




ince teaming up to provide Central Florida with college football excitement, Texaco and Florida Citrus Sports have brought a variety of top-notch games to the Florida Citrus Bowl.

Since its inception in 1990, the Texaco Star Classic has played host to top-25 ranked teams, two of the state's biggest college football names, some of college football's most prestigious names among the coaching ranks, and a Division I-AA shootout that produced the most points and total offense.

Not only has the game drawn fans into the Florida Citrus Bowl Stadium and given them quality football com-

petition, it has showcased Texaco to national television audiences, within the universities and before the Central Florida community.

Here are the scores from the first three Classics.

1990 TEXACO STAR CLASS

Florida State 35, Memphis State 3 November 17, 1990

The ninth-ranked Florida State Seminoles entered the inaugural Texaco Star Classic with a 7-2 record against the 4-5-1 Memphis State Tigers.

Once the game began it quickly turned into the Lawrence Dawsey Show as the Seminole senior wide receiver caught eight passes for 133 vards and two touchdowns. He also added three carries on reverses for 67

yards as FSU turned in a 35-3 win before 55,190 in the Florida Citrus Bowl.

Dawsey, the game's MVP, singlehandedly outscored the Tigers 12-3 and almost outgained them with 200 total yards to Memphis State's 223.

1991 TEXACO STAR CLASSIC

Florida 29, Mississippi State 7 September 28, 1991


In the second edition of the Classic, the 15th-ranked, 2-1 Florida Gators met the streaking Mississippi

All-SEC quarterback Shane Matthews recorded his school-record breaking seventh career 300-yard passing game and running back Errict Rhett rushed for 142 yards to lead the Gators past the Bulldogs 29-7 before a national WTBS audience and 69,328 in attendance.

Matthews completed 22 of 35 passes for 322 yards and two touchdowns as Florida built a 17-0 lead at the intermission. The Gators dominated the game offensively, accumulating 517 yards of offense while the UF defense limited the MSU offense to 233 yards.

it was UCF that scored last to seal the final margin of victory. With 2:26 remaining in the game, Knight quarterback Darin Hinshaw found Bret Cooper on a 13-yard strike to cap a 73yard drive.

While Hinshaw completed 26 of 45 passes for 378 yards, it was freshman running back Gerod Davis who captured the game MVP with 170 rushing yards on 23 carries. Overall the two teams accounted for 1,076 yards of offense, with UCF outgaining the Dukes 632 to 444.



1992 TEXACO STAR CLASSIC

The UCF Knights and James Madison Dukes provided the highestscoring Texaco Star Classic as the Division I-AA powers met in their final game of the 1992 season.

ne day short of a full calendar year has passed since Charlie Ward's pass fell incomplete to Kez McCorvey in the back of the end zone to end the 31-24 game in South Bend. Not only have fans waited a year for this matchup, but Florida Citrus Sports has been planning for this epic clash since 1990, when the game was inked.

FCS membership brochures touted the game as early as 1992. Headlines screamed out: Joining now guarantees you a seat!

The Monday following the 31-24 Notre Dame victory, USA Today gave FCS a plug, telling folks how to join the Orlando organization. And it worked. Countless telephone calls came, membership brochures were sent out and folks from all over the country responded. By the end of January 1994, Florida Citrus Sports had reached its capacity of membership seats and Florida State and Notre Dame had not even received their allotments.

On Sunday, June 26, the final 3,000 tickets were put on public sale at 27 Central Florida Ticketmaster outlets. They lasted six minutes.

The day of reckoning is finally here. Florida State and Notre Dame. Let the game begin.

STRUTTING THE STUFF AND STUFFING THE STRUT

The bulk of the Notre Dame offensive line against the quickness of the Florida State defensive line will be a key today. The Irish boast an offensive line that averages 6-5 and 278 pounds and has led an attack averaging 233.5 yards per game rushing

Aiming into the Florida State defensive front will be Notre Dame's leading rusher Randy Kinder. Kinder and backfield mate Ray Zellars may find openings on the left side of the line featuring Dusty Zeigler (6-6, 264) and Mike Doughty (6-8, 280).

