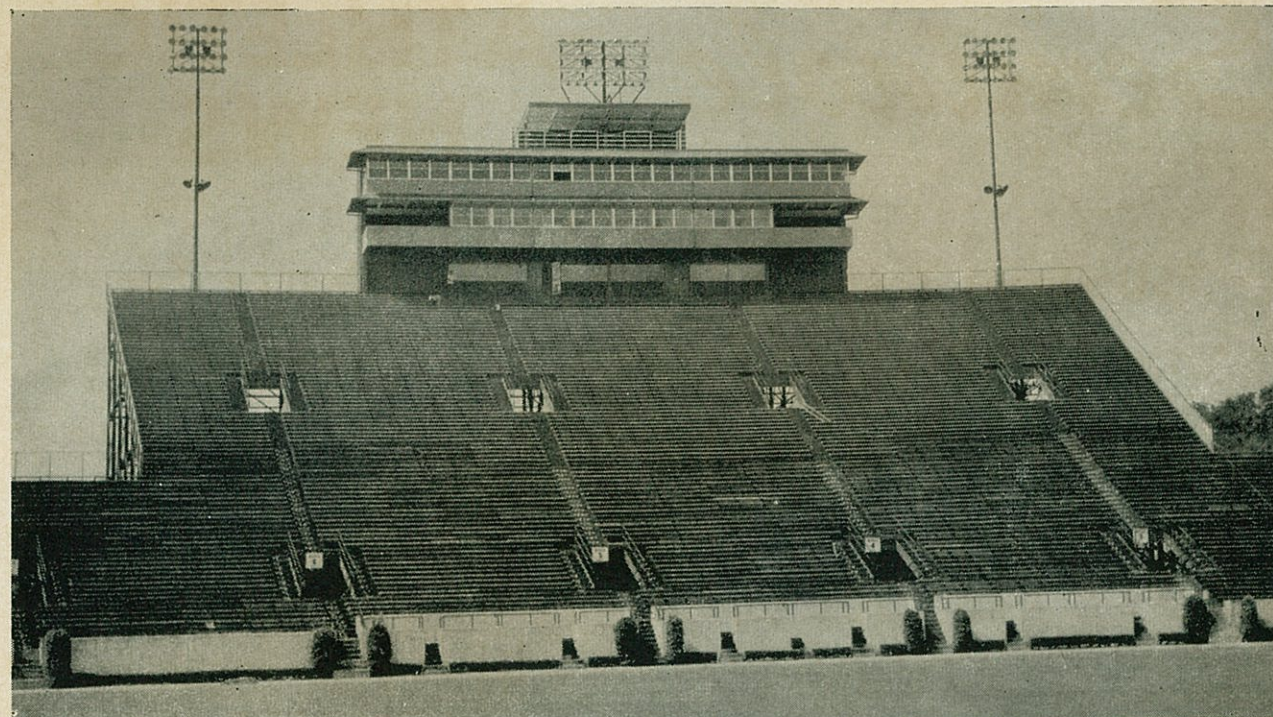

FSU Opens Toughest Schedule With 'Unseen' Foe

Florida State football coach Bill Peterson has become known as a forthright, straight-shooting man in his one and a half years in Tallahassee. Exhibit A was found recently in an article he wrote as tonight's 1961 opener approached with George Washington University:

"I don't believe anybody could blame me or my coaching staff this week," he wrote, "for feeling a lot like the fellow who decided to go bear hunting — but didn't have any idea what the bear looked like . . ."

To paraphrase a bit, Peterson was establishing a fact which has caused considerable worry around the Seminole camp: Nobody knows exactly what to expect out of George Washington's Colonials in tonight's opening game at 8 in enlarged Doak S. Campbell Stadium.

In the first place, there's a new coach at GW: Jim Camp, for several years an assistant under Murray Warmath at Minnesota. New coaches bring new ideas, so an opponent must overlook the team's previous way of doing things. And secondly, the FSU staff hasn't even been able to take a look at the "new" George Washington system. The teams were supposed to swap films of their respective spring training games, but FSU's film turned out bad and there was no swap.

