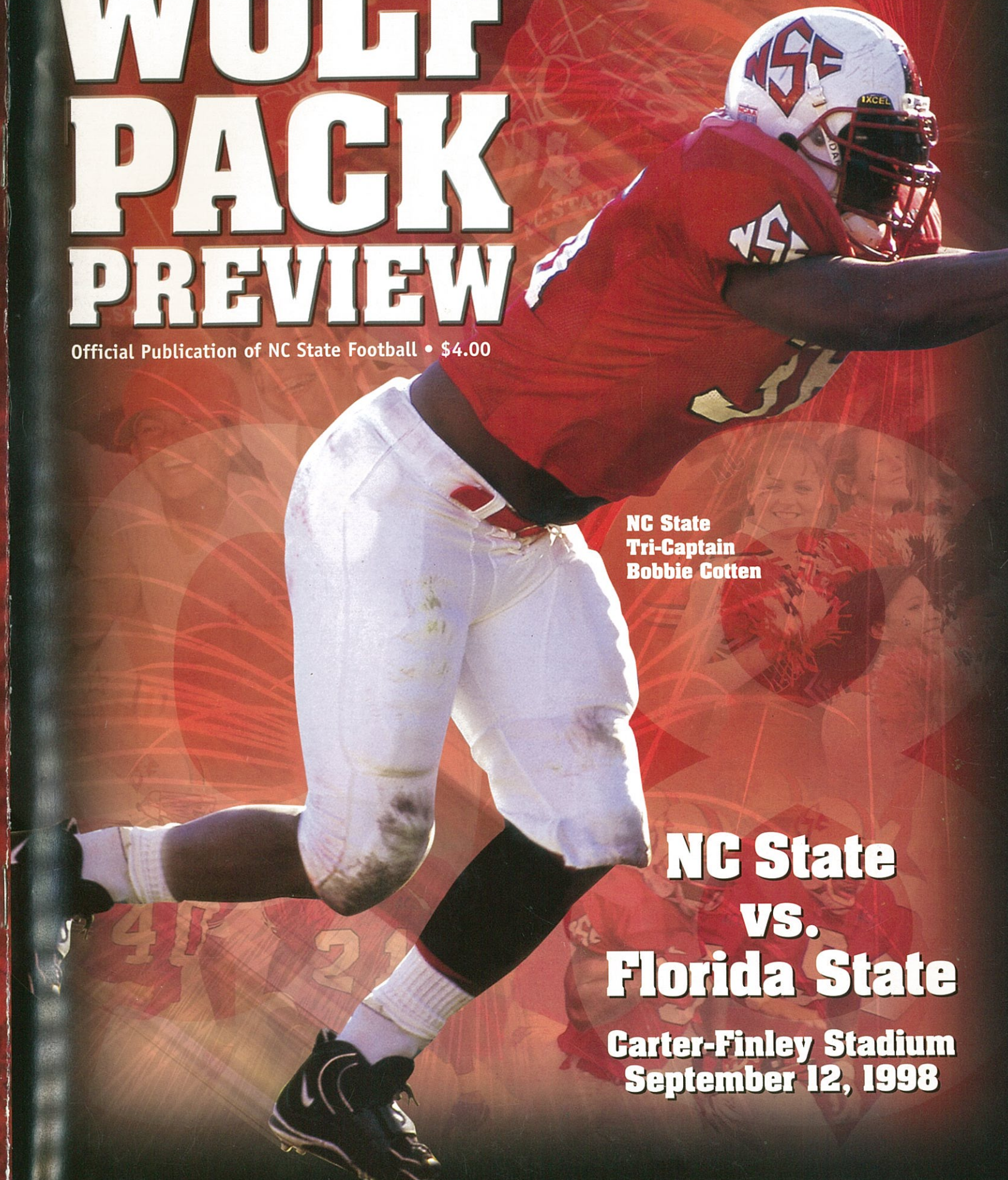

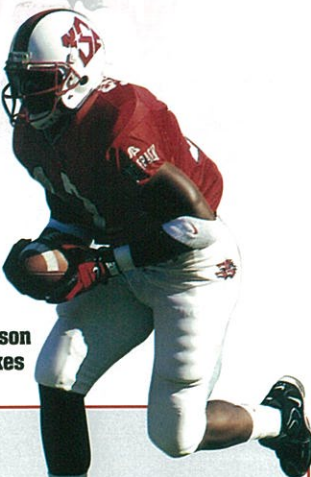

LAST TIME AGAINST FLORIDA STATE

After a quick Florida State start in the first quarter, NC State settled down and outscored them 35-21 over the remaining three periods before falling to the third-ranked Seminoles, 48-35. The Wolfpack's 35 points vs. the Seminoles was the most scored by an opponent since Miami scored 41 points in 1986.

All five Wolfpack touchdowns were on TD receptions to Torry Holt, which set an ACC record. He hooked up with quarterback Jamie Barnette for touchdowns of 25, 27, 26 and two yards. His fifth touchdown came on a nine-yard pass from backup QB Charles Berry. Holt finished the day with 12 receptions for 168 yards, setting an NC State single-game record for catches.

The Wolfpack was also effective running the ball. Senior tailback Tremayne Stephens finished the day with an even 100 yards on 19 carries. It was the third time in his career that he rushed for at least 100 yards against Florida State, and was the first running back to accomplish the feat in '97.

On defense, redshirt freshman linebacker Clayton White made a pair of sparkling plays to rally the Wolfpack. He blocked an FSU punt that led to a touchdown, and also recovered an FSU fumble on a kickoff.

CHRIS COLEMAN IS ANOTHER GIFTED RECEIVER

Much has been made of NC State wideout Torry Holt, and rightfully so, but Chris Coleman has developed into another weapon in the Wolfpack's potent offense. With two receptions for 33 yards against Ohio, Coleman became NC State's career leader in yards per reception, averaging 18.68 yards per catch.

