OUTLOOK 2000

he 2000 season will be filled with questions for Florida State Head Volleyball Coach Dr. Cecile Reynaud and her Lady Seminoles, but the answers are there. It's just a matter of finding where the answers fit best. Once that is accomplished, there will be no stopping the Lady Seminoles.

"I feel good about the student-athletes we have in our program," Reynaud said. "They work hard in practice and do what we ask them to do. It is just a matter of experience and figuring out just what it will take to win."

FSU returns 10 letterwinners, including five starters, and welcomes three new players to the program. Injuries plagued the squad in 1999, which allowed several players the opportunity to see action at different positions.

"The newcomers are going to provide some competition for starting positions," Reynaud said. "Even though we will have a more experienced team, we are still going to be young, with Jennifer Werrick being our only senior. Norisha (Campbell) has a full year of experience and Elizabeth (Pound) played in about half of the matches but the rest of them really have just one year of experience."

The Lady Seminoles will also be able to reap the benefits of the European trip the team took in May. The Tribe embarked on a 16-day journey through Germany, the Czech Republic and Denmark. The Lady Seminoles played eight matches against teams from the Czech Republic, Sweden, Denmark and Ireland.

"The trip was very pleasant," Reynaud said. "It was just a great experience for the team and the staff. I think we learned a lot about each other on the trip. Our extra week of training and competing against some very talented European teams should pay dividends this fall.


"Our players should come back this year with more confidence. They have been through the whole routine now and know what's expected and they know what it's going to take to win our conference championship again."

OUTSIDES

Lone senior Jennifer Werrick will anchor a talented group of outside hitters. Werrick ranked first on the team with 311 kills and was second in both digs (224) and hitting (.226) in 1999. Her knowledge will be most valuable considering that no other Lady Seminole at this position has more than one year of playing experience at FSU.

"Jen leads by her skills on the court," Reynaud said. "She's not a real vocal player, but the way she leads is by taking care of business on the court. She's very good at all the different skills and can be a steady player.'

Sophomore Erica Bunch made a solid contribution as a rookie. Playing in 30 of 31 matches, Bunch ranked fourth on the team in kills with 244 and was third with 198 digs. She proved to be a very valuable in serving with 20 aces which



ranked second on the team.

"While Erica had a very productive freshman year, I don't think we've gotten even a glimpse of what she can offer," Reynaud said. "Her overall general skills should make her a dominant player."

Sophomore Kristin Frye began her FSU career in the starting lineup, but an injury hampered her progress. Frye, who played in 14 matches, was sidelined with a hairline fracture to her right ankle in early October, and missed the rest of the season. She came back this spring and played very well.

"We were pleased with how Kristin played in the spring," Reynaud said. "She's certainly got the athletic ability to be a strong player and is a good leader on the floor. She's very competitive and very vocal with her teammates."

Sophomore Alex Sevillano, who played in 27 matches last year and had her best performance against Wake Forest when she tallied 12 kills and nine digs, could challenge for a starting position.

"Alex is also an option as a left side hitter," Reynaud said. "She's very vocal and extremely competitive in every drill. She's another player who can play on the left side or in the back row for one of the middles."

Freshman Cerina Pele has the potential to come in and earn a starting position. The only player on the team from California, Pele, who hails from Gardena, was named the 1999 CIF Co-Player of the Year after leading her team to the Division 3 championship and state finals.

"Cerina is going to come in and challenge for starting honors on either the left or right side," Reynaud said. "She has excellent ball-control skills and plays very good defense. She passes well, has a great jump and is a good blocker who

knows the game of volleyball very well."

Junior Luana Ruiz Azevedo played in 26 matches in 1999 and twice recorded 15 digs in a match. She will see most of her action on defense, but has valuable experience at outside hitter and will provide depth to the position. Sophomore Martha Hamilton improved her blocking when she got playing time in the spring and will serve as backup on the right side.

"Luana played some on the right side, but will probably be used more in the back row as a defensive player," Reynaud said. "She's got a good serve and can dig the ball well."

MIDDLES

Norisha Campbell will use her 6-4 frame and long arms to lead the attack in the middle for the Tribe. Campbell ranked second on the team last season with 83 blocks and tallied double-digit kills in 16 matches. Although just a junior, Campbell should be one of this season's conference leaders in attacking and blocking.

"This year is going to be more fun for Norisha." Reynaud said. "Last year, she trained for most of the summer with the U.S. Junior National team and competed into the start of our season. She should come in fresh this year with a couple of months off this summer and should dominate in the middle. When Norisha gets the right set, she can put the ball away."

Junior Elizabeth Pound and sophomores Dawn Hough and Kristin Frve will all vie for valuable playing time in the middle. Pound played in 21 matches in 1999 and improved every facet of her game. She served 13 straight points in the team's 15-0 win in game four vs. NC State. Hough played in 20 matches and twice had a career-high 12 kills.

"Who we start is going to depend on a lot of different scenarios," Reynaud said, "but I think Dawn is probably one of our stronger blockers in the middle. Elizabeth is also an

excellent blocker. Kristin will see most of her playing time on the right side, but if we need to go that deep in the middle, we can go to her."

Newcomer Marie Persson, a junior walk-on from Jacksonville, Fla., will backup both the middle and outside hitter positions.

SETTER

Sophomore Jamie Hibbard and freshman Jennifer Anderson will battle it out for starting honors at setter.

Hibbard emerged as the squad's starting setter in 1999 and tallied 1.125 assists, which ranks eighth in the FSU single-season records. She also led the team with 253 digs. Anderson was a four-year letterwinner at Olympia High School in Stanford,

III., who was selected to the All-Stater Sports Magazine's Class of 2000 Volleyball Super 75.

"It's exciting to know that we have two very capable setters in Jamie and Jennifer." Reynaud said. "Jamie came in and ran a new system and progressed as the year went on.

"Jennifer grew up in a family that certainly knows volleyball. Her mother is a vol-

JENNIFER WERRICK leyball coach. She's from Illinois which is a very strong volleyball state. She's intense and likes to win, so we're anxious to see what she's able to do on the floor."



SCHEDULE

The Florida State Invitational with Southern Mississippi, Florida Atlantic, Charleston Southern and Illinois, Sept. 1st and 2nd, gets things started for the Lady Seminoles, followed by a visit from Alabama. The Ball State Tournament in Muncie, Ind., and the Lady Seminole Classic round out FSU's regular-season tournament slate.


The Ball State Tournament, where FSU will face Southeast Missouri State, Texas El Paso and Ball State. will be a homecoming for Indiana natives Jamie Hibbard and Kristin Frve.

Samford, Notre Dame and Florida A&M will invade Tully Gym for the Lady Seminole Classic. All three of the tournaments include two teams that participated in NCAA postseason play last year. In all, FSU will play 14 matches against 1999 NCAA Tournament teams.

"Our schedule is going to be challenging," Reynaud said. "We have a lot of home matches, but a very strong home schedule with some teams that have been ranked in the Top 20. We will also face teams from some of the nation's top conferences. Our schedule is a little bit unusual in that we are not really playing any mid-week matches outside of Tallahassee.'

The Atlantic Coast Conference was rated the secondstrongest conference in the nation last season and the league placed three teams in the NCAA Tournament. FSU will start the ACC season on the road at Maryland and Virginia and conclude on the road at Georgia Tech and Clemson.

"Several ACC schools lost some key people to graduation and will be going through what we did last year as far as rebuilding," Reynaud said. "There will be a lot of new faces in the league and it will be a matter of getting your team to play together. Obviously, with our conference being the second ranked conference in the country, it's going to be competitive as usual, but it looks to be pretty wide open."



r. Cecile Reynaud and Florida State volleyball. You simply can't think of one without thinking of the other, because for the past 24 years, this connection has created one of the nation's premier volleyball programs. The 2000 season will represent the Silver Anniversary of this relationship.

