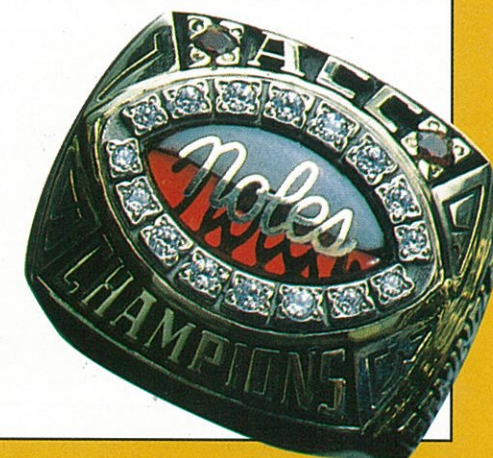
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Head Coach **BOBBY BOWDEN**

Seven straight top four finishes. Nine straight bowl wins. Two hundred thirty-nine career victories. Fifth on the all-time Division I-A coaching win list. The nation's winningest bowl coach by percentage — ever. Fourteen top 20 finishes in 18 seasons. Two Atlantic Coast Conference championships. Thirteen career bowl wins. Seven straight 10-win seasons.

It all adds up to an impressive list of credentials compiled by Florida State University Head Coach Bobby Bowden during a 28-year coaching career. But even with all those accomplishments to his name, not a day went by, hardly an interview concluded, without Bowden having to answer The Question.

"Do you feel your career is missing something without a national title?"

or

"Does winning the national championship eat away at you?"

or

"Does NOT winning the national title keep you awake at nights?"

And every time, even though he had answered the query a hundred times before, the Florida State coach would reply in this vein.

"Sure, I'd like to have one (a national championship), but I don't stay awake at nights thinking about it. It's not what motivates me.

"To me, the most satisfying thing is win-

ning games. I like winning 10 games a year. If they said you could go 11-1, 10-2, 11-1 every year and not win it, or go 5-6, 4-7 and then win one, I'd rather win the games."

Before Bobby Bowden set one foot in the Orange Bowl on Jan. 1, 1994, he was a college football coaching legend. Before Derrick Alexander led a ferocious charge on the top rushing attack in the country, before Matt Frier's impassioned halftime speech and William Floyd's determined running, before Charlie Ward's final masterpiece drive and Scott Bentley's most perfect field goal, even before Byron Bennett's "wide left" and the final gun — Bobby Bowden was a winner. But before that 18-16 victory over Nebraska, Bowden could not escape The Question.

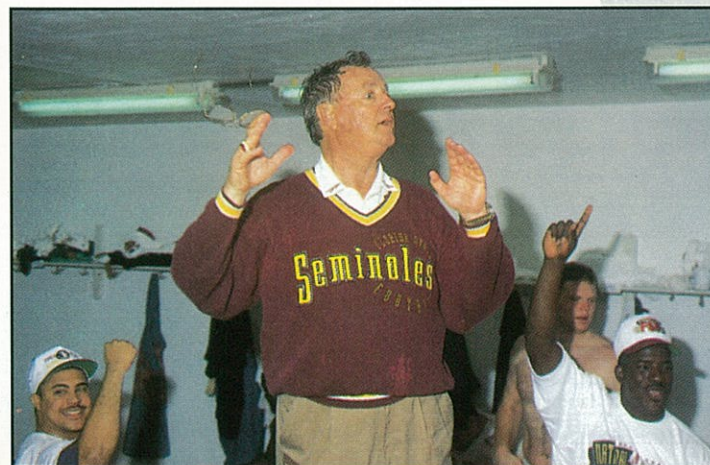
Now, he never has to hear it again. And that, to him, may be the best thing about winning the national championship.

In the early morning hours of Jan. 2, when Bowden's Seminoles were unanimously proclaimed the 1993 national champions, it was hard to tell whether the veteran coach felt more happiness at winning that one single game, or relief about adding the missing element to his nearly unending list of accomplishments.

That morning, there was also a clue to just what has made Bobby Bowden one of the most successful college coaches in history. Because after the late night celebration with family and friends, the morning television shows and photo shoots, Bowden was already working on 1994. He went recruiting.

"I'll probably get to enjoy this in February," Bowden said at a press con-

ference later that morning. He wasn't kidding.

