

JOANNE GRAF FIELD HOME OF SEMINOLE SOFTBALL



Florida State University is home to one of the premier softball facilities in the nation. JoAnne Graf Field at the Seminole Softball Complex is state-of-the art in every facet and provides Florida State softball players with an all-inclusive area that includes locker rooms, meeting rooms, staff and coaching offices, a modern lounge, a traditions room as well as one of the best playing surfaces anywhere in the country. JoAnne Graf Field hosted back-to-back NCAA Regionals in 2001 and 2002, as well as in 2004 and 2009.

Florida State has posted 313 wins in its 12 years at the complex. Even more impressive, FSU has gone 260-70 at home in the last decade for an amazing .788 winning percentage. The complex was also featured in *Athletic Business Magazine's* 2002 Architectural Showcase.

The magnificent additions to the nationally-renowned field continue to surface. A two-story indoor batting cage facility that also includes a bullpen adjacent to the home-side dugout is expected to be completed by opening day of the 2011 season. The key structure is just another sign of the FSU athletics department's commitment to keeping the Seminole softball program among the nation's elite.

Florida State's dream of a new, state-of-the-art softball complex became reality when ground was broken in a ceremony in the spring of 1998. Construction workers worked continuously to complete the facility, which also houses the Seminole Soccer Complex. The result was the creation of one of the nation's premier collegiate softball and soccer facilities. The facility, which was completed in the spring of 1999, includes ticket and concessions buildings and spacious press boxes with radio/television booths.



The Florida State Soccer/Softball Complex was "officially" opened with a ribbon-cutting ceremony on April 17, 1999. The event, which was held in conjunction with Florida State's 30th Anniversary of Women's Intercollegiate Athletics Spring Celebration, drew approximately 150 spectators, including university dignitaries and athletics department personnel. Several former Florida State student-athletes and staff also returned for the monumental event.

On April 2, 2005, former university president Dr. T.K. Wetherell and former Athletics Director Dave Hart officially renamed the softball stadium "JoAnne Graf Field at the Seminole Softball Complex." Graf joined Bob Heck at Georgia State as the only two active softball coaches with fields named after them. It was only fitting that one day later Graf crossed the 1,300-win plateau with a 5-2 triumph over Virginia Tech. In the fall of 2006, the stadium got a facelift as Florida State unveiled a brand new video scoreboard for the 2007 season. The board uses the same technology that is used at most outdoor professional stadiums. The ProStar is capable of displaying video clips, live video, animation, player headshots, graphics and statistics in 4.3 trillion colors.

The Seminole Softball Complex, which is adjacent to the FSU Soccer Complex, is located between Dick Howser Stadium and Mike Long Track on Spirit Way. The facility can be accessed from both Spirit Way and Stadium Drive.

STILES & SMITH TEAM BUILDING





"The Stiles and Smith Team Building is undoubtedly one of the finest team facilities in the nation. Our softball program is fortunate and incredibly grateful to have generous people like Mrs. Stiles and Mr. Smith who continously help our program maintain its competitiveness in what is one of the most important aspects to any collegiate sports program" - FSU head coach Lonni Alameda

The Mary Ann Stiles & Barry Smith team building is the home of the Florida State softball and soccer teams. It houses the coaches' offices, which overlook the soccer and softball fields, reception area, large team and coaches locker rooms, visiting team locker rooms and training and equipment rooms. Renovations and expansion of the second floor were completed in July of 2009, and the latest upgrade includes revamped locker rooms that were completed in January of 2011.

One of FSU's most celebrated and renowned alumni couples, Mary Ann Stiles and Barry Smith epitomize the ultimate in professional and athletic achievement. A pioneer in fundraising for women's athletics, Mary Ann Stiles was among the first Golden Chiefs to financially support the women's programs at Florida State. Barry Smith was instrumental in building the Varsity Club and was one of the first inductees into FSU's Hall of Fame. The splendid central edifice of the Seminole Softball/Soccer Complex proudly bears their names.

The recently expanded second floor includes additional office space, meeting rooms, tradition space, a video edit suite, a 598 square-foot classroom furnished with transferable desks and chairs, dry-erase boards, projection screen and the latest in electronic equipment complete with HD capabilities and surround sound. The building also includes team lounges for both the Seminole softball and soccer teams equipped with HD-television screens, computer monitors with wireless capabilities and surround sound.