"Mike Doughty and Dusty Zeigler have the potential to become two of the best linemen to play side by side since I've been here," said Irish head coach Lou Holtz. "Right now, Zeigler is playing as well as any offensive lineman we've had since I've been at Notre Dame. If he's not an All-American, we don't have one.'

Kind words from the coach about the Springfield, Ga. native who played in the 1992 Florida-Georgia High School All-Star game in the Florida Citrus Bowl.

A stiff challenge is presented across the line. FSU is anchored by 1994 Lombardi Award finalist Derrick Alexander (6-5, 282), who registered eight tackles against the Irish last year. Alexander is joined by senior James Roberson (6-4, 241), junior Orpheus Roye (6-4, 275) and sophomore Connell Spain (6-2, 285) to try and stop the Irish ground attack that gained 239 yards in the 1993 game.

Stopping the rush will also prove to be key as the Miami Hurricanes ran for 185 yards in their 34-20 upset victory over the Seminoles on Oct. 8.

So keep an eye on the trenches and see if the holes open up.


COACHING LEGENDS

There aren't two more respected head coaches in the country than the ones pacing the Florida Citrus Bowl sidelines today.

Between Florida State's Bobby Bowden and Notre Dame's Lou Holtz are 440 victories in 44 years of head

Bowden began his coaching career at Samford in 1959 but reached Division I-A in 1970 at West Virginia. Holtz reached the head coaching ranks in 1969 at William & Mary. The pair have startling similarities during their careers, beginning in 1970.

Bowden took over the West Virginia helm in 1970 and scored eight wins as a rookie coach. Two years later, his Mountaineer team reached the Peach Bowl. Holtz, in his second year at William & Mary, guided the Tribe to the Southern Conference championship. The title earned him a trip to




top-ranked Oklahoma. In Tallahassee, during Bowden's second year at FSU, he led the Seminoles to a 10-2 record and a postseason win against Texas Tech in the Tangerine Bowl.

Since 1987, the year Holtz took over at Notre Dame, he has finished the season among the nation's top 10 five times, including a national championship in 1988.

Bowden's Seminoles have finished in the top 10 seven consecutive years since 1987 and took the national championship in 1993.

Their careers are legendary. Bowden is second in victories among

active coaches with 243 while Holtz is sixth with 197. The leader is Joe Paterno with 262, the coach whose Penn State team made this game possible by joining the Big Ten Conference (see feature story).

FSU AND NOTRE DAME HEAD TO HEAD

While the current two-year series pitting FSU and Notre Dame has drawn quite a bit of attention, there was another meeting between the two schools in 1981 season. That year, FSU head coach Bobby Bowden staked his initial claim to the "King of the Road" tag. FSU visited five opponents—Nebraska, Ohio State, Notre Dame, Pittsburgh and LSU—in six weeks. The Seminoles came away 3-2 against the competition. One of the victories was a 19-13 win over the Irish.

Playing a big part in the Notre Dame win was Florida Citrus Sports member and Orlando resident James Harris, a starting cornerback. His interception of a Blair Keil pass in the fourth quarter set up the winning FSU score, a 5-yard pass from Rick Stockstill to running back Michael Whiting.

"Notre Dame scored to tie the game 13-13 the first play of the fourth quarmy wide receiver by using the tight end as a decoy, but I didn't bite. I tipped the ball with one hand and it fell to me. I returned it a couple of yards and the offense took the ball in and scored to make it 19-13. Then we held them defensively."

The former cornerback sees quite a difference between today's matchup and the 1981 meeting in South Bend.


"The intensity of college football games today is unbelievable," Harris said. "There is so much media coverage today. Both teams are on television all the time and they're on the front page of newspapers every week. When I played, it was like we were playing in front of our family and friends."

Harris relocated to Orlando in March and is an account executive with Raymond James & Associates, Inc., a regional brokerage firm.



anny Kanell never promised he'd fill Charlie Ward's shoes. The Seminoles' 6-4 junior is doing just fine in continuing the lineage of top-drawer quarterbacks under Bobby Bowden at FSU.


He may not have Ward's mobility or creativity under fire. But Kanell started with a bang in the season opener against Virginia and actually got off to a quicker start than Ward did in 1993.

