

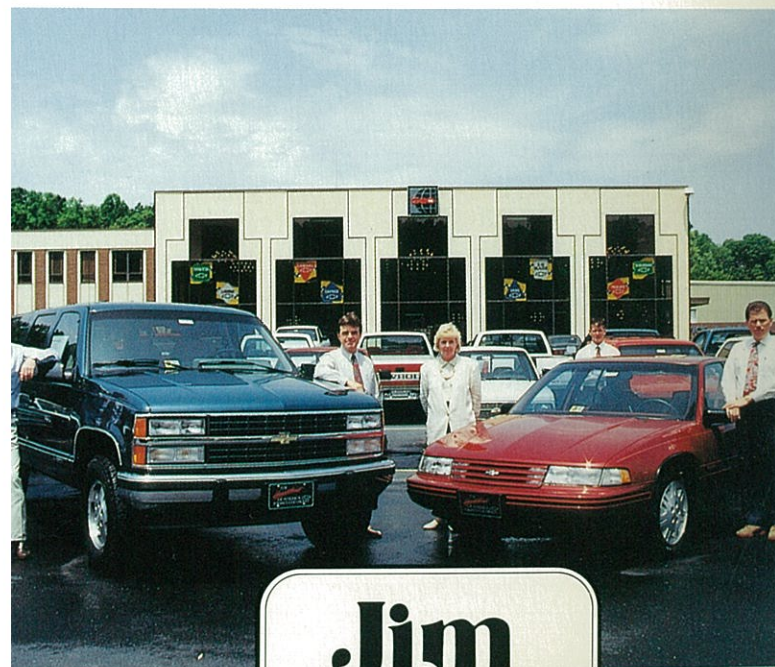
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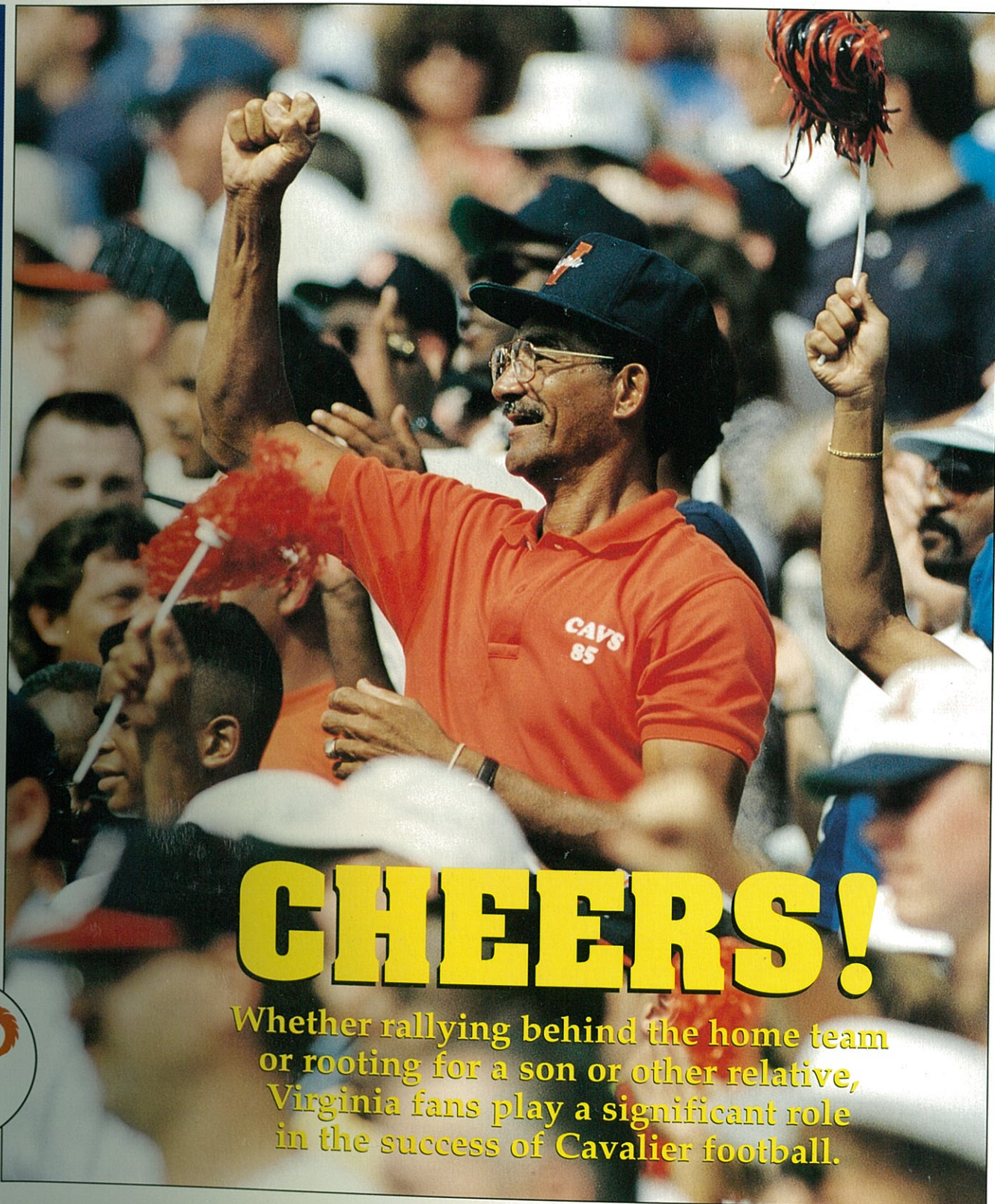

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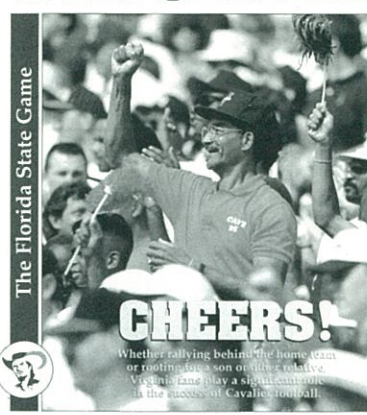

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TONIGHT'S GAME

The University of Virginia football team is back at Scott Stadium tonight for an important Atlantic Coast Conference game with Florida State. It's the first football game between the two schools.

Virginia enters the game ranked 22nd by UPI and *USA Today/CNN*, and 23rd by The Associated Press. The Cavaliers are 6-2 overall and 4-2 in the ACC. UVa stopped a two-game losing streak with a 33-7 victory last Saturday (Oct. 24) over William and Mary here in Scott Stadium. The victory guaranteed the Cavaliers their sixth consecutive winning season. It's the first time Virginia has had six consecutive winning seasons since the 1947-52 seasons.

