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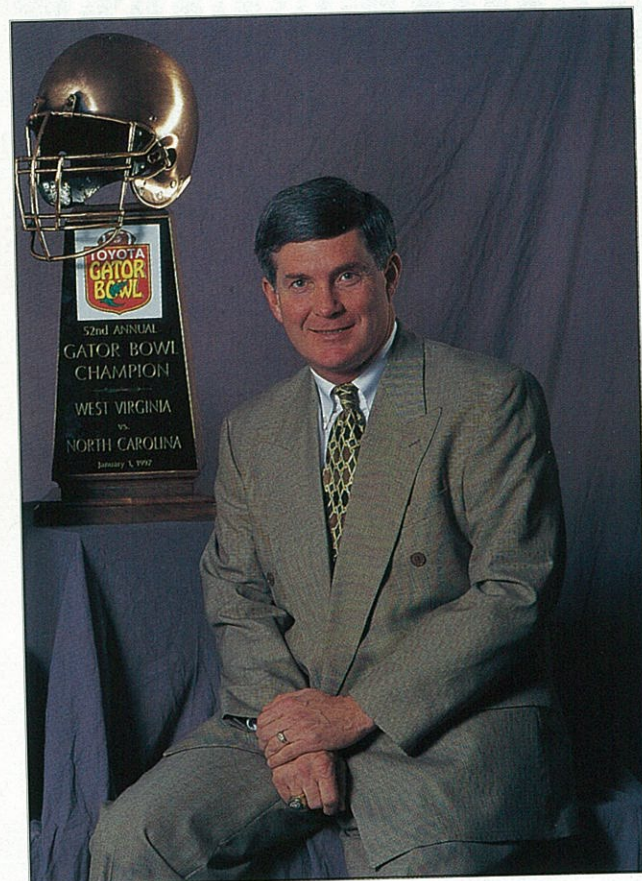

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FSU-UNC: Battle Of Unbeatens

TONIGHT'S GAME: Fifth-ranked and undefeated North Carolina plays host to Florida State, ranked second and third in the country in the respective coaches and media polls, tonight at Kenan Stadium at 7:30 p.m. The game will be televised nationally by ESPN with announcers Ron Franklin and Mike Gottfried. This is the third consecutive national telecast for the Tar Heels and the fifth time in nine games UNC has been featured on either ESPN or ESPN 2.

HIGHEST ACC RANKINGS EVER: The North Carolina-Florida State game will be the first football game in Atlantic Coast Conference history in which both teams are ranked in the top five in the nation in the Associated Press poll.

In fact, this is just the second time ever both teams will be ranked in the AP Top 10. Carolina also participated in the only other Top 10 matchup. That game was played on Nov. 7, 1981, in Kenan Stadium. Second-ranked Clemson edged No. 8 UNC, 10-8, en route to winning the national championship.

Carolina last played against a team ranked in the AP Top 10 in 1996 when it lost at No. 2 Florida State, 13-0. The Tar Heels' last win over a Top 10 foe was a 27-10 win at No. 9 Syracuse in 1996.

The highest-ranked opponent that Carolina has defeated in history was ranked No. 6 in the AP poll.

The Tar Heels beat No. 6 Navy, 13-7, in 1957, and No. 6 Duke, 7-6, in 1960. Both games were played in Chapel Hill.

Carolina is 10-7 in its last 17 games against teams ranked in the AP Top 25 dating back to 1992. Four of those seven losses were in games against Florida State.

This is the 19th time an opponent has come to Chapel Hill ranked in the AP Top 10. The last time a Top 10 opponent came to UNC was in 1995 when No. 6 Florida State beat the Tar Heels in the rain, 28-12. Carolina's last home win over a Top 10 team was earlier that same year when the Tar Heels defeated No. 9 Virginia, 22-17.

FLORIDA STATE SERIES: The Seminoles lead the series, 7-0-1. That includes a 5-0 record since FSU joined the ACC in 1992. This is the fourth meeting in Chapel Hill. Florida State has won in Chapel Hill in 1985 (20-10), 1993 (33-7) and 1995 (28-12).

Last year in Tallahassee, the Seminoles scored two field goals after blocked punts and a touchdown after a UNC fumble deep in its own territory to record a 13-0 win over the Tar Heels. FSU went into the contest ranked No. 2 and the Tar Heels were No. 11. Carolina had six more first downs than FSU, but allowed eight sacks.

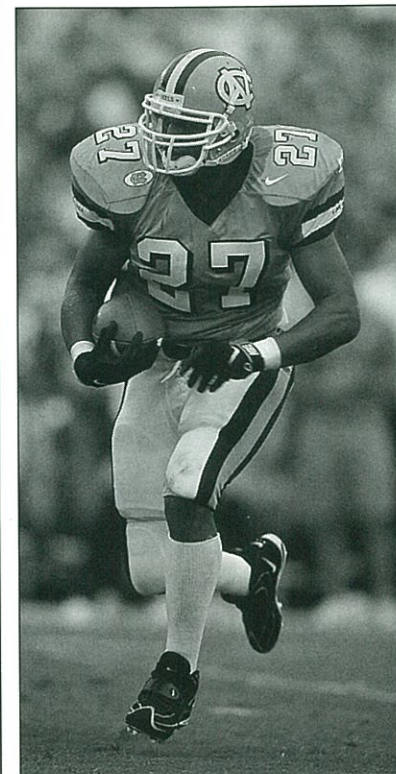
Other notes from last year's game:

