FSU Symbolizes Future For Tech & the ACC

Amidst a plethora of important sports events this weekend in Atlanta, Georgia Tech fans have the unique opportunity to glance back at the Institute's glorious football past while also getting a glimpse of its future.

Last night, at the Hyatt Regency Hotel in a black tie dinner setting, Tech fans had a chance to relive some of the memories that make Yellow Jacket football so special.

Georgia Tech has enjoyed a gridiron tradition matched only by a handful of schools throughout the country, and as part of Tech's Football Centennial Celebration, a very special evening was held featuring the accomplishments of Tech's coaches and players throughout the past 100 years.

From former players such as George Gardner, Ray Beck, Lucius Sanford and Jeremiah McClary, to such sports personalities as Furman Bisher and Bob Neal, the night was resplendent in revelry for a program which has produced immortal names such as Heisman, Alexander and Dodd.

All of Tech's former coaches—there are eight former coaches—and its lettermen were honored at the affair.

Tech's gridiron tradition, which dates back to 1892, has also had successful new chapters added the last few seasons, but the words used to describe Coach Alexander—simply Coach Alex to the players who new him—probably describe Tech's program and its achievements as a whole through the years.

At Alexander's death, Ralph McGill of the Atlanta Journal-Constitution wrote of him: "Bill Alexander's life was eloquent illustration of the phrase: 'It matters not whether you win or lose, but how you play the game.' He played it always on the level and always with all he had."

Throughout its 100-year love affair with this collegiate game, Georgia Tech has always played it on the level and with all it had.

And this afternoon should be no exception.

For while yesterday evening's festivities and today's pre-game program celebrate the past, no team on Tech's schedule this autumn represents the future better than do these powerful Florida State Seminoles.

It was little more than a year ago that the Tallahassee school chose to eschew overtures from the Southeastern Conference and join the ACC. The fit has been a good one as FSU leads a surge of Atlantic Coast Conference football that sees no fewer than five ACC schools—FSU, Virginia, Clemson, N.C. State and Tech—ranked this week among the nation's Top 25.

Today's game, long awaited by many from these two states, isn't the first between the two schools. Beginning in 1952 and concluding in 1975, Tech and FSU met a total of eight times, with the Rambling Wreck emerging with a commanding 7-0-1 series mark.

But this game isn't a resumption of that series; it's more of a starting over, a restarting, so to speak. For all of those previous experiences with Florida State were PB. As in Pre-Bowden.

Since Bobby Bowden departed the hills of West Virginia for the sunny streets of Tallahassee, he has developed this program into one of the nation's finest. What faces the Jackets this afternoon is a true football powerhouse that year in and year out competes for the national championship.

And though these Seminoles' national title hopes may have taken a hit two weeks ago in the Orange Bowl in Miami, Bowden's crew undoubtedly has its eyes set on a title of another kind this week—an ACC football crown.

In addition to their Top 10 ranking, the Garnet and Gold brings with them an unbeaten slate in conference play to date with impressive victories over Duke, Clemson, Wake Forest, N. C. State and North Carolina.

Standing in their way to an unbeaten conference season are only Maryland,

Virginia, and of course, Tech. The Jackets, getting to be known as the nation's cardiac-producing team after wins over Clemson, N. C. State and Maryland were not decided until the final seconds, have crawled back into the conference race after being leveled at Charlottesville a month ago.

Bill Lewis' club, with Clemson's upset of Virginia

last Saturday, stand in a tie with the Wahoos, just a game behind the Seminoles.

But Lewis and his charges, who already have wins on the Dodd Stadium turf over the nationally-ranked Tigers and Wolfpack, will have their hands full.

Florida State's offense, as potent as ever, features multi-talented Charlie Ward at quarterback, who was last seen in Atlanta last January taking some of the thrills out of the Thrillerdome.

State's defense, led by linebacker Marvin Jones, is quick, fast and hard-hitting and takes great pleasure in smothering offenses.

The combination resembles a Centennial-style challenge to Lewis.

"It's time to take our game to another level," said Lewis, earlier this week. "Florida State is one of the three or four best programs in the country. They are one of the premier programs in the entire nation and the only unbeaten team in the ACC. It's going to be a big, big game not only for our team, but for our program and our fans."

Nationally-Ranked Jackets Face ACC Newcomer Florida State

Probably the best way to describe this game is that it's time to move up to the next level," said Tech coach Bill Lewis of the matchup between his 16th-ranked Rambling Wreck and No. 6 Florida State at Bobby Dodd Stadium/Grant Field.

"We're playing one of the premier programs in all of America, a top two or three program, the only undefeated team in the ACC," Lewis added. "It's going to be a big, big game not only for our team, but for our program and our fans."