In addition to being a gifted receiver, Coleman is a valuable member of NC State's special teams. In the fourth quarter against Ohio he scored the go-ahead touchdown after he recovered a blocked punt and returned it 13 yards for the score. In 1996, he blocked a punt, recovered the fumble and also returned it for a touchdown against Wake Forest.

JASON PERRY PICKS OHIO FOR TWO INTERCEPTIONS

During spring practice free safety Jason Perry emerged as one of NC State's most physical defensive backs, punishing receivers and making interceptions. He has displayed that same aggressive attitude this fall, making two interceptions in the Wolfpack's season-opener against Ohio. He also recorded 20 tackles against the Bobcats.

Perry became the first NC State player with two interceptions in a game since Ricky Turner had three picks against Duke in 1992. He now has four interceptions for his career, including two aerial thefts for 33 yards in 1995.

In addition to his football accolades, Perry is a standout member of the Wolfpack's track and field team. The reigning ACC champion in the 60-meter hurdles, he earned All-America honors in the 110-meter hurdles at the NCAA Championships in 1997.

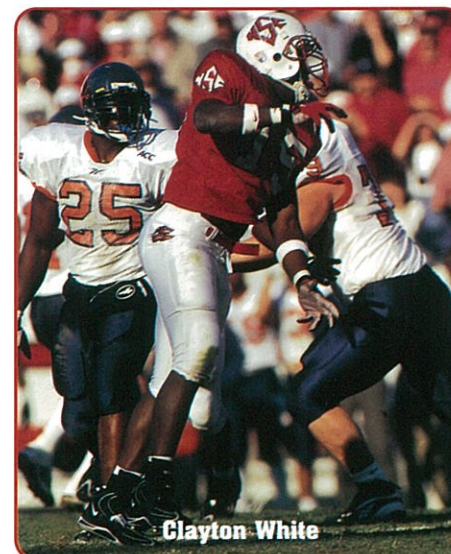

TORRY HOLT, IAN RAFFERTY NAMED PRESEASON ALL-ACC

Receiver Torry Holt and tackle Ian Rafferty continued to add to their preseason accolades, each earning preseason all-conference notice as part of the ACC Writers Tour, which visited all nine teams from Aug. 21 - Aug. 31. Both players have been listed as preseason All-Americans and among the nation's top professional prospects heading into the season.

