## Game Preview

**B**obby Bowden stood at the podium this past August and prepared to address the sellout crowd packed into the Civic Center for the Kickoff Luncheon. Garnet and gold clad Seminole fans nearly had to sit on their hands to keep from breaking into an all out cheer as they had their first chance to see the new Seminoles and hear their coach talk about the new season.

The air was electric.

Florida State was coming off a national championship season that featured a Heisman Trophy winner, a defense that caused even the best offenses to cower and a tradition that some say give the Seminoles an edge before they ever snap the ball.

The gathered were ready to hang on every word. Ready to hear their coach's consoling words about the damage done by the summer's turmoil. Ready to hear their coach's thoughts about the new season.

But, as usual, Bobby Bowden chose to speak more to his players seated in front of him than at the crowd. And in the speech he quietly centered on what would

determine the Seminoles future. "Our season will be determined by the leadership," he said. "Do we have the players on this team to lead us to another ACC championship, another New Year's Day Bowl, another national title? We will not do very well unless we do."

Well, Florida State takes on Florida today on national television with a third straight ACC title already under its belt, a New Year's Day Bowl bid just a formality, and with a win today an outside chance at another national title.

Chalk it up to leadership.

Some have led with incredible statistics. Kez McCorvey will leave Florida State as the second most successful receiver ever. Derrick Brooks will probably become FSU's fourth two-time All-American. Clifton Abraham took over as FSU's next All-American at cornerback. Patrick McNeil and James Roberson have been rock solid on the offensive and defensive line, respectively.

Some have led by being willing to wait their turn and play a role to make FSU

successful. Eric Smith has been invaluable at outside linebacker. Dulack Guerrier is a reserve who can turn a game around at defensive end. Zack Crockett waited behind William Floyd at fullback and has emerged as one of FSU's best ever. 'Omar Ellison did not emerge until this, his senior year as an offensive threat. Kendrick Scott and Melvin Holland have contributed on special teams.

And perhaps the best teachers on the team were the five guys who may have suffered the most difficult path. Billy Glenn's knee injury was described by an FSU team doctor as one of the two worst in his 20 years with the team. While their teammates were winning a national championship, defensive backs Corey Fuller and Steve Gilmer worked tirelessly to rehabilitate injured knees, and although Gilmer reinjured the knee this year, both were in the starting lineup this season. And Tiger McMillon's knee cap ended up in his thigh last year during practice, but the senior bounced back for a fine senior year.

Perhaps no senior's contribution this year was more surprising than Dan Mowrey, who instead of allowing wide right to defeat him, became one of the team's more vocal leaders and got his kicking job back during his final year.

These seniors have won 32 games and lost just seven over the five years that most of them have been at Florida State. They have led their team to a finish among the Associated Press' top four in each of those years and have established Florida State as one of the finest college football programs in history.

While the season still has two major hurdles to go, Coach Bowden's question of leadership appears to have been answered by a group of young men we all should be proud of.



## Athletic Department Spotlight

**F**lorida State University athletics soared to new heights during the 1993-94 season, continuing to earn the distinction as one of the nation's top athletic programs. Both on the playing field and in the classroom, Florida State athletes established a mark of excellence.

FSU ushered in 1994 with its first-ever national championship in football. Quarterback Charlie Ward brought a Heisman Trophy, along with literally every other trophy, to Tallahassee when he was recognized as college football's most outstanding performer for the '93 season.

As a program, Florida State qualified nine teams for NCAA post-season competition. The volleyball team made history by advancing to the second round of the national championship tournament for the first time in eight NCAA appearances. The women's tennis team culminated a historic season by qualifying for the NCAA Tournament for the first time ever.

The baseball Seminoles advanced to the College World Series for the 13th time. Both the men's and women's golf teams placed high enough in NCAA Regionals to earn automatic berths into their respective national championship tournaments. For the ninth straight year, the Lady Seminole softball team qualified for NCAA Regional play. Men's tennis advanced to the opening round of the NCAA Regionals, while track took 15 athletes to the NCAA Outdoor Championship and six to the Indoor.

