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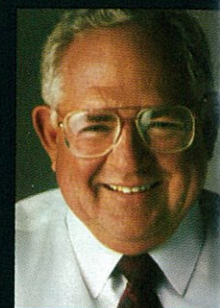
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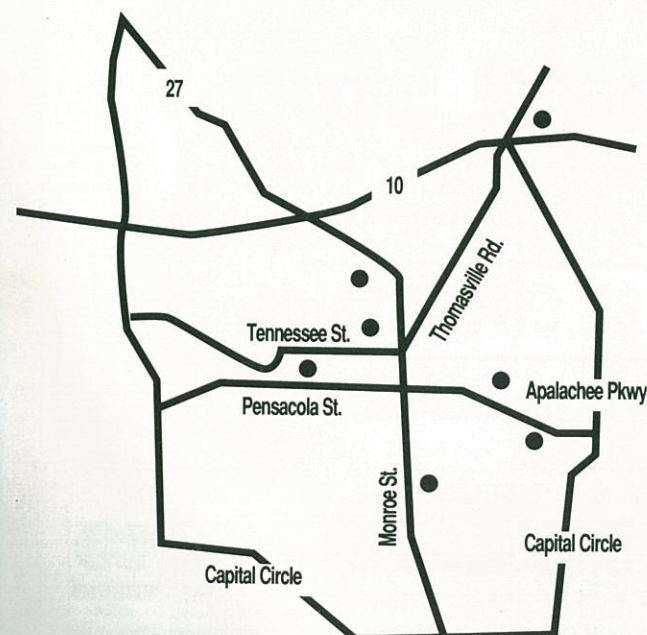


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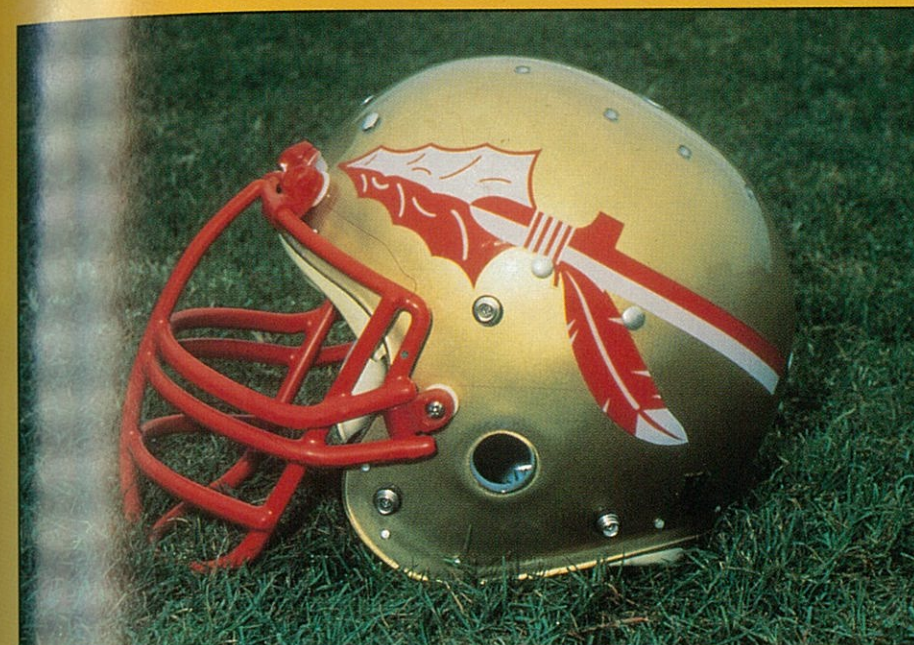

## FLORIDA STATE FOOTBALL 1992

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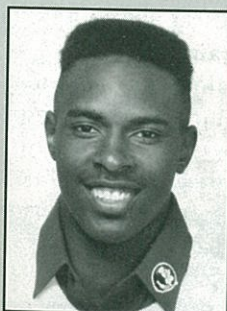


The disappointment of Florida State's 19-16 loss at Miami was still hanging in the oppressive humidity of the Orange Bowl. Seminole players, coaches and staff are headed for the Miami Airport and the chartered flight back to Tallahassee. Almost all of the 78,000 fans have left the stadium — some still carrying on in the parking lots surrounding the storied old place. In the tiny little cubicle reserved for the visiting radio crew, I eased into a chair just vacated by Gene Deckerhoff. The heat in the box was stifling. It was time to begin our post-game "Seminole Calls" show.

