THIS IS FSU VOLLEYBALL - THE NOLES WILL"RISE ABOVE" IN 2015

The ninth-ranked Florida State indoor volleyball team begins its 2015 season on Aug. 28 against Oklahoma. But before the Seminoles take the floor in what hopes to be another historical quest, the Seniors sat down to talk about this season's slogan...#RiseAbove It was senior defensive specialist Laura Dadowski who came up with the idea to #RiseAbove

Laura Dadowski on what she was thinking when she thought of the idea:

"We were experiencing a lot of different challenges this spring and we just wanted to put all of those behind us and rise above them. Also, when we do rise above we take it as being the best team we can be by overcoming any obstacles or conquering any problems we may face together."

Once she came up with the idea, the rest of the class agreed it was a perfect fit.

Outside hitter Nicole Walch on why it felt like it was a great slogan:

"We face a lot of adversity since we're all ranging from 18-22 years old and being in that collegiate experience and we have the new players to gel with on and off the court. Being able to rise above everything that has happened and just leave everything out there.

On how the team is taking to the #RiseAbove standards:

Walch - "There are a little different circumstances this fall compared to last year but I think what we're going through now is going to shape us for the year."

Middle blocker Mercedes Vaughn: "We've done well so far this season. There is constant competition in practice and anyone on the team could easily come into a match and compete."

On how the theme will help them through the tough schedule:

Walch - "Starting off strong is key. The teams we face outside of the ACC are very tough and that prepares us for what we're going to see in the postseason. Which helps because if you play an easy schedule and you make the post season and see a tough team, you're going to go down in three sets. It just helps you know what you're going to see and we work hard all year in order to get there."

On what their goals are as seniors:

Outside hitter Karlie Hauer - "No regrets and leave it out on the court. Every practice, match, set, just leave it out there. It doesn't matter what I'm doing - every touch matters and step up when I'm needed and help the younger girls that are coming in to make sure they feel comfortable and help them with what they can expect for the next three or four years and hopefully they carry on the FSU legacy when we're gone."

Defensive specialist Caroline Dadowski - "I just want to take advantage of every experience. It's going to be my last time doing everything here at FSU and I want to make it special and have fun."

Walch - "Finishing off strong and a National Title and an ACC Championship would obviously make our season the best. I think playing every match like it's my last is key. That's my goal."

L.Dadowski- "I agree with everything that was just said. For me, just to make the most out of everything, every practice, knowing that this is my last year and last chance to have those opportunities and doing whatever I can to help the team in any way possible. I just want to make the most of everything and try and finish strong."

Vaughn - "This being my last season my goal is to cut down on my errors and to be a constant energy source for the team."

UMBERS



Despite the nine wins that were produced in the month of November to close out the 2013 season, FSU fell just shy of its fifth ACC title after posting a 17-3 record in conference. Following the 3-0 sweep of Georgia Tech on Nov. 29, the Seminoles huddled around a computer (with captain Katie Mosher pushing the refresh button) awaiting the result of the Duke vs. North Carolina match. Needing the Tar Heels to pull out the win, the Blue Devils were able to come back after fending off several match points in the fourth set to claim a 3-2 win and the ACC title. This season, the Seminoles will be eyeing their fifth ACC title. In 2014, the Seminoles started off hot with a 24-0 streak, but a trip to Tobacco Road put the Seminoles behind the 8-ball for the ACC title with losses to North Carolina and Duke within 24 hours. Once again, the Seminoles had to wait out their fate, however the Tar Heels defeated the Blue Devils, 3-2 in Chapel Hill, taking the title.

The Seminoles have won 38-straight ACC matches in Tully Gym. Ever since the 3-2 loss to Miami on Nov. 26, 2010, FSU has been unbeatable on their home floor. They will look to defend that streak in 2014.

With one of the toughest schedules in the country, the Seminoles put together 24 straight wins before dropping their first match to Duke in November in 2014. The 24-0 start was a school record.



After setting a school record for appearing in five-consecutive NCAA Tournaments, the Seminoles will look to extend that streak to seven in the 2015 season. The record breaks the streak of four that was set back during the 1987-90 squads that were led by Metro Conference legends Gabrielle Reece and Maggie Philgence.



Straight AVCA polls, climbing to a school record of No. 3 before finishing the season at No. 10 in 2014.



Nicole Walch will start her senior season with just over **1,000 career kills.** Walch will look to climb up the record books. She needs 264 more kills to break into the top 10 in the FSU record book. Her 487 kills and average of 3.99 per set in 2014 was the eighth best season performances in Florida State history.

Wins over ranked opponents. The Seminoles followed up the record-setting year in 2013 of 6 with five wins over ranked teams in 2014. FSU first defeated No. 8 Nebraska, No. 11 Florida, No. 12 North Carolina and No. 21 Texas A&M twice.



The number of block assists that Sarah Burrington needs in order to crack the FSU top 10. With two seasons left, Burrington could be on pace to take over as the alltime blocks leader. She currently has 298 total block assists. All together, Burrington has 327 blocks after two seasons, and needs 66 more blocks to made the career top 10 list.



Florida State will play 13 matches in 2015 against teams that made the 2014 NCAA Tournament.

Coach Poole's career wins. Poole ranks 10th among the active NCAA Division I coaches, however he could move up in the ranks. Bob Bertucci of Lehigh has 738 while just in front of him is Matt Peck from Middle Tennessee State with 743. Lehigh produced 22 wins in 2014 while MTSU had nine. Just behind Coach Poole is North Carolina's Joe Sagula with 731.







on the same night - The BVHS Senior Recognition Award







Carol Forsten (1981-84) • Australian National Team

Somerton Park, Australia native Carol Forsten was a fantastic outside hitter for the Seminoles in the early 1980s. The four-year letterwinner participated with the Australian National Team in the World Cup Competition in 1982, two years following her prestigious position as a captain for the Australian National High School all-star team in the 1979-80 year. Forsten, who also toured Latin America in 1981 and Japan in 1982 with Athletes-In-Action, was an academic all-district selection and an AVCA All-Region performer at Florida State in 1984. She finished her four-year career with 145 matches played.



Karyn Palgut (1982-86) • 1982 Olympic Festival


A three-sport athlete at Florida State, Palgut lettered in volleyball (four), basketball (one) and softball (two) from 1982-86. After a successful collegiate career at outside hitter that saw her named to the All-Metro Tournament team three times, including the distinction of MVP, Palgut competed in the 1982 Olympic Festival on the East team. Upon graduation, Palgut joined the U.S. Women's National Team for Handball and had a successful career. She participated in the Goodwill games, the Pan American Games (Gold Medal) and the 1988 and 1992 Summer Olympics receiving seventh and sixth place respectively. One of Palgut's best volleyball attributes at Florida State was her service game, recording 132 aces in her career.



