






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TODAY'S COVER: Gator co-captain Harvin Clark is a bug on reworking old cars, but none of his products have looked any better than this 1929 model decorated with Florida cheerleaders. This is the 14th meeting between Florida and FSU in a series which began in 1958. The Gators lead the series, 10-2-1, and have won the past three meetings.

Last FSU victory came in 1967 when Kim Hammond came off the bench to hit two long bombs to All-America receiver Ron Sellers in a 21-16 game.

Biggest margin of victory was in 1969, when the sophomore combination of John Reaves to Carlos Alvarez propelled the Gators to a 15-point bulge at 21-6. FSU's biggest margin was nine points in 1964, when the Steve Tensi to Fred Biletnikoff combo put the Seminoles on top in Tallahassee, 16-7, for the first victory in the series for FSU.

This game, over the past few years, has produced some of the finest aerial shows and passing combinations in college football. FSU fans can recall the Tensi-Biletnikoff, Hammond-Sellers groups and the Gators fondly remember the days of Steve Spurrier to Charlie Casey, Spurrier to Richard Trapp, and Reaves-Alvarez.

Last year's meeting at Tallahassee saw the Gators jump out to a 38-7 lead behind Reaves' passes and then

have to fight for their lives in the final quarter as Gary Huff came off the bench to move the Seminoles down the field as rapidly as he could get his hands on the football.

Huff and Reaves both rank among the leading passers in the nation this year and this is as good an indication as any that this FSU-Florida game is likely to follow the same pattern as most of the recent ones in the series.

Losing streaks tend to make you a tad humble and send you, mentally, in search of anything humorous to help break the strain, or ease the pain.

Last Saturday night in Baton Rouge the WRUF crew which originates Florida's radio network was perched in a booth whose previous occupant had placed on the door a sign saying "Humble Radio Network."

Late in the fourth quarter of the 48-7 loss, Bob Leach of WRUF got up, eased across to the door and, in black magic marker, wrote at the beginning of this sign just one word. It was "VERY".

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
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When Harvin Clark was 12 years old his father, ex-pro boxer Carroll Clark, went out and purchased a 1928 Model A to be used as a beach buggy by the family.

'It was always breaking down," Harvin recalls. "I sort of received on-the-job training as a mechanic because I wanted to keep the beach buggy running and there just

wasn't anybody else to make the repairs."

From this began an interest which has developed into an avid hobby for the Gator defensive back and co-captain of the 1971 football team. Clark has reworked many old automobiles and turned a profit with each one he's sold.

"I've been able to move slowly up to better and better cars." he says. "I buy an old car, completely rework it and then sell it and use the profits to buy a little better car."

Harvin now owns a pair of old cars, a 1929 Ford station wagon and a 1928 two-door Ford sedan, for which

he traded an autographed football in 1969.

"We were practicing for the Gator Bowl game in Daytona Beach and I noticed this old car on top of a bar across the street;" he said. "The car really caught my eye because it was something you could put some effort into and really come up with a fine old classic car.

"I eventually found out the car was owned by the man who owned the motel next door to where we were staying. It turns out the guy was a Gator football fan and we tried to work out a way for me to buy the car."

At this point some luck entered the picture.

"I drove up in front of his motel one day and had a football, autographed by the members of our Gator Bowl squad, setting on the front seat," Harvin said. "This man saw the football and he really wanted it bad. After a



discussion about what a precious item it was to me . . . we traded the ball for the car, even-up."

Harvin has purchased, rebuilt and sold 10 cars since he was 16, making money on each and, in turn, buying a better auto. He has become so adept and rebuilding old cars that people have started to express interest in sponsoring his work in car shows.


"This is something I would be interested in doing," he says. "Right now I don't think this is possible because of NCAA rules which prohibit an athlete from appearing to endorse any product. After my athletic career, however, I hope to get a car sponsored, really put some money and effort into it and show it at the car shows."

Harvin admits his hobby is time-consuming, leaving very little time for any recreational activities. His athletic efforts, therefore, are limited primarily to varsity football competition.

"I try to find time for other hobbies, but working on these cars takes up most of the spare time I can manage," he says. "It is satisfying, however, to take an old, beat up automobile and turn it into a car which runs and looks good, too."

Harvin's come a long way in the automobile field, from the days when he used to measure how much gas was left in his Model A with a crank to being a two-car owner.

