A WORLD-CLASS PROGRAM BUILT ON TRADITION





Florida State has been a mainstay in the collegiate softball scene since being one of the pioneer programs of the sport in 1978. Over the last 35 years, the Seminole program has done its part to help the game grow exponentially in that time span by churning out several All-America players, staffing quality coaches and stringing together many impressive seasons.

With the 2013 season marking head coach Lonni Alameda's fifth as the Seminole skipper, the direction of the program continues to stay on the right path.

Forty-win seasons continue to be a staple of the program, with 29 in the program's 35 seasons. NCAA Championship appearances are always expected, with the Seminoles being one of just 11 schools to make an NCAA Regional in every year since 2000.

Historically, there aren't many programs that can match the numbers put up by Florida State: 11 Atlantic Coast Conference titles, seven NCAA Women's College World Series appearances, two AIAW national championships, 25 All-Americans and 25 NCAA Championship appearances.

Being a Florida State softball student-athlete does not mean the sole focus is just on the field. Joining the program puts you in an instantaneous family that is fostered well by a fun-loving coaching staff that brings out the best in each player with team-building activities.


In the 2012 offseason, members of the program were able to partake in valuable internships, speak to and inspire several youth athletes, join many community service activities, attend a nationally-renowned air show in Daytona Beach as well as go on a team-building trip near Pensacola. The Seminole Softball Complex

- Known as one of NCAA softball's best venues, JoAnne Graf Field is a modernized field of play that caters quite well to student-athletes, coaches, fans and other spectators.
- Since opening in 1999, Florida State has played to the venue's home-field advantage. The Seminoles have recorded 358 victories in their 14 years at JoAnne Graf Field.
- The field's tremendous design was featured in Athletic Business Magazine's 2002 Architectural Showcase.
- Approaching nearly 12,000 square feet, the brand-new FSU Softball batting facility is unique and aesthetically pleasing.
- The facility, which was awarded the 2011 AIA Tallahassee Chapter Design Achievement Honor Award, is endorsed for its combination of external features, comfortable nature and multiple purposes within the sport of softball.
- The near million dollar facility that was spear-headed by architects Lewis + Whitlock is a beacon for future player development while providing a safe haven from inclement weather.
- The Mary Ann Stiles & Barry Smith team building is the home of the Florida State softball and soccer teams. It also houses the coaches' offices, which overlook the soccer and softball fields, reception area, large team and coaches locker rooms, visiting team locker rooms and training and equipment rooms.
- One of FSU's most celebrated and renowned alumni couples, Mary Ann Stiles and Barry Smith epitomize the ultimate in professional and athletic achievement. A pioneer in fundraising for women's athletics, Mary Ann Stiles was among the first Golden Chiefs to financially support the women's programs at Florida State. Barry Smith was instrumental in building the Varsity Club and was one of the first inductees into FSU's Hall of Fame.

- Seminole Softball completed nearly 1,000 hours of community service in the last academic year, a testament to the hard work and care put forth by FSU softball coaches and players.
- The Seminoles recorded a 100 percent participation rate in a variety of activities, including Literacy Week, National Student-Athlete Day, Miracle League Softball and much more.
- FSU was honored at the 17th annual Golden Nole banquet on April 21, 2011, with the SemiGnome Award.
- A team leadership group known as The Tribe meets weekly to help promote group activity amongst the team. The leadership council helps coordinate activities such as Dugout Club Socials, seasonal newsletters, community service activities and more.
- Senior outfielder Kirstin Austin was among the top female student-athletes at FSU in individual community service hours in the last academic year. She earned softball's Golden Nole award in 2012 for her tremendous community service commitment.
- Former player Shayla Jackson was one of just 30 softball candidates for the annual Lowe's Senior CLASS Award in 2012, showing excellence in character, competition, community service and in the classroom.
- The program carries several All-ACC Academic Honor Roll students, All-ACC Academic team members, postgraduate scholarship winners, CoSIDA/ESPN All-District and All-American performers.
- Sophomore Kelly Hensley was recently recognized once again for her tremendous work in the classroom at the 2012 Golden Torch Banquet, winning her second straight Golden Torch award.
- Bailey Schinella, Jessica Nori, Kirstin Austin, Kelly Hensley and Tiffani Brown were each named to the 2012 All-ACC Academic Softball Team.

Doctor Hensley Ready to Operate

It was quite the summer for junior first baseman Kelly Hensley. The Niceville, Fla. native has the desire to pursue a career in the medical field and become a doctor, and to further enhance her career aspirations she has been shadowing doctors to better learn the rigorous profession.

Over the summer, Hensley traveled to Lima, Peru with Medlife and shadowed physicians and a dentist who performed surgical procedures. Hensley got a first-hand look at the nuances of the profession and even took part in working on children.

On the trip, Hensley and the rest of the students helped set up mobile clinics in the outskirts of Lima. They also took vitals, assisted the dentist in small procedures and took part in a community development project.

Many Lima civilians live in shacks up in the mountains, and several pregnant women as well as children had fallen as they tried to navigate the mountain area for work, school, etc. Hensley and her crew worked on building stairs to make typical travel much easier and safer.

Hensley has set herself up nicely for her future. She is a two-time Golden Torch award winner for academics while majoring in exercise science. She sometimes adjusts her practice schedule to take advantage of opportunities shadowing doctors.

Hensley also figures to play a vital role with the Seminoles again this season, looking to shore up the first base spot and continue developing her swing that has seen great improvement in the offseason.

Youth Inspiration

The Florida State softball team does everything it can to inspire children and be good role models to follow. But so often, it is always children who wind up inspiring the Seminole softball studentathletes. Here are three prime examples below:

1. Fostering Hope: Taylor Foster is a 16-year old resident of Brown Summit, N.C. who always had a dream to play softball at Florida State. However, in 2010 she had been diagnosed with Osteosarcoma, a type of bone cancer. The diagnosis immediately ended her softball career.

A family friend reached out to the ACC office to get in contact with the Florida State softball program, looking for something positive to divert attention from her treatments. Seminole head coach Lonni Alameda was able to get in contact with Taylor in what was a complete shock for the aspiring softball player. On the weekend of January 25, Alameda visited Taylor in the hospital to celebrate her Sweet 16th birthday with her family and friends.

2. Aiding Amber: Amber Howard is a 17-year old girl from Lynn Haven, Fla. who has been battling a brain tumor since being diagnosed with one in her brain stem in 2008. Florida State softball has been in repeated contact with Howard and her family over the last few years, doing whatever it takes to better their life as she goes through treatment.

During that time, coaches and student-athletes have visited the Howard family, and the family has also made a few stops in Tallahassee. The Seminoles put together a clinic for the Howard family to help pay for medical costs in Niceville, joining Northwest Florida State College to help raise \$1,940. The team also writes letters to Amber Howard as her fight has given several Seminoles an appreciation for many things in life.

3. A Pair of Maddies: Maddie Briscoe is a nine-year old girl who found out she had Stage 4 Neuroblastoma in September 2010, which included three tumors. Led by Florida State redshirt sophomore Maddie O'Brien, the Seminoles helped elevate Maddie Briscoe's spirits during her rounds of chemotherapy.

Maddie Briscoe developed a bond with shortstop Maddie D'Brien because of the two having the same first name. Briscoe and her family continue to root for the Seminoles, especially her idol Maddie D'Brien, who gave Briscoe one of her No. 7 jerseys and signed it. Briscoe and D'Brien also were able to hang out during last year's Florida State-Miami football game.

O'Brien and Courtney Senas visited Maddie Briscoe in the hospital in 2011 when she was undergoing treatment. When the Briscoe family visited the softball team last year, O'Brien and some others made glow in the dark T-shirts for the family.

Father-Daughter Bonds

Three Florida State student-athletes in Niceville natives Kelly Hensley and Stephanie Hartness as well as Alex Powers have a father-daughter connection that stems from travel and high school ball.

