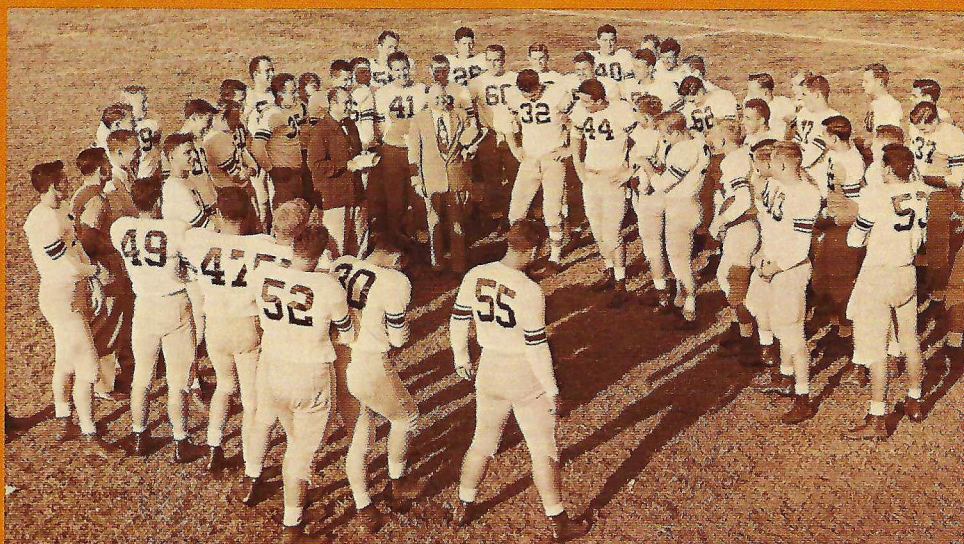

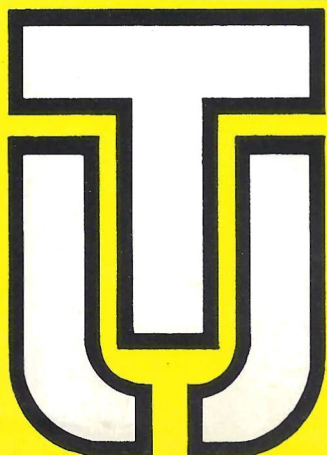

Florida State University is a study in contrasts, its palm trees and oaks shading charming old buildings with Gothic spires and striking contemporary structures of brick and steel.

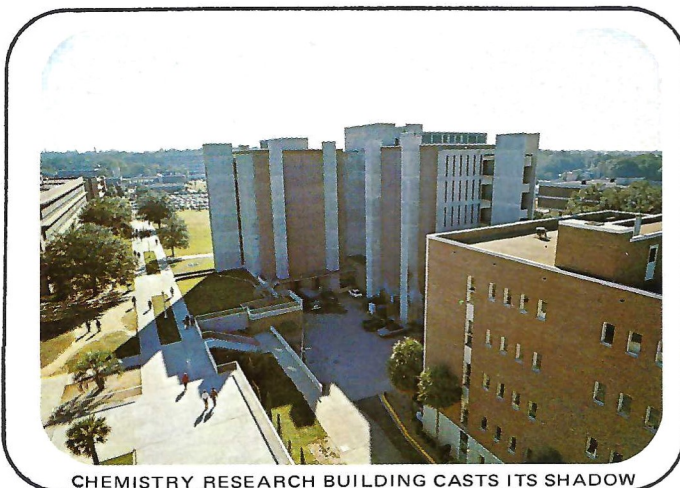
Its history dates back to 1857, when the state legislature named it the Seminary West of the Suwanee. Later it became Florida State College for Women but in 1947, that venerable institution became coeducational Florida State University and a growth spurt started that hasn't stopped yet. Enrollment this year has topped 21,000.

