

OUTLOOK 1988: LADY SEMINOLES AIM FOR FOURTH CONSECUTIVE METRO CROWN

Over the past three years in which Florida State has taken the Metro Conference Tournament championship, head coach Cecile Reynaud has lost a minimal amount of starters from those teams. On the past two Metro championship teams, only one starter has been lost to graduation.

In her thirteenth season at the Lady Seminole volleyball helm, Reynaud again has only one senior on the 1988 team. Is this the sign of a fourth consecutive Metro Crown for Reynaud and her young squad?

"I'm going into my 13th year with as much excitement as ever because of the type of players we have returning," says Reynaud. "I really enjoy working with these athletes, and to me that's very important. I can lead these kids to the court and explain to them what it will take to win and they will go out and do it."

Five starters return from the 1987 team which advanced into the NCAA Championship Tournament as well as an additional wealth of young talent. The class breakdown reads; one senior, four juniors, six sophomores and four freshmen.

"This group of athletes is a dedicated and serious bunch," Reynaud states proudly. "They have a competitive attitude and have made an effort to improve on what they started last season. We'll have four or five sophomores on this year's team which really made an impact during their freshman season and they will come into fall practice ready to play."

Two of the returning sophomores are expected to make an impact this season, according to Reynaud. Metro Conference Rookie of the Year Maggie Philgence and the team's Most Improved Player Gabrielle Reece will be counted on to continue their success in the 1988 season. Teamed with returning senior Deanne Kaleta, an All-Metro Conference Selection, and AVCA All-South Region selection junior Nancy Gaspadarek, Reynaud has a nucleus to work with.

"We'll be counting on Maggie and Gabrielle as the players to make the other teams nervous," Reynaud said. "The two of them can be pretty imtimidating with Gabrielle as tall as she is and Maggie being able to jump as well as she can. Deanne Kaleta is a low-profile player, but consistent. She's one who will keep the ball in play and let the opponents make mistakes. Nancy Gaspadarek has proven herself as a quality setter since she played her first game for FSU two years ago."


Other returnees who will see a considerable amount of action are Shannon Kelly, a sophomore from Miami, Maria Magoulas, a junior defensive specialist and sophomore Marybeth Sutcliffe, who led the team with 34 service aces last season. Florida State will also have quality bench depth returning three players with collegiate experience and three freshmen. Jennifer Marraffino will return in a backup setter role and Debbie Meyer, who came on strong toward the end of the year also returns. Returning to the Lady Seminole lineup after a year's absence is junior Twanna Walker of Jacksonville. Three freshmen, Malaka El Shahawy, Stacy Booth and Rebecca White, will make their debut for the Lady Seminoles in 1988.

Two heralded newcomers will also grace the court at Tully Gym this coming season and when Reynaud envisions their impact, a smile immediately comes to her face. Freshman Amy Bronson, the 1987 Dade County Player of the Year for Volleyball and Sonia Trevino, the Reebok Player of the Year from NJCAA National Champion San Jacinto College, were all that was needed to replace the lone loss from the 1987

club. "We're looking for Amy to come in and make an immediate impact in the middle,"says Reynaud. "She has played against top competition and that level will not change when the season starts. We're also very excited to have Sonia here at FSU. She will bring in a winning attitude she established at San Jacinto and she will know how to react in the pressure situations of a close match."

As Florida State moves up in the collegiate volleyball circles, its schedule must also follow the same lines. During the course of the 1988 season, Florida State will meet top competition from the south region as well as its Metro Conference foes. The philosophy of Reynaud has her young squad building experience against the top teams of the country in their freshman and sophomore years, so when they meet again in their junior and senior years, the previous experience will pay dividends. "It was quite an experience last season when we drew Texas in the first round of the NCAA Championships," said Reynaud. "But after we went out there and gave them a run for their money. The girls are now ready for a rematch." Top matches of the 1988 season include Georgia, Florida, Houston, Lousiana State and Kentucky from the south region and Penn State and Texas-Arlington from other regions.