Kelly's father coached both her and Hartness during their days at Niceville High. Hartness' father is the assistant coach and therefore was able to coach his own daughter, who happened to be an NFCA High School All-American last year.

Hartness' father is also the head coach of Team North Florida, while Alex Powers' father is an assistant for the team and was fortunate enough to coach his own daughter. Freshman Courtney Adams is also a Niceville native who played on the high school team coached by the fathers of Hensley and Hartness.

The coaching alignment shows how some of Florida State softball's student-athletes have been raised while bonding heavily with their families through a game they cherish. In addition, freshman second baseman Kaitlin Allen and redshirt senior pitcher Monica Perry also were coached by their fathers growing up.

An Incredible Four Years

Senior outfielder Morgan Bullock has had a life-changing four years at Florida State. Right before the start of her freshman season in January 2010, her younger brother passed away. The team traveled to Dacula, Georgia to support her at the funeral and watched her give a strong eulogy.

From there, Bullock formed a strong bond with players both past and present. She has been part of position changes, winning the school's first ACC title in seven years in 2011 and contributing to a group that has loads of talent moving forward.

While college has allowed her to grow and figure out what her career aspirations might be, another life-altering moment occurred in December 2012. Bullock got engaged in front of several of her teammates.

Bullock is part of the team's leadership council and is a creative writing major who will provide blogs throughout the season on Seminoles.com.

All in the Family

Wahiawa, Hawaii native Courtney Senas is a big deal back home on her island. The junior centerfielder is almost like a heroic figure to everyone on her side of the Aloha State, which is a reflection of the communal atmosphere that her state possesses.

When head coach Lonni Alameda recruited Senas, she promised her a homecoming trip and was able to fulfill that last season when the Seminoles traveled to the Bank of Hawaii Tournament in Honolulu. In that time, Senas was treated like a celebrity figure by being greeted with open arms by her family, cheered on enormously by fans and making the University of Hawaii's ballpark a capacity venue.

One of five siblings, Senas' family follows Courtney's every at-bat and catch when she is roaming the softball field each and every game. Her decision to attend Florida State has helped create a new crop of Seminole fans across the Aloha State.

A Sisterly Bond

Florida State junior catcher Celeste Gomez is looking forward to the 2013 season after coming off a sophomore campaign where she was hindered by an ankle injury.

Besides opening the season with a clean bill of health, Gomez also has an opportunity to play against her sister, Cecile, who enters her freshman season at Jacksonville University. Cecile is a talented pitcher who could have the opportunity to face her big sister when the two teams meet on Feb. 10 at JoAnne Graf Field.

Celeste, whose family has a large Cuban heritage, has been productive in the program by also helping run camps and clinics throughout the year.

A Wondrous Walk-On

Freshman catcher Macey Cheatham went through fall and spring practice with the Seminoles and has been a model student-athlete in her time in Tallahassee. Judging by her sound play behind the plate and on the offensive end, Cheatham has been unfazed by her walk-on stature and is ready to compete for playing time.

Cheatham, whose father played tennis at the University of Texas, has been one of several Seminoles who reach out to the community. Her community service initiatives have been endless since arriving on campus, which includes traveling with head coach Lonni Alameda to participate in several camps and clinics.

Alameda has even gotten a few emails from people about the caring and outgoing nature that Cheatham posesses and how much it means to them. No matter her outcome on the field, Cheatham is already setting a standard for other student-athletes to follow.

Perry Perfecta

Redshirt senior pitcher Monica Perry has become one of the team's quiet leaders, although her results in the circle have made plenty of noise.

The Whitesburg, Ga. native has a huge passion for softball and shows that by giving back to her home community. Perry has given lessons several times to aspiring players at home and has done her part to make Georgia a fertile ground for talented and up-and-coming players.

Perry was recognized in the offseason as the team's Femina Perfecta winner for her all-around success in athletics, academics and community service. With tremendous characteristics that make her a special player and person, Perry continues to mold her future in the right direction.

Another Natural

Florida State softball assistant coach Travis Wilson is an interesting story, having been a softball/baseball phenomenon from the moment he began each sport.

Wilson was part of likely the best professional softball team New Zealand ever assembled in the Black Sox, winning the country's first International Softball Federation championship in 1996. From there, he decided to pursue professional baseball even though he never played before and signed with the Atlanta Braves organization.

Wilson enjoyed eight successful seasons in both the Braves and Cincinnati Reds' organizations, peaking in 2000 when he joined players like Josh Hamilton, C.C. Sabathia, Barry Zito, Josh Beckett, Mark Buehrle and Vernon Wells in the Major League Baseball Futures Game in Atlanta.

The New Zealand native joins fellow assistant coach Craig Snider as the team's offensive coaches and works with the Seminoles on their fielding. He continues to play professional softball in the United States during the summer.

Alumnae Making an Impact

In December 2012, two former student-athletes at Florida State traveled to the Dominican Republic on a mission trip with World Baseball Outreach to assist several underserved youth in learning the games of baseball and softball.

Former players Robin Ahrberg and Kristie Mc-Conn represented the program well by teaching several inner city children the fundamentals of the game while providing the entire group of boys and girls 12-13 bags of equipment.

HEAD COACH LONNI ALAMEDA

Through four stellar years as the head coach at Florida State University, Lonni Alameda has upheld the proud tradition of Seminole softball in guiding FSU to four consecutive trips to the NCAA softball championship.



Alameda, who began her coaching stint in Tallahassee in 2009, has helped FSU softball continue its streak of reaching the NCAA Tournament in 13 consecutive seasons - every year since the new millennium in 2000. FSU is one of just 11 Division I collegiate softball programs to make the NCAA postseason in every season since then.

In 2012, the Seminoles achieved a mark of 47-16, their most wins since going 62-12 in 2004. Alameda led FSU to a 15-13 record against NCAA postseason teams throughout the year, which included nationally-ranked victories over 14th-ranked UCLA, 23rd-ranked North Carolina twice and Women's College World Series participant LSU.

Since arriving at FSU. Alameda has earned 14 Top 25 victories. Her final signature win of the 2012 year came at the Los Angeles Regional, when the Seminoles knocked off host UCLA in a 2-1 victory. The win was FSU's 50th NCAA Tournament victory in its illustrious history.

As the team's pitching coach, Alameda's influence on FSU starters Lacey Waldrop and Monica Perry was enormous in 2012. Both pitchers finished in the Top 30 nationally in earned run average, making FSU one of just five programs to have multiple pitchers in the top 30. Each hurler earned ACC Pitcher of the Week honors twice, and were named to the All-ACC squad. As a unit, the Seminoles finished 10th in the country with a 1.53 team ERA.

In just her third season as head coach at Florida State, Alameda helped the Seminole softball program snap a sevenyear ACC title drought to highlight an entertaining 2011 season. Despite making the conference tournament in Atlanta as the No. 4 seed, it was Alameda's season-long coaching tactics combined with the energy of her motivated group that enabled the Seminoles to storm through the competition and defeat second-seeded North Carolina, 4-1, to clinch an automatic NCAA Regional bid.

Under Alameda's guidance, the 2011 Seminoles created a noteworthy program achievement - for the first time in school history, FSU softball reached 12 consecutive NCAA Regionals. Her group also won two games in the Athens Regional, defeating Georgia State and UAB, to get to the final day of a regional for the first time since 2006.

Alameda came to Florida State prior to the 2009 season and went on to surpass 200 career coaching victories in her first year in Tallahassee (she picked up her 300th win on March 17, 2012 against Fairfield). The Seminoles finished the 2009 campaign with a 44-16 record and achieved the best conference record in school history with a 17-4 league mark. In her second season as head coach, Alameda led the Seminoles to a 44-18 record and second-consecutive appearance in not just the ACC Championship game but the NCAA Tournament.

