




# Florida State Track and Field

### Outlook

After two consecutive third place national finishes, Florida State has found a place among the top powers in the track and field world. A look at the 1983 team will indicate that the program is there to stay. The Seminoles lost just one NCAA point scorer from 1982's squad.

Graduation claimed 400 meter hurdle NCAA-champion Tonia Brown, who scored in the 100 hurdles as well. "We'll be hurting in the hurdles a bit this year," says head coach Gary Winckler, in his third year at Florida State and his second as head coach after serving there on an interim basis last year. "But I'm pretty confident that we have improved enough in other events to keep us able to compete."

Winckler's losses elsewhere were zero and a good recruiting year filled in some of the weaker spots to give the team a new look depth-wise. The most impressive credentials of the newcomers belong to Brenda Cliette, a Georgia native, whose abilities will allow Winckler to putter with his lineup in the relays and short sprints.

"I think we had about the same kind of recruiting success as the other powers — Nebraska, Tennessee, UCLA," says Winckler. "It was pretty even across the board. But I think we have more room to improve. With our recruiting year, we have more options available."

The sprinting events, of course, are where Florida State excells. The 100 meters is led by 10-time All-American Randy Givens, who finished seventh in the country in 1982 and 13-time All-American Marita Payne. Both athletes have a list of honors that trail far behind them. Freshman Cliette, the 1981 Junior Olympics champion in the event, should turn in some outstanding times while junior Kim Parrish adds depth.

The 200 meters is as strong as any event in the FSU lineup. This is Givens' specialty; she finished third in the nation in 1982 and has run a PR of 22.3 while Payne picked up an NCAA fourth place finish and broke 23 seconds with a 22.91 clocking. Cliette also runs here as will 400 meter specialist and 200 NCAA qualifier Angie Wright, Parrish again adds depth.

The 400 meters could very well equal the 200 in terms of strength. Payne returns as the NCAA champion with a PR of 51.99 after beating UTEP's Char-

maine Crooks to the finish line last June to earn the title. Wright was a top 10 national finisher in both '81 and '82 while Cliette showed in the 1981 Junior Olympics that she could run the 400 too. finishing second, Junior Ovrill Brown, an 800 specialist, runs here and Givens can if she's needed. Senior Scooby Golden concentrates on this race and adds depth.

The 800 boasts of three proven runners and a pair of freshmen. School record holder Brown (2:04.6) finished first in last year's NCAA consolation round while 31-year old Margaret Coomber really began to come on a year ago after concentrating on the 1,500 as a freshman. The biggest improvement may come from junior Janette Wood, who couldn't compete last year because of a foot stress fracture. Wood previously owned the school record. Freshmen Colleen Curran and Kelley Hackler have plenty of time to reach their potential.

Coomber is the leader in the 1,500, finishing seventh in the NCAA finals last year. Wood and



Curran will also be used plus junior Carla Borovicka who has found her niche in

Borovicka, who has improved "bunches" according to Winckler, will be the leader in the 3,000 while Coomber has also run this distance in the past.

The 5,000 and 10,000 events have just one entry, senior Janet Bassford. Bassford showed promise last year and turned in some good times.

Winckler is searching for a 100 meter hurdler but he feels secure in the 400 hurdles. NCAA qualifier Chris McKay returns to improve on her freshman season and two experiments — Ovrill Brown and Angie Wright — may prove to be successful.

Florida State's relays, after second place finishes a year ago, may be the most

versatile area of the squad.

The 400 meter relay of Wright, Payne, third year runner Alice Bennett and Givens is as good as any; last June it was touched out by one-hundredth of a second by champion Nebraska in the NCAA finals. Add Cliette to that team and Winckler can possibly save Payne or Wright for another race. Parrish also has run a leg on the 400 relay in the past.

The 1,600 meter relay has an equal amount of depth. Wright, Brown, Givens and Payne make up this one. Again, Cliette adds depth and Golden ran on the NCAA semi-final team, in place of Givens, to qualify it for the finals.