- Carolina did not allow a first down by FSU until the 8:56 mark of the second quarter.
- Carolina did not allow a second first down until Warrick Dunn's 11-yard touchdown run with 2:45 to play in the first half.
- Carolina gave up 213 yards total offense, the lowest by a FSU team since it had 173 yards against Nebraska in 1986.
- FSU did not go over the 200-yard mark in total offense until a 20-yard run with less than a minute to play.
- Carolina allowed just nine completions in 17 attempts for 65 yards, the lowest passing output by a FSU team since it threw for 56 yards against Memphis in 1984.
- Carolina yielded just 13 points, the lowest by a Seminole team since FSU beat Virginia, 13-3 in Charlottesville, Va., in 1992.
- The 13 points are the fewest scored by the Seminoles in Doak Campbell Stadium since a 17-13 loss to Florida in 1987.
- Carolina forced the Seminoles to punt after just three plays on

nine of Florida State's 16 possessions.

- Carolina picked off two passes, both by cornerback Dre' Bly, and forced a fumble after a sack.

- Carolina stopped the Seminoles on third down 11 times in 12 opportunities (the only third-down conversion for the 'Noles came on a 15-yard run by Dunn on 3rd-and-13 in the third quarter; four plays later Greg Ellis stripped quarterback Thad Busby of the ball and linebacker Keith Newman recovered for the Tar Heels).



Jonathan Linton became the first tailback in UNC history to surpass 100 yards rushing and receiving in a single game.

COMPLETE REVERSAL: Mack Brown has led Carolina football to a 21-2 record in the last 23 games. That's more than a complete turnaround from his first two years at UNC when the Tar Heels won just two of 22 games in 1988 and 1989. That 21-2 mark, which covers the final three games of the 1995 season, the entire 1996 season and the first eight games this year, equals the best mark in the nation over that number of games.

The Tar Heels won their last three games in 1995, went 10-2 a year ago and are 8-0 this season. Carolina, Florida State, Nebraska and Penn State are all 21-2 in their last 23 games. Tennessee is 20-3 in its last 23 games. Other notable teams in or near the Top

10: Florida 19-4, LSU 19-4, Ohio State 19-4, Virginia Tech 19-4, Washington 18-5, Kansas State 18-5, Michigan 17-6, Auburn 16-7, UCLA 13-10 and Georgia 13-10.

10 STRAIGHT: Carolina has the second-longest active winning streak in the country behind Penn State. The Nittany Lions have won 12 games in a row, including seven straight this year.

The Tar Heels have won 10 consecutive games dating back to the last regular-season game in 1996. This is UNC's longest winning streak since it won 10 straight games in the last four games in 1980 and the first six games in 1981. The last time UNC won 11 straight games was in 1947-48 when the Charlie Justice-led teams won their final seven games in 1947 and the first six games in 1948.

The 8-0 start is Carolina's best since it began 8-0 in 1914. UNC ended that year 10-1 with its only loss coming in the season finale against Virginia. The last time UNC won its first five ACC games was in 1980 when Carolina won all seven league games en route to its most recent ACC title.

LOTS OF NO GAINS: Carolina's defense has held the opposi-

tion to no gain or negative yards on 50.4 percent of the offensive plays. The eight opponents have run 507 offensive plays and gained zero or minus yards 256 times. That includes 122 incomplete passes, 96 tackles for losses, 31 tackles on runs or completed passes for no gain and seven interceptions.

DEFENSE AMONG NATION'S BEST: North Carolina and Michigan are the only schools to be ranked in the top five in the nation in all four major defensive categories. Carolina is second in the country in total yards allowed per game, third in pass defense, third in run defense and fifth in points allowed per game.

This is the second consecutive year the defense has been second in the country in total yards allowed per game. Last year, West Virginia was first at 217.5 yards per game and the Tar Heels were next at 225.6. In 1997, Carolina is allowing 206.0 yards a game. Michigan is first in the nation at 202.5 yards per contest.

FOOTBALL NEWS NAMES BROWN SEMIFINALIST AGAIN: Carolina head coach Mack Brown, a finalist for Football News Coach of the Year Award in 1996, has been named one of 10 finalists for the 1997 award. Brown has led Carolina to an 8-0 record and a No. 5 national ranking this season.

ELLIS AND SIMMONS SEMIFINALISTS FOR PLAYER OF THE YEAR: Defensive end Greg Ellis and outside linebacker Brian Simmons, two of the senior standouts on Carolina's defense, are among the 15 semifinalists for Football News' National Defensive

Player of the Year Award. Ellis leads the team with 14 tackles for losses and six quarterback sacks. Simmons leads the squad with five fumbles caused and is second on the team with 81 tackles, including 11 for losses and three sacks.

ELLIS MAKING LOMBARDI PUSH: Senior defensive end Greg Ellis added another quarterback sack in Carolina's 16-13 win at Georgia Tech. Ellis has 29.5 career sacks, a UNC record, including six this season. He leads the No. 2 rated defense with 14 tackles for losses of 63 yards. In his brilliant career, Ellis has dropped the opposition behind the line of scrimmage 46 times for 277 yards in losses.