Since Alameda has made Tallahassee her home, she has now led the Seminoles to three ACC Championship game appearances in four seasons.

In 2010, FSU earned a spot in the field of 64 and made its 11th-straight appearance in the NCAA Division I Softball Championship. The Seminoles hit the road for their regional and played in Athens, Ga. before falling to Georgia and Radford.

Before traveling to the Peach State, FSU was on the campus of Virginia Tech for the 2010 ACC Softball Championship. While in Blacksburg, Va., the 'Noles beat Maryland and the host Hokies before losing to Georgia Tech in the title game. At the time, FSU's championship-game appearance marked the 14th time in school history it had the chance to play for a title - a total number that is more than any other school in the conference.

Under Alameda's tutelage, the 2010 Seminoles accomplished a lot of statistical feats. Not only did FSU get off to its best start since 1993 by starting the year 20-2, but the team capped off the year with high marks in a bevy of categories. The Seminoles' .297 batting average was the best since 2003 and the team's 212 total walks were the most since the 2004 season, just to name a few. The 'Noles also posted just 226 strikeouts at the plate; the fewest since the 1998 campaign.

Individually, Alameda coached several FSU student-athletes who earned recognition for their hard work on the field and in the classroom. Carly Wynn was named an All-ACC First Team selection and Terese Gober, Sarah Hamilton and Ashley Stager were each placed on the All-ACC Second Team. Robin Ahrberg, Tiffani Brown and Hamilton each got the nod on the ACC's All-Tournament team, too. Wynn and Hamilton also captured Louisville Slugger/NFCA Division I All-Southeast Region Second Team honors. Wynn was even named to the ESPN The Magazine Academic All-America Third Team.

Adding to Alameda's on and off-field influence, Hamilton became just one of two conference players in 2011 to be named to the All-ACC Team on three different occasions. Shayla Jackson and Jen Lapicki joined Hamilton on the 2011 all-conference squad. In 2012, four more student-athletes made the All-ACC Team under Alameda's watch including Tiffani Brown, Briana Hamilton, Perry and Waldrop. Brown and Shayla Jackson also were named to the NFCA All-Southeast Region Second Team.

Sarah Hamilton ended her illustrious career as one of the best pitchers in school history, with Alameda playing a large role in her success. Among her noteworthy feats, Hamilton became the first hurler in FSU history to finish with at least 1,000 career strikeouts, ending her four-year stay with 1,005 K's.

For her team's exploits on the field in 2009, Alameda and the Seminoles had the opportunity to host a regional in the NCAA Tournament for the first time since the 2004 season. Alameda coached several Seminoles that garnered postseason awards as Hamilton was named a Third Team Louisville Slugger/NFCA Division I All-American as a sophomore. Hamilton was also named ACC Pitcher of the Year, an ACC First Team member and to the Louisville Slugger/NFCA All-Southeast Region Team. Then-senior catcher Kaleigh Rafter was also named to the team and was an All-ACC First Team member. Wynn and Gober (both second team) were also student-athletes coached by Alameda who were recognized as All-ACC players.

HEAD COACH LONNI ALAMEDA

An All-Big Eight selection as a player at Oklahoma, Alameda came to FSU from UNLV, where she spent five seasons reviving the Rebels' program. She replaced Dr. JoAnne Graf, who retired after 30 seasons with the Seminoles.

Alameda carries an impressive coaching résumé on the international level and, since 2004, has helped in the development of Canada's National Team. She aided Canada up until the 2004 Summer Olympics and resumed as an assistant following the Rebels' 2005 season. In the summer of 2006, Canada qualified for the 2008 Summer Olympics in Beijing, China, after its strong showing in the World Championships. Alameda spent the summer of 2008 with the Canadian team which ended its quest for the gold with a fourth-place finish at the Beijing Olympic Games.


Prior to Alameda's arrival at UNLV, the Rebels had seven straight seasons below .500 and hadn't participated in NCAA Regional play since 1996. In 2005, just her second season at the helm of the program, Alameda guided UNLV to a 44-19 record, including a program-best 17 Mountain West Conference wins, and a trip to Los Angeles for NCAA Regionals. Alameda was named Mountain West Conference Coach of the Year in 2005 and again in 2007 and the entire staff garnered NFCA West Regional Coaching Staff of the Year in 2005.


After a second place finish in the Mountain West in 2007 and an overall 37-27 record, Alameda and UNLV had high hopes for 2008 and had the Rebels ranked in the ESPN.com/USA Softball Collegiate Top 25 Poll for the first time in program history. After starting the season 9-1-1, the Rebels moved up to No. 18 in the ESPN.com/USA Softball Collegiate Top 25 Poll, but injuries to four starters proved costly as the season progressed.

Alameda went 25-35 in her first season at UNLV, which was a four-game improvement over 2003's final tally. She then posted a staggering 44-19 mark in 2005 and the program's first trip





Under Alameda's direction, the Rebels enjoyed recognition at the conference and regional level. Five Rebels have garnered Louisville Slugger/NFCA All-Regional honors while 13 players have earned all-Mountain West Conference accolades, including two pitchers of the year and one freshman of the year awards.

To Alameda, academics are just as important as on-the-field production. Since taking over the program, the Rebels had 58 Academic All-MWC honorees. Over that time span, the team had 10 or more honored four times, including 11 softball student-athletes in 2008. The softball program had 21 MWC Scholar-Athletes selected, as well.

During her tenure at UNLY, Alameda also stressed the importance of community service and had players volunteer their time at the Nevada Childhood Cancer Foundation and Child Haven while participating in breast cancer walks and blood drives. Her emphasis has not changed since arriving at FSU, with the 2011 Seminole Squad earning honors such as the SemiGnome Award for community service and routinely producing standout student-athletes who are honored for their charitable ways.

Alameda came to Las Vegas after eight seasons as the assistant coach at Stanford University, where she helped guide the Cardinal to a 320-179-1 record and six straight NCAA Regional appearances. She oversaw the pitching staff there and produced three All-Americans: Becky Blevins, Marcy Crouch and Dana Sorenson.

Prior to her stint at Stanford, Alameda spent two seasons as an assistant coach at Barry University (Miami Shores, Fla.). She helped the Buccaneers to a fifth-place NCAA Division II finish in her first year. She also spent some time on the international stage, serving as an instructor for both the Aruba (1995) and Spanish (2000) national teams.

An all-around great athlete, Alameda began her collegiate career as a pitcher at St. Mary's University (San Antonio, Texas) where she led the Rattlers to the NAIA Tournament in her only season. She later transferred to Oklahoma in 1989 and played softball and volleyball for the Sooners. She was a two-time All-Big Eight selection as a first and third baseman, while hitting .359 as a senior in 1992.

Alameda earned her bachelor's degree in communications from Oklahoma in 1993 and played softball professionally in Europe for a season before beginning her coaching career.





ASSISTANT COACH TRAVIS WILSON

Assistant Florida State softball coach Travis Wilson finished his first season with the Seminoles, helping the club toward another outstanding year.

Joining fellow assistant coach Craig Snider as the team's offensive instructors, Wilson helped the Seminoles make strides at the plate in the 2012 year. Coaching a youthful unit that included just one everyday senior starter, Wilson also made a great impact on the team's defensive game as it became a sound group in the field.



In 2012, the Seminoles finished the year with a .966 fielding percentage to rank in the upper echelon on a national scale. FSU became an entertaining group to watch defensively as student-athletes such as third baseman Briana Hamilton, shortstop Maddie O'Brien, second baseman Tiffani Brown and centerfielder Courtney Senas made a bevy of highlight-reel plays throughout the season. A fundamentally-sound group of infielders and outfielders collectively produced both the routine and difficult plays last year.

It was the solid play of FSU's defensive stalwarts that helped the Seminoles begin last season with a 16-D record, the second-best start in school history. The 16-game win streak ties for the 10th longest winning stretch for the program.