Florida State (ranked sixth by UPI, *USA Today/CNN* and AP) can clinch the ACC football championship with a victory over the Cavaliers tonight. The Seminoles are 6-1 overall and 6-0 in the conference. Florida State's only loss was at Miami by a score of 19-16. In the ACC, the Seminoles have beaten Duke (48-21), Clemson (24-20), North Carolina State (34-13), Wake Forest (35-7), North Carolina (36-13) and Georgia Tech (29-24). Florida State's games with Clemson, North Carolina State, and Georgia Tech were on the road. The Seminoles did not play last Saturday.

UVa at Scott Stadium

The Cavaliers are 29-5 (.853) at home since the beginning of the 1987 season, including perfect marks of 7-0 in 1991, 6-0 in 1989 and 5-0 in 1987. Virginia had won nine consecutive games at Scott Stadium before losing to Clemson on October 10. Since the start of the 1987 season, Virginia has won 16 of 20 (.800) ACC games played at Scott Stadium.

UVa Under George Welsh

George Welsh is in his 11th season as Virginia's head football coach. The Cavaliers have compiled an overall record of 72-49-3 under Welsh's direction. He is the winningest head coach in Virginia's football history. UVa is 42-28-3 against ACC competition under Welsh. Prior to his arrival, Virginia had a record of 33-121-1 in ACC play.

Notes on Virginia

Tailbacks Jerrod Washington and Kevin Brooks each rushed for over 100 yards in Virginia's victory over William & Mary last Saturday. Washington, making his second start in place of the injured Terry

Kirby, carried the ball 27 times for 197 yards and one touchdown. He carried the ball 20 times for 107 yards in a loss at North Carolina on October 17. Brooks rushed 17 times for 124 yards in the victory over William & Mary. It's the first time UVa has had two running backs rush for over 100 yards in a game since Terry Kirby and Nikki Fisher did it against William & Mary in 1990.

UVa place-kicker Michael Husted tied Virginia single-game records for field goals made and attempted in last week's game with William & Mary. Husted made four of five field goals in the game. He was successful on field goals of 25, 25, 48 and 20 yards after missing a 51-yard attempt. The 48-yard field goal is the longest of his Virginia career. Husted has been successful on 10 of 12 field goals this season.

Virginia defensive end Chris Slade has been in on 13 quarterback sacks (11 solo, two shared) for 114 yards in losses this season and has established an ACC record for sacks in a career. He has been in on 38 quarterback sacks (29 solo, nine shared) during his UVa career. The way the ACC figures sacks, Slade has 33 1/2. The previous ACC record for sacks in a career was 28 by Michael Dean Perry of Clemson (1984-87). Slade is also closing in on the Virginia season sack record of 14 which he established last season. He is one of 12 semifinalists for the 1992 Rotary Lombardi Award. The award is given annually to the college lineman of the year.

Tailback Terry Kirby continues to lead the Atlantic Coast Conference in rushing (average of 147.3 yards a game) and all-purpose yardage (average of 178.0 yards a game) despite being sidelined the last two games after fracturing a shoulder blade against Clemson. He's ranked third in the nation in rushing and fifth in all-purpose yardage. For the season, he's carried the ball 132 times for 884 yards (average of 6.7 yards a carry) and four touchdowns, and caught 23 passes for 183 yards (average of 8.0 yards a catch) and two touchdowns.

UVa quarterback Bobby Goodman has 20 touchdown passes this season and needs one more to tie Shawn Moore's record of 21 touchdown passes during the 1990 season. Goodman leads the ACC in passing efficiency and is second in the nation.

Virginia cornerback Greg McClellan returned a pass interception 25 yards for a touchdown against William & Mary last Saturday. McClellan's play enabled UVa to draw even with the Tribe at 7-7 after William & Mary took an early lead in the game. The last Virginia player to return an interception for a touchdown was linebacker P.J. Killian against Kansas last season.

The Virginia defensive unit has 28 quarterback sacks this season for 221 yards in losses.

The Cavaliers' leading tacklers through eight games are linebackers P.J. Killian and Randy Neal. Killian has been in on 81 tackles and Neal on 67.

Notes on Florida State

Bobby Bowden is in his 17th season as the head football coach at Florida State. His Florida State teams have compiled an overall record of 149-45-3. Now in his 27th year as a collegiate head coach, his teams have compiled an overall record of 222-77-3 and he is the nation's second winningest active coach. Bowden was the head coach at Samford (31-6 in four years) and West Virginia (42-26 in six years) before becoming the head coach at Florida State.

The Seminoles are led offensively by junior quarterback Charlie Ward, junior tailback Sean Jackson and freshman wide receiver Tamarick Vanover. Ward has completed 122 of 225 passes (54.2 percent) for 1,573 yards and 12 touchdowns with 15 interceptions. He's also rushed 66 times for 223 yards (average of 3.4 yards a carry) and three touchdowns.

Jackson is Florida State's leading rusher with 466 yards and three touchdowns in 88 carries, while Vanover leads the Seminoles in receptions with 26 for 346 yards (average of 13.3 yards a catch) and two touchdowns. Vanover has also returned four kickoffs for 217 yards (average of 54.3 yards a return) and two touchdowns.

Defensively, Florida State is led by junior inside linebacker Marvin Jones and sophomore outside linebacker Derrick Brooks. Jones has been in on 79 total tackles, 50 of them unassisted including one quarterback sack, while Brooks has been in on 66 total tackles, 37 of them unassisted including two quarterback sacks. Jones, like Virginia's Chris Slade, is a semifinalist for the Rotary Lombardi Award.

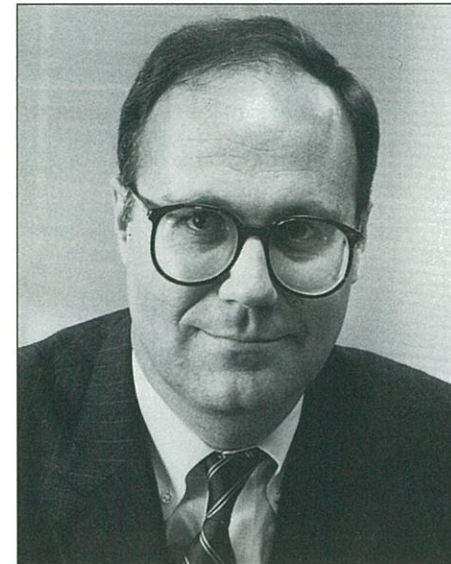
Sophomore cornerback Corey Sawyer leads the ACC in interceptions with five and in punt returns. Sawyer has returned 22 punts for 363 yards (average of 16.5 yards a return) and one touchdown.

Basketball Coming Soon

The University of Virginia men's basketball team makes its first appearance of the 1992-93 preseason next Saturday (Nov. 7) after the UVa-North Carolina State football game. The Cavaliers play their annual Orange-Blue intrasquad game at 7 p.m. Celebrity coaches for the game will be Bruce Hornsby and Woody Harrelson.