Individually, Florida State athletes

athletes maintained a grade point average of 3.0 or higher for both the fall and spring semesters.

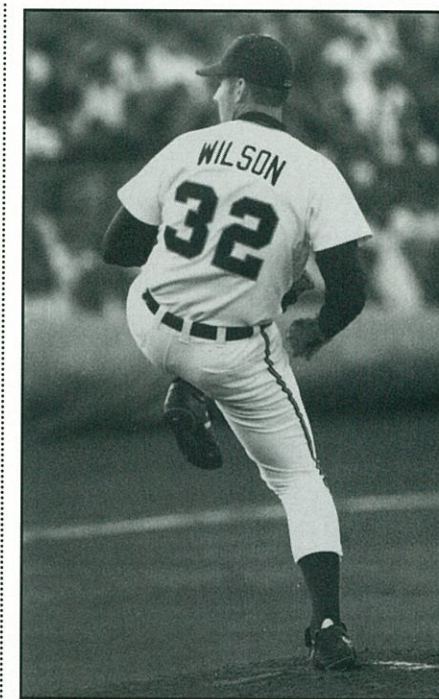
Student-athlete standouts Kristy Derlak and Ken Alexander were ACC Post Graduate Scholarship recipients.

Florida State's first-ever Heisman Trophy winner Charlie Ward set 17 single-season and career records and along the way was named the Atlantic Coast Conference Player of the Year for the second straight season.

Florida State's women's tennis team made a clean sweep of the ACC Most Valuable Player awards when two-time All-American Audra Brannon was named Player of the Year and Lori Sowell was selected Rookie of the Year.

Seminole pitching ace Paul Wilson put his name in the national headlines when the New York Mets made him the No. 1 selection in Major League Baseball's draft of amateur players.

Florida State produced 19 first-team All-Americans in 1993-94. Ward and Derrick Brooks were named consensus All-Americans, while teammates Corey Sawyer and Derrick Alexander garnered first-team honors. Other first team All-Americans included Wilson (baseball), Bobby Cochran (golf), Brannon (tennis), Bob Sura (basketball), Lew Anelo, Kevin Ansley, John Rothell, Jonathan Carter, Marcus Dixon, Kelsy Nash, Phillip Riley, Sheryl Covington, Sophia Danvers, Radhiya Teagle and Erica Shepard (track).

Tallahassee will get a dose of "March Madness" when Florida State hosts the first and second rounds of the 1995 NCAA Basketball Championship Tournament at the home court of the basketball Seminoles, the Tallahassee/Leon County Civic Center, in mid-March.

For the 11th time in 12 years, Dick Howser Stadium was selected to host NCAA Regional baseball action this past spring. During the year, the Atlantic Coast Conference parted with tradition when it held the conference swimming and diving championship meet at Florida State's Bobby E. Leach Center, marking the first time in eight years that the meet was held outside of North Carolina. And for the second straight year Florida State also played host to the ACC's softball championship tournament.

With Florida State's commitment to winning and dedication to serving the needs of its student-athletes both academically and athletically, Florida State University athletics has secured its place among the nation's elite.

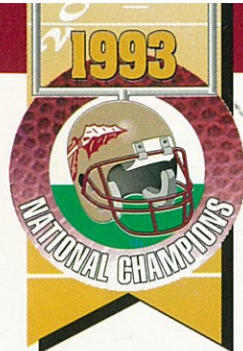

**D**errick Brooks came to Florida State with the highest of expectations, and why not?

He concluded his senior year at Pensacola's Washington High School as *USA Today's* Defensive Player of the Year, a first-team All-American selection by every major publication in America, and Dial's Scholar-Athlete of the Year. All Derrick Brooks has done the last four years is push his expectations to another level.