Holt set a school record for receptions in '97 with 62 and became the first receiver in school history to top 1,000 yards in a season. His 21 career touchdown catches is already a school record.

Rafferty was making a strong bid for postseason accolades last season before injuring the ACL in his left knee during the Wolfpack's 10th game of the season against Virginia. He has spent the offseason and the spring rehabbing his knee and is set to pick up where he left off last year.

"THE STATE CUP" A CHAMPIONSHIP EVENT

The fourth annual "State Cup" golf team fund-raiser is being held this weekend. It is a two-day event with great golf at Prestonwood Country Club in Cary, an exceptional Friday night social and dinner for players and spouses, and a bountiful tailgate party at the NC State-Florida State football game. "We've been working at Carter-Finley Stadium and we have a putting green, a chipping green and a driving range area," NC State golf coach Richard Sykes said. "We are in the process now of trying to expand that and make it even nicer."

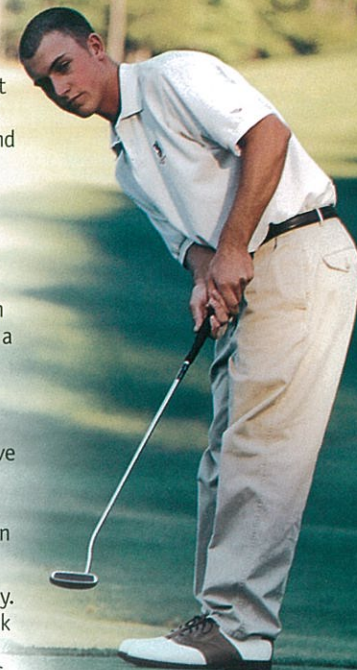

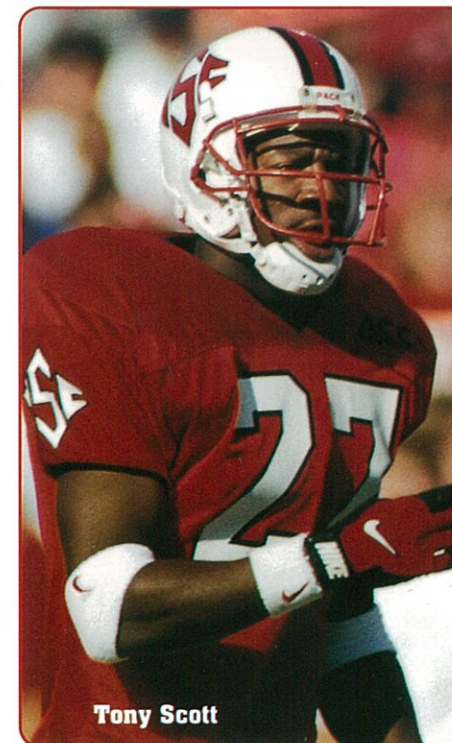

NC STATE'S 17-POINT RALLY AGAINST OHIO THE MOST IN 11 YEARS

In the Mike O'Cain era of NC State football, the Wolfpack has developed a reputation for coming from behind to win football games. After all, the Pack has rallied from a two-touchdown deficit four times to win since O'Cain took over as head coach in 1993. Even with that reputation, NC State's 17-point rally to beat Ohio in this year's season-opener marks NC State's largest comeback since 1987.

That season against Duke, the Wolfpack battled back from a score of 24-6 in the second quarter to beat the Blue Devils, 47-45. After three third-quarter TDs, the Pack finally took the lead, 34-31, on a 52-yard pass from Shane Montgomery to Todd Varn. Duke retook the lead, 45-44, in the fourth before Bryan Carter kicked a 32-yard field goal to win the game.

The previous year, when most of the current coaching staff arrived at NC State, the Wolfpack rallied from a 17-point deficit to beat Wake Forest 42-38.

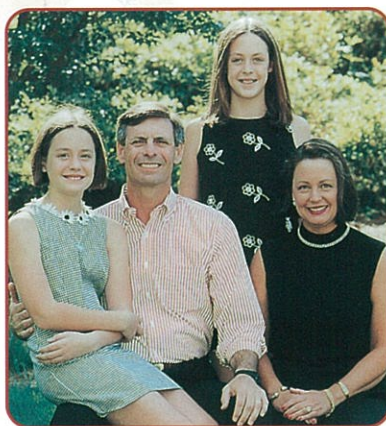

It doesn't take a great deal of time to recognize the two passions of NC State football coach Mike O'Cain's life. Football and family. For Coach O'Cain, who begins his sixth year as the Wolfpack's head coach and his 13th year on the staff, his life includes many families.