Florida State's field team, weak over the past two years, should be stronger in 1983. The long jump has NCAA eighth place finisher Bennett back. Her outdoor best of 20-21/2 came in the semi-finals in Provo last year. Cliette also has some experience as a long jumper and could end up competing here too.

The high jump, virtually a non-existent event for FSU before 1982, looks to be well set with NCAA fifth place finisher Wendy Markham and freshman newcomer Cathy Hill ready to go. Markham is a legitimate 6-0 jumper while Hill has

potential to jump that high.



Rena Antanelis, hoping to recover from the injuries that plagued her a year ago, will be the leader in the javelin and discus. Her throws last year did not equal her high school PRs but, even so, she recorded the fifth best FSU throw ever (143-7) in the javelin. Carolyn Darville, a freshman walk-on, threw the discus farther in high school than the current FSU record.

Darville will also be the main shot putter with Antanelis the only other squad member with


experience there.

Florida State's schedule continues to improve each year. Many of the big meets remain the same; the Lady Gator Relays, the Penn Relays, the Cavalier Classic and the Tom Black Classic. The FSU-Florida dual meet is still there. But several meets are new. Florida State will host a five-way meet with Florida, Michigan State, Kentucky and Georgia in attendance. FSU will also travel to a nine-way meet at LSU and a four-way meet at Tennessee that includes Penn State and Wisconsin in addition to the Volunteers and Seminoles.

The season will culminate with the NCAA Championships, held in June in

Houston, Texas.

"It's a good schedule for us," says Winckler. "The five-way meet at home will be a good one. In scheduling the other meets, we've tried to get the best competition we can from the Eastern United States. I think it will prepare us for the most important meet of the year — the NCAA Championships.



Gary Winckler
Head Coach

Gary Winckler is in his third campaign with Florida State's track and field and cross country programs and his first as head coach.

Winckler first joined the Florida State athletic staff in 1980 as assistant coach and after a year and a half in that capacity, he became interim head coach when then-coach Roger Smith took a leave of absence.

Now, Winckler has full reins of one of the top programs in the South. The track and field team has finished third in the nation the past two seasons and Florida State's cross country program is generally considered to be in the top 30.

Winckler was assistant women's track and field coach at Oregon State prior to joining the Seminole staff. Over three seasons, he helped build the program from 10 athletes to a roster of 45 when he left. During that period, the track and field team climbed from the bottom of its 37-school region to a second place finish in 1980.

Winckler has other coaching experience at Lynnwood (Wash.) High School and Seattle Pacific University. He also attended the latter as an undergraduate student and competed in the high jump in the 1974 NCAA finals. While he was at Pacific, the program was consistently ranked among the nation's top five teams. Winckler held the school's high jump record (6-10).

Also an accomplished writer, he has had several articles published, including *Perspective on the Back-Layout High Jump* which appeared in the 1980 May/June issue of Scholastic Coach Magazine.

In the summer of 1981, Winckler was co-director of the U.S. Southeastern Olympic Development Track and Field camp hosted by Florida State. He is also the southeast region hurdles coordinator for the Olympic Development program.

Winckler received his master's degree in mathematics from Oregon State in 1980.



### Al Schmidt

Assistant Coach

Al Schmidt became Florida State's women's assistant track coach and head cross country coach in August. He joined the Seminole staff from the University of Kansas where he was the assistant men's track coach for the past year.

During his stay at Kansas, the Jayhawks were indoor and outdoor Big Eight champs. Schmidt worked on a master's degree at the Midwest

school while coaching the KU distance runners in both cross country and track.

Prior to his tenure at Kansas, Schmidt became familiar with Florida State's track and field program while he was head men's track coach at St. Louis University from 1975-80. His cross country team was Metro Conference champion in 1977 and earned the runner-up position in 1978 while St. Louis was still a member of the conference.