Fueled by a 330-yard performance against the Cavaliers and 427 yards against Maryland, the fifth highest single-game total in school history, Kanell reached 1,000 yards passing faster than any other FSU quarterback and guided the offense to only two fewer points in the first four games than Ward's high-flying machine of 1993.

Kanell did have his problems in a 34-20 loss to Miami, with three interceptions and two sacks. But he's remained the solid starter throughout the year.

Kanell has had a variety of weapons. Wide receivers Andre Cooper, Kez McCorvey, 'OMar Ellison, Wayne Messam and E.J. Green have been spectacular, and the tight end has been returned to the offense with the duo of Melvin Pearsall and Billy Glenn combining to catch more balls in the first four games than FSU tight ends did in all of 1993. Kanell also is supplemented by more depth at running back. Warrick Dunn, last year's freshman sensation, is backed by Ricardo Preston and Tiger McMillon at tailback, and Zack Crockett has turned into a dependable, rugged fullback.

FSU's offensive line has come together after early-season injuries and suspensions, led by All-ACC players Clay Shiver at center and Patrick McNeil at guard. Scott Bentley, the hero of the Orange Bowl game, has been consistent all season as the kicker.



arly-season injuries have depleted the Florida State defense of some of its depth, and they're giving up an average of one touchdown more per game than last year. But this is still a formidable unit with three legitimate All-America candidates at each position group: tackle Derrick Alexander, linebacker Derrick Brooks and cornerback Clifton Abraham.

Alexander has recovered from a shoulder injury to come close to the form that made him one of the top linemen in the nation last season. Brooks rallied from a two-game suspension to start the season by blocking a punt and forcing a fumble in his first game and Abraham already has scored the sixth touchdown of his college career and continued the tradition of game-breaking Seminole cornerbacks.

Cornerback Corey Fuller has rebounded well from a knee injury that cost him the 1993 season and strong safety Devin Bush, without much fanfare, might be the most solid player on the team after Brooks, Alexander and Abraham.

FSU has had to scramble to find replacements for nose guard Enzo Armella and free safety Steve Gilmer, who went down for the season with knee injuries in the fourth game against North Carolina. However, it's been a coming-out party for several other rising young stars, such as linebacker Sam Cowart, end Reinard Wilson and free safety Sean Hamlet. Cowart led the team in tackles at midseason and Wilson proved to be the most consistent pass rusher after Alexander's injury. ■



ames change regularly, but somehow the production of Notre Dame's football team stays the same year after year.


The running game is still the cornerstone of the Irish attack, but a talented young quarterback gives Notre Dame another dangerous weapon. Ron Powlus, after missing last year with a broken clavicle, is finally getting his opportunity to shine at quarterback.

One important thing the sophomore has learned is that he doesn't have to do everything on his own. With backfield talent like Lee Becton, Randy Kinder, Ray Zellars and Marc Edwards, as well as quality receivers like Derrick Mayes, Michael Miller and Charlie Stafford, Powlus' job is easier.

The unsettling part of the Irish offense is on the line. Injuries have limited the effectiveness of guard Ryan Leahy, but he has come on since early in the season. Guard Dusty Zeigler, tackles Jeremy Akers and Mike Doughty, center Mark Zataveski and tight ends Oscar McBride and Leon Wallace have come together to provide a solid front.

It took a few games for that front to come together, but since early in the season Notre Dame's ground assault has been as deadly as ever.

When the running game is working, the passing game opens up and the opposition is left in its wake.

hich came first, the chicken or the egg? Or, in the case of the defensive unit of Notre Dame's football team, does the attitude make the team or does the team make the attitude?


Since losses to Michigan, Boston College and Brigham Young during the early part of the season, Irish coach Lou Holtz, defensive coordinator Bob Davie and the entire Notre Dame defense has made a commitment to a new attitude.

It's an effort to rekindle the defensive reputation that made Notre Dame one of the most feared teams in the country a few years back and brought the Irish a national championship in 1988. This new attitude is reflected in the aggressive style of defense and the physical nature that the Irish bring into each game.

Defensive captains Justin Goheen, a linebacker, and end Brian Hamilton are the emotional leaders of this rejuvenated defense.

One of the most talented members of the Irish defense is cornerback Bobby Taylor. The Thorpe Award and All-America candidate, who is just a junior, dares the opposition to throw the ball his way.