I took a deep breath or two and told producer Lee Bowen to keep the lines open and the calls coming. Let's give everybody a chance to have their say. Keep 'em rolling. Right on cue, they started.

From Sarasota:

"Terrell Buckley was right," said the first caller, referring to the choice words issued by the Seminole-turned-Packer during the week leading up to the Miami game. "Its time we take a look at what we're doing."

The Tribe Scholar-Athlete of the Week is junior quarterback Charlie Ward. Ward has earned a 3.3 grade point average in his academic major — therapeutic recreation. The Thomasville, Ga., native is known as a poised athlete on both the basketball court and football field at FSU. But few know how well-versed Ward is in the classroom.

"Charlie goes about academics the same way he does just about anything else — he puts very little pressure on himself,"

He proceeds to assail the coaching, the play-calling, the execution, the preparation, the recruiting, the kicking game, the fans, and just about everything but the band.

Seminole Academic Advisor Mark Meloney said. "He never told himself, 'I have to push myself.' He just did it."

Pressure may not be in Charlie's vocabulary, but one word that is listed in his dictionary in bold print and underlined is preparation. Ward never enters a situation he is not prepared to handle, especially in the classroom. Quarterback coach Mark Richt believes Ward prepares to answer all questions before they happen, either on the field or in the classroom. "Through practice, film study and the tests we give him, Charlie is prepared," Richt said.

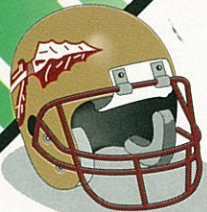
Ward enrolled at Florida State under not-so-normal circumstances. You see, although his high school grades met the minimum standards to play football at FSU, Ward failed to make the necessary

score on his SAT. Rather than travel the junior college route, Charlie enrolled part-time at Tallahassee Community College. There, he fulfilled some freshman requirements while preparing for the entrance exam. In his first semester at TCC, Ward improved his test scores, gained a year of maturity and kept his full eligibility intact.

"I was given some options about what to do concerning college," Ward said. "I needed time to mature away from football." The eligibility factor was also important in his decision. "I wanted to play four years of football at FSU, not two."

The two P's — Poise and Preparation — is the best way to characterize Charlie Ward. The two go hand in hand. As long as Ward is prepared, expect nothing but poise — in the classroom and on the playing fields.





# The Leader of the Pack

Robert Stevenson is the "Old Man" on FSU's Offensive Line

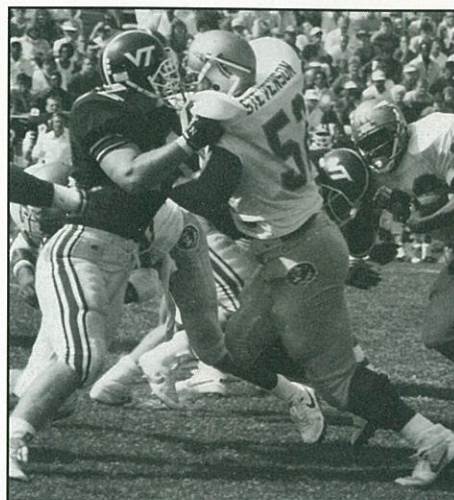
**W**hen Florida State's opposition along the defensive front first began to read the biographies of their counterparts on the Seminole offensive line, they must have licked their chops in anticipation of sacks and tackles for loss. After all, the FSU line appeared to lack both experience and the cohesion so crucial to a good unit. There was a redshirt freshman at one guard and a soft-spoken sophomore at the other; a converted tight end at tackle and a center that has been cut more times in surgery than a gang member in a knife fight.

The group's unlikely leader was equally contradictory. A stalwart on the offensive line, Robert Stevenson has managed to earn his place as a team captain. He's been called on to play every line position in his career but has found a home at tackle this year.

Stevenson, a father figure of the group as a fifth-year senior, has taken the line under his wing. He has become a "Dear Abby" of sorts, giving advice to his young teammates on the intricacies of offensive line play. Because blocking schemes are difficult to master and, early on, mistakes are common, Stevenson's role has been especially important as a buoy of confidence on the line.