Schmidt first attended college at Missouri where he ran on the Tiger track and cross country teams for two seasons. He then transferred back to his native city of St. Louis to attend St. Louis University where he received a bachelor's degree in marketing in 1973. During his senior year, he served as an assistant track coach at the University of Missouri-St. Louis.

Schmidt represented the U.S. in Brazil in 1979 where he helped conduct coaching clinics for the State Department.

As assistant to Gary Winckler at FSU, Schmidt coaches the middle distance and distance areas in track as well as serving as the head coach for the cross country team. He is also FSU's recruiting coordinator.



### **Malcolm Coomber**

Assistant Coach

Malcolm Coomber is entering his second season on the Florida State track and field and cross country staff. During the fall, Coomber is involved with administrative duties and assisting the coaching of the cross country team.

When springtime nears, his specialty becomes the throwing events, the multi-events and some of the FSU relays in the track and field program.

When Coomber joined the staff a year ago, he brought 10 years of coaching experience to the staff. The England native has coached international teams and Olympians throughout Europe. He has also served on the British Amateur Athletic Board and has coached the sprinting events for the British and English national teams.

Considered an authority on the physical development of the athlete, Coomber has lectured throughout Britain and Europe and his work has been published by many leading track and field journals.

Coomber, whose wife Margaret is an FSU junior on the cross country team and an outstanding half-miler, holds a teaching diploma and advanced certificate in Physical Education from the University of London. He taught physical education in Britain high schools for 12 years.

He is presently pursuing a master's degree in motor learning at Florida State.

ANTANELIS, RENA — Javelin/Discus, Sophomore, Randolph, N.J. — will be in her second season at FSU as the team's number one discus and javelin thrower . . . best mark in the javelin was 143-7, fifth best in FSU history . . . best in the discus was 131-3½ . . . has not yet reached her high school standards due to injuries . . . coaches think she'll begin to reach her potential this year . . . was New Jersey state javelin champion and national T.A.C. junior javelin champ in 1981 . . . state discus champ in 1980 . . . named to the high school Adidas and Coaches Magazine All-America teams and was a member of the 1980-81 junior national field team . . . may also see work in the shot put.

BENNETT, ALICE — Long Jump/400 Relay, Senior, Sanford, Fla. — seven time All-American at FSU... her two events are the long jump and the 400 meter relay... has qualified for nationals the last two seasons in the long jump... personal best is 20-4 which placed her fourth in the 1981 indoor national championship... best outdoor jump has been 20-2½, the school's third best jump in history, that she recorded in the NCAA semi-finals last June... has run on two national championship relay teams at FSU — the indoor 800 meter relay that set the collegiate record in 1981 and the 1981 outdoor 400 meter relay... at that time, the 400 meter relay's clocking of 44.35 was the sixth best time run in the collegiate ranks... since then, the relay has come up with four lower times, including last year's 43.73 second place finish at the NCAA Championships...attended Seminole High School outside of Orlando, Fla.

BOROVICKA, CARLA — Middle Distance, Junior, Portland, Ore.—she's in her junior season in track eligibility but this will be her second season in an FSU uniform . . . came to the Seminoles as a 400 meter hurdler but found her niche in the 800 and 1,500 meter distances . . . just missed qualifying for the NCAA Championships last year in the 800 so that will be her goal this year . . . a member of FSU's national collegiate record-holding two-mile relay that finished first in the indoor nationals last year . . . that finish earned her All-America status . . . ran on FSU's cross country team in the fall for her first try at the distances . . . transferred from Oregon State where she was on the state champion-ship 1,600 meter relay team . . . attended Beaverton High School.

DWYER-BROWN, OVRILL — Middle Distance/1,600 Relay/400 Hurdles, Junior, New Rochelle, N.Y. — had an outstanding sophomore

season after transferring to Florida State from Indiana . . . copped four All-American awards in 1982, including indoor honors in the 600 yards and on the 4 x 440 and 4 x 880 relays . . . was on outdoor NCAA second place 1,600 meter relay that set a school record 3:28.70 timing . . . also competed in outdoor 800 meters at the NCAA meet, finishing eighth . . . best time in the 800 was a school record 2:04.9 that she ran at the Tom Black Classic . . . her 2:05.2 time at the star-studded Pacific Coast Invitational placed her third . . . at Indiana, was an indoor All-American in the 600 meters . . . all-state in the 400 and 600 yards while at New Rochelle High School . . . one of two married squad members . . . owns one indoor and one outdoor FSU school record and co-holds another five on relays.

