


COACHING STAFF

CECILE REYNAUD HEAD COACH

Cecile Reynaud enters her 10th season as Florida State volleyball coach having already established herself as one of the top collegiate coaches in the country.

Her nine-year record at Florida State speaks for itself. A 281-113 mark which computes to a .704 winning percentage. Since 1976, Reynaud's teams have consistently been among the most successful on the FSU campus.



She guided her 1983 FSU team to the Metro Conference championship and a spot in the NCAA playoffs while finishing the season with a sparkling 31-6 record. Last year's squad won 20 matches and finished third in the Metro Conference.

While still under the jurisdiction of the AIAW, Reynaud-coached groups enjoyed some of their finest moments. From 1976-81, the Lady Seminoles appeared in five straight regional playoffs (1977-81) and three AIAW national championship tournaments (1978-79-81). Florida State's best season during that time was in 1981 when the team posted a 43-8 record and finished fourth at the AIAW Championship Tournament played in Tallahassee. Following that season, Reynaud was selected volleyball coach of the year in the state of Florida.

Over the past nine seasons, Florida State teams have captured 19 major tournament crowns.

But Reynaud's coaching career has stretched to include activities outside the collegiate arena. In addition to her successes as Lady Seminole head coach, Reynaud has coached teams on the national and international levels, served as a technical consultant for volleyball instructional films, edited a book on Power Volleyball and given speeches at volleyball clinics around the country.

In February, Reynaud was named head coach of the 1985 United States Junior National Volleyball team which traveled to Japan and China during August, playing matches against junior national teams of those countries. It was the second international coaching experience for Reynaud as she had been assistant coach of the United States entry to the World University Games in 1983.

Reynaud hosts the Florida State University Volleyball Camp every summer. Over the past several years, the camp has drawn over 300 participants from around the southeast. In addition to conducting her own camp, Reynaud has worked on the staffs of several other camps and been selected keynote speaker at a number of clinics.

A holder of a USVBA Level I coaching certificate, Reynaud arrived at FSU in 1976 following a standout athletic career at Southwest Missouri State University. At SMSU, she lettered four times and helped the Bears to four appearances in the AIAW National Championship tournament. One of those years, Southwest Missouri State finished sixth at the event.

Reynaud also showed her athletic talents in the sport of field hockey where she lettered twice. She received the prestigious "Outstanding Athlete of America" award while at SMSU. Her outstanding coaching achievements and contributions to the sport of volleyball led to Cecile's induction into the Southwest Missouri State Hall of Fame in May of 1983.

She graduated with a bachelor's degree in physical education in 1975 and spent one year as a teacher and coach at Steelville High School in Missouri before coming to Tallahassee as head volleyball coach in a graduate assistant position.

In 1978, Reynaud was named the first full-time volleyball coach in the school's history. She completed requirements for a master's degree at Florida State in 1979.

For 1985, Reynaud will again serve on the NCAA South Regional Volleyball Committee and as a voting member on several national polls and is chairperson of the All-America Committee.

PATTI HAGELMEYER ASSISTANT COACH

Patti Hagemeyer begins her first season as assistant coach after joining the Lady Seminole volleyball staff in March of 1985.

Hagemeyer came to Florida State after serving as assistant volleyball coach at Washington State University in Pullman, Washington for the past four years.



A standout volleyball player for Minnesota from 1976-80, Hagemeyer earned her bachelor's degree from that school in 1981. She captained the UM volleyball teams during her junior and senior years. During her playing days, Hagemeyer earned several awards for both her play and service to the university, including the 1979 and 1980 Minnesota Student Leadership and Service Award and the Honored Athlete of the Year title for 1980.

After completing her eligibility at Minnesota, she was assistant volleyball coach at Augsburg College in Minneapolis while finishing her degree. She accepted the Washington State post in August of 1981 and earned her master's degree in physical education from WSU in 1982.

