

WHY FSU?

For years, parents, coaches and educators have praised sports and athletics as a means for improving physical abilities and developing character. There is little argument against the fact that participation in a regularly scheduled athletic training program will improve the physical status of those involved. But what of sports as a character builder? Do individuals involved in athletics develop into more self-confident, understanding, humane, moral, achievement-oriented individuals? Does the experience give the participant a clearer understanding of her environment, herself, her peers, her lifestyle, the lifestyle of others, and the value of such things as dedication, positive thinking, perseverance, humility, etc.? Unfortunately, in today's society these questions may not always be answered affirmatively.

With the extensive involvement of our society in the sports world of today, the emphasis on winning and being number one has emerged as the priority in most athletic programs. This fact, plus the close economic ties to the production of winners, has caused many athletic organizations to become so totally involved in winning that they lost sight of the potential of their sport as a means for character development.

WINNING IS IMPORTANT! Yet there is also an opportunity to learn through sport experiences. The potential does in fact exist. Many researchers and extremely knowledgeable men and women will agree that the athletic experience can aid in the development of the values mentioned earlier, IF DIRECTED TO THAT END.

Herein lies the philosophy of coaching in the Florida State program. The FSU program is set up to develop the whole individual, not only physically, but mentally as well. Character traits such as perseverance, dedication, self-confidence, caring for others, "sportsmanship" and basic understanding of one's capabilities and limitations receive an equal amount of attention as do stroke work, interval training and meet performance.

Don't get us wrong. We work hard! We strive to win! We hold very strenuous workouts and we develop quality athletes. Yet their quality, when their participation is over, will hopefully not be just a memory in a scrapbook, but will be in the type of human being who will have a great deal of positive input to her environment.

Fifteen performers from last with a powerful group of recruits Canadian National finalists, a pair of -Americans and a junior college Allto that the unexpected return of one of r and Maul believes he holds the keys to what ery successful start to his second decade as head the Lady Seminoles. The team will be stronger in varea over last year and could mount a serious challenge to unseat South Carolina as champion of the Metro Conference. Depth in almost every event, severely lacking in 1984-85, will be one of the major improvements of the squad. The biggest question mark will be how quickly the youth-laden Lady Seminoles, with only three seniors on the roster, will mature against a tough schedule which includes dual meets against Florida, Georgia and Division II national champion South Florida. Standouts for FSU include All-American diver Wendy Fuller, last year's Most Valuable Swimmer Karen Acre, and four-time All-American Sara Linke, who returns after sitting out last year.

SPRINTS (50/100 Free) - Freshmen sprinters Angela Jones and Veronica Danko come in with excellent credentials and will handle most of the responsibilities in these races. Help here will also come from veterans Tina Gallivan and Jennifer Tankersley. Gallivan scored points in both events at last year's Metro Championships. Lori Skrobiak may also see some action.

MIDDLE DISTANCE (200/500 Free) - Last year these events were a question mark going into the season. This year no questions remain. Loads of both quality and depth make this one of FSU's strongest areas. Linke's return and the arrival of Karen Ciesla will take some of the load off Acre. A host of others will also contribute including Gallivan and Ann Belew, who both scored at Metro's. Mary Gorham, Kay Sterrett, Jane Hayes, Leslie Brown, and Lisa Cunningham are all possibilities.

DISTANCE (1,000/1,650 Free) - Distance events should pose no problems, although Maul has plans to use only a trio of swimmers during the year. In Acre, Maul has the runnerup in the Metro Conference and the school record holder in the 1,650 free (17:08.35). Gorham, who finished seventh in the Metro Conference Championships in 1984-85, is back and Ciesla, a high school All-American in the free, should contribute immediately.

BACKSTROKE (100/200) - This area will be strengthened considerably by the addition of Cunningham. Skrobiak, now in her senior season, once had the sole responsibility for any success in the back events. That is no longer true. Sterrett swam well in her freshman year and will be counted on again this season along with freshman Kelly Smith.


pool full of potential is what awaits the Lady Seminoles here. Last season Maul had one excellent breaststroker but no depth. This year, relying completely on two incoming freshmen, he gives up experience but gains much needed depth. Susan Gable and Alice Freeman will be given the chance to lead the charge in these events. Competition between the two could help make this area a team strength.

BUTTERFLY (100/200) - The fly is very possibly the strongest event for the Florida State team. Everyone returns from a group that last year had three scorers in the 100 fly and four Top 10 finishers in the 200 fly at the Metro Championships. Canadian Chantel Martineau leads the way and is backed by two-year conference finalist Karen Keller. Hayes, Tankersley, and possibly Gallivan will all see action in the fly. If that isn't enough, Brown, a junior college All-American, will provide even more power and depth to an already able group.

INDIVIDUAL MEDLEY (200/400) - Both IM races should be improved in 1985-86. How improved will depend on the impact of newcomers Brown and Ciesla. In addition to the fly, Brown was also a JC All-American in the IM at Brevard CC. Martineau, fourth and sixth at the Metro last year, leads the returners and should again anchor the IMers. Hayes and Prozzillo should also see plenty of action in these races.