His "day after," spent in the homes of five top Miami area recruits, also showed that just because Bowden earned that first national championship, doesn't mean he's ready to stop there.

"The way I've got it figured, after retirement, there's only one big event left," Bowden said. "And I'm not ready for that."

Indeed, Bowden's "lifetime" contract at Florida State is renewed every year for a five-year period, ensuring that the man whose name has become synonymous with Florida State football will finish his career in Tallahassee.

Back in 1976, when then-president Stanley Marshall and athletic director John Bridgers brought Bowden to Tallahassee from West Virginia, there were few clues that the Birmingham, Ala., native would transform Florida State into the football power it is today. When he arrived at Florida State, the Seminoles had won just four games in the previous three seasons, including an 0-11 campaign in 1973. There was talk of ending the program.

"When I was at Alabama, all I heard was 'Beat Auburn.' When I was at West Virginia, all I heard was 'Beat Pitt.' When I got to FSU, their bumper stickers read 'Beat Anybody!'" Bowden joked in the early years.

Bowden had been hung in effigy in West Virginia, despite compiling a 42-26 record at the school in six years there and taking the Mountaineers to a pair of Peach Bowl berths. He left after a 9-3 season at WVU and returned to Tallahassee, where he had been an assistant coach under Bill Peterson from 1963-65, coaching the FSU wide receivers.

Upon his return to Florida State, Bowden immediately united the Seminole fans, alumni and team under a common goal. That goal — to play arch-rival Florida on an even keel. It's a promise he has kept. Since Bowden's arrival, the Tribe is 10-8 against UF.

Within two years of his arrival, Bowden led the Seminoles to their first 10-win sea-

son and to their first bowl game in six years when his 1977 team went 10-2, including a Tangerine Bowl victory over Texas Tech. It was just a preview of things to come.

In Bowden's 18 seasons at Florida State, the Seminoles have won 10 or more games 10 times. FSU has been to 15 bowl games in his 18 years, including a string of 12 in a row and eight New Year's Day trips. Prior to his arrival, Florida State had been to just eight bowls in 29 years. His FSU win total of 166 is greater than the total of the school's previous seven head coaches combined, making him easily the winningest coach ever at Florida State.

Bowden's Florida State record is 166-46-3. His teams have become nearly unbeatable at home with an 88-15-1 record, while earning the head coach "King of the Road" status with a 78-31-2 mark outside of Tallahassee. Many of those 78 wins came in some of the toughest stadiums in the country, as his squads played at Nebraska, Clemson, Notre Dame, LSU and Michigan, to name a few. By playing some of the nation's toughest schedules, Bowden earned respect for his team, lured the top players to his program and developed a reputation as an intense competitor, unafraid to take on anyone, anywhere.

Bowden has brought a 47-year-old Florida State football program into the national limelight. FSU is now mentioned in the same breath as long-time football powers Notre Dame, Michigan, USC and Nebraska. The Seminoles have become a mainstay in the Associated Press Top 25, and of late, the top 10. Under Bowden, the Seminoles have spent 127 weeks in the top 10. In the last three seasons alone, FSU has spent 24 weeks as number one and has rarely strayed

from the top five. In 18 seasons, Bowden's FSU teams have 14 top 20 finishes.

Last season's 12-1 record and No. 1 final ranking tied Florida State with Miami as the only schools ever to post seven straight top four finishes. Over the past seven seasons, the Seminoles have finished second (1987 and '92), third (1988 and '89), fourth (1990 and '91) and first (1993).

Those 10-win seasons keep adding up, and Bowden's career victories now total 239. Only four coaches in the history of Division I-A football

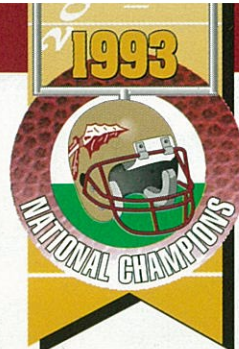

Teepee Talk

Doak Campbell Stadium heard an unfamiliar sound last home game. A strange sound for FSU faithful who have seen their team come so far. Seminole fans booed their own team for, I guess, not wiping a fine opponent off the map. Booing used to be an act FSU faithful would condemn in "spoiled" fans.

It brings up the question of whether Florida State supporters have forgotten from whence they came. FSU has always remained close to its dramatic, if painful, early years.