Offensive coordinator and line coach Brad Scott explains the role of Stevenson in the Seminole offense, "Robert gives the young offensive line leadership and encouragement. He has continually worked to get better in practice. Many times, fourth-year players slack off but he hasn't and this is something the players can look up to."

Stevenson learned many of the lessons that he is now trying to teach in his first few years. After being redshirted in 1988, Robert found himself in the starting lineup the next season with absolutely no game experience. He acclimated quickly, thanks a great deal to some of the players he had to face on the Seminoles' own practice field. He credits 1989 teammates Odell Haggins and Eric Hayes as being some of the most talented players he has ever lined-up against. And he faced the All-Americans every day.

A natural for offensive line play, Stevenson has mastered the positions that many struggle to learn. Part of the reason for his exceptional ability is that he has the mentality to play the part. In order to be successful on the line, one has to be self-motivated. The offensive linemen toil in relative obscurity while the "glamour boys" (quarterbacks and running backs) have praise heaped upon them regularly. Robert adds, "We don't get a lot of recognition but the good thing about playing the offensive line is you can get out there and play hard and contribute to the win."

Furthermore, Stevenson relishes the face-to-face battles he engages in weekly. "Some things you do out there you'd get arrested for on the street. You can go out and let out your frustrations. In the big games there is a lot of talking going on — lots of guys say some not so good things about your mom. I don't let it bother me. In fact, I like it when the defensive linemen talk because it gets me more pumped-up."

And no one is more interested in Stevenson's psyche than FSU quarterback Charlie Ward.

"Yeah, I make sure that the line is into a game," said Charlie. "They've got to get the yards. We get a lot of credit for a great game but it is Robert and the other guys on the line who have got to get us the yards."

He (Stevenson) is a calming and leading force on the entire offense, not just among the line. I like looking at him in the huddle because I know he's been through it."

Next year, the hulking 6-foot-3, 277-pound Stevenson hopes to join his former Florida State comrades in the National Football League. His resume alone should be plenty to gain him a spot on a professional roster. During his career, he has blocked for a half dozen tailbacks that are now running rampant on the next level. As a senior at Escambia High in Pensacola, Fla., Stevenson cleared lanes for Dallas Cowboy All-Pro Emmitt Smith. At FSU, he blazed paths for Dexter Carter, Marion Butts, Sammie Smith, Amp Lee and Edgar Bennett. Stevenson has proved to be equally adept at blocking for the aerial assault as Seminole alumni Peter Tom Willis, Casey Weldon and Brad Johnson can attest.

Scott believes that Stevenson has the athletic ability and the skills to play in the professional ranks, but he is quick to add, "his future is dependent on this year. He has to be dominating in college to make it on the next level."

Stevenson has taken this advice to heart. He has made a name for himself among Atlantic Coast Conference opponents, as he was voted the "Offensive Lineman of the Week" following the N.C. State game. After the matchup, Stevenson graded out at 86 percent when the coaches judged his play on game film. A score comparable to making the Dean's List in school.

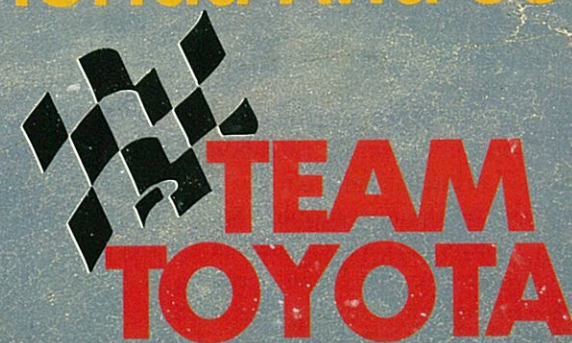
The career of one of Florida State's most versatile offensive linemen will come to a close at the end of the season. When it does, Stevenson will have left his mark on FSU through the play of the brick wall he helped construct out of the offensive line. However, many will remember and credit Stevenson as the putty that held the facade together for four of the Seminoles' most successful years.