The "Tradition Room" is located at the forefront of the team building on the second floor and covers more than 840 square feet showcasing the successful history of both the Florida State softball and soccer programs. Fans from all over will be greeted to the stories of great players, award winners and tremendous teams of the past. Trophies and plaques depicting the success of both programs are on display throughout the room.

A satellite athletic training room is located on the first floor in close proximity to both softball and soccer locker rooms and is equipped with state-of-the-art modalities, including four treatment tables and stainless steel whirl-pools.







COMMUNITY SERVICE

Giving back to the community is a priority for all of Florida State University's student-athletes. The Seminole softball team makes a strong effort throughout the year to perform countless hours of community service in the Big Bend area.

In the 2009-10 academic year, the softball squad completed an astounding 303 hours of community service, equaling roughly 14 hours per person. The team also had a 100 percent participation rate, finishing in third place for the Golden Community Service Award

Third-year head coach Lonni Alameda and the rest of the charitable Seminoles never see such fulfilling work as a mere chore. Instead, they relish the opportunity of impacting lives throughout the region and see themselves as not only FSU student-athletes, but active members who are ready to give back.

It is just one of the many reasons why FSU has one of the most accomplished, well-rounded softball programs throughout the country.



ENDOWED SCHOLARSHIPS

BETTY PALMER

The first endowed position scholarship for women's athletics at FSU was named in honor of Betty Palmer and fully-funded by Dr. Fran Cannon. The scholarship is held by the Seminoles starting shortstop and honors a woman who preached values as well as skills and shaped the lives of many young women throughout her life as a faculty member at FSU and a recreation supervisor.

DR. JOANNE GRAF

The architect of one of the most successful Division I softball programs in collegiate sports and the first Division I coach to reach the 1,000 win plateau, this fully-endowed scholarship honors former FSU softball coach Dr. JoAnne Graf. Coach Graf achieved an unprecedented level of success throughout her many years at the helm of the Seminole softball program. Not only did she win two slow pitch national championships but her teams appeared in seven Women's College World Series, made 18 NCAA Regional appearances and won 10 ACC titles. This endowment will ensure Coach Graf's winning legacy for years to come. Funds are continuing to be raised for this scholarship.

IUDY SPAINHOUR

This fully endowed scholarship is funded by professors Charles and Joan Haworth in honor of Judy Spainhour. The gift is made in appreciation of Judy's spirit and support of FSU women's softball. The Haworths are recognizing Judy for her special sense of humor and warmth and the support she gave to FSU athletics.

CARLA BINGHAM

The fourth endowed scholarship for Seminole softball is in honor of one of our own. Carla Bingham was a two-time All-American and played third base for FSU in 1982 and 1983. She helped FSU to a 102-21 record over those two seasons and was a member of FSU's 1982 AIAW National Championship team. In 1997, Carla lost her battle with breast cancer and this scholarship assures her memory will live forever. This scholarship is continuing to be funded.

KARI KEITH

Kari Keith was an amazing athlete who came to Florida State on a softball scholarship in 1986 but went on to become a two-sport star on the track and the softball diamond. Keith, from Ft. Lauderdale, Fla., played softball all four years and was named to the Lady Seminole Invitational All-Tournament Team in 1987 and 1988. Although she had never picked up a javelin in her life, Keith broke the school record and qualified for the NCAA championships in just her second meet ever. She was in training for the 1992 Olympic games when she lost her life in a two-car accident in Tallahassee. This endowed scholarship pays tribute to one of FSU's best and brightest.

ROBERT GRAF, JR.

This softball scholarship was created and endowed to ensure the tradition of excellence in women's athletics at Florida State University and to always remember Bobby Graf, brother of softball coach JoAnne Graf, who will live on forever in our hearts. This scholarship has been funded by family friend Donald Hinkle.

IAN SIKES AND CINDY MARVIN

This scholarship was endowed by two friends of the Florida State softball program, Jan Sikes and Cindy Marvin. Their belief in the positive values of intercollegiate athletics and its benefit toward the development of young women inspired this endowment. This scholarship will aid female athletes at Florida State University to further their education while participating in softball. Both Jan and Cindy embody these values as well as the Seminole spirit. Jan played on the 1981 and 1982 national championship teams and was named an All-American in 1982.