Mike, his wife of 18 years Nancy, and their daughters Jenny and Lizzi comprise the O'Cain family. The three ladies are frequent participants in the activities around the Wolfpack football complex and serve as the foundation and focus for Mike's everyday life.

But Coach O'Cain's family also includes his coaching staff and players, the entire NC State athletics department and the university, and the Wolfpack fans, and ... well you get the idea.

And to each family setting Mike brings integrity, honesty, tireless energy and the desire to ensure that each family member is successful.



SUCCESS IN THE CLASSROOM

With an uncompromising dedication to the academic success of his players, O'Cain's influence in the academic arena has shown tangible results. In 1996, NC State's football program reached a milestone when the College Football Association (CFA) honored the Pack with honorable mention status in its annual graduation survey. It was the Pack's first-ever appearance on the hallowed list that recognizes programs that graduate at least 70 percent of their seniors.

In addition, members of the football team have earned 43 appearances on the last five ACC Honor Rolls and a 70 percent graduation rate for its last five senior classes, which exceeds the national graduation rate for college students (67 percent). With a proven support system in place, the Wolfpack's academic prowess is a sign of the focus and commitment O'Cain and the entire program have placed on succeeding in the classroom.

SUCCESS ON THE FIELD

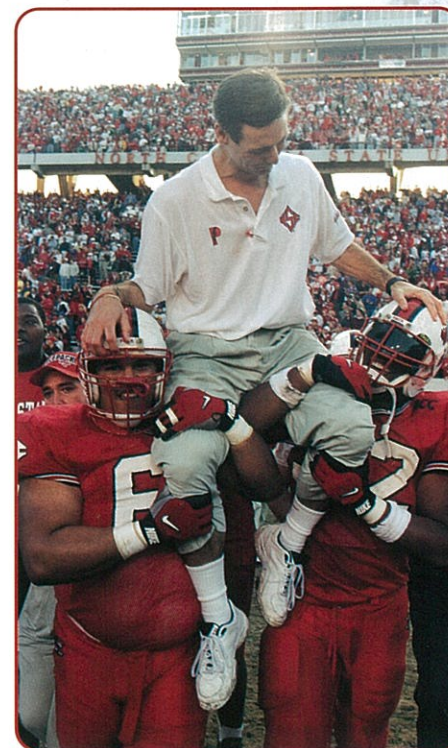
Coach O'Cain's NC State teams have won 28 games and appeared in a pair of bowl games while providing some of the most memorable victories and individual successes in recent history.

Last season, NC State finished the year 6-5, winning its last three games (against Maryland, Virginia and East Carolina) to qualify for a bowl game.

Along the way several players distinguished themselves among the ACC's — and the nation's — elite.

Senior Tremayne Stephens led the ACC with 1,170 yards rushing, averaging 5.6 yards per carry and scoring 10 touchdowns. Stephens finished his career as the school's third all-time leading rusher with 3,581 total yards.

In addition, junior wideout Torry Holt earned first-team All-ACC honors and clearly established himself as one of the nation's elite receivers. A preseason All-American wideout this fall, Holt set school records with 62 catches, 1,099 receiving yards and a whopping 16 touchdowns in 1997. He is the first receiver to record 1,000 yards in a single season at NC State.



Inheriting the Wolfpack program just five weeks prior to the start of the 1993 season, Mike managed to more than just survive his whirlwind indoctrination into the head coaching ranks. His first NC State team demonstrated a never-say-die attitude, winning four games with scintillating fourth-quarter comebacks, to finish 7-4 in the regular season and earn a berth in the Hall of Fame Bowl. As a result, he enjoyed the honor of being the nation's only rookie head coach to take his team to a bowl when the Pack played Michigan in the Jan. 1 contest in Tampa.

