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BOBBY BOWDEN

Many factors go into the making of a truly great head football coach. Many of today's "young gun-slingers" in the coaching business have some of those elements. But few have been able to piece together the entire package like Florida State's amazing Bobby Bowden.

Oh, some claim to be better strategists than Bobby. Some think they are better recruiters. Others claim to be better spokesmen and disciplinarians. But truth be known, you could wrap all those head coaching attributes and so many more into a gift box, and out would pop Bobby Bowden.

With records and personal triumphs mounting at an unbelievable pace, Bowden now leads his program into a bold new world — the Atlantic Coast Conference. A world in which the conference champion is guaranteed a New Year's Day Bowl slot and will likely have a say in the national championship race.

Bowden leads his forces into the new league on an incredible hot streak. A streak virtually unprecedented in college football history.

When Bowden's Florida State Seminoles notched their 10th victory of the 1991 season last November, the amazing Seminole coach had once again figured a way to put himself among the elite coaches of all-time.

Before 1991, only Alabama's Bear Bryant and Oklahoma's Bud Wilkinson had been able to coach their teams to 10 or more wins in five consecutive seasons.



To top it off, Bowden led his 1991 bunch to a season-ending 10-2 victory over Texas A&M in the Cotton Bowl. That bowl appearance completed a cycle of New Year's Day bowls for Bowden.

"When I was growing up in Alabama," Bowden said, "there were only the big four New Year's Day games. You had made the big time if you made it to the Orange, the Sugar, the Cotton or the Rose. Well, since FSU can't play in the Rose Bowl, this gives us the complete cycle — Orange, Sugar and Cotton."

Add to that a couple of Fiesta Bowls and a multitude of other post-season trips, and the man may stake his claim as the bowl master of all-time.

The Cotton Bowl win solidified Bowden's place as one of college football's best bowl coaches. His 11-3-1 record in bowl games

is truly remarkable. The Cotton was the 10th straight post-season showing by Bowden's Seminoles — a string in which there has not been a loss.

Like fine wine, the 62-year-old Bowden keeps getting better. The list of coaches who have won more games than Bobby is getting so short you might want to jot them down on a matchbook cover. In 1991, Bowden climbed to seventh on the all-time win list. His 216 career victories rank second among active Division I coaches behind only Joe Paterno.

Just how impressive is Bowden's 26-year coaching record? He's now on the same page with all the legends of college football. The six coaches in front of him might as well have invented the game: Bear Bryant, Alonzo Stagg, Pop Warner, Woody Hayes, Bo Schembechler and Paterno.

When Bowden first arrived in Tallahassee in 1976, he described his relationship with the school as "a marriage" and was determined to let "no man put it asunder." True to his word, he begins his 17th season at FSU in 1992.

What Bobby Bowden means to Florida State University off the playing field cannot be measured, even by the most sophisticated of supercomputers. Respect, sincerity, class, honesty, charisma, charm and humor. When they put that kind of data into the system, a giant replica of Bowden will appear.

As if his character isn't enough, his coaching style draws admirers nationwide. A wide-open, gambling style makes Bowden teams a treat to watch, a pleasure to play on and a delight to cover. Reverses, flea-flickers, laterals — you name it, here it comes!

A look at the record shows he's done it both ways. The flashy wins may get all the attention, but for every one of those, there are a dozen others spawned from

sound fundamental football. This guy's not just a gambling magician, he can flat out coach!

By now it's been well-chronicled how the Birmingham cracker left the snow and ice of West Virginia to come to Florida State and save the program. Three seasons after he walked on campus, he had taken one of the worst football teams in the country to within one game of a national championship.

Bowden's Florida State record is 143-44-3 (.760). That includes a 76-15-1 (.831) record in Tallahassee and a 67-29-2 (.694) mark away from home. He has built those numbers against some of the nation's toughest schedules. His road record alone includes a 2-0 mark at Ohio State, 1-0 at Notre Dame, 2-0 at Arizona State, 1-0 at Clemson, 4-2 against Nebraska and 2-0 at Syracuse, to name just a few. Last season, he added a coveted 51-31 victory over Michigan in Ann Arbor.

The Coach has been a man of his word, too. At his first FSU press conference in 1976, he said his biggest priority was to play arch-rival Florida on an even keel. The Gators, you see, had owned Florida State, leading the series 15-2-1 at the time. In 16 meetings since his arrival, Bowden owns an 8-8 mark vs. the intrastate school.

Bowden achieved some impressive numbers in his previous coaching stops (31-6 at Samford University in Birmingham between 1959 and 1962, and 42-26 at West Virginia from 1970-75), but what he has done at Florida State is simply phenomenal. Eight times in 16 years, his Seminoles have won 10 or more games in a season. Florida State

•It's nice to be playing in good old Tallahassee again! After playing five of their first seven games on the road, the Seminoles now finish with three straight at home. Also,

Florida State concludes its ACC schedule today with only Tulane and Florida left to go. Florida State wraps up the league schedule the first week in November again next year, but beginning in 1994 the Tribe will play Clemson and N.C. State in November for awhile, meaning the ACC championship probably won't be decided quite so early.