With Tech's win over Maryland and Virginia's loss to Clemson last Saturday, the Yellow Jackets (4-1, 3-1 ACC) have re-entered the ACC race. The Seminoles lead at 5-1 overall, 5-0 in conference games, while the Cavaliers are 5-1, 4-1.

Tech has won three straight games by a total of nine points, including wins over ranked foes Clemson and N.C. State. Florida State comes off a 36-13 win at home over North Carolina, and the Seminoles have also beaten Clemson and N.C. State.

Tech's defense will contend with yet

another wide-open offense in Florida State's one-back set, led by multiple-threat quarterback Charlie Ward. Ward, a high school rival of Tech counterpart Shawn Jones, has completed 53 percent of his passes (102 of 193) this season for 1390 yards and 10 touchdowns, and has also rushed for 158 yards and two scores.

Four receivers have 15 receptions or more, led by Tamarick Vanover with 21 catches and two scores. Vanover also has returned two kickoffs for touchdowns. Tailback Sean Jackson leads the ground game with 409 yards and three scores.

Defensively, cornerback Corey Sawyer has five interceptions and has averaged 17 yards on punt returns, including one for a score.

"They have tremendous team speed. They've always had great speed," Lewis said. "But they have it across the board, including the linemen as well as the skill players."

Jones, in the midst of his best season passing for Tech, has completed 56 percent of his throws (96 of 171) for 1192 yards, nine TDs and just two interceptions. Bobby Rodriguez, with 19 receptions and one score, and Jason McGill, with 17 catches and four TDs, lead the receiving corps.

Running backs Michael Smith, Dorsey Levens, Jimmy Lincoln, Jeff Wright and William Bell are averaging 4.8 yards per carry between them.

Defensive tackle Coleman Rudolph leads a Tech defense which has amassed 21 quarterback sacks in five games, including 13 in the last two weeks. Rudolph added three Saturday to push his season total to 7.5. Free safety Mike

Jason McGill hauled in seven catches for 176 yards and three TDs against Maryland.

Williams has 45 tackles and two interceptions to lead the defense in both categories.

Tech and Florida State will be meeting on the gridiron for the first time since 1975, and this edition of the Yellow Jackets will attempt to keep Tech unbeaten against the Seminoles. The Jackets own a 7-0-1 record against FSU, all at Bobby Dodd Stadium, in a series which began in 1952.

They Only Get Closer

Georgia Tech might be causing an epidemic of fingernail chewing, because the Yellow Jackets are making a habit of playing nailbiters on the football field.

Tech has won its last three games by a total of nine points, including a 20-16 triumph over Clemson, a 16-13 last-second win over N.C. State, and last Saturday's 28-26 cliffhanger at Maryland. Five of Tech's last seven games, including the final two of 1991, have been decided by four points or fewer.

During the career of quarterback Shawn Jones, 15 Tech games have been decided by four points or fewer, and the Jackets are 12-2-1 in such encounters.

McGill Cooks Up Touchdowns

Split end Jason McGill became the first Georgia Tech player in three years Saturday to score three touchdowns in a game, hauling in passes of 48, 35 and 53 yards from Shawn Jones against Maryland.

For the game, McGill established career highs with seven receptions for 176 yards, as well as the three scores. The 176 yards are the fifth-highest single-game total in Tech history, and the most since Greg Lester had 193 yards on seven catches at Duke in 1987.

Jones Continues to Climb

Shawn Jones, with his 253 yards in total offense last week, now stands as the second-most prolific offensive player in ACC history with 8,176 yards, surpassing Duke's Steve Slayden. Jones also ranks 26th in NCAA history, and needs 49 yards to pass Randall Cunningham of UNLV.

Ben Bennett, also of Duke, holds the conference record with 9,061 yards.

Jones also moved into fourth place in the ACC career rankings in passing yardage (7,236) and touchdown passes (45).

Rudolph Eyeing Sack Record

All-America candidate Coleman Rudolph has made a move on the Georgia Tech all-time sack record with his performance in

the last three weeks.

Rudolph has 6.5 of his team-high 7.5 sacks in that time, boosting his career total to 26, just 1.5 shy of Marco Coleman's Tech record of 27 from 1989-91. The Lombardi Award semi-finalist enjoyed a stellar day at Maryland with three sacks for 27 yards.

Home Sweet Home

The Bobby Dodd Stadium advantage has worked wonders for Georgia Tech in the last four years. Today against Florida State, the Rambling Wreck will be defending a streak of 20 wins in its last 21 games at the nation's oldest Division I-A stadium. Tech's only loss in that span was an 18-15 decision to Georgia in the 1991 finale.