In fact, in a pregame ceremony in front of the 48th Annual Homecoming crowd, we will recognize the 1974 and '75 teams which took the field some 20 years ago. They have been in Tallahassee for a couple of days and have celebrated the fact that, while their efforts nearly two decades ago may have seemed pointless at the time, they were the building blocks for the nationally renowned program we now enjoy.

Twenty years ago, think back and

remember. Sure it's fun to look at the long hair, flared pants and garishly patterned shirts. Actually, make that REAL fun to look at. But this was perhaps the most crucial time in the history of intercollegiate athletics at Florida State.

Head Coach Darrell Mudra led his only two Seminole teams from the press box. The 1974 squad finished just 1-10 but sent seven players on to the NFL. The 1975 team managed a 3-8 season. While their fate may indeed be that of the FSU teams which saw the program perched on the verge of abolishment — they deserve a better memory.

Florida State University, and its athletic program in particular, has come so far so fast. Maybe too fast! Most of our rivals began football without face masks or even helmets. Playing in cow pastures in front of a handful of curious on-lookers. They spent years building up war chests to fund programs that would make "Big Time U" look good. FSU did not have that chance.

Florida State jumped into the college football scene as it was beginning to really blossom. Following World War II when the entire country's loyalty was fierce be it to the flag, their state or their alma mater.

In other words, we had to hit the ground running. Our success has been remarkable as was the success of the two teams we recognize today. Not in terms of wins or losses, but in terms of spirit, character and drive. We have built our football program into one of the nation's best by learning from the past. From that, we have emerged as a model for the nation.

In 1974, Florida State almost beat Alabama's Orange Bowl team. They were close to beating Florida and Baylor, which played in the Sugar and Cotton Bowls, respectively. They did break the 20-game losing streak with a win, ironically, at the Orange Bowl against Miami 21-14.

The 1975 Seminoles blew out the Tigers in Clemson 43-7 and lost to Auburn (17-14) and Miami (24-22).

The team produced some of FSU's best remembered athletes. Leon Bright led the Seminoles in rushing in 1974 and '75 and teamed with a young Larry Key in the offensive backfield. Jimmy Black passed for 1,535 yards and nine touchdowns and longtime NFL star Bobby Jackson led the defense in 1974. And current FSU star Kez McCorvey could overtake one of Mike Shumman's receiving records against Clemson if he totals more than 140 yards.

A team, coaches are fond of saying, is a group of individuals working together towards a common goal. A football program is much the same. Today's defending national champion Seminoles took something from each of the early teams — some of the fight, some of the spirit and, surely, some of the pride.

While some of the media attention focused on FSU this summer was less than flattering, a group of student-athletes quietly used their status to give a little back to the community. A contingent of Florida State and Florida A&M University athletes spent their summer vacations participating in a first-of-its-kind outreach program.

The All American Foundation (AAF) is a newly created non-profit organization formed for the purpose of serving the nation's youth. Headed by Executive Director Terry Holly, the AAF hires student-athletes for summer jobs working with youth from ages 8 to 18.

"The All American Foundation was created to help promote self-esteem in the hearts and minds of youngsters throughout the nation," explained Holly. "It's an organized, grass roots program that carefully screens and trains student-athlete role models to work with children."

"Our primary mission is to get kids to believe in themselves and to set positive, personal goals. If the kids will take their own goals seriously, then they will also begin to understand why they need to take care of their bodies, steer clear of violence and crime, and get an education."

The AAF's primary supporter in its endeavor is Eckerd Family Youth Alternatives (EFYA). That organization has been in place for 25 years and has been serving

experts cover topics ranging from current substance abuse and juvenile crime trends, to popular children's games and reasons to stay in school.

According to Holly, "College student-athletes make excellent candidates for the job because they are young themselves and they typically have solid self-esteem. They believe firmly in the message AAF asks them to deliver."

The AAF outreach program typically encompasses three half-day visits to the same youth audience. The message is delivered via group discussions, visual aids, games, lecture, workbook exercises and unstructured time.

Delegates do their AAF work in and near the communities where they live during the summer. The AAF's inaugural outreach campaign was concentrated in north Florida, but it also extended as far west as the Panhandle and south to Miami.