PRESIDENT JOHN T. CASTEEN III



John T. Casteen III became the University of Virginia's seventh president in August 1990. Previously, he had been president of the University of Connecticut since 1985 and secretary of education for the Commonwealth of Virginia from 1982 to 1985.

During his tenure at Connecticut, Casteen taught courses in English while overseeing a system that included the main campus of 25,000 students at Storrs, five regional campuses, and schools of law, social work, medicine, and dentistry.

A native of Portsmouth, Va., Casteen holds three degrees in English from Virginia. He received his B.A. degree with high honors in 1965, an M.A. degree in 1966 and a Ph.D. degree in 1970.

After teaching medieval literature at the

University of California at Berkeley from 1970 to 1975, Casteen returned to Virginia as dean of undergraduate admissions and assistant professor of English. He became an associate professor in the Department of English two years later. During his seven years in the admissions deanship, Casteen saw record numbers of student applications as well as an increase in the number of applications from black students and some of the country's most distinguished high school graduates.

Virginia Governor Charles Robb appointed Casteen as his secretary of education in 1982. While serving in the Governor's cabinet, Casteen advocated rigorous standards for both secondary and higher education, sought to improve the pace of Virginia's college desegregation efforts, initiated programs of state support for research, and served as the chief spokesperson on education before the General Assembly.

Casteen is a member of the University's Raven Society, Phi Beta Kappa and Omicron Delta Kappa. He holds honorary degrees from the Shenandoah College and Conservatory of Music, Bentley College and Piedmont Virginia Community College. He also has served as a member of the National Merit Scholarship National Selection Committee, trustee and chair of the College Entrance Examination Board, commissioner of the Education Commission of the States, member of the Board of Control for the Southern Regional Education Board, and commissioner of the New England Board of Higher Education.

Casteen, who holds the George M. Kaufman Presidential Professorship at UVa, writes short fiction as well as essays and papers in medieval literature, bibliog-

raphy and public policy. A collection of his short stories received the 1987 Mishima Award for fiction.

Casteen's wife, Lotta, a native of Sweden and an Oberlin College graduate, earned her doctorate degree in the University's English Department. Casteen has three children: John T., IV (21), a fourth-year student at UVa, Elizabeth (13) and Lars (10).

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THE UNIVERSITY OF VIRGINIA

History

The University of Virginia was founded in 1819 by Thomas Jefferson, who outlined the institution's purpose, designed its buildings, supervised construction, planned the curriculum and directed the recruitment of the first faculty. As the first Rector of the University, Jefferson presided over the school's governing body, known as the Board of Visitors. James Madison and James Monroe were members of the board in early years.

When it opened for classes in 1825, the University of Virginia represented a dramatic innovation in American education. In an era when colleges trained students almost exclusively for teaching and the ministry, Jefferson dedicated his University to the education of leaders in practical affairs and public service.

The Grounds

Jefferson designed his "academical village" to house teachers and students alike in four long rows of rooms and larger buildings that provided classrooms and dwelling space for faculty families. The Rotunda, a half-scale version of the Pantheon, is the focal point of the historic central Grounds, which a 1976 vote by the American Institute of Architects proclaimed the outstanding achievement of American architecture. These historic buildings were named to the prestigious World Heritage List in 1988.

The University Today

Although the University of Virginia has expanded to encompass more than 1,000 acres, it still retains the intimacy that characterized the academical village. University planners have been careful to reserve open space for study and contemplation while erecting modern facilities for each of the six undergraduate schools.

With an enrollment of 18,006 students, the University remains small among major state-supported institutions. The full-time instructional faculty at the University is almost 1,700. Class size is carefully controlled, and the ratio of students to faculty is low, at 11-1. Sixty-one percent of the student body is from Virginia. The number of women and men is approximately equal and 9.4 percent are African-American. The bachelor's degree is offered in 49 fields and

dent in the awards and honors many UVa students receive. The University has graduated 40 Rhodes Scholars, the highest number graduated by public institutions. The University attracts some of the very best students in the country through the merit-based Jefferson Scholars Program. Twenty-five percent of the undergraduates in the College of Arts and Sciences are on the dean's list.

Four years at UVa prepares students well for becoming adults

who are thinking, contributing members of society. Whether they go directly to a job (many do), teach English in Africa for a year, enroll in law or medical school (more than eighty-five percent of UVa students who apply are accepted), or enter graduate school to pursue the scholarly life as a profession, their undergraduate years at Virginia provide the chance to explore subjects and ideas that will lay the foundation for their future careers and lives.

Athletics

Virginia fields 12 intercollegiate sports for men and 11 for women, all of which compete in the highly regarded Atlantic Coast Conference.

The overall success of Virginia's varsity teams in recent years can be matched by few schools in the country. The Virginia football team has made three consecutive postseason bowl appearances and four in the last five years. In 1990, UVa climbed to number one in the regular season national polls (Associated Press and United Press International) and played Tennessee in the 1991 USF&G Sugar Bowl. The 1989 Cavaliers won a share of UVa's first-ever ACC championship and met Illinois in the 1990 Florida Citrus Bowl. Off the field, Virginia has received recognition every year since 1984 from the College Football Association for its graduation rate involving scholarship football players.

Making its 14th postseason appearance in the last 15 years, the men's basketball team won the 1992 National Invitation Tournament championship. Virginia also won an NIT championship in 1980 and has reached the NCAA Final Four twice (in 1981 and 1984). The women's basketball team made its third consecutive NCAA

The Faculty

In creating an academical village, Jefferson sought scholars who had distinguished reputations and were willing to live among their students—an unusual, but from Jefferson's point of view, essential combination. Virginia's faculty, one of the most distinguished groups of scholars and researchers in the country, still exemplifies this tradition.

The University has established 320 endowed professorships for outstanding scholars, and the Center for Advanced Studies plays a major role in attracting and retaining scholars of national and international distinction.

Student Achievement

The quality of the student body is evi-

Final Four appearance in 1992. It marked the Cavalier's ninth straight trip to NCAA postseason play.

Virginia regularly wins its share of state, conference and national honors in many other sports as well. Over the past three years alone, UVa has claimed two national championships in men's soccer and one in women's lacrosse. At the same time, UVa student-athletes graduate at a rate which is comparable to that of the University's entire student body.

University and Community Arts

The University contributes to the cultural milieu with a wide range of events sponsored by academic departments and student groups. Among these are the Tuesday Evening Concert Series, the University Union Speakers Series; talks by government officials and public figures sponsored by the Student Legal Forum; several student singing groups, and a Collegium Musicum baroque group sponsored by the music department.

The University's Bayly Museum's broad-ranging art collections include outstanding examples of 20th-century American art and European art from Jefferson's era. The Bayly's growing permanent collections are supplemented by frequent visiting shows, the Fayerweather Gallery, which displays student and faculty art and other exhibits, and several private galleries in the city of Charlottesville.

