IN THE PRESSBOX

Welcome to Doak S. Campbell Stadium, football fans! Consider yourself an honored guest in the home of the Florida State University's Seminoles, one of the nation's youngest and fastest developing football teams.

This is the third year that Dr. Don Veller's Seminoles have played their home games in this handsome 15,000-seat steel structure, surrounded by the ample parking space, thoughtfully provided for your convenience.

During those first two years here in Campbell Stadium a home game meant a victory for the Garnet and Gold Indians because in that 1950-51 stretch the Seminoles flattened 10 straight opponents out on that chalk striped sod.

The question which arises as FSU swings into its 1952 schedule is "how long can this Campbell Stadium charm hold good?"

This is the season, you know, when the Seminoles really test their football wings against rugged opposition.

In an effort to bring you fans a better brand of football than you've enjoyed here in the past, Florida State signed to meet six opponents, Louisiana Tech, Louisville, VMI, Mississippi Southern, Furman and Tampa.

That's a rough job for any club that is still several steps away from being called a real power. And it's particularly rugged for a University entering only its sixth year of intercollegiate football in the modern era.

Just to keep the record straight, all of the Seminoles' tough games aren't at home. On the road they are tackling North Carolina State, Stetson, mighty Georgia Tech and Wofford. No wonder the wrinkles on the forehead of "Doleful" Don Veller are deeper this season.

Just for a minute, let's take a look back and check the records.

This Seminole team you're watching in action now is the fifth that Florida State has fielded under the capable direction of Dr. Veller, who frequently groans in anguish about his prospects, but always manages to come up with a hard-hitting spirited crew that runs and passes from a solid single wing formation modernized by several features and tagged with the name "Cockeyed T."

Veller, who was brought in here after FSU lost all five of its games in an abbreviated 1947 schedule, takes what Nashville Banner Sports Editor and football authority Freddie Russell calls "the top record in college football" into the current season. During his four years at State Veller's teams have won 30 times and lost only four. One of those wins was over Wofford in Tampa's Cigar Bowl on January 2, 1950.

One of those four defeats was at the hands of powerful Miami in 1951 while the Hurricanes were enroute to a bid and an ultimate victory in the Gator Bowl!

The only other losses the Seminoles have suffered under the skilled Veller, who played his football and obtained his doctorate at Indiana University, were a defeat at the hands of Erskine in 1948, an upset by Livingston State in 1949 and a similar setback by Tampa in the season finale in 1951.

In addition to his won and lost record, Veller has already produced four Little and Middle All-America players at Florida State during his coaching span here. Tackle Hugh Adams was Little All-America in 1948; Guard Jerry Morrical a Middle All-America in 1949; Guard Bill Dawkins a Little All-America selection by the Associated Press in 1951, and this year's Co-Captain, End Curt Campbell, a Middle All-America selection in 1951.

The difference in the "Little" and "Middle" selections lies entirely with the selectors who use varying classifications for schools and schedules when selecting their players.

So much for the past. How about looking ahead at the future?

The outcome of the six games here will, of course, be decided on the field of play and any forecast is a shaky one on the scores. But win, lose or draw, you should see good football here this season.

Some of the fans who sat with you or near you in the past have perhaps grumbled about the lack of opposition, the Seminoles' high-scoring tendencies or other complaints which fans automatically are entitled to once they purchase their tickets.

Judging by the records of the six teams you'll see here, you shouldn't hear any of that talk in the stadium this season.

VMI was co-champion of the Southern Conference last year. Mississippi-Southern won the Gulf States crown. Louisiana Tech is supposed to be loaded up with some fancy freshmen and sophomore talent. Furman has been playing teams in Florida for years and either beating them or scaring the daylights out of them before losing. No one ever underates Louisville since the Kentucky club held Miami to a tie to spoil an otherwise perfect regular season record for the Hurricanes in 1950. And Tampa, well, the Spartans showed their class in the Cigar City last year when they up-ended the Seminoles 14-6.

If the opposition isn't rough here this season the most surprised man in the stadium will be Dr. Don Veller. Watch him pacing the sidelines if you don't believe it.

Come back as often as you can this season, and keep an eye cocked on the Seminoles in the future. They're bringing bigger and better football to you each season, and your support is helping them improve the caliber of the teams they play.

Mississippi Southern

The 1952 football season could well be the year of destiny for Mississippi Southern of Hattiesburg, Miss.

The Southerners have two of the best running backs in the country and they are primarily a junior-senior studded combine. Pie Vann's charges racked up five straight victories after bowing to the powerful University of Alabama, 20-6, in the season opener.

Fullback Bucky McElroy and Halfback Hugh Laurin Pepper at mid-season had raced for 700 and 680 yards respectively, and barring injury both stand an excellent chance of joining the 1000-yard rushing club, one of the most exclusive lodges in the country.

Impressive wins over Memphis State and Chattanooga were included in the five straight wins and the Southerners were sure-shot favorites to trim Northwestern State prior to their invasion of Tallahassee and their eighth test in a strenuous 11-game campaign.

With both Miami and Mississippi Southern losing 14-point decisions to Red Drew's vaunted Crimson Tide, it would appear that these teams would be natural rivals to meet somewhere for the mythical independent championship in the Deep South—provided, of course, the Southerners continue to roll.

The Florida State-Southern series seems a natural rivalry, for both colleges have made magnificent progress since the end of World War II. The Seminoles quickly outgrew the Dixie Conference just as the Southerners dominated the Gulf States Conference. So now both are independents and they are both looking upwards.

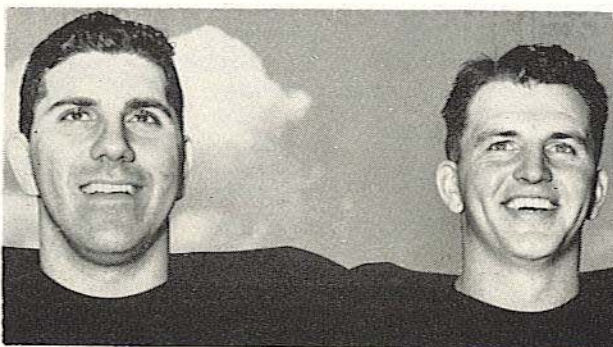
While McElroy and Pepper are the wheelhorses of the Southern attack, they are not by any means the team's only standouts. Defensive ends Jackson Brumfield and Richard Caldwell are regarded as fine a pair of defensive flankmen anywhere. Veteran guards Pat Ferlise, the Birmingham Strong Boy, and Ed McDaniel, the Kentwood Commando, are fine team men, who operate best when the chips are down. Reliable Ray Nobles and J. T. Shepherd have filled in the huge tackle vacancy caused by the graduation of Phil Musmeci, the Little All-American tackle, and Jack Fulkerson.

Elmo Lang and Bob McKellar are dependable senior offensive ends, who are fine blockers and excellent pass receivers. Howard Lehman and John Neill are particularly effective when blocking down field and Johnny Meeks, Leo Herrmann and Soddy Lasley are capable varsity men of the first order.

Billy Jarrell handles the signal calling and when not handing off to Pepper or McElroy, gives the pigskin to the Pensacola warhorse, Tony Rouchon, a nifty stepping half-back, who racked up three touchdowns and gained 189 yards against Tampa.

The 1952 Southerners offer class, color and ole time team play and determination. Alabama set a new conference fumbling record by miscueing no less than a dozen times and seven were recovered by the alert Magnolia Staters. They play the game hard, give little quarter and ask for none in return.