CHARLES AND CYNTHIA TUNNICLIFF

Charles and Cynthia Tunnicliff, both Florida State graduates, are prominent attorneys and active members of the Tallahassee community. Both of their daughters were active in sports, playing softball and basketball. Charles coached city-league softball for years, and has always been a fan of FSU softball. The Tunnicliffs endowed this scholarship to recognize the excellent women student-athletes that Seminole softball has produced, and to help provide an education for future women who honor the Garnet and Gold.

DUGOUT CLUB



You can support Coach Alameda and the Seminoles this season by joining the Dugout Club. The Dugout Club is a restricted club that helps the softball program directly by providing for extras not in the softball budget.

SEMINOLE ATHLETICS TOUTS...

 Football's Myron Rolle became the second Seminoles studentathlete in the past five years to earn the Rhodes Scholarship - one of the oldest and most prestigious awards for international study. It was the first time in nearly 25 years they awarded the scholarship to a prominent college football player.

Over the past 15 years, more than 450,000 in Postgraduate Scholarship money has been granted to FSU student-athletes, as well as numerous other academic honors and awards.

 During the 2009-10 academic year, five Seminoles earned CoSIDA Academic All-American honors, 15 Seminole student-athletes were named District Academic All-Americans, 216 Seminole studentathletes were named to the ACC Academic Honor Roll, seven of Florida State's athletic teams had a 3.0 or better cumulative grade point average.

• In the spring 2010 semester, 202 Seminoles achieved a 3.0 GPA or better, 10 athletic teams had a 3.0 or better GPA and the average team semester GPA was a 2.8. Ten student-athletes made the spring 2010 President's List with a perfect 4.0 GPA while 62 student-athletes earned Dean's List status with a GPA of 3.5 or better.

SEMINOLE SPIRIT

THE SYMBOL: SEMINOLES

Florida State played only two football games in 1947 before students demanded the school to acquire a symbol. While details conflict, most believe the account of a poll of the student body is accurate. The Florida Flambeau reported that Seminoles won by 110 votes over the Statesmen. The other top contenders (in order) were Rebels, Tarpons, Fighting Warriors and Crackers.


In the 1950s, a pair of students dressed in Native American costumes and joined the cheerleaders on the field, which eventually evolved into the majestic symbol of Osceola and Renegade that FSU now enjoys. Today, the Seminole Tribe participates in many campus activities. Florida State University is proud of its longstanding cooperative relationship with the Seminole Tribe of Florida. The Seminole people have suffered many hardships and injustices, but they have remained brave, dignified and proud. The Seminoles are unconquered. They symbolize what Florida State hopes will be the traits of all of its graduates, including student-athletes.






GARNET AND GOLD

Florida State's school colors of garnet and gold date back to the Florida State College championship football teams of 1904 and 1905. In those championship seasons, FSC donned purple and gold uniforms. When Florida State College became Florida Female College in 1905, the football team was forced to attend the University of Florida. The following year the FFC student body selected crimson as the official school color of 1905. The administration in 1905 took crimson and combined it with the recognizable purple of the championship football teams to achieve the color garnet. The now-famous garnet and gold colors were first used on an FSU uniform in a 14-6 football loss to Stetson on October 18, 1947.



WAR CHANT

Florida State's "war chant" appears to have begun with a random occurrence that took place during a 1984 football game against Auburn, but in the 1960's, the Marching Chiefs band would chant the melody of a popular FSU cheer. In a sense, that chant was the long-version of FSU's current "war chant." During a thrilling game with Auburn in 1984, the Marching Chiefs began to perform the dormant melody. Some students behind the band joined in and continued the "war chant" portion after the band had ceased. Most agree the chant came from the fraternity section, but many spirited Seminole fans added the hand motion to symbolize the brandishing of a tomahawk. The chant continued among the student body during the 1985 season, and by the 1986 season, it was a stadiumwide phenomenon. Of course, the Marching Chiefs refined the chant, plus put their own special brand of accompaniment to the "war chant," for the sound we hear today.