Dramatic productions are presented year round by professional and local groups, including the highly acclaimed Heritage Repertory Theatre and the Virginia Players in the University's well-equipped drama and fine arts center. The theatre department regularly presents drama, musicals, and small workshop productions by students in the Culbreth and Helms theaters.

Activities

Plays performed by the Virginia Players; concerts of the Tuesday Evening Concert Series, and student musicians; films from Cinematheque and the Filmwatchers Club; debates staged by the Virginia Debaters and the 150-year-old Jefferson Society; lectures sponsored by the Student Legal Forum, University Union, and various academic departments; and sports in all seasons, intramural and intercollegiate, dominate the University calendar.

The University Union, to which all students belong, generates many of these extracurricular events, including the Union short courses, rock concerts, dances and dinners, and contests in photography,

playwriting, and painting. Madison House, the second largest student organization, provides a wide range of community service programs.

Adding to the varied social life of Virginia students are nearly 60 fraternities and sororities as well as numerous student clubs and organizations—all providing opportunities for friendship, leadership and service.

Newcomb Hall, the University Union building on the central Grounds, is the center for student activities along with nearby Peabody Hall, now connected to Newcomb. Newcomb Hall contains several types of dining facilities, a sweet shop, a ballroom, a bookstore, numerous meeting rooms and offices of student organizations. Two other student centers, the International Center and Luther P. Jackson House concentrate on international and black students, and the Graduate Student Lounge provides a meeting place for colloquia and lectures sponsored by various graduate clubs.

Several student publications record the school session, including the *Cavalier Daily*, the *University Journal*, the *Declaration*, the *Law Weekly*, and the yearbook, *Corks and Curls*. Magazines add their commentary as well: the *Virginia Literary Review*, *Lampoon*, *Thought-lines*, and *Loki* among them. Three student-staffed radio stations, WTJU, WUVA and WIRE, supply student-oriented musical programming.

The Honor System

The Honor System is one of the University's oldest and most venerated traditions. Based on the fundamental assumption that anyone who enrolls at the University subscribes to a code of ethics forbidding lying, cheating, and stealing, the Honor System allows students the kind of personal freedom possible only in an environment where respect and trust are presumed. For nearly 150 years, this system has been run entirely by students.

The Libraries

The University's library system consists of 16 libraries containing nearly three million volumes. Alderman Library houses the principal general collections. Clemons Library, a reading library designed primarily for undergraduate use, provides a general collection of frequently used materials in all fields, reserve reading titles, an audio and video collection, computer terminals for student use, group study rooms, and facilities for the handicapped. Departmental libraries provide specialized collections in engineering and applied science, music, education, commerce, psychology, biology, chemistry, astronomy, mathemat-

ics, business administration, fine arts, law and medicine.

The University's rare books and manuscripts are valued at more than \$200 million.

Computer Facilities

The University operates extensive computer facilities to support research and instructional programs (Academic Computing Center), administrative services (Administrative Computing Services), and hospital systems (Medical Center Computing).

The Academic Computing Center provides computer resources and services to faculty, students and staff. This support for the research and instructional programs of the University includes a wide variety of computer systems and peripheral equipment, ranging from single-user microcomputers and workstations to large mainframe systems. Services include user training, documentation, data communications services, and professional programming and data entry services.

Research

The University supports research and scholarship in many fields. Research in the humanities has been a long-recognized strength at the University, and programs in the biomedical, physical, and engineering sciences have developed as areas of excellence. Research in the sciences is supported by a University-wide computer network, state-of-the-art facilities for the study of DNA, two astronomical telescopes, a nuclear reactor, and an impressive variety of equipment for the analysis and imaging of substances. The Aerospace Research Laboratory was dedicated in the School of Engineering and Applied Science. This laboratory will study the technical aspects of the National Aerospace Plane, which is designed to take off from an airport and fly into space orbit.

In the spring of 1989, the University became the first U.S. environmental research center of the International Institute of Applied Systems Analysis (IIASA). This nongovernmental research institute brings together scientists from more than 20 nations and a variety of disciplines to work jointly on problems of international significance, including the environment, population growth, technological risk, international negotiations, and food and agriculture.

New research instrumentation is being acquired continuously at a rate in excess of \$10 million each year. In the past year, external support of research programs exceeded \$100 million. The University is among the top 100 public universities in competitively-awarded federal grants.

The George Welsh Era

Long regarded as one of the finest college football coaches in the nation, George Welsh enters his 11th season at the University of Virginia having led the Cavaliers to five consecutive winning seasons and three consecutive bowl invitations.

The job done by Welsh and his staff last fall was recognized as one of the finest of his long and successful career.

UVa lost 15 starters from its 1990 team that compiled an 8-4 record, was ranked

number one in the nation for three weeks and competed in the USF&G Sugar Bowl. Among the starters missing from that team were two players that finished among the top six in the 1990 Heisman Trophy voting—quarterback Shawn Moore (fourth) and wide receiver Herman Moore (sixth).

After starting the 1991 season 1-2, the young Cavaliers finished with a flourish under Welsh's steady leadership to earn a Gator Bowl invitation. UVa won its last five regular season games and was unbeaten in the last eight games of the regular

season. Virginia finished with an overall record of 8-3-1 following a Gator Bowl loss to Oklahoma. Statistically, UVa led the ACC in both scoring offense (28.5) and scoring defense (10.8) during the 1991 regular season. Virginia ranked fourth nationally in scoring defense and sixth in pass efficiency defense (91.1 rating) among NCAA Division I-A programs during the regular season.

Welsh was honored in 1991 as the Atlantic Coast Conference Coach of the Year, the Bobby Dodd Coach of the Year and the National Coach of the Year by *College & Pro Football Newsweekly*.

Welsh has spent the past 10 seasons at Virginia stamping the word "never" out of the vocabulary of Cavalier fans. Before he arrived at Virginia, the Cavaliers had never been invited to a bowl game, never won 10 games in a season and never were ranked higher than ninth in The Associated Press poll.

Last season's success came on the heels of two outstanding football seasons. Virginia's 8-4 USF&G Sugar Bowl season in 1990 was preceded by a 1989 season in which the Cavaliers compiled a 10-3 record, earned the school's first ACC football championship, received a top-20 ranking and participated in Virginia's first New Year's Day bowl game (Florida Citrus Bowl).

UVa's success in 1989 came against perhaps the most demanding schedule in school history. The Cavaliers played five teams during the regular season that played in bowl games and four others who finished the season with winning records.

Welsh has led UVa to four bowl games in the last five years, and five bowl appearances in the last eight years, including wins in the 1984 Peach Bowl and the 1987 All American Bowl.

Nowhere has Welsh's presence been more evident than UVa's success in the ACC. Welsh has guided Virginia to a 38-26-3 record in conference play, while his predecessors posted a 33-121-1 ACC mark.