The following season, just his second as the head coach, O'Cain led the Pack to one of the finest years in program history, tying the school record for wins in a season. The preseason pick to finish sixth in the ACC, the team displayed tremendous heart in posting a 9-3 record, finishing second in the conference with a 6-2 record and defeating Mississippi State in the Peach Bowl, NC State's seventh straight bowl appearance.

By comparison, only Lou Holtz, who coached the Pack from 1972-75, posted more wins in his first two seasons (17) than O'Cain (16). No Wolfpack coach won more ACC contests (10) in his first two seasons than Mike. And he and Holtz are the only NC State coaches to take the Pack to bowl contests in each of their first two seasons.

SUCCESSFUL PHILOSOPHY

Coach O'Cain's disciplined, innovative philosophy, his attention to detail as well as his ability to surround himself with quality people, sets the tone for a successful program, both on and off the field. The Wolfpack players' success in the classroom and the community as well as the program's well-earned, highly-respected on-the-

field reputation is a result of the tremendous work ethic that permeates through the program. He is a players' coach, and he believes in winning with people of character. One very visible result of that philosophy is that O'Cain and his staff have put together five of the Pack's most highly regarded recruiting classes.

"You have to have 'X' amount of talent to win ball games, but I believe you win ball games with people, not just talent alone," O'Cain has said to the media. "That is what I like about the makeup of our football team; they are very good people who also have talent."

"I heard a coach in the ACC say one day that he doesn't go to bed a single night without worrying about his football team. There has not been one night where I worried about waking up and reading something negative about our football team because I know what kind of people they are. Athletic ability will help you compete when the chips are down, but character makes the difference in winning far more often."

SUCCESSFUL CAREER

O'Cain began his coaching career as a graduate assistant at Clemson University, where he had lettered for three seasons as a quarterback. He stayed with the Clemson program for the 1977 season as a graduate assistant working with the running backs.

From 1978 through 1980, O'Cain worked with Art Baker at The Citadel as the offensive backfield coach.

O'Cain then moved on to Murray State for four years, where he served as quarterback coach and then assistant head coach and offensive coordinator for three more years. During his four-year tenure, the Racers posted a 28-16 record, including a 9-2 mark in 1984.

Mike re-joined Baker in 1985, this time at East Carolina, where he served as assistant head coach.

He moved to Raleigh in 1986 when Dick Sheridan took over the Wolfpack program. O'Cain served as the quarterback coach for the next seven seasons, helping the Pack re-write nearly every passing and receiving record. During that time span eight Wolfpack offensive players were selected first-team All-ACC, including quarterback Erik Kramer, who earned the conference's Player of the Year award in 1986.

A native of Orangeburg, S.C., Mike began his association with Dick Sheridan at Orangeburg-Wilkinson High School, where Sheridan coached O'Cain. A three-year starter at quarterback, O'Cain led the team to a perfect 13-0 record, the state 4-A title and a No. 12 national ranking as a senior.

SUCCESS AT HOME

O'Cain, who was born on July 20, 1954, was married to the former Nancy Farnum on May 17, 1980. High school sweethearts at Orangeburg (S.C.) High School, they met some 10 years prior to getting married. Nancy has been an active participant in Mike's football career, attending

games and speeches as well as, on occasion, helping grade game films.

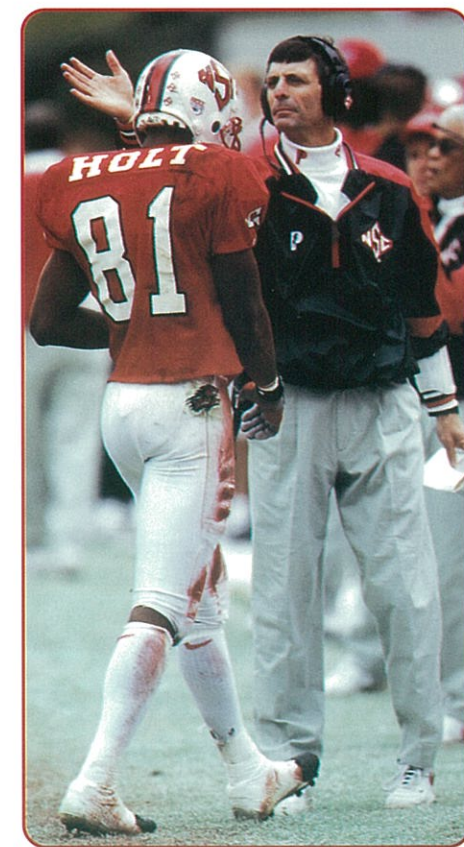
They are the proud parents of two daughters, Jenny, age 13, and Lizzi, 11. Both young ladies have inherited, and possibly surpassed, their father's athleticism, enjoying success in regional swimming programs as well as playing basketball and tennis. Having served as ball girls for the NC State women's basketball games, Jenny and Lizzi often accompany Mike to his weekly radio and television shows.