"I think this is a great opportunity for athletes here at Florida State," said Lady Seminole swimmer and AAF delegate Ruth Kominski. "It is a great way to spend your summer. You are helping kids stay on the right track and they are not the only ones who are learning. I also



and keep their on a straight path." Jennifer Withrow, a Florida State athlete, serves as an AAF delegate.

In just its first year, the All American Foundation has received great reviews from youth group leaders around the state. Phillip Bryant, a former FSU wide receiver who now works for the Leon County Regional Juvenile Detention Center, hosted AAF delegates last summer and was very impressed.

"The All American Foundation is an excellent program," said Bryant. "It is a positive experience any time you have athletes who are positive role models come and speak to our

kids. I really think the program is a great idea."

"I've had several of the kids at my facility tell me that the people who came out and spoke from the All American Foundation really made them think about their lives. Some of the kids said that it made them want to set goals and turn their lives around."

In the short term, the Foundation would like to expand its boundaries and invite several more universities to involve their student-athletes in the program. Ultimately, the AAF would like to have affiliate member schools in every state in the country.

youth through a multifaceted program that encompasses residential wilderness camps, leadership programs, early intervention services and much more. Support also comes from private gifts and from Florida State University.

Student-athlete outreach delegates hired by the All American Foundation must complete a 40-hour training seminar. The seminar includes presentations from university faculty and other professionals. The training class studies and practices communication and role-modeling skills and learns how to work with children to help them develop their self-esteem and set positive goals. Training

have learned a lot from the groups I have talked with this summer."

AAF delegates visit detention centers, Boys and Girls Clubs, EFYA's programs and recreational summer camps. Although the focus is on "at-risk" children, any organized summer youth program is a prospective target.

"I have enjoyed my work with the Foundation," said Florida State softball player Laurie Shepard. "We are using our role model status as college athletes to help kids. Many of these same ideals that we talk about with the kids are things that helped me get to where I am today. We can help these kids with their self-esteem

have more. Bear Bryant, Amos Alonzo Stagg, Pop Warner and Joe Paterno are ahead of Bowden on that all-time win list. The Orange Bowl win over Nebraska pushed Bowden ahead of Woody Hayes. It's mighty select company.

"To tell you the truth, when I started out, I never thought about breaking records or getting this many wins or that many. I just wanted to coach football and win games," Bowden said. "So far, it's worked out OK, so I guess I'll just stick with that."

Likewise, Bowden is hard-pressed to explain his unprecedented success in bowl games. Florida State's string of 12 bowl games without a loss dates back to the 1981 Orange Bowl, while the nine wins in nine straight seasons (an NCAA record) goes back to a 17-17 tie with Georgia in the 1984 Citrus Bowl. Only Bryant and

Paterno, with 15 each, have claimed more bowl wins than Bowden's 13. His 13-3-1 bowl record and .794 winning percentage is unmatched in the history of college football.

However, it is not Bowden's bowl victories or 10-win seasons or national rankings that make him special. Maybe it's his down-home accent, his folksy charm and his self-deprecating humor.

No one is a stranger for long. Bowden is quick with a handshake or a hug for everyone, big and small. He hates to say no to requests. He flies around the country every off day during the season and nearly every day during the offseason, giving speeches to churches and businesses, hospitals and youth groups, making appearances and shaking hands. His schedule would tire even a much younger man, but the 64-year-old makes it look easy. He has become Florida State's number one goodwill ambassador.

He enjoys dealing with the media and keeps up with what is written and said about his team. Everyday, he takes time out for phone calls and remains one of the most accessible major college coaches in the nation. His affinity for the media led some to say he was TOO well-liked, and that because he was a "good guy," people gave his teams a break in the polls last year. TOO well-liked? Too sincere? Well, if that's the worst thing people can say about you, it's been a pretty successful run.

Bowden is a man with his priorities in order. God and family top the list. In this day when coaches go crazy, threatening each other, throwing tantrums and living solely for their sport, Florida State's man says "I realized a long time ago that football is not life and death. It's just football, a nice game. I hate to lose, but I love life too much to let it get me down."