Welsh first led Virginia onto the national scene with an 8-2-2 record in 1984, his third season at UVa. Virginia capped that season with a thrilling 27-24 victory over Purdue in the Peach Bowl. Other big wins that year included a convincing 27-7 win over then 15th-ranked West Virginia in Morgantown, W.Va., and a 26-23 cliffhanger over bowl-bound Virginia Tech. The Cavaliers finished the season ranked in all the major Top-20 polls.

His 1987 squad rallied from a 3-4 start to win its final four regular season games and earn an appearance in the All American Bowl. The Cavaliers handed Brigham Young a 22-16 loss in the bowl game as UVa ended the season with a final Top-20

ranking by *The Sporting News*.

Hand-in-hand with Virginia's recent on-the-field success has come much individual recognition for both Welsh and his players. In addition to earning National Coach of the Year recognition in 1989 (by the Washington Touchdown Club) and 1991, Welsh has been named ACC Coach of the Year four times at Virginia (1983, 1984, 1989 and 1991).

A number of Welsh's players have earned All-America honors at Virginia. Last season, offensive tackle Ray Roberts and defensive end Chris Slade earned first-team All-America honors. In 1990, quarterback Shawn Moore and wide receiver Herman Moore earned first-team All-America honors.

Welsh also coached Virginia's first unanimous All-American—offensive tackle Jim Dombrowski (1982-85). Dombrowski was selected by the New Orleans Saints in the first round of the 1986 NFL draft. Virginia has since had a player selected in the first round in three of the past four NFL drafts. They include: Jeff Lageman in 1989 (14th pick, New York Jets); Herman Moore in 1991 (10th, Detroit Lions); and Ray Roberts in 1992 (10th, Seattle Seahawks).

Welsh and his staff have made an equally strong commitment to academic excellence. Virginia won the College Football Association's Academic Achievement Award for the highest graduation rate of scholarship football players in 1985 (92.6 percent) and 1986 (88.9 percent). UVa also received honorable-mention recognition in 1984 and every year from 1987 through 1992.

"One of the things that attracted me to Virginia was its reputation as an outstanding academic institution," said Welsh, who signed a new eight-year contract in March of 1990 that will keep him in the UVa athletic department through the 1997 football season. "I like the idea that you can have high academic standards, a high graduation rate among the athletes and have a good football team that will be competitive each week."

Welsh, a 1956 graduate of the United States Naval Academy, came to Virginia from Navy in 1982. During his nine years as head football coach at Navy, his teams compiled an overall record of 55-46-1, participated in three bowl games and posted winning seasons in each of his final four seasons.

Welsh was appointed head coach at Navy in 1973, following 10 years as an assistant coach at Penn State under Rip Engle and Joe Paterno.

Welsh guided Navy to its first bowl appearance in 15 years in 1978 when his team defeated Brigham Young 23-15 in the inaugural Holiday Bowl. Two years later,

Welsh guided the Midshipmen to an 8-4 record and a final ranking of 17th in the nation by United Press International.

Welsh was a standout quarterback for Navy, where he finished third in the 1955 Heisman Trophy balloting after leading the nation in passing and total offense as a senior. He led Navy to a 21-0 upset over heavily favored Mississippi in the 1955 Sugar Bowl.

Born August 26, 1933, in Coaldale, Pa., Welsh played his early football at Coaldale High School and Wyoming Seminary Prep. He was appointed to the Naval Academy in 1952. When he was not quarterbacking the Navy football team, he was an infielder for the baseball team. Welsh won a total of six varsity letters before graduation and was awarded the Thompson Trophy Cup as the midshipman who had done the most for the "promotion of athletics at the Naval Academy."

Assigned to the USS Des Moines after graduation in 1956, Welsh played football one year for the Norfolk (Va.) Naval Base Tars, but torn knee ligaments before the

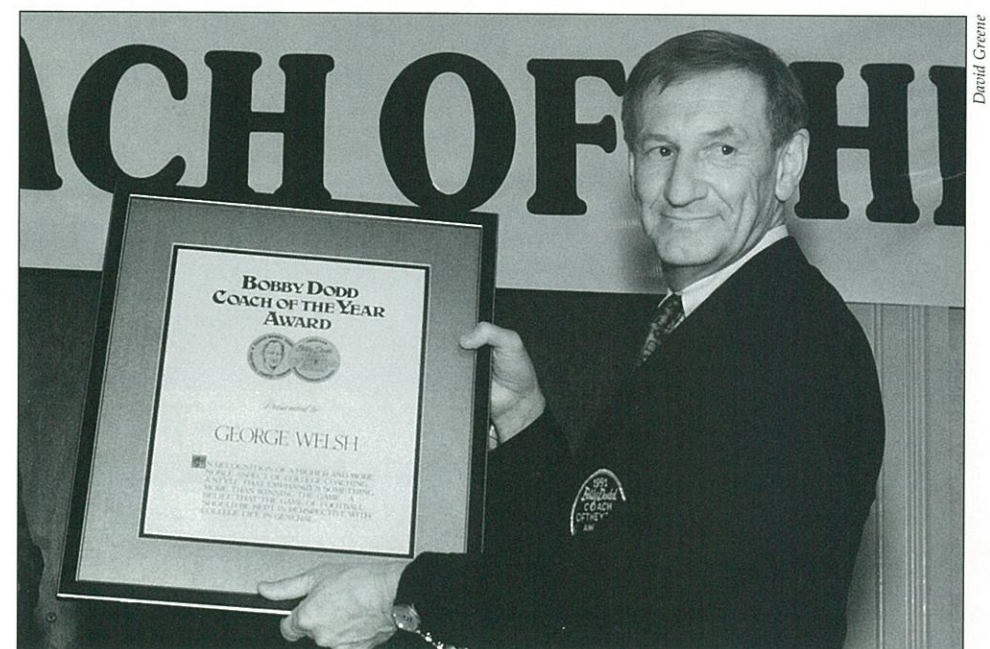
1957 service season ended his active playing career. After 32 months on the Des Moines and a tour on the staff of Commander, Cruiser Division 4, Welsh returned to the Naval Academy in 1960. He assisted with the football program in 1960-61 under Wayne Hardin, helping the Midshipmen to the 1960 Orange Bowl.

Welsh left the academy for a tour aboard the destroyer USS Fletcher in 1962. He left the service with the rank of lieutenant in July of 1963 and joined Rip Engle's Penn State football coaching staff a month later.

Welsh owns a 66-47-3 record in 10 years at Virginia and is the winningest coach in the history of UVa football. Welsh also remains the winningest coach in Navy history. His overall record in 19 seasons as a collegiate head coach is 121-93-4. Only Welsh and the legendary Bear Bryant (Alabama and Kentucky) have the most wins at two different Division I-A schools.

