. Venable was chosen based on her exceptional performance in the classroom, on the field and in the community.