RELAYS (400 Medley/400 and 800 Free) - Although Maul is sure all three relays will be faster than in 1984-85, there is not much else he can say. Each of them is still a huge question mark. The medley event is wide open with almost anyone having a chance at the four spots. In the 400, having more pure sprinters on the team will help tremendously, but constant improvement will be necessary. In the 800, Acre returns for the third year in a row and should provide leadership.

DIVING (One and Three Meter) - Last season all six tribe divers who went to the Metro Championships scored on both the one and three meter boards. For this season, only half of those remain, but among those still here is FSU's first-ever diving All-American. Now, Canadian Wendy Fuller returns for her sophomore season and leads what is now a smaller but still very capable group of FSU divers. Along with Fuller is former Metro three meter champion Patsy O'Toole who finished fourth on the one meter and fifth on the three at the 1985 Conference Championships. Sophomore Sharon Warning is also back and will be counted on heavily during the season.



This is Florida State:



Florida State University, a coeducational institution with an enrollment of 21,500 students, is located in Tallahassee, the capital of Florida.

The beautiful 345-acre campus is wrapped in greenery that combines the blossoms of camellias, azaleas and dogwoods with palm trees and moss-hung oaks. The campus looks enough like Ivy League schools, particularly around its older, Gothic buildings, that several times each winter New York

advertising agencies fake summer scenes supposedly shot at Princeton or Harvard. On the west side of campus, the scene is dominated by the contemporary, high-rise science complex.

There are more than 1,300 faculty including four members of the National Academy of Sciences. Florida State is one of only five universities in the nation to have its own supercomputer.

Academic programs in the sciences (notably physics, chemistry, biology and meterology) and the performing arts (music, theater, visual arts and dance) have high national rankings. Other strong departments among the 15 schools and colleges include criminology, hospitality administration, accounting, statistics and interior design. FSU's pre-med program has a much higher than average medical school placement rate for its graduates.

Today, FSU offers students the opportunity to choose from more than 100 career options in arts and sciences, business, communication, criminology, education, home economics, law, library and information studies, music, nursing, social sciences, social work, theater, visual arts and engineering, which operates in cooperation with Florida A&M University. The most popular majors at FSU are business, biology, computer science and communication.

Florida State has honors programs for its top students. Overseas study program in fields ranging from law to hotel and restaurant administration are offered in Florence, Italy; Oxford and London, England; Switzerland, Costa Rica, Yugoslavia and the Panama Canal Zone.

Social life for many centers around 24 fraternities and 20 sororities. Wind surfing, swimming and sunning are among the activities to be enjoyed at FSU's convenient lakeside "Reservation" or along the sandy beaches of nearby coasts.

A unique extracurricular activity is the Flying High Circus, the nations only all-collegiate circus. Students from every academic major can become stars on the flying trapeze, on the highwire or in clown acts.

Fine entertainment is provided year-round by the FSU Schools of Music and Theater and the Department of Dance.

Student Campus Entertainment presents concerts, movies, lectures and other activities throughout the year and the Artist Series brings professional entertainers to campus.

Student government at FSU is one of the most powerful in the country. Elected students spend an annual budget of about \$1.7 million. Student government funds intramurals, activities at the Student Union and more than 200 interest organizations.



C.W. "HOOTIE" INGRAM Athletic Director

Cecil Ingram, known to most of his friends and associates as simply "Hootie," has headed the Florida State athletic department since 1981 after serving as associate commissioner of the Southeastern Conference for eight years.

Since his arrival in Tallahassee, Ingram has initiated a \$10 million dollar building program for athletic facilities, including the Moore Athletic Center - home of Florida State athletics.

A native of Tuscaloosa, Ala., Ingram played for the Crimson Tide from 1951 to 1954 and led the nation in interceptions as a sophomore. He also lettered in baseball as an infielder. Following a stint in the army, Ingram turned to coaching. After several years of high school coaching, Ingram moved into collegiate athletics; making assistant coaching stops at Wake Forest, Virginia Tech, Georgia and Arkansas.



BOB GOIN Associate Athletic Director

A member of the Florida State athletic staff since 1981, Bob Goin begins his fifth full year as Associate Athletic Director.

All men's non-revenue coaches report to Goin and he also assists in the day-to-day operations of the department. A large portion of football, basketball and baseball game-day operations fall under his leadership.

A 1959 graduate of Bethany College, Goin received his master's degree from West Virginia in 1961. From 1960-76, Goin served Bethany in several administrative and coaching capacities before moving on to West Virginia as an assistant athletic director. He was named athletic director at California (Pa.) State College in 1980, where he formed that institution's first scholarship fund for athletics and the college's first booster club.



CHARLES W. EHRHARDTFaculty Athletic Committee Chairman

A Florida State University professor of law, Charles W. Ehrhardt is in his second year as Chairman of the Athletic Committee.

He is currently in his second stint on the committee, having served 1969-71 and then being reappointed to the board in 1983. As chairman, Ehrhardt succeeded Dr. James Jones, who held that position since 1980. Ehrhardt becomes Florida State's representative to the NCAA and was also president of the Metro Conference in 1984-85.

A native of Elkander, Iowa, Ehrhardt received his bachelor's degree from Iowa in 1962 before earning a law degree at Iowa State two years later. He came to Florida State in 1967,

A widely respected expert in the field of Evidence, Erhardt is frequently called on to lecture on the subject by lawyers and judges nationwide.