CITY OF TALLAHASSEE

Tallahassee boasts diverse heritage and is flourishing with many cultures, rhythms and flavors. Florida's Capital City played a big role in the story of Florida, and in American history and we are still making history today.

After Florida became a territory of the United States in 1822, both St. Augustine and Pensacola competed to become the State Capital. Unable to come to an agreement, it was decidede to locate the Capital at a point between the two cities. Tallahassee's beauty attracted the search party and in 1824 the City of Tallahassee was created with a log cabin as the first Capitol building.

The Tallahassee area, long known as "the red hills" region, was a land of rich agriculture vaule and consequently many large plantations were built with crops primary of cotton, corn and sweet potatoes. In fact, America's largest concentration of orginal plantations - 71 plantations, 300,000 acres - exists between

Tallahassee and Thomasville, Ga., just 28 miles away, and several are open to the public.

During the Civil War, a small battle was waged at Natural Bridge, south of Tallahassee, where a makeshift army of locals fought off an attack by Union troops. Tallahassee was the only Confederate city east of the Mississippi that did not fall to Union troops.

Higher learning has long been a jewel in the crown of Tallahassee. Florida State University had its early beginning in 1851, became Florida State College for Women in 1909 and finally Florida State University (FSU), again co-ed, in 1947. Established in 1887 as the Florida State Normal College for Colored Students, Florida Agricultural and Mechanical University (FAMU) is the oldest historic black public university in Florida.

The Capital area's beautiful environment is a continuous inspiration for the many visual arts that call Tallahassee home:

- Arrive on a First Friday and you can join the monthly Gallery Hop at the eclectic world called Railroad Square. Begin at the sculpture garden and walk your way through and see artists working in their studios and tending their exhibits to visitors.
 - In the northeast, visit the galleries and shoppes clustered around Market Street.
- Up and coming Midtown is an exciting area with an array of galleries to explore and an array of cafes, restaurants and wine bars to socialize at with friends.
- Downtown is filled with history, government and museums. The Museum of History and Mary Brogan Museum of Arts & Sciences, host exhibits of regional and national prominence and historical significance.
- Our colleges all provide theatre seasons with a chance to see soon-to-be stars' first performances right here in Tallahassee. A year's worth of touring theatre packs a busy calendar at the local civic center.
- As cool, crisp air give way to warm summer days, Tallahassee buzzes with electricity. Festivities such as the Downtown GetDown jumpstart the sporting season with a helping heap of team spirit.
- From colorful celebrations of the spectacular spring to festive incarnations of football spirit, Tallahassee is the center of amusement year round. Amid a dazzling panorama of fiery azaleas and lush landscaping, Tallahassee and the Capital Region indulge in a spring season abloom with cheerful events and lively diversions.

















Staying competitive in the collegiate sports realm is the goal of many athletic institutions. Finding a place among the nation's best is a spot that only few can achieve.



The university houses some of the best student-athletes across any collegiate campus, and continues to bask in the national spotlight in what is considered another Golden Era of Seminole athletics.





TOURNAMENTS AT FSU





The FSU softball alumni base is as strong as ever, with several former student-athletes staying connected with their alma mater, and particularly with the game they grew up loving. Reaching out to such a well-established alumni base is a huge priority for the FSU coaching staff and student-athletes.

As illustrated on this page, an abundance of FSU softball alumni go on to be successful in their future endeavors. Helping lay a foundation that includes two Women's College World Series titles and seven WCWS appearances, the Seminole softball alumni truly are the backbone that makes the FSU softball program one of the country's best.

"In 1979, funding for more and full scholarships began as did paying for full time coaches. There was no softball facility. Until 1981 there were no national championships for softball. However, FSU dominated at the region and state levels. I transferred from Lake City Community College. I received a full scholarship to play softball in 1981 and 1982. Without the full scholarships, I could not afford to go to college.

The rest I guess is history. We won back to back national championships in '81 and '82. We were proud and honored to wear the garnet and gold. We knew this time was special, to perform at the highest level and win... twice. We loved the game and all the competition it brought with it. We will always be WINNERS

I know that I was blessed to be a part of such a special time to be a player. We were 'in a league of our own.' I really don't think that any words could explain it."

Janis Likes

One of the best to ever don the softball garnet and gold, Janis Sikes led the Seminoles to back-to-back AIAW College World Series titles in 1981 and 1982.

