

Annual events in Tallahassee are a big part of the community involvement. Springtime Tallahassee draws a crowd of


more than 200,000 during its four-week jubilee in March and April. A downtown parade, festival in the park, city-wide race and balloon rally all make

Residents also look forward to the Celebration of Lights in December when the Civic Center parking lot is turned into an ice skating rink along with lighting festivities and a 3K run in the downtown area. The LPGA Tour brings the world's top female golfers and FSU alumni like Jane Geddes, Colleen Walker and Barbara Bunkowsky, who compete each May for the largest purse on the tour at the Sprint Classic hosted

by the Killearn County Club. Summer-time brings a city wide fourth of July Celebration at Tom Brown Park and of course, fall means Seminole fever as the Florida State football team kicks off another exciting year.

With a median age of 27 years old, studies have shown that Tallahassee is relatively young, affluent, well-educated, ethnically diverse and growing by leaps and bounds. Whether a student, professional or retiree, Tallahassee has something for everyone to enjoy.

















From its beginning as "The Seminary West of the Suwannee" in 1857, Florida State University has grown

to stretch across 347 acres of rolling oak and pine-covered hills to comprise a campus which has educated millions of students over the last century.

Florida State University has boasted a heritage of service and scholarship since the beginning when the legislature passed an act authorizing two state colleges — one east (now University of Florida) and one west of the meandering Suwannee River.

Starting with a 130-member coed enrollment in 1857, the Seminary survived the Civil War, reconstruction, radical social changes, and a variety of name changes to emerge in 1909 as the Florida State College for Women.

It was helped back into coed status in 1947 by a legislature anxious to open up the state's educational resources to thousands of degree-seeking ex-Gl's from World War II. It also was granted a new name "Florida State University." The University's expanse and complexity

today contrast vividly with its beginning. Sixteen schools and colleges within the University serve more than 29,000 students who are enrolled in the 276 graduate and undergraduate degree programs and live and work among 1,500 faculty and 3,000 staff members.

About 5,000 degrees are awarded every year.


In the past several years, the University has joined an

elite group of universities in the United States which produce more than 200 doctoral graduates annually. Emphasis on graduate research and study at the University continues to grow, and today more than 4,000 graduate students pursue a variety of degrees.

Student life at Florida State University also offers young people ample opportunity to acquire leadership skills and to apply their classroom learning in student government, residence hall government, Greek social organizations, honors programs, departmental organizations and more than 200 other registered student organizations active on campus. The FSU Artist Series, the Distinguished Lecture Series and outstanding music, theater and dance production provide enjoyable evenings for the entire community.

Being a student at Florida State University means stepping into a tradition of more than

130 years of higher education. From its Flying High Circus to its Supercomputer Computations Research, Florida State provides a panorama of excitement, blending the educational and social sides of campus life.

September 1994


Completion of the northwest corner seating section adding 2,000 seats and the south end-zone building, providing a food court and other features.

Academic Advising

The primary concern of being a student-athlete at Florida State University is getting an education and taking advantage of the many opportunities offered to assist players. Dr. Roger Grooters, Director of the

Athletic Academic Program, along with his staff, aids each student who participates in the non-revenue sports program with his or her admission, class schedule, registration. and the normal progression towards a degree. Graduate assistants also monitor each athlete in their class performance and recommend tutors when necessary.

As student-athletes learn to juggle practicing 20 hours a week and making six road trips during their season, plus a full class load, they find comfort in knowing there is a support staff to help them accomplish the ultimate goal of receiving a quality education.

Strength Training and Conditioning

Strength training and conditioning is an important part of an athlete's performance on the court. At Florida State, a supervised program is developed for volleyball, emphasizing the objectives of not building bodies, but strengthening and conditioning them. Strength coach Matte Hamparian individually customizes programs for each of the athletes beginning with pre-conditioning before the season gets underway. The workouts are modeled after the National Strength and Conditioning Association's volleyball training program.