Having spent the past 24 years at the helm of the FSU volleyball program, Reynaud has experienced the growth of athletics firsthand. She remembers the days when team members packed their own lunches, car pooled to games and paid travel expenses out of their own pockets. She's seen where it 's been, where it is now and where it is headed and it is this unique perspective that keeps Reynaud coming back for more. More growth, more experience, more chills, more thrills...each season is a new experience, a new challenge.

With a career record of 597-303, Reynaud ranks 9th nationally in career victories among active Division I coaches. Highly respected among her peers, Reynaud's involvement in international competition was elevated to an even higher level when she was chosen to serve as the Deputy Competition Manager for the 1996 Centennial Olympic Games. Years of volleyball experience paid off as she coordinated the activities of the Athens, Ga., venue for 10 days of competition.

As a coach, Reynaud has surpassed many milestones in her 24-year tenure at Florida State. Coach Reynaud notched her 500th career victory in the first match of the 1994 season against Southern Illinois, placing her among an elite list of coaches in the 500-win club. She reached win number 550 in a three-set win at Florida Atlantic in 1997 as she led the Lady Seminoles to the program's best ever start at 12-0.

Looking back over 24 seasons of volleyball, post season play has become familiar to the Lady Seminoles. Florida State has made 10 NCAA post-season appearances, eight of which have been in the last 13 years. At the conference level, FSU has made three appearances in the Atlantic Coast Conference Championship match and earned its first ACC crown in 1998. Prior to joining the ACC, Reynaud and the Lady Seminoles claimed six regular-season titles and five tournament titles in Metro Conference play.

A two-time Metro Conference Coach of the Year, Reynaud was also honored as Coach of the Year by the Atlantic Coast Conference in 1992 when she led FSU to a first-place regular season finish. She was also named Florida Association of Intercollegiate Athletics for Women Coach of the Year in 1991 and in 1989 she garnered AVCA South Region Coach of the Year accolades.

In May of 1996, Reynaud received the George J. Fischer Leader in Volleyball Award, presented at the USA Volleyball National Meetings in Dallas, Texas. This award recognizes long-time-significant contributions to volleyball programs and activities in the United States.


Reynaud's success directly correlates with the type of individuals she attracts to Florida State. This is evident on the court as well as in the classroom as reflected by the graduation rate of the student-athletes who have played for her. Among four-year volleyball letterwinners, all but two have earned their college degree, which is nearly a 98 percent graduation rate. These graduates have included two GTE Academic All-Americans and numerous honor roll students over the years.

In 1983, Reynaud went to the international level and served as the assistant coach at the World University Games in Canada and in 1985 was head coach for the United States Junior National Team which toured Japan and China. She has been on the AVCA All-America Committee and was the Zone Coordinator for 1986 and 1987 Olympic Festivals. She continued to serve as the commissioner for the Olympic Festival for several years. Reynaud participated in the 1990 Goodwill Games as the technical secretary and is past-president of the American Volleyball Coaches Association. Reynaud is a current member of the Volleyball Hall of Fame selection committee and spent 12 years on the USVBA Board of Directors and Executive Committee.

As an expert of the game, Reynaud is co-editor of "The Volleyball Coaching Bible", which is due to be completed in the fall of 2001. She has also been a technical consultant for two Power Volleyball films and the third edition of the book "Power Volleyball." She has co-authored numerous articles pertaining to women's athletics and continues to be active on the speaking circuit. Reynaud has been an instructor at more than 100 camps and clinics across the country and hosts her own each year which attracts hundreds of voung volleyball players.

A 1975 graduate of Southwest Missouri State, Reynaud enjoyed an outstanding athletic career on the volleyball team and was twice named among the Outstanding College Athletes in America. In 1983, she was inducted into the school's Women's Athletics Hall of Fame.

Reynaud added "Dr." to her name in the spring of 1998 after completing her doctorate degree in athletic administration at FSU.

STAFF BIOS

ue Woodstra, former University of California head volleyball coach and an 1984 Olympic silver medalist, is in her second season as a member of the Florida State volleyball coaching staff. As Dr. Cecile Reynaud's top assistant, Woodstra is involved with recruiting for the Lady Seminoles, assisting the student-athletes with their academic progress, as well as the day-to-day management of the team.

After a decorated playing career, Woodstra turned her talents to the coaching arena as an assistant at Arizona State University in 1985. After four seasons at ASU, she began a four-year reign as head coach at the University of Pittsburgh (1989-1992) where she led the Lady Panthers to four consecutive Big East conference titles and NCAA Tournament appearances. She earned Big East Coach of the Year honors in 1990. Woodstra also spent a year coaching internationally at the professional level in Germany, guiding the USC Munster team to a 28-4 record and the C.E.V. European Cup Championship in 1993. The following year, Woodstra served as a volunteer coach at the University of Notre Dame before becoming the head coach at the University of California (Berkeley) in 1995.


As a standout player at the University of Southern California, Woodstra helped the Lady Trojans to the 1977 AIAW National Championship while earning All-America honors. She went on to an impressive eight-year career on the U.S. National Team and served as team captain for four seasons. During her National Team stint, Woodstra helped the United States to the 1983 Zone Championship and three other top five finishes in Zone and World Championship play. Woodstra was also the team captain of the 1984 U.S. Olympic Team that earned a silver medal at the Olympic Games in Los Angeles. Woodstra played four seasons (1984-88) on the professional level for the NEC Volleyball Team of the Japan League. She also played three seasons with the Merrill Lynch/Reebok USVBA team where she earned Most Valuable Player honors after leading the squad to its second straight national championship in 1986.

In 1993, Woodstra was selected as a USVBA All-Time Great Volleyball Player for her career achievements.



THIS IS TALLAHASSEE



ear, but far from the glaring strips of neon amusement, and the castles and crowds of Disney, lies another magical place in the Sunshine State — one of plantations, politics and great pride. Often described as "The Other Florida" with its deep-rooted history, rolling hills, canopy roads of moss-draped oaks, cool climate and Southern-style hospitality; it is a Florida few have seen. It is Tallahassee — Florida with a Southern accent.

Best known as Florida's capital, Tallahassee is an intimate neo-metropolitan city where the power of state government, the academic and the artistic are complemented by subtle, old-fashioned charm. It is the perfect two- or three-day diversion for the more than 41 million annual visitors to Florida and 13 million residents.

Tallahassee touts a menagerie of sights including one of the world's deepest freshwater springs, site of America's first Christmas, a wildlife habitat, Capitol buildings, fascinating museums of history, sprawling plantations, highly acclaimed fishing and hunting adventures and nearby beaches. Spirited area festivals range from celebrations of Tallahassee's spectacular spring and swamp stomps to genuine rattlesnake roundups and seafood festivals.

With the Gulf of Mexico just 20 miles south and the Georgia border only 14 miles north, Tallahassee rests between the

foothills of the Appalachian Mountains and the juncture of Florida's panhandle and peninsula. Nearer in miles to Atlanta than to Miami, Tallahassee more closely resembles its Southern neighbors than Florida in topography, climate and lifestyle.

Accentuating Tallahassee's Southern persona are lush rolling hills, likened to the seven hills of Rome, and five "official" canopy roads of patriarch oaks. The fertile, rich soil and four distinct, yet pleasant, seasons breed floral brilliance and natural vitality year-round.