Maggie Philgence (1987-90) • 1991 Olympic Festival

Hailing from the Virgin Islands, outside hitter Maggie Philgence became one of the most well-established Seminoles in program history. After her successful four-year career, Philgence was drafted to the South Team for the Olympic Festival in Los Angeles in 1991 where she helped lead her squad over the West to claim the gold medal. Philgence played her professional career with the international league in France and the Virgin Islands, and was inducted to the Florida State Athletics Hall of Fame in 1998. Philgence was a four-time all-region player, a three-time Metro All-Conference player and is Florida State's all-time leader in kills with 2,110. She has a hand in virtually every Top 10 category at Florida State.






Gabrielle Reece (1987-90) · Women's Beach League

Arguably Florida State's most well-known volleyball alumna, former middle hitter Gabrielle Reece is more than just one of the world's most famous models. From 1987-90, Reece terrorized oncoming attackers as she racked up 747 total blocks, including 240 solo. She was a two-time Metro All-Conference player and an AVCA All-Region performer who also enjoyed an exceptional career on the pro tour. In the Women's Beach Volleyball League, Reece was a two-time offensive player of the year (1994-95), the league's leader in kills for four straight years (1993-96) and the league's leader in blocks (1993). Reece also helped her team take first place in the first Beach Volleyball World Championships and participated in the FIVB Beach Volleyball World Tour. The California native started earning her acclaim for modeling while attending Florida State, being named as one of the five most beautiful women in the world by Elle in 1989 and receiving the "Most Inspiring Collegiate Athlete" honor at the 1989 Dodge National Athletic Awards.




Franci Rard (1993) · AVP Tour

Outside hitter Franci Rard of Naples, Fla. spent one season at Florida State in 1993. Following her lone year, which included helping lead the Seminoles to their first-ever NCAA Tournament win over DePaul, Rard made a living on the AVP tour playing beach volleyball. Rard enjoyed plenty of success in the sand, but was known for battling back from fusion surgery for degenerative discs in 2000 as the procedure set her back nearly 2 ½ years before she could play competitively again. Rard was named to the All-ACC Tournament Team as well as the ACC Academic Honor Roll in 1993.



Norisha Campbell (1998) • USA Volleyball

A fine middle-hitter from Universal City, Texas, Norisha Campbell twice was an AVCA All-Region player as well as a two-time All-ACC performer in 2000 and 2001. Prior to her sophomore campaign, Campbell participated with the 1999 USA Junior National Volleyball Team that competed at the Junior World Championships in Saskatoon and Edmonton, Canada. In the tournament, she led the USA squad in hitting in its final match vs. the Czech Republic with 11 kills and four blocks. Campbell's career at Florida State was highlighted by her 1,289 kills and .320 hitting percentage. Aside from her experience with the junior national team, Campbell was selected to the 2001 USA National A2 Training program and then became the first Seminole ever to participate with the USA National Team in 2007. Campbell has also played professionally in Switzerland and Germany.



Alex Sevillano (1999-02) • AVO Pro Beach Tour

A native of Clearwater, Fla., former outside hitter Alex Sevillano spent her career at Florida State from 1999-2002. Following four years that included leading the Seminoles in digs in her last two seasons, Sevillano made her living on the pro beach tour from 2006-11. The four-time ACC Academic Honor Roll member started in the AVO Pro Beach Tour, then made her way to the National Volleyball League as well as Wide Open Volleyball. During her beach-playing career, Sevillano made stops in Arizona, California, Colorado, Florida, Georgia, Illinois, New York and Texas.



Cecile Reynaud (1976-2001) • USA Volleyball

Known as an exceptional teacher, educator, motivator and coach of volleyball, Reynaud's global experience has been aplenty since building the Seminoles into a respectable volleyball program for 26 seasons. Reynaud was an assistant coach for the United States World University Games team in 1983. then served as head coach of the Women's Junior National Volleyball Team in 1985. In the summer 2012, Reynaud had the privilege of coaching at the Paralympic Games in London for the USA Women's Sitting Volleyball Team, and coachedthe USA Women's National Team at the Grand Prix in Japan in August 2013. Reynaud finished her FSU coaching career with 635 wins following her retirement in 2001, placing her in a group of just eight active coaches at the time who amassed 600 or more victories. In her 26 seasons, 98 percent of her four-year letterwinners at Florida State went on to earn their college degree, proving her immense focus on both volleyball education and classroom education. She was a four-time conference coach of the year who also served as Deputy Competition Manager for the 1996 Centennial Olympic Games in Atlanta.



Makini Thompson (2005-07) · Jamaican National Team

Another great outside hitter to don the Garnet and Gold, Makini Thompson became Florida State's third All-American when she earned the national honor in 2006. In that same year, Thompson was also an AVCA All-Region performer and made the All-ACC Team in both 2006 and 2007. The 2006 season witnessed her putting down kills at an average of 3.95 per set. Thompson's post-FSU career included playing for the Jamaican National Team as well as Langenthal VBC in Switzerland at the professional level.





Jordana Price (2007-09) · VFM

Jordana Price was another substantial piece to Florida State's history-making 2009 team that made it all the way to NCAA Volleyball's version of the Elite Eight. The Mountain Home, Idaho native was a ferocious player who garnered a .312 hitting percentage from 2007-09 and led Florida State in total blocks in two of her three years. An AVCA Honorable Mention All-American and a two-time all-region performer, Price took a similar path to teammate Brianna Barry by playing for VFM in Switzerland and also playing for Team Florida WAVE. Price was an All-ACC Team selection in 2009 when she recorded a .355 hitting percentage and 161 total blocks.



Brianna Barry (2006-09) · VFM

Middle blocker Brianna Barry holds the distinguished honor as Florida State's first non-honorable mention All-American when she earned second-team honors as a senior. The Winter Springs, Fla., native had a tremendous career that was highlighted by leading the Seminoles to their first NCAA Regional Final appearance in 2009. In that season, Barry became Florida State's first ACC Player of the Year and finished with an astonishing .492 hitting percentage that is high atop the NCAA charts. Following her collegiate career, Barry played for VFM in Saignelégier, Switzerland from 2010-13, and also played for Team Florida WAVE. Barry was also an all-region and all-conference player in her Seminole years, and made the All-ACC Academic Team and the ACC Academic Honor Roll in each of her four seasons. She finished her college career with an outstanding .371 hitting percentage and 396 total blocks.



