


## 

he University of Maryland used to a 30-20 win over Temple last week to help propel itself into today's battle with ninth-ranked Florida State.

Today's game marks the first of seven straight Maryland games against Atlantic Coast Conference opponents. It is the Terrapins' third meeting against a Top 25 opponent in their last four games.

Against Temple, the Terps captured their second victory in four games behind



Sophomore LaMont Jordan ran for a career-high 138 yards and two TDs against Temple last week.

Maryland's greatest offensive showing since a 52-0 pasting of Wake Forest two years ago. Quarterbacks Ken Mastrole and Randall Jones platooned throughout the game to help the Terps to 380 yards total offense. Sophomore placekicker Brian Kopka booted three field goals for the second time this season to take over the nation's lead with 10 on the year.

The Seminoles make just their fourth

visit to College Park, and their third since joining the ACC in 1992. FSU comes to Byrd Stadium as the sixth Top Ten visitor of the '90s. The 'Noles, themselves, were ranked No. 1 in 1993 and No. 4 in 1994 during previous visits.

#### Records

Maryland is 2-2 overall and 0-1 in the ACC following its 30-20 win over Temple. Florida State is 3-1 overall and 1-1 in the ACC following a 30-10 victory against No. 17 USC.

#### Rankings

Florida State (#9 AP, #10 ESPN/USA Today) is one of two ACC schools and three Maryland opponents ranked in AP or ESPN/USA Today Top 25 polls.

Maryland opponents in national polls: Florida State, Virginia (#10, #9) and West Virginia (#16, #17). North Carolina State and Georgia Tech each received votes in both

#### Maryland Goach Vanderlinden

Maryland's Ron Vanderlinden continues his second season at Maryland after helping rebuild struggling programs at Colorado (1983-

91) and Northwestern (1992-96). Vanderlinden's only meeting against Florida State was last season in his ACC debut and second game as a college head

#### Florida State Coach Bowden

In his 33rd season as a college head coach, Bobby Bowden is second to Penn State's Joe Paterno among active coaches in all-time victories (284) and bowl wins (16). In his 23rd season at Florida State, he has helped FSU to six straight ACC titles and 11 straight Top Five finishes. He is the only coach in NCAA history to win 10 or more games in 11 straight

#### Youngest in the Nation?

The Terps continue 1998 gridiron wars with perhaps the youngest I-A team in the country. For the fifth straight week, Ron Vanderlinden employs at least 20 freshmen and sophomores on the current two-deep. For the second straight week, Maryland established new season highs for freshmen and sophomores that saw game action, as 32 of 53 players vs. Temple were underclassmen. The Terrapins have started eight freshmen or sophomores in three straight weeks.

#### **Barton Update**


Senior linebacker Eric Barton averages 13.5 tackles per game after matching a career-high 17 stops against Temple. Unofficial press box statistics credited the 6-3, 229-pound senior with 12 at halftime. Barton has posted 45 tackles in his last three games to average 15 a game during that span. Barton has recorded double-digit tackles in eight of his last 10 games.

#### Jordan-esque

The ACC rookie-of-the-year runnerup last season, LaMont Jordan established a new career-high against Temple with 138 yards and two touchdowns on 22 carries. His effort last Saturday eclipsed his previous best, 135 yards on 21 carries in last year's meeting with the Owls. It marked the third 100-yard game of his 14game college career. His two touchdowns against the Owls were also a careerbest. He enters the Florida State game as

the fourth-leading rusher in the ACC with 75.7 yards per game. Teammate Matt Kalapinski ranks sixth in the ACC. Both trail today's opposing FSU tailback Travis Minor who ranks second in the league with 85 yards per game.