And someday, when you see a beautiful classic car driving around painted like a Coca-Cola top, you'll know he's achieved his goal of reaching the "big time" in the car reconstruction field, that of having his product sponsored in car shows.

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



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

Doug Dickey, a 1954 graduate of the University of Florida, returned to his alma mater as Head Football Coach on December 30, 1969, bringing with him credentials as one of the nation's finest football coaches.

In seven seasons as a head coach he has compiled a record of 53-19-4, have five bowl teams, two Southeastern Conference championship teams and was named the league's coach of the year two times.

Dickey, 38, began his head coaching career at the University of Tennessee in 1964 and after an initial rebuilding year his teams ran up five consecutive seasons of eight or more wins, the only team in the nation to accomplish this over this period.

Dickey has spent most of his life on college campuses, having been born in Vermillion, South Dakota, home of South Dakota State University, where his late father, Dallas Dickey, was a speech professor. The Dickey's later moved to Louisiana State University and then on to the University of Florida.

Dickey went to high school in Gainesville and attended the University of Florida, where he played quarterback and guided the Gators to the 1953 Gator Bowl crown. His coaching career began in 1954 at St. Petersburg (Fla.) H.S., continued at Fort Carson, Colorado (1955-56), University of Arkansas (1957-63) and then to Tennessee and, eventually, Florida.

He is presently serving as Chairman, Campaign Fund, Florida Division, American Cancer Society.

Dickey is married to the former Jo Ann Beville and they have four sons, Don 15, Danny 14, David 12 and Darrell 9, and a daughter, Jaren Ann 4.



RAY GRAVES &

When Ray Graves stepped down as Head Football Coach at the University of Florida on December 30, 1969, he completed a decade unmatched by any previous Gator coach.

As Director of Athletics Graves provides the leadership to keep the UF athletic program in the position it attained during the 1960s, a period in which Gator athletic teams won a shade under 70 percent of their contests and captured the Southeastern Conference All-Sports Championship five times. His overall football mark of 70-31-4 is the best in school history.

Graves has seen Florida athletic teams, competing in eight intercollegiate sports, win one national championship (golf) and 15 SEC titles during his 11 years as Director of Athletics

As a coach, Graves left many contributions to the University and to the game of football in general. He is recognized as one of the originators in perfecting the shifting defense now commonly called the "Monster Defense." Graves perfected this defense while coaching the defense at Georgia Tech in the

STEPHEN G. O'CONNELL

On October 8, 1968, Stephen C. O'Connell, former Chief Justice of the State Supreme Court, was inaugurated as the sixth President of the University of Florida, the only alumnus and native Floridan ever to hold that prestigious office.

A 1940 graduate of the College of Law, O'Connell had distinguished himself during his student days as president of the student body and of Florida Blue Key, and as captain of the Gator varsity boxing team.

Following military service in the Pacific during World War II, O'Connell returned to the practice of law in Fort Lauderdale until called by former Governor LeRoy Collins to serve on the state's highest court.

In 1967 O'Connell, summoned by the Board of Regents to the service of his Alma Mater, returned to the troubled university as its president. Since the beginning of his tenue, many progressive changes have been effected, leading toward the fulfillment of President O'Connell's pledge to make the University of Florida "the best in the South and second to none in the nation".



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


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

UNIVERSITY FACTS

LOCATION

Gainesville is located in north-central Florida, about equidistant from the Atlantic Ocean and the Gulf of Mexico. It is 72 miles southwest of Jacksonville, 120 miles northwest of Orlando and 150 miles southeast of Tallahassee, capital of Florida.

HISTORICAL STATEMENT

In 1853 the foundation work of the present University of Florida was laid in Ocala when a small private school, East Florida Seminary, was opened. Florida Agricultural College was established at Lake City in 1883 and by 1905 six colleges were at least partially state-supported. With the passage of the Buckman Act in 1905, the University of Florida was established at Gainesville. There have been six presidents: Dr. Andrew Sledd (1905-09), Dr. Albert A. Murphree (1909-28), Dr. John J. Tigert (1928-47), Dr. J. Hillis Miller (1947-53), Dr. J. Wayne Reitz (1955-67) and Stephen C. O'Connell (1967-).