Like the city itself, the story of how Tallahassee was chosen as the state capital is rich in history. In 1823, two explorers set out — one on horseback from St. Augustine and the other by boat from Pensacola — to find a permanent, central location for the Legislature to convene. The two met at a beautiful site that the Creek and Seminole Indians called "tallahassee" — derived from the words "talwa" meaning town and "ahasee" meaning old. The rendezvous point remains Florida's capital.


The "old town" has undergone many changes, but one thing remains the same — it is still a government town fiercely proud and dedicated to preserving its heritage. The Capitol buildings, both old and new, epitomize Tallahassee's perseverance.

The 22nd floor of the New Capitol provides a panoramic scope of a sophisticated Southern city awash in a sea of

flowering azaleas, snowy dogwoods, towering pines, fragrant magnolias, and hundreds of shimmering lakes, springs, swamps, rivers and sink holes. Special legislative viewing galleries are open during the legislative session.

Below, in the shade of giant live oaks, proudly stands the Old Capitol, originally constructed in 1845 and restored to its 1902 splendor complete with red-and-white candystriped awnings, a dome adorned with stained glass, antique furnishings and political memorabilia.

Across from the Old



Capitol are the 40-foot twin granite towers of the Vietnam Veteran's Memorial, and the blue stone Union Bank, Florida's oldest surviving financial institution. The nostalgic Old Town Trolley, a replica turn-of-the-century street car, carries passengers through restored Adams Street Commons to numerous other historical downtown shops for free — unheard of even 100 years ago.


Minutes from downtown lies the Governor's Mansion, which resembles the home of Florida's military hero Andrew Jackson; and the 52-acre natural animal habitat and 1880s farm of the Tallahassee Museum of History and Natural Science, which provide the rare chance to walk and talk with native Florida animals.

Tallahassee remains firmly linked with the past as evidenced by the unearthed 1539 winter encampment of Spanish Hernando de Soto, the site of the first Christmas celebration in America. Visitors travel back through time as they stand in the shadow of a giant 12,000-year-old American Mastodon at the Museum of Florida History or explore other historical spots including The Knott House that Rhymes, The Columns, San Luis Mission, Lake Jackson State Archaeological Site, Natural Bridge Battlefield, First Presbyterian Church, Brokaw-McDougall House, Goodwood Plantation and Adams Street Commons.

Nearby, alligators lazing in the sunshine and anhinga "snake birds" perched on twisted cypress branches are seen at Wakulla Springs, one of the world's deepest fresh water springs and site of many underwater scenes in the "Tarzan" movies with Johnny Weissmuller and Maureen O'Sullivan. Safaris aboard glass-bottomed and jungle cruise boats whisk visitors within arm's length of "The Other Florida."


Outdoor enthusiasts enjoy adventures including boating and

fishing on area lakes, rivers, ponds and the Gulf — just 30 minutes away. Lakes Seminole, Jackson and Talquin are renowned in the bass fishing world for vielding the "big ones," and dense forests offer an abundance of prize-winning game. Local wildlife areas such as the Florida National Scenic Trail, St. Marks National Wildlife Refuge and Apalachicola National Forest are among many spots for camping, picnicking,



swimming, biking and exploring.

Appealing to the strokes of different folks,
Tallahassee also features
99 holes of golf on six courses and a proliferation of tennis centers. Sideline athletes cheer the nationally-ranked Florida State
Seminoles, Florida A&M
Rattlers and the
Tallahassee Tiger Sharks, of the East Coast Hockey



League. And always a sure bet are the nearby greyhound races.

A sport of sorts, shopping at two regional malls and many specialty centers offer many "playing options" — from popular chains to curiosity and antique shops.

Cultural interests are sparked by widely-acclaimed museums and galleries and elaborate entertainment at the 14,000-seat Tallahassee-Leon County Civic Center.

Tallahassee is a collaboration of power-play politics and classical character splashed with a twist of Southern beauty and charm. Tallahassee is Florida with a Southern accent.


TALLAHASSEE'S AN ALL-AMERICA CITY!

THIS IS FLORIDA STATE



■lorida State University, recently celebrating its golden anniversary as a coeducational graduate research institution in 1997, has joined the nation's elite in both academics and athletics.

Located on the oldest continuous site of higher education in Florida and building rapidly on the framework of a highly regarded liberal arts college for women, the University has emerged over the past 50 years as an institution of national and international esteem. Its stature is evidenced by a number of additions to its record of excellence in the 1990s:


- In 1994, Florida State was classified a "Research University I" by the Carnegie Foundation, placing it among the nation's top research universities.
- In 1994, the college referral service, "Who's Who Among American High School Students," placed FSU among its top 10 with such universities as Harvard, Duke, Stanford, North Carolina-Chapel Hill, Michigan-Ann Arbor and Yale — of most frequent choices of more than 100,000 of the nation's best and brightest high school students who asked that a specific college be notified of their recognition in "Who's Who."
- · Vice President of the United States Al Gore spoke at the dedication of the National High Magnetic Field Laboratory at Florida State in 1994. The National Science Foundation established the \$100 million magnet lab in 1990 at FSU, which is partnered in research with the Los Alamos National Laboratory and the University of Florida. A Nobel laureate in physics and a top Russian physicist were among the first scholars drawn to

the faculty. The world's largest magnet — two stories high and capable of generating 45 tesla or 1 million times the Earth's magnetic field — was installed in 1995 at the NHMFL, located in the off-campus research complex, Innovation Park. In 1996, the NSF renewed and increased by 50 percent the NHMFL's funding for another five years.

- FSU created the first multipurpose student identification/banking card. The Card Application Technology Center is a national leader in "smart card" systems.
- At the forefront of supercomputing since obtaining its first high-speed computer in 1985, FSU took yet another step in ultrafast and parallel computing in 1990 when it acquired two supercomputers, the Thinking Machine Corp. Connection Machine and the Cray Y-MP.
- In fall 1994, the first tenants moved into the east side of the \$100 million University Center, a classroom-and-office facility at Doak Campbell Stadium; the stadium's south end zone also was enclosed and the adjacent Moore Athletic Center expanded. With the completion of the west side in 1996, University Center now provides 550,000 square feet of much needed academic space and a centralized location for student services.
- In 1990, Florida State ranked second in popularity nationwide among high school seniors, based on the number of students who request that their Scholastic Aptitude Test (SAT) scores be sent to an institution. FSU was the only institution listed among the top 10 choices of both black and white collegebound students.
- FSU's high-tech program in structural biology in 1991 received the University's largest single foundation grant, \$4 million.
- Capping more than a decade of national prominence in intercollegiate athletics, Florida State's athletic teams, nicknamed "Seminoles," joined the

Atlantic Coast Conference as its ninth member in 1990. The FSU football team won the 1993 National Championship and its quarterback, Charlie Ward, won the University's first Heisman Trophy. The 1999 football team also won the National Championship going undefeated and wire-to-wire number one in the polls.

- The Dr. Bobby E. Leach Center, a state-of-the-art student recreation facility, with a pool, saunas, basketball and racquet-sport courts, was completed in 1991.
- FSU ranked 20th in the nation for 1990-91 in the number of black Ph.D. students it graduates. Over the






five years, 1986 to 1990, FSU ranked eighth nationally by granting doctorates to 70 African Americans. As this list of highlights attests, Florida State is excelling in the 1990s with exceptional strength, energy and vision for the future. Under the leadership of the University's 12th president, **Talbot "Sandy" D'Alemberte**, who took office in January 1994, FSU will continue to build on the foundation of its history of excellence in scholarship, research and service.

A senior member of the 10-member **State University System**, FSU was founded as an institution of higher learning in 1851 by legislative act and began in Tallahassee with its first students in 1857.

