Teepee Talk

The Seminoles take the field this afternoon with a number of significant elements in effect.

First, FSU has won 21 consecutive Atlantic Coast Conference football games. Twenty-one straight, against a league determined to show the new kid on the block just who is boss. I think the significance is terribly understated among Seminole faithful.

Sure FSU entered the conference with a football program stronger than any other in the league, but you have still got to walk the walk. A walk not as easy as we all probably remember.

A walk that included a September game in 1992 at Death Valley. In only its second game in the ACC and on a Clemson field that took a punt-rookie to win on. Charlie Ward connected on a touchdown pass to Kevin Knox with just two minutes left for a come-from-behind, down-to-the-wire, 24-20 win over the Tigers.

Remember?

A walk that included a trip to Atlanta to face a program with a pair of national

championships under its belt. Behind 18-7 and in danger of being run out of Dodd Stadium in the fourth quarter, Ward worked magic. He engineered 22 points in the last 15 minutes, relying on an onside kick to get the winning possession. Charlie did everything but lead the band before hitting Kez McCorvey with the winning touchdown with 1:48 left for a come-from-behind, down-to-the-wire, unbelievable game.

Remember?

A walk that, just a week later, saw FSU travel to Virginia where the Cavaliers were waiting. The defensive battle allowed scores by either team in only the second and third quarters before the Seminoles prevailed 13-3. Another come-fr ... well, you get the picture.

Remember?

I'm guessing that things were a whole lot closer than most of us remembered. And our pride and satisfaction should be that much deeper knowing that if Florida State manages to defeat Duke today, it was a long, tough road with only one traveler.

Speaking of traveling, our guests today deserve the gracious reception that Florida State fans have been known to give. One of the many quotes given by ACC officials at FSU's announcement of league affiliation dealt with the impact of the powerful Seminole football program. "What you hope will happen is that the teams at the bottom will elevate their aspirations and rise to the top."

Witness, salute, congratulate today's opponent — the aspirers.

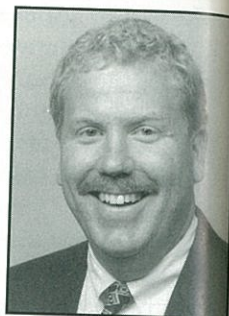
Duke's program appeared headed for another frustrating year with a new football coach and coming off a 3-8 season. However, the Blue Devils donned a new attitude along with their new duds and have fashioned a spectacular 7-0 run.

Their efforts have brought about today's regionally televised game between undefeated league frontrunners. It is the stuff that conference offices dream about.

So, a salute to Duke, congratulations to Florida State and another afternoon of college football at its best in Doak Campbell Stadium.

Florida State moved the kickoff of today's game to 7 p.m. in September in hopes of avoiding the traffic complications caused by Florida A&M's Homecoming route. However, Duke's tremendous start made it a very attractive television game and Jefferson-Pilot selected it for regional broadcast shifting the kickoff to noon. The irony is that FSU had no choice but to move the game because a new ACC rule requires schools to move their games to accommodate television. The irony comes from the fact that the rule was passed because of Virginia's refusal to move its game with FSU for national television in 1992.



Golden Torch Gala

The Florida State University athletic department, along with the Seminole Boosters, hosted the fourth annual Golden Torch Gala Friday night at the Oglesby Union Ballroom. This one-of-a-kind black-tie affair, with the sponsorship of the Florida Lottery, honors the outstanding academic achievements of FSU's student-athletes. The top male and female athletes from each of the University's 14 teams with the highest grade point average were honored, as were the top male and female teams for the 1993-94 academic year. Others featured in the evening's festivities included the 106 student-athletes named to the Atlantic Coast Conference honor roll last year. To qualify, these FSU athletes maintained a minimum 3.0 GPA for both the fall and spring semesters and competed in an ACC championship event.

Dr. Roger Grooters, associate athletic director for academic programs, sings the Gala's praises. "This banquet is important because it recognizes those student-athletes who have attained academic goals and it encourages others to strive for these same types of goals."

Daryl Bush (Business): A sophomore middle linebacker from Altamonte Springs, Bush is a tough, hard-nosed player who has started every game this season.

Curtis Azama (Accounting & Finance): This 6-1 senior walked-on to last year's squad. Azama has continued his success by landing a job with the accounting firm of Ernst & Young.

WOMEN'S BASKETBALL

Allison Peercy (Elementary Education): A spark plug for the Lady Seminoles, Peercy enters her senior year with a string of 52 consecutive games started.

BASEBALL

Colby Weaver (Business): Weaver capped a successful baseball career at Florida

State by becoming a fifth-round draft choice of the Atlanta Braves this past June.

SOFTBALL

Adrienne Pearson (Criminology): Pearson saw action in 48 games last season for FSU's nationally ranked softball team.

VOLLEYBALL

Jennifer McCall (Physical Education): A two-time Golden Torch Gala honoree, McCall finished her career ranked second on the all-time set assists list.