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# They Call Him "Boots"

Robbie Baker Looks Like He Should Be Starring in Westerns

Fort Myers is an energetic city where the rapid-paced lifestyle is obvious on almost every corner. After all, it is the home turf of one of this nation's flashiest characters — Deion "Prime Time" Sanders. With a smorgasbord of activity keeping the Lee County population of 300,000-plus entertained year-round, one might expect that only the very charismatic can survive in this neck of the woods. Not true.

From the chaos of this south Florida town emerges someone who has rebelled against the urban ways of the area. Robbie Baker, a quiet, gentlemanly fellow, has chosen to be a little different from the rest of the pack.

"I am a laid-back guy who enjoys to go hunting and fishing," Baker says. "I love the outdoors. I would rather be out on a river bank catching catfish with my friends and socializing than out at clubs."

He appears to be a true, modern-day cowboy. His two-day-old stubble and tobacco-packed jaw sends a signal that this guy may have been born a hundred years too late. He has the face of the cutest kid in fifth grade — but a body that belongs on the professional wrestling circuit. He towers over most people at 6-foot-5 and 260 pounds.

"Everybody says I've got that baby face — I don't see it, but everyone else says that I do," laughs Baker.

Teammate Matt Frier (who could probably write the book on being country) says Baker reminds him of a well-known western figure. "He's like 'The Duke' — John Wayne. You know, always getting shot and knocked down, but then always getting back up and whipping someone. He's tough," says Frier.

It is no wonder that Baker chose the rural, laid-back environment of Tallahassee and Florida State University to embark on his college football career. This town seems to fit his persona like a tailored stetson.

"I love this town," Baker states. "It has that friendly 'hometown' feel. There are some fine people here. The guys on this team have a lot in common with each oth-

er. If we want to go hunting or fishing, it's within 20 minutes."

The term 'toughness' does not do Baker justice. Since coming to FSU five years ago he has found himself biting the bullet on an operating table no less than six times. Three of his operations were regarded as major, including the complete repair and rebuilding of his right shoulder this past spring. His latest surgery came last month when bone fragments had to be removed from his left knee.

Brad Scott, Seminole offensive coordinator and line coach, says Baker's rugged football savy is amazing.

"I doubt the majority of the guys on this team would come back for a fifth year after having the injuries that Robbie has had happen to him," Scott says. "He has a very high tolerance for pain."

Many times FSU's trainers have visited Baker on the practice and playing fields for various battle injuries. "He never says anything," explains assistant trainer Jack Marucci. "I can't ever remember him pulling himself out of a game on his own."

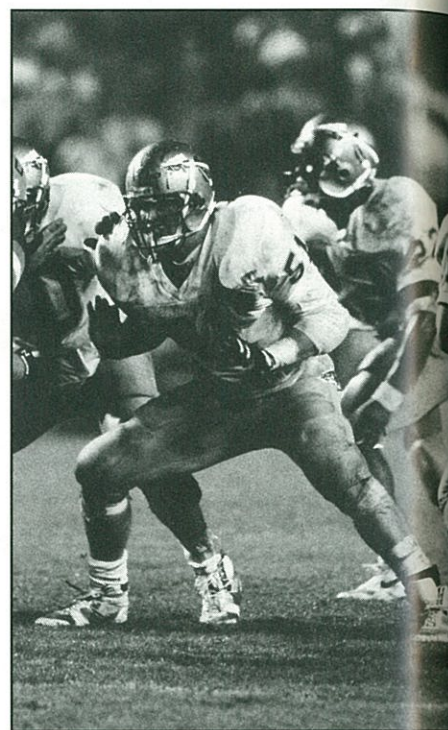
Marucci remembers one injury that occurred in LSU's stadium last year. "He had a deep laceration to his right knee. You could see the tendons and kneecap," Marucci vividly describes.

With comic relief Marucci adds, "Did you ever see the characters' eyes on 'The Little Rascals' when they got excited? Well, that's what Robbie's face looked like when he watched Doc Haney completely submerge his finger under the kneecap. But then we got him a dip and he was alright. That was his aspirin."

Baker's boyish face shyly glows with a modest smile as he remembers that cool, rainy night in Baton Rouge.

"I fell on someone's cleat and it tore my knee wide open. You could see everything in there. It was disgusting," Baker graphically explains. "Instead of taking pain killers, I just had them give me a dip of Copenhagen."

Baker's time at FSU has been spent fighting many injury bandits hiding out along his traveled path. The constant battles have taken their toll on him.