Bowden grew up in the shadow of Legion Field and was an all-star quarterback at Birmingham's Woodlawn High. From there, he went to Alabama, fulfilling a lifelong dream to play for the Crimson Tide. But, after one semester in Tuscaloosa, he returned to Birmingham to marry his

childhood sweetheart, Ann Estock. He transferred to Howard College (now Samford University) in his hometown and became a Little All-America signal-caller there in 1951.

After graduation in 1953, Bowden stayed at Howard as an assistant coach, serving in that capacity for two years before becoming head coach at South Georgia Junior College in Douglas, Ga. There, he compiled a 22-11 record and then returned to his alma mater as the head coach in 1959. He went 31-6 at Samford in four years, and dominated Alabama small-college football. Following his stint at FSU as an assistant coach, Bowden went to West Virginia as an assistant for three years and was subsequently promoted to the top job. Then, he slipped on a patch of West Virginia ice following his Florida State interview, made the decision to come to Tallahassee and the rest, as they say, is Seminole legend.

Bowden also is the patriarch of the "first family of college coaching." He and son Terry, the head coach at Auburn University and last year's national coach of the year, are the first father-son duo to lead Division I-A programs, let alone to coach them at the same time. Terry's brother, Tommy, is on his staff at Auburn, as is brother-in-law Jack Hines, who is married to Bobby and Ann's eldest daughter, Robyn. Youngest son Jeff joined the Florida State coaching staff in 1994 as the wide receivers coach. The rest of the Bowden clan includes Steve and Ginger. The six Bowden children and 14 grandchildren all attended last year's national championship game, making the victory truly a family event.

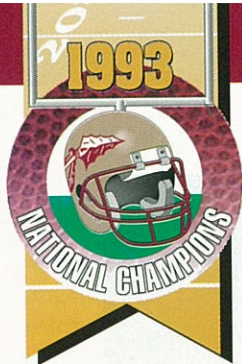

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Player Profile

"Little Buddy" is what his teammates call him, but do not mistake his size for inability.

Clifton Abraham, a senior from Dallas, Texas, makes up for his lack of height with a heart as big as the Lone Star state.

"He really is everyone's little buddy," said Defensive Coordinator Mickey Andrews. "I don't think there's a kid on this team or a fan who has met him who doesn't like Cliff."

Abraham entered his senior season with his eye on the Jim Thorpe Award, given annually to college football's top defensive back.

"I want to be just like Deion (Sanders) and Terrell (Buckley)," said Abraham. "I think I can give a great run at being the third Florida State defensive back to win the Thorpe Award."

"All the things I did to sacrifice for the team are now paying off for me as an individual. The Thorpe means a lot. It says you're the best defensive back in the country, and I feel like I am. And I'm setting out to prove it."

One thing you will not find in Abraham is a lack of confidence. "From day one, you are told you will be in a position to either beat your man or get beat," Abraham said. "We have a lot of confidence, and if we don't, you might as well go to another school."

That sentiment is shared by Andrews. "The biggest thing at Florida State is we ask our corners to stick out there on an island," said the cornerbacks coach. "The opportunities are there to make a lot of plays, smart plays, or to be a goat. If you can't stand the heat, this isn't the place for you."

The way Clifton was raised may be as much of the reason for his confidence as anything else. He was raised in a section of Dallas called Oak Cliff's, an area known for its crime and poverty.

"Oak Cliff's is a tough area," explained Abraham. "A lot of drugs. A

lot of crime. You can get messed up if you are not careful. It's a shame to see some of the things that happen there. It's a struggle. You have to find a way out."

Clifton always knew that football was going to be his ticket out. From an early age he succeeded in the game he loves. He was a member of a Pop Warner national championship team and played on a 5A state championship team with Dallas' Carter High School, one of the most respected high school programs in the country.

"All I ever cared about was football," said Abraham. "I was too busy playing football to get into trouble."

Hard work and dedication have proven to be Clifton's most outstanding characteristics on the football field. "The Lord has blessed me with physical ability," said Clifton. "It's up to me to use it the best I can. Whether it's in practice on Monday's or games on Saturday's. People see the cornerbacks at FSU and think it's all done on natural ability. That may be a part of it, but peo-

ple don't see how hard we work to make those big plays. Players like Deion, Buck (Buckley) and Corey (Sawyer), they worked hard every single day. And that's what I try to do."

This season Abraham has been called on to provide leadership and take on more responsibility. He moves from the boundary corner to the field corner making him responsible for the opposition's top receiver on almost every play.