Mira Djuric (2007-09) • HPK

Outside hitter Mira Djuric from Belgrade, Serbia was a tenacious student-athlete with an entertaining serve that came at opponents fast. Djuric was another AVCA Honorable Mention All-American in 2009 and twice made the All-ACC Team in both her playing seasons in 2007 and 2009. In just two seasons she ended her Seminole career with 152 service aces, a Top five mark in school history at the conclusion of her senior season. Djuric also excelled offensively in the attacking game, delivering the most kills on her teams in 2007 and 2009. Prior to her enrollment at Florida State, Djuric was a member of the Serbian Junior National Team. She played professionally in Finland for HPK following her years at Florida State.



Stephanie Neville (2007-10) · Canadian National Team

Canadian-born outside hitter Stephanie Neville had four fine seasons for the Seminoles between 2007-10, always being a steady presence on the attack. The Cambridge, Ontario native ended her FSU career with a consistent .268 attack percentage which was highlighted by a .309 finish in the team's program-building 2009 year. As a senior, she was named to the All-ACC Team and earned a spot on the All-East Region Honorable Mention list after leading the Noles in kills. Prior to her enrollment at FSU, Neville had the honor of playing for the Canadian Youth and Junior National teams, adding to Florida State's growing list of student-athletes who spent time playing among their country's most competitive national teams. While at FSU, Neville was also an achiever in the classroom after earning a spot on the All-ACC Academic Team in both 2009 and 2010. She was also an All-ACC Academic Honor Roll recipient in all four seasons played.



Visnja Djurdjevic (2010-11) • Serbian Junior National Team

Versatile Visnja Djurdjevic became Florida State's first multiple All-American, earning the honor twice in her only two seasons as a Seminole. She was a two-time All-ACC Team member and was responsible for the biggest point in program history, a matchpoint service ace that gave Florida State a five-set win over Iowa State on Dec. 10, 2011, to send the Seminoles to the NCAA National Semifinals. Djurdjevic participated with the Serbian Junior National Team that twice won the Balkan Championships. She is now a volunteer assistant coach at Boston College.



Duygu Duzceler (2009-12) • Turkish Junior National Team


Turkish-born Duygu Duzceler became one of the most polished setters in program history as she was one of the guiding forces that began Florida State's unprecedented era. Duzceler never missed a match or even a set in her four-year career and was part of an NCAA Regional Final in 2009 and an NCAA National Semifinal in 2011. Her 134 career matches are just outside of the Top 10 list in school history, with the most recent player being Deanna Kaleta (137) in 1985-88. Duzceler helped make Florida State's attacking game exponentially better in her time in Tallahassee, helping a flurry of middle blockers and outside hitters earn All-America honors. Playing in a two-setter rotation, Duzceler still managed to record 2,915 assists for a Top 10 mark at Florida State. Shortly after her collegiate career, Duzceler signed a professional volleyball contract in Turkey.





Sareea Freeman (2009-12) · North Texas Region

In her time as a Seminole, middle blocker Sareea Freeman went from being a raw athlete to a highly-skilled player who was a dominating force by her senior season. The Fresno, Calif., native earned AVCA Honorable Mention All-America honors in 2012 and finished second nationally with a .438 hitting percentage that season. Heading into her big senior year, Freeman faced some great competition during the summer 2012 when she competed with teammate Sarah Wickstrom in the United States Senior Women's A2 Program in Columbus, Ohio against some of the nation's best collegiate athletes across the country. Freeman set a school record for most ACC Player of the Week awards in a career when she earned four, including three in her final season at Florida State. She ended her FSU career with an outstanding .356 hitting percentage and 393 total blocks. After an assistant coaching stint with UAlbany, she joined the North Texas Region and helped the squad with the PVL Championship in 2015.



Fatma Yildirim (2009-12) • Turkish National Training Team

A hard-working player, Fatma Yildirim showcased several of her abilities while at Florida State. She ended her career as an AVCA Honorable Mention All-American in 2012, and became just the fifth Seminole to earn both All-ACC Freshman Team and All-ACC honors. Prior to coming to Florida State, Yildirim was a member of the Turkish Junior National Team from 2005-08. One of the highlights of her three-year stint was helping the national team to the title at the 2006 Balkan Championships. Yildirim was a co-captain on the 2012 Seminole squad and was known as a role model for the way she conducted herself. Yildirim is currently training with the Turkish National Team in preparation for the FIVB U23 World Championship in October 2013.



Marija Milosavljevic (2010-12) • Serbian Junior National Team

Middle blocker/right-side hitter Marija Milosavljevic was a steady player at Florida State, winning the Seminole Warrior and Total Commitment awards after her senior year for the devotion she showed. Milosavljevic was on the team's NCAA National Semifinal run in 2011, her second year with the program. The Bajina Basta, Serbia native has been a member of both the Serbian Youth and National Teams, having a few successful years at the Balkan Championships. Milosavljevic has the skills to continue playing at the professional level.



Katie Mosher (2010-2014) · Florida WAVE

Libero Katie Mosher participated in the U.S. Collegiate National Team Program in the summer of 2014 (which is formally know as the U.S. Senior A2 program). Mosher was part of the European Global Challenge title in the summer 2011 in Croatia by the USA Junior A2 Team. Mosher was also part of the A2 program in high school, competing with the Youth A2 National Team in 2009. The Fort Myers, Fla., native holds the single-season record for digs at Florida State in a season with 604 in 2011, a year in which she was named the team's most influential player. Mosher finished with 495 digs in 2012 and 506 in 2013. Mosher recently joined the Florida WAVE and helped it take fourth at the 2015 PVL Championships.



Elise Walch (2011-2013) • USA Junior A2 Team

Elise Walch has played with USA Volleyball on a few occasions, most recently in 2011 when she helped the USA Junior A2 Team to the championship at the European Global Challenge in Croatia. She has also been a member of the 2008 and 2009 USA Volleyball Youth A2 Teams, and was placed on the 2010 USA Volleyball Junior National Training Team. The right-side hitter from Stuart, Fla., has produced some big-hitting matches for the Seminoles, including a dominant 12-kill performance against Miami as a sophomore when Florida State upended the nationally-ranked Hurricanes.



Sarah Wickstrom (2011-2014t) • U.S. Collegiate National Team **Program**

Setter Sarah Wickstrom participated in the U.S. Collegiate National Team Program along with Katie Mosher and Mercedes Vaughn. She joined former teammate Sareea Freeman in the United States Women's Senior A2 Program in Columbus, Ohio during the summer 2012. Wickstrom helped the USA Blue team to a 4-1 record at the national tournament. Through her first three seasons at Florida State, the Stuart, Fla., native has been a part of an NCAA National Semifinal run in 2011, a second-round appearance in 2012 and a Sweet 16 berth in 2013. Following her freshman campaign, Wickstrom earned All-ACC Freshman Team honors. Prior to her arrival at Florida State, Wickstrom participated in the USA Volleyball Junior Olympics for several years and also played at USA Volleyball Beach Nationals.