Wilson is seen as an excellent instructional mind by FSU's student-athletes, which was evident from the first day of practice in the fall 2011. He is a reliable arm for batting practice who is always offering excellent teaching points to better enlighten each player. Wilson has proven to be an absolute student of the game who utilizes various statistics in his meticulous game-day preparation.

Wilson is a native of New Zealand who has already taken on an important

role in recruiting. The baseball, softball and cricket veteran serves as the Seminoles' hitting and fielding coach, using his past success as a player to better serve his student-athletes.

"Travis is from both professional baseball and the New Zealand National Program," head coach Lonni Alameda said when Wilson first arrived in the summer 2011. "From the first time I met Travis I knew he would be a great fit for our program. It is not often you come across someone that has played the same game that the girls do and yet has 10 years of Major League Baseball experience. He is personable and he has won at the highest level of this game from the men's side. He has played every position you can on the



field and has been among some of the world's best in men's fastpitch. I believe Travis will be able to relate to the players on a unique level as he stills plays the game. He is excited about this opportunity and can help our program get to the next level."

From 1996-2004, Wilson played seven seasons in the Atlanta Braves organization covering all stops from Rookie Ball to Triple-A. He enjoyed much success in his professional stint, being named an All-Star for the Appalachian League (1998), South Atlantic League (1999) and the Carolina League (2000). He was named Carolina League Player of the Year for the Myrtle Beach Pelicans, and led the Grapefruit League in hitting for the Braves during spring training in 2001.

Wilson ended his professional career in 2004 with the Cincinnati Reds' organization in Chattanooga, Tenn. As a softball player in New Zealand for the Black Sox, he made his debut as a 16-year old in 1994 and was named both the New Zealand Softballer of the Year and the Canterbury Softballer of the Year after posting a team-best .396 batting average in 1996. He would earn the Canterbury Player of the Year honor multiple times and become one of his country's biggest softball ambassadors. He continues to play today.

Wilson's most recent baseball stint was as an instructor for the Idaho Falls, a Rookie League team of the Kansas City Royals. His tasks included scouting the Pioneer League, writing reports and utilizing video while communicating with the Royals organization on several prospects. His efforts have helped the Royals claim their status of having the best farm system in Major League Baseball, as asserted by several minor-league publications. On the field, he helped his players develop their infield/outfield skills, base running and hitting mechanics. Wilson also served as expert commentator for the ISF Men's World Softball Series, and was fielding coach and video analyst for the Black Caps of the New Zealand Cricket Association.

Wilson is married to his wife, Jill. The two have a son named Tyler.



ASSISTANT COACH CRAIG SNIDER

Florida State softball assistant coach Craig Snider completed a successful first season as a member of the Garnet and Gold coaching staff in 2012.

Arriving in the summer 2011, Snider helped foster a winning attitude and developed tremendous camaraderie with student-athletes and recruits immediately. He worked actively to improve the individual performances of several student-athletes in the 2012 season, helping players such as Briana Hamilton, Tiffani Brown, Kirstin Austin and others record banner years. Hamilton and Brown earned selections to the All-ACC First Team for the first time in their

careers, while Austin's noticeable improvement at the plate gave the Seminoles an enormous spark through-



In 2012, Snider's daily teachings helped the team establish a strong sense of plate discipline. FSU's 230 walks were vital toward manufacturing runs, with it being the team's highest total since 2004. Throughout the season, the Seminole offense proved to be a clutch-hitting bunch that could come through in late-game situations. It was also a fundamentally-sound group that improved greatly in situational hitting, contributing to its 47-16 overall record this past season.

Moreover, Snider's first season at FSU was an enjoyable one for everyone associated with the program. He has proven in just a short period of time how easily he relates with student-athletes while working with them day-to-day, and is someone who is sure to develop positive and meaningful relationships with future Seminoles on the recruiting trail. As someone who possesses an innovative mindset, Snider will continue to help FSU student-athletes at the plate through his analytical work in the video room, batting cages and on the field.

The Franklin, Ky. native has built a reputation for being a difference maker everywhere he has been, which includes Stephen F. Austin, Oklahoma, Centenary and Lindsey Wilson College. Over the last decade, Snider has propelled each of his teams toward tremendous improvement at the plate, and looks to continue his history of success as FSU's hitting coach.

In his most recent stint at Stephen F. Austin as an assistant coach, Snider helped turn the Southland Conference program around right away. He took over as hitting coach in 2007 following a season in which the Ladyjacks finished with a .229 batting average. Over the next three seasons, SFA batted .274 (2008), .275 (2009) and .278 (2010). He also led the team to sharp spikes in home runs, on-base percentage and slugging percentage, as SFA recorded 43 round-trippers in Snider's first season after hitting just 16 the season

At Stephen F. Austin, Snider took on several roles in guiding the program toward its recent success. He devised hitting and defensive workouts during the fall, directed all aspects of camps, developed team-building exercises, served as a fundraising arm, handled much of the recruiting and recruiting databases and oversaw his student-athlete's academic progress.

"I'm extremely impressed with Craig's character," FSU head coach Lonni Alameda said. "He is a genuine person who works hard and loves the game. He has been a part of bigger programs as well as mid majors and I believe that makes him a tremendous coach as you have to be very creative in your coaching as you relate to different styles of athletes. Craig also brings a wealth of recruiting connections. He is very good with people and respected by many and he will now embrace those relationships as a Seminole."

Snider, who has been involved as a coach in softball since 2001, previously assisted in producing three All-Americans at Oklahoma from 2005-06, and played a large role in creating scouting reports as a graduate assistant coach for the Sooners. At his alma mater of Centenary, he helped lead the school to two Mid-Con Tournament championships while providing analysis for recruiting, hitting, fielding and putting together chart systems. His

versatility also included field maintenance and even putting together the team's highlight videos in 2004 and 2005.



At Lindsey Wilson College from 2001-03, Snider quided the team to batting averages above .300 every season. He was heavily involved in the recruiting process as an assistant coach and oversaw all summer camps.

"I'm thrilled to help coach at such an established program that is coming off another conference championship and has great things going for it." Snider added when he first came to Tallahassee. "FSU's history of softball success was such a motivating factor for me to come here, and I have no doubt that through the hard work of this current coaching staff and our student-athletes, we can take this program to the next level."

Snider is married to his wife, Lauren, who is a native of Bellville, Texas. The two have one daughter, Riley.



VOLUNTEER ASSISTANT ROBIN AHRBERG

Former Florida State softball standout Robin Ahrberg begins her first season as the team's volunteer assistant, handling a myriad of duties. Ahrberg will provide special instruction to Florida State's group of catchers while supervising the rest of the team. Ahrberg will play a key role in video breakdown and analysis for scouting purposes, and also has an administrative focus as a liaison between the softball squad and both the marketing and sports information departments.



Ahrberg played at her alma mater from 2007-11, enjoying a fine career with the Garnet and Gold. The former catcher and first baseman holds career totals of a .289 batting average, 233 games played, 117 RBIs, 13 home runs and 28 doubles. She currently holds Top 10 school records in three categories at Florida State and earned several academic, community service and athletic honors in her five-year stay.

Ahrberg was the recipient of the Doc Fauls Award at the 2011 Golden Nole banquet, an honor she earned after recovering from offseason shoulder surgery in 2009 and producing two of her best years in the following seasons. The Stillwater, Okla. native was known as a true team leader who brought the best out of the program with her gritty style of play on the field. In her senior year, she recorded two home runs in an important rubber game victory over N.C. State despite battling a nagging knee injury. Ahrberg also homered in the team's ACC title game victory over North Carolina in 2011.

Following her senior season, Ahrberg was named the Co-Coaches Award winner for her inspiring play and positive attitude. In 2010, her first season following season-ending surgery, Ahrberg was named an ACC All-Tournament Team selection and finished with a career-best 33 RBIs.

