Today's Matchup: Miami vs. Florida State

Big Names & Action From The Nation's #1 Rivalry

THE TEAMS

The University of Miami (3-1, 1-0) is ranked No. 10 in the *USA Today*/CNN Coaches' Poll and No. 13 in the Associated Press poll. Florida State (4-0, 4-0) is ranked No. 3 in both the Associated Press and *USA Today*/CNN Coaches' Poll.

THE COACHES

Hurricane Head Coach **Dennis Erickson** (Montana State, '70) is in his sixth season at Miami with a 56-8 (.875) record. His overall career mark stands at 106-39-1, the seventh-best percentage (.729) among coaches with a minimum of five years as a Division I head coach (John Robinson, Tom Osborne, Joe Paterno, Danny Ford, Bobby Bowden and LaVell Edwards are ahead of Erickson). Erickson is Miami's 18th head coach and only the second coach in NCAA history to win a National Championship in his first year at a school (Bennie Oosterbaan, Michigan, 1948) and the second to win two national titles in his first three years (Barry Switzer, Oklahoma). Florida State Head Coach **Bobby Bowden** (Samford, '53) is in his 18th season at FSU with a 170-46-3 (.783) record and 28th overall as a head coach with a career mark of 243-78-3 (.755).

UM-FSU, A MADE FOR TV AFFAIR

Tonight's game will mark the 10th consecutive season and the 14th time in 38 meetings that the UM-FSU clash will be shown on network television. The 'Canes hold an 8-5 advantage in the 13 previously network televised meetings. Florida State won the only game between the two state rivals shown on ESPN, downing UM, 24-10 in Tallahassee in 1989. The loss is just one of two for the Hurricanes in 20 all-time appearances on the national cable network.

HIGH FIVE FOR ERICKSON & BOWDEN

University of Miami Head Coach Dennis Erickson and Florida State Head Coach Bobby Bowden boast the top two records of all major college football coaches over the last five-plus years. Both coaches have just eight losses over that period, with Bowden taking the edge with one game in hand.

NATIONAL SHOWDOWN

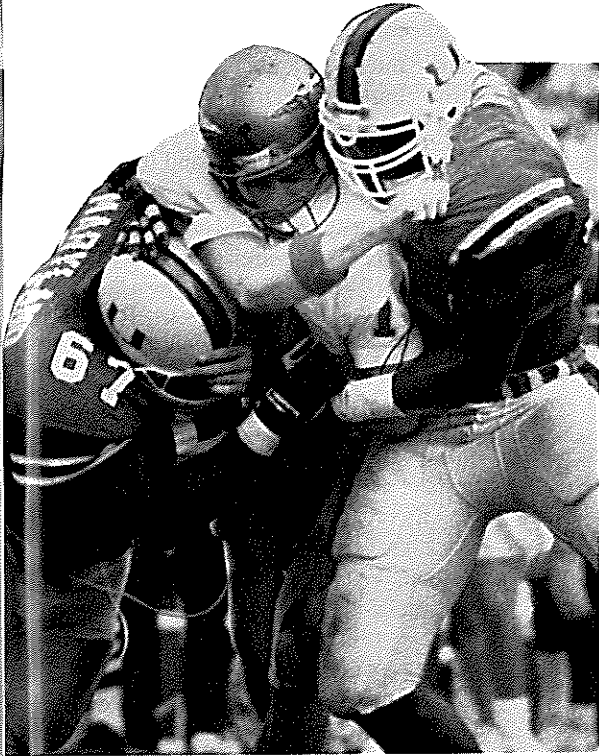
The winner of the UM-FSU game has gone on to win the national championship four times in the last 11 seasons: 1983, 1987, 1991 and 1993.

SERIES NOTES

- Miami holds a 22-15 lead in the series and has won three of the last four, seven of the last nine and 10 of the last 13.
- FSU is Miami's longest on-going rivalry (since '69).
- The series at the Orange Bowl is tied, 12-12 while Miami leads the series in games played at Doak Campbell Stadium, 10-3.

