

#### Credentials

Required for all events where an admission is charged. Please contact the sports information office at least one week before event to be covered. Space for the working press, radio, television and scouts is allocated by the Sports Information Office.

**Press Parking** 

Passes not required except for games at the Leon County Civic Center. For those events, make request at same time credentials are issued. Ample parking may be found in Doak Campbell stadium lots for baseball games and around Tully Gym area for basketball, track, and tennis events.

**Photographers** 

Only accredited photographers will be issued working credentials. All still photographers must shoot from designated areas. Space for video cameras for certain events will be assigned by the Sports Information Office.

#### Statistical Services

Complete statistics will be provided for all basketball and baseball games. Additional services will be provided as requested for all other events.

#### **Telecopiers**

Two telecopiers are owned by the Sports Information Office. These will be made available on a first come - first served basis, free of charge.

**Interviews** 





# **Sports At Florida State**



When the Lady Seminoles play Volleyball, Tully Gym is electric. This sport has come so far in capturing the sports fans of this capital city that the seating capacity has been expanded. This is another sport in which Florida State has been represented in the NCAA playoffs. So popular is the game in Tallahassee and so powerful is the FSU program, that plans are in the works to host a regional playoff.

Baseball at Florida State has long been the pacesetter among the nation's colleges. The reasons why go back to the program's roots. Never has a Seminole baseball team had a losing record. Only two schools have appeared in more NCAA Regionals; and all of that against the toughest schedule in college baseball. A Seminole baseball player spends 11 months a year playing the game, with fall, summer and spring programs affording him the opportunity to play an incredible 150 games a year.






What a proud tradition there is in track and field at Florida State. The Lady Seminoles recently added the latest of the national titles to the heritage by winning the 1984 NCAA Championships in Eugene, Ore. Incredibly, they had finished third and second in the two previous years. Members of the Lady Seminole track team have earned 51 All-American titles since 1982. That is about as close to domination of a sport as you'll find. The mens' track team continues to uphold its own proud tradition. Not only the leader in its own state, this team has won The Metro Confrence title for eight consecutive years. And Florida State's prowess in this sport, too is aided by a newly renovated and upgraded track and field stadium. Utilizing the annual site of the prestigeous Domino's Pizza relays, no other track athletes in the area have the advantages that these Seminoles do in terms of training facilities and coaching.







## CECILE REYNAUD HEAD COACH

Since taking over the Florida State volleyball program in 1976, head coach Cecile Reynaud has quickly established herself as one of the top college coaches in the country.

Reynaud's record speaks for itself. During the previous eight seasons, Florida State has com-

piled an ultra-impressive record of 261 wins and just 105 losses—good for a winning percentage of .713.

Under Reynaud's leadership, the Lady Seminoles have been no stranger to national tournament play. FSU has appeared in regional play five times under the AIAW format (1977-78-79-80-81) and went on to play in three AIAW national championship tournaments (1978-79-81). The 1981 season marked a high point in Lady, Seminole athletics, as Reynaud guided FSU to a final mark of 43-8 and a fourth place finish at the AIAW Championship Tournament played in Tallahassee.

When the Seminoles came under the NCAA banner in 1982, Reynaud's program did not skip a beat. After an injury riddled campaign in 1982 in which FSU finished 27-17, the Lady Seminoles came on strong last season to win the Metro Conference tournament and advance to the NCAA playoffs—finishing with a 31-6 record.

In her first eight seasons, Reynaud has guided the Lady Seminoles to 19 major tournament victories.

Reynaud's coaching abilities have been recognized at the state, regional and national levels. On the national level, Reynaud was selected as an assistant coach of the United States team to the World University Games in 1983. She also serves on the NCAA South Regional Volleyball Committee and is a voting member on several national polls.

A holder of a USVBA Level I coaching certificate, Reynaud was selected as a technical consultant for two volleyball instructional films produced by the Athletic Institute. She also edited a book on Power Volleyball.

Selected as a keynote speaker at several volleyball clinics around the south region, Reynaud has served on the staffs of several camps. She also hosts the Florida State University Volleyball Camp, which yearly draws in the excess of 300 participants from the southeast region.

Selected as volleyball coach of the year in 1981 in the state of Florida, Reynaud came to FSU following a standout athletic career at Southwest Missouri State University. At SMSU, Reynaud lettered four times and led the Bears to four appearances in the AIAW National Championship tournament. One of those tournaments resulted in a sixth place finish.

In addition to volleyball, Reynaud lettered twice in the sport of field hockey and was named recipient of the prestigious "Outstanding Athlete of America" award. Her outstanding coaching and athletic achievements led to Cecile's induction into the Southwest Missouri State University's Hall of Fame in May of 1983.

Following graduation with a bachelor's degree in physical education in 1975, Reynaud spent one year as a teacher and coach at Steelville High School in Missouri.

One year later, she was named head volleyball coach at Florida State as a graduate assistant. In 1978, she was named the first full-time volleyball coach in the school's history. Reynaud completed requirements for a master's degree at Florida State in 1979.