One of the heroes from last year's win over Florida State is cornerback Shawn Wooden. He batted down Charlie Ward's last-second desperation pass to preserve the 31-24 victory.







lorida State University, nearing its golden anniversary as a coeducational
 graduate research institution, is poised on the brink of joining the nation's academic elite.

Located on the oldest continuous site of higher education in Florida and building rapidly on the framework of a highly regarded liberal arts college for women, the university has emerged over the past 47 years as an institution of national and international esteem. Its stature is evidenced by a number of exciting additions to its record of excellence since the 1990s began:

• In 1990, the National Science Foundation established the \$100 million National High Magnetic Field Laboratory at Florida State, which is partnered in research with the Los Alamos National Laboratory and University of Florida. A Nobel laureate in physics and a top Russian physicist were among the first scholars drawn to the FSU faculty by the magnet lab.

• At the forefront of supercomputing since obtaining its first high-speed computer in 1985, FSU took yet another step in ultrafast and parallel computing in 1990 when it acquired two supercomputers, the Thinking Machine Corp. Connection Machine and the Cray Y-MP.

• In 1990, Florida State ranked second in popularity nationwide among high school seniors, based on the number of students who request that their Scholastic Aptitude Test (SAT) scores be sent to an institution. FSU was the only institution listed among the top 10 choices of both black and white college-bound students.

• FSU's high-tech program in structural biology in 1991 received the university's largest single foundation grant, \$4 million, to position it among the leaders in the field worldwide.

• The Appleton Museum of Art in Ocala, its vast and varied art collection and an eminent scholar chair were donated to FSU and Central Florida Community College in 1990. Valued at \$42 million, the gift is the largest ever received at Florida

• In 1990, the FSU School of Theatre reached out to the then-Soviet Union to begin a mutual student-and-faculty exchange program with the renowned Moscow Art Theatre.

● Now the professional training ground for film production, one of Florida's fastest growing industries, FSU graduated the first class of graduate film students from its School of Motion Picture, Television and Recording Arts in 1991 and its first undergraduate class in

1993. The school offers a bachelor's degree program in Tallahassee and a master of fine arts program in Sarasota. Its students are already producing award-winning films.

• To instill an awareness and understanding of the world's cultural diversity, FSU undergraduate students, beginning with the 1991 freshman class, are required to complete at least two courses that focus on diverse traditions beyond Western civilization. The multicultural study requirement complements a long-established liberal studies program for undergraduates at Florida State.

• Florida's Office of Campus Volunteers, which matches college students with agencies in need of community service volunteers, is located at Florida State. It opened in 1990.

• The Dr. Bobby E. Leach Center, a state-of-the-art student recreation facility including an indoor pool, saunas, basketball and racquet-sport courts, was completed in 1991.

• Construction of the \$82 million University Center, adjacent to Doak Campbell Stadium, got under way in 1991. When completed, it will provide 550,000 square feet of classroom and office space and a centralized location for student services. The three-phase project includes two eight-story buildings and three four-story buildings on the east and west sides of the stadium, enclosure of the south end zone and expansion of Moore Athletic Center.

• Capping more than a decade of national prominence in intercollegiate athletics, Florida State's athletic teams, nicknamed "Seminoles," joined the Atlantic Coast Conference as its ninth member in 1990.

• FSU ranked 20th in the nation for 1990-91 in the number of black Ph.D. students it graduates. From 1986 to 1990 FSU ranked eighth nationally by granting doctorates to 70 African-Americans.

• In 1992, FSU College of Law graduates led the state with a 97.5 percent passing rate among law graduates taking the state bar exam for the first

time.

Florida State has begun the 1990s with exceptional strength, energy and vision for the future. Under the leadership of the university's 12th president, Talbot "Sandy" D'Alemberte, who took office in January 1994, FSU will continue to build on the foundation of its long history of excellence in scholarship, research and service.

lorida State University athletics soared to new heights during the 1993-94 season, continuing to earn the distinction as one of the nation's top athletic programs. Both on the playing field and in the classroom, Florida State athletes established a mark of excellence.