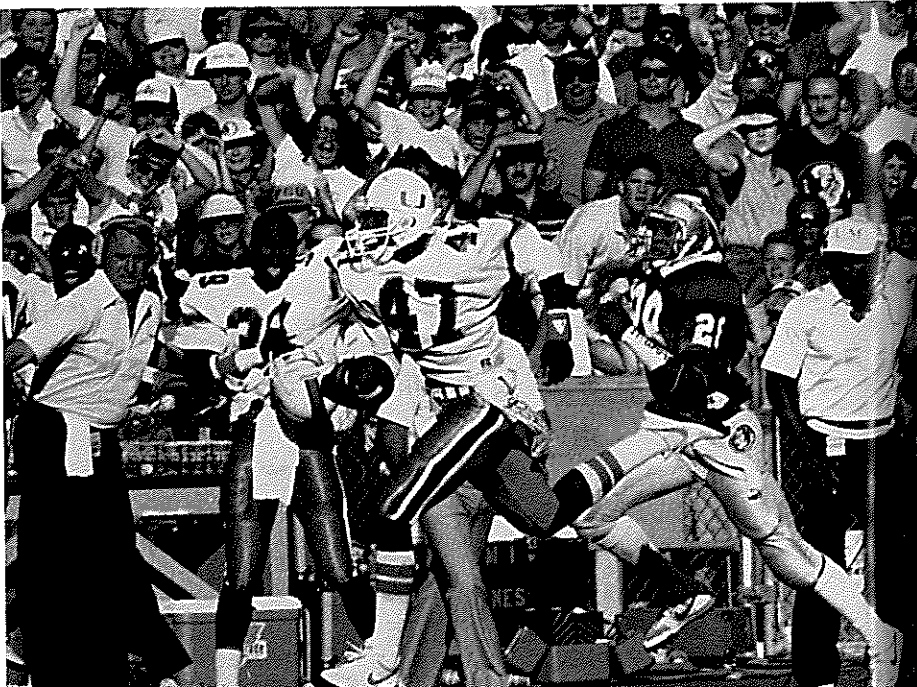

ONLY MIAMI

Since Bobby Bowden took over the coaching reigns at Florida State 18 years ago only one team has managed to shutout the Seminoles, the Miami Hurricanes. The 'Canes shut out the Noles, 47-0, in the Orange Bowl in Bowden's initial season at FSU (1976) and then blanked his pre-season No. 1 ranked Seminoles, 31-0 in the Orange Bowl in 1988.

A DECADE OF 4TH-QUARTER COMEBACKS

In the last decade, Florida State has led Miami after three quarters of play in nine of 11 games. However, Miami has come from behind to win in six of those nine games. In those six comeback victories, Miami has outscored FSU in the fourth quarter by a total of 71-12.

In the last 11 Miami-FSU contests, the Hurricanes have outscored Florida State in the fourth quarter, 91-49.

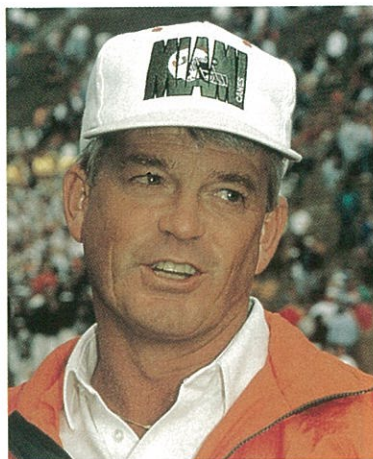
THE LAST TIME

Dennis Erickson



One of the most successful coaches in college football

with two National Titles and a Heisman Trophy winner among his list of accolades.

Most coaches would be satisfied with a 9-3 season and New Year's Day bowl appearance—but not Miami Head Football Coach Dennis Erickson.

The Hurricane mentor who has compiled an impressive 53-7 record in his first five years at UM, is looking forward to getting his team back to the basics that have brought him two national championship rings in 1989 and 1991.

“Our number one goal every year is to win the Big East and have an opportunity to compete for the national championship,” Erickson said. “Anytime you have a disappointing season you want to get back on the field and play and try to make up for that.”

In fact, in an effort to become more involved with the motivational aspect of his entire team, Erickson has passed on the offensive coordinator role to quarterback coach Rich Olson. He also promoted former secondary coach Greg Mc Mackin to defensive coordinator when Tommy Tuberville went to Texas A&M.

“It frees me up a little bit more,” Erickson said. “I’m going to try and get more involved with both sides of the football.”

While his stated goal in taking the position at Miami in 1989 was to “maintain the level of athletic and academic success this program has been associated with,” he clearly has led Miami to a higher plateau.

Erickson led the Hurricanes to their third national championship in seven years during his first year, becoming only the second coach in NCAA history to capture a title in his first year at a school.