Franci Rard (Early Childhood Education): After transferring to Florida State for her senior year, Rard was a steady all-around performer who finished second on the team in digs and fourth in kills.

MEN'S SWIMMING

Jose Gutierrez (Mechanical Engineering): Gutierrez was a valuable member of last season's 400 medley, 400 freestyle and 800-meter freestyle relay teams that set a pair of school records.

WOMEN'S SWIMMING

Ruth Kominski (Special Education): Kominski was a three-time finalist in the ACC Championship meet.

MEN'S TENNIS

Ken McKenzie (Social Science): A

member of FSU's All-ACC doubles team, McKenzie posted a 14-8 record at number two singles last season.

WOMEN'S TENNIS

Ashley Delaney (Business): Put together a 6-6 record as a freshman while playing through a painful leg injury.

MEN'S GOLF

Christian Raynor (Communications): A key member of the Seminole golf team, Raynor advanced into the quarter-finals of the U.S. Amateur tournament this summer.

WOMEN'S GOLF

Mabel Pascual-del-Pobil (Business): Placed third at the LSU-Fairwood Invitational last season and had one other top-10 finish.

MEN'S TRACK

Bryn Wells (Finance): Another in a long line of fine Seminole pole vaulters.

WOMEN'S TRACK

Casey Custer: Custer is a young, talented sprinter, specializing in the 100- and 200-meter dashes.

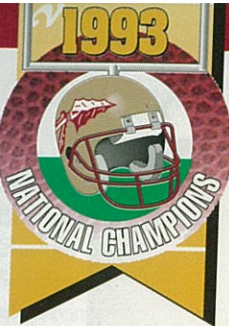

Player Profile

When it comes to talking, one would be hard pressed to find anyone better on this year's Seminole squad than fifth-year senior cornerback Corey Fuller. Once you consider Fuller's résumé, it is easy to understand why.

Perhaps one of the team's more adept trash talkers, Fuller finds his game thrives on it. "I love to talk trash on the field," he claims, "because I know it will bring out the best in me as well as the best in my opponent." Fuller's presence in the Seminole secondary is a welcomed return after he was forced to sit out all of last year with a torn anterior cruciate ligament in his right knee.

True to form, Fuller was able to turn a negative experience into a positive. "It was very difficult for me to be on the sidelines during a season like (last year's national championship), but that is just a part of life and I tried to make the most of it. It was a great experience for all of us, and being injured just made me more hungry to compete again." This type of adversity would test the will of any football player, but for Fuller, it was just another in a long line of obstacles he has overcome.

Having successfully tackled dyslexia to be within one semester of his degree in child development, Fuller wants to make sure kids avoid the path that led to the death of his younger brother Fred who, in the summer of 1992, was gunned down by another youth. To help achieve this, Fuller participated in Florida State's "Brotherhood of Pride" program the past two summers. A graduate of the program, which matches "at risk" juvenile offenders with mentors, Fuller knows first hand the impact a positive role model can have.

"I grew up without a father and was on my way down the wrong road," says Fuller. "I want to give back to the kids in my community. They need help and they

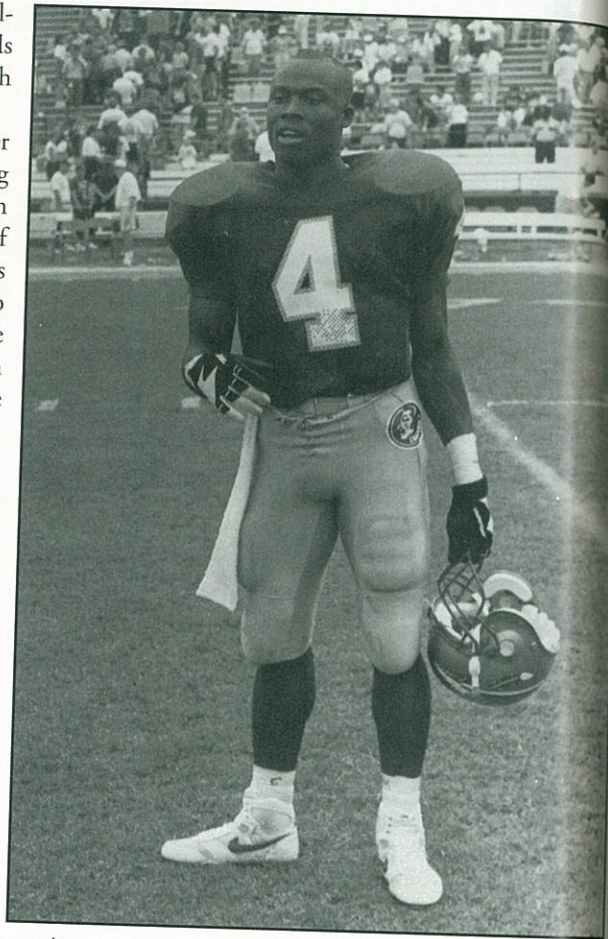
need direction. I especially want to help the kids who were like me, with no father."