•Do you think the move into the ACC was good for FSU? How many schools could say by Nov. 1 that they would be playing in the Orange, Cotton or Sugar Bowl, regardless of what happens the rest of the way?

•Today's game marks the unveiling of the lower bowl of the south endzone. The first 41 rows will add an additional 6,000 seats to Doak Campbell Stadium. The center portion of the addition will seat the Marching Chiefs. That section contains

specially designed seats for the band members — wider and more spacious to accommodate the instruments and cases. It will give fans on both east and west sides a better earshot at the Chiefs' great sound. However, the band will not begin sitting there until next season.

•Speaking of the Marching Chiefs, they may have turned in an all-time great performance a few weeks ago at Georgia Tech. Players and coaches repeatedly mentioned the band's encouragement as a catalyst for the come-from-behind victory. As a tribute, Bobby Bowden himself saluted the band as he left the field following the game. Then, he tossed his cap into their midst.

•It took Florida State University 29 seasons to win its first 150 football games, that milestone coming in Darrell Mudra's final season in 1975. Bobby Bowden has led the Seminoles to 150 more victories in less than 17 full seasons. Although Bowden has coached FSU in fewer than 17 of its 46 seasons, he has accounted for one-half of all its wins.

•One final word on this Virginia/ABC-TV flap. A few "save-the-world" columnists suggested that it was about time

someone stood up to the wicked corporate TV moguls. Well, by my accounting the television networks have paid Florida State University better than \$40 million in Bobby Bowden's 17 seasons at FSU. As a direct result of that, funding of non-revenue sports is allowed to flourish. Just this week FSU's volleyball team traveled to New York City to compete in a four-team tournament at Hofstra University and the tennis teams were able to participate in a tournament in California. All of FSU's non-revenue sports operate with a full complement of allowed scholarships. The television networks are our friends, guys. Is a few hours of inconvenience worth denying deserving non-revenue athletes a chance to compete at the highest level? I think not!

•FSU basketball participation in the Preseason NIT fits nicely into a football open week. The Seminoles play Siena College in the NIT opener on Nov. 18 at the Civic

Center. With a victory in that game, Florida State will then host round two in Tallahassee on Friday night, Nov. 20 against the winner of the Iowa State-Indiana State game. That second-round tilt is scheduled to tip at 9:30 and be nationally-retevised by ESPN. And all of this during a football open week! Final game of the Preseason NIT takes place Nov. 27 at Madison Square Garden. That's the Friday night before the FSU-Florida game here in town.

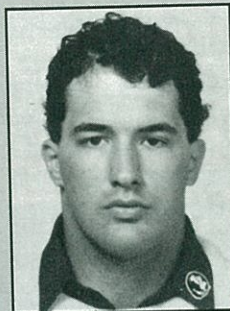
•Impact of ACC basketball: Ten of Florida State's 26 regular-season games are slated for national network TV.

•Florida State athletes are preparing once again for their annual "Say No To Drugs" blitz. On Monday, Nov. 16 more than 100 FSU athletes will join members of the Golden Key National Honor Society in visiting virtually every school in the territory with the good word. Since its inception several years ago, this program has touched more than 250,000 school children. Florida State, by the way, was the originator of this worthwhile plan and many other athletic programs around the nation have followed suit.

•While watching Maryland play football I can't help but think of good friend Tim Brandt — a linebacker for the Terrapins in the '70s and now a darn good television announcer and a whale of a guy.

•Mark your calendars for two major upcoming events here at Florida State. Coincidentally, both fall on Friday the 13th (of November). Applications are now available for the first annual Seminole Golf Day. Many former Seminole golfers on the various pro tours as well as club pros will be in town for this pro-am event at the Seminole Golf Course. In future years this event should draw all of FSU's now famous and wealthy golfers. The event is a fund-raiser for the men's and women's golf programs. Call the FSU course at 644-CLUB for information. Later that same evening will mark the second annual Golden Torch Gala at the University Union. This sparkling black-tie event honors FSU's top academic achiever in each sport. Last year's event was an overwhelming success and this year looks to be even better. Guest speaker will be Alan Page, former Minnesota Viking All-Pro and now the Assistant Attorney General in the state of Minnesota. Tickets are available through the Seminole Boosters at 644-3484. If you only do one event this year — this should be it!

Seminole Academic Advisor Mark Meloney sees Peirce as a strong listener. "He is quiet. Jason picks up more listening than talking," says Meloney. "His attributes come into play when he gains ad-

vice and goes with it."

Peirce agrees. After struggling in basic studies his freshman year, Jason took the advice of his mother and now maintains nearly a 3.0 grade point average.

"I tried to think too much early in school," Peirce said. "My mother once told me, 'Don't think too much, but think about it.' As a result, I started to relax more in class and not over analyze."

Peirce has adjusted well to the advice he has received from coaches, teachers and teammates. Jason has scored a 3.0 GPA or higher six of the past eight semesters and will graduate this spring with an English degree.