A 1979 graduate of Central Michigan University, Jaye Flood becomes Florida State's first full-time assistant volleyball coach. Flood brings a wealth of experience as both a player and a coach into her new post.



As a player, Flood lettered for the Lady Chippewas from 1975-79, during that time period CMU won back-to-back state titles in 1977 and 1978 and also appeared in the AIAW Regionals—finishing fifth in 1977 and sixth a year later.

Following graduation with a degree in Education, Flood went on to earn master's degrees in Athletic Administration and also Exercise Science-Health Science at CMU.

Her coaching credentials include two years as assistant coach at Western Michigan, one year in a similar position at Central Michigan, and one year at Drake University. For the past two years, Flood has served as Executive Director of the Mid America Women's Sports Association—a group responsible for the development of junior volleyball in the Detroit area.

Other coaching related experience includes supervising an adult recreation program, directing summer volleyball camps at CMU, and coaching at the junior high school, Junior National and Junior Olympic levels.

A member of the Women's Sports Federation, Flood holds level I and level II coaching certificates from the USVBA and is also certified to officiate the sport at the high school level.

### STEVE ANDERSON GRADUATE ASSISTANT COACH

Former high school coach Steve Anderson returns to the collegiate ranks this season as Florida State's graduate assistant coach.

A 1978 graduate of Indiana University with a degree in education, Anderson has five

years of experience as the head coach at the prep level. Taking over the program at Mishawaka High in 1979, Anderson turned the school into a state powerhouse in just two seasons. His 1980 team won the state championship with a 20-1 record after an initial 4-7 season. In 1983, Mishawaka repeated as state champions with a 30-3 mark.

In five years as head coach, Mishawaka compiled an overall mark of 108-19—winning four conference championships, three regional titles, one second place state finish and two state championships.

A three time coach of the year at Mishawaka, Anderson was nominated for the same award by the Indiana Volleyball Club for 1983. Anderson has coached at camp levels; as well as being an accomplished club level player himself.

### LADY SEMINOLES LOOK TO DEFEND METRO CHAMPIONSHIP

An old football coach once said that a traditional power doesn't have to rebuild its team after losing a great senior class but rather it just reloads. Florida State volleyball coach Cecile Reynaud feels the same way about her 1984 team, despite losing five players and three starters off of last year's 31-6 NCAA qualifier.

"To tell the truth, I can't wait to get this season started," Reynaud said. "We lost some great players, but looking at what we have back plus the incoming freshmen, I'm convinced this team's overall talent is as good as last year's. Our goal has not been changed, we want to win the Metro tournament and advance to the NCAA playoffs.

Florida State's strength will again come from the outside hitter position. Although all-time great Sally Summer graduated, FSU returns four solid players and one strong newcomer to the group.

Karyn Palgut returns as the top player here. A 5-8 senior, Palgut was the team's MVP in 1982 and has started since her freshman year. A two-time all-conference tournament selection, Palgut appears to be fully recovered from surgery to correct a chronic shoulder problem and appears ready to assume a leadership role. "Karyn was hitting the ball as good as ever in preseason," Reynaud added. "She's simply the strongest defensive player we've had and we need a big year out of her."

Lisa Smith, who transferred to FSU last year from Manatee JC, returns for her senior year. Possessor of a 28" vertical jump, Smith could challenge for a starting position. Carol Forsten should be Smith's main competition for the job. Another three-year letterwinner, Forsten has played brilliantly at times and consistency will be the key. "When she's on, Carol's as good as anyone on the floor," Reynaud said. "I think she'll come on strong for us."

Depth will come from Shelly Birkholz, Joan Morris and newcomer Jametta Jackson. Birkholz, who missed all of 1983 with a knee injury, has three years of eligibility left and is described by Reynaud as the "most intense player on hte team." Both Morris and Jackson, who has great leaping abilities, appear to just need additional match experience to develop into fine players.

Middle hitter is probably the biggest question mark. Starter Julie Brown (294 kills) and backup Shannon Lages (138 kills) both departed through graduation after the 1983 season. A pair of 5-11 freshman recruits in Sherry Smith and Julie Todd will

be given an opportunity to win the job. Both players earned all-region and all-state honors and come from winning programs as evidenced by both players leading their respective high school teams to state championships last year.

At setter, FSÚ lost its quarterback Marie Sanders, but should be able to fill that void with Donna Krai. A part-time setter last year, Krai has shown considerable talent at both setter and outside hitter—making 244 kills and 452 assist last season.

An intelligent, hard-working player, Krai will be pressed by sophomore Colette Housh and freshman Kim Britt for playing time. A product of the same school as former FSU star Alicia Cross, Britt was an all-stater at Ben Davis High.

Jackie Young, a 5-5 senior, performed well in the back row last year as a defensive specialist—recording 139 digs and 39 service aces. For the second season in a row, Young will be the number one person off the bench to serve in this capacity.

Summing up the talent for 1984,

Reynaud said "Last season we were a finesse team but this year we have some power and consequently could be even more fun to watch. I have no problems with the talent I have back, what we need to do is become consistent."

