Seminoles Are Dangerous



Florida State University comes to Miami tonight for its first football meeting with the University of Miami Hurricanes, a game which should be hard fought and close for the Seminoles have been pointing for this one

ever since it was scheduled.

For Florida State, this is the most important football game it has played since football was resumed at the Tallahassee school in 1947. It is no secret that the Seminoles would like to improve their national rating in football and this game could go a long way toward bringing about that situation.

Miami fans can harken back to the efforts along that line when, after many turn downs, University of Florida finally agreed to meet Miami and a thrilling series was inaugurated. Florida State didn't have to wait so long to get its chance to show it has one of the state's leading football teams. Miamians share with the Tallahassee team supporters the hope that another fine series is in the making.

Florida State comes to Miami with pretty much of a mystery team. A solid nucleus of 20 veterans gives the Seminoles letter men in every position and comes close to providing the upstaters with enough lettermen to field experienced offensive and defensive units.

In addition, a fine crop of freshmen has been added to the squad to bolster depth. Since Florida State has always allowed freshmen to play on its varsity squad, the 1951 sophomores already have the advantage of one year of experience as varsity reserves.

An even more important factor is a liberal transfer rule which allows transfer athletes to play for Florida State without the year layoff which is in effect at Miami, and the Seminoles have a number of men who are in this category who are expected to help the Don Veller coached club.

Captain of the invaders is guard Bill Dawkins, one time Miami Jackson high star and half dozen or more other Miamians can be expected to be in action tonight for the visitors.

Expected to be the workhorse for the invaders is 215 pound fullback Mike Sellers who topped the team in ground gaining a year ago with 578 yards in 130 carries. He is rated one of the better line crashers in Dixie. Behind him is another letter man, Dick Turk who averaged 5.6 yards per carry in 56 efforts a year ago.

Balance wheel of the backfield is Nelson Italiano, 185 pound lad who averaged 5.6 yards per try in 76 efforts a year ago and had the unbelievable record of 8 touchdown passes thrown out of 16 completions. His tosses go long as they rolled up 459 yards for Seminoles, nearly 30 yards per pass, Harry Bringger, who caught five Italiano passes, all for touchdowns, is again on hand. He carried those five passes 246. Eddie Gray, who carried 9 passes for 234 yards and two touchdowns is also on hand.

The Seminoles yield little in experience to the Hurricanes on offense and have an edge in size. Defensively they're more experienced and are about as big as the miami defensive warriors.

Yep, our lads are in for a difficult evening and 'little' Florida State seems very well equipped to make it a rough one.







HERE WE GO AGAIN

What Well Dressed Grid Fan Will Wear



Hurricane Gridiron's Fashion Shopper found the duckiest little Stadium Shoulder Pads you would ever want to see. Detachable, they fold up into a compact package for inconspicuous carrying in and out of the stadium. Worn over the shoulders, they provide ample protection from (1) the knees

of the person sitting behind who is always hunching forward and (2) from the fists of this same person who has to pound whoever is sitting in front during exciting plays. Sturdily built of reinforced steel, the pads absorb heavy shocks. A novelty model is equipped with a small storage battery and wired to send a mild but effective current through an exposed top edge of the pad. The person pounding from the rear usually stops pounding after the second or third shock. Worn with a tin hat, the spectator need fear no trouble from the rear. The pad is waterproofed against rain, soft drink drippings and the finish is guaranteed to stand up under any type of three day corn likker. The tin hats come in two sizes, depending on whether the ears are the type which tuck in or can be used to support the hat itself.

Florida State University

■ The Florida State University at Tallahassee is an integral part of the Capital City of Florida. Located in the northwestern part of the state, Tallahassee has a metropolitan population of approximately 47,000.

The University was first established in 1857 as a "Seminary West of the Suwanee," authorized by the 1851 Legislature. The school opened on the grounds of the former "Florida Institute." The name changed to "Florida State College" in 1901, the school remained co-educational until the Buckman Bill of 1905. Then it became the "Florida Female College," and was replaced in 1909 by the "Florida State College for Women." By act of the 1947 Legislature, the institution again became co-educational as the Florida State University on May 15, 1947.


Growth and progress have always distinguished Florida State University. The institution has grown from a seminary consisting of three buildings and an enrollment of 150 to a university with a physical plant of 45 permanent structures and a student body of over 6,000. About 1,000 comprise the teaching and ad-

ministrative personnel. A "master campus plan" recently developed under the direction of President Doak S. Campbell will coordinate expansion for the next 50 years. Some of the buildings first designated in this plan, such as the new stadium, the music building and the maintenance building, have already been constructed.

Primary emphases at FSU are placed on a highly qualified faculty and staff, scholarship, personal interest in the individual students, a carefully planned curriculum and an efficient and beautiful physical plant.

The Florida State University has 14 major divisions—the College of Arts and Sciences, School of Education, School of Home Economics, School of Music, School of Library Training and Service, School of Journalism, School of Business, School of Public Administration, School of Social Welfare and the Graduate School, School of Nursing, Home Demonstration School, Air Force & Ordnance ROTC.