CLIETTE, BRENDA — Sprints/Relays, Freshman, Macon, Ga. — another in a long line of fine high school sprinters who have come to Florida State . . . ironically, is on a basketball scholarship where she is a starter and averages in double rebounding and scoring figures . . . named Athlete of the Year in Georgia last spring by the Georgia Sports Hall of Fame . . . holds Georgia state records in the 100 and 220 yard dashes and ran anchor on Northeast High School's mile relay team that holds another Georgia state record . . . took first place in the 100 meters (11.7) at the 1981 National Junior Olympics meet . . . led her basketball team to consecutive class AAAA state championships her junior and senior years . . . selected to the 1982 National Sports Festival track team . . . was a semi-finalist at T.A.C. senior championships in 1982, running 11.58 for the 100 meters.

COOMBER, MARGARET — Middle Distance, Junior, Charlton, London — FSU's top 1,500 meter runner . . . qualified for nationals in the event both her freshman and sophomore seasons and finished seventh in the nation at the 1982 NCAA Championships with a 4:23.19 clocking . . . top time is the 4:19.6 that she ran at the Cavalier Invitational last year . . . owns FSU's top five times in the event . . . was a member of indoor two-mile national champion and collegiate record holding (8:47.27) relay in 1982 . . . also qualified for the NCAA's in the 800 outdoors but did not get into the finals . . . finished third in the nation in the indoor 1,000 yards in 1981 . . . has received four All-American awards . . . top FSU cross country runner over the past three years . . . team MVP as a freshman . . . at one time was ranked among the top 30 women in the world in the

half-mile...has participated in 14 World Cup events...former member of both British and Scottish international teams... is 31 years old, the oldest active athlete at FSU.

CURRAN, COLLEEN — Middle Distance, Freshman, Dayton, Ohio —ran cross country last fall for her first collegiate competition at FSU . . . scored in two meets with her best finish, a seventh place, coming at the Florida Invitational . . . ran in the TFA-USA cross country national championships as a high school senior in 1981 and finished second . . . finished fourth in the 800 meters and third in the 1,500 meters in the TAC junior nationals in June . . . was first and second, respectively, in the same events at the Canadian Junior Nationals . . . attended Chaminade Julien High School but ran for the Kettering Striders track and field club since her high school did not field a team . . . named a prep All-American.

DARVILLE, CAROLYN — Discus/Shot Put, Freshman, Riviera Beach, Fla. — a walk-on who will probably emerge as an important part of FSU's field plans . . . Florida high school state champion and state record holder in the discus with a 143-8 throw . . . that throw is better than FSU's current school record of 140-0 . . . second in the state championship meet in the shot put with a 42-8½ throw . . . she could also eventually challenge the school record in that event . . . coaches think she could be a great one . . . attended Palm Beach Gardens High School . . . 1982 high school All-American in the discus.

GIVENS, RANDY — Sprints/Relays, Junior, Amityville, N.Y. — along with Marita Payne, has distinguished herself as one of the greatest athletes in FSU history . . . runs the 100 and 200 meters as well as the 400 and 1,600 meter relays . . . favorite race is the 200 meters where she finished third in the nation in both '81 and '82 . . . in 1982 finally broke the 23 second barrier in the race, recording four times in the 22 second range . . . best is 22.3 . . . in the 100 meters, Givens has run three of the top five all-time FSU marks . . . finished seventh in the country at the 1982 NCAA championships in the 100 . . . also was on second place 400 and 1,600 meter relay teams . . . never ran on the 1,600 meter relay before the Penn Relays last year and, as an experiment, ran a leg on it . . . the relay turned in the top time in the country at the time . . . also had a fine indoor season, finishing second in the country behind world record