Peirce contemplated following a business track at Florida State, but instead chose his true love — literature. "I enjoy

reading. I get a chance to see myself reflected in what I study," Jason says. "With reading you can definitely do that. After all, literature is a metaphor for human experience."

With still another year of eligibility following the 1992 season, Peirce has his mind set on attempting a Master's degree in Communications, which he hopes would lead to a career in film making.

Peirce's low-key profile makes it difficult to imagine him barking out orders from the director's chair on the set of a major motion picture. But it would not be too hard to picture him taking advice and listening to his crew. Perhaps he could model the lead role after himself and title the movie "Silent Leader."

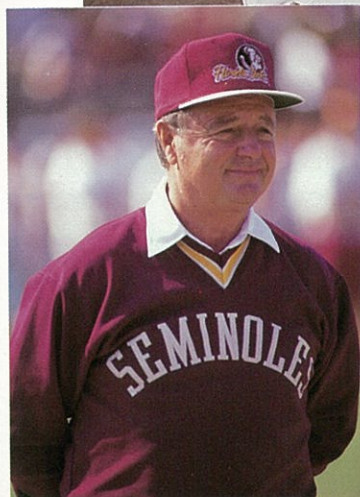

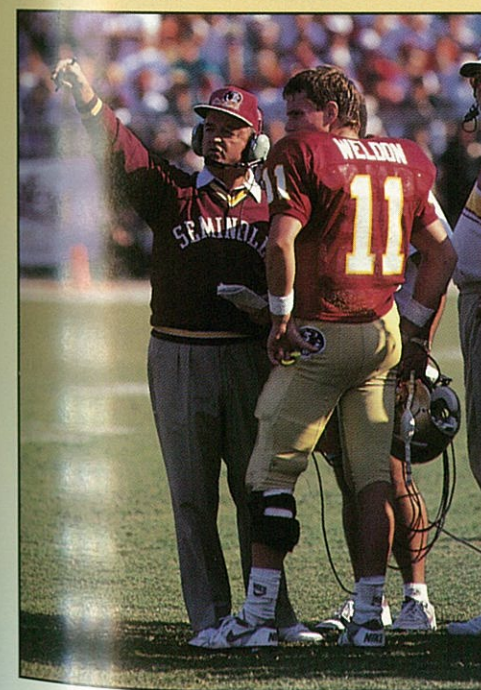
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had been to just eight bowls in 29 years before him. Since his arrival, FSU has been to 13 bowl games, including a string of 10 in a row and six New Year's Day trips.

In his 16 years, the Seminoles have been a mainstay in the Associated Press Top 20 — ranked by that poll in 176 polls out of 230 possible weeks. An incredible 96 times under Bowden, the Seminoles have been in the top 10 on a given week. What about a top 20 finish? Twelve times in 16 seasons!

Last year, Florida State became only the fourth school in college football history to record five consecutive top five finishes in the AP rankings. The current run has seen the Seminoles finish second (1987), third (1988-89) and fourth (1990-91) over the last five years. A truly remarkable run.

Above all Bowden's coaching accomplishments, though, are his credentials as a man. Friendly and outgoing, he is a devoted Christian and family man. The Coach loves people. His personality and charm are bigger than life. He has become somewhat of a folk hero in the Deep South.



A polished speaker, Bowden is constantly in demand. His busy coaching schedule curtails many speaking engagements, but any free evening in the year will find him on the after-dinner circuit. Every free Sunday morning will find him in the pulpit of a church somewhere in the South.

Outside of football, Bowden has an intense

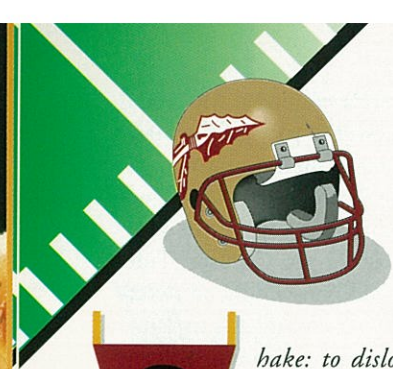
interest in World War II history and reads countless books and articles on the subject. He traced his ancestry to parts of Germany and had an opportunity to visit the country again last summer.

Bowden was an outstanding player at Woodlawn High School in Birmingham, Ala. and went on to Alabama as a freshman quarterback, fulfilling a lifelong dream to play for the Crimson Tide. During one semester in Tuscaloosa, he found his childhood sweetheart, Ann Estock, and she was enough to lure him back to Birmingham. He soon married Ann and transferred to Howard College (now Samford University) in Birmingham.

Bowden was a Little All-American there and started a long Bowden tradition at the school which goes on even today. He began his collegiate head coaching career there in 1959, and his son Terry is currently the head coach while son-in-law Jack Hines is on Terry's staff. The youngest Bowden son, Jeff, is an assistant coach at Southern Mississippi and Tommy Bowden is the offensive coordinator at Auburn. Oldest son Steve is on the faculty at Flagler College in St. Augustine, Fla. The four boys, daughters Robyn Hines and Ginger Madden, and their families, make up the Bowden clan, which numbers 24 and includes 10 grandchildren.

