

here is an underlying current of excitement running through the women's tennis team. It's manifested by the feeling that the team goals are in sight and that FSU is on the verge of achieving great strides in collegiate tennis. lt's a Seminole Uprising of sorts and it is the Dawn of a New Era in Florida State tennis.

In the midst of the excitement is Head Coach Alice Reen. After only one year at the helm of the program, Reen has taken significant steps in changing the perception of Lady Seminole tennis. There is a new winning attitude brought on by Reen's coaching philosophy, the players, and the new tennis center.

To be successful Reen says they must "establish a tradition at Florida State through the work on and off the court. This begins by installing a work ethic and a mentality that will take the program into the national rankings." This process is already well underway with the four veteran players. Audra Brannon, Jenny Graf, Jennifer Hyde and Amy Hanby understand the demands and rigors that are necessary to win. Brannon, Graf and Hyde are juniors and will serve as the core of the squad for the next two years. Hanby is the team's

Four additional players join the lineup in 1992. LSU transfer Laura Randmaa leads the talented group that also includes three freshmen, Bresha Byrd, Sandi Ecclestone and Elke Juul.

Reen describes her team as hard working and intense. She adds, "the returning players will be the backbone of the team. The new players will be impact players who step into the spots vacated by the seniors that graduated."

> Singles is the focal point but doubles play will be one of the team's major strengths this year. The squad has experienced doubles players and finding the right chemistry will determine the ultimate success of the teams. Reen believes that there won't be a weak link in doubles play this year allowing FSU to field three solid teams.

Another advantage working towards the team's favor is the Scott Speicher Tennis Center at Don Loucks Courts. The new state-of-the-art tennis facilty will house 12 lighted courts and 1,332 seats. The stadium will be a fitting place for the rising Lady Seminole tennis team to reside.

All these factors will assist Reen in reaching her main objective. "My goal for the players is that they graduate and they feel that their collegiate experience was a success."

# Alice Reen Head Coach University of Georgia



Simply put, second year Head Coach Alice Reen makes a difference. Throughout her competitive and coaching career, Alice has elevated the level of competition at every program she has been associated with, and she is well on her way to continuing that trend here at Florida State where she led the Lady Seminoles to a 13-10 record last year, third place in the Atlantic Coast

The Orlando native played collegiate tennis for the University of Georgia. When she arrived in Athens, the Lady Bulldogs were by no means a perennial powerhouse. Four years later, Reen was Georgia's number one player and captain of the team that was runner-up at the 1987 NCAA Tournament in Los Angeles.

Upon graduation, Reen stayed on with the Lady Bulldogs as an assistant before moving on to the University of Tennessee. Today it would be difficult to say that both schools didn't benefit immensely from Reen, as both are continually ranked in the top 20 and belong to the nation's elite in women's tennis.

In 1990, Alice Reen earned her first head coaching position at the University of

Arkansas. Unsurprisingly, Reen enjoyed a successful season in Fayetteville before accepting the head job at Florida State. Despite this being only her second season in Tallahassee, Reen is already directing the Lady Seminoles to the top.

With top 20 experience as a player and a coach, it seems only a matter of time.before Reen puts Florida State's women's tennis among the upper echelon of intercollegiate programs. This summer, Reen coached the 18-year-old Florida Intersectional team to a first place finish in the USTA's National Tournament.

Alice Reen is a fine overall athlete which should come as no surprise when considering her lineage. Her father played football for the University of Florida and her brother is the general manager of the Cleveland Indians. Currently, Alice is working on her Master's in Athletic Adminstration.

In her first season as women's tennis assistant coach, Jenny Mainz will be concerned with a variety of on and off court activities. Included in her responsibilities will be assisting in the coaching of

the doubles teams as well as performing a variety of administrative tasks.

Mainz is a former player from the University of Houston. While there, she won many awards including being named a GTE Academic All-American. In addition she was voted captain of her team three years and was tabbed a member of the All-Southwest Conference team two years. Mainz ranked as high as 12th in the nation in doubles in 1990.

Currently Jenny is working on a Master degree in Exercise Physiology.