- Jordan made his presence known in last year's meeting with Florida State, ripping off a 44-yard touchdown run vs. the Seminoles. It was the fourth-longest run by a freshman in Maryland history.
- He needs 84 yards to reach the 1,000-yard rushing plateau for his career. Iordan enters the Florida State game with 916 net yards on 213 carries (4.3 average).
- Jordan has typically been a valuable receiver, also, and against Temple he contributed to the Maryland passing game again. This time as a passer. Jordan threw the first pass of his career on a third-down gadget play in which he took a pitch right from Randall Jones, and threw back across the field to Jones for a 15-yard gain and first down.

#### **Best Offense Since 1996**

Scoring, total offense and rushing offense against Temple was the best by a Maryland team since a 52-0 drubbing of Wake Forest on Oct. 19, 1996. Against Temple last Saturday, Maryland totaled 380 vards total offense, 245 rushing and outscored the Owls 30-

At Byrd Stadium against the Deamon Deacons two seasons ago, Maryland compiled a whopping 355 yards rushing and 589 total.

#### Possession Miscellany

The Terrapins have developed a nifty habit of converting thirddown opportunities, including 8-of-16 (50%) against Temple. Maryland has converted 27of-65 (41.5%) third-down

conversions while limiting opponents to a 17-of-49(34.7%) success ratio. Maryland is currently second in the ACC in offensive third-down conversion percentage, and fifth defensively. Last season, the Terps were ninth on both sides of the ball. Overall, the Terps are 20-of-26 (76.9%) on third-down attempts from six yards

#### **TODAY'S HONORARY GAPTAINS**

#### DEAN RICHARDS



Dean Richards was a four-year Terrapin wingback who played in four consecutive bowl games from 1975 to 1978. Included in his Maryland career were ACC championship seasons in 1975 and 1976. Richards set a record in 1978 for the most pass receptions

with 35, and leading into the "78 season, was the league's second-leading returning receiver with 23 catches for 370 yards as a junior. He earned the team's Teke Trophy (now called the Terrapin Club Award) honoring the student-athlete who rendered the greatest service to football over his career. Richards was also a member of the 1978 All-ACC academic team. He is a native of Dover, Ohio.

#### **NEIL OLKEWIGZ**



Neil Olkewicz earned ACC weekly honors on three occasions and served as a team captain during his 1978 senior season. With 188 tackles, he set a single season record, as well as a team-leading, record 27 tackles versus Penn State. He lettered on three con-

secutive bowl teams, earned the coaches award as best defensive back, and won the team's Ray Krouse Memorial Award as the most valuable senior. A three-year letterwinner, Olkewicz was part of backto-back ACC championships teams. Originally from Phoenixville, Pa., Olkewicz later starred locally in the NFL for the Washington Redskins.

#### **Mastrole & Jones Platoon**

After the Terrapin offense sputtered at West Virginia and freshman QB Jones moved the team in the second half against the Mountaineers, media anticipated a "quarterback controversy" prior to last week's Temple game. Following a win over the Owls, Vanderlinden commented, "We don't have a controversy. We have two good quarterbacks who have different styles."

Terp coaches unveiled a platoon system between Jones and incumbent starter Ken Mastrole which is expected to continue through the season. Mastrole started the game and took 42 snaps. Jones alternated regularly, three times during the same series, in fact, and took 31 snaps of his own.

#### **First TD Pass and Catch**

Still seeking his first touchdown pass since a seven-yard score at Duke in 1996, Mastrole subbed for Randall Jones during a fourth quarter series last week and on his first play found senior Bruce James for a 39-yard score. It was the second TD of Mastrole's career, and also the second for James. It was James' first catch of the year and his first TD reception since his freshman year in 1995, a 48-yarder also against Duke.

#### **Control the Clock**

Maryland has controlled time of possession in all four games this season, and in 11 of its last 15 games — including, actually, a 30:39 to 29:21 advantage in last year's bout with FSU. The Terps have dominated the third quarter of all four games from a possession standpoint. Against Temple, Maryland held the ball for 11:45 of the third quarter.