Today, FSU's operating budget is **\$474.3 million**. Faculty and administrators generate more than **\$102 million** annually in external funding to supplement state-sponsored research. Three direct-support organizations serve to bolster the University: **FSU Foundation**, which raises millions in private gifts to support academics, **Seminole Boosters** and **FSU Alumni Association**.

The main campus is spread over **451.6 acres in Tallahassee**; FSU, which has one of the smallest campuses in the SUS, has been actively acquiring land in the 1990s after years of being landlocked at 347 acres. FSU owns 1,281 acres in Leon, Bay, Franklin and Sarasota counties.

Within the state, the University maintains facilities at its **25-acre campus in Panama City**, its **Marine Laboratory** on the Gulf of Mexico, the Appleton Museum in Ocala and the Asolo Performing Arts Center in Sarasota. **The Center for Professional Development and Public Service**, housed in



the **Augustus B. Turnbull III Florida State Conference Center** on the edge of the campus, provides extensive credit and non-credit continuing education programs statewide.

Florida State offers **286 graduate and undergraduate degree programs** through its **eight colleges** — Arts and Sciences; Business; Communication; Education; Engineering (operated jointly with Florida A&M University, a historically black institution); Human Sciences; Law; and Social Sciences (which also incorporates the Reubin Askew School of Public Administration and Policy) — and **eight schools** — Criminology

and Criminal Justice; Information Studies; Motion Picture, Television and Recording Arts; Music; Nursing; Social Work; Theatre; and Visual Arts and Dance.

With 1,655 members, the FSU faculty has included nine National Academy of Sciences elected members, nine American Academy of Arts and Sciences fellows and five Nobel laureates. It is backed by 2,887 administrative/professional and support staff.

Library holdings at Florida State include 2.1 million book titles, 16,384 serials and 4.5


million micro-forms. The main library facility, the Robert M. Strozier Library, is linked by computer to other state university and national research libraries. The Paul A.M. Dirac Science Center Library is located at the heart of the University's science research complex. FSU also maintains extensive music, library science and law libraries.

Graduate students, who number more than 5,929, pursue advanced degrees in fields as diverse as business administration and theoretical particle physics. A majority of research done at FSU is the direct result of student effort, culminating in numerous books, monographs and journal articles relating to the whole spectrum of intellectual interests and the practical needs of society.


FSU, a residential campus, places a high priority on its **35,019 students** and their needs and interests (of the student population: 45 percent are male; 55 percent are female; 20.1 percent are minorities; and 2.5 percent are foreign students).

The University Honors Program, Disabled Student Services, International Student Center, Student Government, Flying High Circus and intramural sports are among more than 200 organizations and activities in which students may participate.

In all areas of its mission — excellence in teaching, research and public service — **Florida State University** is advancing boldly toward the 21st century.






NEW LOCKER ROOM

lorida State University's commitment to excellence continued this year as the FSU volleyball locker room along with Tully Gymnasium underwent major renovations. The project, started in March of 2000, is scheduled to be completed by the Noles' opening match against Southern Miss. on Sept. 1. The renovations of both the Seminoles' locker room and Tully Gymnasium will reach \$500,000 upon its completion.

With the remodeling comes exciting features for the Garnet and Gold. Tully's weight room was expanded 1,000 sq. ft., while the locker room itself grew from a mere 800 sq. ft. to almost 2,000. The new locker room will feature custom wood lockers, a large shower area and a high tech study area with study desks. The lounge area will also be furnished with several display cases as well as a wide screen television, VCR and stereo system.

"Our goal with these renovations is to give our student-athletes every opportunity to succeed in school and in their sport," Assistant Athletics Director for Facilities, Operations and Event Management Bernie Waxman says.





ACADEMIC SUPPORT

Academic, personal and professional support are essential to college success. At Florida State University, we have developed an outstanding support program which enables student-athletes to reach their full potential.

FSU's academic support philosophy is "to offer an academic support program integrated with the total university. This will assess all student-athletes with the transition into college and provide continued support in all phases of academic and professional development, culminating with graduation, job placement or graduate school."

To accomplish this goal, FSU has developed an academic environment which facilitates the academic success of student-athletes. Student success is encouraged through competent academic counseling, career exploration, planning and placement and academic assistance through tutorial programs and mentors.

The program operates on a "proactive" rather "reactive"

approach. At Florida State, the academic staff does not wait for an academic crisis to occur. They gather important background information and build an academic profile on all student-athletes to assess their needs in advance. Coaches also stay informed on the daily progress of each student athlete.

The academic support services are located in the state-of-the-art University Center and are on the sixth floor of the \$126 million facility. It includes private study desks, a tutorial study area and a computer lab outfitted with 16 new IBM computers and laser printers. In addition, athletic sky boxes are utilized for group and individual tutorial instruction.

FSU offers 16 Schools and Colleges with 99 undergraduate degrees and 75 post-baccalaureate degrees.

STRENGTH AND CONDITIONING

The Strong Shall Survive is the motto of the strength and conditioning staff at Florida State. It is also this philosophy that has made Seminole athletes in all sports among the strongest, fastest and most fit anywhere. At Florida State,

Amy White is in her sixth year with the FSU Athletic Academic Support Staff where she serves as the Academic Counselor for the volleyball, baseball, soccer and men's and women's golf teams.

White is responsible for coordinating support services for these student-athletes, monitoring their academic progress and counseling them on academic issues such as course and major selection, study

habits and eligibility requirements. She also assists in the recruiting process for these programs.

In addition to her counseling duties, White is the Academic Honors, Awards and Scholarship Coordinator, as well as the coordinator of the annual Golden Torch Gala, a black-tie event which recognizes the student-athletes for academic achievements. She also serves as the sports psychology consultant for all FSU student-athletes.

A native of Pensacola, Fla., White is a 1993 graduate of the University of West Florida where she earned a Bachelor's degree in psychology. She received a Master's degree in sports psychology from Florida State in 1995 and is currently a Ph.D. candidate in sports psychology.

Strength coach Janna Walkup, who is in her first year on the Florida State strength and conditioning staff, individually customizes programs for each of the athletes beginning with

pre-conditioning before the season gets underway. FSU takes pride in customizing the programs to help student-athletes reach their maximum potential.

Walkup, who was a member of the inaugural Seminole soccer team in 1996, was a four-year starter at defender for the Seminoles. A native of Orlando. Fla., Walkup earned a bachelor's



degree in nutrition and fitness from FSU in April of 1999 and a master's degree in sports administration this summer. A certified personal trainer, Walkup became a Certified Strength and Conditioning Specialist in June.

EVENTS MANAGER

A member of the Florida State athletic staff since 1990, Melissa Dawson begins her 10th season with FSU volleyball as the Assistant Director of Events Management. Some of Dawson's responsibilities include home event management and overseeing the equipment duties for the volleyball team.

A native of Hernando, Fla., Dawson attended Florida State earning her undergraduate degree in Physical Education in April of 1992 and her Master's in Athletic Administration in April of 1996.

WEIGHT ROOM

The Tully Gymnasium weight room took on a whole new look following a complete renovation in 1996 and additional improvements have been made to the facility every year since. The weight room went from 1,500 square feet to 3,500 square feet in size in 1996, fresh with a new stereo system, drop ceiling, lighting and mondo rubber flooring. Over \$140,000 worth of new exercise equipment was added to the Lady Seminole weight room, including 16 cardiovascular pieces such as Life Fitness, Stairmaster and Textrix. The facility was expanded to 4,500 square feet this past summer with a new squat rack and platform.

