

WHY FSU?

For years, parents, coaches and educators have praised sports and athletics as a means for improving physical abilities and developing character. There is little argument against the fact that participation in a regularly scheduled athletic training program will improve the physical status of those involved. But what of sports as a character builder? Do individuals involved in athletics develop into more self-confident, understanding, humane, moral, achievement-oriented individuals? Does the experience give the participant a clearer understanding of her environment, herself, her peers, her lifestyle, the lifestyle of others, and the value of such things as dedication, positive thinking, perseverance, humility, etc.? Unfortunately, in today's society these questions may not always be answered affirmatively.

With the extensive involvement of our society in the sports world of today, the emphasis on winning and being number one has emerged as a priority in most athletic programs. This fact, plus the close economic ties to the production of winners has caused many athletic organizations to become so totally involved in winning that they lose sight of the potential of their sport as a means for character development.

WINNING IS IMPORTANT! Yet there is also an opportunity to learn through sport experiences. The potential does in fact exist. Many researchers and extremely knowledgeable men and women will agree that the athletic experience can aid in the development of the values mentioned earlier, IF DIRECTED TO THAT END.

Herein lies the philosophy of coaching in the Florida State program. The F.S.U. program is set up to develop the whole individual, not only physically, but mentally as well. Character traits such as perseverance, dedication, self-confidence, caring for others, "sportsmanship" and basic understanding of one's capabilities and limitations receive an equal amount of attention as do stroke work, interval training and meet performance.

Don't get us wrong. We work hard! We strive to win! We hold very strenuous workouts and we develop quality athletes. Yet their quality, when their participation is over, will hopefully not be just a memory in a scrapbook, but will be in the type of human being who will have a great deal of positive input to her environment.



1982 Outlook: On the Rise

An 11-1 record, five All-Americans and a 14th place finish at the AlAW National Championships. Seasons such as the one the Lady Seminoles experienced in 1981 are usually reserved for teams that have reached their full potential. But such is not the case for the Florida State women's swimming team.

With an excellent recruiting year tucked away, along with another year of valuable experience for the returning lettermen, Florida State appears headed for another great season.

Under seventh-year head coach Terry Maul, the Lady Seminoles appear stronger in every event than at any other time in their short but successful history.

"I look forward to the 1981-82 season with great anticipation," Maul says. "We have quality depth in almost every event this season, and that is something that we have lacked in prior years."

As was the case last season, the sprints will be the squad's strongest area. In addition to returning All-Americans Sharon Spuler and Lenore Gribble, the squad will be bolstered by the addition of junior Laurie Lehner. A former swimmer at Monmouth College, Lehner was ranked third in the world 50-meter freestyle and 14th in the 100 meter Butterfly in 1980. She holds the American record in the 50-meter (short course).

Gribble holds the Florida State records in both the 50 and 100-free events; while Spuler was FSU's highest individual finisher at Nationals a year ago.

At the middle distances, the Lady Seminoles will field an experienced squad in all strokes, with the exception of the free-style. Meg McCully, Kim Foster and freshman Stacy Deck are three backstroke specialists that all have the potential to place at the National Championships. In the breaststroke, Lisa Nencioni and Sharon Spuler return for Florida State. Both qualified for breast-stroke events at the AlAW Championships last season. Sonya Booth, a freshman from West Palm Beach, Fla., will give the Lady Seminoles added clout in the event. Booth finished third and fourth in the 50 and 100-meter breaststroke events this summer at

the Junior Olympic Championships at Mission Viejo, California. Her times, when translated to yards, are faster than FSU's varsity records in those events.

Gribble, Foster and senior Paula Hartzer return to give the Seminoles and experienced group in the individual medley events.

If any area of concern can be found on the 1981-82 FSU squad, that area would be the distance freestyle events. Lack of depth may cost Florida State points this season. McCully and Foster who will concentrate mostly on middle distance events, may help FSU at the longer events also. The Lady Seminoles will also look for points from juniors Amy Davis and Julie Day. Freshman Kelly Hillencamp, whose brother John is one of the nation's primere distance swimmers, may also help at these events.

Under new diving coach Dave Moreau, FSU should improve significantly in the one and three-meter board competition. Veteran divers Camile Cox and Lynn McCoy will combine with freshman Susan Hahn to form a solid group of divers for the Lady Seminoles

"Basically, I'd say we're a much stronger team in all events from the sprints to the middle distances," Maul says. "Since most dual and championship meets are composed of sprint and middle distance events, I'd say we're in pretty good shape."

Can the Lady Seminoles match last season's performance? Maul believes this year's squad can not only match but surpass last year's accomplishments. "As I see it Texas will be the favorite to repeat as National Champions. After that there are perhaps five or seven teams that could take second place. I would like to believe that we would be one of those teams in the running."



TERRY MAUL Head Coach



To allow each individual to develop to her fullest potential academically, educationally and athletically. For the past six years this has been Terry Maul's philosophy on coaching at FSU.