Since the facility was built in 1913, Tech has won more than 70 percent of its games at home (369-147-23).

Mary Smiles Again

For the second straight week, Georgia Tech tried the "Hail Mary" pass, and the prayer was answered.

Against N.C. State, Shawn Jones found Keenan Walker for 54 yards to set up the game-winning field goal with one second left.

Last Saturday at Maryland, with just four seconds left before halftime and Tech behind 17-14, Jones connected with Jason McGill for 53 yards and a TD to give the Yellow Jackets a permanent lead.

Secondary Makes Big Plays

Georgia Tech's defense, which has been rapidly improving over the last three weeks, still had come up with just five turnovers before last Saturday.

The Jackets thwarted the Maryland run-and-shoot with four interceptions, the most since Tech picked off four against Wake Forest in the 10th game of the 1990 season.

Free safety Mike Williams grabbed two of them, both ending Maryland penetrations inside the Tech 35. Tech's offense turned two of the pickoffs into touchdowns.

Sunshine Jackets

Next to Georgia, the state of Florida is the most-represented state among Tech's football players, with 16 Jackets hailing from the Sunshine State.

Four of those are in the starting lineup, including split end Jason McGill (Miami), running back Michael Smith (Pensacola), cornerback Curley Day (Tampa) and strong safety Kevin Peoples (Gainesville). ○

players should be the next most important group of people in our lives because we are in a situation where we can have a direct impact on their lives.

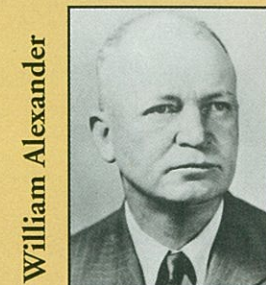

DANNY SMITH

*Assistant Head Coach/
Wide Receivers*



Danny Smith begins his sixth season at Georgia Tech but his first as Assistant Head Coach after coaching the Rambling Wreck running backs the last five years. In addition to his duties as Assistant Head Coach, Smith will coach wide receivers.

Last season, Tech running back Jimmy Lincoln was named the ACC's Rookie of the Year as he set a school record for freshman with 913 yards rushing. In both 1989 and '90, the Yellow Jacket rushing game produced an average of more than 200 yards per game.

Smith also coached Tech's all-ACC running back Jerry Mays, who rushed for more than 2,000 yards in two years (1988-89) and finished his career as the second-leading rusher in Tech history and sixth-best in ACC history at 3,699 yards.

Smith joined the Tech staff in 1987 after serving three seasons (1984-86) as the defensive coordinator and defensive backs coach at The Citadel.

Prior to his stint at The Citadel, Smith spent four seasons (1980-83) at William & Mary coaching defensive ends and backs. At the Williamsburg, Va., school, he coached free safety Mark Kelso, who plays with the NFL's Buffalo Bills.

The 38-year-old Smith also spent one year (1979) coaching defensive backs at Clemson and two years at his former high school, Central Catholic in Pittsburgh, Pa., where he tutored current Miami Dolphins' quarterback Dan Marino. He began his coaching career as a graduate assistant at his alma mater, Edinboro (Pa.) State, where he received his bachelor of science degree in elementary and special education in 1976.

A native of Pittsburgh, Pa., he is married to the former Elaine Petkash of Ambridge, Pa., and they have two daughters, Erin, 12, and Courtney, 8, and one son, Jason, 2.

STEVE SHANKWEILER

*Offensive Coordinator/
Offensive Line*



Steve Shankweiler, a member of the East Carolina football staff the last five seasons, begins his first season at Georgia Tech as the Rambling Wreck's offensive coordinator and offensive line coach.

Shankweiler directed the Pirates offensive line the last five seasons and was elevated to offensive coordinator prior to the 1990 season. In 1991 he guided a potent ECU attack that ranked fifth nationally in passing offense, 12th in scoring and 17th in total offense.