Courses leading to masters degrees are provided in 36 areas, and for the doctorate in Education, Psychology, Marriage and Family Living, English, Home Economics, Modern Languages, Music, Speech, Botany and Chemistry. Extension service is offered in all fields in cooperation with the General Extension Division.



Rubber Game Coming Up



The Miami-Purdue football series comes to a temporary close after next Friday night when the Boilermakers invade Miami. Two years ago, they came down to whip Miami 14-0

but last year, Miami made its first invasion of a Big Ten stadium a winning one by getting a revenge victory 20-14 just one week after Purdue had ended Notre Dame's long winning streak 28-14, biggest score ever made against a Frank Leahy Notre Dame eleven.

Stu Holcomb and Andy Gustafson, warm personal friends and former coaches together at the Army, are naturally keen rivals on the field and each will be going all out for this one.

Purdue, with 18 lettermen returning, is green in interior of its line both offensively and defensively. The fine showing against Texas indicates that great progress has been made on the defensive side of the picture and failure to score on the Longhorns is no indication that the offense is weak. Kentucky, with one of the nation's high powered offenses, could only get six points on Texas. At that, Purdue made one stab to the Texas 5 and later fumbled away the momentum of another drive on the 19.

Three great ends spark the Boilermakers, Leo Sugar and Bernard Flowers on the left side and Darrel Brewster on the other side. Sugar is one of the nation's best defensive ends. Brewster is an exceptionally fine pass catcher and often plays defense as well as offense.

Only one letterman returns at tackle, 214 pound Billy Bruner but of 10 other candidates, the lightest weighs 200, the heaviest 235.

A couple of lettermen return at guard with husky newcomers available also. No center won a letter last year and this spot is uncertain. Dale Samuels, Purdue's passing sensation last year, is now a tried and true junior. Samuels gained 1089 yards for Purdue on his passes a year ago and fired 10 touchdown passes during the season, one of the better records in the nation. Last week, Texas became the third team to keep Samuels from throwing a touchdown pass but the Longhorns are the No. 1 defensive team of the land to date.

Veteran backs include Mike Maccioli, a favorite target for Samuels; John Durham, Phil Klezak, Earl Henninger, Donald Kasperan and Norman Montgomery. A fine sophomore fullback, Daniel Pobojewski and the younger brother of last year's fine fullback, John Kerestes, Louis, will play a lot of football for Purdue.

The Boilermakers have a trio of capable punters in Norman Montgomery, Earl Henninger and Thomas McNamee. The latter is also a good passer as is Roy Evans, a highly touted sophomore prospect.

Purdue, which lost to Texas 34-26 last year, dropped a 14-0 decision to the same club in its 1951 opener. Texas, playing in its second game, was much more poised and forced the Boilermakers into three costly fumbles. The fumbles cost Purdue two touchdown drives, while a third drive was halted by the Texas defense on the five. The third Purdue fumble set up one Texas touchdown while a 15 yard interference penalty deep in Purdue territory set up the second score.

The Boilermakers play Iowa this week and should erase the sting of a 33-21 loss last year. Should they do so, they'll be very tough to handle here next week.

It's An Upset . . . **When A Favorite Wins**

★ Football's budding 1951 campaign has already stamped itself as one in which upsets of other years will be repeated on an even more widespread scale and already the alignment of ratings of future Miami foes has altered sharply. Where some of the enthusiastic were, but a few days back, dividing Miami's foes into a healthy group of 'sure to lose to Miami' and the smaller 'probable victories,' plus a varying but meager list of 'possible' victories 'but might lose,' there is a growing conviction that this year, as usual, the games will have to be won or lost, from week to week, out on the football field. With Kentucky twice defeated and many another power-house temporarily off the lines, it looks like a wild merry-goround from now on in.

Florida State, Miami's opponent tonight, got away to a handsome 40-0 start over Troy in what was little more than a controlled scrimmage for the Seminoles. Tulane, which biffed our Hurricanes last Saturday, will get a stiff test from Baylor this week. The Bear's short passing game may bother the Greenies and this is a toughie. Baylor can win if it cuts down on the kind of bobbles which gave Tulane so many openings last week.

Purdue, Miami's next foe, was as liberal as the 'Canes last week in fumbling four times and allowing several pass interceptions. Texas cashed in on two of the errors for touchdowns and used others to halt Purdue drives. The Boilermakers look very rough and should crack into the victory column over Iowa this week.

Washington-Lee, with a 1-1 record to date, meets an unbeaten West Virginia eleven in what should be a tight affair. However, the Generals, with their brilliant Gil Bocetti at

quarterback, will be favored to win all the close ones on the basis of his passing and generalship.

Ole Miss which invades the Orange Bowl Oct. 27, takes on Boston college in Memphis. Coach Vaught has done a great job in moulding his best balanced team in recent years as his win over Kentucky indicates. Though Vaught's men may hit a mental slump this week, they should still have enough left to turn back the invaders.