He had a two-sack (for 14 yards) game at N.C. State and added a third tackle for a 3-yard loss. The three-yard loss was one of the biggest plays in the game. He dropped State receiver Torry Holt for a loss on a flanker reverse. That came on the Wolfpack's first play after a UNC fumbled punt gave State the ball at the Carolina 32 early in the fourth quarter and UNC holding just a 10-7 lead.

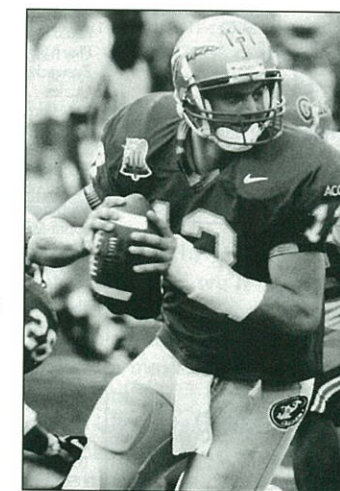
The Wendell, N.C., native is a semifinalist for the Lombardi Award, given to the nation's top lineman.

Head Coach Mack Brown

The University of North Carolina football program entered the 1997 season ranked among the Top 10 in the nation, and head coach Mack Brown is one of the main reasons the Tar Heel program's fortunes continue to soar toward the top.

Brown is a man of many talents. Father, husband, coach, mentor, counselor and leader of a football program that is beginning to be considered among the country's premier institutions. If you ask Brown, however, what he considers to be his greatest mission in Chapel Hill, he will likely say educator. The Tar Heel players will attest to that. Brown instructs them in the finer points of playing football, is a proponent of higher education and a teacher of life's challenges. For if one thing can be said about Carolina football players under Mack Brown, it can be said they have developed into a group of young men who continue to make Coach and University very proud.



Under Brown's direction the Tar Heel football program has returned to the Top 10. Carolina has posted winning records in seven consecutive seasons, tying the longest streak in modern Tar Heel football history, and UNC is the 12th winningest program in the country over the last five years. *Lindy's* magazine named Brown its preseason National Coach of the Year in 1997.

"Mack Brown is a coach with his priorities in order," says UNC Chancellor Michael Hooker. "First and foremost, he is committed to making sure his players succeed academically. He recognizes that student-athletes are students first and that they are at Carolina for an education which will prepare them for the future. Of course he also wants them to win on Saturday afternoon, and I applaud his unstinting commitment to making his team the best it can be."

"This kind of integrity is obvious throughout the Tar Heel football program under Coach Brown. He has clearly shown that an academically sound team also can be a winning team, as demonstrated by our 1997 Gator Bowl championship. Mack is a class act

through and through. He is as much a team leader off the field as on it, coaching his players in the all-important game of life."

Brown instituted changes in staff and philosophy on both sides of the ball prior to the 1996 season, and the rewards were quite evident. Last year Carolina's defense led the nation in points allowed, was second in the country in total defense and third in stopping both the run and the pass. Offensively, the Tar Heels established school records for passing touchdowns while still having a runner rush for more than 900 yards and 10 touchdowns.

The Tar Heels defeated No. 25 West Virginia, 20-13, in the Toyota Gator Bowl on New Year's Day, the third time in five years Carolina has won in the postseason. UNC finished tied for second place in the ACC and won on the road at both Syracuse and Houston.

Carolina scored school-record totals against a pair of arch-rivals (52 points against N.C. State and 45 against Clemson), swept its in-state ACC opponents for the fourth straight season and transformed an I-back offense into a balanced pro-style set that featured the school's first all-conference quarterback in 22 years and a record four receivers with 30 or more catches.

Brown was at the helm as several Tar Heels set school records and were among ACC and national leaders. UNC led the ACC in passing offense and pass defense and improved from 105th in the country to first in the nation in turnover margin.

"Throughout my 27 years of coaching at the college level, Mack was clearly the most talented offensive coach that I was associated with," says Barry Switzer, who won three national championships at Oklahoma and a Super Bowl crown with the Dallas Cowboys. "You could tell

early on that he had the complete package and that he was going to be a very successful head coach. What he has accomplished at North Carolina has come as no surprise to me."

Five Tar Heels were selected in the first five rounds of the 1997 NFL Draft and several more signed free-agent contracts.

Carolina also received honorable mention accolades from the College Football Association for outstanding graduation rates last year. UNC and Florida State are the only two schools which finished in the National Top 10 last year in the final Associated Press and CNN/USA Today polls to receive the CFA award.

"As much pride as we take in receiving awards for our actions on the field, we gain an even greater sense of accomplishment and pride when our student-athletes receive their degree," says Brown. "That is the true mission of the University and the reason we are able to attract such quality young men to play football here at Carolina. The opportunities a college degree affords them are limitless, and the feeling we as a football staff have to see them earn that

degree is one of respect and pride.

"To be one of just two programs to receive the award and finish in the Top 10 in the country is an indication where this program is going," said Brown. "We want to be a total program, and this is just another indication of reaching that goal."