Shake 'n Bake

With Speed to Burn, Shannon Baker Makes the Big Plays

Shake: to dislodge, eject or free oneself by quick, jerky movements

Bake: to cook or burn by subjecting to excessive speed or use

Put the two together and what do you get? Shannon Baker — known affectionately by teammates and friends as Shake 'n Bake. Perhaps the Seminoles' fastest player, the senior wide receiver can often be seen juking and stutter-stepping his way past defensive backs. If the moves are not working, Shannon goes with his forte — pure speed, by just shifting into high gear and running right by them.

Baker's ability to make mince-meat out of defensive backs has vaulted his status to that of "big play" receiver. You see, Shannon is not a possession receiver. Baker is the guy FSU coaches call on when they want to go deep. In other words, when they want to break the opponent's back.

Receivers coach John Eason uses Baker specifically when he feels the long ball is open. "Shannon has a knack for the big plays," Eason says. "We have him in mind when we want the throw to take off."

According to Baker, "The way to get a name as a big-play receiver is speed. I like the fact that I have a chance to do it, to make the big touchdown pass."

Baker has come through with a pair of long touchdown receptions this season. Ironically, North Carolina State was the victim on both. With only 43 seconds left in the first half in Raleigh, N.C., the Seminoles held tightly to a 7-3 lead and Baker got the call.

Shannon came off the bench on first down at the N.C. State 32-yard line. "I knew the ball was going to come to me," Baker remembers. He used his trademark speed to outrun the Wolfpack defensive back and a beautifully lofted Charlie Ward pass landed in his arms for a touchdown.

"I had to run as fast as possible and Charlie laid it out for me," Baker said. Thanks to Baker, the Seminoles funneled into the locker room with a 14-3 halftime lead.

Florida State's first touchdown of the second half was again a Ward-to-Baker

connection. Only this time, the pigskin did not fall quite as neatly into Baker's hands. It took the "big play" receiver's ability to adjust to haul in Ward's bullet. Baker raced 44 yards toward the endzone, diving at the last possible second and landing in the paint for the touchdown.

Shannon's stats for the day? Two receptions for 76 yards and two touchdowns. Not bad, huh? What is even more impressive is that Baker "missed" his second touchdown. Landing face first in the endzone with the football cradled in his hands, Baker's helmet slammed against his eye, bruising it and causing him to miss the rest of the game.

"I did not know that I had scored," admitted Baker. "I knew I would be close to the endzone, but I could not see anything after I caught the ball. I guess that is what concentration is all about."

Both Eason and Baker attribute part of Shannon's success to his one year "apprenticeship" under the Seminoles' Fab Four.

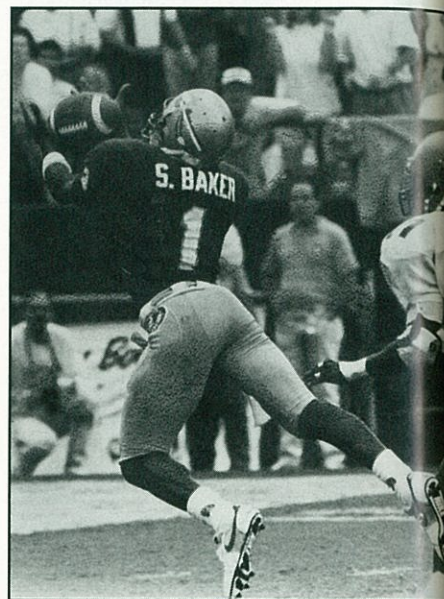
"Not too many people are as blessed as I was my first year at Florida State," Baker said. "To learn from such talented receivers has really vaulted my career."

When Shannon was a freshman the Fab Four dominated college football. Those four — Terry Anthony, Lawrence Dawsey, Bruce LaSane and Ronald Lewis — gave Baker the foundation on which to build his collegiate career.

Which of Baker's 61 career receptions is his favorite big play catch? "My personal favorite is the one I caught against Syracuse last year. You know, the one down to the 1-yard line." Yeah, we remember. The catch in which Shannon hydroplaned about fifteen yards into, and out of, the endzone. The catch that ESPN continues to use on its College Game Day introduction sequence.

The Syracuse bomb may be Shannon's favorite "big play," but another big catch remembered by many a Seminole fan concluded a play simply called "Berlin."

Time was running out in the first half of the 1990 Florida State-Louisiana State game. On the Tigers' 38-yard line with only three seconds left, FSU called time-out.



After talking it over with the coaching staff, quarterback Casey Weldon returned to the huddle and called "Berlin," adding, "Whatever you do don't let this one get intercepted."

Weldon dropped back to pass and unleashed a rocket toward the corner of the endzone. About eight players had gathered in hopes of coming up with the "Hail Mary" reception/interception. It appeared that Lawrence Dawsey might come down with the pass, but a big hit by an LSU defender sent the ball back into the air. The ball was then juggled and tipped around like a hot potato before descending toward the ground. Just as the football was going to land on the end zone turf, Baker, who came out of nowhere, laid is body out and pulled in the "Hail Mary" pass for an improbable touchdown.