After 12 years of collegiate coaching and experience in international volleyball, Cecile Reynaud is a good judge of talent. In her opinion, this young 1988 squad will turn some heads and others will take notice. "The experience this team will have by the time they are juniors and seniors will be tremendous," she says. "I envision a top 20 finish in the years to come. Who knows maybe it will even be this year with a few breaks."

HEAD COACH CECILE REYNAUD

(SW Missouri State, 1975) 350-150-1 (12 Years)

When it comes to winning Metro Conference Championships, no other women's coach at Florida State can match the feats of volleyball head coach

Cecile Reynaud. In four of the past five Metro
Tourney's the Lady Seminoles have walked away victorious. FSU has taken the Metro crown in the past three years and enter the 1988 season with a 21-match win streak against Metro opponents.

Entering her 13th season for Florida State, Reynaud has yet to experience a losing campaign. Her teams, since 1976, have averaged 29 wins per season and have never dipped below a 60 per cent winning clip. Eight times, the Lady Seminoles have advanced into post-season play. Prior to the 1983 season, Florida State competed in AIAW post-season play five times and twice reached the national tournament. FSU had its highest finish in the AIAW in 1981, finishing fourth. Since joining NCAA action, the Lady Seminoles have moved into the prestigious tournament three times.

Revnaud has proven to be a winner beyond the colleciate ranks with experi-

Reynaud has proven to be a winner beyond the collegiate ranks with experi-Heynaud has proven to be a williner beyond the collegiate ranks with expen-ence coaching several international teams. In 1983, she served as an assistant coach at the World University Games. She took her biggest step in international coaching when she served as the head coach for the 1985 United States Junior National team which traveled and competed in Japan and China. For the past two years, she has served as East Zone coordinator at the U.S. Olympic Sports

An authority on the game, Reynaud has served as technical consultant for several volleyball films and also edited a book on power volleyball. She has also appeared as a guest speaker at various clinics across the nation.

Reynaud came to Florida State in 1976 following a standout athletic career at Southwest Missouri State in Springfield, Missouri. Her outstanding playing and coaching career led to her induction into Southwest Missouri State's Hall of Fame in 1983.

After serving as an officer of the American Volleyball Coaches Association (AVCA) board, she has been voted President-elect for 1988 and will begin her term as President for the 1989-90 year. She is also a member of the United States Volleyball Assocation (USVBA) Board of Directors.



ASSISTANT COACH SHELLY BIRKHOLZ

(FLORIDA STATE, 1986)

Shelly Birkholz enjoyed two successful years as a competitor for Florida State until suffering a knee injury her sophomore season which ended her play-ing career. Birkholz rejoined Florida State in 1986 as an assistant coach and now enters her third

season at that same post.

As assistant coach, Birkholz works closely with head coach Cecile Reynaud during practices and matches. She also coordinates the recruiting process and monitors the academic progress of the players.

A native of Roscoe, IL, Birkholz graduated from FSU with a degree in leisure

services in May, 1986.

FSU AND ACADEMICS By Cecile Reynaud

Florida State University has long been recognized as an outstanding educational institution, providing young men and women an opportunity to learn, develop and secure a degree in their chosen fields of interest. Indeed, the reason my staff and I are here is to assist our athletes in carrying out this objective.

There can be no greater accomplishment than for a studentathlete to complete her eligibility and obtain her degree simultaneously. That is our goal for every volleyball player at FSU. Twice in the past five years, an FSU volleyball player earned the Metro Conference Mediallion award, the highest academic award a conference athlete at each member school that completes their eligibility and graduates on time with a 3.0 overall grade point average or higher. Just last season, Julie Todd closed out her playing career earning the medallion.

I know it is possible for an athlete to be successful both on the court and in the classroom at Florida State. Our best athletes have also been our best students. It is my professional objective to recruit student-athletes that have a personal goal of graduating with distinction in four years. My greatest satisfaction is to see our players realize their potential as both athletes and productive members of society after graduation.