The University has a total population larger than many towns. Add the staff of over 7,100 employees, including some 1,300 faculty members and you have a nearly 30,000 members of an active, vital community.

Contract and grant expenditures for 1974-75 for research and training at Florida State amounted to \$17,285,000. The University has an operating

budget of \$81 million, which includes state, federal and private sources.

The University's 14 schools and colleges include Arts and Sciences, Business, Social Sciences, Criminology, Communication, Nursing, Work, Library Science, Home Economics, Theatre, Law, Music and Visual Arts. In these fields there are 52 doctoral programs, more than 80 bachelor's and master's programs.

Florida State was one of the first universities in the nation to have its affirmative action program approved by the U. S. Department of Education, and Welfare. The University aims to build a community in which all are equalized and uses its facilities and resources to develop the skills and talents of the members of all groups so they may play significant and productive roles in society.

Florida State football fans are looking to the 1975 season with a high degree of optimism.

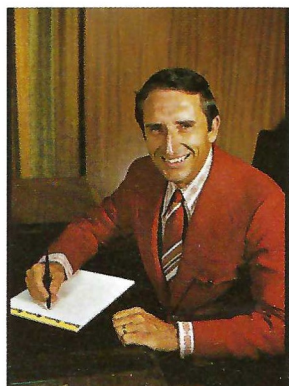

be described as a dream come true.

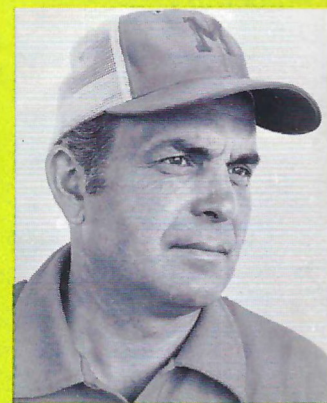

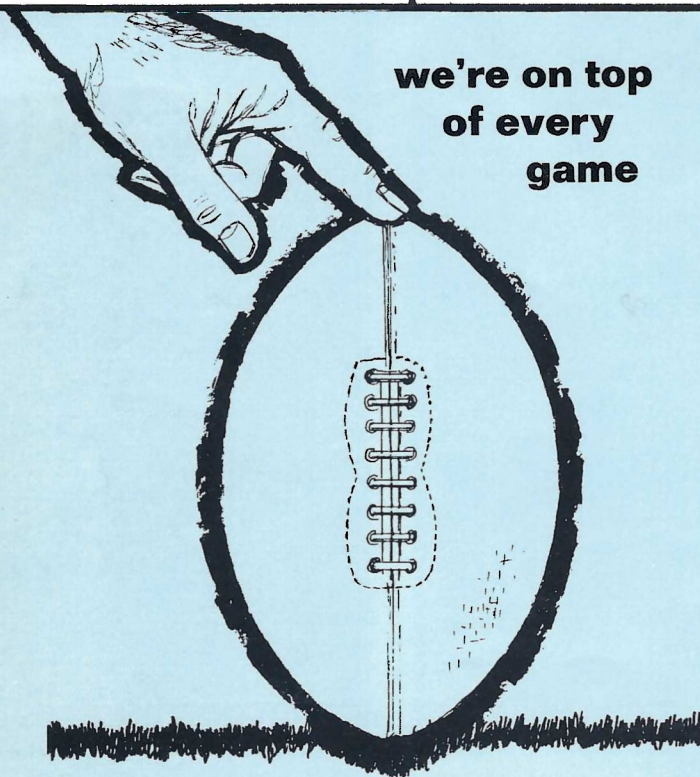

# SATURDAY NIGHT

What a SEMINOLE SATURDAY NIGHT it must have been—that cold November evening in 1950 after the Seminoles had just put the crowning touches on their only unbeaten, untied season.

Although the Seminoles were "red hot," the weather was not for that season finale. Game time temperature never reached the freezing point and was listed anywhere from 12 to 28 degrees, depending on the source. Florida State was facing a rugged Tampa team that was seeking revenge for a loss inflicted the season before.