# Scott Speicher

Tennis Center

To support the future of Florida State tennis, a new 1.2 million dollar tennis center will grace the FSU campus in the next year. Due to growing popularity and the rise of Seminole tennis, the existing courts no longer satisfy the recreational and Varsity athletic needs of the University.

The state-of-the-art center will house twelve varsity tennis courts as well as 1,332 court level seats. The Scott Speicher Tennis Center will be one of the premier tennis facilities in the country.





The center has been named in the honor of Lieutenant Commander Michael Scott Speicher, a graduate of Florida State University, and the first American casualty of the Operation Desert Storm. By Presidential Directive, the Facilty has been named the "Scott Speicher Tennis Center."

The facility was designed by Emo/Architects, Inc, a Tallahassee based Architectural firm, in collaboration with Global Consult Group, Inc. an internationally recognized Tennis Facility Design Consultant. The complex was funded by a private source and the State University System of Florida.

# Strength & Training

Strength training and conditioning is an important part of an athlete's performance on the court. At Florida State, a specially designed program is developed for tennis, emphasizing the objectives of strengthening and conditioning the athletes. Strength coach Matt Hamparian individually customizes programs for each of the athletes beginning with pre-conditioning before the season gets underway.

Hamparian works with the players in sport specific training which includes conditioning the major muscle groups used in tennis. The coaches believe so strongly in the program that they even participate themselves. FSU takes pride in customizing the programs to help student-athletes reach their maximum potential.

Being an athlete at Florida State University means receiving the best care and treatment possible. All of the student-athletes undergo a pre-season examination so a certified trainer can detect any potential injuries an athlete may incur. If a problem is detected, the athlete is placed on a prevention care program which may include any kind of treatment from icing to exercising. The program is closely monitored by Head Trainer Robin Gibson or one of her nine staff members.

Rehabilitation is another important componet of the Seminole training room. Though preventing injuries is the main objective, they are sometimes a part of participating in athletics. More serious injuries and illnesses are referred to the Seminole team physicians at the Tallahassee Orthopedic Center, who, for many years, have worked in conjunction with the FSU training room in successfully rehabilitating numerous athletes after an injury.



# Acodemics

Coach Alice Reen's Lady Seminoles are destined to become a force to be reckoned with on the tennis courts. Equally, they have become a force to be reckoned with in the classroom. Coach Reen's vision is focused on just more than her tennis team's competitive edge on the courts, she keeps a keen eye on their progress in the classroom as well.

"One of the first priorities I try to instill when an athlete comes to FSU is the need to strive for academic excellence. Their accomplishments in the classroom is a genuine concern for me and a responsibility that I gladly accept," Reen says.


Coach Reen is proud of the fact that four of her players were nominated by FSU to the Atlantic Coast Conference Honor Roll. For attaining above a B-average the entire school year and participating in a intercollegiate sport, the players were recognized by the University.

Here at Florida State the Lady Seminoles, as well as all of their student-athlete counterparts, enjoy one of the nation's premier academic support systems. A full-time staff assists all incoming student-athletes adjust to their new campus environment and works with them throughout their academic careers at FSU.

In addition to a solid academic support staff, all studentathletes have the luxury of a spacious and quiet study hall. They also have the advantage of private study carols, computers and basic reference materials that are conducive for studying. At the student-athletes' request, free tutors are also available.

Athletic Director Bob Goin says, "We want to provide the best opportunity for our student-athletes to achieve academic and athletic success. Doing that, we'll be setting a precedent of excellence."





### FSU and the Atlantic Coast Conference

The Atlantic Coast Conference has long been known for the success of its athletic programs and tennis is further proof of this fact. Last year the conference ranked four teams in the nation's top 25 including number four Duke. Wake Forest, Clemson and North Carolina rounded out the ACC teams in the top 25.

Florida State proved to be a force in conference play in 1992. The Lady Seminoles defeated both Wake Forest and North Carolina en route to a 6-3 ACC record. FSU finished third in the conference standings.