MEDICAL CARE AND TREATMENT

An athlete can expect to receive the best care and treatment possible with the athletic training staff at Florida State University. Prior to competition, all FSU student-athletes undergo screening in order to detect any potential injuries. If a problem is detected, the athlete may be placed on a prevention care system which may include any kind of treatment from icing to exercising. Graduate Assistant trainer Joshua Nichter will handle the athletic training duties for the Ladv Seminole volleyball team this season.

Nichter is in his third year with the FSU athletic training


staff. In his first two years with the program he worked with the Seminoles' football team in practice and game day operations. Nichter assisted with the 1999 Tostitos Fiesta Bowl, the 2000 Nokia Sugar Bowl as well as the 1999 NCAA Baseball Regional and Super Regional, hosted by Florida State. Nichter graduated with a degree in Exercise Science from the University of Nebraska-



Lincoln in 1998, where he assisted with football, wrestling and track and field as a student trainer. Nichter currently lives in Tallahassee with his wife Lisa.

Though the prevention of injuries is the main objective, some injuries are unavoidable. Rehabilitation is another facet of the Florida State training room. The FSU athletic training staff will work with the athlete and provide an intense rehabilitation schedule that will allow the athlete to successfully recover after an injury. Some injuries and illnesses may be referred to the Seminole team physicians at the Tallahassee Orthopedic Center, who, for many years, have worked in conjunction with the FSU athletic training staff in successfully rehabilitating athletes after an injury.

Drug testing is also the responsibility of the athletic training team. This program is dedicated to providing the best care possible for all FSU student-athletes.



Serving the community is the focus of our Seminole Spirit program. Student-athletes are challenged to give service to



LEADERSHIP DEVELOPMENT

The Florida State University Department of Athletics is committed to developing programs of excellence that foster leadership development. The foundation of the leadership development program are the Seminole Leadership Institutes that are held four times a year. These Institutes offer student-athletes the opportunity to learn skills that will benefit them as students, as athletes, and as they pursue their goals after leaving Florida State. The Institutes are based on building communication skills. Students have the opportunity to use the values and work ethic taught by athletic participation as the framework for their leadership development. The Institutes attract outstanding guest speakers who challenge Seminole studentathletes to achieve their greatest potential and use their leadership skills to positively influence others.

The Student-Athlete Advisory Council (SAAC) serves as the

advisory board to the NOLES program and the athletics administration. The prestigious board, comprised of two representatives of each athletic team at FSU, also recommends programming and serves as a liaison between studentathletes and the athletics administration. The Advisory Council plans and implements various events for student-athletes and serves as the department's most visible ambassadors. The SAAC hosts the annual Golden Nole banquet and

plans such events as orientation for incoming student-athletes and the back-to-school picnic.

NCAA INFORMATION

The following information is provided by the Florida State Office of Compliance for prospective student athletes. It is intended as a guideline to introduce some of the rules governing NCAA athletic involvement.

WHO IS PERMITTED TO RECRUIT FOR FSU?

Only Florida State University coaches who have successfully completed the NCAA Recruiting Rules Examination on an annual basis may be involved in the recruitment process. Representatives of our athletics interests **may not** make any recruiting contacts. This includes letters, telephone calls or face-to-face contact on or off campus with a prospect or the prospect's parents.

KEY TERMS YOU SHOULD KNOW

You become a **prospective student-athlete** if you have started classes for the ninth grade. Before the ninth grade, you become a prospective student-athlete if the college provides you (or your relatives or friends) any financial aid or other benefits that the college does not provide to prospective students generally.

A **contact** is any face-to-face encounter between a prospect or the prospect's legal guardian and an institutional staff member or athletic representative during which any dialogue occurs in excess of an exchange of greeting. NOTE: At the Division I level, athletic representatives (boosters) may not contact you for the purpose of recruiting. A college coach may contact you in person off the college campus beginning July 1 after completion of your junior year in high school.

An **evaluation** is any off-campus activity designed to access your academic qualifications or athletic ability, including any visit to your high school (during which no contact occurs) or the observation of any practice or competition in which you participate.

During your senior year, you can have one expense-paid **official visit** to a particular campus. You may receive no more than five visits. During your official visit, which may not exceed 48 hours, you may receive round-trip transportation between your home and the campus, and you (and your parents) may receive meals, lodging and complimentary admission to campus athletics events.

PHONE CALLS AND LETTERS

Phone calls from faculty members and coaches (but not boosters) are permitted beginning July 1 after completion of your junior year. A college coach or faculty member is limited to **one telephone call per week** except when it is:

- During the five days immediately before your official visit to the university
- On the day of a coach's off-campus contact with you
- During the time beginning with the initial National Letter of Intent signing date in your sport through the two days after signing date

Letters from coaches and faculty members (but not boosters) are not permitted until September 1 at the beginning of your junior year in high school. A Division I university may provide you with the following printed materials:

- General correspondence, including letters, U.S. Postal Service postcards and institutional note cards
- Game programs which may not include posters and one Student Athlete Handbook can be provided only during official or unofficial visits to the university's campus
- · NCAA educational information

- Pre-enrollment information subsequent to signing a National Letter of Intent with the university
- One athletic publication which may include only one color of printing inside the covers
- Official academic, admissions and student services publications published or videotapes produced by the institution and available to all students
- · Schedule cards
- · Questionnaires which may be provided prior to your junior year
- Summer camp brochures which may be provided prior to your junior year.

ALUMNI AND BOOSTERS DO'S AND DON'TS

You may forward information about prospective student-athletes to the appropriate coaches.

You may have contact with a prospect regarding permissible pre-enrollment activities such as summer employment, provided the prospect has already signed a National Letter of Intent and the Compliance Office is aware that you are making these contacts in regard to employment.

You may have a telephone conversation with a prospect only if the prospect initiates the call. Such a call may not be prearranged by an institutional staff member and you are not permitted to have a recruiting conversa-

tion, but may exhibit normal civility. You must refer any questions about our athletics programs to an athletics department staff member/coach.

You may view a prospect's contest at your own initiative provided you do not contact the prospect or his/her parents. In addition, you may not contact a prospect's coach, principal, or counselor in an attempt to evaluate the prospect.

You may continue established family relationships with friends and neighbors. Contacts with sons and daughters of these families are permitted as long as they are not made for recruiting purposes or encouraged by Florida State University coaches.

You may not become involved in making arrangements to receive money or financial aid of any kind for a prospect or the prospect's family and friends.

You may not make contact with a prospective student-athlete and his/her parents when the prospect is on campus for an official or unofficial recruiting visit.


You may not transport, pay or arrange for payment of transportation costs for a prospect, and his/her relatives or friends to visit campus (or elsewhere).

You may not pay or arrange for payment of summer camp registration fees for a prospect.

You may not provide **anything** to a prospect, the prospect's family or friends without prior approval from the athletics' Compliance Office.

over the years. Overall, Tully Gym has been good to the Lady Seminoles as they have accumulated a 240-84 record on its home court for a winning percentage of .741 in the past 24 years in the facility.

The facility, which was constructed in 1956, was named for the late Robert Henry (Bobby) Tully, a 1952 FSU graduate who played football. Active on campus, Tully was a member of the Gold Key, ODK, the Arnold Air Society and Alpha Tau Omega fraternity. He died in May 1954 after battling a long illness.

The 2,500 capacity gymnasium has undergone several renovations in recent years. Just prior to the 1999 season, the playing floor was resurfaced and repainted and new lighting was added. The facility features new arena-style padded seating with armrests which were installed to create a movie theater experience while watching the Lady Seminoles.