holder Merlene Ottey in the 300 yards . . . tied Rosalyn Bryant's 1980 American record in the semi-finals of the event with a 34.07 clocking . . . 10 time All-American and a member of the national collegiate record-holding indoor 800 meter relay that won it all in 1981 . . . also on national championship 400 meter relay team in 1981 . . . 1982 National Sports Festival participant . . . member 1982 U.S. National team . . . co-holder of American record of 42.29 for 400 meter relay set this past summer by U.S. teams vs. East Germany . . . state high school champion in both the 100 and 200 meters at Amityville High School . . . invited to the 1980 Olympic trials as a high school senior.

**GOLDEN, SCOOBY** — 400/1,600 Relay, Senior, Tampa, Fla. — attended the NCAA's last season as an alternate on the 1,600 meter relay . . . ran in the semi-finals to qualify the relay for the finals . . . was All-American on the FSU indoor 4 x 440 yard relay . . . two other All-American awards came in 1981 on fourth place indoor and outdoor 4 x 400 relays . . . has also long jumped in her career where her best mark is the 19-9½ she did as a freshman . . . knee problems have curtailed her ability to compete in that area . . . originally came to FSU to play basketball but devoted all her energies to track during her sophomore season . . . attended Tampa's Robinson High School where she was second in the state in the long jump . . . real name is Eunice, Scooby is just a nickname.

HACKLER, KELLEY — Middle Distance, Freshman, Eustis, Fla. — state AAA 880 yard champion as a senior at Eustis High School . . . time in the event has been a consistent 2:13 . . . has run a 54 second split on the mile relay which shows she also has good speed . . . competed in the Golden South Track Classic in both '81 and '82 and won the 800 meters in 1981 . . . coaches originally thought she may run cross country last year but she spent the fall training for the middle distances instead.

HILL, CATHY — High Jump, Freshman, Darien, III. — walk-on who will probably be FSU's #2 high jumper . . . has jumped 5-7 but coaches feel a strength program will eventually have her jumping over her 5-9 height . . . first time she high jumped was her jumior year at Hinsdale South High School in Illinois . . . increased her jump four inches to 5-7 during that year . . . had a pulled thigh muscle as a senior and jumped

McKAY, CHRIS— Hurdles/1,600 Relay, Sophomore, Oakville, Ontario — part of FSU's Canadian connection . . . qualified for nationals last season in the 400 hurdles with a season-best 1:00.46 clocking at the Tom Black Classic in Knoxville . . . she finished first in that meet in the event . . . did qualify into the consolation round at the NCAA Championships . . . ran cross country at FSU for the first time last fall . . . comes from the same hometown as teammate Janette Wood . . . Ontario high school champion in the 400 and 800 meters at White Oaks Secondary School.

MARKHAM, WENDY — High Jump, Sophomore, Cedarburg, Wisc. — established herself as the best high jumper in FSU history as a freshman last season . . . owns the top five jumps ever at the school, including a school record 6-0¼ leap . . . gradually improved from 5-7 during the indoor season to her best at the NCAA Championships where she finished in a four-way tie for fifth place . . . jumped over 6-0 as a high school star at Cedarburg High where she was the Wisconsin state champion . . . after graduating, underwent knee surgery and slowly recovered to her old form . . . invited to the Olympic trials in 1980 as a high school senior . . . coaches think Markham's potential lies well above her current best . . . on the 1982 National Sports Festival field team where she finished fourth.

PARRISH, KIM— Sprints/Relays, Junior, Jacksonville, Fla.— received one All-America award during her first year at FSU as a member of the 880 relay that finished second at the 1982 indoor nationals . . . that relay set an FSU indoor mark at 1:38.28 . . . Mike Long Track record holder as a member of the outdoor 400 meter relay (44.46) . . . is the fifth wheel on the outdoor 400 meter relay . . . also runs the 200 meters . . . transferred to FSU after one season at Mount Hood Junior College where she was MVP in the national j.c. track meet in 1981 . . . was the juco champ in the 100 and 200 meters, breaking existing national records . . . also anchored the 400 and 1,600 meter relays that took national championships that year . . . attended Ribault High School where she was homecoming queen as a senior.