COLLEGES


The University's colleges are: Agriculture, Architecture and Fine Arts, Arts and Sciences, Business Administration, Dentistry, Education, Engineering, Health Related Professions, Journalism and Communications, Law, Medicine, Nursing, Pharmacy, Physical Education, Health and Recreation and University College. A College of Veterinary Medicine is being planned for the future. Schools are: Graduate School and School of Forest Resources and Conservation.

GENERAL INFORMATION

The University of Florida is one of the largest land-grant institutions in the South with nearly 2,500 faculty members and a student body of more than 22,000. Extensive building and modernization in the last 15 years has resulted in a physical plant valued at approximately \$200 million.

In addition to numerous special research projects in the various colleges, schools and divisions, the University has established a number of independent laboratories. These agencies carry on continuous basic research in the fields of engineering, science, agriculture, forestry, business, economics, public administration, communications and statistics, making significant contributions to private industry and government research.

A broad program in medical education, research and patient care is being carried out in the J. Hillis Miller Health Center. Expansion totaling \$42 million during the next three years will provide space to house the College of Dentistry and to accommodate more medical students.

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42 Seasons, 203 Victories, Teaching Character

Up a steep drive at 212 Young Street in Tallahassee sits the house with the pine tree in the furthermost room.

All around the pine tree at the base are white rocks and mostly-beige seashells. Covering the circular rim of the whole is a woven piece done in the bright orange and bright green of Florida A&M.

On the walls of the room are dozens of plaques and pictures. There seems no space for more. One picture shows the man of the house with Lyndon Johnson.

But the most striking part of the pictureplaque alignment is squarely in the center of the furthermost wall in the furthermost room.

At the bottom of that central display is a picture of a woman. Just above it is a picture of a man. And just above that is a little teddy bear . . .

It is obvious that this is the most special part of the room.

The woman is Jake Gaither's wife, Sadie. The man is Jake Gaither's father, a 6-foot-6 Tennessee preacher in his day.

And the teddy bear?

It came from George (Papa Bear) Halas, the owner-coach of the Chicago Bears, when Gaither lay long in bed with a severe foot ailment three years ago. Halas sent flowers, and in the middle was the teddy bear.

203-36-4

After 42 years of coaching football, after an extraordinary record of 203-36-4 through 25 seasons as head coach of the storied Florida A&M Rattlers, Jake Gaither retired from the game in January of 1970.

He remains with the Rattlers as director of athletics.

"Just say," says Gaither,, "that I am 65, because somebody has already printed that I was. Say also that I am going to stay 65 for a very long time.

It was Sadie who built the trophy room, not long ago. Jake shakes his head over it: "Cost a lot of money."

Sadie smiles and says: "It didn't cost you anything." . . . She cashed in an endowment insurance policy on herself to build the room.

She built it where there had been a concrete patio. The pine tree was already there. "Just build around it," said Jake. So she built around it, and sometimes the tree—70 feet tall—gets wet inside. Nobody worries about it.

Football Every Day

While Gaither has retired from coaching the game, the game won't retire from him. Every day is still football.

The phone rings and it's a head coach of a big Eastern university wanting Gaither to recommend "one of your players" as an assistant coach.

The phone rings and it is Bob Hayes wanting Jake's advice on this or that.

The phone rings and it is the White House or the NCAA wanting Gaither to serve on a committee.

The phone rings and it's somebody wanting him to make a speech.

A gifted orator, Gaither is extremely active with the Fellowship of Christian Athletes "and they're working me to death." He is on the President's Committee for Physical Fitness, and is on the NCAA Television and American Football Coaches Association committees.

Never far removed from Gaither's thoughts are "my boys," the former A&M players now in the pros, the ones in coaching, the ones who have become doctors, lawyers and business men.

Childless himself, he worries about some of his boys, thinking he has a greater feeling for particular ones.

"Some boys," he says, "just tug at your heartstrings more than others. It's just that way."

Sadie teaches freshman English at A&M. She has taught there since 1942.

The A&M gymnasium is named after Gaither. So is a city golf course—though he doesn't play golf—and a city street.

M-A-H

Once he declared that he liked his football players "mo-bile, a-gile and hos-tile." He also likes his players to get their degrees, to be notably aware—for all the merit of the game—that there is much more in life.

To a player once complaining about the practice-field heat, Gaither replied: "Yes, baby, that sun is hot. I've been trying to think of a way to put an umbrella over that sun just for you. But I want you to know one thing, baby—if you can practice and play under this Florida sun, you can play under any sun."