In addition to the always exciting Atlantic Coast Conference schedule, the 2000 Florida State home schedule is highlighted by two tournaments. The Florida State Tourney, a five-team tournament featuring FSU, Southern Miss, Florida Atlantic, Charleston Southern and Illinois, kicks off the season. Samford, Notre Dame and Florida A&M visit Tully Gym for the Lady Seminole Classic in mid-September. SEC-foes Alabama and Florida will make a trip to Tallahassee, while state rivals Jacksonville and Central Florida are also a part of this year's home slate.



HALL OF FAME

he Florida State Athletics Hall of Fame enjoys a rich tradition as its first and largest class (15) was inducted in 1977. At least six individuals have been selected each year since, with the exception of 1996 when no class was inducted as Florida State celebrated its 50th Year Anniversary of Athletics. There are a total of 183 members in the Florida State Athletics Hall of Fame with the 2000 class to be inducted on September 16th.

Named team MVP the last three years of her college



career, **Margie Wessel** led the Lady Seminole volleyball team to a 127-60 record during her four years at Florida State. Twice during her career, the Lady Seminoles advanced to the AIAW National Tournament. The Miami native was co-captain of the Florida State squad as a senior and was named to the AIAW Region III all-star team in 1979 and 1980.

A Lady Seminole from 1987-90,

Gabrielle Reece quickly established herself as a force on the volleyball court. She holds the FSU career and single-season records for solo blocks (240 and 69) as well as the career record for total blocks (747). She garnered AVCA

All-Region honors in 1989 and was a Metro All-Conference selection in 1989 and 1990. As a junior, Reece was named to the Metro All Tournament Team after helping to lead Florida State to the Metro Conference Championship. Reece did not go unnoticed nationally either. She was pegged the 1989 Dodge National Athletic Awards Most Inspiring Collegiate Athlete and was

among Rolling Stone Magazine's Wonder Women of Sport that same year. Reece went on to play professional volleyball as the captain of Team Nike for the Bud Light four-woman beach volleyball tour. In addition to her playing career, Reece is also a supermodel and television celebrity. She recently added "author" to her resumé, when she co-authored her first book, "Big Girl in the Middle," which was released in the summer of 1997. She is currently training in "gravity golf." As head coach of the Lady Seminole volleyball (1970, 1972-75) and softball (1971, 1972-74) programs,

Dr. Billie Jones played a major role in paving the way for the success of women's athletics at Florida State University. Dr. Jones earned her Ph.D. from Florida State in 1972 and began serving as an Associate Professor in the Department of Movement Science and Physical Education in addition to her coaching duties. Under Dr. Jones' direction, the volleyball program compiled a remarkable 107-22 record and

made appearances at the AIAW National Championship Tournament in 1973, 1974 and 1975 while competing for state and regional championships along the way. Dr. Jones also coached the 1971 softball team to the state championship and the 1974 squad to a runner-up finish. Dr. Jones devoted her time to teaching full-time in 1975, but continued to be instrumental in the advancement of women's athletics at Florida State. She was recognized for service and dedication to FSU's women's athletics when she was given the Herb Morgan Award in 1982. In 1985, Dr. Jones became a Service Professor in the Department of Movement Science and Physical Education and in 1989, she was honored with the distinction of Professor Emerita. Among her many accomplishments, Dr. Jones has also co-authored four books on coaching and fitness. A scholarship by an anonymous donor, given in the name of Dr. Jones, is awarded annually in the College of Education to a female student who intends to coach.

A member of the Florida State volley-ball team from 1987-90, **Maggie Philgence** made a name for herself not only at FSU, but at the conference and national levels as well. Philgence broke six school records during her senior season, three of which still stand, and earned All-Metro Conference and AVCA All-South Region team honors. A powerful hitter, she still ranks among FSU's Top 10 in 14 statistical

categories and remains the FSU leader in career kills (2,110) and kill attempts (4,793) as well as single-season kills with 579 in 1990. Upon graduation, Philgence was drafted to the South Team for the Olympic Festival in Los Angeles and helped lead her team to a gold medal. She went on to play professionally with the international league in France.

A SPECIAL GIFT



ucy McDaniel never imagined that she would become the first woman in the State of Florida to donate more than \$1 million to women's athletics. McDaniel is among a growing band of pioneer philanthropists across the country who have realized the importance, if not necessity, of private support of women's intercollegiate athletics.

But pioneering is nothing new to the FSU graduate, who attended college before women competed intercollegiately. When she arrived at FSU in 1955 she was a national qualifier in swimming and gymnastics. FSU swim coach Bim Stults welcomed her to work out with the men's team and FSU's national championship gymnasts also invited her to train with them in Tully Gym, but she was denied that opportunity because the administration did not feel it appropriate for her to swim or work out with the men. So, McDaniel settled for synchronized swimming with the Tarpons, which is a combination of the two sports.

Following graduation, she coached at Palm Beach High and started a gymnastics program at Miami Senior while running over 100 summer clinics across the United States. After serving ten years at Stetson University, she joined the staff at Florida Technology University, before it became University of Central Florida. She taught and started the school's first intercollegiate teams in softball and volleyball where she rang up a perfect 55-0 record – believed to be an NCAA record — to win the Division II national title.

"I had watched man after man, couple after couple, donating a million or two million to Florida State but there was never, ever, one woman to come forward with a major gift to women's athletics," said McDaniel. "The Committee of Thirty is educating women and men that women's scholarships, equipment and travel cost the same as men's, and that our women athletes need the same private help. I felt strongly that if one woman stepped forward, surely others would follow, but I didn't think it would be me."

"I am starting my twenty-fifth year in college athletics and I have never heard of one individual making that large of a gift to one individual women's sport," head coach Cecile Reynaud said. "It has to be one of the first gifts like it in the country and hopefully, the beginning of many more gifts like it to women's teams. The time is right for women that have been fortunate to make those kind of gifts, and when they do, you will see women's programs make a big jump."

McDaniel first gave \$100,000 to endow a volleyball scholarship at Florida State and later designated another \$50,000 so the team could play a European tour this past May. McDaniel wanted to do

more, so she asked her accountant to run through her financial statements to see what she would be able to gift now and later in her will. When the accountant told her, she called Seminole Booster Planned Giving Director Joel Padgett to start the process.

The snag came when Padgett mentioned publicizing what is the largest gift in FSU women's athletics history by a woman. McDaniel, who has kept her wealth private, was uncomfortable with publicity or the idea that the volleyball court inside Tully Gym would be named "The McDaniel Arena".

A portion of McDaniel's \$1 million-plus gift is a will gift. "There will be no fighting over my will now, because I have taken care of everything," McDaniel said. "I have taken care of my five nieces and nephews, and friends, and the rest will go to FSU."

McDaniel had kept her wealth and her plans to give to FSU a secret from her family and friends, so they were surprised to read about her gift in the Daytona Beach paper. By the time the story ran, McDaniel was on a plane bound for Germany and the volleyball team who had left a few days before.

The former volleyball coach spent fourteen days with the women, observing practices, matches, shopping and sightseeing in three different countries. "I had more fun with them than I would have if I went with a bunch of my friends," McDaniel said. "They are in high gear or dead stop. Playing matches, shopping, on walking tours and then dead asleep on the bus in between. It was a wonderful time and I don't think anyone ever got as much for \$50,000 as I did."

McDaniel has a lifetime of memories of the tour. "When the kids knew that I was taking them, I got darling thank-you notes and when I got home I'd received seven or eight thank-you notes from the parents, which I was not expecting," she said. "I made myself a scrapbook of all the letters."

"I'm truly grateful to Lucy for feeling that strongly about our program and I know when we announced it to our student athletes, they just don't get how much money that is and how historic of a gift it is to women's athletics," Reynaud said. "When she first told me she was going to do it, I was typing on my computer and I caught myself saying, ok, put your work down and listen to this. Listen to this because this is a historical conversation you are having. Nationally, people are going to be very impressed. Hopefully, we can recognize her at national conventions for her leadership and generosity."