FSU ushered in 1994 with its first-ever national championship in football. Ouarterback Charlie Ward brought a Heisman Trophy, along with literally every other trophy, to Tallahassee when he was recognized as college football's most outstanding performer for the '93 season.

As a program, Florida State qualified nine teams for NCAA postseason competition. The volleyball team made history by advancing to the second round of the national championship tournament for the first time in eight NCAA appearances. The women's tennis team culminated a historic season by qualifying for the NCAA Tournament for the first time ever.

The baseball Seminoles advanced to the College World Series for the 13th time. Both the men's and women's golf teams placed high enough in NCAA Regionals to earn automatic berths into their respective national championship tournaments. For the ninth straight year, the Lady Seminole softball team qualified for NCAA Regional play. Men's tennis advanced to the opening round of the NCAA Regionals, while track sent 15 athletes to the NCAA Outdoor Championship and six to the Indoor.

Individually, Florida State athletes qualified for NCAA postseason competition in men's swimming and tennis. and women's swimming and tennis.

FSU athletes also excelled in the classroom. The Seminoles placed a school record 113 athletes on the ACC's Academic Honor Roll. These student-athletes maintained a grade point average of 3.0 or higher for both the fall and spring semesters. Among FSU's 16 teams, the Lady Seminole golf squad took top team honors for the second straight year. The linksters ended the school year with a 3.1 cumulative grade point average.

Student-athlete standouts Kristy Derlak and Ken Alexander were ACC Postgraduate Scholarship recipients. Derlak led the Lady Seminole basketball team in scoring last season, while Alexander was a two-year starter at linebacker.

Florida State's first-ever Heisman Trophy winner Charlie Ward set 17 single-season and career records and along the way was named the Atlantic Coast Conference Player of the Year for the second straight season.

Florida State's women's tennis team made a clean sweep of the ACC Most Valuable Player awards when two-time All-American Audra Brannon was named Player of the Year and Lori Sowell was selected Rookie of the Year.

Seminole pitching ace Paul Wilson put his name in the national headlines when the New York Mets made him the No. 1 selection in Major League Baseball's draft of amateur players.

Florida State produced 19 first team All-Americans in 1993-94. Ward and Derrick Brooks were named consensus All-Americans, while teammates Corey Sawyer and Derrick Alexander garnered first-team honors. Other first team All-

Americans included Wilson (baseball), Bobby Cochran (golf), Brannon (tennis), Bob Sura (basketball), Lew Anelo, Kevin Ansley, John Rothell, Jonathan Carter, Marcus Dixon, Kelsy Nash, Phillip Riley, Sheryl Covington, Sophia Danvers, Radhiya Teagle and Erica Shepard (track).

The support student-athletes receive at Florida State is second to none. The nearly completed University Center houses the athletic department's academic support services. Under the direction of Dr. Roger Grooters, FSU student-athletes have access to tutors, one-on-one academic counseling, study areas, the latest in computer technology, and a study hall and research area.

The expansion and renovation of Doak Campbell Stadium puts it on a par with the finest football facilities in the nation. The 12-court, 1,000-seat Scott Speicher Tennis Center will be the host site of the 1996 NCAA Women's Championship.

Tallahassee will get a dose of "March Madness" when Florida State hosts the first and second rounds of the 1995 NCAA Basketball Championship Tournament at the Seminoles' home court, the Tallahassee/Leon County Civic Center, in mid-March.

For the 11th time in 12 years Dick Howser Stadium was selected to host NCAA Regional baseball action this past spring. During the year, the Atlantic Coast Conference parted with tradition when it held the conference championship swimming and diving meet at Florida State's Bobby E. Leach Center, marking the first time in eight years that the meet was held outside of North Carolina. For the second straight year, Florida State also played host to the ACC's softball championship tournament.

With Florida State's commitment to winning and dedication to serving the needs of its student-athletes both academically and athletically, Florida State University athletics has secured its place among the nation's elite.

even straight Top Four finishes. Thirteen bowl wins, including nine in a row, and 239 career victories. Fifth on the all-time Division I-A coaching win list. The nation's winningest bowl coach—ever. Fourteen Top 20 finishes in 18 seasons. Two Atlantic Coast Conference championships. Seven straight 10-win seasons.