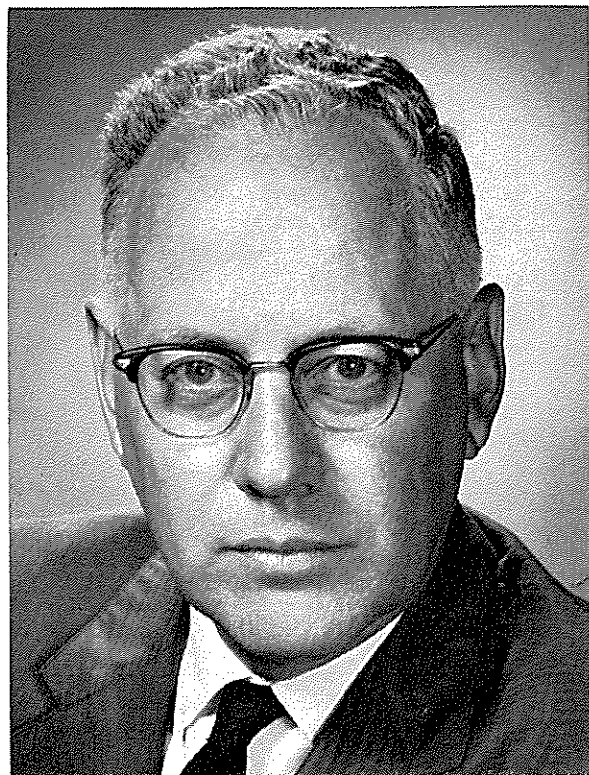
This much, however is known about the Southern Conference Colonials: They'll play a tough defensive game (last year's team, from which 13 lettermen return, gave up only 14 points in its last five games); they'll have good passing from quarterbacks Bill Hardy and Frank Pazzaglia; and they'll get good running out of halfback Dick Drummond and fullback Jim Johnson.

The Seminoles, says Peterson, plan to pass even more than they did last year, when FSU averaged 20 aerial tries per game. This is due to the presence of junior quarterbacking wizards Eddie Feely and Ed Trancygier and receivers-par excellence Tom Hillabrand and Jim Daniel. The running of soph fullback Gene Roberts should keep GW's defense honest.

The President . . .

DR. GORDON W. BLACKWELL

Dr. Gordon W. Blackwell, a 50-year-old social scientist and native of South Carolina, is the president of Florida State University.

The former chancellor of the Woman's College of the University of North Carolina is the third president for Florida State since the institution, more than 100 years old, became a coeducational university in 1947. Dr. Doak S. Campbell and Dr. Robert M. Strozier, who died April 20, 1960, were the others.

Dr. Blackwell is a native of Timmonsville, S. C., the son of a Baptist minister. He grew up in Sparantonburg, S. C., and in 1932 was graduated summa cum laude from Furman University where he was a varsity tennis player for three years. He is a member of Kappa Sigma fraternity.

He was awarded the M. A. degree by University of North Carolina in 1933, working while there as a research assistant. He was awarded the Ph.D. by Harvard in 1940.

After research work with several government agencies from 1933 to 1936, Dr. Blackwell joined the faculty of Furman and served from 1937 to 1941. He joined the faculty of the University of North Carolina at Chapel Hill in 1941 but left soon thereafter for two years of war service as community organization specialist in the Office of Civilian Defense.

He returned to North Carolina in 1944 as a professor and director of the Institute for Research in Social Science, and in 1955 was appointed Kenan Professor of UNC.

A former co-editor of the journal, "Social Forces," Dr. Blackwell is the author of several books and numerous articles in his field.

The Vice President . . .

DR. MILTON W. CAROTHERS

Dr. Milton W. Carothers calmly took over and held the University on its course as acting president following the tragic death of President Robert M. Strozier.