Head Coach Bobby Bowden knows Abraham can handle the increased responsibility because of his work ethic. "I see him do a lot of things that make up

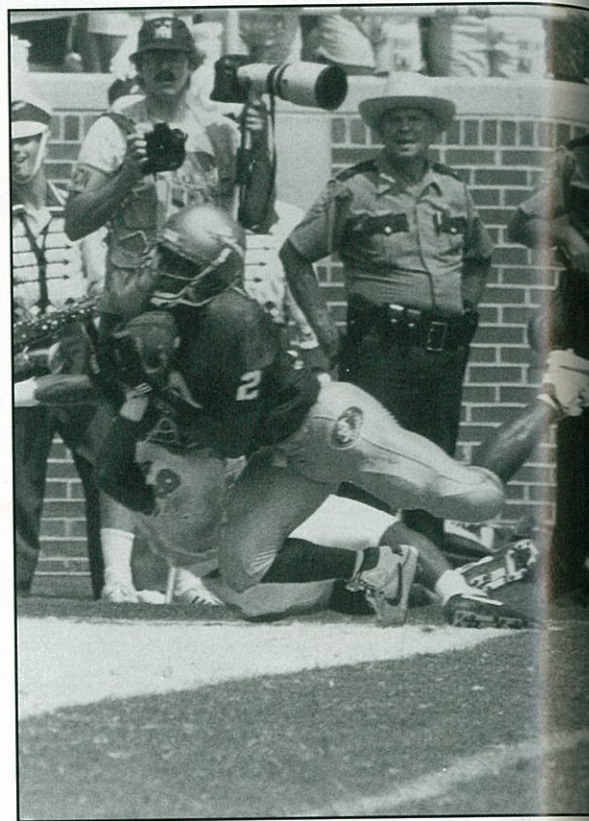
for his height," said Bowden. "He jumps well, he's got a long arm span and he studies the game. Every time I see a big play on defense in practice, it seems to be ol' number 2."

Abraham couples speed, 4.38 in the 40-yard timed run, and unbelievable quickness to make it very tough on opposing receivers as well as his own teammates from time to time.

FSU wide receiver Andre Cooper faces Abraham every day in practice. "What Cliff does best is stay with you out of your break," says Cooper. "You can't fake him. He's quick enough to change direction with you and sometimes it feels like he is the one running the pattern."

A three-year starter and All-ACC player last season, Abraham has broken a school record by returning four blocked punts for touchdowns. He also has eight career interceptions, including one returned for a touchdown.

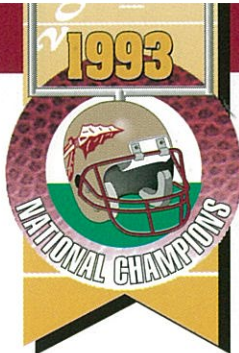
If Abraham continues his hard working ways, his ultimate dream should become reality — Clifton Abraham, 1994 Jim Thorpe Award winner!

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Player Profile

Billy Glenn entered this season as a fifth-year senior expecting to battle for the starting tight-end position and to see plenty of playing time. However, that's only the beginning of his story. The fact that he is even on the field is a credit to modern medicine and the quiet intensity that drives Glenn.

By all accounts, 1990 was a year full of promise for Billy Glenn. Following an outstanding senior season at Daytona Beach Seabreeze High School, he had been named second team All-State and to recruiting analyst Max Emfinger's All-American squad. The Florida-Georgia All-Star game would be the grand finale of his high school career and then it would be on to Florida State University. It wouldn't be that easy though.

The All-Star game that was supposed to be for fun proved to be more than Glenn bargained for. An ill-fated block in the fourth quarter put his football career in jeopardy. A tear of the anterior cruciate, posterior cruciate and medial collateral ligaments would require major reconstructive surgery and a full year of rehabilitation.

"What most people don't realize is that Billy's knee injury was very severe," says assistant trainer Jack Marucci. In spite of the injury, Glenn insists that the game was "fun." But then again, a positive outlook comes naturally to Glenn.

The surgery meant that Glenn would receive a medical redshirt his freshman year. True to form, he found the silver lining in the dark cloud. "I used my red-shirt year to get a jump on academics and to learn the system and rehab my knee," comments Glenn.