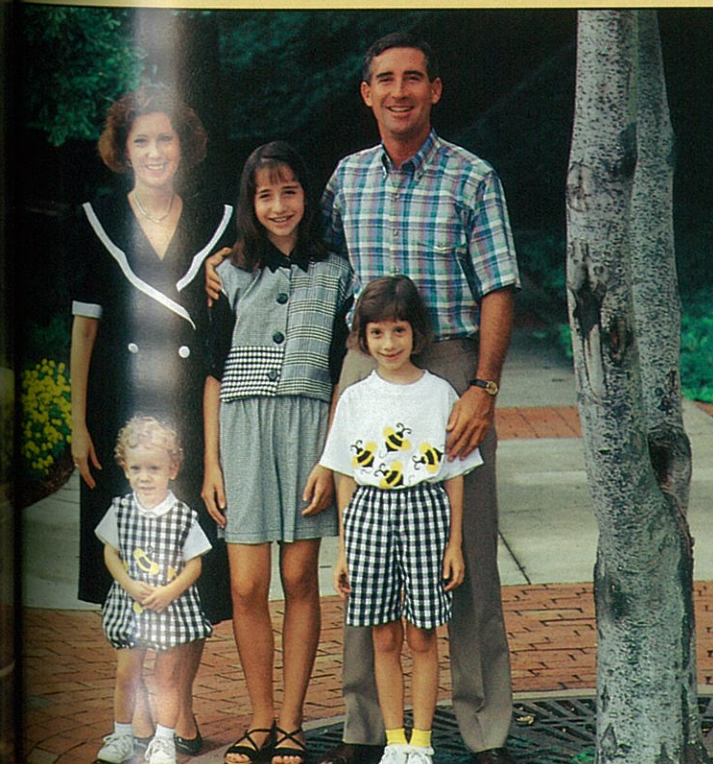

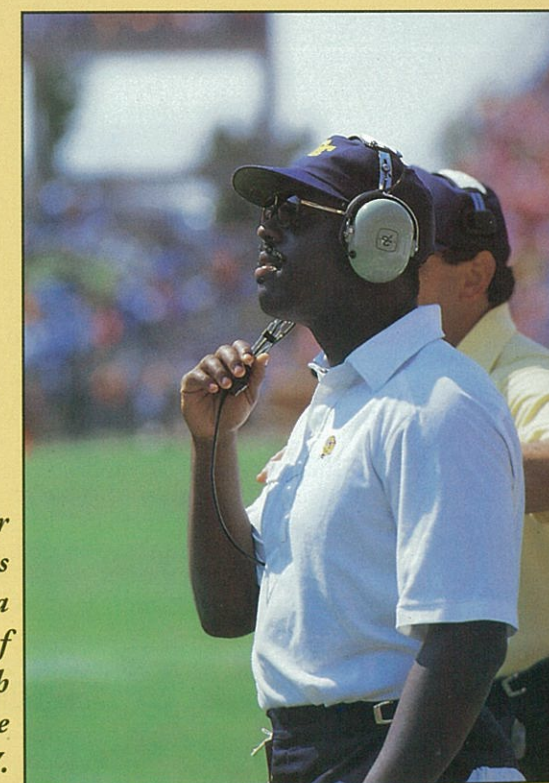
Baker served one season (1985) as a graduate assistant and another (1984) as a student assistant at Maryland, coaching outside linebackers, before arriving at Tech.

Rusty Burns begins his first year as Georgia Tech's quarterbacks coach after serving in the same capacity at the University of Cincinnati the last three years.

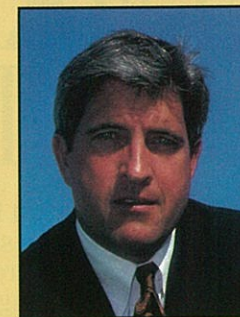
In 1991, Burns helped direct a Bearcat offense that amassed over 2,000 yards both rushing and passing for the first time in school history. Cincinnati's 4,185 yards of total offense was the most for the Bearcats since 1986. Statistically, the Cincinnati offense was the nation's second-most improved in Division I-A.

Burns joined the Cincinnati staff in 1989 after nine seasons as an assistant at Connecticut, the first four coaching the running backs and receivers and the last five as offensive coordinator and quarterbacks coach. While with the Huskies, Burns fashioned attacks which were rated fifth nationally in 1988 and 12th in 1987.

A 1978 graduate of Springfield College, Burns began his career there as a graduate assistant coach in 1979. He then spent one season (1980) as running backs and receivers coach before moving to Connecticut.

Burns received his Bachelor's Degree in Physical Education and English from Springfield in 1978, followed by a Master's Degree in Education in 1979.

When Dye became the head coach at Wyoming in 1980, Godette joined him and remained there three seasons as the Cowboys' linebacker coach.

From 1983-88, Godette served as an assistant coach at Cincinnati, working with the outside linebacker, tight ends and defensive line.

Godette earned all-America honors in 1976 by Associated Press and RECAP. He was an honorable mention all-America by AP in 1975, and an all-Southern Conference selection in 1973 and '75.

Godette, 38, received his bachelor's degree in Physical Education from East Carolina in 1977. A native of Havelock, N.C., he was recently married to the former Ruby Lee Williams. ○

Huxtable will also coordinate Tech's special teams, as he did for the Pirates.