THIS IS FLORIDA STATE UNIVERSITY

Florida State University, home of the world's fastest supercomputer, is setting the pace as higher education in the state prepares to enter the 21st century. The FSU Supercomputer Computations Research Institute attracts international attention with scientists from many nations using the University's two powerful supercomputers in their research.

The Department of Physics' Tandem Van de Graaff Superconducting Accelerator Laboratory, ranked in the top four in the nation by the National Science Foundation, houses two powerful atom smashers which also provide unique research opportunities.

Located in Tallahassee, the capital of Florida, FSU is a public, coeducational university and a senior member of the State University System. More than 24,000 students are enrolled, representing all 50 states and 100 foreign countries. The University offers more than 250 graduate and undergraduate degrees in its 15 schools and colleges. Outstanding programs in the colleges of arts and sciences, business, communication, education, engineering, home economics, law and social sciences combine with the schools of criminology, library and information studies, music, nursing, social work, theater and visual arts to make Florida State a nationally acclaimed university.

The Florida State campus, located just blocks away from the state capitol, is beautiful in all seasons. Its 347 acres mirror the picturesque features of the surrounding North Florida region. The buildings are nestled among evergreen live oaks, pines and palms, as well as hardwoods that provide fall color, and dogwoods and azaleas that are covered with a profusion of springtime blossoms.

As an institution, FSU began as coeducational Seminary West of the Suwannee River, approved by the Florida Legislature in 1851 and assigned to Tallahassee in 1857. Name changes over the years included Florida State College in 1901; then in 1905, Florida Female College and, in 1909, Florida State College for Women. Gov. Millard Caldwell signed a bill in 1947 which again made the institution coeducational and changed the name to Florida State University.

The first building to house the institution was completed in 1855. Westcott, the present administrative building, replaced the original building, making this location the state's oldest active university site.

Today, Florida State faculty and administrators generate more than \$50 million annually in external funding to supplement state sponsorship of research. In addition, \$14.5 million in private gifts was raised through the FSU Foundation during the past fiscal year.

These contributions from alumni, friends, corporations, the University community and charitable foundations benefit Florida State's academic programs.

The University's location affords excellent research and internship opportunities in government, law and the social sciences. The reputation of Florida State's research programs and the expertise of its more than 1,500 faculty members—including four members of the National Academy of Sciences and four members of the American Academy of Arts and Sciences—represent major strengths of the University. FSU prides itself on pursuing academic quality while

maintaining a friendly, welcoming atmosphere.

Programs in music, dance and theater at Florida State have earned well-deserved national recognition. The visual and performing arts exhibited and produced on campus offer students and the community a wealth of enrichment opportunities.


Student activities at FSU create an important balance between the classroom experience and the personal life of the individual scholar. Honors programs, student government, intramural sports and more than 200 organizations are available for student involvement. Furthermore, the Flying High Circus, the world's only all-collegiate circus, makes its home here.

Florida State academic programs extend well beyond Tallahassee. The FSU Marine Laboratory is located on the Gulf of Mexico, 45 miles away. Students participate in professional training programs at the Asolo State Theater in Sarasota and the Burt Reynolds Institute for Theatre Training in Jupiter. The Panama City

Campus of Florida State offers upper-level courses which lead to bachelor's and master's degrees. The Center for Professional Development and Public Service, housed in the Florida State Conference Center on the edge of the main campus, manages educational outreach activities from Pensacola to Miami.

The physical growth of the University during the 11-year administration of President Bernard Sliger represents new construction expenditures of more than \$100 million. It includes such additions as the University Union expansion project, the new Paul A.M. Dirac Science Library Building, the Jeffersonian-style Village Green project at the College of Law, the new wing of the Rovetta Business Building, and the new FAMU/FSU College of Engineering at Innovation Park.

It is not only the academic programs and facilities of Florida State, but also its people—students, faculty, alumni, administrators and staff—who make this University such a proud monument to learning.