Kentucky, with a 1-2 record, is going to explode pretty soon for the Wildcats have had some bad breaks to date. However, they face an up and coming Georgia Tech team this week and will be very hard pressed to avert their third loss in a row.

Chattanooga was booked as a stiff scrimmage foe for the week between Kentucky and Florida. The Mocs, with a near veteran outfit bolstered by some fine freshmen and top notch transfers, are off to their best start in years. They've a 3-0 record and have rolled up 124 points to 13 for their foes. This week they should take a fairly rugged Evansville foe to keep on rolling.

Florida, after two wins, succumbed to hitherto hidden line weaknesses in losing to Georgia Tech 27-0. However, the Gators should roll over Loyola in California this week. The Westerners, green this year, have a fair offense but are weak defensively and Haywood Sullivan should regain his stride after two bad outings in a row.

Nebraska isn't going anywhere until Bobby Reynolds gets back but even the all-sophomore Husker backfield should be able to outscore Kansas State which has played two games without tallying a point.


A year ago, a series of calls from the Marine Corps wrecked the Pitt backfield. Now the Panthers have regained two backs and a lineman from the service, have picked up a choice sophomore or two and last week gave Duke fits before losing 19-14 in the last minutes of action. The Panthers journey to Bloomington to face the remnants of what was supposed to be an improved Indiana squad. The Hoosiers were derailed by Notre Dame last week and may not get back on the track in time to avert defeat No. 2.




★ JIM DOOLEY, senior right halfback from Miami, is 6 feet 4½ inches tall and weighs 198. He is the team's fireman, being a great defensive player as well as a top ground gainer at either halfback on offense. He proved that last year when, shifted to left halfback against Florida with one week's practice, he gained 147 yards on the ground for a record for the Florida-Miami series. Jim is a powerful runner, yet has worlds of speed. He's an excellent pass receiver. He topped the team in ground gained last year with 532 yards, averaging 5.4 yards per carry. He caught 10 passes for 127 yards and intercepted five enemy heaves. He'll average at least 50 minutes per game in the big ones, judging from his similar performance in 1950.

★ NICK CHICKILLO, junior offensive left tackle from West Scranton, Pa., is 5 feet 11 inches tall and weighs 212 pounds. This fall he is rated the most improved man on the squad and whereas in 1950 he did not play enough to win a letter, he has taken over the left tackle offensive post this season. He has a fine charge and his steadily improving blocking is devastating. Nick is also a pretty fair guard and could handle that position very well should the need arise. He is one of those lads who needs a bit of time to find himself but now that he has hit his stride, Miami can be sure of two fine seasons at left tackle from him.

★ ED LUTES, offensive left end from McKeesport, Pa., is in his second year on the University of Miami football squad and the 6 foot 21/2 incher is a first stringer. A year ago last spring, Lutes demonstrated that he was something out of the ordinary as a pass receiver but he was rated behind 6 foot 6 inch Ralph Fieler, team captain at the start of the 1950 campaign. However, Fieler was injured early in the season and Lutes, playing before home town fans from McKeesport when Miami tangled with Pitt in Pitt stadium last fall, moved in to stay. He caught two touchdown passes in that game and added two more before the season ended. He grabbed one from Bob Schneidenbach to gain 78 yards in the Orange Bowl game, a record for that classic, and set up a Miami touchdown. In all, he caught 15 passes for 285 yards and his 15 receptions for part of one season has been exceeded by only seven former Hurricanes in their entire playing careers. Only Tom Jelley in 1950 and Paul Hildreth on the 1944 war time team are ends who caught more passes in one season. Lutes is not tremendously fast but has an amazing ability to work free and snare the ball on a dead run or grab it when surrounded by defenders.

★ LEO O'BOYLE, 6 foot 2 inch sophomore from Dunmore, Pa., was all set for a year of seasoning as understudy to Ed Lutes at left end for Miami when the right end offensive post was thrown open as Tom Jelley decided to try out for a pro football job. Other left ends couldn't make the coaches forget the prowess of Jelley, a mighty blocker and greatest pass catcher in Miami history. O'Boyle, three inches shorter and 40 pounds lighter with two year's less experience, is no Tom Jelley and may never be as great but he is making a very sound start in that direction. He can block and he is a reliable pass receiver. He is fast, big enough to make his presence felt and seems headed for great things.

★ WILLIAM DIAMOND, 185 pounder who stands 6 feet 2 inches tall, is another of the light, scrappy but tremendously fast lads the Hurricanes have up front. The McKeesport junior was written off the books in the spring of his freshman year when just before the spring drills opened, he suffered a serious fall. He showed up for fall practice, however, quickly proved himself to be a diamond in the rough and after a typically tempestuous battle, shoved bigger and more experienced men off the starting team to annex the No. 1 right guard post. Now with experience to put along-side his speed and fight, he's a valued member of the Hurricane front line.