Hamparian works with the players in sport specific training which includes conditioning the major muscles groups used in volleyball. FSU takes pride in customizing the programs to help student-athletes reach their maximum potential.

Prevention Care and Treatment


Being an athlete at Florida State University means receiving the best care and treatment possible. All of the student-athletes undergo pre-season screening so a certified trainer can detect any potential injuries an athlete may incur. If a problem is detected, the athlete is placed on a prevention care program which may include any kind of treatment from icing to exercising. The program is closely monitored by Head Trainer Robin Gibson or one of her nine staff members.

Rehabilitation is another important component of the Seminole training room.

Though preventing injuries is

the main objective, they are unavoidable for the 125 athletes who participate in sports. More serious injuries and illnesses are referred to the Seminole team physicians at the Tallahassee Orthopedic Center who, for many years, have worked in conjunction with the FSU training room in successfully rehabilitating numerous athletes after an injury.

Body fat measurements, counseling, and drug testing are all responsibilities of the athletic training team which is dedicated to providing the best care possible for all FSU student-athletes.



The Florida State volleyball team has a lot to look forward to in 1993. The Lady Seminoles are coming off an extremely successful season as co-champions of the Atlantic Coast Conference regular season and participants in the NCAA Championship Tournament for the seventh time since 1983. FSU was also the first ACC team ever to be invited to the NCAA tournament with an at-large bid.

Leading the Tribe this season will be a wealth of experienced players. Seniors, Jennifer McCall and Vicki Zinkil were both starters last season and provide a consistent offense along with team leadership. Junior outside hitters, Luiza Ramos and Deanna Bosschaert are quickly becoming known as a powerhouse duo across the conference. The pair combined for over 800 kills just last season. Fellow classmates Adria Ciraco and Catie Lotarski will also be looked to for strength defensively.

Though technically the Lady Seminoles will have five newcomers on the roster, the group brings much experience and knowledge. Franci Rard, a transfer from the University of Georgia, will play her final year at FSU and Valerie Broussard and Sonia Preocanin will return as redshirt freshmen.


Broussard suffered stress fractures during the summer which side-lined her after pre-season work-outs and Preocanin recovered from a high school knee surgery during the year.

FSU will have two true freshmen faces on the court in 1993. Colorado native Heidi Sorensen, a 5-11 middle hitter and Michigan native Patty Diamond, a 5-10 setter. Both players bring in a strong background in club ball and head coach Cecile Reynaud feels confident the two will adjust to college life quickly.

"Our new players have excellent ball control skills and I see them contributing early," said Reynaud. "I expect both (Sorensen and Diamond) to open up a lot of offensive opportunities for us."

Also new for the squad this season is the Lady Seminole's home court Tully Gym. The 37 year old facility had the floors sanded down and repainted for the upcoming year. Along with the floor, the first phase new comfortable seat back chairs were installed for the FSU fans.

The hometown fans will enjoy another year of topnotch competition including a full ACC schedule which will include a home and away schedule along with final four participant Florida Gators, as well as Auburn, South Florida, and Southwest Missouri State.

COACHES PROFILE









CECILE REYNAUD

18th Season; Career Record 475-196 (.708) Alma Mater: SW Missouri State, 1975

Volleyball at Florida State and Cecile Reynaud have both enjoyed great success over the last 17 years. After a transitional year of departing the Metro Conference to the highly competitive ACC, Reynaud rebounded in 1992 bringing her team back to the top-notch level program it has been known for in the past.

After 17 seasons at FSU, Reynaud has accumulated an amazing 475 wins. The Lady Seminoles finished with a 6-1 conference record last year and were co-champions of the ACC regular season. Reynaud was also honored as the ACC Coach of the Year and three of her athletes were named to the All-Conference team.

During her tenure, the Lady Seminoles have yet to encounter a losing season and have averaged 28 wins a year. With a 475-196 overall record, Reynaud is undoubtedly one of the most successful coaches in volleyball today. Since joining the NCAA Division I, the Lady Seminoles have captured six Metro Conference championships and made seven NCAA tournament appearances since 1983, including four in the last five seasons.