#### **Kopka Kicks**

Sophomore placekicker Brian Kopka has booted 10 field goals in four games to lead the nation in average and total field goals. He and FSU's Sebastian Janikowski share the ACC lead with 38 points. Kopka was perfect against Temple to run his consecutive field goal streak to 10 and mark the second game this season that he has matched his career-best with three FGs in a game. This season, he is 4-of-5 from 40 yards or more, and is perfect inside the 40. He is 5-of-7 lifetime from 40 yards or more. He is 8-of-10 on attempts from 35 or longer.

Kopka wears a cast on his right hand and wrist, the result of an injury suffered while lifting weights. Laughs Kopka, "I wish I could say I hurt it tackling somebody."

#### **Kudos to New Holder**

When quarterback Trey Evans was lost for the season with a torn ACL late in fall camp, it meant that a new holder would be forced into duty with Kopka this season. Russ Edwards, the previous backup holder, was pressed into action and hasn't missed a beat, helping his kicking mate go 10-for-11 on field goals and eight-for-nine on PATs. Edwards is having a career-year himself as Maryland's fourth-year punter. His 42-yard average is significantly improved over his previous average and he has pinned opponents inside their own 20-yard line on six occasions.

#### **Next Games**

Maryland continues its ACC schedule at Clemson next week before returning to Byrd Stadium for its annual homecoming game against Wake Forest. Florida State plays at Miami next week before hosting Clemson.

Next week's game at Clemson begins at noon and is televised by JP Sports.

#### **Next Home Games**

Following the Terrapins' homecoming game with Wake Forest in two weeks, Maryland's game with Georgia Tech, at Baltimore on Oct. 31, will also be televised by JP Sports and kick off at noon.

#### In the Red Zone

The Terps have scored on 11 of 12 occasions that they have reached inside the opponents 20-yard line. Maryland has scored four touchdowns and seven field goals for 91.6% effectiveness.

## RON VANDERLINDEN

#### **HEAD COACH**



coach intimately familiar with turning around college football programs enters his second season at the University of Maryland intent on doing just that in

College Park.

Ron Vanderlinden, 42, took over as the Terps' head coach in December, 1996, following five seasons as the top assistant for the Northwestern Wildcats, whose meteoric rise to national prominence included the school's first Rose Bowl appearance since 1949 and first conference championship since '36. Previously, Vanderlinden spent nine seasons as an assistant at Colorado, where he was part of a program that made six bowl appearances in a seven-year stretch, including a victory in the Orange Bowl to win the 1990 national title.

"I absolutely think Maryland should be one of the premier programs in the country," said Vanderlinden on the day he was introduced as the Terps' head coach. "We have a beautiful campus in a great location, first-class facilities and an impressive stadium, a supportive administration committed to winning, and a large fan base with enthusiastic boosters. These are the essential ingredients necessary for success."

Since arriving in College Park in the winter of '96, Vanderlinden has been tireless in his efforts to awaken the Terraping' gridien fortunes focusing

ins' gridiron fortunes, focusing on his twin goals of "graduating all of our players and winning the [conference] championship."

Those were similar goals during Vanderlinden's days at Northwestern, where he served as Gary Barnett's assistant head coach and defensive coordinator from 1992 to 1996. In that span, a moribund Northwestern program — one that hadn't had a winning season in more than 20 years — was transformed into a two-time Big Ten

Conference champion and Rose Bowl participant. The Wildcats won five league games in his first three seasons, but then went 15-1 in conference play on the way to capturing consecutive Big Ten titles in 1995 and '96. Northwestern played USC in the 1996 Rose

Bowl and Tennessee in the 1997 Citrus Bowl.

At Northwestern, Vanderlinden was the chief architect of a defensive unit that in 1995 finished first nationally in scoring defense (12.7 ppg) and third nationally in turnover margin (+1.82 pg). In '96, the Wildcats finished 19th nationally in turnover margin. In addition to heading Northwestern's defensive efforts, Vanderlinden oversaw the inside linebackers and punt return unit. The Wildcats were among the nation's top 10

punt return teams three times, finishing first in '92, fourth in '93 and ninth in '95.