It all adds up to an impressive list of credentials compiled by Florida State University head coach Bobby Bowden during a 28-year coaching career. But even with all those accomplishments to his name, not a day went by, hardly an interview concluded, without Bowden having to answer The Question.

"Do you feel your career is missing something without a national title?" or "Does winning the national championship eat away at you?" or "Does NOT winning the national title keep you awake at nights?"

Every time, even though he had answered the query a hundred times before, the Florida State coach would reply in this vein: "Sure, I'd like to have one [a national championship], but I don't stay awake at nights thinking about it. It's not what motivates me.

Before Bobby Bowden set one foot in the Orange Bowl on Jan. 1, 1994, he was a college football coaching legend. But before that 18-16 victory over Nebraska, Bowden could not escape The Question.

Now he never has to hear it again. To him, that may be the best thing about winning the national championship.

Back in 1976, when then-president Stanley Marshall and athletic director John Bridgers brought Bowden to Tallahassee from West Virginia, there were few clues that the Birmingham, Ala. native would transform Florida State into the football power it is today. When he arrived at Florida State, the Seminoles had won just four games in the previous three seasons, including an 0-11 campaign in 1973. There was talk of ending the program.

"When I was at Alabama, all I heard was 'Beat Auburn.' When I was at West Virginia, all I heard was 'Beat Pitt.' When I got to FSU, their bumper stickers read 'Beat Anybody'!" Bowden joked in the early years.

Bowden himself had been hanged



in effigy in West Virginia, despite compiling a 42-26 record at the school in six years there and taking the Mountaineers to a pair of Peach Bowls. He left after a 9-3 season at WVU and returned to Tallahassee, where he had been an assistant coach under Bill Peterson from 1963 to 1965, coaching the FSU wide receivers.

Within two years of his arrival, Bowden led the Seminoles to their first 10-win season and to their first bowl game in six years when his 1977 team went 10-2, including a Tangerine Bowl victory over Texas Tech. It was just a preview of things to come.

In Bowden's 18 seasons at Florida State, the Seminoles have won 10 or more games 10 times. FSU has been to 15 bowl games in his 18 years, including a string of 12 in a row and eight New Year's Day trips. Prior to his arrival, Florida State had been to just eight bowls in 29 years. His FSU win total of 166 is greater than the total of the school's previous seven head coaches combined.

Bowden's Florida State record heading into this season stood at 166-46-3. His teams have become nearly unbeatable at home with an 88-15-1 record, while earning the head coach "King of the Road" status with a 78-31-2 mark outside of Tallahassee.

Last season's 12-1 record and No. 1 final ranking tied Florida State with Miami as the only schools ever to post seven straight Top Four finishes. Over the past seven seasons, the Seminoles

have finished second (1987), third (1988 and '89), fourth (1990 and '91), second (1992) and first (1993).

Those 10-win seasons keep adding up, and Bowden's career victories now add up to 239. Only Bear Bryant, Amos Alonzo Stagg, Pop Warner and Joe Paterno are ahead of Bowden on that all-time win list. The Orange Bowl win over Nebraska pushed Bowden ahead of Woody Hayes. It's mighty select company.

Bowden grew up in the shadow of Legion Field and was an all-star quarterback at Birmingham's Woodlawn High. From there, he went to Alabama, fulfilling a lifelong dream to play for the Crimson Tide. But after one semester in Tuscaloosa, he returned to Birmingham to marry his childhood sweetheart, Ann Estock. He transferred to Howard College (now Samford University) in his hometown and became a little All-America signal-caller there in 1951.

After graduation in 1953, Bowden stayed at Howard as an assistant coach, serving in that capacity for two years before becoming head coach at South Georgia Junior College in Douglas, Ga. There, he compiled a 22-11 record and then returned to his alma mater as the head coach in 1959. He went 31-6 at Samford in four years, and dominated Alabama small-college football. Following his stint at FSU as an assistant coach, Bowden went to West Virginia as an assistant for three years and was subsequently promoted to the top job. He slipped on a patch of West Virginia ice following his Florida State interview, made the decision to come to Tallahassee and the rest, as they say, is Seminole legend.