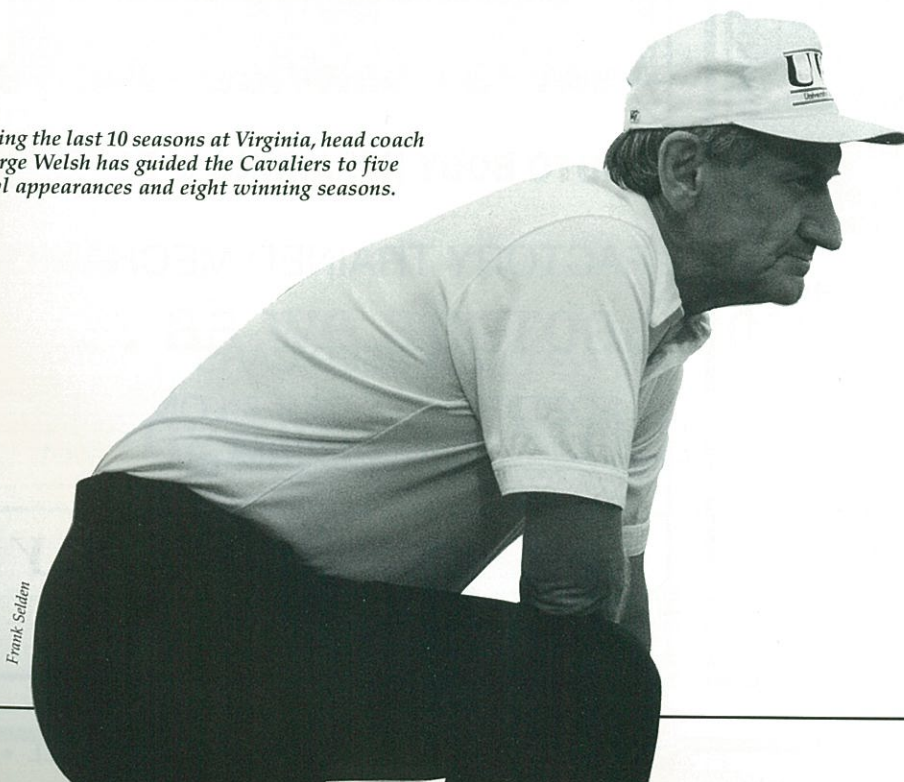
Welsh is married to the former Sandra Hubisak of Bedford, Pa. The couple has four children: Sally, George, Matt and Adam.

Named 1991 National and Atlantic Coast Conference Coach of the Year, George Welsh has led the Virginia football program through a decade of unprecedented success.



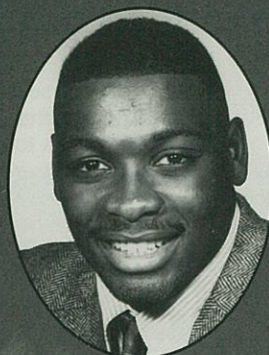
Among his many 1991 coaching honors, George Welsh was named Bobby Dodd Coach of the Year by a panel of former collegiate coaches.

During the last 10 seasons at Virginia, head coach George Welsh has guided the Cavaliers to five bowl appearances and eight winning seasons.

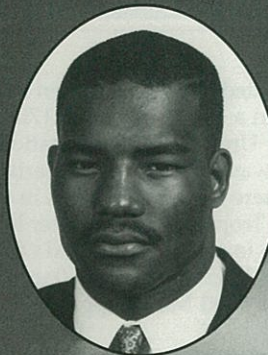

MIKE ARCHER Linebackers Coach



Mike Archer is in his second season at Virginia and is in charge of the Cavalier linebackers.

From 1987 to 1990, Archer was the head football coach at Louisiana State University. His four-year record at LSU was 27-18-1. He led the Tigers to a 10-1-1 record, a Gator Bowl victory and a number-five national ranking (AP) in his first season at Louisiana State in 1987. He was, at the time, the youngest Division I-A head football coach in the nation (34). Archer's 1988 LSU squad won the Southeastern Conference championship with a 6-1 conference record and an overall mark of 8-4. Following the 1990 season, Archer served as an assistant coach on the East team in the East-West Shrine Football Classic.

Archer was elevated to head coach at Louisiana State after first serving as an assistant there for three seasons under Bill Arnsparger. Archer was in charge of the defensive backs in 1984 and served as both defensive backs coach and defensive coordinator in 1985 and 1986.

During Archer's tenure as a LSU assistant coach, the Tigers appeared in the Liberty Bowl (1985) and two Sugar Bowls (1985 and 1987), won the 1986 SEC championship and finished 10th in the final 1986 Associated Press poll. Louisiana State's defensive backfield led the SEC in interceptions in 1986, tying the school record for most interceptions in a season with 27.

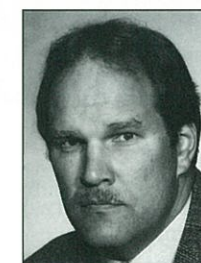
Archer originally came to LSU from the University of Miami, where he spent five

seasons as the defensive backs coach and helped lead the Hurricanes to the 1983 national championship.

A native of State College, Pa., Archer graduated from Miami in 1975. He was a two-year starter at free safety for the Hurricanes and also punted. Archer served as a graduate assistant football coach at Miami from 1976-77 and as an administrative assistant in 1978.

He is married to the former Barbara Pollak of Kansas City, Mo. The couple has two children: Jeffrey Matthew, 10; and Betsy Ann, 6.

JIM BOLLMAN Offensive Guards and Centers Coach



Jim Bollman is in his second season at Virginia. He is in charge of the offensive guards and centers this fall after coaching the offensive line in 1991.

Bollman joined the Cavalier football program in March of 1991 after spending five years as an assistant coach at Youngstown State in Youngstown, Ohio. He was the offensive coordinator at Youngstown State in 1989 and 1990, and the Penguins' defensive coordinator from 1986 to 1988.

Bollman came to YSU from N.C. State, where he served as assistant head coach for three seasons. He coached the offensive line at N.C. State in 1983 and 1984 and the Wolfpack's inside linebackers in 1985.

Prior to working at N.C. State, Bollman coached the offensive line at Miami University in Oxford, Ohio, from 1978 to 1982. He served as a graduate assistant at Miami in 1977.

Bollman was a standout offensive lineman at Ohio University in Athens, Ohio, before graduating with a bachelor's degree in business education in 1977.

He is married to the former Terri Claffey of Kettering, Ohio. The couple has two children: Courtney, 11; and Stephanie, 8.

RICK LANTZ Defensive Coordinator



Rick Lantz, Virginia's defensive coordinator, is in his second season with the Cavalier football coaching staff.

Lantz oversaw the Cavaliers' change last year from a 5-2 defensive alignment to a more aggressive 4-3.

The team responded by ranking fourth in the nation in 1991 in scoring defense (average of 10.8 points a game) and sixth in the nation in passing efficiency defense (91.1 rating). Virginia led the Atlantic Coast Conference in both of those categories. In the final five games of the 1991 regular season, UVa allowed only 26 points, an average of 5.2 points a game.