Sarah Burrington (2012-Present) • USA Junior National Team

Middle blocker Sarah Burrington was named to the USA Volleyball Women's Junior National Team on June 14, 2013. The squad was composed of some of the very best collegiate athletes born in 1994 or 1995. The Ruskin, Fla. resident enjoyed a near two-week journey at the FIVB Women's U-20 World Championship in the Czech Republic. She helped Team USA to a 6-3 record which included scrimmages.



Olivera Medic (2012-2013) • Serbia Senior National Team

Outside hitter Olivera Medic has been another great addition to the Serbian pipeline that the Florida State indoor volleyball program has grown. In 2012, she joined former teammate Fatma Yildirim as the only Seminoles to be named to more than one all-tournament team in 2012. The Subotica, Serbia native spent the summer of 2009 playing for the Serbian Senior National Team as she helped her national squad to a first-place finish in the Euroleague, defeating France in the semifinals and Turkey in the championship match. Medic also played on the Serbian Junior National Team and helped it to a second-place finish at the Balkan Championship.



Nicole Walch (2012-Present) • U.S. Collegiate National Team

Nicole Walch has had a couple stints with USA Volleyball. Heading into her senior season at Martin County High School, Walch joined her sister Elise and fellow Seminole Katie Mosher in winning the European Global Challenge as a member of United States Junior A2 team in Pula, Croatia. Walch took her game to the next level in the summer 2013 when she played in the USA Volleyball senior A2 program in Dallas, Texas, against some of the best players remaining with collegiate eligibility. In 2014, she was selected to top the U.S. Collegiate National Team that played on the China Tour. Following her junior season where she captured AVCA All-America Second Team honors, Walch was a member of Team USA that competed at the 2015 World University Games in Gwangju, Korea. Walch Poised to Climb the Ranks

Senior outside hitter Nicole Walch enters the 2015 season with 1,007 career kills. After a season of 447 and 487 kills in 2013 and 2014 respectively, The Stuart, Fla. native will look to leave her mark on FSU history. She is on pace to finish fifth (1,436) or sixth (1,420) on the All-Time Kills list. Although she will likely finish in the middle of the top 10, she will be the only Seminole on that list from the rally scoring era, which is equally if not more impressive than



the school record of 2,110 which was set by Maggie Philgence (1987-90) when scoring was different and teams played around 50 matches a season.

Walch Dons Red. White & Blue...PART 2

This summer, senior Nicole Walch became the first Seminole in history to compete in the World University Games. After falling 0-3 in a tough pool play, Walch helped the Americans rally to a 3-0 showing in the silver bracket for ninth place.

Joining the Coast

The Seminoles picked up two players that had previous stints with Big Ten teams. Junior middle Blocker Melanie Keil looks to make an impact in the lineup after spending two seasons with Nebraska. While in Lincoln, Keil helped the Huskers to back-to-back Elite Eight appearances by coming off a regular in the starting rotation towards the end of the season. She will look to compliment redshirt junior middle blocker Sarah Burrington on the front. In addition to Keil, redshirt freshman outside hitter Christina Ambrose joins the Seminoles after a year with Purdue. Ambrose will make her collegiate debut this season after

sitting out her first year as a Boilermaker. She arrived in January.

Back to the Grind

It's not a secret that Florida State Volleyball goes after those RPI points. After finishing third in the RPI in 2013, Coach Poole has put together another tough schedule for the Seminoles in 2015.

FSU will play 12 matches against teams that finished in the top 50 of the 2014 RPI, including North Carolina and Florida who finished in the top 10.

In fact, in the first six matches of 2015, the Seminoles will face a team that was recognized in the preseason AVCA Coaches Poll or received votes.

Welcome Coach Jeff

With the departure of beloved associate head coach Ryan McGuyre to a head coaching position at Baylor, Coach Poole announced the hiring of Jeff Hulsmeyer, who was the associate head coach at Kansas State.

Hulsmeyer brings a wealth of coaching experience to Florida State after serving as an assistant at Kansas State for six seasons (2009-14), helping the Wildcats to three NCAA Tournament appearances including a Sweet 16 berth in 2011 after being selected to finish eighth in the Big 12.

Poole and Hulsmeyer have been friends since the 1980's when both coaches were in the Sun Belt Conference.

Noles Participate in U.S. Programs

In 2015, junior outside hitter Katie Horton participated with the US Collegiate National Team program that ran in New Orleans.

Noles Ranked Ninth in AVCA Preseason Poll

The AVCA starts the season ranking the Seminoles ninth in the 2015 preseason poll. It is the first time in school history that the Seminoles have cracked the top 10 to begin the year. Although FSU is listed in the top 10, the 15 head coaches of the ACC chose FSU to finish second in the league behind North Carolina, who is listed at No. 5 in the poll. OH Nicole Walch, OH Katie Horton and MB Sarah Burrington all captured All-ACC Preseason Team honors.

Ready for a Showdown

Who doesn't love a rivalry match? When it comes to Florida State vs. Florida, there's always excitement. In 2013, the Seminoles lost 3-0 in the O'Connell Center on Sept. 17. Although it was a sweep, FSU dropped the first set 25-20, before falling 26-24 and 25-23 in the final two.

However, the Seminoles got their chance for revenge when they drew the Gainesville Regional in the NCAA Tournament for the fourth time in school history.

This time, FSU would pull off the biggest upset in school history by knocking out the sixth-ranked Gators, 3-2. Not only was it the highest-ranked win, it was the first time since Oct. 9. 1990 FSU defeated UF inside the O'Connell

Center. In fact, each Seminole listed on the roster was not born yet at the time of the last win.

In 2014, Florida came to town for the home opener and in front of a record-setting crowd in Tully Gym, the Seminoles outlasted the Gators 3-2 in a five set thriller. It was the first time under Poole that the Noles were ranked ahead of the Gators at the time of the match. FSU was eighth in the AVCA Poll while Florida was 11th.


This year's contest is in Gainesville on Sept. 20 at 5 p.m. and it will be featured on the SEC Network.

The Highest EVER

FSU has made a habit of leading the ACC when it comes to monumental accomplishments. In 2011, the Seminoles became the first team to advance to the Final Four and yet another ACC first has been achieved by Chris Poole's squad in 2014.

Florida State becames the first team in ACC history to receive an invitation to the AVCA Showcase - a preseason tournament that features tradition powerhouse volleyball schools.

