



Yet the opportunity and the challenge are golden; for what Florida can do in the next six years will insure its development for a century beyond.

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
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
THE STATE'S MOST VALUABLE resource — young brainpower — has been multiplying beyond the wildest predictions accorded two postwar baby booms. To meet this new demand for college education will take more classrooms and more teachers in the next six years than the state has provided in all of its history up to now.

UNIVERSITY BUDGET REQUESTS ARE FOCUSED on the future. They're big; but enrollments are bigger, and will continue to grow. The number of college students in Florida has doubled in the last decade, and will more than double again by 1970. Yet the percentage of state revenue allocated to higher education has declined in the last 10-year period.

Educational costs are increasing in direct proportion to the increases of man's sum total of knowledge; and man's store of facts and discoveries is growing at an unprecedented pace. Doubled in the first half of this century, doubled again between 1950 and 1960, and again by 1965, history waits for no one. Florida's last chance to catch the main stream has come.

HIGHER EDUCATION MEANS HIGHER INCOME, and the dividends of statewide development will exceed any amounts invested in the education of today's young people. The types and depths of quality education for modern careers are the changing, and costly, factors of the times. Florida's national lag in per capita income will only be overcome by increases in per capita education — education designed for modern technology, space industry, and scientific frontiers. Each new college graduate will take home \$170,000 more in his lifetime than the average high school graduate. Florida's total economy gains as its educational levels go up.

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




For Higher Education

FLORIDA'S FUTURE IS TAKING SHAPE ON ITS COLLEGE CAMPUSES, where the concepts of tomorrow are being drawn in classrooms, laboratories and auditoriums all too few for the size of such projects. An excellent start has been made in the establishment of four new state universities and the passage of a major bond issue for construction on these and older campuses in the state. Yet the growing backlog of construction requests dates back to 1957. It will take an additional \$118.5 million in the next two years to expand the system's physical facilities to accommodate the influx of students and the implementation of vital research.

GRADUATE RESEARCH PROGRAMS ARE THE KEYS TO STATE PROSPERITY. Undergraduate depth and advanced accomplishment are the guidelines by which good citizenship becomes leadership. Florida needs both in larger quantities, and much sooner than its presently underfinanced institutions of higher learning can produce them. Faculty and research personnel of the highest calibre must increase in numbers 125 per cent by 1970, if the state's proposed master plan for a coordinated system of junior and senior colleges, and senior universities is to be effective and productive.



# Dividends From Diversity



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
TO EACH UNIVERSITY ITS OWN MARKS of distinction! That is the guiding philosophy which will make Florida's coordinated system of higher education uniquely successful and economical in the long run.

Encompassing all areas of the state, Florida's new network of universities will serve many diverse needs in its urban sites and its suburban regions. Yet each will answer the dictates of statewide demands for brainpower, manpower and cultural advancement with its own specialized courses and methods of study and research. Constructive initiative will supercede rivalry as a systemwide prestige develops.

SEVEN STATE UNIVERSITIES MOVING IN unison toward Florida's social, scientific and economic benefits must be ready for 86,252 students in six years' time. The state's 29 junior colleges must be prepared for another 97,000 students in the same span of years. Graduate education and research programs must meet the corps of 10,350 students who will be seeking advanced degrees and opportunities to develop new industries and create new jobs.

Florida's total sphere of development — the physical, mental and economic health of generations to come — hinges on higher education's progress in the next six years.

# The View From Above By BILL BUNKER Sports Publicity Director Florida State University



Florida State and Florida have met six times before, but never has the game had the national flavor it has today.

When one of the nation's top offensive teams meets one equally prominent defensively, something's got to give, as the saying goes.

The potent Seminole offense has rolled up 3078 yards in nine games. The Florida defense has given up only 1226 yards in seven games. On the other hand, a tenacious Florida State defense, headed by the "Seven Magnificents" has given up only 1567 yards in nine games.

The Florida State offensive punch is spearheaded by rangy Steve Tensi, one of the nation's top passing quarter-backs. Tensi has completed 110 passes out of 182 attempts for 1493 yards and 13 touchdowns. His favorite targets are Fred Biletnikoff and Don Floyd, two seniors who rank as the top pass receivers in Florida State history. Biletnikoff has caught 55 passes for 909 yards and ten touchdowns, Floyd has 34 catches for 471 yards and one TD.

This combination will face a Florida pass defense which ranks number one in the country, having given up only 364 yards passing all season. The alert Gators have intercepted 12 opponents' passes.

This is not to say that the Gainesville neighbors are devoid of offensive power. If anything, this ranks as one of Florida's top attacking teams of all time. Sophomore quarterback Steve Spurrier handles the controls which send Larry Dupree, Jack Harper and Allen Poe cracking behind a traditionally powerful Gator line.

Lonesome end Charles Casey is the best pass receiver in Florida history, and has caught 34 for 478 yards and four touchdowns this season.

In addition to his running and passing duties, Spurrier ranks high nationally with over a 40 yard punting average, an extremely important factor when coupled with the outstanding Gator defense.

Florida State, with a 7-1-1 record, is already assured of its best season since 1950 regardless of the score this afternoon. However, the Seminoles are still looking for that important first victory over Florida, and there could be no opportunity so fitting as this first game in the friendly atmosphere of Campbell Stadium.

Those of you lucky enough to be here are about to see what may be the greatest football game in the history of the State of Florida. Remember, win or lose, good sportsmanship is always the best policy.


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# FLORIDA STATE BASKETBALL

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