Bowden is also the patriarch of the "first family of college coaching." He and son Terry, the head coach at Auburn University and last year's national Coach of the Year, are the first father-son duo to lead Division I-A programs, let alone coach them at the same time. Terry's brother, Tommy, is on his staff at Auburn, as is brother-in-law Jack Hines, who is married to Bobby and Ann's eldest daughter, Robyn. Youngest son Jeff joined the Florida State coaching staff in 1994 as the wide receivers coach. The rest of the Bowden clan includes Steve and Ginger.

Seminoles Defend Their National Title



Florida State's defensive front four averages 6-4 and 267 pounds.

Florida State began defense of its national title with a convincing 41-17 triumph over Virginia at Doak Campbell Stadium, overcoming a slug-

Florida State got on the board in the second quarter when Danny Kanell connected with Warrick Dunn for a 16yard scoring strike to cap a 71-yard, four-play, :23 drive.

From that point on it was all FSU as the Seminoles took a 20-3 halftime lead

into the locker room. Kanell finished the afternoon passing for four touchdowns, hitting on 32 of 48 for 330 yards.

Wide receiver Kez McCorvey snared a pair of TD passes en route to an 11-catch, 107-yard performance.

Conference game. For the first time since it joined the ACC, FSU found itself trailing at halftime. Down 20-17, Rock Preston put Florida State on top to stay with a 6-yard scoring run early in the third quarter.

That was all the cushion FSU needed as the defense completely shut down Maryland, limiting the Terrapins to just 52 yards total offense and three first downs in the second half. Clifton Abraham's fourth-quarter pick off of a Scott Milanovich pass was his second interception of the season in as many games.

Warrick Dunn and Zack Crockett each rushed for over 100 yards. Crockett exploded for 123 yards on 19 carries and a pair of touchdowns in one of the best rushing efforts from a fullback in school history. Melvin Pearsall's seven receptions, one touchdown and 90 yards receiving won him conference Rookie of the Week honors.

Danny Kanell directed the Seminoles to 731 yards of total offense. The junior quarterback connected on 28 of 44 attempts for 427 yards.

The Seminoles proved to be less than cordial guests at Groves Stadium, handing the Demon Deacons a 42point setback.

For the second consecutive week. the FSU defense shut down the opposition's running game as the Seminoles held Wake to 49 yards rushing. The Tribe used a balanced attack as eight different players scored touchdowns.

For the first time in his collegiate career Kez McCorvey did not play, snapping a string of 40 consecutive games. Despite the loss of McCorvey, FSU wideouts put up impressive numbers. Andre Cooper totaled 105 receiving yards on five receptions and E.G. Green snagged eight catches for 70

Florida State returned home to take on the 13th-ranked Tar Heels, with the victor taking the early inside track in the race for the 1994 ACC title.

Playing before a record home crowd of 78,111, the Seminoles jumped out to an early 7-0 lead. Danny Kanell's 5-yard touchdown pass to tight end Melvin Pearsall put FSU on the board.

On FSU's next possession James Hamilton stepped in front of a Kanell pass to give the Tar Heels the ball deep in FSU territory. Four plays later UNC running back Leon Johnson plunged in from the one to knot the score.

FSU took the lead for good in the first quarter, as wide receiver Andre Cooper outjumped a UNC defender for a 27-yard touchdown reception. Scott Bentley added a 37-yard field goal for a 17-7 advantage at the break.

Tailback Warrick Dunn turned in his second 100-yard plus game of the season with a 121-yard effort. Kez McCorvey returned to the lineup with a stellar five-reception, 83-yard, onetouchdown performance.

The University of Miami parlayed three errant Danny Kanell passes into 21 points to upend Florida State in front of 77,010 frenzied Orange Bowl

In their annual showdown the Hurricanes stayed alive in this year's national championship hunt while delivering a setback to the Seminoles. as both teams went to 4-1.


Florida State appeared poised to take control early after recovering a Miami fumble deep in Hurricane territory on the game's second play. But Malcolm Pearson picked off Kanell in the end zone, and nine plays and 80 yards later, Miami had a 7-0 advantage.

Seminole fans will forever remember Scott Bentley's 22-yard field goal with :21 remaining to give FSU an 18-16 Orange Bowl win over Nebraska and the school's first national championship.