"Mike is very conscientious about including the family in his football activities," Nancy said. "We travel to nearly all of the road games. And our love for and involvement in football enhances our time with him. Even though his schedule is demanding, he always makes time for us."

"Mike has always been compassionate, yet firm with his family and his football team. His style is to work to build someone up, instead of tear them down."

Coach O'Cain also makes time for charitable activities. He is active in his church where he has served as a Sunday school teacher. He has been a speaker at FCA camps as well as donating his time to the American Lung Association, Make A Wish Foundation and the Duke Children's Classic. He also reads to elementary school classes and has served as an instructor for his church's youth group.

An avid hunter, Mike often returns to his family farm to hunt birds. An outdoorsman at heart, he is also an accomplished photographer.

IMITREX® (sumatriptan succinate) Tablets and IMITREX® (sumatriptan) Nasal Spray

Patient Information about IMITREX Tablets and IMITREX Nasal Spray for migraine headaches. Generic names: sumatriptan succinate, sumatriptan

Please read this summary of information about IMITREX before you talk to your doctor or start using IMITREX. No summary can take the place of a careful discussion between you and your doctor. Only your doctor has the medical training and the complete prescribing information necessary to determine if this medicine is right for you. Once you read this summary, you should discuss with your doctor whether IMITREX is appropriate treatment for you and ask any questions you may have.

WHAT IS IMITREX?

IMITREX is the brand name of sumatriptan, a drug intended to relieve your migraine headaches but not to prevent or reduce the number of migraine headaches you experience. IMITREX should be used only to treat an actual migraine attack. IMITREX can be obtained only with a doctor's prescription and should be used by adults only after discussing the choice with your doctor, taking into account your individual preferences and medical circumstances.

HOW DOES IMITREX WORK?

How IMITREX works is not completely understood. IMITREX is a 5-HT₁ agonist that seems to relieve migraine headaches by acting like a brain chemical called 5-hydroxytryptamine, causing some blood vessels in the head that are swollen during a migraine to constrict (that is, to become smaller), which helps relieve migraine headache.

IMPORTANT SAFETY CONSIDERATIONS

Although the vast majority of patients who have taken IMITREX have not experienced any significant side effects, some patients have experienced serious heart problems and, rarely, considering the extensiveness of IMITREX use worldwide, deaths have been reported. In all but a few instances, however, serious problems occurred in patients with known heart disease, and it was not clear whether IMITREX was a contributing factor in these deaths.

Serious events relating to the blood vessels in the head (e.g. brain hemorrhage, stroke) have been reported in patients who were taking IMITREX. Some of these have resulted in death; however, the relationship of IMITREX to these events is uncertain. In a number of these cases it appears possible that patients were not experiencing a migraine but rather an event due to blood vessel disease in the head. IMITREX was given in the incorrect belief that the person may have been suffering a migraine. Therefore, you should not take IMITREX if the headache you are experiencing is different from your usual migraine attacks. People who suffer from migraines may be at increased risk of certain blood vessel events in the brain (e.g., hemorrhage, stroke, or transient ischemic attack).

Ask your doctor about these and additional safety considerations.

WHO SHOULD NOT TAKE IMITREX?

Some types of migraine headaches should not be treated with IMITREX, and some patients should not take IMITREX because of an increased risk of serious side effects.