Hagemeyer has also served on the staffs of several volleyball camps and clinics. She will assist head coach Cecile Reynaud with all areas of the volleyball program at FSU, and will supervise the recruiting and conditioning aspects of the program.

CAROL FORSTEN GRADUATE ASSISTANT COACH

After a stellar four-year career at Florida State as a player, Carol Forsten moves into a coaching role this season. A native of Somerton Park, Australia, Forsten earned a starting position every year and helped lead the 1981 squad to a fourth place finish at the AIAW National Championship.



Forsten, who earned a bachelor's degree in counseling from FSU in April, was named to the College Sports Information Directors of America Academic All-District team in 1984. She also has international volleyball experience after playing two summers with the Athletes-in-Action team that toured Japan in 1982 and South America in 1983.

Prior to starting her collegiate career at FSU, Forsten played for the Australian National volleyball team in World Cup competition and captained her high school team to the national championship her senior year.

She still holds the Florida State record for most aces in a match, set in 1981 against Baylor. Forsten will handle several administrative duties as assigned by Reynaud and will also begin work toward a master's degree in counseling.

1985 OUTLOOK: LADY SEMINOLES TO BATTLE YOUTH, INEXPERIENCE

Glancing over the 1985 roster, head coach Cecile Reynaud hesitated when asked about this year's Lady Seminole volleyball team. After a few moments of deep thought, Reynaud replied. "Anytime you are dealing with a young team, you have to be concerned. But at the same time, I have to admit that I am excited by the possibilities. We only have one player on the team with three years of experience, but we do have a lot of talented newcomers. At the very least it should be an interesting season."

Without question, youth will be a factor with the Lady Seminoles. Eight players will be in their first season at FSU; while two others are sophomores. Ten out of FSU's 12 players have a year or less experience in the program.

"Realistically, these younger players will make some mistakes on the floor," Reynaud said. "But we do have some veterans that can take a leadership role. and a lot of our freshmen have come from strong high school programs and are used to a high level of competition."

If FSU is to overcome its inexperience, the returning lettermen must play a key role. Leading the way is middle hitter Joan Morris. A junior, Morris recorded 303 kills last year to go with 121 total blocks. Morris will receive help in the middle from sophomore Julie Todd—who had 275 kills last season. "Joan is one of the strongest players we have ever had," Reynaud says. "She has really come into her own as one of the better players in the conference."

Sophomore Kim Britt and senior Donna Krai will handle the setter position. Both players shared that position last year, but Britt will probably open the season as a starter. A versatile performer, look for Krai to make the starting lineup somewhere. She led the team in assists last year with 604, but also had 106 kills at outside hitter. "Donna appears to handle our faster offense better at setter, but we can use her on the front line in certain situations. The main thing is that Donna needs to be on the floor for us."

With only four returning lettermen, at least two newcomers will need to come into the program ready to play. Freshmen Lynne Fullhart, Gina Muensterman and Marianne Tobolski will battle for playing time at outside hitter. Fullhart possesses an outstanding vertical jump and comes from a highly competitive program in her native Indiana. Tobolski has the advantage of being able to hit equally well either left or right handed; while Muensterman at 6'2" has all the tools to be an outstanding player. Twanna Walker could also see action on the outside; as could FSU All-American high jumper Wendy Markham—who will

play volleyball for the first time since high school after competing four years in track.

Backing Morris and Todd in the middle will be freshman Valene Harris, who signed a letter-of-intent to play basketball at FSU but is an experienced volleyball player as well. Harris can also play outside hitter

Deanne Kaleta is a 5'10" middle hitter from Riverside, IL. Described by Reynaud

as a natural athlete, Kaleta should see considerable time at either the middle hitter or outside hitter positions.

FSU faces a 28-match schedule that is highlighted by the Metro Conference Tournament November 23-24 in Hattiesburg, MS. The winner of that event receives an at-large bid into the NCAA Championships beginning December 7.