Strength and Conditioning Coach Dave Van Halanger agrees, "Billy is a hard worker who took advantage of the situation to get a good start on his education."

Following his first year, Glenn was still experiencing difficulty with the knee.



Although he appeared in a game on the defensive line, he spent the majority of the season continuing his rehabilitation. For the first time, he began to have doubts. "During the second year of rehab, I started to wonder if I would make it back," confesses Glenn. Persistence paid off and the knee responded.

Things began to improve for Glenn during his sophomore season when the coaches asked him to switch from the defensive line to tight end. Glenn was happy to oblige, stating, "I always wanted to play on offense."

He provided much needed depth at the position during his sophomore and junior seasons. However, with the limited role of

the tight end in the "Fast Break" offense, Glenn went both seasons without catching a pass. He did not seem to mind though. "It was worth it if it meant helping us win the national championship last year," Glenn says.

The 1994 season brought on new opportunities and Glenn has made the most of them. During FSU's season opener against Virginia, his number was finally called. He made his first career catch count, hauling in a three-yard touchdown pass. Although he admits that he does not remember how he reacted following the catch, he does remember how he felt. "It was like a dream come true," says the soft-spoken 6-3, 260-pound senior.

Glenn is scheduled to graduate in the spring with a degree in social science. And with plans to continue at FSU and pursue a master's degree in public administration, he has obviously been a success off the field as well. If the saying "good things come to good people" is true, then Billy Glenn has a lot to look forward to.

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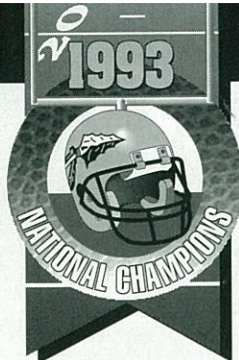


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Player Profile

Dulack Guerrier appreciates the story of David and Goliath. As a defensive end for the Seminoles, he often goes up against football giants. At 6-2, 254 pounds — “soaking wet” Coach Chuck Amato says — Guerrier’s opponents are usually two to three inches taller and 70 pounds heavier. But he slays those giants with 4.7 speed, top conditioning and intelligent play.

“He’s quick and smart,” Amato says of Guerrier.

Strength and Conditioning Coach Dave Van Halanger calls him “one of the top conditioned athletes on the team.” Van Halanger cites Guerrier’s 35-inch vertical jump, his ability to bench press 435 pounds and squat 525 pounds when singing his praises.

Guerrier finds the size difference a fun-filled challenge. “I’m the smallest defensive end in the ACC. Basically everyone I line up against is about 300 pounds, but I like that ... that’s my real excitement ... going up against the biggest people and especially beating them, it’s fun getting them frustrated.”

Versatility is also part of Guerrier’s repertoire. He’s played three different positions in three years — outside linebacker, defensive end and defensive tackle. He’s most comfortable at defensive end. “At this position there’s basically one thing you have to do, and that’s attack every play and explode off the ball,” says Guerrier.



this year. That was a significant accomplishment, but I worked hard for it.”

Another of Guerrier’s equalizers for the football Goliaths is his resilience. He returned to play the ’92 season after recovering from a back injury that led to a medical redshirt the year before. Last season Guerrier recorded his best game against Wake Forest with a pair of tackles, half a sack, and a stop for a loss. “He’s a tough young man,

home town of Miami, Guerrier played linebacker at Edison High — the position of one of his heroes, Lawrence Taylor. He was named first team 5A All-State and made the All-Dade County squad as a senior.

Guerrier’s soft-spoken demeanor is best exemplified by an incident in this year’s North Carolina game. Working on the punt block unit, Dulack recalled the play. “I hit him, I got him on the ground, we flipped over, then he punched me in my stomach. That was the first time (in college) I had experienced anything like that, I remember I used to do things like that in high school ... As I lay there I thought about it — he really just hit me — and then I started chasing him down the field. But I stopped. I had to maintain my composure ... I wanted to play in the Miami game.”

Guerrier’s goals conform with his pragmatic nature. A criminology major, Guerrier wants to work with juveniles in Miami. “When I graduate in December, and if the opportunity is there, then I’d like to turn pro, but if not, I have a lot to offer kids back home.”