■ If you have had a heart attack, stroke, transient ischemic attacks, peripheral vascular disease (including ischemic bowel disease or Raynaud's syndrome), or any sort of heart disease or symptoms that are associated with constriction of blood vessels, such as ischemic heart disease, angina, or coronary artery vasospasm, you should not use IMITREX.

■ If you have uncontrolled high blood pressure, you should not use IMITREX.

■ If you are taking certain drugs for depression, talk with your doctor. IMITREX should not be used if you take or have taken within the last 2 weeks, monoamine oxidase inhibitors (MAOIs).

■ Your doctor will discuss with you the type of migraine headaches you have. If you have hemiplegic or basilar migraine, you should not take IMITREX. IMITREX should be used only in patients who have been diagnosed by a physician as having migraine with or without aura.

■ Tell your doctor about any other medications you are taking. If you are currently taking any migraine medications that include ergot alkaloids, such as methysergide or dihydroergotamine, or other 5-HT₁ agonists, do not take IMITREX within 24 hours of taking these medications.

■ Do not take IMITREX if you are allergic to sumatriptan or any of the ingredients in IMITREX.

WHAT MEDICAL PROBLEMS OR CONDITIONS SHOULD I DISCUSS WITH MY DOCTOR?

■ If you have risk factors for heart problems, you should tell your doctor. Your doctor should examine you for heart disease to see whether IMITREX is appropriate for you. Risk factors include high blood pressure, high cholesterol, obesity, diabetes, and smoking. Other patients with risk factors for heart disease are women who are past menopause (whether natural menopause or menopause resulting from surgery), men over 40 years old, or patients with a family history of heart disease. If you have risk factors and your evaluation for heart disease is satisfactory, your doctor may ask you to take the first dose of IMITREX in the doctor's office.

■ Tell your doctor if you have chest pains, shortness of breath, or irregular heart beats.

■ Tell your doctor if you are taking selective serotonin reuptake inhibitors (SSRIs).

■ Tell your doctor if you have a history of epilepsy or seizures.

■ Tell your doctor if you have liver or kidney problems.

■ Tell your doctor if you have ever had to stop taking any medication because of an allergy or other problems.

USE OF IMITREX DURING PREGNANCY AND BREAST-FEEDING

Do not take IMITREX if you are pregnant, think you may be pregnant, are trying to become pregnant, are not using adequate birth control methods, or are breast-feeding, unless you have discussed this with your doctor.

HOW TO USE IMITREX TABLETS OR NASAL SPRAY

Tablets: For adults, the usual dose is a single tablet taken whole with fluids. A second tablet may be taken if your symptoms of migraine come back or if you have partial response to the first dose, but no sooner than 2 hours after taking the first tablet. For a given attack, if you have no response to the first tablet, do not take a second tablet without first consulting with your doctor. Do not take more than a total of 200 mg of IMITREX Tablets in any 24-hour period.

Nasal Spray: For adults, the usual dose is a single spray administered into one nostril. If your headache comes back, a second nasal spray may be administered anytime 2 hours after administering the first spray. For a given attack, if you have no response to the first nasal spray, do not take a second nasal spray without first consulting your doctor. Do not administer more than a total of 40 mg of IMITREX Nasal Spray in any 24-hour period. The effects of long-term repeated use of IMITREX Nasal Spray on the surface of the nose and throat have not been specifically studied.

The safety of treating an average of more than four headaches in a 30-day period has not been established.

WHAT ARE THE POSSIBLE SIDE EFFECTS OF USING IMITREX?

Do not rely on this summary alone for information about side effects. Your doctor can discuss with you a more complete list of side effects that may be relevant to you.

The most frequently seen side effects are tingling and warm/cold sensations with IMITREX Tablets and bad/unusual taste with IMITREX Nasal Spray.

■ Some patients feel pain or tightness in the chest or throat when using IMITREX. If this happens to you, discuss it with your doctor before using any more IMITREX. If the pain is severe or does not go away, call your doctor immediately.

■ If you have sudden or severe abdominal pain after taking IMITREX, call your doctor immediately.

■ Shortness of breath; wheeziness; heart throbbing; swelling of the eyelids, face, or lips; or a skin rash, skin lumps, or hives happen rarely, but if they happen to you, tell your doctor immediately. Do not take any more IMITREX unless your doctor tells you to.