As a student-athlete at Florida State, Ahrberg was a two-time Seminole Softball Leadership Council member. She was also a two-time Student Athlete Advisory Committee member and twice was named an All-ACC Academic Softball Team selection. 

2012 SEASON ACCOMPLISHMENTS

- Florida State's overall record of 47-16 in 2012 marks the program's highest win total since finishing 62-12 in 2004.
- FSU softball now has a total of 29 seasons with 40 or more victories in its illustrious history.
- FSU's selection to another NCAA Regional in 2012 marked its 13th consecutive season of reaching the NCAA postseason. Since the millennium in 2000, the Noles are one of just 11 Division I collegiate softball programs to make the NCAA Tournament in every season.
- The Seminoles have now made 25 appearances in the NCAA Tournament, tied for fifth in the nation.
- Florida State now has 50 victories in NCAA postseason play, including a 44-38 record in the NCAA Regionals.
- In 2012, FSU finished 15-13 against NCAA Tournament opponents, which included competition against 16 postseason teams throughout the season.
- FSU showed plenty of plate discipline in 2012,
- drawing 230 walks for the most in a single season since recording 252 in 2004. It was the fourth highest total in school history.
- Drew an ACC Tournament record 13 walks in its 6-2 victory over N.C. State on May 10, 2012.
- Four Seminoles in third baseman Briana Hamilton, second baseman Tiffani Brown and pitchers Monica Perry and Lacey Waldrop were named to the All-ACC Team. Brown, Hamilton and Perry were chosen to the conference's first team, the most first-team selections of any ACC school and the highest amount at FSU since 2006.
- In conference play, FSU won six of its seven series played for the first time since 2009. FSU's 16-5 ACC record was the most wins in the conference and the second-most ACC wins in school history behind only the 2009 squad's 17 victories in head coach Lonni Alameda's first season.
- The 2012 pitching staff set a single-season record for saves with 10.
- FSU defeated four Top 25 squads in 2012, including 14th-ranked UCLA, 23rd-ranked North Carolina twice and 23rd-ranked LSU. Since head coach Lonni Alameda came to FSU in 2009, the Seminoles have defeated 14 Top 25 opponents.
- A Seminole was named ACC Player of the Week or Pitcher of the Week six times, including two times apiece by Briana Hamilton, Monica Perry and Lacey Waldrop.
- The Seminoles finished 6-3 in 2012 in ESPN-programmed games, which include ESPN3 and ESPNU. FSU won both its ESPNU contests at home in wins against No. 23 North Carolina and Georgia Tech. Altogether, the Seminoles made 10 appearances this season on ESPN networks and regional sports networks.
- Finished 26-4 at JoAnne Graf Field in 2012, which includes a perfect 19-0 record to begin the home season.
- Tied for the sixth-fastest team in program history to 20 victories, needing just 23 games to accomplish the early-season feat.
- Began the season with a 16-0 record, the second-best start in school history behind only the 1992 team's 25-0 record.
- FSU's 16-game win streak to start the season ties for the 10th longest win streak in school history. In program history, the Seminoles have held 15 different 15-game win streaks, highlighted by a school record 32-game win streak during the 1985 season.
- FSU's near-12,000 foot batting facility earned enormous praise in the January 2012 edition of the Florida Engineering Society Journal, being lauded for its combination of external features, comfortable nature and multiple purposes within the sport.
- Achieved three come-from-behind victories in 2012 when trailing in the seventh inning.





2012 SEASON ACCOMPLISHMENTS

- Team earned run average of 1.53 was the second-lowest since 2005.
- FSU's 98 walks allowed marked just the seventh time in school history that the Seminole pitching staff has surrendered less than triple-

digit base-on-balls in one season. In Head Coach Lonni Alameda's four seasons, she has now coached two teams that have given up less than 100 walks, including the 2009 team (93).

- FSU's pitching allowed opponents to hit at just a .192 clip, just the fifth time the Noles have held the opposition to a sub-.200 batting average since 2000.
- The Seminoles, which remained in the upper echelon throughout the year in RPI, finished 31-11 in non-conference play.
- Heading into the NCAA Regionals, FSU spent 13 consecutive weeks in the ESPN.com/USA Softball Collegiate Poll, peaking at No. 19 during the weeks of May 1 and May 8. FSU spent 12 straight weeks in the USA TODAY/NFCA Poll.



- The Seminoles finished first in the ACC in 12 different hitting, pitching and fielding categories, including triples (19), at-bats (1,596), walks (230), earned run average (1.53), opposing batting average (.192), innings pitched (425.2), wins (47), saves (10), runs allowed (127), earned runs allowed (93), home runs allowed (18) and putouts (1,277).
- FSU finished 20-0 in 2012 when it scored in the first inning.
- Held a 37-1 record when leading after six innings.
- The Seminoles finished 9-2 in 2012 against Florida-based opponents.
- Entered the NCAA Regionals with the 16th-ranked RPI, 20th-ranked strength of schedule and 17th-ranked non-conference RPI and non-conference strength of schedule. In the regular season and ACC postseason, the Seminoles defeated 35 teams in the Top 100 RPI, and added another quality RPI victory by defeating UCLA in Los Angeles, 2-1, in the NCAA postseason.
- Headed into the NCAA postseason ranked in the Top 25 nationally in triples per game (10th), earned run average (11th) and win-loss percentage (16th).
- Florida State touted several award winners in 2012:

 - o 1 ACC Player of the Week recipient (Briana Hamilton twice)

 - o 2 ACC Pitcher of the Week recipients (Monica Perry twice, Lacey Waldrop twice)
 - o 2 Capital One Academic District 4 softball team members (Jessica Nori and Kirstin Austin)
 - o 2 NFCA All-Southeast Region Second Team members (Tiffani Brown, Shayla Jackson)
 - o 4 All-ACC Team members (Briana Hamilton, Tiffani Brown, Lacey Waldrop, Monica Perry)
 - o 4 members of the Bank of Hawaii All-Tournament Team (Lacey Waldrop, Shayla Jackson, Erika Leonard and Courtney Senas)
- Finished 3-1 versus the SEC (Ole Miss twice, LSU), 3-0 versus the Big Ten (Wisconsin twice, Northwestern) and 1-0 against the Pac 12 (UCLA).
- Eliminated No. 12 national seed UCLA in the NCAA Regionals with a 2-1 victory, marking the first time FSU defeated a national seed in NCAA
 postseason play since knocking off No. 11 Georgia twice to win the 2006 Athens Regional.

1981 & 1982 NATIONAL CHAMPIONS

Before the games were televised on ESPN and before there were professional leagues, the main goal of collegiate softball was to go out, give your best and try to win, but mainly the student-athletes were there because they loved the game and they wanted to have fun. For two years in the early 1980's, the Florida State softball team not only had fun, but also dominated the competition and brought home a pair of national championships.

There was plenty of reason for optimism going into the 1981 season after FSU won 13 of its last 15 games the year before and was one game away from advancing to the AIAW National Tournament. Countering the momentum from 1980 was the inexperience of the 1981 roster which featured only six returnees but a host of talented

newcomers

'It was a lot of fun," former head coach Dr. JoAnne Graf said. "They had known each other from summer league ball so Í think there was a lot of respect right away. Anytime you win it's a whole lot of fun. That team was in every game, they won, obviously, most of them, but it's always fun to coach people who win and they worked hard. They just had that confidence, that air that they were going to have to lose the game; no one was going to beat them."

Any concerns about the 1981 season were quickly erased as the Seminoles ran out to a 19-2 start with a trio of tournament titles. The only hiccup during the year came at the South Florida Invitational as FSU lost three of four but that also served as a wake up call as the Seminoles won 16-straight games to push their record to 38-5.

Just when the Seminoles had everything going in their favor, another bump in the road came. Winners of its last 16 games, FSU dropped a pair of games to East Carolina to finish second at the North Carolina State Invitational. But just like the losses at South Florida, the setback refocused the Seminoles when they needed it the most.