In 2014, the Seminoles earned the highest rank-



ing out of any ACC team in conference history when it rode a 24-match winning streak all the way to No. 3 in the AVCA poll.


Coach Mo'

HEAD COACH CHRIS POOLE



The transformation has been thorough and quick.

When Chris Poole inherited the Florida State volleyball program in the summer of 2008, he took over a team that had failed to reach the 20-win plateau in five-straight seasons and hadn't been to the NCAA Tournament since 2002. It was a program looking for answers; a program looking to get back to the winning ways it had grown accustomed to in the 1980s and early '90s.

Seven years later, Poole has made his mark, grabbing his 700th career win while rejuvenating a program that has built itself into a national contender. He has guided the Seminoles to an NCAA National Semifinal (2011), an NCAA Regional Semifinal (2013, 2014) and Final (2009), and two trips to the NCAA second round (2010, 2012).

In 2014, the Seminoles continued to produce history, riding a 24-0 match winning streak while climbing to a program and ACC best AVCA ranking of No. 3 as four athletes captured AVCA All-America honors en route to the second consecutive Sweet 16.

In 2013, Poole helped the Seminoles to a school-record setting six AVCA top-25 wins (Kentucky, Michigan, Western Kentucky, Duke, North Carolina, Florida), including two of the biggest wins in school history. On December 6, 2013, Poole guided the Seminoles to a 3-2, NCAA Second Round victory over No. 6 Florida lifting them to the NCAA Champaign Regional Semifinal. It marked the first time since 1990, FSU defeated UF inside the O'Connell Center. Florida State also picked up a 3-2 win over No. 7 Michigan on Sept. 14, 2013.

The Seminoles finished second in the Atlantic Coast Conference with an overall record of 26-8, while finishing the year ranked 11th in the AVCA poll and 12th in the RPI. FSU was led by AVCA All-America honorable mention players, Ashley Neff, Nicole Walch and Elise Walch. Neff earned All-ACC First Team honors, while both Walch sisters and Katie Mosher were awarded All-Second Team accolades.

On Nov. 17th in a 3-0 victory over Notre Dame, Poole picked up his 700th career win, becoming one of the most winningest active division I coaches in the country (10th-706 wins).

In 2012, the Seminoles won their third Atlantic Coast Conference title under Poole and the program's fourth overall. Florida State finished with a remarkable 28-4 overall record, earning back-to-back conference crowns for the first time in the ACC since Maryland achieved the feat in 2003 and 2004. The Seminoles tied a previous school record with the 2011 squad by defeating five AVCA Top 25 opponents, and one of just three teams (Southern California, Western Kentucky) who have garnered 28 wins or better in the last two seasons (2011 and 2012).

In Poole's fifth season Florida State obliterated the school record for consecutive wins at home, reaching 27 matches before falling to Purdue in the NCAA Second Round. Florida State also achieved a 16-match win streak and won 19 consecutive sets overall in the 2012 season to reflect its stellar play. The Seminoles finished 18th in the final AVCA Poll and 12th in the final RPI, while being led by AVCA Third-Team All-American and ACC Player of the Year Ashley Neff as well as honorable mention All-Americans Sareea Freeman and Fatma Yildirim.

Poole's most memorable year thus far came in 2011, when he led the Seminoles to their first-ever NCAA National Semifinal appearance in what was a startling year to say the least.

In 2011, FSU earned its third ACC title while finishing with a 28-7 overall record and an 18-2 mark within the conference. The Seminoles entered the NCAA Tournament as a No. 12 national seed and began the Field of 64 by defeating Albany and Cincinnati in Tully Gym. From there, FSU upset No. 5 Purdue in four sets in the Sweet 16 and defeated fourth-seeded Iowa State in five sets in the Elite Eight in Minneapolis to achieve a feat that many deemed unthinkable when Poole and his staff first arrived.

FSU became the first ACC volleyball team to ever advance to the final round of four, where it eventually lost to NCAA champion UCLA in the national semifinal at the Alamodome in San Antonio. FSU was the only team in the final four that had gotten through its regional in which both Sweet 16 and Elite Eight opponents were nationally-seeded. In his five seasons leading the Seminoles, Poole has compiled 11 of FSU's 12 NCAA postseason wins, showing a 11-5 mark in championship play.

As a result of FSU's historical 2011 campaign, Poole helped the Seminoles achieve their highest national ranking ever as they finished at No. 7 in the final AVCA Poll. FSU also finished with the seventh-best RPI in the nation. Poole capped his incredible season by being named the ACC Coach of the Year for the second time

as well as the AVCA East Region Coach of the Year. He coached AVCA Second-Team All-American Jekaterina Stepanova to a career year as well as AVCA Honorable Mention All-Americans Visnja Djurdjevic and Neff.

The Seminoles earned 21 wins in Poole's first season in 2008 and then followed that up with an incredible 2009 campaign. FSU not only posted a 31-3 overall record, but under Poole's tutelage the 'Noles captured their first outright regular-season Atlantic Coast Conference championship in school history (second overall) and made it to the Elite Eight of the NCAA Tournament for the first time ever.

In addition to those program firsts, Poole's Seminoles also set the school standard for most conference wins in a season with 19 and ACC wins in a row with 16, which was then tied by the 2011 team. A national ranking of No. 11 in the entire country was the highest ever for a Florida State volleyball team at the time and its No. 3 national seed in the Big Dance continues to be the highest ever. Poole's 2012 team reached the program's highest AVCA ranking at No. 6 on Sept. 3, 2012.

For his squad's multiple successes, Poole garnered ACC Coach of the Year and AVCA Division I East Region Coach of the Year honors in 2009.

He also coached a handful of players that generated quite a few accolades. Brianna Barry became the first Seminole to ever be named the ACC's Player of the Year and she also garnered AVCA Division I Second-Team All-American honors. Barry, an ESPN The Magazine Academic All First-Team member, was joined by Jordana Price, Mira Djuric and Rachael Morgan on the 2009 All-ACC Team - a record at FSU for most players on that list in one season. Price, Djuric and Morgan also each achieved an AVCA Division I Honorable Mention All-American nod. Poole also coached an ACC All-Freshman Team performer in Yildirim.

The 2010 season featured several roadblocks for the Seminoles, ranging from life-altering misfortunes off the court to devastating injuries that inhibited the team's continuity. Despite all the hardships, the gutsy FSU squad finished 22-11, including 12-8 within the ACC. Several program feats were accomplished - making back-to-back postseason appearances for the first time in over a decade, advancing to the second round of the NCAA Championship in consecutive years for the first time in school history and finishing with at least 20 wins for the third straight season.