"I definitely ache a lot more. It's hard getting out of bed in the mornings. I feel old and worn," he says.

Now, Baker sees the end of what has been a long trail just ahead. He certainly knows there will be a few obstacles yet to eliminate. His wounds during the ride have drained him, but this season, Baker's final shoot-out, is spurred by a motivation to survive.

Baker explains, "All I want to do is play what might possibly be my last year of football. I'm doing this for me and my parents. It's a good feeling coming out of that tunnel and seeing them proud and smiling. I am not a loud person and I didn't come here to be famous, win honors and be popular. I can see it soon ending and I'm going to do just like I've always done — give it everything I've got and move on."

Just like the end of every good western.

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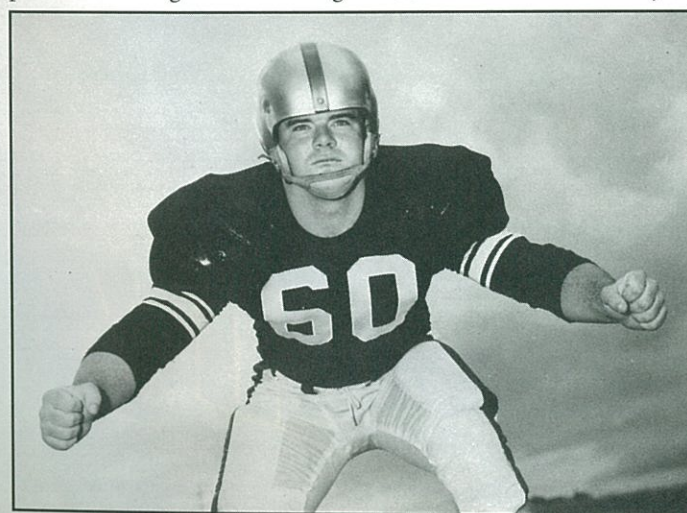


## The "Kidnapping" of Leo Baggett

**B**ack in football's infancy at Florida State, the NCAA compliance regulations were not what they are today. This was especially true when it applied to the recruiting of student-athletes.

If a student-athlete committed to one school, nothing prevented him from “changing” his mind and going elsewhere. It was not uncommon for a recruit to sign a letter of intent with more than one school.

Since Florida State was not in a conference, the only university with whom FSU had an agreement to honor committed signees was with the University of Florida. This brings up an interesting case involving FSU and the University of Alabama concerning a highly recruited athlete by the name of Leo Baggett. Just how this 5-foot-9, 195-pound guard from Panama City came to play for the Seminoles is indicative of the strange practices in college football during the 1950s.



Early in the recruiting period, Baggett had signed letters-of-intent with both FSU and Alabama. By late summer, he had settled on Florida State and was looking great in fall workouts.

The next day Leo called his mother to tell her that he was now at Alabama but really wanted to be at Florida State, admitting that the only reason he left was because the Alabama assistant coach was so persistent. Mrs. Baggett wanted her son to attend FSU and reminded him that he had promised to do so.

With the intention of rectifying the situation, she called a prominent dean whom she knew well and told him the story. He advised her to come to Tallahassee so they could work out a solution to the problem.

After much discussion, they decided to leave the next day for Tuscaloosa to pay Leo a visit. As they approached the campus the dean began to worry about the FSU logos on the sides of their school car. Fearing the logos would “give them away,” they pulled into a service station.

Luck was on their side this day because as fate would have it, the gas station was adorned with flyers and posters promoting an upcoming Baptist revival. Convinced the station attendant that she wanted to help promote the revival, Mrs. Baggett secured two posters.

After purchasing tape from a nearby store, the duo ducked into an alley and

The plan was to take a drive around campus to ascertain whether they were being followed. Noticing nothing out of the ordinary in his rear-view mirror the dean turned south at Denny Chimes Road and made a beeline back to Tallahassee.

Leo Baggett lived up to all expectations and went on to become one of the great linemen in Seminole history. As for the kidnapping, all fingers pointed toward a certain Alabama football alumnus who at that time was a member of the FSU coaching staff. Still pleading his innocence to this day, Vaughn Mancha went on to become Florida State's Director of Athletics from 1960-70.