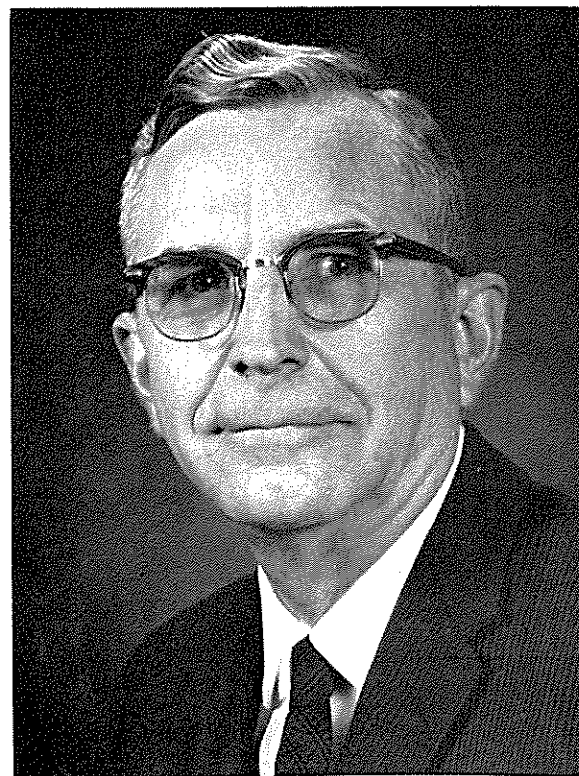
At that time, the 62-year-old native of Newbern, Ala., had been with FSU for 17 years. His first job here was as registrar at Florida State College for Women. In 1946, when the Tallahassee Branch of University of Florida was set up at FSCW to take care of an overflow of male students, Carothers was placed in charge of the Tallahassee Branch.

After FSU officially became coeducational in 1947, he was selected as first dean of the Graduate School. In 1958, he was appointed associate dean of the faculties and later was named vice president.

Before entering the administrative ranks in higher education, Carothers had a long record of service in public school work. After getting a degree from the University of Alabama, he served as school principal at Carlowville in 1919, and then at Selma, Ala. He left Selma in 1927 for Tampa where he served for five years as principal of Plant High School and five years as supervising principal of Tampa schools. From 1937 to 1942, he was director of the Division of Instruction in the State Department of Education.

He has served as president of the Florida Education Association and twice has been elected president of the Florida Association of Colleges and Universities. He also has been president of the National Association of Directors of Teacher Education and Certification and of the Southern Conference on Teacher Education.

Dr. Carothers is a camellia-grower, collects old glassware and china, and loves deep sea fishing but is a little behind on it.

A senior member of Florida's system of higher education, Florida State University seeks to provide significant educational opportunities to greatly increasing numbers of promising students. Enrollment has risen from 6,442 only six years ago to an anticipated 9,500 this fall of whom about 1,500 will be graduate students.



ing Mathematics, Meteorology, Statistics, and the Computing Center. The last is being equipped with the first large-scale, high-speed electronic digital computer (IBM 709) in Florida's educational institutions.

Now under construction is a million-dollar building to house the Institute of Molecular Biophysics. Funded by the Atomic Energy Commission, this Institute draws together scientists from several departments in a research program directed toward an examination of life on the molecular level, using the methods of chemistry and other physical sciences.

Strong programs are offered at Florida State University in all of the basic arts and sciences and in professional schools of business, education, home economics, library science, music, nursing, and social welfare. The Graduate School offers master's degrees in each of these fields except nursing, and doctoral degrees in more than 25 disciplines.








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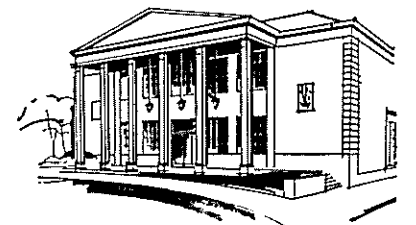
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The Athletic Director... VAUGHN MANCHA

Not many persons have enjoyed such a varied and successful career as Vaughn Hall Mancha, who has devoted un-estimable time and energy to athletics as a player, coach, teacher, and administrator.

Practically as legendary in Alabama football circles as Don Hutson, and Harry Gilmer, Mancha began his present pursuit as director of Florida State's seven-sport program of intercollegiate athletics in November, 1959. He has tackled his newest role with all the fervor that characterized the performances that made him a 240-pound All-Southeastern Conference center at Alabama for four seasons (1944-48) and everyone's All-American center.