A consensus All-American, Academic All-American and Lombardi Award finalist the last two years, Brooks has not let up since his first day on the FSU campus. Unlike a lot of players who come into college with the advance billing of a new Madonna video and cannot live up to the hype, Brooks decided he was going to be different. 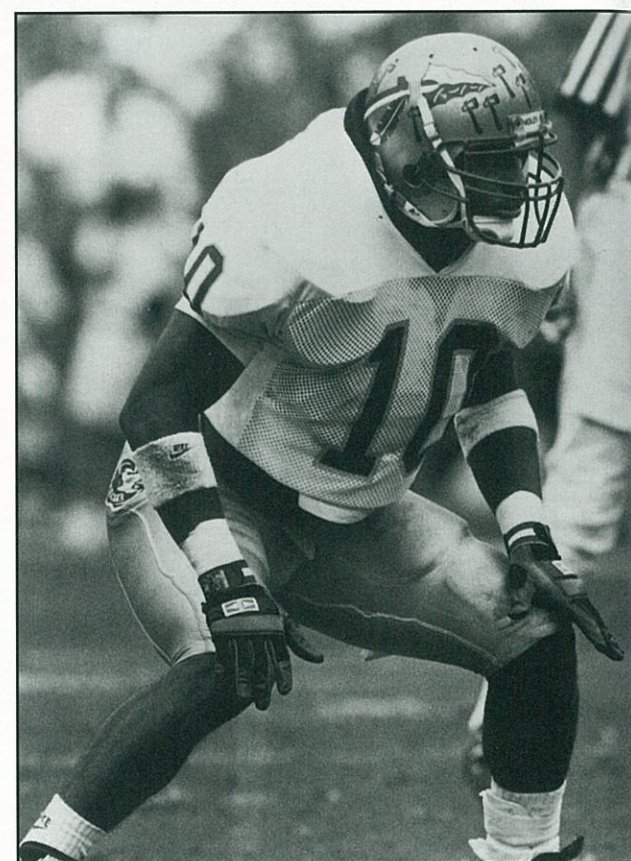
Derrick can remember when it wasn't always that way. "My parents came to see the first home game of my freshman year. I didn't play one single down in that football game, but after the game my parents were telling me how proud they were of me. I didn't play one single down! I made a commitment that day that I was going to do something to make my parents really proud of me."

Making the decision to come to Florida State allowed Derrick the opportunity to grow and mature during his four years in Tallahassee. "When I came here, I was a teenager," said Brooks. "I feel I'm leaving FSU a mature young man. I've made

lifetime friends, I've traveled around the country, and I've received a great education. This University has been good to me and at the same time I've given myself back to the University."

Rarely does a college football player project the maturity that Brooks possesses. Yet maturity is the reason he did not enter the NFL draft last year. He talked to several current NFL players who elected to leave school early, and he says that they all told him it was a big adjustment. "I feel that if I'm meant to be in professional football, whether it be in three years, in five years, or tomorrow, I'll be there. I just want to be ready for that type of living both mentally and physically."

The tenacious 6-1, 227-pound outside linebacker has once again put himself among the nation's elite both academically and athletically. He has received an \$18,000 post-graduate scholarship and



the expectations cannot increase any further, Derrick attains them and pushes the standards even higher.

"My top priority as a football player is to win another national championship," said Brooks. "But I will admit that the personal awards are very important to me. I am not promised tomorrow, so I play each and every down, live each and every day like it is my last."

"I thank God for the opportunity to be in college. He has given me the opportunity, and now it is up to me to make the most of it."

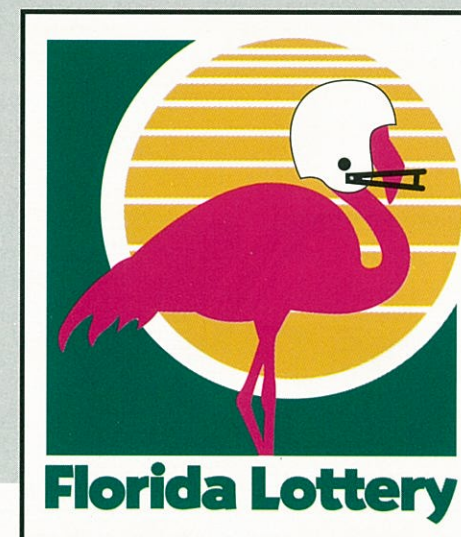

When Derrick Brooks made the final cut for this year's Lombardi Trophy, it marked the fourth consecutive year a Seminole has been a finalist.