PAYNE, MARITA — Sprints/Relays, Junior, Trante, Ontario — 13-time All-American at FSU in just two years . . . three time national champion . . . is the "work horse" of the Seminoles in any championship meet because of her great versatility ... qualified for nationals last year in the 100, 200 and 400 meters individually and as a member of the 400 and 1,600 meter relays . . . did not participate in the 100 at the championship ... NCAA 400 meter champion where in the semi-finals she became the first FSU runner to break 52 seconds (51.99) . . . also finished fourth in the 200 meters with a 22.91 clocking, third best in school history, and was on second place 400 and 1,600 meter relays . . . owner of the five fastest FSU 400 meter times and was on five fastest 400 and 1,600 meter Tribe relay teams . . . on 1981 national championship outdoor 400 meter relay and indoor 800 meter relay . . . finished second in the nation in 1981, her freshman season, in the 400 meters before winning it in 1982... name is in the FSU record books 14 times . . . attended Vaughan Road Collegiate Institute in Ontario . . . member of American World Cup team in 1980 . . . member of 1982 Canadian national team and Commonwealth Games team . . . co-holder of 400 and 1,600 relay Canadian national records . . . silver medalist at 1982 Commonweath Games.

WHITE, JENNIFER — 400, Freshman, Aurora, Co. — attended high school at Cedar Grove High School in Georgia before moving to Colorado . . . a walk-on who ran a 58.9 440 yards in high school where she was the state AA runnerup the last two years . . . according to head coach Gary Winckler, she's got great potential and has made tremendous strides in the four months she's been working with the FSU team . . . one of the fastest FSU sprinters out of the blocks which may lead to a switch to shorter sprinting events for her . . . first became interested in the Seminole program when she attended the 1981 Summer Olympic Development clinic hosted by FSU.

WOOD, JANETTE — Middle Distance, Junior, Oakville, Ontario — has been bothered with injuries throughout her first two and a half seasons at Florida State . . . a foot injury kept her from participating in track last spring and she had more problems with the foot in the fall, eliminating her from the NCAA regional cross country meet after she had run well all fall . . . runs the 800 meters and will occasionally run on the 1,600 meter relay . . . had a fine freshman season where she held the school record with a 2:07.85 timing in the 800 . . . that time is still the third best in

FSU history ... gained All-America status that same year (1981) on FSU's 1,600 meter relay that finished fourth in the country . . . attended T. A. Blakelock High School in Canada where she was once a member of the Canadian national team.



### Florida State Athletic Leaders



### C. W. "Hootie" Ingram Athletic Director

C. W. "Hootie" Ingram is in his second year as Florida State's athletic director. He came to the post in 1981 after serving as associate commissioner of the Southeastern Conference.

Since coming to Florida State, Ingram has initiated a \$10 million dollar building program for athletic facilities that will include a new athletic administration building and improvements to the football stadium, baseball complex and swimming pool area.

Ingram had been associated with the SEC office for eight years. He was first an assistant commissioner before being named associate commissioner (1978).

A native of Tuscaloosa, Al., the home of the University of Alabama, Ingram played football for the Crimson Tide from 1951 through 1954. He was All-SEC as a sophomore when he led the nation in pass interceptions.

After an Army stint, Ingram turned to coaching. He started as an assistant at Bradenton (Fl.) Manatee High School and was later head coach at Tuscaloosa High School for three years.

He later moved into college coaching and had stops at Wake Forest, Virginia Tech, Georgia and Arkansas as an assistant. His only college football head coaching assignment began in 1970 when he succeeded the veteran Frank Howard as head coach at Clemson. Three years later he joined the SEC as assistant commissioner.