Mancha, who gained wide popularity with FSU officials and fans while serving as line coach from 1952 through 1956, returned to FSU as athletic director following three years at Columbia University as an assistant football coach and associate member of the Department of Physical Education.

Born in Sugar Valley, Ga., in 1921, Mancha moved to Birmingham at an early age. He entered Alabama in 1944, when he was issued jersey No. 41, a number Alabama's football opponents tried to dodge for four years. During Mancha's four seasons, Alabama rolled up a 30-9-2 record and played in three major bowl games. Vaughn was a starter when the Crimson Tide met Duke in the 1945 Sugar Bowl, Southern Cal in the 1946 Rose Bowl, and Texas in the 1948 Sugar Bowl.

He was such a standout in the '45 Sugar Bowl that he was named to the All-Time Sugar Bowl team (1945-52 period). In 1955, he was named to Alabama's All-time Crimson Tide.

He sandwiched in a year of play with the professional Boston Yankees (1948) while earning BS and MA Degrees at Alabama. In 1949, he accepted an appointment as head coach and athletic director at Livingston (Ala.) State, where he put in a highly-successful three-year tenure.

Mancha first came to Florida State in 1952 as an assistant football coach and an assistant professor of Physical Education. In 1957, he left for Columbia, where in addition to his teaching and coaching duties he completed all work for the Doctorate with the exception of the dissertation.

The Head Coach... BILL PETERSON

When personable Bill Peterson was named Florida State's fifth modern-day head football coach on Dec. 7, 1959, one of his first statements went something like this:

"We have to build pride and the will to win at Florida State, and we're going to do it."

Peterson inherited a demanding schedule and a predominantly sophomore squad for his first season as a college head coach. After a Texas hatfull of wrongway bounces and a deceiving 3-6-1 finish, FSU followers are convinced that Peterson has the Seminoles headed in the right direction. Three of the six Seminole losses in 1960 were by a total of six points. With 11 points spread in the right spots, FSU's record would have been 7-3.

What impressed Seminole fans most was the ardor and vivaciousness with which Peterson's first Florida State team went about its task, a full-speed demeanor that mirrored another Peterson comment:

"Good team morale is more important than a good system of play. You don't put on morale like a good suit of clothes. If you have proper morale, you'll win some games that you aren't supposed to win."

A former offensive line coach at Louisiana State University, Peterson is an intense, dedicated worker who has a talent for blending personal warmth and wit into just the right mixture for the occasion.

Throughout his coaching career, he has been associated with success. A 1946 graduate of Ohio Northern University—he was a standout end and captain in his senior year—he coached high school teams at Forest, Wapakoneta, and Mansfield, O., to a combined 51-22-3 record over 10 years. Two of his Mansfield elevens won Ohio state high school championships.

In 1955, Peterson was the only assistant coach that LSU's Paul Dietzel brought with him to the LSU campus. Peterson was credited with obtaining many of the players who boosted LSU into college football top ranks.

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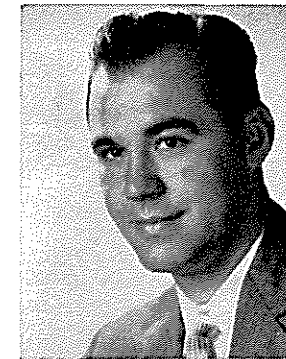

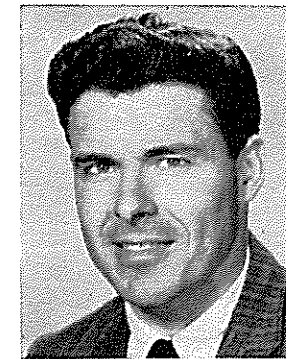

THE FSU COACHING STAFF

DICK FLOWERS, a native of Mobile, Ala., is in his third season on the FSU football staff. A graduate of Alabama, where he was a first-team tackle from 1945-48, Flowers played in the 1945 Rose Bowl and 1947 Sugar Bowl games. He was an assistant coach at Alabama in 1949-50 and at LSU in 1951-52. He coached one year at Live Oak, Fla., High School (1953) and was out of coaching in 1954 before taking over as head coach and athletic director at Gainesville, Fla., High School.