A two-time Metro Conference Coach of the Year, Reynaud was also honored as Coach of the Year by the 1981 Florida Association of Intercollegiate Athletics for Women and the 1989 AVCA South Region. In 1983, she went on to the international level and served as the assistant coach at the World University Games in Canada, and in 1985, was head coach for

the United States Junior National Team which toured Japan and China. She has also been on the AVCA All-America Committee and the Zone Coordinator for the 1986 and 1987 Olympic Festival. She has continued to serve as the co-commissioner or commissioner for the Olympic Festival since 1988.

Reynaud participated in the 1990 Goodwill Games as the technical secretary and is past-president of the American Volleyball Coaches Association.

Currently, she is active on the USVBA Board of Directors and Executive Committee.

As an expert on the game, Reynaud has been a technical consultant for two Power Volleyball films and the third edition of the book *Power Volleyball*.

She has also co-authored numerous articles pertaining to women's athletics and continues to be active on the speakers circuit.

Reynaud has been an instructor at more than 35 camps across the country and hosts her

own camp each year which attracts nearly 500 young volleyball players from as far away as Canada and the Virgin Islands.

A 1975 graduate of Southwest

Missouri State, Reynaud enjoyed an outstanding athletic career on the volleyball team and was twice named among the Outstanding College Athletes in America. In 1983, she was inducted into the Southwest Missouri State Women's Athletic Hall of Fame.

Reynaud completed her Master's degree at Florida State in 1979 and has recently enrolled in the doctoral program at FSU.





Shelly Birkholz returns for her seventh year assisting Reynaud with the Florida State team. In 1991, Birkholz returned to her position after a year's absence when she served as the Indiana women's coordinator for the Fellowship of Christian Athletes. Previously, Birkholz was the assistant from 1986 through the 1989 seasons during which the Lady Seminoles made three appearances in the NCAA tournament.

After a standout prep career at Hononegah High School in Roscoe, Illinois, Birkholz accepted a volleyball scholarship at FSU. Knee surgery side-lined her as a sophomore, however Birkholz continued to play an important role on the Lady Seminole team for the next two years.

Birkholz graduated from Florida State in 1986 with a degree in leisure services before she officially joined the coaching staff. She continued her education and earned her Master's degree in 1988.

She currently coordinates recruiting, monitors the academic progress of the players and provides Reynaud with input on daily practices and matches. She also assists and participates in the team's training and workout sessions which led to her selection and top two finish at the American Gladiators competition held in Tallahassee.

As one of the organizers of the FSU huddle for FCA, Birkholz continues her speaking engagements around the state. In 1991, she served as an administrative assistant for the volleyball delegation at the Olympic Festival in Los Angeles. Birkholz has also been involved in the Big Bend USVBA 18 and older team and assists in the Cecile Reynaud Volleyball Camp each summer.

Assistant Coach 3rd Season George Mason, 1991

Kris Grunwald enters his third year on the Lady Seminole staff after a successful academic and athletic career at George Mason University. In 1991, he completed an impressive four-year stint on the nationally ranked men's volleyball team while holding a 3.6 GPA in Mathematics.

While at GMU, Grunwald was twice selected first team All-East and Honorable Mention All-American as well as being named to the Dean's List three times and to the Athletic Honor Roll four times. He is a veteran of five Empire State Games, the State Games of New York, and the 1987 Olympic Festival. His 1988 GMU squad participated in the NCAA Volleyball Final

In 1991, Grunwald was selected to play on the prestigious First Investors USVBA team of Atlanta. He helped lead the team to championships at the Caribbean and Hi-Neighbor tournaments as well as a bronze medal in the silver division at the national champinship.

Grunwald spent his first two years as a graduate assistant while completing his Master's degree last spring. This fall the New York native will continue his duties specializing with the teams middle blockers and assisting Reynaud and Birkholz with the team's practices and games.