And for the past six years, the FSU women's swimming program has benefited from this philosophy. From a 2-4 year in 1975 (Maul's rookie coaching season) to an 11-1 record in 1981, Florida State has improved each year under Maul's tutelage until it is now recognized as one of the nation's top programs.

A mere look at Florida State's record under Maul backs this up. During the past three seasons,

Maul has racked up an impressive 30-5-0 record and has coached his squad to a top 20 ranking in both 1977 and 1981, including a 14th place finish at last season's AIAW National Championship.

Under Maul, FSU has had 23 athletes earn 31 All-America titles. His overall coaching record at Florida State



stands at 46-17-0, good for a .730 winning percentage. Maul was named "Region III Coach of the Year" in 1980.

But excellence in athletics is only a part of Maul's program. At Florida State, Maul places academic and educational aspects at the same priority level as athletics. "We have three goals for our swimmers at Florida State—academic, educational and performance," Maul says. "Our academic goal is to have a team grade point average of at least a 3.0. Educationally, we'd like members of our team to use the experience and techniques we offer them and put them to use in other areas of life.

"Finally,our performance goals are to assist each individual to produce personal best performances and through that, complete a winning dual meet season and finish among the nation's top 20 teams."

A former Seminole swimmer, Maul was graduated from Florida State University with a bachelor's degree in 1968. He then earned a masters' degree in sports psychology from FSU, finishing that degree in 1975. He has completed all course work for a doctorate on the same subject.

Maul's coaching career began during his undergraduate years at FSU where he coached summer swimming teams in both Tallahassee and Wellington, Kansas. In 1971, Maul became manager and coach of the Sheridan Swim Club in Quincy, Ill. It was there that he developed Nicole Kramer, who would later become a member of the 1980 United States Olympic Team.

Maul returned to Florida State in 1976 to become FSU's first full-time women's swimming coach.

In addition to having several articles on swimming and sports psychology published, Maul is a member of the Board of Directors of the National Collegiate Women's Swimming Coaches Association. He is responsible for developing a research newsletter for that organization which circulates quarterly to more than 400 coaches throughout the world.

JODI YAMBOR Assistant Coach



Jodi Yambor begins her third season at Florida State as Terry Maul's top assistant. As a member of Maul's staff, Yambor is in charge of coaching the middle distance events as well as handling certain administrative tasks for the squad.

Yambor started her coaching duties at Florida State in 1979, following a standout career at the University of Miami. At Miami, Yambor was a 16-event All-American and helped her alma mater win the AlAW National Championship twice. As a member of the 200-yard medley

relay team, Yambor helped Miami win that event three times.

Previous coaching experience for Yambor includes aquatic club coaching of age-group swimmers for six summers at the Carrollwood Village Swim Team in Tampa, Fla.

Yambor received her bachelor's degree from the University of Miami in 1978 and finished her master's degree in movement science from FSU in 1980. She is currently working on doctorate in sports psychology.

ANDREW LEHNER Assistant Coach



Andrew Lehner enters his first season at Florida State as assistant swimming coach to Terry Maul. A native of Caldwell, N.J., Lehner brings a wealth of coaching experience to the Lady Seminoles.

Lehner's coaching experience includes stints as swimming coach at the Ft. Lauderdale Swimming Team (1980-81), North Houston (Texas) Dolphins Swim Club (1979-80) and the Somerset Hills (New Jersey) YMCA Club (1978-79).

Prior to coaching, Lehner was a standout athlete at Monmouth College (New Jersey) and

before that at the University of Southern California. While at USC, Lehner finished 11th at the 1973 NCAA Championships in the 100-fly. He also was a member of the USA senior national team that same year. After transferring to Monmouth College in 1975, Lehner went on to set an NCAA record in the 100-fly.

Lehner's duties at Florida State include working primarily with distance swimmers and development of a strength program.

DAVE MOREAUDiving Coach



Dave Moreau is in his first year as the Florida State diving coach. He joined the Seminole staff last August after serving as the diving coach of six high school teams in Houston's (Tex.) Spring Branch School District.

While coaching for Spring Branch, he was named Texas High School Coach of the Year, the only diving coach to ever receive that honor. He also coached the high school all-state diving teams from 1979-81 and took the 1979 squad to Norway and Sweden to compete in international competition.

Moreau also coached the Dad's Club AAU team in Houston and was named AAU Coach of the Year in both 1979 and 80.

He received his bachelor's degree from Ohio State University in 1977 after a successful diving career in which he achieved All-American honors on the one and three meter boards. He worked as a part-time coach of the OSU women's diving team as a junior and co-captained the men's squad as a senior.

Moreau received Ohio State's student athlete award, an honor that combines athletics and academics, in his sophomore, junior and senior years.

He has been associated with Ron O'Brien, the nation's premier diving coach, for the last seven years. He was coached by O'Brien during his early competitive years and later worked at the O'Brien School of Diving.

BETH KINGAdministrative Assistant



Beth King begins her first season on the Florida State coaching staff as an administrative assistant following a year on Terry Maul's staff as an assistant coach. As an administrative assistant, King is responsible for the day-to-day affairs and duties associated with running a major collegiate program.