Veterans Jenna Romanelli and Stephanie Neville capped off their four-year careers in excellent fashion. Junior outside hitter Djurdjevic was one of the top transfers in the country, being named an AVCA Honorable Mention All-American and an AVCA Honorable Mention All-East Region member. She joined Neville as members of the

All-ACC Team as well.

The fact that Poole has breathed life in the FSU volleyball program should come as no surprise as he brought a wealth of knowledge and experience to the school after heading the program at the University of Arkansas for 14 accomplished seasons.

Poole started Arkansas' volleyball program in 1994 and was not only successful, but led the Lady Razorbacks to 11 Southeastern Conference Western Division titles. Add to that 11 postseason appearances - two NIVC and nine NCAA - along with an SEC Tournament title and numerous individual player honors.

Upon arriving in Fayetteville, Ark. in 1993, Poole personally handled every element of building the program from buying the first pieces of equipment, hiring the assistants and recruiting the players, to renovating the court and building locker room facilities.

With head coaching stints at Arkansas, Arkansas State and Arkansas Tech, Poole earned a 550-230 career record in 21 seasons prior to his hiring at FSU and had been named conference coach of the year seven times and was pegged the South Region Coach of the Year in 1997.

During his 14 seasons at Arkansas, in which he compiled a 316-161 record, Poole produced two AVCA All-Americans, three AVCA honorable mention All-Americans, 24 players with 44 All-SEC honors, three SEC Freshmen of the Year and 25 AVCA All-District/All-Region honorees. In addition to the success on the court, Poole's Arkansas teams excelled in the classroom as well with 67 SEC Academic Honor Roll selections, 10 CoSIDA All-District selections, two H. Boyd McWhorter Scholar-Athlete finalists and one McWhorter winner.

Poole certainly made his mark in the SEC as he guided Arkansas to a 159-65 record in the SEC regular season for a 71 percent league-winning mark. Poole and the Lady Razorbacks were even more impressive against the Western Division, winning 11 of 14 titles.

Poole spent an entire year away from competition preparing for the Razorback's inaugural season in 1994 and it was time well spent as he led Arkansas to a 19-17 overall record, a 10-5 SEC mark and an SEC Western Division title with a perfect 10-0 divisional record in the first year of competition. The Lady Razorbacks finished third overall in the league that year and played well enough to earn a postseason bid to the National Invitational Volleyball Coaches tournament in Kansas City where they finished seventh in a field of 20 teams. Poole was selected as the 1994 SEC Coach of the Year while two of his players earned All-SEC honors and one player earned All-District honors.

Poole's ability to build a program was proven first with Arkansas Tech then at Arkansas State. He took over days prior to the 1987 season at ASU and his first team showed the effects with an 8-24 record. But with one season under Poole's careful tutelage, virtually the same team was 41-1 the next year, launching a five-year run of winning seasons for the Lady Indians.

His 1988 team had a 33-match win streak, longest in the nation, and posted a school-record 41-1 overall mark. The next year, ASU had a 34-match win streak, notched a Lady Indian record with 43 wins (43-6 overall) and was ranked ninth in the South Region.

In his last season at ASU, the Lady Indians were 41-6 and received an automatic bid into the NCAA Tournament in 1992. ASU entered the 32-team NCAA field with the most wins of any team, but lost a tough four-game match to the Northwest Region's top-seeded team, Long Beach State.

Prior to ASU, Poole was an assistant and later head coach at Arkansas Tech. In two seasons as head coach at ATU, he posted a 53-20 record, winning the Arkansas Intercollegiate Conference title in 1985 as co-head coach and finishing runner-up as head coach in 1986. He started his collegiate career in 1983 as a graduate assistant for the nationally ranked Arkansas

Tech Golden Suns. Tech was 58-9 with a perfect 24-0 conference mark in two seasons with Poole as an assistant coach.

A native of Heber Springs in north-central Arkansas, Poole is a 1983 graduate of Arkansas Tech and earned a master's degree from there in 1989. He is a member of the American Volleyball Coaches Association and has served on the AVCA's All-American, All-South Region and All-South Region Ranking committees and is also an AVCA Top 25 voter.

Poole and his wife, Toni, a former Arkansas State track and field standout, have two children, son Joshua and daughter Taylor.

ASSOCIATE HEAD COACH JEFF HULSMEYER



Florida State indoor volleyball head coach Chris Poole announced the hiring of Jeff Hulsmeyer as the associate head coach. Hulsmeyer will replace Ryan McGuyre, who was named the head coach at Baylor in December

Hulsmeyer will fulfill the responsibilities of training and recruiting coordinator.

"I have been very blessed with great assistants," Poole said. "Holly Watts, Gokhan Yilmaz and now Ryan McGuyre have all moved to a head coaching positions at the Division I level. I am now excited to welcome Jeff and his family to the Florida State Volleyball program and looking forward to another great season. Jeff has spent about 25 years coaching and recruiting and we expect him to make an impact. Jeff is also known as an exceptional trainer and focuses on the small details of being a great individual player."

Hulsmeyer brings a wealth of coaching experience to Florida State after serving as an assistant at Kansas State for six seasons (2009-14), helping the Wildcats to three NCAA Tournament appearances including a Sweet 16 berth in 2011 after being selected to finish eighth in the Big 12.

In 2014, the Wildcats teetered in and out of the AVCA Top 25, finishing with a record of 22-9 after falling in the first round of the NCAA Tournament, 3-0 to Utah. Hulsmeyer served as the offensive and recruiting coordinator at Kansas State, working heavily with the setters in practice while acquiring some of the top recruiting classes in the country according to PrepVolleyball.com.

"I am very honored and blessed to have this opportunity to work with Chris Poole at Florida State," Hulsmeyer said. "Coach Poole has established himself and Florida State volleyball as a national contender. Their goals are getting to the Final Four and being consistently ranked among the nation's elite programs. I'd like to thank Suzie Fritz and Kansas State University for six wonderful years in Manhattan and all the players and support staff that made our time there so memorable. My family and I are looking forward to making Tallahassee our home and getting immersed in the community."

Hulsmeyer served as the head coach for Georgetown College, where he produced a record of 75-14, leading the Tigers to a No. 5 national ranking in 2007. In both seasons at the helm he was named the conference and region coach of the year while helping a pair of players to NAIA All-America honors.

Prior to an assistant coaching job at Illinois (1996-98) and a four-year head coaching stint at Purdue (1999-2002), Hulsmeyer worked for Arkansas State and Western Kentucky - two teams in the Sun Belt Conference, capturing three titles and two Coach of the Year awards.

While at the helm of Arkansas State (1993-95) he led his team to the crown in all three seasons while remaining perfect in regular season conference play in addition to a pair of NCAA Tournament bids.