A highly competitive schedule, starting with a much improved Metro Conference race, awaits the '84 Lady Noles. Thirty regular season matches, including five matches against NCAA tournament teams, highlights the schedule. But it is the Metro Tournament in Columbia, SC on Nov. 16-17 that Florida State will be focusing its attention on.

"With only 13 at-large tournament spots available, the conference championship takes on a lot more importance," Reynaud said. "Our conference has improved dramatically in the last few years and I believe that three or four teams will have a chance to win this thing before its over."

Florida State's main competition should come from South Carolina, Louisville and Cincinnati.

### NATIONAL CHAMPIONSHIP FORMAT




The 1984 NCAA Volleyball Championship will consist of 28-team, single elimination tournament. Tournament selection is based on the following: 1) Conference champions for 15 conferences, including the Metro—in which FSU is a member. 2) 13 at-large teams as selected by the NCAA committee based on won-lost record, strength of schedule etc.

Each of the 28 teams will be placed in one of four regions, with the four top seeds receiving byes in the first round. The remaining 24 teams will each play a first round tournament game at the site of one of the two teams involved between November 29 and December 2.

Twelve winners of first round competition, as well as the four seeded teams, will then advance to one of four regional sites for the second round to be played from December 6-9. The four regional winners will meet on the campus of UCLA on December 14-16 for the NCAA semi-finals and finals.




# **Athletic Facilities**



More than six million dollars have been invested in athletic improvements, renovations and additions in just the last two years. There may be no other institution that can claim such a feat. Florida State's facilities are in a word... AWESOME. On this page you see part of a new \$4.5 million athletic complex...the Coyle E. Moore Athletic Center. It is the hub of FSU's Men's sports operation, housing all of the men's athletic administrators, coaches and support personnel. Amid the plush furnishings, the building boasts 1½ basketball gymnasiums, two fully equipped weight rooms, locker rooms for each sport, two equipment rooms, a training room, a complete cafeteria and kitchen, a projection room seating more than 100, an academic work area for athletes, numerous meeting rooms board rooms and plush, spacious office suites. The entire ticket and business operations are also afforded space here.







# Florida State University






Among many interesting facets, Florida State boasts the only Collegiate circus in the world.








## **Tallahassee**

C.W. "Hootie" Ingram Athletic Director

Cecil Ingram, known to most of his friends and associates as simply "Hootie", has headed the Florida State athletic department since 1981 after serving as associate commissioner of the Southeast Conference.

Since his arrival in Tallahassee, Ingram has initiated a \$10 million dollar building program for athletic facilities, including the Moore Athletic Center...Home of Florida State athletics.

A native of Tuscaloosa, Alabama, Ingram played for the Crimson Tide from 1951 through 1954 and led the nation in interceptions as a sophomore. He also lettered in baseball as an infielder. Following a stint in the army, Ingram turned to coaching. After several years of high school coaching, Ingram moved into collegiate athletics; making assistant coaching stops at Wake Forrest, Virgina Tech, Georgia and Arkansas.





A member of the Florida State athletic staff since 1981, Bob Goin begins his fourth full year as Associate Athletic Director.

All men's non-revenue coaches report to Goin and he also assists Director Ingram in the day-to-day operations of the athletic department. A large portion of football, basketball and baseball game day operations fall under his leadership.

A 1959 graduate of Bethany College, Goin recieved his master's degree from West Virgina in 1961. From 1960-76, Goin served Bethany in several administrative and coaching capacities, before moving on to West Virgina as an assistant athletic director. He was named athletic director at California (Pa.) State College in 1980, where he formed that institutions first scholarship fund for athletics and the college's first booster club.

# **Charles W. Ehrhardt**Faculty Athletic Committee Chairman



A Florida State University professor of law, Charles W. Ehrhardt is in his first year as Chairman of the Athletic Committee.

He is currently in his second stint on the committee, serving from 1969-71 and then being reappointed to the board in 1983. As chairman, Ehrhardt suceeds Dr. James Jones, who served in that capacity since 1980. Ehrhardt becomes Florida State's representative to the NCAA.

A native of Elkander, Iowa, Ehrhardt received his bachelor's degree from Iowa in 1962, before earning a law degree at Iowa State two years later. He came to Florida State in 1967.

A widely respected expert in the field of Evidence, Ehrhardt is frequently called on to lecture on the subject by lawyers and judges nationwide.

**Barbara Palmer** Associate Athletic Director



Barbara Palmer has been with Florida State athletic program since 1977. As Associate Athletic Director. Palmer is in charge of the women's athletic program and also holds the title of women's athletic director.

Since her arrival, the Florida State Lady Seminoles program has been recognized as one of the strongest in the country...with four national championship teams in the last four years (track, 1984; softball, 1981-82; and golf 1981). In 1982, all eight varsity sports went to national tournaments...one of only two schools to make the claim nationwide.

A 1970 graduate of Florida State, Palmer has been recognized as the driving force behind FSU's climb toward national excellence. Palmer headed a lobbying effort that pushed Title IX legislation through state government and she is directly responsible for state funding women's athletic recieves each year.