FAMOUS ALUMNI



York. She also co-authored her first book entitled Big Girl in the Middle in 1997.



Despite her hectic work and travel schedule, Reece is devoted to helping Florida State athletics. Reece returned to




After breaking six school records during the 1990 season, Philgence was drafted to the South Team for the Olympic Festival in Los Angeles. Philgence helped

LADY SEMINOLES ENJOY EDUCATIONAL TRIP TO EUROPE

fter a year of hard work, both in the classroom and on the court, what would you want to do to get away from it all? Many students would think a trip to Europe would be the best way to unwind. Thanks to Lucy McDaniel, who became the first woman to donate \$1 million to a women's athletic program, the Florida State volleyball team was able to tour Germany, the Czech Republic and Denmark battling veteran European teams.

"We, as coaches, learned a little bit more about our team competing against high level competition," said head coach Cecile Reynaud. She noted the student-athletes learned far more about themselves, their teammates and a culture they had only read about in books.

"They played eight matches and got better in every one," McDaniel said. "They played against national teams with former Olympians, whose average age was 26, and then shop until they dropped in between matches.

"Plus, we'd take walking tours of the country between matches. These teams have been playing for 12 or more years, so I don't think they will ever play anyone in their conference as good as those teams."

The benefits extended far off the court, said Pam Overton, the Director of Florida State's Student Development Program. "They gained more than just good competition, they gained a cultural experience by seeing as many countries as they did," said Overton, who traveled with the group.

"These girls had the opportunity not only to see the world,

but to see how far the dollar would go; they learned about money. They learned about food."

The women also had a chance to be ambassadors for Florida State. At the beginning of each match they would exchange gifts with the teams they played.

"Cecile had beautiful t-shirts drawn up for them to exchange and then everybody wanted the golden tomahawk pins we brought," McDaniel said.



"We saw people in every country we toured wearing Florida State shirts. We'd say 'Go 'Noles' and stop and talk."

Aside from what the women learned from the cultural point of view, they also learned a lot about each other on the arduous trip.

"An experience like this brings people closer together; there is a very mental side to athletics," said Overton. "Teams who play together win championships. People who understand each other, and appreciate and respect each other off the court, win championships. When you spend 16 days togeth-



er, not under ideal conditions, not under the same kind of conveniences you might have in other places, you learn together."

Reynaud added the trip is going to help the team for the next few years because of the 10 players who went on the trip, only one is a senior, with seven freshmen.

"Many universities do not have the money to pay for a European trip, but Lucy made it possible for these girls to go," Overton said. "It was an absolute godsend for these girls because without Lucy McDaniel's contribution, it would have been very difficult for the department to have managed."

EUROPEAN EXPERIENCE WILL LAST

Imagine a fairy-tale city surrounded by an enchanting wall...majestic castles that have stood throughout centuries...a biking tour through miles and miles of mountainside foliage. The FSU women's volleyball team was able to see all this and more, thanks to Lucy McDaniel, the generous Seminole booster who sponsored our trip to Europe and shared the fun with us in May.

This marvelous journey provided a learning experience that isn't available in a classroom, books, or even a gym. We spent two and a half weeks traveling by boat, by bus, and by foot through cities and beautiful countryside in a land completely foreign to us. We picked up bits of different languages and learned to say "thank you" in German, Czech, and Danish: danke sch'n, dlkuji vam, and takke. We tried exotic foods, from German sausages

We relived the days of Mozart and saw where he once performed in Prague. We visited Dachau and envisioned the rise of Hitler and the holocaust. We sat in the Olympic

Stadium of 1974 and took pictures of each other by the remains of the Berlin Wall. Seeing such places made history become a reality for all of us.

Along with the opportunity to have our eyes opened to a new world, we had the chance to play against European national volleyball teams. Our game was taken to a new level as we adjusted to international rules, facing teams that play the same game, but play it differently. And we discovered that we could go anywhere together and win, even in a completely different country.

This trip was a once-in-a-lifetime experience that not only brought the team together, but also opened doors for everyone. Through our travels we gained knowledge that goes beyond the volleyball court and into real life. Our European experiences and our memories will stay with us forever.





THIS IS THE ACC

THE TRADITION

Consistency. It's the mark of true excellence in any endeavor. However, in today's intercollegiate athletics, competition has become so balanced and so competitive that it is virtually impossible to maintain a high level of consistency.

Yet the Atlantic Coast Conference has defied the odds. Now in its 48th year of competition, the ACC has long enjoyed the reputation as one of the strongest and most competitive intercollegiate conferences in the nation. And that is not mere conjecture, the numbers support it.

Since the league's inception in 1953, ACC schools have captured 79 national champion-ships, including 39 in men's competition and 40 in women's. In addition, 119 men and 29 women have earned the coveted title of NCAA champion.

1999-2000 IN REVIEW

The 1999-2000 academic year concluded with the league pocketing four more national team titles and five individual NCAA crowns. In all, the ACC has won 36 national team titles the last 10 years.

The ACC's 1999-2000 national champions were Maryland in field hockey and women's lacrosse, North Carolina in women's soccer and Florida State in football. Overall, ACC teams posted a 62-46 (.574) mark in NCAA Tournament play.

The ACC placed at least one team in the Top 10 nationally in 19 of the 25 sports sponsored by the league. Other records of note during the 1999-2000 season include 90 teams competing at NCAA Championships, five bowl teams and 34 Top 10 showings.

Fourteen ACC teams, in ten different sports, representing seven of the nine member institutions, earned a No. 1 ranking during the course of the past academic year.

The ACC Academic Honor Roll record was broken for the 13th-straight year in 1999-2000 as 1,631 student-athletes were recognized for their work in the classroom.

THE CHAMPIONSHIPS

The conference will conduct championship competition in 25 sports during the 2000-01 academic year — 12 for

men and 13 for women.

The first ACC championship was held in swimming on February 25, 1954 at NC State. The conference did not conduct championships in cross country, wrestling or tennis during the first year.

The 12 sports for men include football, cross country, soccer, basketball, swimming, indoor and outdoor track, wrestling, baseball, tennis, golf and lacrosse. Fencing, which was started in 1971, was discontinued in 1981.

Women's sports were initiated in 1977 with the first championship meet being held in tennis at Wake Forest University. Championships for women are currently conducted in cross country, volleyball, field hockey, soccer, basketball, swimming, indoor and outdoor track, tennis, golf, lacrosse, softball and rowing.

A HISTORY

PCT

The Atlantic Coast Conference was founded on May 8, 1953, at the Sedgefield Inn near Greensboro, N.C., with seven

charter members — Clemson, Duke, Maryland, North Carolina, North Carolina State, South Carolina and Wake Forest — drawing up the conference by-laws.

The withdrawal of seven schools from the Southern Conference came early on the morning of May 8, 1953, during the Southern Conference's annual spring meeting. On June 14, 1953, the seven members met in Raleigh, N.C., where a set of bylaws was adopted and the name became officially the Atlantic Coast Conference.

On December 4, 1953, conference officials met again at Sedgefield and officially admitted the University of Virginia. The first, and only, withdrawal of a school from the ACC came on June 30, 1971 when the University of South Carolina tendered its resignation.

The ACC operated with seven members until April 3, 1978, when Georgia Tech was admitted. The Atlanta school withdrew from the Southeastern Conference in January of 1964.