With more big catches than a tournament bass fisherman, don't be surprised if Baker reels in the "Big One" during today's game.

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Looks Can Be Deceiving

Troy Sanders Proves That What You See is Not What You Get

When he passes in a corridor his mass leaves a wake of curious double takes. Eyes fix upon his hulking stature from a distance, but coolly look away, pretending not to notice as he draws nearer. His resemblance to former Mr. Universe, Lou Ferrigno, is uncanny. At 6-2 and a solid 265 pounds, Troy Sanders has the physical tools to be one of the most troublesome characters around. His roughshod features could earn him easy acceptance with some of the rowdiest rogues of east Los Angeles.

However, this package of muscular bulk does not hail from the tough inner-city streets of New York, Los Angeles, or any other metropolitan area where residents endure "life on the streets." Nor does he carry one of those slang names like "Mad Dog," "Ripper," or "Snake."

"Everybody just calls me 'T-Roy,'" Sanders says. The defensive behemoth's speech runs contrary to his physical appearance. His soft flowing voice could lull an insomniac.

As for his old stomping grounds — sneak a peek on the atlas to south Alabama. Modestly sitting on the banks of the Pea River is a tiny town with a cozy name — Elba. Its borders cover an area of Alabama soil not much wider than a Birmingham suburb.

"Elba's a small town," he says. "Its residents live a simple life. Our biggest problem is the Pea River. When it takes a notion to flood, people are run out of their homes."

Sanders seems to be in a constant state of humble reserve — almost zen-like. "I don't get too excited about anything. I'll sit back and let things happen. I don't make waves or try to cross people," Sanders says.

However, when Sanders' massive frame enters Doak Campbell Stadium, his Sunday-school-boy politeness takes a hike. On every fall Saturday "the boy next door" goes awry.

"Would you believe I'm actually sleepy before a game?" Sanders quizzes. "I don't feel awake and psyched until I get myself in front of the guy I'm going up against."

Like a madman in a horror film, Sanders is relentless. No matter how fast his victims run, his steady stalk almost always seems to catch up.

"The truth is I don't have the speed of the other defensive linemen. And I certainly don't mean to sound like I'm bragging when I say this, but what I do have is that 'high school bully' attitude and strength. This is what keeps me in the fight," Sanders confesses.

Assistant head coach Chuck Amato says Sanders' mainstay on FSU's high-octane defensive line is due to several factors. "He has persistence, knowledge and experience," Amato says. "He just has an incredible will to play. He's mentally and physically tough and can be counted on to always do what he is told."

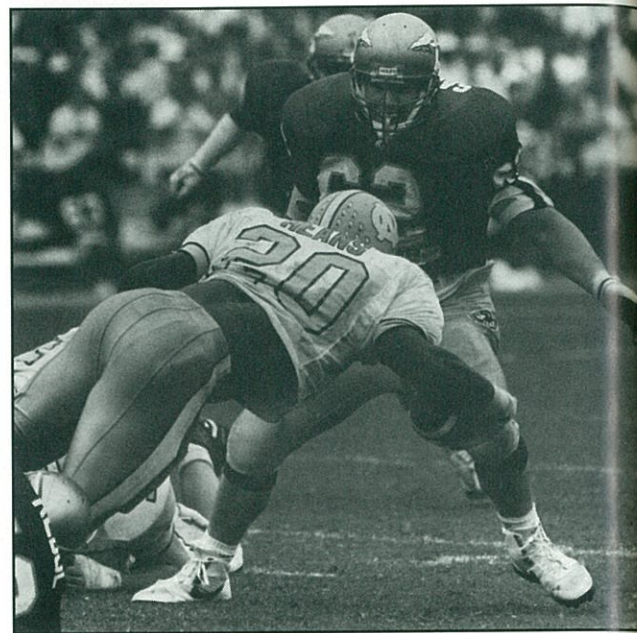
"He can play any position on the defensive line — any position, anytime," Amato adds. "He'll play hurt in a game or in practice and keep quiet about it. Some guys will let a hangnail keep them from practicing, but not Troy."

Sanders also possesses the heart of a true athlete. This past spring, after a heavy exodus of offensive linemen from the 1991 squad, Sanders offered to sacrifice his senior season as a defensive lineman and become something completely foreign to him — an offensive guard.

"They say, 'You can take the boy out of the country, but you can't take the country out of the boy,' well in my case it was, 'You can't take the defense out of the boy,'" Sanders says with a warm smile.

Offensive veteran Robbie Baker took pleasure (as did many others on the FSU team) in observing this unsightly metamorphosis trying to take place on the practice field.

"You've got to give him credit for trying something like that. It was like watching a Keystone Cops comedy. He was definitely

out of his environment, but we enjoyed the heck out of it while it lasted," Baker says.

Troy Sanders will find himself waking up across the line from opponents only a few more times in Doak Campbell Stadium. As these wake-up calls begin to dwindle, memories of his best times at FSU run through his mind.