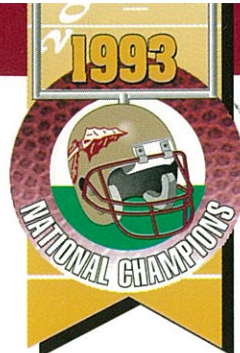

## Player Profile

Perhaps no one exemplifies his name more appropriately than Tiger McMillon.

Since signing with Florida State as an All-American out of Kissimmee's St. Cloud High School in 1990, McMillon has embarked on a most memorable collegiate career. "It was a roller coaster ride that wasn't a complete finish," comments McMillon. "I feel it was a good enough attraction to ride on, but I can't help to think there's more."

The fact that McMillon is playing football is a tribute to his tenacity and work ethic. The fifth-year senior was voted the team's Most Outstanding Offensive Player following 1993 spring drills and was slated as the Seminoles' number one tailback heading into last season. All that and more changed one fateful afternoon out on the practice field when, attempting to jump for an overthrown pass, McMillon injured the patellar tendon in his right knee.

Suddenly the tendon that held his kneecap in place tore and McMillon's football career appeared over. The injury was so uncommon that none of its kind could be found on record.

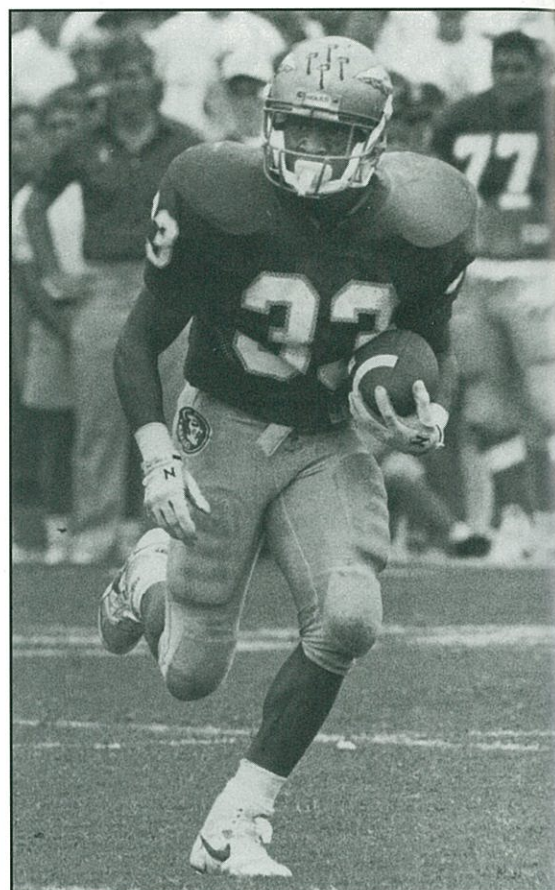
ish what you start."

While some wondered if a comeback from such a severe injury was possible, those close to McMillon had few doubts.

Running backs coach Billy Sexton sings McMillon's praises. "Knowing him, I knew he would do it. He's always been such a hard worker. He shows that kind of tenacity in his schoolwork and everything else he does in life."

Strength coach Dave Van Halanger has witnessed McMillon's work ethic in the weight room. "He worked unbelievably hard and had to fight through pain everyday. A conventional ligament tear is hopscotch compared to a patellar tendon. There were days when he was literally in tears."

McMillon's injury occurred during the same week free safety Steve Gilmer and corner-back Corey Fuller also suffered severe knee injuries forcing the well-publicized trio to miss Florida State's national championship



tremely hard on all of us, but we were there for each other. I will never forget those guys."