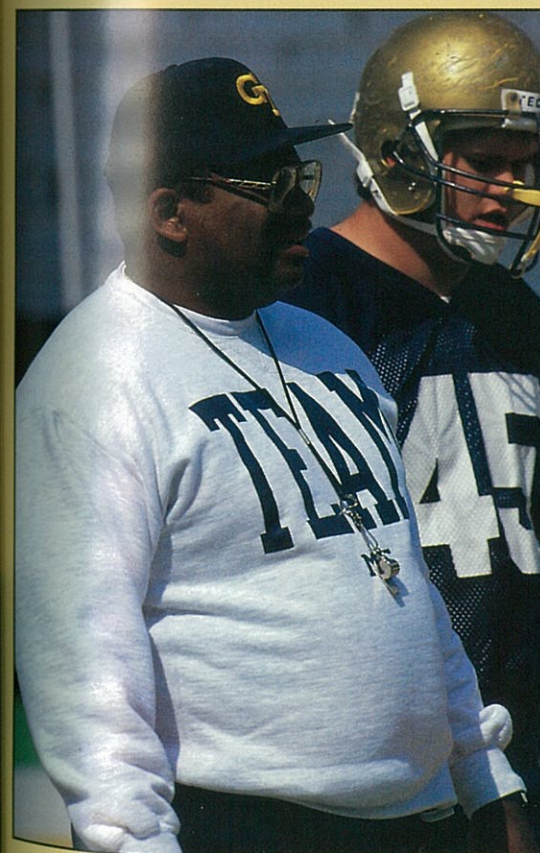
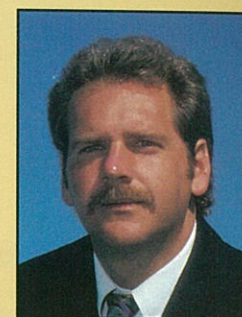
In his two seasons at East Carolina, Huxtable tutored all-America Robert Jones, a finalist for the Butkus Award as the nation's outstanding linebacker.

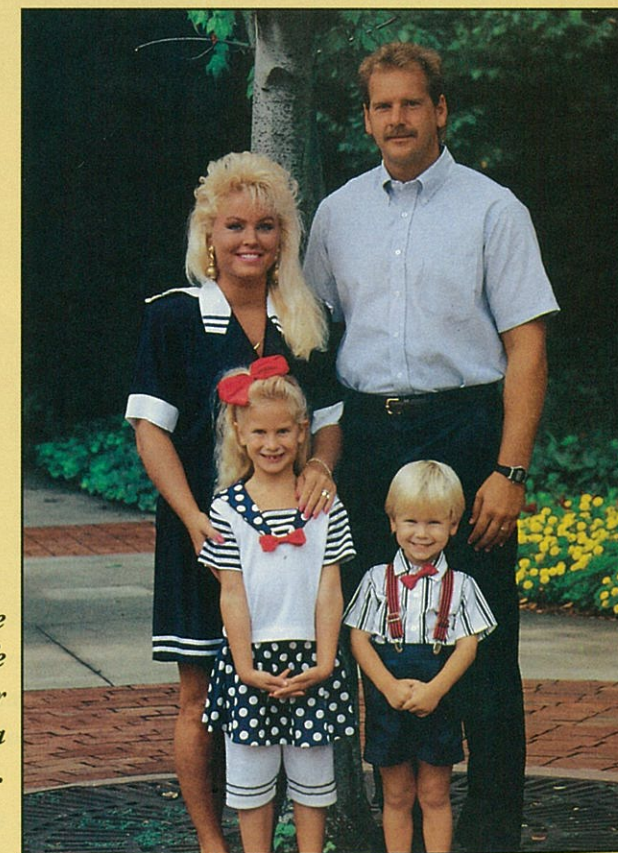
While at Western Kentucky, Huxtable also coached the defensive line for two seasons as well as the outside linebackers and offensive line for one year each.

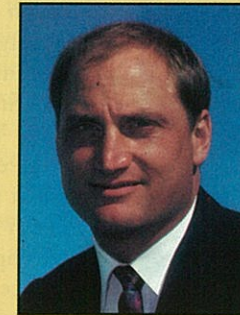

Greg Nord, the running backs coach at East Carolina the last two seasons, begins his first season in the same capacity at Georgia Tech.

Nord joined the East Carolina staff in 1990 after eight seasons at the University of Kentucky, where he coached running backs under head coach Jerry Claiborne.

At Kentucky, Nord coached five of the Wildcats' top 12 all-time rushers, including current NFL players Mark Higgs of the Miami Dolphins, Marc Logan of the San Francisco 49'ers and Ivy Joe Hunter of the New England Patriots as well as 1989 all-Southeastern Conference selection Alfred Rawls.

Nord, 36, spent three seasons as a graduate assistant (1979-80) and part-time assistant (1981) at Kentucky under Fran Curci before he was elevated to full-time status under Claiborne.