The score was 13-7 in favor of the Seminoles at the half, but Tampa tied it going into the fourth quarter. The Tribe was not to be denied its "place in the sun" though and Florida State erupted in the final stanza for a 35-19 victory.

"If we had any sense at all, we would have called the game off," recalled former Florida State Coach Don Veller. "The old water tower that overlooked the field had giant icicles hanging from it and they drew as much attention as the game did."

"There were more people sitting in cars parked at the endzones than there were in the stands. The people in the press box (which was not enclosed at the time), had to borrow the team's warm-ups to keep from freezing up there in the wind."

More than one Seminole fan tagged the game "The Ice Box Bowl." Ironically one of the many bowl bids the Seminoles received following the game, came from the Evansville, IN "Refrigerator Bowl." It along with all the rest were turned down. Perhaps the squad figured one frozen game was enough.

The Seminoles' accomplishments probably were best summarized by the Atlanta Journal's Furman Bisher who wrote: "Veller's list of victims will not be found high on anybody's rating system, except Dr. Veller's . . . but you would be surprised how impressive it is when Veller is introduced as the coach of the unbeaten Florida State team . . . Veller didn't slay any dragons, but perfection is still perfection."

There are numerous stories surrounding the 1950 Seminole team, but perhaps none so spectacular as the incomparable passing combination of Nelson Italiano and Harry Bringger.

It was the sixth game of the season before Italiano threw a pass to Bringger. The first one came against a highly regarded Stetson team and it went for a 53-yard touchdown.

The next week the two teamed up again this time Italiano threw two passes to Bringger. The result was two touchdowns, one a 73-yard play. In the season's final game they connected on two more TD passes. The first to give the Tribe a 13-7 lead at halftime and the second to break a 13-13 deadlock in the fourth quarter.

As hard to believe as it may seem, those were the only five passes that Italiano threw to Bringger all year—not just the only ones they connected on, but the only ones they attempted. Five attempts, five completions, five touchdowns, period.

There were several other accomplishments in 1950 in addition to the Seminoles' unbeaten football season. That same year the Tribe moved into its new football stadium. Then seating a modest 15,000, Doak S. Campbell Stadium has been expanded until it now holds more than 40,000 fans.

Also that year a name was announced for the University's Marching Band and a new fight song was introduced.

A contest was held to select a name for the university marching band. A student from Ironton, OH, Pat Gunnoe, submitted the name which has since become a reminder of the finest halftime performances in the South—The Marching Chiefs.

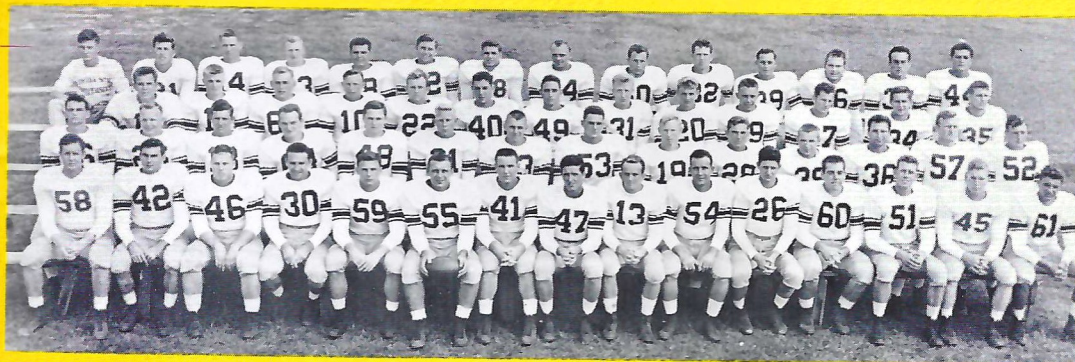