Although her career marks at FSU still reasonate with her quite well, it is the impact she has made during and after her collegiate career that has made her successful. Sikes has made a huge contribution to several scholarships, including ones endowed by JoAnne Graf, Kari Keith, Carla Bingham, Michele Guilbault, as well as the Dr. Wells and Dr. Jones Legacy Award.


As a two-year letterwinner, Sikes earned All-America accoloades twice in her career. She was also an all-region performer and made countless all-tournament teams.

In her own words, her greatest accomplishment is simply giving back. 
Sikes has consistently given back to her church, community and college. She recently retired from UPS as a manager in 2010 after 26 great years of service.




Dr. JoAnne Graf spent 30 successful seasons at the helm of the Florida State softball program. With 1,437 victories under her belt, Graf retired on June 15, 2008, with more wins than any other head coach in collegiate softball.

The first collegiate softball coach to earn 1,400 victories, Graf's numerous achievements with Florida State softball include AIAW slowpitch national championships in 1981 and 1982, seven trips to the Women's College World Series, with the first coming in 1986 (just four years after FSU went to NCAA fastpitch softball), 21 NCAA Regional appearances and 10 Atlantic Coast Conference titles.

On April 2, 2005, then-Florida State University President Dr. T.K. Wetherell officially renamed the softball stadium "JoAnne Graf Field at the Seminole Softball Complex," making her among only two active softball coaches with fields named after them.

One of the most prolific coaches in collegiate softball, Graf concluded her career having won 75 percent of her games (1,437-478-6), including a 1,218-425-6 (.740) mark in NCAA Division I play. Florida State's average of 50.75 wins per year under her guidance since beginning NCAA play ranked No. 1 all-time.

Graf is a 1975 graduate of Florida State. In 1992, she earned her doctorate degree in athletic administration at FSU, and continues to teach at her alma mater today.



NATIONAL CHAMPIONSHIP PROGRAM

Before the games were televised on ESPN and before there were professional leagues, the main goal of collegiate softball was to go out, give your best and try to win, but mainly the student-athletes were there because they loved the game and they wanted to have fun. For two years in the early 1980's, the Florida State softball team not only had fun, but also dominated the competition and brought home a pair of national championships.

There was plenty of reason for optimism going into the 1981 season after FSU won 13 of its last 15 games the year before and was one game away from advancing to the AIAW National Tournament. Countering the momentum from 1980 was the inexperience of the 1981 roster which featured only six returnees but a host of talented newcomers.

"It was a lot of fun," former head coach Dr. JoAnne Graf said. "They had known each other from summer league ball so I think there was a lot of respect right away. Anytime you win it's a whole lot of fun. That team was in every game, they won, obviously, most of them, but it's always fun to coach people who win and they worked hard. They just had that confidence, that air that they were going to have to lose the game; no one was going to beat them."

Any concerns about the 1981 season were quickly erased as the Seminoles ran out to a 19-2 start with a trio of tournament titles. The only hiccup during the year came at the South Florida Invitational as FSU lost three of four but that also served as a wake up call as the Seminoles won 16-straight games to push their record to 38-5.

Just when the Seminoles had everything going in their favor, another bump in the road came. Winners of its last 16 games, FSU dropped a pair of games to East Carolina to finish second at the North Carolina State Invitational. But just like the losses at South Florida, the setback refocused the Seminoles when they needed it the most.

Few would have guessed that the 5-2 loss to the Pirates would be the Seminoles' last of the season. FSU took four-straight heading into the FAIAW State Tournament where it breezed to the state title with four more wins to match the most wins in school history. Up next was the AIAW Region III Tournament where the Seminoles took the next step, sweeping four more games to advance to the National Tournament.

Proving its versatility, FSU won every way possible, outscoring Western Carolina 13-9 in the first game before winning a defensive triumph 4-3 over North Carolina State. FSU disposed of the Pirates 12-3 then beat North Carolina 4-1 to capture the school's first national championship in women's athletics.

Postseason accolades came in for Darby Cottle as the shortstop collected All-America honors after hitting .428. Joining her on the All-America squad was second baseman Jan Sikes as she hit .477.

