
New Look At Auburn University

HOME ECONOMICS BUILDING—(at right) The School of Home Economics now is using this building which is the first designed specifically for home economics at Auburn.



Graduate Study-Key To Progress

THE HIGHLY TRAINED men and women who study and do research in Auburn University's graduate program, to a considerable degree, hold the key to Alabama's continuing progress.

The growth in graduate instruction at Auburn is clearly evidenced by the fact that 2,372 graduate degrees have been granted in the past decade. Two hundred seventy-eight of those degrees were awarded in 1963. Since the first doctorate was awarded in 1955, Auburn has awarded a total of 106 doctoral degrees. Graduate Dean W. V. Parker reports that 1,081 students now are enrolled in graduate study.

The first graduate degree was awarded in 1870 when Howard M. Hamill was awarded a Master of Arts degree while the institution was still known as the East Alabama Male College.


New Graduate Areas of Study

When the current fall quarter began, Auburn initiated doctoral programs in English and in electrical engineering. In 1962 two new doctoral programs, physics and mechanical engineering, were initiated with the new master's degree programs in aerospace engineering and business administration.

Multi-disciplinary graduate programs with the National Aeronautics and Space Administration and the U.S. Public Health Service now are in progress or are awaiting final approval. The NASA grant, supporting the three-year program which began this fall, is for approximately \$147,000.

Fellowship Recipients

FELLOWSHIP RECIPIENTS attending Auburn have increased during the past year, a period

that found graduate training programs supported by the U.S. Public Health Service continued in the departments of animal science and physiology and pharmacology. The department of animal science also had one USPH postdoctoral fellow and one fellow of the Alabama Heart Association.

Included in the Graduate School's administration of 43 fellowship programs during the year were the National Defense Education Act (27), National Science Foundation (6), S. Allen Edgar (3), and others (7). The Annual Report shows that stipends on these programs amounted to \$114,000 for the year.

Auburn offers the Master of Arts degree in three areas, the Master of Science degree in 32 fields and the specialized Master's degree in seven areas. The doctoral degree is offered in 16 different areas.

The Greatest Auburn Game I've Ever Seen

It has been a cold November Saturday, now the sun was lost back of the giant West stands at Birmingham's Legion Field. The football players ran in shadows as the last minutes of the Auburn-Miami game came on, and the wind was a knife down on the sidelines. This, surely, was a football game lost. Auburn had been a team moving toward greatness under Shug Jordan in 1953. Surely 1954 would be better. But it wasn't.

Florida beat the Tigers. So did Kentucky. So did Georgia Tech. Chattanooga, Florida State and Tulane were Auburn victories, but this wasn't enough.

And now Miami had the Tigers on the ropes, for the nationally-ranked Hurricane had scored on a 11-yard pass in the second quarter, and a 53-yard run by Mario Bonofiglio in the third. Bobby Freeman, the great Auburn quarterback, had broken through to block the extra point kick after the second score, and that was about all good that had happened for Auburn this icy afternoon.

It was the fourth quarter. Miami drove again. But eight minutes, 49 seconds from the finish, the Tigers got them stopped. George Atkins, M. L. Brackett, Jack Locklear, Jim Pyburn rose up and threw them back.

On the sidelines, last rites were held in a hurry for the X-Y, two-team system, which had worked so well the season before. Now, Jordan gathered his best ones all together and sent them forth to salvage something.

From the 29, Joe Childress, Fob James, Hoppy Middleton and Freeman and friends set forth. Freeman, whose passing hadn't been sharp, went on the ground now, driving his team up the middle, Childress and Middleton weren't stopping.

Miami reeled back under this ripping, tearing ferocity. Auburn was at the 50, the 30, and the 20, then Middleton slammed 14 to the three, and Freeman scored from there. Childress stepped back and kicked the extra point. Now it was 13-7, but the clock was speeding.

Auburn kicked off, and Miami was at the 29. If Miami could hold.

But Miami couldn't. Bonofiglio was separated from the ball on the 27 and Frank D'Agostino leaped upon that prize. Defeat was written on Miami faces, in Miami posture now. This was a team which seemed to know it was about to lose, and Auburn lined up with the fire of victory in Auburn eyes.

Middleton ran nine yards, then Childress seven, then four.

Freeman knew the horse to ride. He called on Childress once more and Ole Joe from Robertsdale was on the three when they dragged him down.

The next time, Joe Childress wasn't stopping for anyone or anything in the whole, wide world. He saw an end zone.

Tiger blockers had opened the door. Childress went in.