Lantz came to Virginia from the University of Louisville, where he spent five seasons as defensive coordinator and linebackers coach. During Lantz's final season at Louisville in 1990, the Cardinals finished with a 10-1-1 record, defeated Alabama 34-7 in the Fiesta Bowl and were ranked 14th in the nation by The Associated Press and 12th by United Press International. Defensively, Louisville allowed an average of 12.8 points a game and ranked sixth among Division I-A teams in the nation in scoring defense and sixth in total defense (259.5). Before Lantz's arrival at Louisville in 1986, the Cardinals were ranked 106th in the nation in total defense in 1985.

Lantz has a total of 26 years of experience as a collegiate football coach and was an assistant coach with the New England Patriots of the National Football League in 1981. Before joining the Louisville football coaching staff in 1986, he served as defensive line coach for two seasons at Notre Dame and as defensive coordinator for two seasons at Georgia Tech. His other assistant coaching stops include the University of Miami (1977-80), the U.S. Naval Academy (1971-76), the University of Buffalo (1968-70) and Boston University (1965-67).

Lantz also served four years in the U.S. Marine Corps and was the head football

coach at Bridgton Academy in Bridgton, Maine, in 1964.

Lantz is a native of New Britain, Conn., and a 1963 graduate of Central Connecticut State University.

KEN MACK Running Backs Coach



Ken Mack, a former running back at North Carolina, is in his 11th season as an assistant coach at Virginia and is in charge of the Cavalier running backs. Mack previously served under head coach George Welsh for one season at Navy

before coming to Charlottesville in 1982.

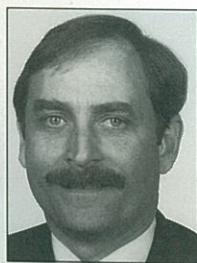
A native of Cary, N.C., Mack won four letters in football, track and field and basketball at Southern Wayne Senior High School in Mt. Olive, N.C. He was an All-North Carolina prep selection and a high school All-American before matriculating at North Carolina.

At UNC, Mack won three letters as a running back, playing on the Tar Heels' Peach Bowl team in 1976, and the 1977 Liberty Bowl squad. In the spring of his senior season, he received the Spring Hustler Award.

A 1979 graduate of North Carolina, Mack remained at Chapel Hill for one year as a part-time football assistant. He then spent the 1980 season as offensive backfield coach at Howard University in Washington, D.C., before joining the Navy staff as defensive ends coach in 1981.

He is married to the former Sherry Collette Greenfield of Goldsboro, N.C.

ART MARKOS Defensive Backs Coach



Art Markos is in his 11th season as a member of the UVA coaching staff and is in charge of Virginia's defensive backs.

Markos joined George Welsh's coaching staff at Navy as defensive interior line coach in 1977 and came to Virginia when Welsh was named

the Cavaliers' head coach. Before that, Markos had served as head football coach and director of athletics at the Naval Academy Preparatory School (NAPS) for four years.

Growing up in Oradell, N.J., Markos was a three-sport letterman at River Dell Regional High School, playing as a wide receiver and defensive back in football, as a guard in basketball and as a pitcher in baseball.

He went on to letter as a defensive back at Springfield College. Markos earned his bachelor of science degree from that Massachusetts school in 1970.

His first coaching assignment was as head basketball and head football coach at Classical Junior High School in Springfield during the 1970-71 school year. He joined the Naval Academy football staff as a junior varsity coach for the 1971 and 1972 seasons. In 1973, Markos was appointed athletic director and head football coach at NAPS and directed that school to a 19-12 record over the next four years.

He is married to the former Nancy Jean Egner of Hillsdale, N.J. The couple has two children: Lance, 17; and Wendy, 15.

TOM O'BRIEN Offensive Coordinator/ Quarterbacks Coach



Tom O'Brien is in his second season as Virginia's offensive coordinator and quarterbacks coach after previously serving nine years as an offensive line coach at UVA. He is the first offensive coordinator at Virginia under Cavalier head

coach George Welsh.

Virginia finished first last season in the Atlantic Coast Conference in scoring offense (average of 28.5 points a game), second in total offense (399.6) and rushing offense (187.5) and third in passing offense (212.1).

A native of Cincinnati, Ohio, O'Brien has been with Welsh as an assistant coach for the past 17 years, first at Navy and now at Virginia. He was an assistant coach in charge of the offensive line at Navy for seven years before coming with Welsh to Virginia before the 1982 season. O'Brien coached the guards and centers for six years at UVA and was the offensive line coach for three years before being promoted to offensive coordinator and quarterbacks coach in February of 1991.

O'Brien was a co-captain and an All-City end at St. Xavier High School. He later en-

joyed an outstanding collegiate career at Navy, where he was a three-year starter at defensive end from 1968 to 1970. O'Brien was named to the ECAC All-East weekly team in 1969 for his performance in the Midshipmen's 10-0 win over Virginia. He had a hand in a fumble recovery and made two clutch tackles in a key fourth-quarter defensive stand that afternoon.

Following his graduation from the Academy in 1971, O'Brien accepted his commission as a second lieutenant in the United States Marine Corps. He served as an assistant on the plebe football staff for one season before spending a year at the Quantico Marine Base in Virginia, playing on the last Quantico football team. He then had a two-year tour of duty as an air traffic controller in California, followed by a year's tour in Japan.

He resigned from the service in 1980, and served several years as a major in the U.S. Marine Corps Reserves.

He is married to the former Jennifer Byrd of San Diego. The couple has three children, Colleen Frances, 12; Daniel Patrick, 10; and Bridget, 9.

BOB PETCHEL Defensive Line Coach



Bob Petchel, who previously served as an assistant under George Welsh for one year at Navy and as an assistant under Joe Paterno for two seasons at Penn State, is in his 11th season as an assistant coach at Virginia. Petchel coaches