Tiger McMillon was the Seminoles' leading rusher in 1992.

This season has been an adjustment for McMillon. After leading the team in rushing in 1992 with 579 yards, he now plays in the shadows of teammates War-rick Dunn and Rock Preston, occasionally seeing action as a slot receiver when the Seminoles go to their four-receiver set.

As a freshman, McMillon was clocked in the 40-yard dash in 4.35. He has lost little, if any, of that speed since his injury. It's because of his speed that McMillon is hopeful that he can play at the professional level.

"I know they will have to take my knee into consideration," says McMillon. "Personally, I feel I should at least get a chance. I know my knee is fine. I've been tested and have held up fine."

Tiger McMillon's most important test during his career has been the test of his heart. He has passed it with flying colors.

So rare was the injury that in order to gauge McMillon's rehabilitation, FSU's sports medicine staff surveyed college and pro teams from around the country, but could find no historical data. To many, McMillon is a pioneer in the field of sports medicine.

"At first I was really scared because no one had ever seen an injury like that," said McMillon, who worked out four hours a day attempting to return. "I never thought I'd run again, much less play again. There were times when I wanted to quit for that day, but my parents told me to always fin-

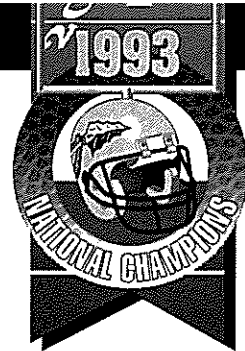

At first look, Patrick McNeil appears as a 6-3, 280-pound iron man. But under his "hard"

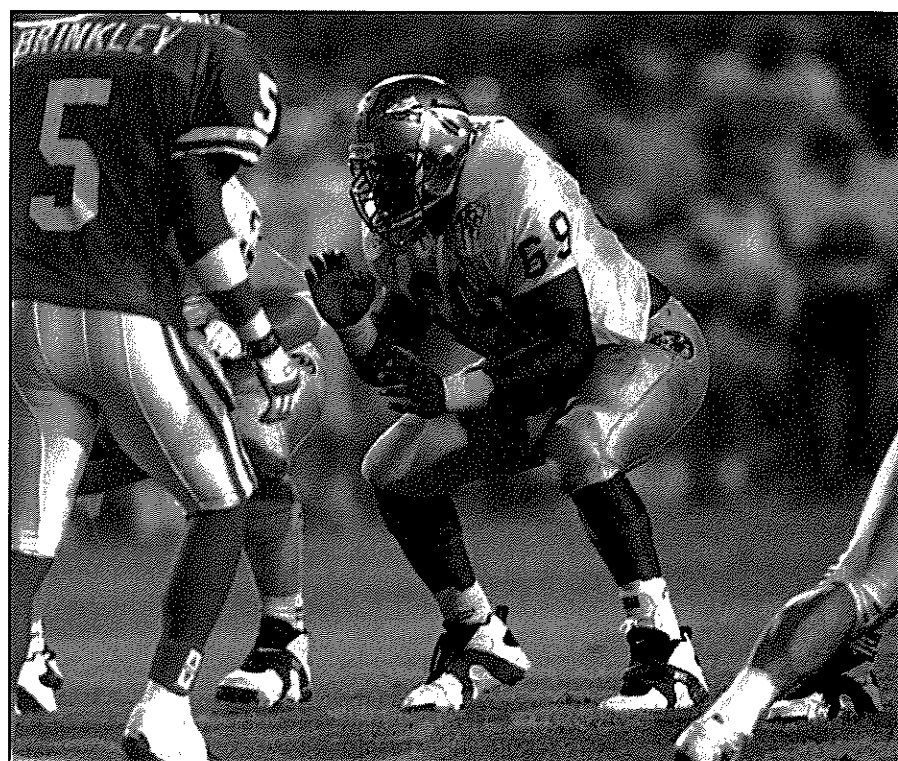
looking shell is a gentle, soft spoken individual. McNeil is a fifth-year senior out of Bradenton Manatee High in Palmetto, Fla. He has been a starter along FSU's offensive line for the past three seasons.