Two years later, Erickson matched Oklahoma’s Barry Switzer as only the second coach to win national crowns in two of their first three years, when he led the Hurricanes to a perfect 12-0 mark. In the three years Miami did not win titles during Erickson’s tenure, they were in the hunt until the end, finishing third in the final polls twice.

In 1993 he won his 100th career game with a 42-7 win over Temple on Oct. 30, in only his 137th game. He was the third quickest to reach 100 wins among active Division I-A coaches (only Joe Paterno, 122 games, and Tom Osborne, 126 games arrived faster). At age 46, he reached 100 wins at the same age as Bear Bryant, who after hitting 100 at game 151 went on to win 323 games in his 38-year career.

With Miami’s 41-17 win over Memphis St. at the Orange Bowl on Nov. 27, the Hurricanes tied Alabama for the NCAA record with its 57th straight victory on its home field, a place where Erickson is a perfect 31-0.

Erickson came to Miami after successful tenures at Washington State, Wyoming and Idaho. His career win percentage of .729 (103-38-1 in 12 years) ranks sixth among all active Division I-A coaches with a minimum of five years as head coach.

But Erickson is not ready to sit back and coast. He remains dedicated to achieving the high standards set by the South Florida fans in the city and community he and his family consider home.

When he came to Miami, he knew the expectations of the city, school and players were high.

“I have a great deal of respect for the players and coaches who have worked so hard to establish this team as one of the nation’s best, and I’ll do everything in my power to make sure we continue at that pace.”

"You want to be the best at your profession and every year is a new year. If I want to maintain the level of this program, I think it's more challenging every year, but I'll do what it takes to keep it on top."

The 1992 season was especially challenging following the devastation of Hurricane Andrew. Erickson prompted his squad to become a rallying point for the South Florida community as it began to rebuild. Despite the fact that Erickson and members of his coaching staff and players were displaced by the storm throughout the season, the 'Canes marched to an undefeated regular season. They defeated three top-10 teams (No. 3 FSU, No. 7 Penn State and No. 8 Syracuse) before a heartbreaking loss to Alabama in the Sugar Bowl. Gino Torretta won the Heisman Trophy.

The 12-0 record in 1991 included No. 2 UM's stunning 17-16 victory over No. 1 FSU in Tallahassee. 1990 ended with a 46-3 thrashing of Texas in the Cotton Bowl and a No. 3 ranking. Russell Maryland was honored as UM's first Outland Trophy winner.

Erickson's first squad at Miami in 1989 went through the regular season at 10-1 that ended in dramatic fashion by stunning No. 1 Notre Dame 27-10, in a nationally televised game which earned the 'Canes a No. 2 ranking in both wire service polls. Miami then rolled to a 33-25 win over Alabama in the Sugar Bowl to earn the national championship. In the process Erickson was named Southern Independent Coach of the Year by the *Associated Press* news service.

His inaugural squad led the nation in total defense (216.5 ypg), rushing defense (69.1 ypg) and scoring defense (9.3 ppg).

A soft-spoken gentleman with an unassuming manner, Erickson was appointed head coach at Miami on March 5, 1989. The school's 18th coach brought a blue-collar work ethic and genuine love for his sport to UM. It didn't take long for the casual observer to realize that Dennis Erickson was a master at his craft — a skilled technician in directing a high-profile program that places equal emphasis on winning on the field and in the classroom.

For the third consecutive year, UM received honorable mention from the College Football Association for exceeding a 70 percent graduation rate. As one of 20 schools recognized, Miami had a 75 percent graduation rate from the entering class of 1988.

Erickson came to the University of Miami after leaving his winning mark on three other college football programs. Most recently, he earned PAC-10 Conference co-Coach of the Year honors in 1988 after guiding the Washington State Cougars to a 9-3 mark and the team's first bowl game victory since 1916. Washington St. finished ranked 16th in both wire service polls, the school's highest ranking ever. The nine victories were the most at Washington State since 1930.