A 1980 graduate of Kentucky, Nord lettered three seasons for the Wildcats, playing center and tight end. He earned the UK "Heart" Award in 1977 and the "110 Percenter" Award in 1978.

Nord, a native of Louisville, Ky., was an all-state football player at Bishop David High School. He and his wife Donna have two daughters, Amy and Angie.

The South's Largest Institute of Technology & Research

The Georgia Institute of Technology is a vital component of the bustling, booming, international City of Atlanta—and a cornerstone of opportunity for people in the cities and counties of the State of Georgia, across the country, and around the globe.

In his most recent "State of the Institute" address, Georgia Tech President John P. "Pat" Crecine said: "We are an urban university with the potential for a residential campus in the heart of America's new city. We are a public university in an age where access to education is more dependent on resources than intellect, where the costs of quality private higher

education are soaring."

Georgia Tech was founded by the Georgia General Assembly on October 13, 1885. Georgia Tech held its first classes Oct. 7, 1888 with a total of 129 students. They all pursued bachelor's degrees in mechanical engineering—the only degree and major offered at the time.

Tech today is looking to the future, focusing its degree opportunities for students entering the workforce of tomorrow—a technology-oriented, internationally diverse work force. Degree options for students include engineering, architecture, computing, sciences, management, economics, public policy and international affairs, just to name a few.

Tech's student body currently numbers 12,814. Students come to the Institute from almost every county in Georgia, all parts of the U.S. and from 80 countries. They pursue degrees they have chosen from 33 undergraduate degree programs, 36 master's degree programs and 25 doctoral degree programs.

Although exclusively male for three-quarters of its history, the student body today includes more than 3,025 women. In addition, more than 3,018 minority students are enrolled. The fall 1991 entering freshman class scored nearly 300 points higher than the national average on the Scholastic Aptitude Test (SAT); their average SAT score was 1206.

Georgia Tech also enrolls the highest percentage of freshman National Merit Scholars and the third highest percentage of National Achievement Scholars among publicly supported institutions in the U.S. The President's Scholarship Program, designed to bring exceptional students to Tech, has awarded 30 full President's Scholarships, 20 Tuition Scholarships for entering freshmen in fall 1992. In addition, 135 Dean's Scholarships and six Dean's Scholarships with Distinction were given to other outstanding entering freshmen.

The Georgia Tech student body is taught by a full-time teaching faculty numbering 714 (90 percent hold doctorates). Many are nationally recognized leaders in their fields. As of April 1992, Tech faculty and staff held 128 patents and had 70 patents pending. *U.S. News and World Report* ranked Georgia Tech in the top ten engineering ranked number one. Tech is ranked number 10 in the top 25 U.S. graduate schools of engineering.

Georgia Tech is also a major player in research. During fiscal year 1990-91, research expenditures totaled \$175 million. The National Science Foundation ranked Georgia Tech third among U.S. universities for the amount of engineering and research expenditures. Tech ranked first nationally in research expenditures for electrical engineering research and development. The National Science Foundation ranked Georgia Tech fifth in industry sponsored research, and that represents more than two percent performed nationally by all colleges and universities.

Tech ranks among the top ten U.S. colleges and

universities in research volume for the following disciplines: electrical engineering, mechanical engineering, aerospace engineering, computer science, and physics. The Georgia Tech Research Institute (GTRI) ranks among the 20 largest nonprofit defense contractors in the nation, according to a recent study in *The Chronicle of Higher Education*. In addition, *Business Week* magazine has ranked Tech second among all U.S. universities it called the "academic elite" for their level of industrial interaction.

Research at Tech is conducted through its major colleges (Architecture; Computing; Engineering; Sciences; Management, Policy & International Affairs), 40 interdisciplinary research centers on campus and the Georgia Tech Research Institute, with seven laboratories employing more than 1,458 staff.

Georgia Tech, the largest institution of technology, education, research, and service in the South, has an outreach that extends far beyond the immediate metropolitan Atlanta area. Georgians in every county are connected to the campus through the Institute's network of 12 regional offices. These Industrial Extension offices serve as links to the Tech campus, enabling communities across the state to tap into educational, research, and service resources.

According to James M. Langley, vice president for External Affairs, "Tech is committed to two overriding goals: giving Georgia's young people a top flight technological education, and serving as an engine that drives economic growth throughout the state."