He capped his junior campaign by being named to the All-ACC second team, as well as being tabbed third-team All-American by *Football News*. McNeil's philosophy is simple. "I just try to go out each game and improve on the one before. If I concentrate on improving my technique each time that I am on the field, I know that our team will be tough to beat."

Florida State was forced to begin the 1994 season without the services of its only senior offensive lineman as McNeil missed the first four games.

"It wasn't easy sitting out those four games," McNeil said. "But I just had to keep myself focused on what I had to do, and especially work that much harder in practice to show the coaches that I hadn't lost any of my intensity."

Head Coach Bobby Bowden was impressed by McNeil's work ethic during that four-week period. "Patrick showed a lot of character," commented



one on the team seems like they are one big family," he adds. "We all get along really well off the field, and this helps us come together as a unit when we are on the field."

Roommate James Roberson notes that McNeil's off-field personality does not really portray the person that steps on the field. "Off the field, Patrick is quiet and usually doesn't say too much," Roberson explains.

McNeil is hard-pressed to explain his game day metamorphosis. "When I am on the field, I try to concentrate on my

McNeil says his most gratifying moment as a Seminole was at last season's National Championship game at Miami's Orange Bowl. "It was just a terrific experience for the whole team. It made all of the hard work for those past eight months pay off." He also would like nothing more than to be able to experience that same feeling again. "Anything is possible, we just have to take care of our own business and then see what happens."

McNeil has asserted himself as a leader along the line. "I am just going to try to lead by example, and if the younger guys see me working hard and pushing myself, then hopefully they'll respond by putting in a 100 percent effort on every play."

His dedication and effort has not gone unnoticed. Projected to be selected in this April's NFL draft, McNeil should enjoy a successful career playing Sundays at the next level.

## Spotlight on Philanthropy

**W**orking hard and saving are secrets to success, according to Pearl Tyner of the

west Florida panhandle community of Laurel Hill. Miss Tyner steadfastly maintains these secrets are the reasons she has been able to make a gift of \$500,000 toward the construction of academic space in the University Center at FSU. "That was hard work," she says of the ranching experience, "but I enjoy work! It isn't really work if a person truly enjoys what she's doing. That's one of

learned to paint, she plants and tends vegetable and flower gardens, and she operates her tractor and all of the farm equipment.

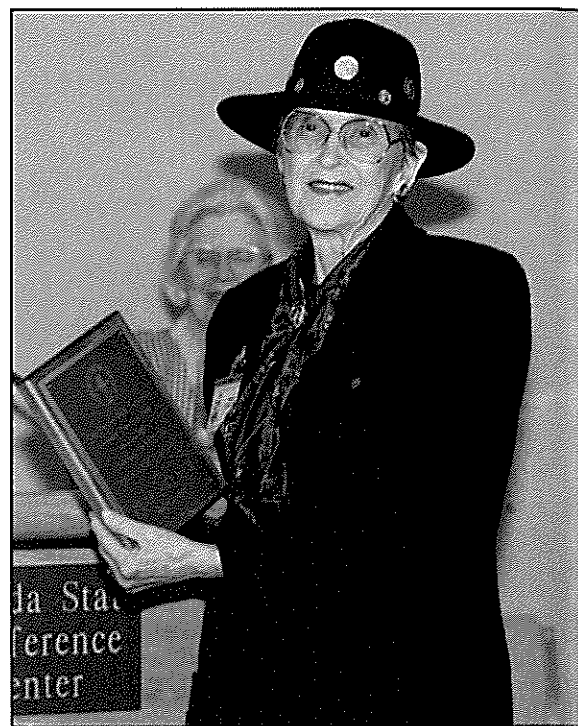