■ Some patients have feelings of tingling, heat, flushing (redness of the face lasting a short time), heaviness, or a feeling of pressure after taking IMITREX. A few patients may feel drowsy, dizzy, tired, sick, or experience nasal irritation (Nasal Spray only). Tell your doctor about these effects at your next visit.

■ If you feel unwell in any other way or have any problem that you do not understand after taking IMITREX, tell your doctor immediately.

WHAT SHOULD I DO IF I TAKE AN OVERDOSE?

If you have taken more medication than you have been told, contact either your doctor, a hospital emergency department, or the nearest poison control center immediately.

HOW SHOULD I STORE IMITREX?

Be sure to keep your medicine in an area that cannot be reached by children. It may be harmful to children.

IMITREX Tablets and IMITREX Nasal Spray should be stored at room temperature and do not require refrigeration. Do not store above 86°F (30°C) or below 36°F (2°C). Store away from heat and light. If your medication has expired (the expiration date is printed on the label) throw it away as instructed. If your doctor decides to stop your treatment with IMITREX, do not save any leftover medication unless your doctor tells you to do so. Throw it away as instructed.

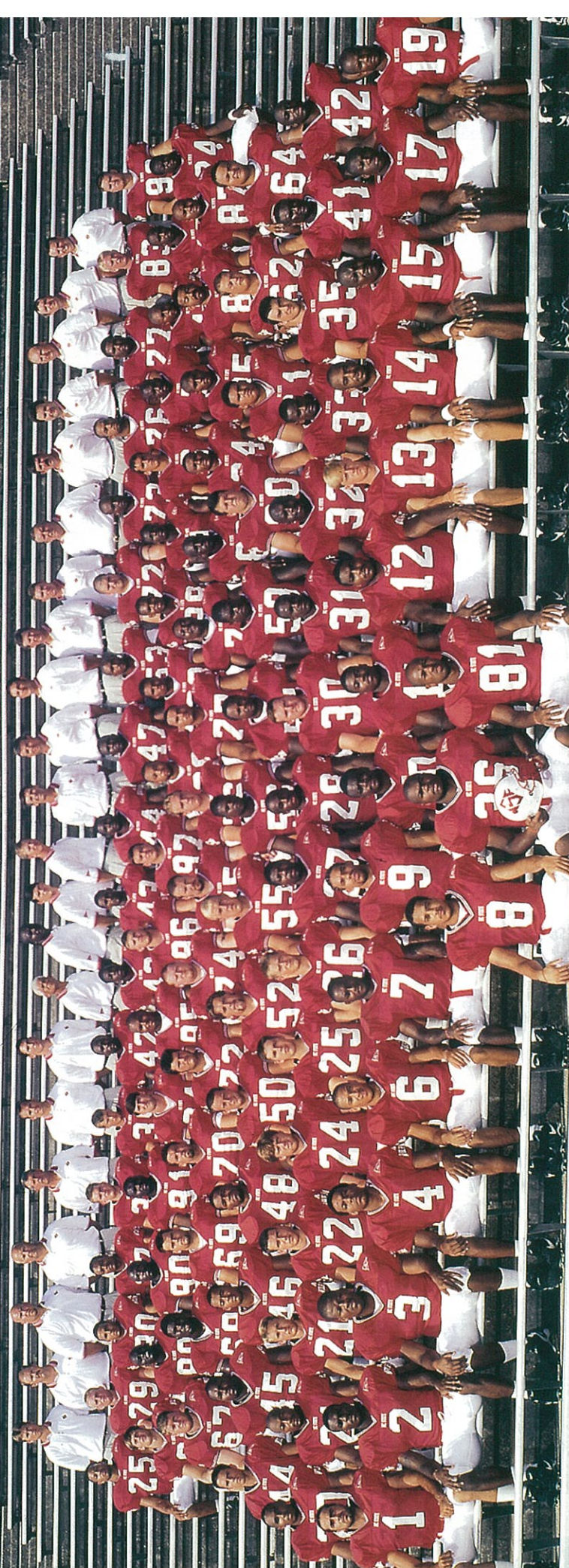