SEMINOLE SEASON IN REVIEW



After spending the last two seasons as Charlie Ward's backup, Danny Kanell inherits Florida State's high-powered offense.

The turning point of the game came with FSU leading 14-7 early in the second quarter. After blocking a Mike Crissy punt for the second time in the half, FSU found itself with a first and 10 at the Miami 24. The momentum shifted two plays later when C.J. Richardson stepped in front of a Kanell pass intended for Warrick Dunn and returned it 58 yards to the Seminole 29 and six plays later the score was knotted at 14.

Miami scored again with :14 left in the half and would not trail again as they took a 21-14 lead. The Hurricanes delivered a knockout blow when Carlos Jones intercepted Kanell and went 16 yards for a touchdown and an insurmountable 31-17 Miami lead late in the third.

The Hurricanes derailed the FSU offense, limiting the Seminoles to a season-low 219 yards of total offense. Miami used a balanced attack, churning up 185 yards rushing and passing

for 178 in upping its home winning streak over Florida State to five straight.



The Florida State defense held Clemson in check to register its first shutout of the year in leading the Seminoles to a 17-0 blanking of the Tigers. In front of 75,902 Homecoming fans the FSU defense limited Clemson to just 149 yards total offense and gave up only four plays longer than 10 yards. With the win, Florida State tied the Atlantic Coast Conference record of 21 straight league victories established by Maryland during the period from 1973 to 1977.


Sophomore tailback Warrick Dunn enjoyed his second best rushing day at FSU with 133 yards on 17 carries.

Dunn scored both Seminole touchdowns with second-quarter scoring runs of 4 and 5 yards. He kept Florida State's first touchdown drive alive when on fourth-and-1 from the FSU 38 he swept around right end for a 24yard pickup.


The Seminole offense was effective, accumulating 393 yards of total offense, but had trouble scoring once it got into the red zone. FSU attempted four field goals of less than 35 yards but could only make one.

Danny Kanell completed 17 of 32 passes with one interception. Kanell failed to throw a touchdown pass for the second consecutive game and gave way to backup quarterback Jon Stark in the fourth quarter.

The Oct. 29 game versus Duke and the Nov. 5 game at Georgia Tech took place after presstime. ■

Lou Holtz embarks on his 25th season as a head coach at the collegiate level, the University of Notre Dame's football boss finds himself on the verge of establishing himself as one of the most successful college football coaches of all time.

Heading into the 1994 campaign, he needs only seven victories to reach the coveted 200 mark, something accomplished by only 13 head coaches in the history of college football and by only four other coaches currently active in the game.

When Holtz took over as Notre Dame's 27th head football coach in November 1985, he brought with him a well-proven reputation as a fixer of football programs following a series of spectacular repair jobs at William & Mary, North Carolina State, Arkansas and Minnesota.


Holtz proved he could take the Irish back to the ranks of college football's elite and keep them there on a consistent basis. Once he took Notre Dame to the 1988 title, he has kept the Irish near that

apex nearly every year, with his teams finishing sixth or better in the final AP poll in five of the last six seasons.

Holtz continually has told Irish fans he had no intention of coming to Notre Dame to earn comparisons with Hall of Fame coaches and national championship winners Knute Rockne, Frank Leahy, Dan Devine and Ara Parseghian. Yet the statistics he continues to produce make those comparisons inevitable.

Through eight seasons, Holtz already has chalked up 77 victories, more than the number accumulated by Parseghian (71), Rockne (67) or Leahy (65) in their first eight years on the job. Including the consensus national championship in 1988, a record 23game winning streak that ranks as the longest in Notre Dame history, a sparkling 64-9-1 (.872) record over the last six seasons and an overall 77-19-1 (.799) mark during those eight years his accomplishments nonetheless have positioned him alongside those Fighting Irish coaching legends.

Those 64 wins since 1988 represent the most ever in a six-year peri-



od at Notre Dame. The Irish triumph over Texas A&M in the 1994 Cotton Bowl marked the seventh straight vear Holtz had taken the Irish to one of the traditional Jan. 1 postseason bowls—the Cotton Bowl following the '87, '92 and '93 campaigns, the Fiesta in '88, the Orange in '89 and '90 and the Sugar in '91.