### Barbara Palmer Associate Athletic Director

Barbara Palmer has been with the Florida State athletic program since 1977. As associate athletic director, Palmer is in charge of the women's athletic program.

Since her arrival on campus, the FSU women's program has grown to the point where it is now considered among the top five programs in the country.

All eight women's sports have turned in winning records over the past three years. There have been three national championships won, including back-to-back

titles by the softball team in 1981 and 1982. And finally, last season Florida State sent every team to a national tournament, a feat accomplished by only one other school in the nation.

Simply put, Barbara Palmer has been the energy behind that climb toward national excellence. She was directly responsible for the funding FSU women's athletics receives from the state legislature each year. It was Palmer's lobbying that pushed Title IX legislation through the state government in 1980.

So great has been Palmer's impact on the growth of women's athletics in the state of Florida that she was chosen to the inaugural Women's Florida Hall of Fame by Governor Bob Graham last summer. She was one of just six women elected from a field of 226 candidates.

Palmer joined Florida State after serving four years as executive director of a private leisure and recreation services organization. A long-time resident of Tallahassee, Palmer graduated from FSU in 1970 and earned a master's degree in leisure services in 1974.

### This is Florida State

Florida State University, nestled in the center of Florida's capital city, is home to more than 22,000 students from all over the nation and from 115 foreign countries. FSU was founded in 1857 as the Seminary West of the Suwannee. Today, the main campus, with more than 340 green acres, is one of the prettiest in the South. Camellias, azaleas and dogwoods blossom under towering moss-draped oaks. From the stately Gothic-styled structures on the eastern end of the campus to the contemporary science complex on the west, FSU has grown and changed with the times. Enrollment has quadrupled since the school became coeducational in 1947, following nearly half a century as FSCW—Florida State College for Women.

Today, students at Florida State can choose from more than 100 career options made available by 14 schools and colleges including arts and sciences, business, communication, criminology, education, home economics, law, library science, music, nursing, social sciences, social work, theatre and visual arts. Also the FAMU/FSU Institute for Engineering began this fall.

The University's location in the capital city of Florida affords excellent study and research opportunities in the areas of government, social sciences and policy sciences. Additionally, the presence of state government provides widespread opportunities for internships and on-the-job study.

In terms of scientific research, FSU excels as a basic research-oriented university. The nuclear physics laboratory is ranked by the National Science Foundation as one of the top four in the nation. FSU also maintains a large marine laboratory on the coast of the Gulf of Mexico.

Florida State counts among its faculty six members of the National Academy of Sciences, including Paul Dirac, a Nobel Prize winner in physics. Kurt Waldheim, former secretary general of the United Nations, recently joined the University faculty as a distinguished visiting lecturer in international relations and law.

When it comes to the performing arts, Florida State ranks among the best schools in the nation.

The School of Theatre is recognized nationally for its leadership and training of talented young people. Burt Reynolds, acclaimed for his work with aspiring theatre professionals at the Reynolds Institute for Theatre Training in Jupiter, Florida, is an adjunct professor of professional and regional theatre at FSU.

The Department of Dance is ranked as one of the top five in the country. Florida State also offers many varied activities outside the classroom. The Union Program Office presents concerts, movies, lectures, flea markets and other activities throughout the year. For those with more classical tastes, the University annually presents the Fine Arts Festival, featuring the University's best artists and performers, and the Artist Series, which brings big name entertainment to campus. The intramural office also has much to offer, with year-round sports activities available to students and faculty.

The University is home to the only collegiate circus in the country. The Flying High Circus carries a reputation of quality, professional aerial and stage entertainment for children of all ages.

When it comes to intercollegiate athletics, Florida State has established a winning tradition. The athletic program, including both men's and women's athletics, is among the top 20 in the nation.

But it's not just good programs that make the University great. As President Bernard Sliger proclaims, it is the people who make Florida State the successful monument to learning that it is. And he takes special pride in the people—students, faculty, administrators and staff—who are Florida State University.