Baggett, who entered the business world after his playing days, retired last year after a successful career with the Lorillard Tobacco Co. of Tampa. He and wife Frandy now reside in hometown Panama City. Their three children, Russ, Sarah and Ann, are all graduates of Florida State.

*After a very successful college and pro football career, Vaughn Mancha was an assistant coach at Florida State from 1952-56 before moving on to become the defensive coordinator at Columbia University. Mancha returned to Tallahassee in 1960 to become the University's athletic director, a post he held through 1970. Mancha is a member of the College Football Hall of Fame. He has also been inducted into both the Florida State and Alabama Sports Halls of Fame. A center during his playing days, Mancha was recently selected to the University of Alabama's All-Century Team.*

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# A New Look Offense

*One-Back Set Gives FSU New System, But Results Remain the Same*

**F**lorida State head football coach and military strategy buff Bobby Bowden has literally out-flanked his new ACC colleagues by revamping the Seminoles attack. By committing his team to the one-back offense, Bowden has added yet another weapon to the FSU arsenal.

Considering the Seminoles' success in recent years the change seems unnecessary, but offensive coordinator Brad Scott says otherwise. "The way defenses are playing in the '90s, crowding the line of scrimmage with seven- or eight-man fronts, blitzing a lot, you have to have something to help spread that defense out a little bit or you're not going to survive."

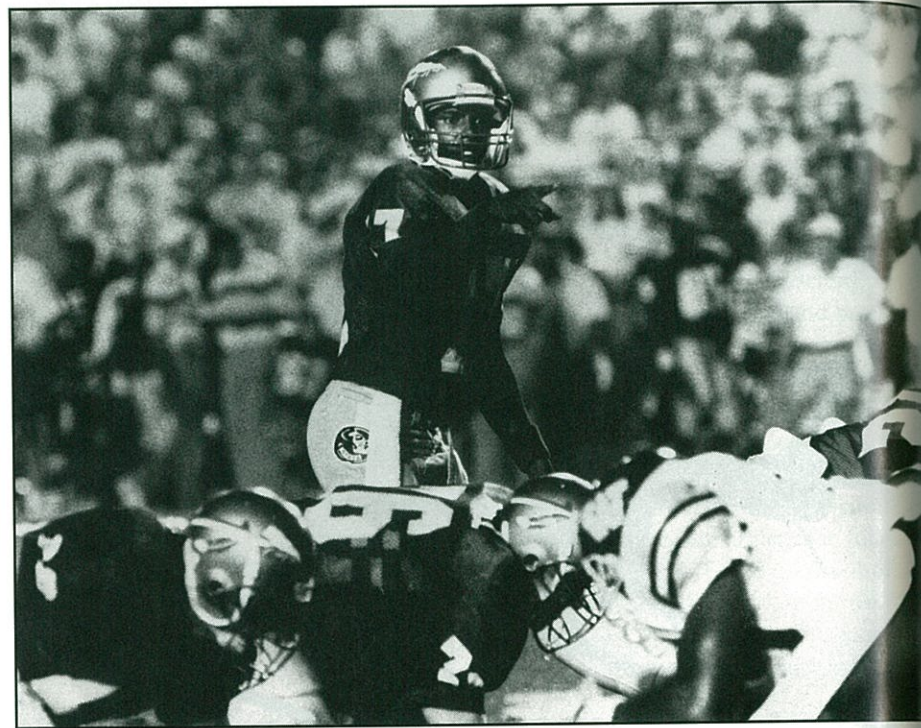
Although the new look may have caught opponents and fans off guard, the change has not been a sudden one. Scott and quarterback coach Mark Richt have been studying the one-back offense for two-and-a-half years. They began implementing it two springs ago, but with a veteran offense returning and some unanswered questions lingering, Bowden hesitated with the change.

Most of the questions regarding the one-back revolve around blocking schemes. This past year Scott, Richt and running back coach Billy Sexton spent time studying the one-back with Tampa Bay Buccaneers head coach Sam Wyche. Noted as the pioneer of the one-back during his tenure with the Cincinnati Bengals, Wyche gave the Seminole staff insight into the intricacies of this offense.

"I think this past year we (the coaches) just looked at it and realized we would be starting over with a bunch of new, young offensive linemen and just thought it was a good time for the transition," said Scott.