Brown's players graduate, they represent the University in a first-class manner and they stay out of trouble. Why? The head coach demands it be just that way. Brown has built a program which has won 57 games in the last seven years and graduated at least 70 percent of its players all but once in the last nine years. Several players who are just credits shy of a Carolina degree are playing in the NFL, where the minimum salary is more than \$130,000.

"I want to to thank Coach Brown for giving a 210-pound linebacker a chance to start at linebacker," says Dwight Hollier, now in his sixth season with the Miami Dolphins and the leading tackler in Carolina history. "I give him a lot of credit for bringing in the coaching staff and players that were needed

to turn the program around. No matter how tough it got those first two years, he managed to stay positive and kept us working hard during that whole time. It was that attitude that also helped to turn the program around."

In fact, Carolina had the fourth-most alumni in the NFL last fall with 34 players and 27 of them played at UNC for Brown. But it is more than on-field coaching which has made Brown one of the most personable, approachable and appreciative head coaches in the game.

It is the understanding that Brown has for the commitment his staff and players demonstrate for the game of football; it is the ability to communicate with fans, media, alumni, faculty and most importantly, his players and staff; it is his desire to see his players get the most out of their collegiate experience, on the field, in the classroom and amidst the social climate of one of the top collegiate



environments in the country; it is the manner in which Brown can be both a disciplinarian and counselor to more than 100 young adults; it is the intensity with which Brown competes; it is the excitement and enthusiasm with which he celebrates success; and it is even the passion and compassion with which he deals with defeat.

The changes evident in Carolina's offensive and defensive schemes the last two years are part of a larger approach of recruiting the best players in the country. Brown's move to a more balanced pro-set on offense and an aggressive, physical, speed-based defense is simple to understand.

"Mack has unbelievable foresight, is highly intelligent and has outstanding character," says Gil Brandt, consultant to the NFL and longtime vice president of the Dallas Cowboys. "He has the uncanny ability to understand the larger picture - that is, the mix between football, academics, alumni and faculty relations, media obligations and the ability to make his players

understand that football is just a stepping stone to other great things in one's career."

"I never cease to be amazed by the new ideas and concepts he installs every year on and off the field to make his players better football players and better people. Mack reminds me so much of Coach (Tom) Landry in his ability to understand the entire picture and have a great plan for success."

Brown is in his 10th year in Chapel Hill, where he is tied for third place in alltime wins with Carl Snively, who coached the teams in the late 1940s led by Hall of Famers Charlie Justice and Art Weiner. Brown has a 59-45-1 record in his first nine years at Carolina and a 76-73-1 overall mark in 13 years as a college head coach.

The 1996 season proved to be one of the most successful and exciting ones in Carolina history. The Cookeville, Tenn., native led the Tar Heels to a spot in the national Top 10 and Carolina made a postseason bowl game appearance for the fifth straight year. For his efforts, Brown was named the Atlantic Coast Conference Coach of the Year. He was a finalist for the Bear Bryant National Coach of the Year Award selected by the Football Writers Association of America. Arizona State's Bruce Snyder, Florida's Steve Spurrier, Wyoming's Joe Tiller, Army's Bob Sutton and Ohio State's John Cooper joined Brown in a select group of award-finalists.

Brown, who is coaching college football players for the 26th year, is in his 14th season as a head coach. He stands third in tenure among active head coaches in the Atlantic Coast Conference behind only Florida State's Bobby Bowden and Virginia's George Welsh. Nationally only 12 men have been head coaches for a longer period at their current institutions. Carolina has in the last five years participated in the Peach Bowl in Atlanta, Disneyland Pigskin Classic in Anaheim, Calif., the Gator Bowl in Jacksonville, Fla., the Sun Bowl in El Paso, Texas, and the Carquest Bowl in Fort Lauderdale, Fla.

"Mack Brown is making a name for himself not only in the

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ACC, but nationally," says Grant Teaff, Executive Director of the American Football Coaches Association. "He is not only an outstanding coach and recruiter, he also is a leader in our profession."

In November 1996 then-Athletic Director John Swofford received approval from the Chancellor and the Board of Trustees to offer a two-year contract extension to Brown, which the coach signed to extend his deal at UNC through the year 2001.

"Mack has done a tremendous job of developing our football program into a nationally competitive one," said Swofford, who in April 1997 was selected the next commissioner of the ACC. "Under his leadership we have not only stability but also great momentum heading into the future. We are very pleased that Coach Brown has chosen to make that future right here at Carolina."

Brown has recruited and coached several of the most outstanding football players in Carolina history. He has helped to develop standout players like Marcus Jones, a consensus first-team All-America defensive tackle who also earned ACC Defensive Player-of-the-Year honors in 1995; Corey Holliday, the leading receiver in Tar Heel history, a CFA/Hitachi Scholar-Athlete and current member of the Pittsburgh Steelers; Hollier, who made over 500 tackles as a Tar Heel; Natrone Means, who rushed for 1,000-plus yards in each of his last two seasons as a Tar Heel and led the San Diego Chargers to Super Bowl XXIX and the Jacksonville Jaguars to the AFC title game last year; quarterbacks Jason Stanicek and Mike Thomas, who together rewrote Carolina's passing and total offense records; cornerback Thomas Smith, who came to UNC in 1989 as a walk-on from a small high school in North Carolina and departed as a first-round draft pick of the AFC champion Buffalo Bills; and tailback Leon Johnson, one of the premier all-purpose offensive threats in ACC history.