"Now is the time I start to look back at the things I've accomplished here. The real memories are in the best friends I've made and a wonderful girl I met named 'Tracy.' The experience of doing something that many people never have the chance to do — play college football — makes me and my parents very proud. I hope the seniors have pleased a lot of Seminole fans with what we've done these past five years," Sanders says.

If his pursuits off the field are anything like those on the field, Troy Sanders will stalk them down — no matter how elusive they may be.

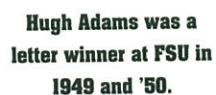
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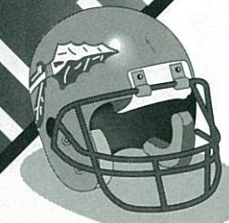
That first year we played a full eight-game schedule, winning all but one game. What makes our record so amazing is that we had no facilities. We played at nearby Centennial Field and practiced at Mabry Field, which was located west of campus at the present day intersection of Jackson Bluff and Appleyard roads. Mabry Field was the site of an old outdoor theater back



Well, on the very next play I heard a loud "pop" and George Spurling, a third string guard, was out cold on the ground. He was practicing opposite Hugh Adams, our captain and most valuable player. Adams was a great leader who could play all positions and was our only deep snapper.

Don Veller went on to coach football at Florida State for five years before stepping down after the 1952 season. Veller compiled a 31-12-1 record, including a stretch when his teams won 30 of 34 games. He is credited with laying the early foundation for football at FSU. He served the University for 31 years as a coach and teacher. He went on to become the Seminole golf coach, holding that position three different times. He still writes a weekly golf column for the Tallahassee Democrat.

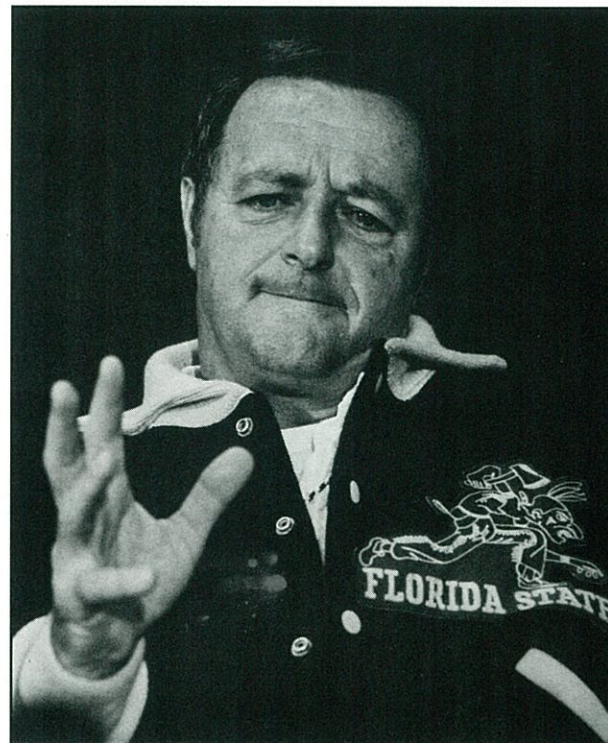
Top 10 Humorous Bobby Bowden Moments in Seminole History

Last week against Virginia, Coach Bobby Bowden registered his 150th win as the coach of the Seminoles. The win also marked the 300th in the storied history of FSU football, which means Bowden is responsible for exactly half of all Florida State wins.

For the past decade, Wayne Hogan has served as FSU's Sports Information Director. During his tenure, Hogan has seen the Seminoles become one of the nation's top programs and, along the way, has picked up on some of the most humorous moments. The following is a collection of 10 of his favorite Bowden stories.

We salute Coach Bowden on his 150th coaching victory and on his unwavering ability to keep his sense of humor in all circumstances.



1 In a 1982 game against Louisville that had been moved to Thursday night for television, Bowden agrees to give post-game quotes in the fourth quarter to assist the state media in meeting their tight weeknight deadlines. Joe Henderson of the *Tampa Tribune* and I pace the sideline with the coach in the final minutes of the game with FSU ahead, 49-14. Bowden's quotes are typed and copied for distribution in the press box as the final seconds tick off the game clock.

2 Distraught after a grueling 17-16 loss at Pittsburgh in 1983, the Coach is leaving the parking lot at the Tallahassee Airport in the wee hours of Sunday morning. He inadvertently drives his car over the concrete curbing, rupturing the gas tank. Unfazed, the Coach continues to drive away, only to have assistant coach John Eason, sensing a possible explosion, physically pull him from the vehicle. Eason gives Bowden a ride home.

Coach Bowden meets with the media during a 1979 press conference.