And no one had any doubt at all about what would happen next.


They lined up for the extra point. Childress back there to kick it. And Childress did so.

On his greatest afternoon as an Auburn fullback, Childress, the All-American, had 29 times with the football. He gained 164 yards, and Auburn won, 14 to 13, starting back up the road which was to lead, by 1957, to a National Championship.

I've seen a hundred Tiger football games or more, up and down the South, at Cliff Hare Stadium, Legion Field, Grant Field, on a hundred Autumn Saturday afternoons.

But the greatest of them all for me must be the one they played on the cold afternoon in Birmingham in November, 1954 when the shadows were long, and the wind was a knife, and Auburn's Tigers came marching toward greatness.

Eight minutes, 49 seconds to play, they were beaten. Then they weren't. And no one who saw it ever could forget.

On a one-day visit you are tested and interviewed by a trained counselor to help determine your best area of study. You will also have the opportunity to visit in the department of your interest. If you would like to take advantage of this service, contact the Student Counseling Service, Auburn University.

Auburn's Ten Schools


AFTER you have received guidance in determining your area of study, you will be interested in the wide choice of curricula available.

Auburn offers you academic training in ten schools, including the Graduate School. Listed below are the number of fields in which you may specialize in each school.

School of Agriculture—Agricultural administration, agricultural engineering, agricultural science, biological sciences, forestry, and ornamental horticulture.

School of Architecture and the Arts—Architecture, interior design, industrial design, visual arts, building technology, dramatic arts, and music.

School of Chemistry—Chemistry, chemical engineering, and laboratory technology.



School of Education—Preparation in elementary, secondary, and special education and opportunities in administration, supervision and guidance, and psychology.

School of Engineering—Aerospace, civil, electrical, and mechanical engineering, aeronautical administration, industrial management, textile management, and textile science.

School of Home Economics—Clothing and textiles, foods and nutrition, home management and family economics, family life and early childhood education, and nursing science.

School of Pharmacy—The five-year curriculum prepares students to become registered pharmacists.

School of Science and Literature—Curricula are designed to lead students to specialization as businessmen, accountants, statisticians, secretaries, mathematicians, physicists, linguists, journalists, historians, and sociologists, and preprofessional instruction is given to prospective lawyers, dentists, and doctors.

School of Veterinary Medicine—A six-year curriculum leading to the degree of Doctor of Veterinary Medicine.


Life at Auburn

Facts About Entering Auburn

IF you decide to come to Auburn, you will need additional information.

Admissions—Applicants must now present a satisfactory high school record in college preparatory courses and attain a satisfactory score on the American College Test. Specific admission requirements may be found in the Auburn catalog in your principal's office, the library, and your counselor's office.



Housing—You should contact the Head of Women's Housing for women's dormitory residency, or the Manager of Magnolia Dormitories for men's dormitory residency. Housing information for off-campus residency and for married students may be obtained by writing to the Student Affairs Office.


Expenses—Minimum costs for each school quarter at Auburn are: University fees, \$75; room and board, \$180; laundry (optional), \$18; books and supplies (estimated), \$27; total, \$300. Out-of-state residents pay an additional \$100.

Financial Aid—Many scholarships and loan funds to aid worthy students in meeting their University expenses have been provided by civic organizations, business concerns, and individuals. Further information may be secured by contacting the Student Financial Aid Office.

Students in the engineering curricula, physics, mathematics, and business administration may participate in the Cooperative Education Program.

How A Veteran Sports Writer Feels About Coach Jordan

Where do you find a finer gentleman than Ralph (Shug) Jordan? You don't! He's in a very select group of people, who enjoy the warmth and friendship of all whom they meet.

I can make such a statement with all sincerity, having known Ralph Jordan for over 30 years as athlete and coach.

You would get the same appraisal of Auburn's head football coach if you were to question hundreds of intimate friends and casual acquaintances, starting with his high school days in Selma, Ala.

Talk with his former teen-age associates in Selma, fellow students and athletes at Auburn, World War II buddies, hundreds who have served under him as coach, and his associates in the coaching profession. All will tell you quickly, "They don't make 'em any finer than Ralph Jordan."

Although quiet and unassuming, Ralph has been a fierce competitor all of his life. He played to win. In victory he was gracious; in defeat he was the good sport, but never satisfied. These traits, coupled with natural ability as a leader, were to put him in good stead for a position in the coaching profession.