"When I first came here we were just trying to establish that we could win games," says Holliday, who caught two passes for the Steelers in Super Bowl XXX. "Now when you hear people talking about Carolina, they are also talking about them with the Florida States and Nebraskas and with winning national championships. The caliber athlete coming here now is different, too. One or two players used to go to the NFL when I was here and now it's more like one or two are going in the first two rounds and five or six are going to the pros. We've definitely taken the next step toward being one of the great programs."

Many observers credit Brown's affable qualities and outgoing personality as the key to his success. While those observations are on the mark, what often gets overlooked is Brown's careful attention to detail and game strategy. These personal traits are aided by his hiring an experienced and talented staff. Seven of Brown's nine current assistant coaches have been head coaches, including four at the Division I college level.

"I love coaching at the University of North Carolina because of the friendships I have developed over the years, in addition to the type of young people, coaches and staff members this school attracts," says Brown. "They are people that have class, are intelligent, understand they want ultimate success on the field, but not at the cost of ethical standards or class. That's the type program in

which I have always felt like I needed to be. As I get older I know that's the type program I really feel most comfortable with and enjoy every day."

Carolina's 44 wins over the past five years mark the second-highest total in the ACC behind Florida State. The Seminoles have won 54 games in that span. Virginia is third with 39. Carolina, FSU and Virginia are the only schools in the ACC to compile a winning record in each of the last seven seasons. The 44 wins are more than 100 other Division I schools, including Notre Dame, Michigan, Washington, Syracuse, Auburn, USC, UCLA, Georgia and Oklahoma.

The Tar Heels have made steady progress in the polls, as well. In 1992, the first of five straight seasons with bowl appearances, Carolina was 18th in the final A.P. poll and 19th in the USA Today/CNN coaches poll. The Tar Heels finished 19th and 21st in the 1993 rankings and 21st in the coaches' poll in 1994. Last year Carolina was sixth in the country in the Associated Press poll in late October and finished the year ranked No. 10 by both the writers and coaches.

"Tradition has always been important in football, but people also have to recognize change," says Brown. "Right now some of the old names, the traditional old names in college football are not the same people they were 20 years ago. We feel like North Carolina is one of the new names, the new kids on the block. It's a school we want young guys to come to because hopefully we will be one of the programs they are talking about 20 years from now instead of one of the upcoming programs."

"We want to be in a position to challenge for the conference championship and go to a bowl game every year. There's no reason we can't do that, given all the things we have going for us here - a tradition of excellence in athletics, one of the best academic institutions in the nation and with the stadium renovations beginning immediately, our football facility will be among the finest in the nation."

Outgoing and personable, one of Brown's greatest strengths may simply be his integrity. When he says something, people know he means it.

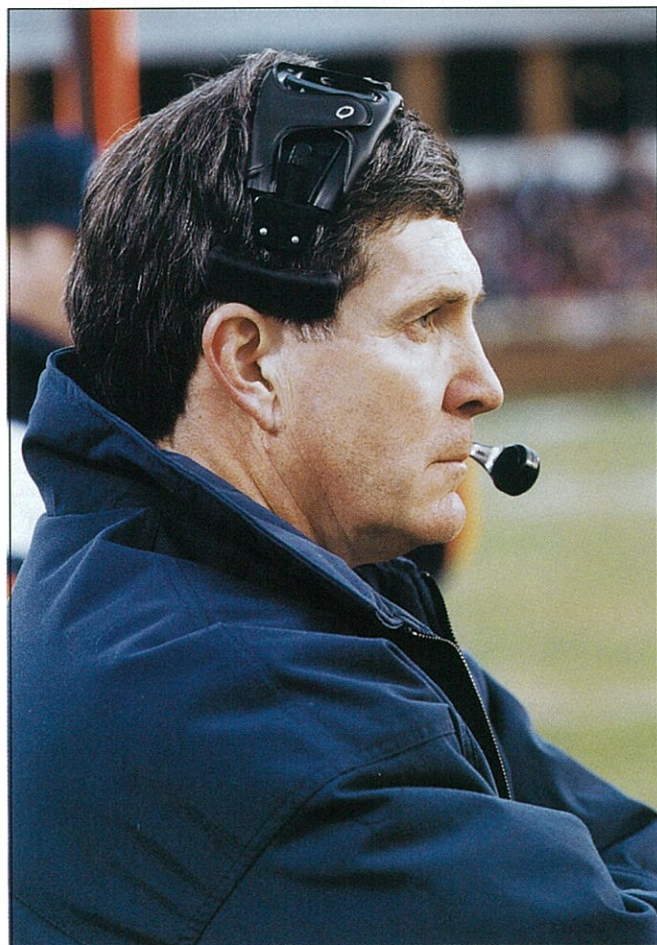
"Coach Brown is a combination of all the things that go into a good head coach," says Holliday, who played for Brown from 1989-93 and was a member of the CFA Hitachi National Scholar-Athlete Team. "He is a solid coach on the field, a father figure who instills discipline, a career counselor and a friend. The thing that impressed me more than anything else was our first meeting at Carolina as freshmen when he made us stand up, introduce ourselves to each other and say what we wanted to major in. He didn't ask us what position we wanted to play or anything like that. He made us know right from day one that academics were the reason we were here in the first place."