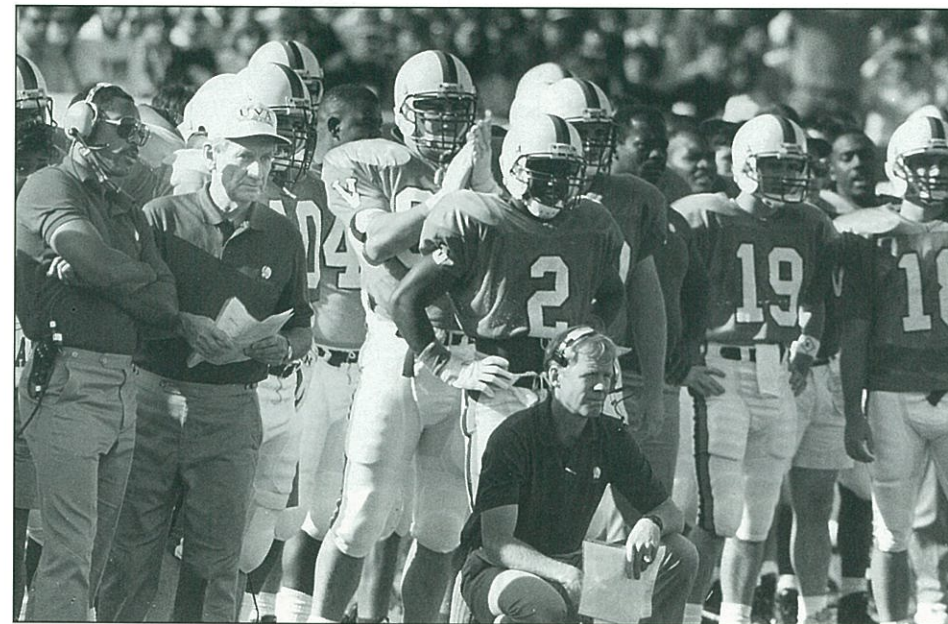
the UVA defensive line.

Tom Sherman joined George Welsh's Virginia staff in 1982, following two years as an assistant coach at Rutgers University. He is in his sixth season as UVA's wide receivers coach. Following Virginia's 1986 season, Sherman as-

sisted Welsh with coaching the South's offensive unit in the 49th Annual Blue-Gray All-Star Football Classic.

A 1968 graduate of Penn State, Sherman played on the 1967 Nittany Lion squad that tied Florida State in the Gator Bowl. In his three varsity seasons at Penn State, Sherman saw action as a quarterback, split end and defensive back.

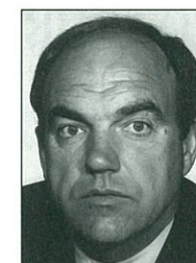
A native of Pittsburgh, Pa., Sherman

Wilmer, who grew up in Buena Vista, Va., attended Parry McCluer High School

and Staunton Military Academy. On the Way to the NIT Championship, Stith's Number Retired

In a ceremony after the Virginia-N.C. State game on March 3, Virginia retired the jersey of basketball star Bryant Stith. Following a 29-point, nine-rebound effort in Virginia's final home game of the season, he became the sixth player in Virginia history to have his number retired.

While leading the Cavaliers to the 1992 NIT Championship and being named as the tournament MVP, Stith capped a stellar collegiate career with one of the most outstanding seasons in Virginia basketball history. Averaging a team-high 20.7 points per game this season, he was named to the All-ACC team for the third consecutive year. Stith is only the fifth player in ACC history to be named ACC Rookie of the Year and be selected first-team ACC for three consecutive seasons. He finished his career as Virginia's all-time leading scorer with 2,516 points. He also passed Virginia Tech's Bimbo Coles to become the all-time Division I leading scorer in Virginia state history. Stith also joined former UVA star Ralph Sampson as the only players in ACC history to score 500 points and grab 200 rebounds in all four seasons of their careers.

Virginia's Scott Stadium

The home of the Cavaliers for over half a century and the only place in the state of Virginia to enjoy thrilling head-to-head Atlantic Coast Conference football, picturesque Scott Stadium provides the perfect setting for big-time college gridiron action.

Virginia went undefeated at Scott Stadium in 1991, playing seven home games for only the fourth time in school history and the first time since 1911. UVA is 26-4 at home during the past five seasons, including perfect marks of 7-0 in 1991, 6-0 in 1989 and a 5-0 record in 1987.

UVA sold 23,682 season tickets in 1991, breaking its football season ticket sales record for the third consecutive year. The total attendance at Virginia's seven home games last season was 291,100, for an average of 41,586 fans per game. Not surprisingly, the 10 largest crowds in Scott Stadium history have all come since UVA head coach George Welsh's arrival in 1982, including an all-time record-setting crowd of 49,700 for UVA's nationally televised

game against Georgia Tech in 1990.

Scott Stadium has been the scene for many of the greatest triumphs in Cavalier football history. Two years ago, the stadium was filled with euphoria as USF&G Sugar Bowl-bound Virginia posted a 20-7 victory over Clemson to end "the streak" — UVA's string of 29 consecutive losses to the Tigers since the series began in 1955.

Other memorable wins at Scott Stadium include a 16-15 thriller over Louisville in 1989—won on a last-second field goal by Jake McInerney—and a 20-17 victory over ACC-rival North Carolina in 1987. Virginia staged two dramatic touchdown drives with just 4:44 left in that game, sealing one of the greatest UVA football comebacks of all time.

Built in 1931, Scott Stadium has since undergone numerous changes. Most recently, new AstroTurf was installed before the start of the 1988 season, replacing the artificial surface that had been there since 1981. A permanent lighting system was added in 1982, bringing the excitement of

night football to Charlottesville. Before the 1986 season, Scott Stadium successfully underwent repairs to correct deterioration of the foundation in the stadium's original seating.

Located in the south end zone of Scott Stadium is Bryant Hall. The modern dining and locker room facility was completed for the start of the 1985 season at a cost of nearly \$3 million. The building is named in honor of J.C. Herbert Bryant, a 1932 Virginia graduate and one of the principal benefactors of the structure. While a student at UVA, Bryant lettered in football, boxing, baseball and track. He played in the Scott Stadium dedication game against William & Mary in 1931 and his field goal in that game accounted for the first points ever scored in Scott Stadium.

One of the finest facilities of its kind, the two-story Bryant Hall complex houses locker rooms and training rooms for both the home and visiting teams, a team meeting and press conference room, and a fully equipped kitchen. The second-floor dining area, where Virginia athletes are served their training-table meals, faces the Scott Stadium field, which is visible through large windows running the length of the facility. The large meeting and dining areas were designed for many uses and are ideal for hosting Virginia Student Aid Foundation groups, prospective student-athletes and their families as well as other parties.

Next to Bryant Hall is the Locker Room. The building, which once served as the locker room facility for the home and visiting teams, has been renovated into a gathering place for Virginia football lettermen. The Locker Room was dedicated in September of 1990 to the late Charles Frankel, a long-time UVA football team doctor.

Scott Stadium has long been considered one of the most beautiful football stadiums anywhere, with Monticello Mountain as a backdrop and the Blue Ridge Mountains on the horizon.

Entering its 61st season of college football, Scott Stadium was the gift of Frederic William Scott and Elisabeth Strother Scott, and was dedicated to the memory of his parents, Frederic Robert Scott and Frances Branch Scott. Responding to recommendations of a Stadium Committee, which was appointed by former University President Edgar Shannon, the University decided to renovate the stadium in 1974. In a splendid gesture of generosity, the descendants of Frederic W. Scott pledged \$360,000 for a comprehensive renovation. The athletic department provided an additional \$125,000 to install new aluminum seating, and an anonymous benefactor made an