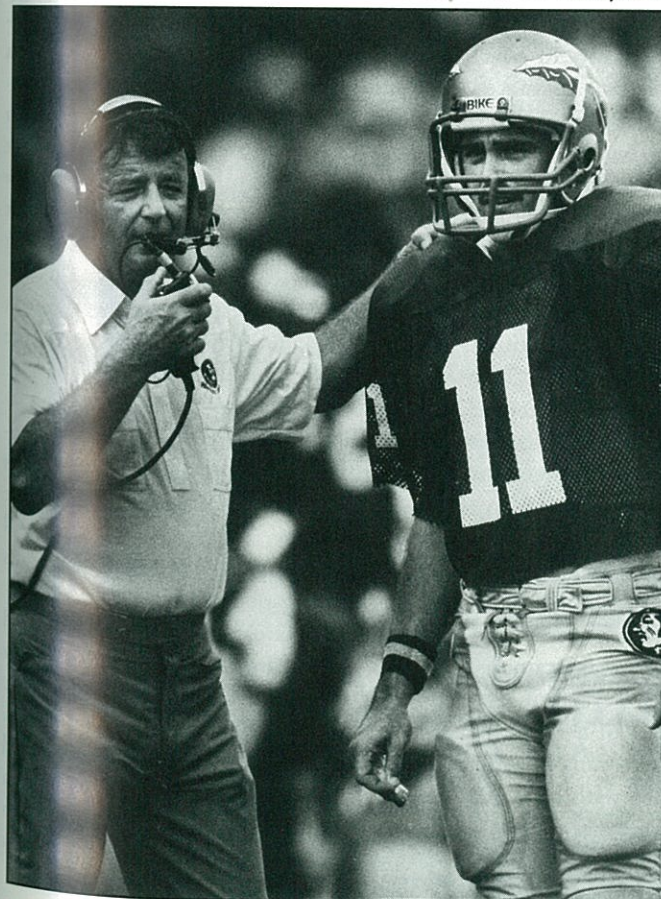
4 After one low-profile home win in 1989, Assistant SID Rob Wilson and I are escorting Bowden to his post-game press conference. All of a sudden he stops, turns to us and asks, "Is this thing live or is it taped?" An odd question for a man who stands before several dozen "very live" media types after every game. Apparently, he had been thrown off by hearing a taped replay of his press conference aired on local radio later in the evening.

3 Rick Warner, college football editor for the Associated Press and arguably the most powerful sports pen in America, visits Tallahassee for the first time during the week of the FSU-Miami "Game of the Century" in 1991. Although Bowden is doing almost exclusively gang-style press conferences daily, I agree to set Warner up for a one-on-one interview with the Coach. Determined to cut through this "Bowden good ole boy mystique" with his New York savvy, Warner enters Bowden's office only to find him at his desk, shoes off, towel around his neck and in the early stages of a haircut. "Don't mind if I get a trim while we chat," snickers Bowden. Warner swears to this day it was a set up.

5 After a 27-24 loss at Auburn in 1983, Bowden sits before the media looking quite disheveled. "Men," he says, "I'm visibly shaken." "I've observed and written that a time or two," said one writer, "but I've never had a guy tell me he was visibly shaken."

6 With Florida State ranked No. 1 for the first time ever going into the 1988 season opener at Miami, Bowden agrees to do a live shot with Tallahassee TV station WCTV during an hour-long pregame show from the Orange Bowl. Satellite problems delay the Bowden interview for an inordinate amount of time, forcing the Coach to sit in the end zone of the rapidly filling stadium for better than 20 minutes. Told he could bag the interview with game-time fast approaching, the Coach declined, choosing to stick with his commitment and wait out the technical glitch.

team gathered in the tunnel for entry onto the field on the cue of ESPN. But a miscommunication sends the team, led by Renegade and Bowden, onto the field nearly four minutes early. Someone tells the Coach he has run out too early. He promptly signalled the team back into the tunnel to wait for the proper signal. Entrance No. 2 was flawless.

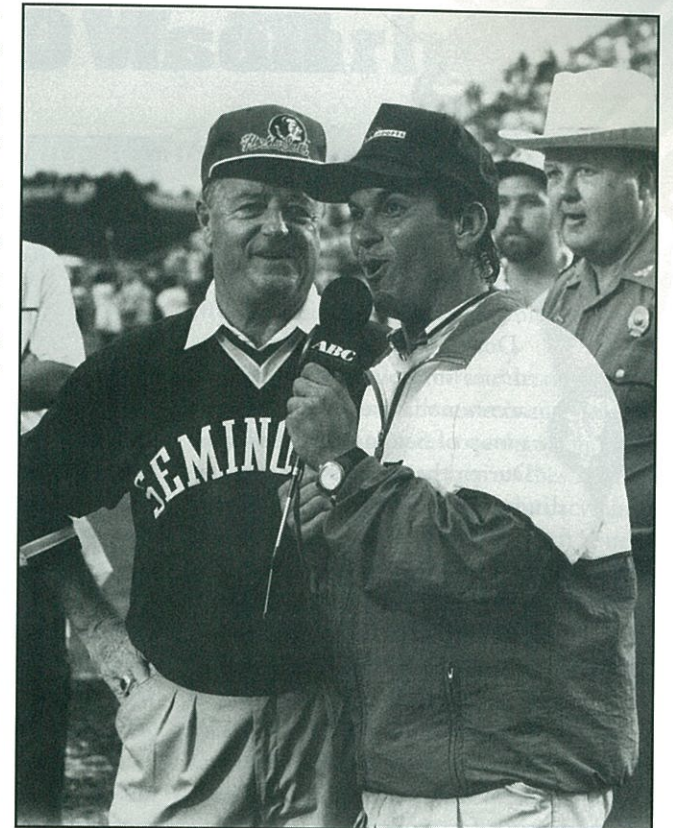
8 Florida State is in Syracuse for a 1988 game at the Carrier Dome. Reporters glance to the sideline just before kickoff and notice that Bowden has not changed into his traditional coaching wear. Instead, he is in his travel attire — a gray sportcoat, blue slacks, conservative tie and black street shoes. Never before or since has the coach failed to change for a game. Asked to explain the change in attire after FSU's 49-10 victory, Bowden said, "This place is so clean and it's air-conditioned. I just didn't feel like I was going to get dirty."