The ACC expanded to nine members on July 1, 1991, with the addition of Florida State.



aving lost four starters and with seven newcomers, Florida State Head Coach Dr. Cecile Reynaud counted on a year of rebuilding. What she didn't count on was having to do it with different lineups nearly every time the Lady Seminoles stepped onto the floor. Injuries to several key players throughout the season hampered FSU's ability to have a consistent rotation on the court which led to a difficult season for the Tribe.

The season-opener vs. Auburn was, at that time, a preview of what most thought would be Florida State's season: a young, but competitive group of players who had the ingredients to develop into a solid team.

With a team-high 19 kills, senior Aisha Thornton provided leadership for the young team that pulled out a hard-fought 3-2 victory over the Tigers. Four freshman started for FSU and each of them contributed to the victory.

Early on in the season, the Tribe's youth proved to be a factor. Florida State went 5-5 before entering Atlantic Coast Conference play. As conference play started, so did the Lady Seminole injuries. To start things off, FSU traveled to Duke without junior outside hitter Jennifer Werrick and freshman middle hitter Dawn Hough in the lineup. Without two key starters, the Lady Seminoles struggled against the Blue Devils. In fact, FSU struggled the entire ACC season, winning just one league match. Starting outside hitter Kristin Frye was lost for the season on October 3rd and played in just 14 matches. Hough missed five early matches with right knee swelling, Thornton missed five matches with various ailments while Werrick played in 23 matches, but fractured her ankle late in the season and missed the last five regular-season matches. Florida State's one ACC victory was at home



against NC State. The fourgame win was truly a team-effort. Four players tallied double-digit kills, led by Thornton and Werrick's 14. The Lady Seminoles outblocked the Wolfpack 14-7 and shut them out in the final set. Senior Kensy Zulueta served the first two points and after a sideout, it was freshman Elizabeth Pound who served 13straight points for the 15-0 win.


Several players gained valuable experience in this season of change. Jamie Hibbard emerged as the starting setter and ended

the season ranked first on the team with 1,125 assists and 253 digs and third on the team with 18 service aces. Erica Bunch played in all but one match and was a constant in the starting lineup. She was second on the team with 20 service aces and had double-digit kills in 11 matches. Alex Sevillano was valuable as both an outside hitter and defensive specialist and played in 27 matches. Hough battled injuries



but was dominating at the net when in the lineup. Prior to her injury, Frye had established herself as a keeper in the starting lineup. Luana Azevedo had her first career double-double with 15 kills and 15 digs in the start at Duke. She saw action in 26 matches. Pound replaced Frye in the lineup and played in 21 matches at outside hitter, Norisha Campbell, who joined the team late after competing in the USA Junior Nationals, was second on the team in blocking with 83 and third in hitting (.208) and kills (298). She tallied double-digit kills in 16 matches, including a career-high 20 vs. Virginia. Jennifer Werrick played in 25 matches before going out with the ankle injury. She still ranked second on the team in kills (311) and digs (224). A co-captain, she recorded nine double-doubles and 18 matches of double-digit kills. Kensy Zulueta played mostly back row for FSU this season, but did see some action at setter in her 28 matches. With 1,207 career assists, she finished her career ranked ninth all-time among FSU setters. Team co-captain Courtney Dipert played in all 31 matches and led the team with 29 service aces. She recorded a career-high 15 digs and had double digit digs in three other matches. Aisha Thornton was a dominant

force for FSU, as she had been throughout her career. She ranked first on the team and second in the ACC in hitting throughout the season and was also the team leader with 99 blocks. The senior middle hitter had double-digit kills in 15 matches and recorded a .600 hitting performance late in the season vs. Florida. She concluded her career ranked second all-time at FSU in hitting percentage and among the all-time Top 10 in blocks and kills.




















FSU VOLLEYBALL HISTORY

ince its beginning in 1968 with a group of physical education students and a volunteer coach, Florida State volleyball, which is considered FSU's first women's intercollegiate sport, has shed its club team roots to become one of the nation's premiere programs.

In its infancy it was not uncommon for the group of aspiring athletes and teachers to pay their own way to tournaments and share warm-up suits with the other women's club teams. The club struggled to become established in those early years as team members were faced with having to find a new volunteer head coach each of the program's first five years.

After Florida State made its first ever appearance at the AIAW National Tournament in 1971, Dr. Billie Jones assumed the coaching duties on a permanent basis for the next six seasons. Under Jones' direction the Seminoles amassed a 107-22 record, and volleyball at Florida State became a mainstay.

Success continued for the program as it returned to the AIAW National Tournament in 1973, '74 and '75, while competing for state and regional championships along the way. Popularity for the sport began to grow. In just a few short years, Florida State volleyball became recognized as one of the sport's up-and-coming programs.

Current head coach Cecile Reynaud continued to build on the foundation laid by her predecessors. Under Reynaud's guidance, FSU qualified for the AIAW National Tournament three more times. After its AIAW appearance in 1981, Florida State joined the NCAA and began competing as a member of the Metro Conference in 1982.

Before FSU joined the Atlantic Coast Conference in 1992, the Lady Seminoles dominated the Metro Conference, capturing six league titles. Florida State seized its first ACC Championship in 1998. Overall, in nine years of ACC play, the Lady Seminoles have an ACC regular season co-championship to their credit and have played in three ACC Tournament title matches.


Perhaps the most famous of the FSU volleyball alumni is

RULES OF THE GAME






TERMS

LINE SHOT: A ball spiked along an opponent's sideline, closest to the hitter and outside the block.

ROOF: To block a spike, usually straight down for a point.

PANCAKE: A one-hand floor defensive technique where the hand is extended and slid along the floor palm down while the player dives or extension rolls, so that the ball bounces off the back of the hand.

POWER ALLEY: A cross-court hit traveling away from the spiker to the farthest point of the court.



OFFICIAL SIGNALS

5 ome of the signals of the officials are fairly obvious: index finger raised to indicate a point scored; arm extended to show "side out," or change service.

Other signals indicate how various rule infractions that cause either side out or a point to be scored by the serving team. Here are the signals for the most common infractions:



Raising Palm Up: Held, thrown, lifted or carried ball; ball held up against the net. Contact must be very brief. The ball must be struck in such a way that there is no more than momentary contact with any one part of the body.



Raising Two Fingers: Double Hit. A player commits a violation when the ball makes two successive contacts with any part of the body — unless the first of those contacts was either a legal block or the attempt to make the first team hit of a ball coming from the opponents.



Three Fingers: Ball contacted more than three times in returning the ball to the opponent's area. A legal block does not count as one of the three allowed hits. However, a ball touching the ceiling on the defending team's side of the net counts as one of the three allowed hits.



Brushing Hand Over Fingertips: Ball was touched before landing out of bounds. Also used to signal that ball was touched in attempted block and may be hit three more times without penalty.



Illegal Attacker: Back row player hits ball to opposing side from within the attack area (in front of three-meter attack line) and from above the height of the net. Also illegal attack of serve: hitting the ball before it has clearly passed the plane of the net.



Sweeping Motion Under Net: Touching the floor across the center line with a part of the body other than the feet. A foot or feet may cross if some part of the encroaching foot or feet remains on or above the line.



Line Foul: The server was in contact with the end line or the court at the instant she contacted the ball.



Wrong Server Or Player Out Of Position: When the ball is contacted for the serve, placement of players must conform to the service order on the score sheet. in both front- and back-row, outside players must be closer to their respective sidelines than the center player. No back-row player may be as near to the net as the corresponding front-row player.



Moving Palm Over The Top Of The Net: Player reached over net in a way not permitted by the rules. Other than in blocking, players may not make initial contact with the ball on the opponents side of the net. However, after contacting the ball in an attack hit, a player may follow through over the net, providing she doesn't touch the net. Touching the net is never permissible and is signaled by the official's touching the net on the side of the offender.