Invariably calling his players, "baby," making his points with occasional humor and rare sarcasm, Gaither tells how life is as he sees it.

"Baby, you ain't gonna dream any number," he said once, "you ain't gonna win any Irish Sweepstakes. You're gonna have to work for everything you get."

"Give me a boy on a football field, and I'll strip his soul. I'll tell you everything about that boy.

"You teach more character winning than losing.

"It is fourth down and goal to go at the two. We are going to run off tackle. I want that defensive tackle double-teamed. I want that halfback to take out the cornerback. And I want my fullback to take that football and charge with his knees high—up under his chin— and I want him to run up that linebacker's stomach and leave him flat.


"Now, you tell me you're gonna talk about character to that poor linebacker!"

. . . Traditionally, after every A&M home football game, the crowd gets together at 212 Young Street.

They wade through the food that Sadie was preparing all day Friday and most of Saturday. They fill every nook of the house.

Eventually, they'll make their way back to that furthermost room with the pine tree where a smiling Jake Gaither holds forth on the sofa.

And, chances are, somebody will ask him about the teddy bear.

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
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
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Students in the School of Forest Resources and Conservation do field work in the school's Austin Cary Memorial Forest. In keeping with the environmental emphasis, the School of Forestry changed its name this year, broadening the program to include new environmental management fields. Director John Gray says, "We are committed to educating resource managers who can interpret and apply fundamental scientific principles, new research findings and results of experience from a number of fields in management and protection of forests and related environments. This is the school's most vital contribution to Florida and the nation."





Through preliminary research on alligator farming, workers in the Institute of Food and Agricultural Sciences discovered a system to "fingerprint" or identify alligators and alligator hides. The method could put an end to illegal poaching of hides as the unique belly scaling of each reptile is photographed or otherwise recorded, allowing authorities to separate legitimately produced hides from those that have been poached from the wild.



Rhesus monkeys are similar anatomically and physiologically to humans and are involved in environmental studies. To learn more about ecological adaption a researcher in the Department of Anthropology is trying to determine the population size of Florida's wild monkey colony and the extent to which it has spread. The wild monkeys were brought to Silver Springs to take part in early Tarzan movies and the unique colony has increased and ranged from its original site.





The Department of Coastal and Oceanographic Engineering is closely allied with and responsive to the needs of Florida. Research facilities include an area for carrying out hydraulic model studies of coastal phenomena, two wave tanks in which the effects of waves on structures, sand motion, etc., can be investigated and a hydraulic tilting flume for basic studies of the interaction of flows with sediments.






University of Florida zoologists and biologists are noted for the studies of ecology, behavior and migrations of various species. Dr. Archie Carr's work with the marine turtle has been hailed by conservationists throughout the world. Dr. David Johnston currently is studying the pesticide content in migratory birds in order to determine if the migrant is an ecological link between sprayed fields and carnivorous birds on the endangered list.









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
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

"My desire . . . is that mine adversary had written a book." The prophet Job, surely an early Gator fan.

Few gridiron rivalries have blossomed so quickly as has the one re-newed today at Florida Field for the fourteenth time. By the end of its first decade this series was the subject of a splendid book (Let No Man Put Asunder by Julian D. Clarkson of Fort Myers), the locale of one of the most celebrated controversies in American sports (an incident needing no further identification), and best of all, the source of rugged football offered by nationally acclaimed players.

As the 1968 season opened, Florida partisans looked for what mentor Ray Graves in an unguarded moment at a Tallahassee alumni meeting predicted would be the "Year of the Gator." As it turned out, this expression borrowed from the Orient was not nearly as descriptive of reality as would have been Hank Stram's pungent reference to a Chinese fire drill. Unknowing, the old grads looked forward to high success. Few paid attention to the absence of a proven quarterback, the departure of star receiver Richard Trapp, and the perennial injured status of running back Larry Smith.

Of all the wounds to be avenged, foremost stood one rendered at the hands of the Florida State Seminoles. In 1967 on the strong arm of Kim Hammond and the magnificent receptions of Ron Sellers, they had defeated the Gators for the first time at Florida Field, 21-16. Despite the fact of a 7-2-1 lead in the series, it was an open secret that Florida spent considerable time in spring and pre-season drills preparing not for its first opponent, Air Force, but for its second foe, FSU.