BOB HARBISON, in terms of longevity, is the real veteran of the Seminole coaching staff. Harbison is in his 14th season. In his playing days, Bob was an outstanding guard for the late Bo McMillin at Indiana University from 1945-47. A native of Evansville, Ind., Harbison came to Florida State in 1948. He is credited with developing Little All-America linemen Bill Dawkins in 1951 and former Seminole coach Hugh Adams, in 1949.

KEN MEYER is in his second season as a member of the FSU staff. He joined the Seminoles prior to spring practice last year after serving two years as an assistant coach at Wake Forest and six years as backfield assistant at Denison University, Granville, Ohio. Meyer was a standout halfback at Denison for three years. During his first two seasons, Denison compiled a 19-game winning streak under Woody Hayes, now head coach at Ohio State. Ken was born in Erie, Pa., but attended high school in Ashtabula, Ohio.

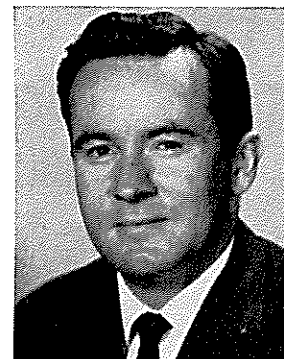
JOHN COATTA, one of the sharpest passing quarterbacks in Big Ten history, came to Florida State two years ago from Wisconsin. He was an assistant coach with the Badgers for four years. A native of Dearborn, Mich., Coatta was a passing whiz for Coach Ivy Williamson at Wisconsin from 1949-51. In 1950, John set an all-time Big Ten pass completion record with a .642 percentage. He was named to the All-Big Ten and All-Midwest honor teams following the 1951 season.

DON JAMES has packed a lot of football experience into his 28 years. The Massillon, Ohio, native came to Florida State last year from Southwest Miami High School, where he was backfield coach in 1957 and 1958. Don was an outstanding high school quarterback at Massillon, playing under Chuck Mather and leading Massillon to two state championships. He set passing records as a quarterback for the University of Miami (Fla.) in 1952 and 1953.

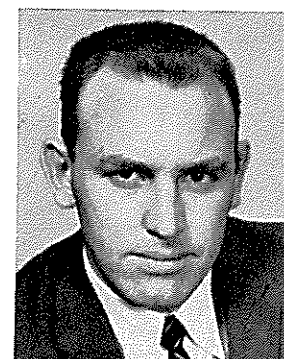
VINCE GIBSON, one of the toughest guards in Florida State's relatively brief football background, is a comparatively new varsity coach. Vince, who served as assistant freshman coach in 1959, had the knack for recovering fumbles and slipping through to block punts when he performed for the Seminoles in 1954 and 1955. Following his graduation from Florida State, Vince became line coach and basketball and track coach at South Georgia College. He is a native of Birmingham, Ala.

BUBBA MCGOWAN has the distinction of being the first person to have coached at both the University of Florida and Florida State University. A former left halfback at Florida—he played as a freshman and sophomore under Bear Wolf and as a junior and senior under Bob Woodruff—McGowan was Florida's freshman backfield coach in 1952. The Dothan, Ala., native coached the Fort Jackson, S. C., Army team in 1953-54 and was track coach and football assistant at Gainesville High School from 1955-58.

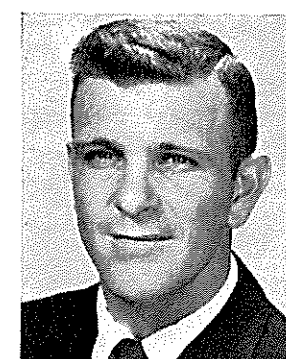
CHARLIE LaPRADD, second oldest member in terms of service on the FSU staff, is in his third year as head freshman coach. The former All-America tackle at Florida (1952) led FSU's frosh to a perfect 4-0 season in 1959 and a 5-0 mark in 1960. A native of St. Augustine, Charlie was graduated from Florida in 1953 before serving in the Air Force. He was a graduate assistant at FSU in 1956 and became a full member of the staff in 1957.