This season's statistics indicate the move to the one-back has not hindered the offense. In 1991, the Seminoles averaged 450.1 yards per game while scoring 36.6 points. Through four games this season, Florida State is gaining 446.3 yards and scoring 35.3 points per game.

Convincing Bowden to implement the

new offense took some work. Scott said "a little coaxing" from himself and Bowden's son Tommy, who is Auburn's offensive coordinator, and even some coaching peer pressure was needed to convince him to go with the one-back. Scott is quick to say, however, that the coach has been extremely supportive of the change and might be holding something back.

"He's playing wolf a little bit," explains Scott. "He understands a whole lot more than he's giving himself credit for, he's still in full control."

"One thing you can never do in college football is get satisfied with what you are doing," says Bobby Bowden. "Football is different now than it was five years ago, 10 years ago and it will be different five years from now. You've got to change with the times and our coaches convinced me that the one-back is something we should look at. I have stood back and observed more in the last year than I ever have and I think it's given me a better overall feel for how the thing is working."

If the one-back does have a deficiency Scott says, it's in the loss of a power running game, and it becomes most evident in

short-yardage situations. Without a fullback the offense loses its lead block at the point of attack. As a result, it is unlikely that the two-back set will ever be permanently shelved at Florida State.

"We keep our two-back offense greased up," says Scott. "We still utilize it in short yardage and goal-line situations, and may even start a series (with the two-back) like we did at N.C. State."

Nevertheless, the Seminole staff, Bowden included, is encouraged by the player's progress and enticed by the potential of the new offense. Scott likes the improvement the players are making week to week and is impressed with the enthusiasm the one-back set has brought to the team.

"I see excitement and that's important. The players have really rallied around it and responded well," says Scott.

He also points to the talented Charlie Ward as a reason for the success of the change, adding, "Charlie throws the ball very nicely and is a dangerous runner. You

need a guy back there that can make things happen and we certainly have that in Charlie Ward."

Equally important has been the emergence of the receiving corps. Much maligned a year ago, the group has matured and is playing with new-found confidence. A big reason for this is the one-back offense brings three and sometimes four receivers into the game at one time. With the coaching staff's penchant for rotating players in and out, it gives as many as seven different receivers the opportunity to play in a game.