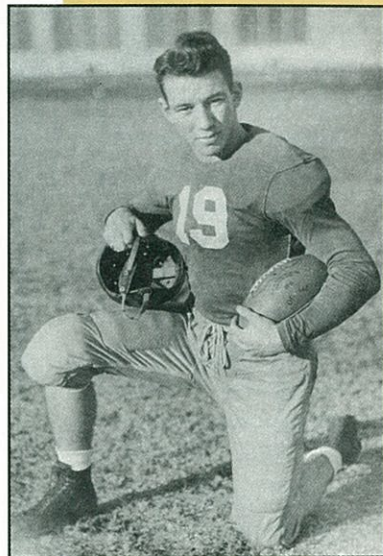
Georgia Tech alumni are the greatest evidence of the Institute's success. Many corporate boards around the nation can claim Tech graduates as members. These successful alumni support an alumni association that was named number one in the country in 1989 and 1990 by the Council for the Advancement and Support of Education.

Tech alumni include former President Jimmy Carter, U.S. Senator Sam Nunn, Delta Air Lines President and CEO Ron Allen, former Atlanta mayors Ivan Allen Jr. and Roy LeCraw, architect John Portman, and seven NASA astronauts—including Rear Admiral Richard Truly (former head of NASA) Captain John Young (a moon walker who also commanded the first space shuttle mission), and Nancy Jan Davis.

The world's eye is on Georgia Tech as it moves into the 1990s. With the announcement in September of 1990 of Atlanta as the host city for the 1996 Summer Olympic Games, Georgia Tech was thrust into the international spotlight as the planned site of the Olympic Village.

Tech produced two multimedia 3-dimensional, interactive videos to showcase the campus and Atlanta for the International Olympic Committee.

President Crecine said, "Our involvement in Atlanta's Olympic bid was early, it was strategic, and Georgia Tech people made a truly significant contribution to its success. Our involvement, past and present, has been predicated on our ability to simultaneously pursue two goals—helping to make the Atlanta bid and the Atlanta Olympics the best ever, and leaving Georgia Tech after the bid and after the Olympics in an overall better position as a university." ○



Georgia Tech's only retired football jersey is the No. 19 worn by Clint Castleberry. The running back from Boys High in Atlanta burst onto the scene in 1942, finishing third in the Heisman Trophy voting as a freshman. Many said he could have been the greatest Yellow Jacket player ever, but he was called to World War II. On Nov. 7, 1944, his plane disappeared, and he was never heard from again.

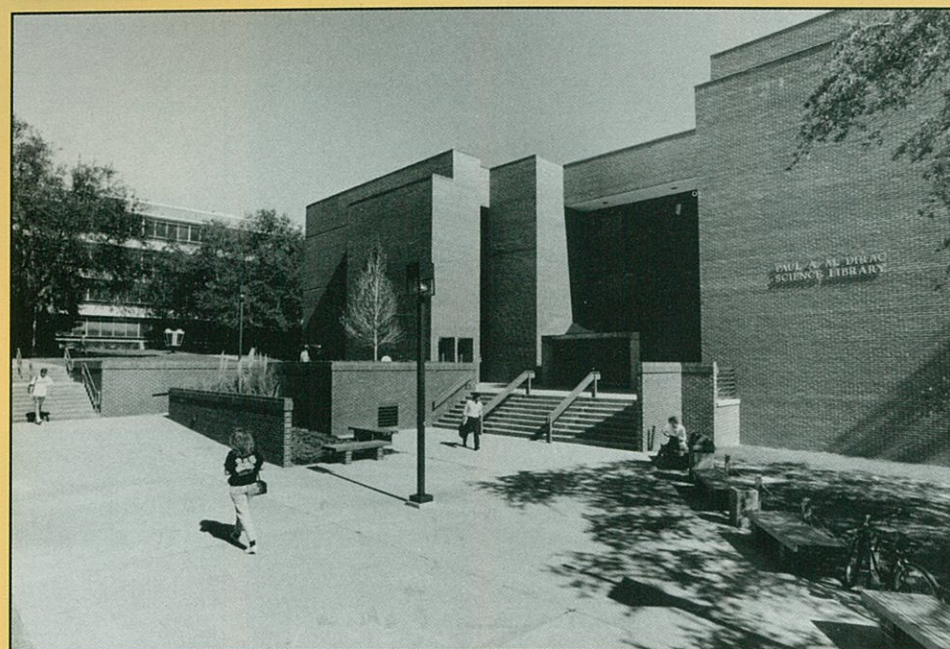

Florida State University

Florida State University, nearing its golden anniversary as a co-educational graduate research institution, is poised on the brink of joining the nation's academic elite.

Located on the oldest continuous site of higher education in Florida and building rapidly on the framework of a highly regarded liberal arts college for women, the university has emerged over the past 45 years as an institution of national and international esteem.

Florida State has begun the 1990s with exceptional strength, energy and vision for the future. And, under the leadership of the university's 11th president, Dr. Dale W. Lick, who took office in August 1991, FSU will continue to build on the foundation of its long history of excellence in scholarship, research and service.