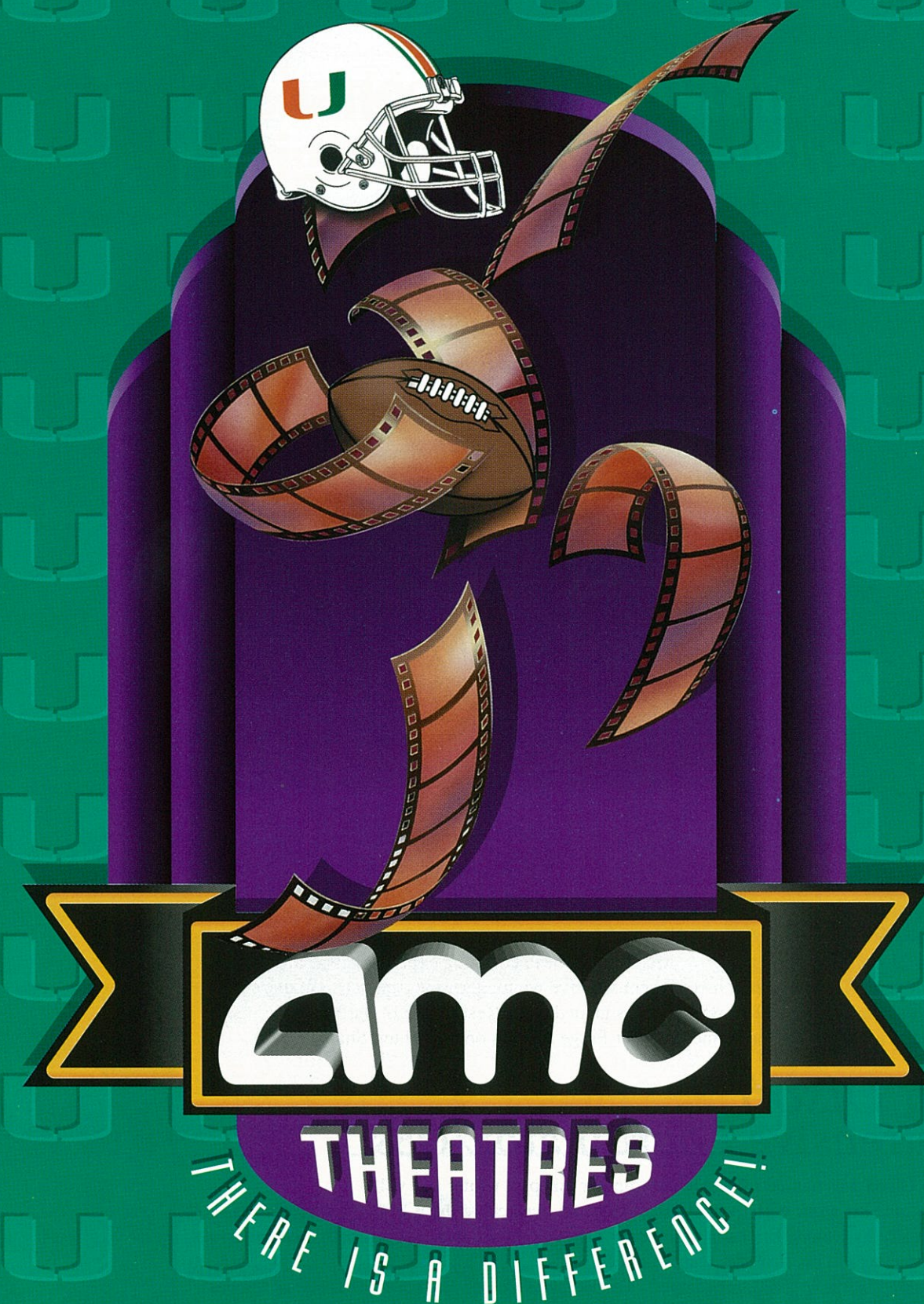
In Pullman, he guided Timm Rosenbach, who was the nation's pass efficiency leader with a 162.0 rating in 1988. That year his Cougars ranked among the nation's leaders in nearly every major offensive category. That season ended with a 24-22 win over Houston in the Aloha Bowl — a turnaround from the 3-7-1 record in Erickson's first year at Washington State.

Prior to his arrival in Pullman, the Wyoming Cowboys enjoyed a vivid turnaround in their one season under Erickson. Wyoming posted a 6-6 mark that offered drastic contrast to the 3-8 season in 1985. Wyoming's 1986 team switched from the wishbone to Erickson's Air Express offense and finished second in the nation in pass offense. Three quarterbacks broke every school passing record.

In his four seasons at Idaho, Erickson enjoyed more success than any Vandals' coach, compiling a 32-15 record and .681 winning percentage. His teams earned a berth in the NCAA Division I-AA playoffs in his first (1982) and last (1985) seasons.

Married to the former Marilyn Selley, the Ericksons have two sons: Bryce, 19, and Ryan, 16.