Few would have guessed that the 5-2 loss to the Pirates would be the Seminoles' last of the season. FSU took four-straight heading into the FAIAW State Tournament where it breezed to the state title with four more wins to match the most wins in school history. Up next was the AIAW Region III Tournament where the Seminoles took the next step, sweeping four more games to advance to the National Tournament.

Proving its versatility, FSU won every way possible, outscoring Western Carolina 13-9 in the first game before winning a defensive triumph 4-3 over North Carolina State. FSU disposed of the Pirates 12-3 then beat North Carolina 4-1 to capture the school's first national championship in

women's athletics.

Postseason accolades came in for Darby Cottle as the shortstop collected All-America honors after hitting .428. Joining her on the All-America squad was second

baseman Jan Sikes as she hit .477

"Those teams were so full of life, heart, we had great camaraderie," former player Susan Painter said. "It started at the top with JoAnne. We had a great group of players, but she was the main component. She kept us on top and kept fighting for us and for the title. Every great team has a fit and that one certainly did. It was quite a group. We still keep in touch, but I miss that."

The piece's were in place for another run in 1982 and the Seminoles wasted no time as they won their first 12 games, highlighted by the title at the Florida Invitational - including eight shutouts. Ironically the "low point" of the season came at the Lady Seminole Invitational where FSU

lost three in a row.

But just like they had done the previous year, the Seminoles bounced back to win 10-straight, including titles at the Friendly City and South Florida Invitationals. Twice during the middle half of the season the Seminoles scored 30 runs or more, including a 39-5 drubbing of Georgia Southern.

Despite all of FSU's success that year - the Seminoles won four of six regular season tournaments - there was one team it could not get past: rival Florida. Of the 10 losses that season, six came to the Gators, including backto-back losses at the Montgomery Invitational where FSU finished second.

Similar to 1981, the losses refocused the Seminoles as they won their next 12 going into the FAIAW tournament. UF got the Tribe again 2-1 in the third game, but



the Seminoles won a pair to claim the state title. Florida State had relatively little trouble in the regional tournament, only dropping a 2-1 decision to South Florida before beating the Bulls for the trophy.

The stage was set for a repeat and the Seminoles were on a mission having won 21 of their last 23 games. The first three games were a breeze as FSU outscored its opponents 46-6 with wins over Georgia Southern, South Florida and UNC-Charlotte. All that stood between FSU and its second national championships were the Florida Gators.

While Florida State held an 8-6 lead in the season series, Florida was the only team that had been close to FSU over the last five years and handed the Seminoles their worst loss in school history at the time, a 14-0 defeat during the middle of the season. With the championship on the line the Seminoles were at their best and they prevailed 9-4 to claim their second-straight national championship.

The accolades poured in for the Seminoles again, headed by Cottle who was named the Broderick Award winner as the AIAW Player of the Year. She was joined on the All-America squad by Natalie Drouin, Painter, Toni

Robinette and Sikes.

"We were like a big family, I don't even remember anyone not getting along," Drouin said. "We had two great teams and I don't know which one was better. They were pretty equal. At the time none of us really knew what we had accomplished, we just wanted to do our best and have fun, but afterwards it was thrilling."

The Seminoles won 110 games those two years with a 54-7 record in 1981 and a 56-10 mark the year after. Florida State was an offensive juggernaut those two seasons, scoring an average of 9.2 runs per game. What might be even more impressive was the Seminoles' pitching and defense. Behind Painter, the team's lone pitcher, FSU gave up only 2.7 runs per game, a number that is unfathomable in slow pitch.

'I remember a lot of team unity and enthusiasm," Cottle said. "We were a group of winners, that's for sure, and we were a team that was willing to do whatever it took to get to the top. I'm just proud to have been part of the teams that started a tradition of winning."

While the AIAW was disbanded one year later and FSU went to NCAA competition in 1984, the players on those teams were the founders of a legacy that continues today.

DR. JOANNE GRAF

Dr. JoAnne Graf spent 30 successful seasons at the helm of the Florida State softball program. With 1,437 victories under her belt, Graf retired on June 15, 2008, with more wins than any other head coach in collegiate softball.

The first collegiate softball coach to earn 1,400 victories, Graf's numerous achievements with Florida State softball include AIAW slowpitch national championships in 1981 and 1982, seven trips to the Women's College World Series, with the first coming in 1986 (just four years after FSU went to NCAA fastpitch softball), 21 NCAA Regional appearances and 10 Atlantic Coast Conference titles.

On April 2, 2005, then-Florida State University President Dr. T.K. Wetherell officially renamed the softball stadium "JoAnne Graf Field at the Seminole





Softball Complex," making her among only two active softball coaches with fields named after them.

One of the most prolific coaches in collegiate softball, Graf concluded her career having won 75 percent of her games (1,437-478-6), including a 1,218-425-6 (.740) mark in NCAA Division I play. Her NCAA career win total is currently second all-time. Florida State averaged 50.75 wins per year under her guidance since beginning NCAA play ranked No. 1 all-time.

Graf is a 1975 graduate of Florida State. In 1992, she earned her doctorate degree in athletic administration at FSU, and continues to teach at her alma mater today.

The Tradition

Consistency. It is the mark of true excellence in any endeavor. However, in today's intercollegiate athletics, competition has become so balanced and so competitive that it is virtually impossible to maintain a high level of consistency.

Yet the Atlantic Coast Conference has defied the odds. Now, in its 60th year of competition, the ACC has long enjoyed the reputation as one of the strongest and most competitive intercollegiate conferences in the nation. And that is not mere conjecture, the numbers support it.

Since the league's inception in 1953, ACC schools have captured 127 national championships, including 67 in women's competition and 60 in men's. In addition, NCAA individual titles have gone to ACC student-athletes 145 times in men's competition and 104 times in women's action.

The conference had an immediate impact on the national college football scene in the fall of 1953 when the University of Maryland captured the first of what would eventually be five national football titles for the ACC. Clemson laid claim to the league's second national title in 1981 while Georgia Tech followed suit in 1990. Florida State pocketed national titles No. 4 and 5 in 1993 and 1999.

Additionally, Miami has laid claim to five national gridiron titles over the past 29 seasons. Four of the Hurricanes' five national titles (1983, 1987, 1989, 2001) were unanimous with both the sportswriters and coaches polls, while in 1991 Miami (AP) shared the national title with Washington (coaches).

The 12 institutions that take to the field this fall under the ACC banner have produced 586 first- or second-team gridiron All-Americas and 73 first-team academic All-Americas.

ACC Football, though, has always been about more than just wins and losses and individual athletics honors. For the sixth time in the last seven years, ACC schools, cumulatively, were ranked higher nationally than any other conference in the most recent rankings of American Universities by the U.S. News & World Report, with seven ACC institutions ranked 38th or higher nationally and all 12 schools rated as "Tier One" schools.

The Conference was No. 1 in the NCAA's APR for the sixth consecutive year in 2012, and the ACC has led all Football Bowl Subdivision Conferences in the NCAA's graduation rate (GSR) in six of the last seven years. In 2011, six ACC schools were honored nationally (AFCA) for their graduation rates. ACC schools have led the nation in football graduation rates no fewer than 20 times and have been honored for their rates 101 times, far more than any other conference.

Since becoming a 12-team league in 2005, the ACC has consistently made history in the NFL's annual professional football draft. This year, the ACC had 15 of the first 100 players chosen in the NFL Draft, and had the first linebacker chosen.

In the 2009 NFL Draft, the ACC was the only league with four players chosen among the top nine selections in the draft. It marked the second time in four years the ACC had managed that trick, also claiming four of the top nine picks in 2005. During the 2006, 2007 and 2008 drafts, the Conference became the first college league in the history to have two of the top four NFL Draft picks in each of three consecutive years.