That's one reason he's done such an outstanding job as a recruiter. He's honest and forthright in his dealings with his players. He has a good understanding of today's young people, can relate to them and their problems and stresses the importance of academics and a college degree. The incoming class of freshmen in the fall of 1997 has the highest collective board scores and high school academic standing of any class in Brown's 10 years in Chapel Hill. Super-

Prep magazine editor Allen Wallace said after National Letter of Intent signing day this year, "We are no longer surprised when North Carolina beats out Notre Dame for a player."

When he came to Chapel Hill, one of his first goals was to reestablish solid relationships with the state's high school coaches. He and his staff have done just that and UNC's football program is once again the dominant factor in the state. Even though Carolina has recruited top players from across the nation, more than half the roster is comprised of young men from the Tar Heel State.

Additionally, he has made a special effort to have former play-



ers feel welcome when they return to campus. A spring lettermen's outing has become a huge success, attracting players from all eras back to Chapel Hill.

As Brown's work has resulted in improvement on Saturday afternoons, it has also benefited his players who have decided to try careers in professional football. Over the past six seasons 25 Tar Heels have been selected in the National Football League draft. Florida State is the only ACC school to have more players drafted in that period. Thirty players who have played at Carolina for Brown have been drafted, and 21 of the 30 have been selected in the first four rounds of the NFL Draft. Marcus Jones and Thomas Smith were first-round selections; Jones by Tampa Bay in 1996 and Smith by Buffalo in 1993. Additionally, in the past six years 30 other Carolina players have signed free agent contracts with NFL teams.

"You go to a place that's won this many games and you see what you expect to see, and that is a lot of fine athletes and good football players," Washington Redskins head coach Norv Turner said this spring at a pre-draft workout in Chapel Hill. "The thing about these guys is that they are extremely well coached, very disciplined and from my exposure, the type of players you want in

your program. They go to school, they graduate and they don't have off-field problems."

Brown came to Carolina from Tulane where he had rejuvenated the Green Wave's sagging football fortunes in just three years, taking his team to only its fifth bowl game since 1940 in his final season.

However, Brown may be best known for helping develop some of the most explosive offenses in the college game. As an offensive coordinator and assistant, he directed record-setting attacks at Oklahoma, LSU and Iowa State.

Brown's 1987 Tulane team completed one of the fastest turn-arounds in the country. Brown went to Tulane on December 16, 1984, as head coach and was also appointed the school's athletic director the following April. The Green Wave had suffered three straight losing seasons before Brown's arrival in New Orleans.

In his third season, he led Tulane to a 6-5 regular-season mark and earned a spot opposite Washington in the Independence Bowl. In the process, the Green Wave set school records for total offense and points. Tulane ranked 11th in the nation in scoring, averaging 32.5 points a game.

Brown had begun his full-time coaching career at Southern Mississippi in 1974, working with receivers for four seasons. He then spent one year coaching that same position at Memphis State.

At Iowa State, from 1979 to 1981, Brown served as receivers coach for one year and as offensive coordinator for the last two seasons. In his time as offensive coordinator the Cyclones broke 17 school and Big Eight Conference records and produced league leaders in rushing and total offense.

He then took an assistant's job at LSU where he ran the offense in 1982. The Tigers went 8-2-1 and played in the Orange Bowl.

That led to his first head coaching job at Appalachian State. In 1983, at the age of 32, he directed the Mountaineers to a 6-5 record. However, he left after that one season when he became the offensive coordinator at Oklahoma.

In his one year on Barry Switzer's staff, the Sooners were 9-2-1, won the Big Eight Championship and earned a berth in the Orange Bowl. Brown helped Oklahoma develop its best passing attack in years as he coached quarterbacks Danny Bradley, a first-team All-Big Eight selection, and Troy Aikman, three-time Super Bowl champion quarterback of the Dallas Cowboys.

Brown attended Vanderbilt and Florida State. He lettered twice as a running back for the Seminoles in 1971 and 1972. He finished work on his bachelor's degree in education at FSU in 1974. While there, he worked on a part-time basis, coaching receivers and the junior varsity. He earned his master's degree in administration from Southern Mississippi in 1976.

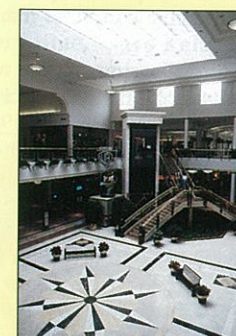
Brown, born Aug. 27, 1951, was a three-sport star at Putnam County High School, lettering three times in football.

In his tenure at Carolina Brown has been invited to coach in postseason all-star games on four occasions, including the Japan Bowl, the Hula Bowl and the East-West All-Star Game. He will direct the East squad in Palo Alto in 1999.