Although focused, Guerrier finds, “the thing that stands out most in my career at Florida State is being a part of the first National Championship in FSU history.”

But this season isn’t quite over yet and Dulack, as well as the team, has big aspirations, “...it seems like every thing we’re doing around here these days are firsts ... repeating as national champions would be another, I’d like to take that with me, everything would be a first ... three-time ACC champs, that’s another record ... I have a chance to be a part of a lot.”

Although that’s a giant order to fill, Guerrier seems to know how to deal with giants. If the team’s persistence matches Dulack’s, it’s within the realm of possibility.

And explode he does. Coach Amato says Guerrier is an excellent special teams player and a good pass rusher. “The position changes are semantics,” Amato says. “We were trying to find a position best suited for him to contribute to the program. He plays well at many positions.”

Guerrier alternates with Tryant Marion. The two provide a solid pass rush. “It’s a good rotation,” Guerrier said. “I got the opportunity to rotate with the first team

very disciplined and a dependable player ... it’s good that he’s healthy this year,” Amato said.

Unlike some players, Guerrier prefers good sense to good luck charms. He has no pre-game rituals or superstitions. He’s pragmatic and persistent. That, he says, comes from his mother’s influence. His good relationship with his mother also contributed to his decision to attend FSU over LSU and Colorado. In his

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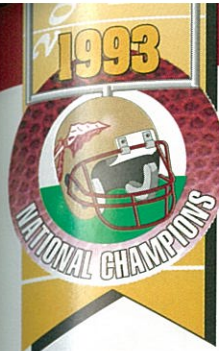
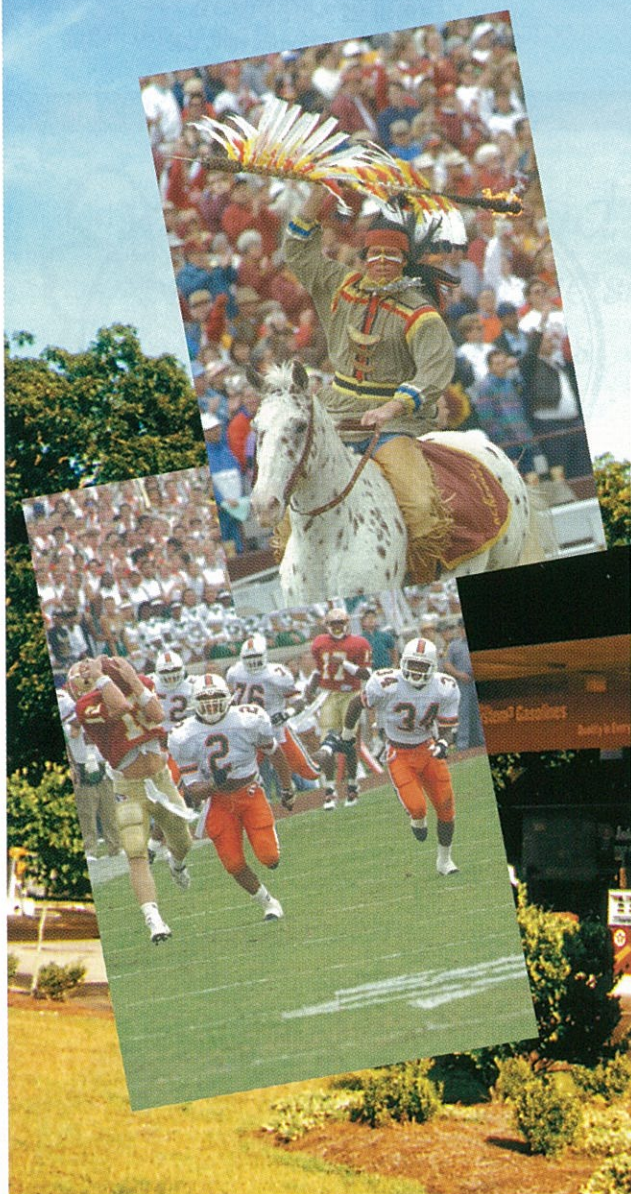


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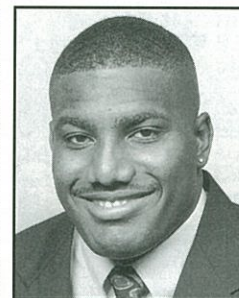