3. ILLEGAL MOTION—Offensive player illegally in motion when ball is snapped—Loss of Five Yards.
4. ILLEGAL SHIFT—Failure to stop one full second following shift—Loss of Fifteen Yards.
5. ILLEGAL RETURN of substitute not previously disqualified—Loss of Fifteen Yards.
6. ILLEGAL DELAY OF GAME; Taking more than four times out during either half (except for replacement of injured player)—Loss of Five Yards. Team not ready to play at start of either half—Loss of Fifteen Yards.
7. PERSONAL FOUL — Tackling or blocking defensive player who has made fair catch; Piling on; Hurdling; Grasping face mask of opponent; Tackling player out of bounds, or running into player obviously out of play; Striking an opponent with fist, forearm, elbow or locked hands; Kicking or kneeling—Loss of Fifteen Yards (Flagrant offenders will be disqualified.)
8. CLIPPING—Loss of Fifteen Yards.
9. ROUGHING THE KICKER or holder—Loss of Fifteen Yards.
10. UNSPORTSMANLIKE CONDUCT—Violation of rules during intermission; Illegal return of suspended player; Coaching from sidelines; Invalid signal for Fair Catch; Persons illegally on field—Loss of Fifteen Yards. (Flagrant offenders will be disqualified.)
11. ILLEGAL USE OF HANDS AND ARMS by offensive or defensive player; Defensive holding—Loss of Fifteen Yards.
12. INTENTIONAL GROUNDING of forward pass—Loss of Five Yards Plus Loss of Down.
13. ILLEGALLY PASSING OR HANDING BALL FORWARD—Loss of Five Yards Plus Loss of Down.
14. FORWARD PASS OR KICK CATCHING INTERFERENCE—Interference with opportunity of player of receiving team to catch a kick—Loss of Fifteen Yards. Interference by member of offensive team with defensive player making pass interception—Loss of Fifteen Yards Plus Loss of Down. Interference by defensive team on forward pass—Passing Team's Ball at Spot of Foul and First Down.
15. INELIGIBLE RECEIVER DOWN-FIELD ON PASS—Loss of Fifteen Yards.
16. BALL ILLEGALLY TOUCHED, KICKED OR BATTED—Forward pass being touched by ineligible receiver beyond the line of scrimmage—Loss of Fifteen Yards from Spot of Preceding Down and Loss of a Down. Eligible pass receiver who goes out of bounds and later touches a forward pass—Loss of Down. Illegal touching of kicked ball within opponent's ten yard line—Touchback.
17. PENALTY DECLINED; Incomplete forward pass; No play or no score.
18. CRAWLING by runner—Loss of Five Yards. Interlocked Interference—Loss of Fifteen Yards.

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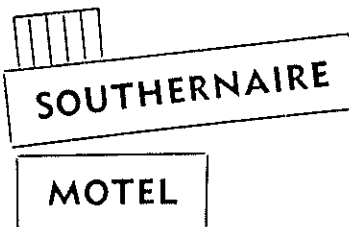
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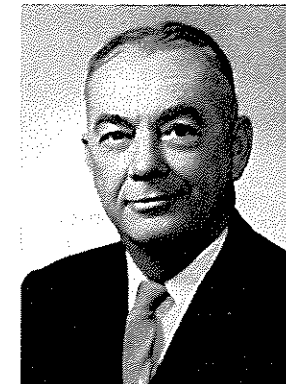

The network is sponsored by Tenneco Oil Company with some 15 stations forming the basic portion of the network. Other stations are added, with the number varying with each game.