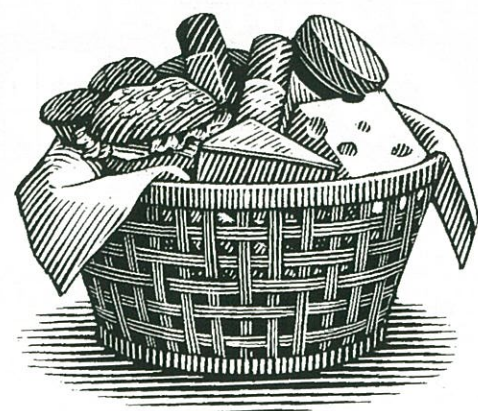
Under Erickson's tutelage, Miami has a 53-7 record, two national titles, 12 first-team All-Americans and numerous national honors for Hurricane players.

Florida State University

Florida State University, nearing its golden anniversary as a coeducational national research institution, is poised on the brink of joining the nation's academic elite.

Located on the oldest continuous site of higher education in Florida and building rapidly on the framework of a highly regarded liberal arts college for women, the university has emerged over the past 47 years as an institution of national and international esteem.

Florida State has begun the 1990s with exceptional strength, energy and vision for the future. And, under the leadership of the university's 12th president, Talbot "Sandy" D'Alemberte, who took office in January 1994, FSU will continue to build on the foundation of its long history of excellence in scholarship, research and science.

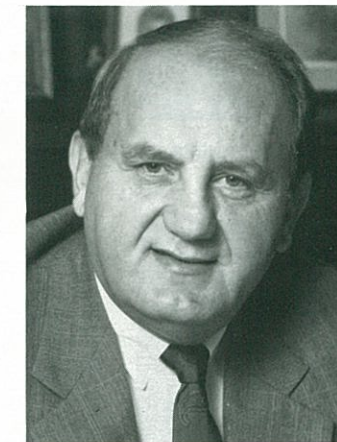
A senior member of the 10-member State University System, FSU was founded as an institution of higher learning in 1851 by legislative act and began in Tallahassee with its first students in 1857.

Today, Florida State's operating budget is \$415 million. Faculty and administrators generate more than \$100 million annually in external funding to supplement state-sponsored research. Three direct-support organizations serve to bolster the university: the private non-profit FSU Foundation, which raises millions in private gifts to support academics, the Seminole Boosters and FSU Alumni Association.

The main campus is spread over 418 acres in Tallahassee; FSU, which has the smallest campus in the SUS, has been actively acquiring land in the

1990s after many years of being landlocked at 347 acres. The university owns a total of 1,248 acres in Leon, Bay and Franklin counties.

For years FSU has reached far beyond Florida through international programs in Switzerland, France, Panama, Costa Rica and the Caribbean. FSU's study centers in Florence, Italy and London, England are considered by many to be the nation's best in Europe.

Florida State offers 273 graduate and undergraduate degree programs through its eight colleges - Arts and Sciences; Business; Communications; Education; Engineering; Human Sciences; Law; and Social Sciences - and eight schools - Criminology and Criminal Justice; Library and Information Studies; Motion Picture; Television and Recording Arts; Music; Nursing; Social Work; Theater; and Visual Arts and Dance.

With 1,558 members, the FSU faculty currently includes five members of the National Academy of Sciences and eight members of the American Acad-

emy of Arts and Sciences, and has included five Nobel laureates. It is backed by 2,915 administrative/professional and support staff.

FSU, a residential campus, places a high priority on its 28,700 students and their needs and interests (of the student population: 46 percent are male; 54 percent are female; 16.1 percent are minorities; and 2.6 percent are foreign students). The Honors and Scholars Program, Disabled Student Services, International Student Center, Distinguished Lecture Series, Student Government, Flying High Circus and intramural sports are among more than 200 organizations and activities in which the students can participate.

Situated in the heart of the state's thriving city capital, Florida State's main campus blends Gothic and modern styles of architecture with the oaks, pines, dogwoods, palms and azaleas of North Florida.

Florida State continues to progress and grow - from its pre-Civil War foundation as the Seminary West of the Suwanee,

through the early 20th century as the academically respected Florida State College for Women, returning to coeducational status as a university in 1947, to its modern development as an acclaimed research institution, a top-ranked competitor in intercollegiate athletics and as a standard-setter in the basic sciences and the performing arts.

In all areas of its mission of excellence in teaching, research and public service, Florida State University is advancing boldly into the 21st century.