The storms that Fuller has weathered, along with his involvement in the "Brotherhood of Pride" program, the Boys Club and FSU's "Say No to Drugs" campaign were recently rewarded when he was one of 11 college football players named to the 1994 College Football Association's "Good Works Team." Fuller became the first FSU recipient of the annual award recognizing the superior efforts of college football players off the field.

"Having grown up in Tallahassee, it's a very special feeling going into the community and helping these kids," commented Fuller. "It is one of the most rewarding experiences to know you are helping people and making a difference. These kids need to know there is another side than bad and that they can make good out of bad. I am living proof of that."

"One thing I always stress when I talk

to the children is that it's a very narrow road to doing right, and a very wide road to doing wrong."

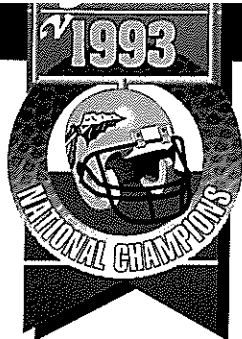
Fuller credits much of his success in football to his second sport at Florida State, track. "Track is very important to me," Fuller begins, "because through track training I learn to run faster and speed is everything in football, especially for the position I play." Although his track future is in limbo because of the lingering effects of reconstructive knee surgery, Fuller will always give credit to track for keeping him in top physical condition. "I would like to play professional (football) someday and track will be crucial in helping me keep my speed and endurance levels up."

Although Fuller's football career after this season is unclear, one thing is certain: If the adage, "You get back from life what you put into it" holds true, then Corey Fuller is in for a bright future.

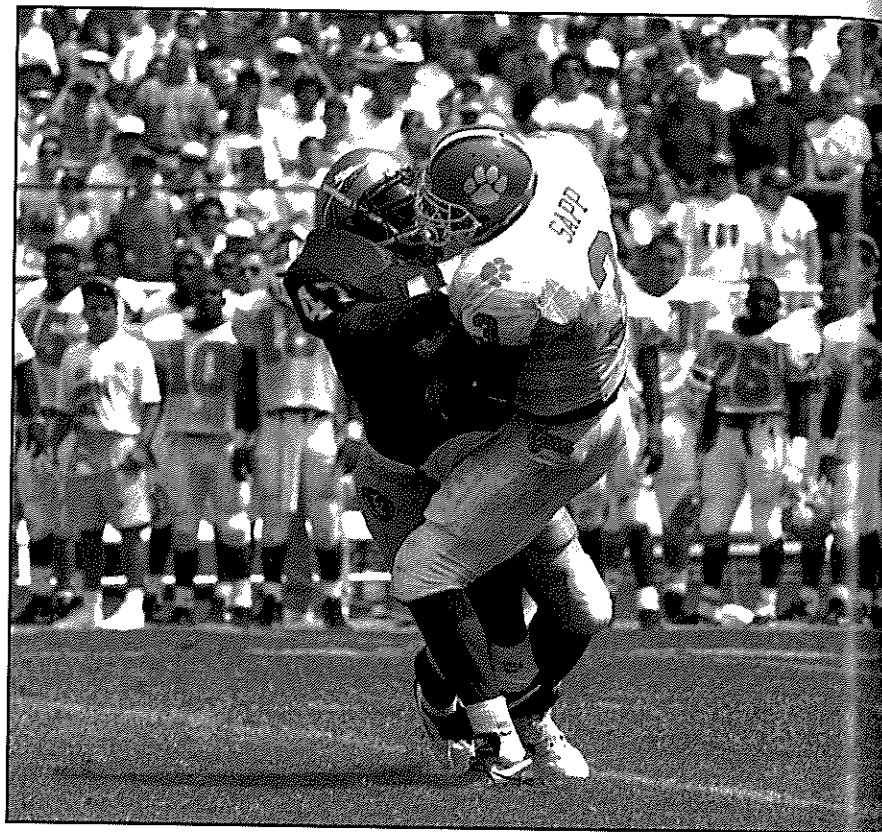
For many college football seniors, this point in the season becomes a period of self reflection.

Florida State's James Roberson is no exception. For this defensive end, the next level is a possibility but not a certainty. Therefore, he often finds himself looking back at his career and his decision to attend Florida State.

Out of high school Roberson had visions of attending Auburn University. His dream was to play for the Tigers and follow in the footsteps of other great outside linebackers by becoming one himself. 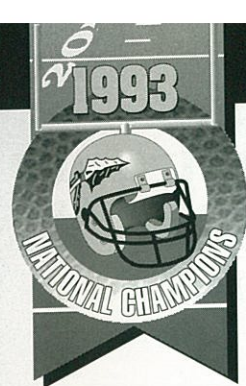
becomes clear how important this close-knit family is to him as most of his stories refer back to lessons taught by his mother, father, brothers and sisters.