A graduate of the University of Alabama, King served for three seasons as a student coach for her alma mater before coming to Florida State as an assistant coach last season.

King's additional coaching experience includes several years as a coach for several swimming clubs, including Sea



N. B. "Bim" Stults Aquatic Center

Long known as one of the most respected swimming programs in the country, Florida State boasts some of the finest facilities found anywhere in the nation. The spacious Stults Aquatic Center on the FSU campus is no exception.

Heated for maximum comfort, the pool itself sports the standard 25 yard collegiate course which has eight lanes set into a 60-foot wide area. This leaves each of the outside lanes two feet from the wall making them as fast as the middle lanes. The same holds true for the eight-lane 50-meter course.

In addition, the pool itself is equipped with Keifer lane lines for both 25 and 50 meters, has extremely deep gutters which allow swimmers to compete in perfectly smooth water, and also has three underwater windows for stroke analysis and filming.

The diving areas meet or exceed the published specifications as outlined by the NCAA and the AAU. Included in the diving area are a pair of one-meter and three-meter boards and a platform tower. All four maxiflex boards are mounted on Durafilm fulcrums. The tower has platforms at five, seven-and-a-half and 10 meters.

The mild climate of the Tallahassee winter has allowed out-door workouts over the years, but last spring the state legislature allotted monies to have the Aquatic Center enclosed in a heated bubble for the colder months. During the warm months, the translucent bubble will be removed.

Florida State also offers one of the finest dry practice setups found anywhere in the country. A complete set of Nautilus weights are available to all athletes and are used extensively by the Florida State swimming program.

C. W. "Hootie" Ingram Director of Athletics



C. W. Hootie Ingram is in his first year as athletic director at Florida State. Assuming his post on January 16, 1981, Ingram brings to Florida State an outstanding reputation as athletic administrator.

Prior to accepting the Florida State post, Ingram worked with the prestigious Southeastern Conference for eight years—first as an assistant commissioner and then as an associate commissioner since 1978

A native of Tuscaloosa, Alabama, Ingram played football for the University of Alabama from 1951-54. Following a stint in the army after graduation from college, Ingram turned to coaching. After several years in the high school ranks, Ingram moved into college coaching. He served as an assistant coach at Wake Forest, Virginia Tech, Georgia and Arkansas. He assumed the head coaching job at Clemsom University in 1970 and remained there for three years before joining the SEC.

While with the SEC, Ingram's duties included supervision of football and basketball officials, rules interpetations and eligibility.

Barbara Palmer Women's Athletic Director




As the women's athletic director at Florida State since 1977, Barbara Palmer has been instrumental in the development of women's athletics at FSU to the point that the Lady Seminole athletic program is regarded as one of the finest in the country.

Only one women's team has experienced a losing record in the last two years, while two teams—golf and volley-ball won their respective national championships in 1981.

Palmer's duties as women's athletic director includes the hiring of coaches, preparation of budgets, monitoring of scheduling and travel and raising of funds. She was directly responsible for the funding FSU women's athletics receives from the state legislature each year. It was Palmer's lobbying that pushed Title IX legislation through the state government in 1980.

Palmer joined Florida State after serving four years as executive director of a private leisure and recreation services organization. A long-time resident of Tallahassee, Palmer graduated from FSU in 1970 and earned a master's degree in leisure services in 1974

Palmer is currently president of Region III of the AIAW.



THIS IS FLORIDA STATE

Florida State University—the home of more than 22,500 Seminoles—has a campus that starts at the top of one of Tallahassee's famed seven hills, and rolls gently downward and westward across 340-odd acres of pines, palms and pecan trees.

Founded in 1857 as the Seminary West of the Suwannee, its heritage is evidenced in the wide range of architectural struggles to preserve history and keep up with modern times and air conditioning. Yet it still ranks as one of the South's last, few bastions of campus greenery—the kind that combines the blossoms of camellias, azaleas and dogwoods with moss-hung oaks that are, in some cases, as old as the University itself, if not older.

From the Gothic towers of Westcott at the eastern entrance to the campus, to the modern glass and steel structures of its Science Complex to the west, Florida State University has moved forward in time and growth more rapidly than many of its newer counterparts in the State University System. Its enrollment has quadrupled since it became coeducational in 1947, following nearly half a century as the Florida State College for Women.

Today, its 14 schools and colleges are spread through \$150 million worth of buildings, its annual budget exceeds \$100 million and it attracts more than \$18 million a year in research contracts and grants. Students can pick and choose from more than 100 career options offered in arts and sciences, business, communication, criminology, dance, education, home economics, law, library science, music, nursing, social sciences, social work, theater and visual arts programs.

The location of FSU in the Capitol City of Florida offers unusual opportunities for study and research in the social and policy sciences, and an optimum environment for internships and on-the-job learning experiences for students in many fields of study.

A city within a city, Florida State has 1,200 faculty members, more than 6,000 additional employees and a construction program that will exceed \$50 million before the end of 1981.