In 2008, the ACC also set an NFL Draft record having the first defensive player chosen for three straight years with NC State's Mario Williams (2006), Clemson's Gaines Adams (2007) and Virginia's Chris Long (2008) claiming the honor.

The ACC's run began with the 2006 Draft when the Conference set an NFL Draft record with 12 players chosen in the first round and 51 players chosen overall. During that time, the ACC is second among all conferences in the last seven years in first-round draftees, having 40 chosen, and total number of draftees with 245.

Heading into the 2012 football season, no league in America has sent more linebackers to the NFL, as no fewer than 45 former ACC standouts began the summer on NFL rosters leading both the Big Ten (44) and SEC (38) for that honor. This marked the fourth straight year the Conference had led or tied in numbers of linebackers on NFL rosters.

Since 2006, the ACC has had more defensive ends or outside linebackers--the glamour positions of

defense in the NFL--drafted in the first or second rounds (19) than any other league. The Big Ten is next with 13 followed by the SEC (8).

The 12 current ACC schools have had 2,287 players selected in the annual professional football draft, including 232 first-round selections.

Last year, the ACC had three teams ranked among the Top 25 in both final polls for the Associated Press and USA Today Football Coaches. Virginia Tech was ranked 21st by AP and 17th by USA Today, followed by Clemson (22nd in both polls) and Florida State (23rd in both polls).

The ACC also has a storied bowl tradition, setting an NCAA record with 10 of its teams (.833) invited to post-season bowl games in 2008, breaking its own record for bowl participation (.778) set originally in 2002.

Since 2005, the Conference is second among all leagues with 58 of its teams traveling to postseason bowl games. Additionally, five of its teams— Florida State (6th, 25-14-2, .634), Boston College (1lth, 13-9, .591), NC State (16th, 14-11-1), Georgia Tech (17th, 22-18, .550) and Miami (20th, 19-17-0, .528)—rank among the Top 20 winningest bowl programs of all-time, with a sixth--Maryland (23rd, 11-11-1, .500)--tied for 23rd.

Three ACC schools are also among the top eight nationally in current bowl game streaks including national leader Florida State (30 straight bowl games), Virginia Tech (3rd, 19) and Georgia Tech (tied for 4th, 15).

2011-12 Review

The 2011-12 academic year saw ACC teams capturing four more national team titles and 7 individual NCAA crowns. In all, the ACC has won 55 national team titles over the last 14 years and has won two or more NCAA titles in 29 of the past 31 years.

The ACC was one of only three conferences in America to place two of its teams in the final Top 10 rankings of the 2011-12 Learfield Director's Cup Standings--symbolic of the nation's top overall programs--as Florida State (5th). North Carolina (8th). Virginia (15th) and Duke (16th) all were ranked nationally in the Top 20.

This past year also marked the 11th consecutive year that the ACC has placed four or more teams in the Too $30\,$

A total of I26 ACC teams placed in NCAA post-season competition in 2011-12. League teams compiled a II6-73-5 (.611) mark against opponents in NCAA championship competition.

Dr. Eric J. Barron **University President**



Dr. Eric J. Barron became 14th president of The Florida State University on February 1, 2010.

He is a 1973 Florida State alumnus, with a bachelor's degree in geology. He earned master's and doctoral degrees in oceanography from the University of Miami.

Prior to assuming the Florida State presidency, he served as director of the National Center for Atmospheric Research in Boulder, Colo. From 2006-2008 Dr. Barron was dean of the Jackson School of

Geosciences at the University of Texas at Austin. At Pennsylvania State University from 1986 to 2006, he was professor of geosciences, director of the Earth System Science Center, director of the EMS Environment Institute, and finally dean of the College of Earth and Mineral Sciences.

Dr. Barron is a Fellow in the American Association for the Advancement of Science, the American Geophysical Union, the American Meteorological Society and the Geological Society of America. He has received many national awards as a scholar, researcher and distinguished lecturer, has published extensively, and has been editor or a member of the editorial boards of a dozen academic journals.

He has testified before Congress and has chaired numerous committees in service to the federal government, including the NASA Senior Review for the Earth Sciences in 2005. He has chaired committees and panels of the National Research Council since 1987 and currently chairs "An Ocean Infrastructure for U.S. Ocean Research in 2030."

A highly visible scientist, Barron is committed to the full spectrum of academic disciplines. He is an ardent supporter and advocate for the full spectrum of excellence in the arts and humanities, sciences, law, business and medicine.

A native of Lafayette, Ind., Barron and his wife, Molly, have two grown children and one granddaughter.

ATHLETIC ADMINISTRATION

Randy Spetman Director of Athletics



Florida State Director of Athletics Randy Spetman can rightfully look at his four years at the helm of the Seminole athletic program with great pride. In his three full seasons as the Seminoles AD. FSU qualified for NCAA postseason play in every sport every year with just one exception. This past athletic year FSU equaled its highest-ever Director's Cup finish placing fifth for the second time in three years. The Seminoles were also just one of two schools to finish ranked among the Top Z5 in football, men's basketball and baseball. Six Seminole teams made it to the final four in their respective sports and the ACC named six of FSU's studentathletes the top scholar-athlete of the year in their sport.

In 2010-11 Florida State athletics was the only Division I department in the NCAA to have all of its 19 sports participate in the NCAA postseason. It marked the second consecutive year that FSU sent every one of its athletic programs into NCAA postseason play. In addition, this past athletic year the FSU's men's basketball program won the ACC Tournament

Title for the first time in school history, as did the Seminole women's soccer team.

After being ranked 15th nationally in the Director's Cup following his first year. FSU earned its highest ever ranking in 2009-10 when the school finished fifth overall. In 2010-11 FSU was in the top 10 once again finishing ninth in the nation. These were the first top 10 finishes in school history and in each of the last seven years the Seminole athletic program has finished higher in the standings than at any other point in program history. The first ever top 10 finishes under Spetman are so impressive as this has been accomplished during a time when budgets are as constrained at Florida's universities as they have ever been in the modern era.

In 2011-12 Florida State had a banner athletic year under Spetman's guidance both on the field and in the classroom. There were more than 50 All-America honors earned by Seminole student-athletes this past year, a number that was surpassed only by the amount of athletes selected to All-ACC Academic Teams.

"This was a wonderful athletic year on so many levels. Finishing in the top 5 for the second time in three years, something only four programs with three straight top 10 finishes have done, speaks to the commitment and excellence of this entire department, our coaches and especially our student-athletes." said Spetman. "To finish in the top 5 for a second time in three years and inside the top 15 every year I have been at Florida State is an amazing accomplishment. We are very proud to be amongst this select group of athletic programs and I know our fans appreciate the success we have had across the board."

In 2011-12 Florida State was one of only two schools to have football play in a bowl game, the men's team make the NCAA Basketball tournament and the baseball team play in the College World Series. That blend of rare success has been the norm the last three years at Florida State under Spetman. FSU was one of only eight schools to have its football team play in a bowl game, its men's basketball team selected to the NCAA Tournament and its baseball team selected for the NCAA Championships in 2010-11. That came on the heels of 2009-10 when the Seminoles were one of only three universities in the country to appear in a bowl game, a NCAA men's basketball tournament and advance to the baseball College World Series.

The success Spetman has experienced at Florida State begins with excellence in the classroom. In November of 2008, football's Myron Rolle highlighted the academic year when he became the second Seminole student-athlete since 2006 to earn a Rhodes Scholarship - one of the oldest and most prestigious awards for international study. It was the first time in nearly 25 years a Rhodes Scholar was awarded to a prominent college football player. Rolle is the fourth Florida State student ever to be named a Rhodes Scholar.

In the last three years alone there have been 18 Seminoles named the ACC's top student-athlete in their sport, 13 student-athletes have been named CoSIDA Academic All-Americans, 25 have been named CoSIDA Academic All-District first team selections and well over 200 All-ACC Academic honors have been bestowed on FSU student-athletes.