A public institution and a senior member of the nine-member State University System, FSU was founded as an institution of higher learning in 1851 by legislative act and began operating in Tallahassee with its first students in 1857.

The main campus is spread over 396 acres in Tallahassee. The university owns a total of 1,172 acres in Leon, Bay and Franklin counties.

Within the state, FSU maintains facilities at its 25-acre campus in Panama City, its Marine Laboratory on the Gulf of Mexico and the Appleton Museum in Ocala. The university's theater and film professional-training programs, the FSU/Asolo Conserva-

tory of Professional Actor Training and FSU/Asolo Conservatory of Motion Picture, Television and Recording Arts, both located in the Asolo Performing Arts Center in Sarasota, opened in 1990. The Center for Professional Development and Public Service, housed in the Florida State Conference Center on the edge of the main campus, provides extensive credit and non-credit continuing education programs statewide.

Florida State offers 274 graduate and undergraduate degree programs through its eight colleges—Arts and Sciences; Business; Communication; Education; Engineering (operated jointly with Florida A&M University, a historically black institution); Human Sciences; Law; and Social Sciences (which also incorporates the School of Public Administration and Policy)—and eight schools—Criminology and Criminal Justice; Library and Information Studies; Motion Picture, Television and Recording Arts; Music; Nursing; Social Work; Theatre; and Visual Arts and Dance.

With 1,577 members, the FSU faculty currently includes five members of the National Academy of Sciences and four of the American Academy of Arts and Sciences, and also boasts five Nobel laureates.

Library holdings at Florida State include 1.94 million book titles, 18,751 serials and 4.4 million microforms. The main library facility, the Robert M. Stroz Library, is linked via a computerized information system to other state university and national research libraries. The Paul A.M. Dirac Science Center Library

is located at the heart of the university's main science research complex. FSU also maintains extensive music, library science and law libraries, and the Mildred and Claude Pepper Library houses the personal and professional papers of one of Florida's best known political couples.

On the top floor of the Dirac Library is the headquarters of the Supercomputer Computations Research Institute, a multidisciplinary, multinational program established in 1984 that brings together some 50 scientists, engineers and technicians. SCRI is electronically linked to an off-campus research complex at Innovation Park and the university's two powerful supercomputers.

Also providing unique research opportunities is the physics department's tandem Van de Graaff Superconducting Accelerator Laboratory, which houses two powerful atom smashers and is ranked among the top four nuclear research centers in the nation by the National Science Foundation.

Situated in the heart of the state's thriving capital city, Florida State's main campus blends Gothic and modern styles of architecture with the oaks, pines, dogwoods, palms and azaleas of North Florida.

Florida State continues to progress and grow—from its pre-Civil War foundation as the Seminary West of the Suwannee, through the early 20th century as the academically respected Florida State College for Women, returning to coeducational status as a university in 1947, to its modern development as an acclaimed research institution, a top-ranked competitor in intercollegiate athletics and as a standard-setter in the basic sciences and the performing arts. In all areas of its mission of excellence in teaching, research and public service, Florida State University is advancing boldly into the 21st century.

Head Coach Bobby Bowden

What Bobby Bowden means to Florida State University off the playing field cannot be measured, even by the most sophisticated of supercomputers. Respect, sincerity, class, honesty, charisma, charm and humor. When they put that kind of data into the system, a giant replica of Bowden will appear.

Like fine wine, Bobby Bowden, at age 62, keeps getting better. In 1991, he climbed to seventh on the all-time win list. His 216 career victories rank second among active Division I coaches behind only Joe Paterno.

Just how impressive is Bowden's 26-year coaching record? He's now on the same page with all the legends of college football. The six coaches in front of him might as well have invented the game: Bear Bryant, Alonzo Stagg, Pop Warner, Woody Hayes, Bo Schembechler and Paterno.

Bowden's Florida State record is 143-44-3 (.760). That includes a 76-15-1 (.831) record in Tallahassee and a 67-29-2 (.694) mark away from home. His 11-3-1 record in bowl games is truly remarkable. Last year's Cotton Bowl was the 10th straight post-season showing by Bowden's Seminoles, a string in which there has not been a loss.

Bowden achieved some impressive numbers in his previous coaching stops (31-6 at Samford University in Birmingham between 1959 and 1962, and 42-26 at West Virginia from 1970-75), but what he has done at Florida State is simply phenomenal. Eight times in 16 years, his Seminoles have won 10 or more games in a season. Florida State had been to just eight bowls in 29 years before him. Since his arrival, FSU has been to 13 bowl games, including a string of 10 in a row and six New Year's Day trips.