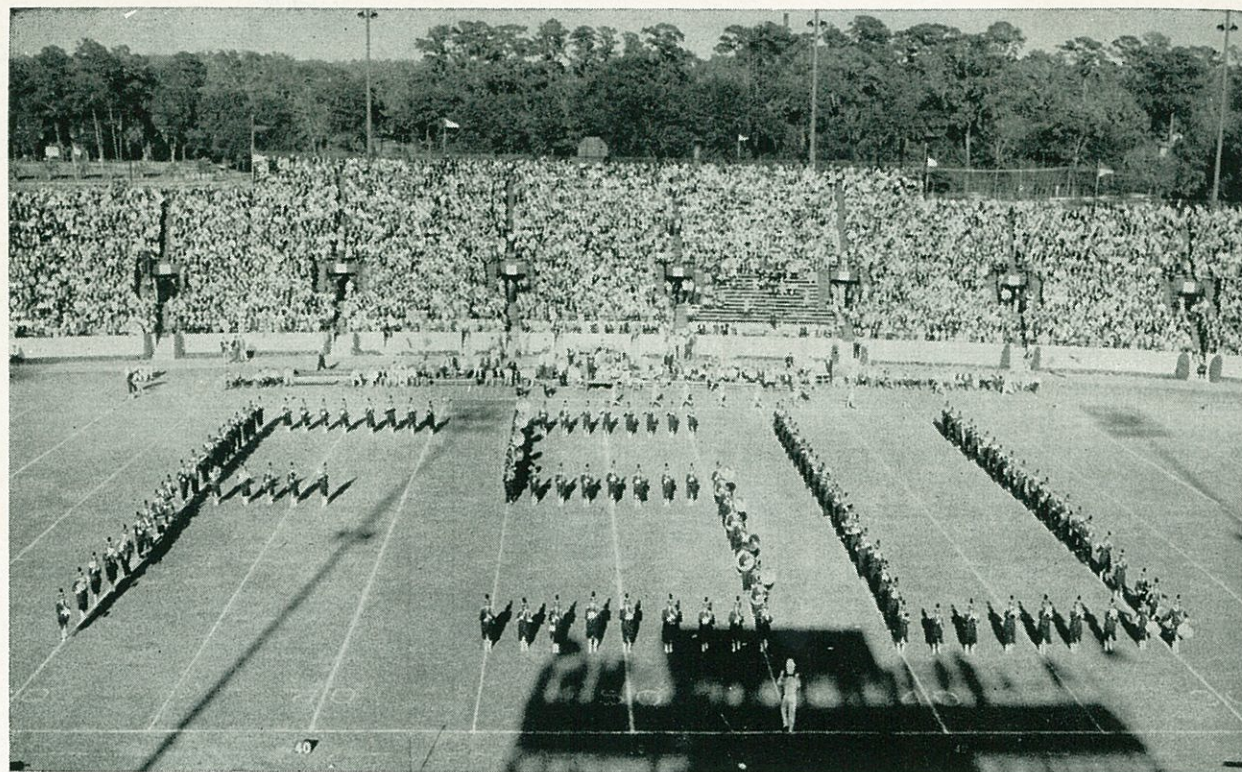

FSU Cagers Set for Best (and Toughest) Season

Florida State basketball coach J. K. (Bud) Kennedy is about ready to harvest the fruits of nearly 15 years of labor.

"This is going to be the best ball club I've ever had at FSU," Kennedy says about his 1961-62 Seminoles, who'll open their season on Dec. 2 with all five starters returning from the team which last year won 14 and lost 10.

The fly in the ointment, though, is the fact that this season's schedule is far and away the toughest ever tackled by an FSU cage team. It begins with the defending NCAA champion, Ohio State, and includes eight games with Southeastern Conference opponents.

Kennedy is still optimistic, however, and it's mainly due to the presence of 6-6, 200-pound forward Dave Fedor—a lanky senior who was recruited while playing high school basketball in Germany and whom Kennedy "wouldn't trade for anybody in the South."

Fedor, who averaged 19 points and 14 rebounds last winter and could very possibly be FSU's first basketball All-America, is a co-captain along with senior Ray Swain. They are joined by five more of the eight players who managed to upset mighty Kentucky last year in the Wildcats' backyard in Lexington. (Only three other teams have ever done that.)

Says Kennedy, who's had his two best freshman teams back-to-back: "We're ready to play with the big folks now."