After a season at Western Kentucky as a graduate assistant, Hulsmeyer took over as

the head coach in 1990, turning the program around and finishing with a 32-9 record following a season that had a losing record. While at the helm (1990-93) Hulsmeyer led Western Kentucky to a pair of runner-up finishes in the Sun Belt Conference.

"I have personally known Jeff since he started coaching," Poole said. "We both got into Division I Volleyball about the same time in the late 80's. In fact, we coached against each other in the Sun Belt Conference. His teams were always exceptionally well prepared for matches."

During parts of his coaching career began, Hulsmeyer played indoor and professional beach volleyball from 1989-95 while recruiting on the East Coast.

Hulsmeyer graduated from Kentucky in 1988 with a degree in political science. He is married to the former Michelle Hall of Halstead, Kan. She was a two-time All-American volleyball player for Barton County Community College before she went on to play at Arkansas State where she helped her team to the NCAA Tournament in both seasons. The couple have four children, Zach, Ben, Hannah and Jack.



ASSISTANT COACH GANNA KHRYSTENKO



Ganna "Anna" Khrystenko is tremendously dedicated to the sport of volleyball. She has enjoyed success as both a player and a coach at the most elite level in Europe. She brings that wealth of knowledge and experience to FSU while entering her second season as the Assistant Coach for the indoor volleyball team.

In 2014, Khrystenko took charge of coaching blocking, helping Sarah Burrington to an AVCA All-America honorable mention accolade and All-ACC First Team nod while Kiara Wright finished with All-ACC Second team honors.

Khrystenko arrived in Tallahassee in March (2014) and assists heavily in international recruiting while coaching in her area of expertise - blocking.

The native of Ukraine, Khrystenko played five seasons on the Ukrainian National Team while playing professionally in her country from 1995-2008. During a three year junior career (1995-1997) she gained valuable international experience by competing at a pair of Junior World Championships and European Championships.

Khrystenko won a plethora of accolades as a player, including a four-time Ukrainian Championship, where she was awarded the 'Best Blocker' multiple times. She is a four-time winner of the Cup of Ukraine and was seen in the Elite Eight of the European CEV Cup and Top Teams Cups. In 2002 where she was awarded the 'Best Server' for the Top Teams Cup.

She helped Ukraine take fifth place at the World University Games in 2003.

Following her athletic career, Khrystenko began coaching in 2008 as a manager of the Ukraininan Girls' Team before being promoted to assistant coach of the Junior Team in 2009. During that time, Khrystenko essentially served as a general manager of the club by selecting coaches and players for the teams while working with advanced volleyball development in her country.

Her role in the Ukraine expands further than just a coach. In 2008, Khrystenko was named as the Chairman of the Athletic Commission for the Ukrainian Volleyball Federation and was a member of the Executive Committee and National Olympic Committee as well. She also spent five years as a General Volleyball Manager at the Ukrainian Government.

Recently, Khrystenko took her career to the United States in December of 2013 where she had been coaching the USA NY AAU Volleyball teams, which are based out of New York and are members of the New England Amateur Athletic Union.

Khrystenko is married to Alexander Khrystenko and the couple have a four-year old son, Ivan.

2014 SEASON ACCOMPLISHMENTS

- The Florida State indoor volleyball team put together another record-setting year in 2014, finishing the season with a second-consecutive Sweet 16 appearance before finishing ranked 10th in the AVCA poll with a record of 30-3.
- The Seminoles have now been included in 58 straight polls, while turning in the second highest finish to a season in school history.
- Started the season ranked No. 13 in the AVCA Poll and relied on veteran leadership to mold nine new players including five transfers.
- •Katie Mosher and Sarah Wickstrom finished their careers by becoming one of the most winningest senior classes in FSU history with 112 wins.
- The Seminoles were led by junior outside hitter Nicole Walch who finished the season with AVCA All-America Second Team honors behind 487 kills (3.99 per set), 306 digs and 35 aces. Walch became the fourth player in FSU history to earn an All-America nod. The Stuart, Fla. native garnered All-ACC First Team honors in 2014 on top of three ACC Player of the Week honors. Walch established new single match career highs in kills (25 vs. Clemson) and aces (5 vs. NC State) while registering 15 double-doubles.
- FSU rode a 24-match winning streak to start the season.
- Katie Mosher left her legacy on the FSU program by taking over as the FSU All-Time digs leader with 2,123. She broke the record on a career day of 34 digs in the 3-2 win over Miami. She finished the year with 518 digs, averaging 4.18 per set.
- In 2014, Mosher was named to the All-ACC first team before earning AVCA All-America honorable mention accolades. The three-year captain was also selected as a finalist for the Senior CLASS Award where she finished with Second-Team honors.
- Sarah Wickstrom also moved up the FSU ranks and she inished her career with 2,915 which ties her for sixth place on the All-Time Assists list. She also established a single match career high in assists of 39 in the win over Marquette. Wickstrom also led the defense in the 3-1 loss vs. BYU with 19 digs, which was another career high. During her four years at FSU, she only missed one match a total of four sets.
- In addition to Walch and Mosher, Burrington captured

- All-ACC First team honors while earning AVCA All-America honorable mention accolades. Burrington finished with 178 total blocks, 1.44 per set while adding 260 kills for .406 percent, which is the fourth-best hitting percentage in school history. Wright and Horton earned All-ACC Second Team honors, while Horton was named as an AVCA All-America honorable mention. Wright finished second on the team with 148 total blocks averaging 1.19 per set while leading in solo stops with 21.
- In addition to Walch's AVCA All-America second team, Burrington, Horton and Mosher all earned second team honors tying the most in school history.
- FSU dominated the East, with Walch, Horton, Mosher and Burrington all receiving All-Region honors. Kubura was an honorable mention. Coach Poole was named as the AVCA East Region Coach of the Year.
- Walch earned ACC Player of the Week twice in 2014, Horton picked up the honor after the wins over Texas A&M.
- Kubura was named to the All-ACC Freshman Team and an AVCA All-East Region honorable mention after producing 184 kills (2.02 per set) and 63 total blocks. The Belgrade, Serbia native was also selected as the ACC Freshman of the Week twice in 2014.