The strategy all but backfired. Supposedly weak Air Force electrified 52,600 on hand for the first Gator game at Tampa Stadium before bowing 23-20. With this rather dismal start, and with FSU basking in the glow of a nine-game streak without loss (then longest in the nation) the outlook for the Gators was not bright. One who fully shared this view was the sports editor of the Tallahassee Democrat, Bill Mc-

Grotha, long time Gator hater, who in his Friday afternoon story, proudly bannered on the first page, led off with the pontifical observation, "Florida the pontifical observation, "Florida State will win the football game. Possibly without too much sweat." His characteristically "objective" analysis concluded with the classic observation, "There ain't no way, Florida!"

Such literary gems rarely emanate from coaches. Tribe coach Bill Peterson doubtless hoped McGrotha's observations would escape notice. Pete enjoyed no such luck. The restive Gators, bedded down in the nearby Florida stronghold of Perry were treated to frequent references to the story by their coaches, and to a typical Friday evening pep talk by Gene Ellenson, chief of the Gator defense, and acknowledged as a master of motivation. Ellenson, star Georgia lineman of the Sinkwich-Trippi era, and an authentic hero of the siege of Bastogne, was the genius who guided the Florida defense in the Graves decade. His success against the fabulous defense of the wily Peterson is legendary: in ten games FSU under Peterson scored only ten touchdowns against Graves and Ellenson. In four of these games the Seminoles did not score a touchdown, and only once did they score more than two.

However, the 1968 game was billed as a clash between the offense of Florida State led by the great All-American Sellers and the Florida offense led by All-American and three-time All-SEC back Smith. It was not to be. It was a day for the men up front and the defensive secondary. For Florida the heroes were All-American to be Steve Tannen, who limited Sellers to an ineffective six catches for 50 yards, monsterman Jack Burns, guard Bill Dorsey, and tackle Jim Hadley, who batted down five Gary Pacjic passes. Old Volunteer Graves grinned when Tom Kelly of the St. Petersburg Times later wrote, "Somewhere General Robert Neyland must be smiling."

The Gators struck in the second quarter. Sophomore Jack Youngblood (a future All-American and with Smith and Sellers, one of three future first round pro choices in the game) booted a 30 yard field goal. A weak FSU punt then set up a short Florida drive. Smith carried seven of eight times and catapulted into the end zone from the three with two defenders holding on. Walt Summer, now of the Cleveland Browns, blocked the conversion, and Florida led 9-0.

The Seminoles, aided by a 33 yard pass from Pacjic to Warren drove to the Gator four. Three shots by Bill Gunter and Tom Bailey, now of the Philadelphia Eagles, found FSU at the three, rebuffed by great plays of Burns and Hadley. Grant Guthrie booted a field goal, and it was 9-3, Florida, at the half. No one would have believed the scoring was done.

A vicious defensive battle moved to the fourth quarter. After a short punt to the Florida 43, Peterson inserted quarterback Bill Cappleman. A key pass to Sellers, hard running of Gunter, and a personal foul penalty moved the Seminoles to the Florida four, with first and goal. Peterson lifted Sellers to go with a two tight end goal line offense. Gunter in two tries moved to the one. On the big third down Burns and Dorsey stopped Gunter for a two-yard loss. Cappleman was low on a pass to end Chip Glass, also now of the Browns, and the Ellenson defense had held. A final flurry of action remained, but the troops of Big General capable assistants lack Thompson and capable assistants Jack Thompson and Don Brown had kept their goal line again inviolate. The ferocity of the game was such that at the end the departing gladiators left the game ball lying limply at the last scrimmage line.

Although mischievious Florida alumni later had a plaque presented to a sur-prised McGrotha in front of fellow Tallahassee Quarterback Club members, expressing gratitude for his help, few of them, or anyone else, doubted that this day belonged to the Gator defense and its coaches. For Gene Ellenson, silver haired orator, aficionado of poetry, and wizard of the chemistry of challenging the young, it was another test met and overcome. On this day as his old rivals come to Gainesville, we salute him with that esteem and affection reserved for the great.

Next week is Homecoming. That day we shall recall the first time the Gators defeated one of the top ten, and an unlikely award of the Lambert Trophy.




This year he's over the \$50,000 mark in earnings and has been in the top 10 seven times this year.



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

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
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