After serving as assistant at Auburn, with the Miami Seahawks and at Georgia, Ralph was recalled by his alma mater in 1951 as head coach. It was a challenge. The school's football fortunes were in a state of almost complete collapse. The Tigers had just gone through a winless season and three previous teams had won a total of five games. But Ralph accepted the challenge with the dedication that had marked his career as athlete and assistant coach.

Since then Auburn has enjoyed phenomenal

success. Going into today's game, the Tigers have compiled an 89-35-4 record under his leadership, with a national championship in 1957.


A lot of excellent traits have combined to make Ralph Jordan a fine head coach at Auburn—loyalty, optimism, ambition and a captivating personality to name a few. But the key to his success probably is the fine treatment accorded his athletes. As long as they do their part there isn't anything he won't do for them. And he never embarrasses them in public. If a reprimand is in order it is carried out on the practice field or man-to-man, but never in print.

And if a player becomes physically unable to continue football due to injury or some other ailment he remains on scholarship. Thirty-five such players, most of them eliminated by aggravated injuries suffered in high school, have remained on scholarship during the past 13 years, even though they made little or no contribution to Auburn's football program.

Although held in high esteem by many, Coach Jordan's popularity among sportswriters, telecasters and broadcasters is unsurpassed. A newsman is always welcomed in his office. Interviews are always easy and fruitful. Never a pessimist, he has words of hope no matter how dire the circumstances. Information volunteered or divulged in answers to questions is always accurate. Through his willingness to cooperate in releasing news material, the Auburn mentor has the confidence and admiration of men working with the various news media throughout the nation.

Again I say Ralph Jordan is a fine gentleman, an outstanding coach and a credit to Auburn.

We're proud of TV and thankful for the contrast in diginity, sincerity, humbleness, and leadership shown to us each Sunday on football replays.

Thanks for company, friends, and relatives for eating ALL the thanksgiving turkey.

Speaking for all little boys, thanks for sports. Footballs, baseballs, and basketballs may clutter the house or yard but they never do the damage of idleness and delinquency.

While we're hopeful for a bowl game this year, be thankful that the National Champions of 1957 didn't have to gamble their legend on one more outing.

As alumni, friends, students, and fans, we are thankful for a football team like we have today.

I'm thankful that Alumnus Wilton Kilgore and his lovely wife get such a kick out of watching son Jon perform.

We take pride in saying that Auburn has a team of which we can be proud, and our team has a University of which they are proud.

Auburn—A Growing University

AUBURN University, with the largest on-campus enrollment in the State of Alabama, has experienced its most phenomenal growth over the past 20 years, most of it within the past decade.

The goal at Auburn of teaching the principles of science and their application to the needs of agriculture and industry is unchanged, but rapid strides in technological fields and the liberal arts have highlighted recent growth.

Enrollment Growth

TODAY, with a total of 9,819 students studying in Auburn's ten schools, enrollment has increased two and one-half times over that of 1940, and by almost 40 per cent in the last ten years.

On the basis of the American College Test, one of the admission standards, Auburn's freshman class as a whole is far superior to the average college-bound student in Alabama. They compare favorably with the average collegebound student nationally and far surpass national averages for last year's high school seniors.

Approximately 550 faculty members teach students at Auburn. At least 250 of them hold the doctoral degree, a percentage that compares favorably with other colleges and universities on a national average.

Graduate Study and Research

THE master's program at Auburn extends to almost every field of study and the doctoral program leads to terminal degrees in 16 areas. During the 1962-63 academic year alone, 20 doctoral and 258 master's and specialist's degrees were awarded.

Professors go beyond the area of teaching in a university. To keep their students current with new developments, they engage in continuing programs of research.


Auburn's organized research expenditures amount to approximately \$5 million annually, or one-fourth of the annual operating budget.

Physical Plant Growth

AUBURN'S physical plant value has nearly doubled in the past five years with more than \$18 million available for new buildings and other expansion. The major building program began with passage of Amendment Five in 1957 and gained impetus through the \$100 million bond issue of 1959. Friends and alumni contributed \$2,594,000 for buildings and equipment and student housing was expanded through loans from the Housing and Home Finance Agency.

Auburn Serves Alabama

THROUGH its three divisions—instruction, research and extension—Auburn serves the entire State of Alabama. The instruction prepares students for future careers. Research is conducted through the Agricultural and Engineering Experiment Stations, the Auburn Research Foundation and at the graduate level in all academic fields. Results are transmitted to citizens through the facilities of the Agricultural Extension Service and the Engineering Extension System. All divisions participate in off-campus services through the Auburn Educational Television Department which provides one-third of the programming over the Alabama ETV network.