9 In 1982, Bowden agrees to help his good friend Howard Schnellenberger stir up some interest in Miami football by making a trip to South Florida during the week of FSU's game there. Bowden and Schnellenberger appear at a joint press conference Wednesday in Miami. On Saturday, FSU beats Miami 24-7 in the Orange Bowl, and Schnellenberger commits to visit Tallahassee during FSU-Miami week in 1983.

When the two stage a mock boxing match in Tallahassee during that '83 season, no one knew that a national championship was in the offing for the Hurricanes. A 17-16 Miami win at Doak Campbell Stadium propelled the 'Canes to the surprising title. Needless to say, interest in UM football has needed no more stirring since.

10 By now all the world is aware of the famous "puntrooskie" play that lifted FSU to a 24-21 win at Clemson in 1988. But perhaps the best scene of the day came during Bowden's explanation of the play to the media in his post-game press conference. Using several chairs, as well as a stunned sportswriter or two, to simulate players, a rain-drenched Bowden is on stage, bent over, holding a football between his legs. Using the props, the Coach proceeds to re-enact the play for the media. He ends by saying, "We named it puntrooskie. It's some dad-gum play, ain't it?"

Assistant athletic director Wayne Hogan, a '79 FSU graduate, has headed the FSU sports information office since 1982.

•Robert Ward, Senior Vice President, MCA Recreation Services Group, Universal City, Calif.

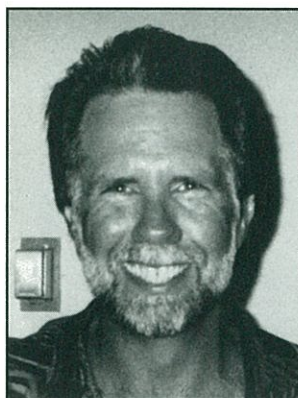

Howse, who received a doctorate in linguistics at Florida State in 1973, was named the first woman to head the March of Dimes foundation in January 1990. She had served as executive director of the Greater New York March of Dimes, the foundation's largest chapter, since 1985.

Under Howse's leadership, the March of Dimes launched a national Campaign for Healthier Babies aimed at reducing the incidence of low birth weight and infant mortality in the United States.

Born in Los Angeles, Howse previously served as state commissioner for mental retardation in Pennsylvania and as associate commissioner in the New York State Office of Mental Retardation and Developmental Disabilities, along with other executive positions in health-related organizations.

She also is a trustee of the Salk Institute for Biological Studies in La Jolla, Calif., and of the National Health Council.

•Woody Woodward, Vice President of Baseball Operations, Seattle Mariners, Seattle, Wash.

Woodward, who earned a bachelor's degree in 1966 and a master's degree in 1970 from Florida State, both in education, joined the Seattle Mariners professional baseball organization as general manager in July 1988. He is responsible for personnel and operations, player development and

scouting departments.

A former NCAA All-American at FSU, Woodward played for five years with the Braves organization, first in Milwaukee, then in Atlanta when the franchise was moved there. He was traded to Cincinnati in 1968 and, in 1970, played with the Reds in the National League Championship Series and the World Series. He retired as a ballplayer in 1971, entered private business, then in 1974-75 went back to pro baseball as the Reds' television broadcaster.

In 1975, Woodward returned to Florida State as head coach to post the second-highest winning percentage in Seminole baseball history (170-57, .749).

The Miami native began his front-office career in 1978 as the Reds' minor league field coordinator and was promoted to assistant general manager in 1980. He joined the New York Yankees as vice president for baseball administration in 1984 and, under his direction, the Yankees won the 1985 Topps Awards for the best overall minor league system. In 1986, he was promoted to vice president and general manager for the Yankees, and in October 1987, he moved to the Philadelphia Phillies as vice president for personnel until June 1988.

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
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
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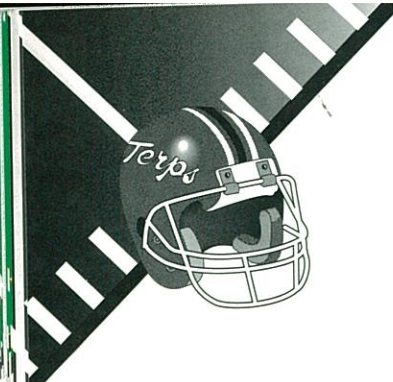