The success FSU's student-athletes and coaches have achieved since Spetman's first full year on the job in 2009 is a credit to his leadership and direction for the department. In just four years, there have been more than 250 All-America honors earned by Seminole student-athletes, 18 ACC Coach of the Year awards, 18 ACC team championships and out of a possible 76 NCAA Tournament appearances, the Seminoles have advanced to NCAA postseason play 69 times.

Over the last two years FSU added three exciting facilities with the completion of a multi-purpose teaching facility and six indoor courts for the tennis programs, a softball hitting complex, and a new sand volleyball complex as well. In 2011-12 the football practice fields, which underwent a major renovation during the summer, opened for fall practice.

Spetman was introduced as Director of Athletics at FSU on February 4, 2008 following a national search. A former pilot and retired Air Force colonel, he took over after serving as Director of Athletics at Utah State from 2004-2008 and in the same position at the United States Air Force Academy from 1996-2003.

Spetman, 59, was lauded over his tenure at Utah State for the success of the Aggies' athletic programs both on the field or court and in the classroom. Utah State joined the Western Athletic Conference (WAC) in 2005 and claimed four conference championships in its first two years. USU's student-athletes led the WAC with a 78 percent graduation rate and maintained over a 3.0 cumulative grade point average.

Under Spetman's leadership. Utah State made high profile improvements to the football stadium. He also spearheaded fundraising and building efforts for a \$12.5 million facility and crafted a unique business partnership for medical health coverage that improved the overall coverage of USU student-athletes and reduced

medical costs. In addition, he negotiated a lucrative new marketing agreement for Aggie Athletics with Learfield Sports Properties.

Spetman spent eight successful years as Director of Athletics at the United States Air Force Academy in Colorado Springs. Colo. During his tenure, he administered the school's 27-sport intercollegiate program as well as the physical education and intramural programs. Under his command, the football team participated in four bowl games.

Born and raised in Council Bluffs, lowa, Spetman graduated from the Air Force Academy in 1976. He earned three letters as a defensive end for the Falcons and was a team captain as a senior. He also won a pair of heavyweight Wing Open Boxing Championships. Spetman's 28-year military career took him around the world in a variety of positions. A command pilot with more than 3,000 hours of flight time, his range of positions took him from assistant football coach at his alma mater to Chief of Bomber Planning in Operations Desert Shield and Desert Storm to serving as Chief, Command and Control Division, Operations Directorate of the U.S. European Command in Stuttgart, Germany.

A graduate from Squadron Officer School, he attended the National War College and earned a master's degree in National Security Strategy. Spetman also holds a master's in management and supervision from Central Michigan University.

He served as President of the National Association of Collegiate Director's of Athletics (NACDA) in 2009-10.

He and his wife, the former Becky Luhring of Des Moines, Iowa, are the parents of two grown children, Brian and Kim.



Dr. Pamela L. Perrewe Faculty Athletics Representative



Pamela L. Perrewé (Ph.D.) is in her second year as the Faculty Athletic Representative to the NCAA and the Atlantic Coast Conference.

Perrewé is the Haywood and Betty Taylor Eminent Scholar of Business Administration and Distinguished Research Professor at Florida State University. She received her Bachelor degree in Psychology from Purdue University and her Master and Ph.D. degrees in Management from the University of Nebraska. Dr. Perrewé has focused her research interests in the areas of job stress, burnout, coping, mentoring, organizational politics, emotion and personality. Dr. Perrewé has published several books, over 20 book chapters and over 100 journal articles in journals such as Academy of

Management Journal, Journal of Management, Journal of Applied Psychology, and Organizational Behavior and Human Decision Processes. She holds Fellow status in the Society for Industrial and Organizational Psychology and the American Psychological Association.

Dr. Perrewé has maintained a commitment to her profession as well as to Florida State University for over 25 years, and she has won teaching, mentoring, and research awards at Florida State University. She has served as the Management Department Chair as well as the Associate Dean for Graduate Programs in the College of Business. She has a passion for sports, enjoys playing tennis, and has served on the Athletic Board since 2004. Dr. Perrewé also served on the Board of Scientific Counselors of the National Institute for Occupational Safety and Health (NIOSH) from 2004-2007. She is married to Dr. Gerald R. Ferris and together they have six children; Erin, Jennifer, Emily, Ellie, Stephen and Matthew and one granddaughter, Lily.

Monk Bonasorte Senior Associate Athletic Director

Monk Bonasorte is in his fifth year as Senior Associate Director of Athletics at Florida State and among his responsibilities is oversight of internal operations within the athletic department and oversight of Florida State's football program.

Currently, Bonasorte is responsible for administrative oversight of the following departments: Media Relations, Equipment, Communications, Student Services, Athletic Training, Coaches Video and

Strength & Conditioning.

A member of Florida State's All-Time football team as named by Athlon Magazine, Bonasorte earned four varsity letters (1977-80), played in the 1977 Tangerine Bowl and two Orange Bowls (1980 and 1981) and was inducted into the FSU Athletics Hall of Fame in 1995 as one of the top defensive backs in school history. He ranks second in school history with 15 interceptions while his eight interceptions in 1979 ranks as the second highest single season total in school history.

Bonasorte joined the Florida State athletics department executive staff in 2008 after a 13-year career as the president and executive director of the Florida State University Varsity Club - the organization that gives back to every Seminole letter winner and allows them to give back to the current letter winners. He helped build the FSU Varsity Club into one of the top organizations of its kind across the nation.

As a player, Bonasorte earned All-America Third Team honors in 1979 by the Associated Press and All-America Second Team honors from Football News in 1980 starring on one of the toughest defensive units in Florida State history in 1979. He led the nation in interceptions for the majority of the 1979 season and finished with eight to rank fourth nationally and set a Seminole record for interceptions in a season. The Seminoles ranked sixth nationally and fifth nationally during his junior and senior seasons respectively.

Bonasorte spent seven years working with the Elmont Sports Group - a leader in the building and marketing of professional sports teams. He served as the marketing director for two seasons for the Tallahassee Scorpions of indoor professional league. He served as the director of marketing for the East Coast Hockey league Tallahassee Tiger Sharks (1997-99) and served as the Vice-present and General Manager for the Tallahassee Thunder of the Arenal Football league (1999-2003).

Bonasorte and his wife, Beverly, have two sons, T.J. and Rocky.



Bernie Waxman Softball Oversight

In his 39th year at Florida State and his 23rd with the athletics department. Bernie Waxman continues to help mold the athletic campus that has emerged as one of the finest in the nation during his time. Waxman has represented athletics' interests during the building of a new soccer and softball complex, the renovation of Dick Howser Stadium, the construction of the FSU Basketball Training Center and cooperatively with other university departments had a role in the completion the University Center, the Dave Middleton Golf Building at the Don Veller Golf Course, the Don Loucks Tennis Courts at the Scott Speicher Tennis Center, the band practice field (The Manley Whitcomb Band Complex and Bill Harkins Field) the Morcom

Aquatics Center, and the McIntosh Track and Field Building. The athletics department has also invested in a number of improvements to Tully Gymnasium. These renovations include a new sound system, expanded locker rooms, new offices, an expanded strength and conditioning area, and the addition of tradition displays to name just a few. A new indoor tennis facility was also constructed under Waxman's watch, and he is currently working with the building team on the construction of Florida State football's indoor practice facility.

Softball's own facilities have seen great changes under Waxman, including the recent indoor batting facility that was finished in February 2011. Waxman has overseen projects that have made the Seminole Softball Complex one of the top softball venues in the nation.

In addition to his current Facility and Event Management responsibilities Waxman has oversight responsibilities for men's and women's golf, cross country, indoor and outdoor track and field and softball.

A 1971 graduate of Florida State University, Waxman earned three letters as a member of the FSU track and field team and captained the 1972 squad. He also earned his Master's Degree from Florida State in 1972