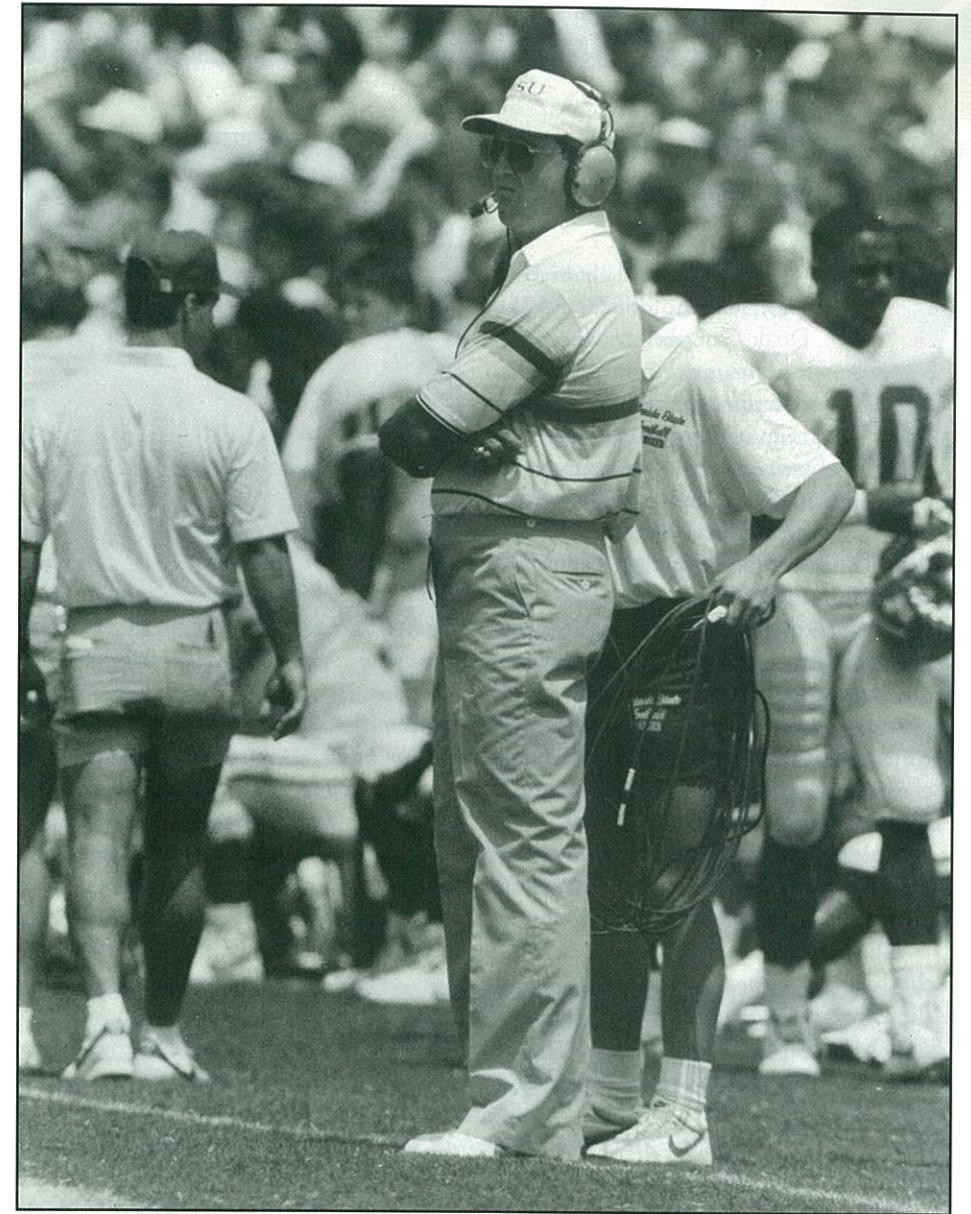
FSU wideout Shannon Baker likes the one-back set because of the problems it poses for the secondary. "When we run four receivers in and line up with trips (three receivers) to one side, it creates some one-on-one matchups," explains Baker. "Now with the speed we have at the receiver position, there is no way a DB can cover us for an entire game. He might be able to for awhile, but at some point in the game he's gonna get burned."

Another key is the quarterback's ability to read defenses at the line of scrimmage and identify coverages. After doing so, the quarterback must audible at the line and make the necessary adjustments. The man responsible for making this happen is Ward.

"I really like this type offense," says Ward. "I'm still learning it though, and have much more yet to learn, but I feel comfortable with it. I think some of the problems I've experienced thus far were due to me not making the proper reads at the line. Since the one-back is a pass-oriented offense, I've got to be able to find the receiver that's in single coverage and get him the ball. If I can do that, we'll be successful."

Scott says he would not mind being a receiver in this offense and expects the one-back set to continue to attract the talented skill position players that Florida State is accustomed to recruiting. "I believe this will aid our recruiting efforts in that we'll get more players in the game, and utilize their skills better," explains Scott.

The Sean Jackson/Tiger McMillon platoon at running back is an example of how the one-back set can take advantage of diversified talent. The powerful Jackson and the speedy McMillon both get ample carries in the offense and give the Seminoles a complementary attack. Scott says in addition to the backfield platoon, fans may notice Florida State using the same few running plays over and over.

Unlike the two-back set which uses nine to 10 different runs, the one back has only four different runs. Scott, however, has found this to be a blessing in disguise. With so few running plays the emphasis has been on execution which has been helpful for his inexperienced offensive line (three freshmen and a sophomore started vs. Wake Forest).

The offense has been an adjustment for the running backs as well. "I really wasn't sure about the one-back offense at first," says Jackson, a junior tailback. "But the biggest difference is that once you break the line of scrimmage the field is wide open. You've got to feel your way through the defensive line and then it's one-on-one tackling and the odds are in your favor."

Considering that Florida State has such a young offensive line and new starters in the backfield, inconsistency is to be expect-

ed. But Scott loves the versatility of the new attack.

"This offense takes advantage of what the defense is giving you. If they're gonna load up against the run, then you throw the ball. If they're gonna double all the wide receivers, then they leave themselves weak against the run. If we can physically match up against the opponent, then we should be able to move the ball."

A strategic paradigm that ole General Bowden can appreciate.