He was named the chairman of the Football Coaches' Committee and was named to the Board of Directors of the College Football Association. Brown was a member of the American Football Coaches Association's Ethics Committee and NCAA Rules Committee and was on the AFCA Public Relations Committee. He also was chairman of the AFCA committee which puts together the organization's summer manual.

Mack and his wife, Sally, have four children - Matt (22), Katherine (20), Barbara (17) and Chris (15). Sally is president of Marin Development and past president of PPP - the Public, Private Partnership, an organization which fostered improved relationship between the University and the town of Chapel Hill. She has also volunteered to chair the fundraising efforts for the UNC Black Cultural Center.

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Five Heels At Top Of Their Games

The designers of the new memorabilia area in the Frank Kenan Football Center have gone to great lengths to make sure all the important pieces of Tar Heel football history are on display.

There are five ACC championship trophies and plaques; old awards won by Charlie "Choo Choo" Justice and teammate Art Weiner; ACC Player of the Year honors for Danny Talbott, Don McCauley, Mike Voight, Lawrence Taylor, Ethan Horton and Marcus Jones. There are bowl trophies and old uniforms and plenty of vintage photographs dating to the turn of the century. There's a lot to see.

Problem is, this year's Tar Heel team has the potential of bringing home more hardware than any group in the past. Some artifacts might have to go next year to make room for the new.

Carolina has five premier all-star candidates this season, players who could contend for high profile conference and national honors. In quarterback Chris Keldorf and center Jeff Saturday, you have the backbone of the Tar Heel offense. In defensive end Greg Ellis, linebacker Brian Simmons and cornerback Dre' Bly, you have three of the reasons Carolina was first in the nation in team defense last season and had such a lopsided advantage in turnovers (12 lost to 34 gained).

"They're all preseason All-Americans in one place or another," says Tar Heel coach Mack Brown. "They're all very bright. The seniors will graduate. All of them at some point will be playing in the NFL. They have tremendous intensity and a great desire to win. We're really lucky to have them."

Three of them are members of the signing class of 1993 (the sophomore Bly is the youngster of the group, and Keldorf is a junior-college transfer). They've been to four bowls and won two of them and have been on teams that have won 35 games in four years.

A candidate for the Lombardi Award, Ellis is a life-long Tar Heel fan who grew up just east of Raleigh in the town of Wendell. At 6-6, 265 pounds, he's fast and is a terror to block. He has arms the size of many folks' thighs and has won first-team All-ACC honors for two years running. He will likely join William Fuller and Pat Crowley as the only Tar Heels to make first-team All-ACC three straight years.

"Greg is a great football player but a better person," says Brown. "He's got the great balance of being as nice

and quiet and proper off the field and as tough as anybody could be on the field."

Ellis says his dream goal this year is for the Tar Heels to go 11-0 and win the Orange Bowl. To help accomplish that, he's going to try to dominate and achieve a couple of marks on his own.

Ellis has 23.5 career sacks and, barring injury, will break Jones' school record of 24. Last year, he had 12.5 sacks, second only to Lawrence Taylor's 16 sacks accomplished in 1980.

"I really want to be the all-time sack leader," he says. "I want to have more sacks in any season than Lawrence Taylor. And the ultimate is to win the national championship. All three are possible."

Simmons grew up on the east coast of the state in New Bern and, like Ellis and Saturday, red-shirted in 1993, was a second-team player in 1994 and became a starter in 1995. He's 6-4, 230 pounds and is a viable candidate for the Dick Butkus Award, given annually to the best linebacker in college football.

"He's one of the toughest players I've ever been around," says Brown. "He's quality. He's nice. But he is an intense, tough football player."

Simmons was first team All-ACC in 1996 and is a load for opponents because he can blitz, cover receivers and chase down ball carriers from across the field. He also intercepted four passes in 1996.

The coming year brings the opportunity for an array of personal awards, but the only one that matters to Simmons is the won-loss record.

"My personal goal is to play the best football I can play," he says. "If I do that, the rest will take care of itself."

Together, Ellis and Simmons are monumental concerns for offenses. The classic question goes like this: Can we send the backfield out in the passing game, hoping to make Carolina

cover five receivers, or will they send the linebackers and get to our quarterback before he can find someone to throw the ball to? It's a vexing proposition.

Saturday sees Ellis and Simmons all he wants in practice. He wouldn't want to be on that opposing offense in a game.

"With what we have to see in practice, nothing in a game can compare," he says. "It's so much slower in a game. You set up to pass block and you're waiting for Ellis or Simmons to go crashing by you, but the other teams don't have anyone that good."

Bly bolted onto the scene last year as a redshirt freshman and picked off 11 passes, not including two more in the Gator Bowl which don't count in the season's final statistics. He amazed his teammates, coaches and opponents with an uncanny ability to confound the opposition's passing game, and in doing so impressed observers enough that he was runner-up for the Jim Thorpe Award given to the best defensive back in college football.

"He has an awesome knack of being at the right place at the right time and making the play," Brown says. "Some of our coaches said last year they think he lets a kid get open a little bit so the quarterback will throw it up and he can go steal it."

Bly acknowledges that he does do that—he'll literally sucker a quarterback into thinking a man's open, then be there for the steal.

"It's something you have to be careful with, but I know I can recover and get there to make the play," says Bly.