"Those teams were so full of life, heart, we had great camaraderie," former player Susan Painter said. "It started at the top with JoAnne. We had a great group of players, but she was the main component. She kept us on top and kept fighting for us and for the title. Every great team has a fit and that one certainly did. It was quite a group. We still keep in touch, but I miss that."

The pieces were in place for another run in 1982 and the Seminoles wasted no time as they won their first 12 games, highlighted by the title at the Florida Invitational - including eight shutouts, Ironically the "low point" of the season came at the Lady Seminole Invitational where FSU lost three in a row.

But just like they had done the previous year, the Seminoles bounced back to win 10-straight, including titles at the Friendly City and South Florida Invitationals. Twice during the middle half of the season the Seminoles scored 30 runs or more, including a 39-5 drubbing of Georgia Southern.

Despite all of FSU's success that year - the Seminoles won four of six regular season tournaments - there was one team it could not get past: rival Florida. Of the 10 losses that season, six came to the Gators, including back-to-back losses at the Montgomery Invitational where FSU finished second.

Similar to 1981, the losses refocused the Seminoles as they won their next 12 going into the FAIAW tournament. UF got the Tribe again 2-1 in the third game, but the Seminoles won a pair to claim the state title. Florida State had relatively little trouble in the regional tournament, only dropping a 2-1 decision to South. Florida before beating the Bulls for the trophy.

The stage was set for a repeat and the Seminoles were on a mission having won 21 of their last 23 games. The first three games were a breeze as FSU outscored its opponents 46-6 with wins over Georgia Southern, South Florida and UNC-Charlotte. All that stood between FSU and its second national championships were the Florida Gators.

While Florida State held an 8-6 lead in the season series, Florida was the only team that had been close to FSU over the last five years and handed the Seminoles their worst loss in school history at the time, a 14-0 defeat during the middle of the season. With the championship on the line the Seminoles were at their best and they prevailed 9-4 to claim their second-straight national championship.

The accolades poured in for the Seminoles again, headed by Cottle who was named the Broderick Award winner as the AIAW Player of the Year. She was joined on the All-America squad by Natalie Drouin, Painter, Toni Robinette and Sikes.

"We were like a big family, I don't even remember anyone not gerting along." Drouin said. "We had two great teams and I don't know which one was better. They were pretty equal. At the time none of us really knew what we had accomplished, we just wanted to do our best and have fun, but afterwards it was thrilling."

The Seminoles won 110 games those two years with a 54-7 record in 1981 and a 56-10 mark the year after. Florida State was an offensive juggernaut those two seasons, scoring an average of 9.2 runs per game. What might be even more impressive was the Seminoles' pitching and defense. Behind Painter, the team's lone pitcher, FSU gave up only 2.7 runs per game, a number that is unfathomable in slow pitch.

"I remember a lot of team unity and enthusiasm," Cottle said. "We were a group of winners, that's for sure, and we were a team that was willing to do whatever it took to get to the top. I'm just proud to have been part of the teams that started a tradition of winning."

While the AIAW was disbanded one year later and FSU went to NCAA competition in 1984, the players on those teams were the founders of a legacy that continues today.

BACKGROUND: The Florida State University is one of eleven units of the Division of Colleges and Universities of the Florida Board of Education... It was established as the Seminary West of the Suwannee by an act of the Florida Legislature in 1951 and first offered instruction at the postsecondary level in 1857...It's Tallahassee campus has been the site of an institution of higher education longer than any other site in the state...in 1905, the Buckman Act reorganized higher education in the state and designated the Tallahassee school as the Florida Female College... In 1909, it was renamed the Florida State College for Women...In 1947, the school returned to co-educational status, and the name was changed to Florida State University. It has grown from an enrollment of 2,583 in 1946 to a enrollment of 40,255 in the Fall Semester of 2009.

The libraries also subscribe to more than 600 data bases.

The FSU Libraries include eight libraries on campus: The Robert Manning Strozier Library, Paul A.M. Dirac Science Library, Mildred and Claude Pepper Library Warren Allen Music Library Harold Goldstein Library and Information Science Library, College of Law Library, the College of Engineering Library, College of Medicine Medical Library and the College of Engineering Library. Library materials and services are also available at the FSU Panama City Campus, as well as International Program study centers in London, Florence, and Panama, and a collection of art related materials at the John and Mable