Duke won the conference crown for the fifth year in a row last season. The Blue Devils shut out runner-up Wake Forest 6-0 in the Championship match. Although Duke has been the team to beat in recent years, the ACC has witnessed streaks of champions. North Carolina had the

most success in early years, winning the championship from 1977-1980. From 1981-1987 Clemson put together a string of victories. Duke snapped their streak in 1988 and have been on cruise control ever since.

The 1993 season will be the 16th year of women's tennis competition in the Atlantic Coast Conference. Beginning in 1977, the ACC started crowning a conference champion. This process has gone through many changes throughout the years. In 1982 the tournament was held in the spring for the first time. In 1990, the tournament determined the ACC team champion while the singles and doubles champi-

ons were decided in regular-season play.

Florida State plays in the ACC Championships in Charlotte, NC on April 22-25.

# 1991 Results

### Year in Review

The mark of a team can often be measured by how it responds to adversity. That's exactly what the Lady Seminoles were forced to do after they found themselves 0-3 at the start of the season. Not willing to accept defeat, the team responded by winning their next six matches in a row. Included in the streak were two victories over conference foes, Virginia and N.C. State. Nine matches into the season, the squad posted a 6-3 record and a 2-0 mark in the ACC.

The team see-sawed through the rest of the season, losing a match then coming back and winning the next one. One of the biggest victories of the year came on March 22nd when FSU upended the 25th ranked North Carolina Tar Heels. The Lady Seminoles clinched the win in the final doubles march of the afternoon. Down a set, the tandem of Nicki Ivy and Jennifer Hyde won the next two sets 6-4, 7-5 to assure the upset.

Florida State played the role of spoilers again on April 12th when they defeated No. 24 Wake Forest. Knotted up 3-3 going into doubles play, the Demon Deacons took a 4-3 lead winning the No. 1 match. However the Lady Seminoles fired back, taking the next two matches including a three-set thriller won by Jenny Graf and Robin Cifaldi 6-1, 4-6, 6-4.

Four days later Florida State travelled to Charlotte, NC and the ACC Championships. The Tribe, seeded third, opened play against No. 6 Virginia. FSU blanked the Cavaliers, winning all six singles matches.

Second round competition proved to be a rematch of a few days earlier, pegging the Lady Seminoles against Wake Forest. Florida State could not duplicate the outcome and lost 5-1 to the eventual tournament runners-up.

Florida State ended their season with a 13-10 overall record and a 6-3 ACC mark.

# This is FSU

# The University . . .

From its beginning as "The Seminary West of the Suwannee" in 1857, Florida State University has grown to stretch across 347 acres of rolling oak and pine-covered hills to comprise a campus which has educated millions of students over the last century.

Florida State University has boasted a heritage of service and scholarship since the beginning when the legislature passed an act authorizing two state colleges — one east (now University of Florida) and one west of the meandering Suwannee River.

Starting with a 130-member coed enrollment in 1857, the Seminary survived the Civil War, reconstruction, radical social changes, and a variety of name changes to emerge in 1909 as the Florida State College for Women.

It was helped back into coed status in 1947 by a legislature anxious to open up the state's educational resources to thousands of degree-seeking ex-Gl's from World War II. It also was granted a new name "Florida State University." The University's expanse and complexity today contrast vividly with its beginning. Sixteen schools and colleges within the University serve more than 29,000 students who are enrolled in the 276 graduate and undergraduate degree programs and live and work among 1,300 faculty and 2,600 staff members. About 5,000 degrees are awarded every year.

In the past several years, the University has joined an elite group of universities in the United States which produce more than 200 doctoral graduates annually. Emphasis on graduate research and study at the University continues to grow, and today more than 4,000 graduate students pursue a variety of degrees.

Student life at Florida State University also offers young people ample opportunity to acquire leadership skills and to apply their classroom learning in student government, residence hall government, Greek social organizations, honors programs, departmental organizations and more than 200 other registered student organizations active on

campus. The FSU Artist Series, the Distinguished Lecture Series and outstanding music, theater and dance production provide enjoyable evenings for the entire community.

Being a student at Florida State University means stepping into a tradition of more than 130 years of higher education.