Bly was the first freshman in ACC history to make first-team All-America and only one of five freshmen ever to make the Associated Press first team. The others were Herschel Walker, Tony Dorsett, Marshall Faulk and Bjorn Merten.

"He can anticipate where the quarterback's going with the ball every time," says Keldorf. "It's virtually impossible to throw on him."

It actually would be interesting to see how Keldorf would handle Bly in a real game (maybe on Sunday some day?), because the senior quarterback showed a remarkable ability in 1996 to keep the ball out of opposing hands.

ter than I did. I didn't have my head on straight some times last year. I think that will improve this year."

Keldorf's roommate and one of his closest friends on the team is Saturday, the center who has developed into one of the top blockers in the ACC.

"With Jeff Saturday on the line, I don't have to worry about any of the line calls," Keldorf says. "That's all taken care of. He's probably the best in the country. He's physical and aggressive. On the field he's total, physical domination. He'll have a very lucrative career in the NFL."

Saturday was first-team All-ACC as a junior and is one of the team's most vocal leaders. He can play with pain and is an expert at figuring out where the defense is sending pass rushers.

"He has a great balance between the aggressiveness you have to have to be a tough, physical leader and blocker on the offensive line, and the intelligence to make all the calls up front," says Brown.

And this doesn't account for players like Octavus Barnes, L.C. Stevens and Na Brown among the wideouts, or Vonnie Holliday on the defensive line, or Kivusama Mays at middle linebacker or Omar Brown at free safety. They could be all-stars come November as well.

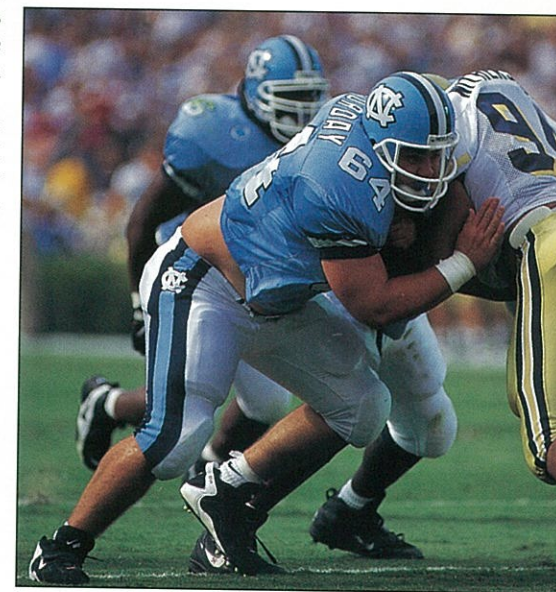
It could all lead to a new trophy case somewhere in the Kenan Football Center.

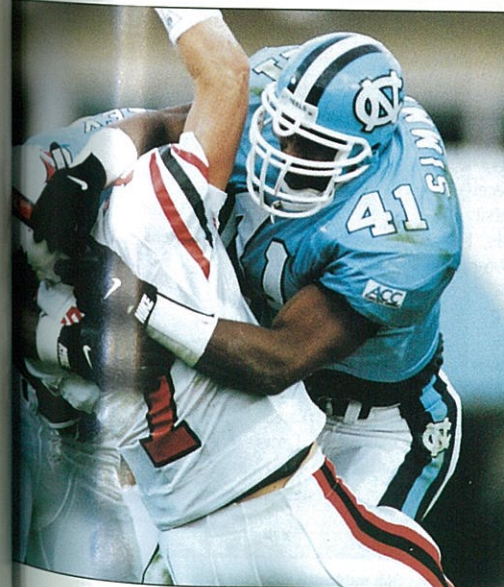
place. Because he's such a thinker, he has an inner confidence that leads the other kids."

He believes a year's experience at the top level and at running the new offense installed by coordinator Greg Davis will be invaluable in 1997.

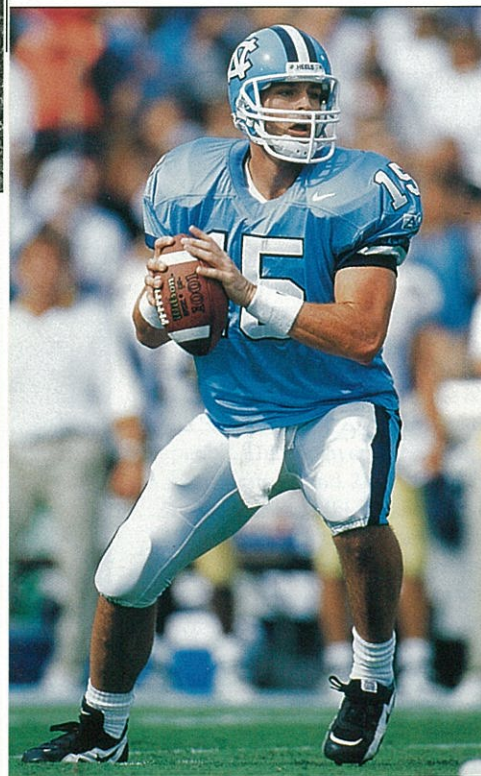

This year he wants me to pick up on what the defense is doing better than I did. I didn't have my head on straight some times last year. I think that will improve this year."