- Florida State Volleyball owns 32 nationally-ranked victories in the AVCA Poll.
- The Seminoles' top-ranked win according to the AVCA Poll occurred in the second round of the NCAA Tournament when the Seminoles knocked-off sixth-ranked Florida in Gainesville, Fla.
- Head Coach Chris Poole owns 19 nationally-ranked wins as FSU's head coach. He has more in his first four seasons than the program had in the prior 27 seasons before his arrival (9).
- Prior to Poole's first nationally-ranked victory versus Illinois on Sept. 4, 2009, the Seminoles hadn't defeated a ranked team since beating No. 12 UNC on Nov. 23, 2002.
- Florida State is 0-3 against top-ranked teams.
- The 2011, 2012 and 2014 seasons featured five nationally-ranked wins apiece, the most in any season. FSU had two Top 20/25 wins apiece in the 1989, 1993, 1994, 2002 and 2009 seasons.
- Florida State knocked off a school record six ranked teams in 2013.
- FSU's first-ever nationally-ranked win came at No. 9 Kentucky on Nov. 12, 1988.
- Cecile Reynaud owns seven nationally-ranked victories in her coaching career.
- Fifteen of FSU's 32 nationally-ranked wins have been against the Southeastern Conference, including five against Kentucky, five against Florida, two versus LSU and Texas A&M and one against Tennessee.

THE ACC

The Tradition

Consistency. It is the mark of true excellence in any endeavor.

In today's intercollegiate athletics, competition is so balanced and so competitive that it is virtually impossible to maintain a high level of consistency. Yet the Atlantic Coast Conference has defied the odds.

Now, in its 63rd year of competition, the ACC has long enjoyed the reputation as one of the strongest and most competitive intercollegiate conferences in the nation. And that is not mere conjecture, the numbers support it.

Since the league's inception in 1953, ACC schools have captured 141 NCAA team championships, including 72 in women's competition and 69 in men's. In addition, NCAA individual titles have gone to ACC student-athletes 159 times in men's competition and 120 times in women's action. Given the ACC's strong history and the strengthening of its ranks with the additions of Notre Dame, Pitt and Syracuse in 2013, followed by Louisville in 2014, those numbers – and the league's longstanding tradition of excellence – appear destined to grow in the years ahead.

ACC Football enjoyed another banner year in 2014 as Florida State posted a 13-1 record, won its third straight ACC crown, won 29 straight games—which tied for the 12th-longest streak in college football history--and earned a berth in the first College Football Playoff. Two ACC teams were ranked in the final Associated Press Top 10 as Capital One Orange Bowl champion Georgia Tech (8th) joined the Seminoles (5th). The ACC finished with four teams ranked in the final AP and Coaches polls, with Clemson (15th) and Louisville (24th) also being recognized, and became the first Conference in history to send 11 teams to bowl games in back-to-back seasons. ACC teams defeated five Top 10 non-conference teams in 2014, the most in a single season in league history.

Over the past two seasons, ACC athletes have captured 14 of the 17 major national football awards, including the Heisman, the Outland Trophy, The Nagurski Trophy, the Lombardi Award and the National Football Foundation's Campbell Trophy--the nation's academic Heisman--which was awarded to Duke linebacker David Helton. Louisville's Gerod Holliman tied the NCAA record for most pass interceptions in a season (14) and was named winner of the Jim Thorpe Award while Florida State's Nick O'Leary captured the John Mackey Award as the nation's top tight end. In all, the conference tied its all-time high with six consensus first-team All-Americas.

The ACC total of nine first-round draft picks in the 2015 NFL Draft tied for the most among all conferences, including the overall No. 1 pick in Florida State quarterback Jameis Winston. The ACC also had 47 players selected in 2015, the second-highest total in league history and the second-highest of any conference.

2014-15 Review

The 2014-15 academic year saw ACC teams capture five more national team titles and 16 individual NCAA crowns. In all, the ACC has won 72 national team titles over the last 18 years and has won two or more NCAA titles in 32 of the past 34 years.

Academically, the member institutions of the Atlantic Coast Conference again led the way among Power 5 conferences in the latest "Best Colleges" rankings released by US News & World Report. ACC member institutions combined for an average rank of 54.8, marking the eighth straight year that the ACC led all Power 5 conferences.

The Championships

The conference will conduct championship competition in 27 sports during the 2015-16 academic year--13 for men and 14 for women. The first ACC championship was held in swimming on February 25, 1954.

The 13 sports for men include football, cross country, soccer, basketball, fencing, swimming and diving, indoor and outdoor track & field, wrestling, baseball, tennis, golf and lacrosse. Women's sports were initiated in 1977 with the first championship meet held in tennis at Wake Forest University. Championships for women are currently conducted in cross country, field hockey, soccer, basketball, fencing, swimming and diving, indoor and outdoor track & field, tennis, golf, lacrosse, softball and rowing, with volleyball deciding its champion by regular-season play.

A History

The Atlantic Coast Conference was founded on May 8, 1953, at the Sedgefield Inn near Greensboro, North Carolina with seven charter members - Clemson, Duke, Maryland, North Carolina, North Carolina State, South Carolina and Wake Forest - drawing up the conference by-laws.

The withdrawal of seven schools from the Southern Conference came early on the morning of May 8, 1953, during the Southern Conference's annual spring meeting. On June 14, 1953, the seven members met in Raleigh, North Carolina, where a set of bylaws was adopted and the name became

officially the Atlantic Coast Conference.

Suggestions from fans for the name of the new conference appeared in the region's newspapers prior to the meeting in Raleigh. Some of



the names suggested were: Dixie, Mid-South, Mid-Atlantic, East Coast, Seaboard, Colonial, Tobacco, Blue-Gray, Piedmont, Southern Seven and the Shoreline.

Duke's Eddie Cameron recommended that the name of the conference be the Atlantic Coast Conference, and the motion was passed unanimously. The meeting concluded with each member institution assessed \$200.00 to pay for conference expenses.

On December 4, 1953, conference officials met again at Sedgefield and officially admitted Virginia as the league's eighth member. The first withdrawal of a school from the ACC came on June 30, 1971, when the University of South Carolina tendered its resignation. The ACC operated with seven members until April 3, 1978, when Georgia Tech was admitted. The Atlanta school had withdrawn from the Southeastern Conference in January of 1964.

The ACC expanded to nine members on July 1, 1991, with the addition of Florida State.

The conference expanded to 11 members on July 1, 2004, with the addition of Miami and Virginia Tech. On October 17, 2003, Boston College accepted an invitation to become the league's 12th member starting July 1, 2005.

The ACC added its 13th and 14th members on Sept. 18, 2011, when Pittsburgh and Syracuse accepted invitations to join the conference. The two schools officially join the ACC on July 1, 2013. Notre Dame also officially joined the ACC on July 1, 2013, after announcing on Sept. 12, 2012 its intention to enter the league for competition in all sports but football, bringing the membership of the conference to 15. The Fighting Irish will play five games with ACC schools each year.

On July 1, 2014, Louisville entered the ACC on the same day Maryland withdrew, keeping the conference's membership at 15 institutions.