During his tenure at Northwestern, Vanderlinden recruited and coached several of the most outstanding players in school history. Under his guidance, Northwestern's Pat Fitzgerald was the 1995 and '96 Big Ten Defensive Player of the Year and a two-time All-American. Fitzgerald also was named the Chuck Bednarik and Bronko Nagurski national defensive player of the year in '95, as well as the national defensive player of the year by Chevrolet and Sports Illustrated.

The success enjoyed on the field by the Wildcats was congruent with Vanderlinden's philosophy of high academic achievement. Northwestern earned recognition by the College Football Association as one of the exemplary academic programs in the nation.

Vanderlinden came to Northwestern after coaching Colorado's defensive line for nine years (1983-91). He also served as the Buffaloes' recruiting coordinator for two years (1985 and 1986). While at CU, he coached three All-Americans and five first team All-Big Eight selections. In addi-

tion to winning the 1990 national championship, Colorado captured three Big Eight titles (1989, 1990, 1991) and played in six bowl games. From 1985 to 1991, Colorado's defensive unit was considered among the best in the country, ranking No. 10 for fewest touchdowns allowed, 11th in fewest points allowed and 18th in total defense.

Only three years after his arrival in Boulder, the Buffaloes advanced to their first bowl game in nine seasons. All told, CU would make six bowl appearances during Vanderlinden's final seven seasons on the staff, including the 1990 campaign when the Buffs won the national championship.

It was Vanderlinden's hands-on experience in two successful and stunning rebuilding efforts which attracted the attention of Maryland athletic director Deborah

"Ron won unanimous support of our selection committee, and that was great because he was always my top choice," said Yow. "Everyone has said that he is a dynamic coach, that he is knowledgeable, a relentless recruiter and a tireless worker. He's done twice what we want a coach to do: build a program. And the rebuilding jobs were at good academic schools in Colorado and Northwestern. Based on those credentials, he was an early front runner."

Vanderlinden began his full-time coaching career at Ball State University in 1982, where he worked with the offensive line for two years. From Ball State he moved to Colorado, then to Northwestern.

As a graduate assistant coach, he began his coaching career at Bowling Green State University under Denny Stolz in 1978. He then moved on to the University of Michigan,

where he was a graduate assistant in 1979 and '80 on Bo Schembechler's staff. During his time in Ann Arbor, Michigan participated in both the Gator and Rose bowls.

Said Bill McCartney, former head coach at Colorado: "Ron is a student of the game. He brings energy and fire to the game. I expect Maryland to be a physical and very versatile football team. I expect them to run with authority and pass with continuity. On defense, I expect they will play with an aggressive, challenging style."

Vanderlinden earned his bachelor's degree from Albion (Mich.) College in 1978.

A four-year starter at center, he was a twotime first team all-conference selection, earning the honor as a junior and senior, when Albion posted undefeated seasons. Albion also participated in its first Division III playoff game in school history. He also earned three varsity letters in baseball.

A native of Livonia, Mich., Vanderlinden and his wife, Lisa, have a daughter, Chelsea, and a son, Reid. Vanderlinden is one of seven children born to Pete and the late Mary Vanderlinden. Pete was one of 14 children born to Belgian immigrants of Dutch descent.

Carter was inducted into the Ft. Lauderdale Hall of Fame in 1981 and the University of Miami Sports Hall of Fame in '92.

Carter and his wife, Karen, have one daughter, Diandra, and three sons, Andre, Alvin and Joshua. Andre began his major college football career at the University of California in the fall of 1997.

#### MIKE GUNDY Wide Receivers

Mike Gundy, a four-year starting quarterback at Oklahoma State who still figures prominently in the Cowboys' record book, joined Maryland's staff in 1997 as wide receivers coach.

Prior to his arrival in College Park, Gundy spent one season as an assistant coach at Baylor (1996) and six seasons as an assistant coach at Oklahoma State (1990-95). At Baylor, Gundy was the Bears' passing game coordinator and quarterbacks coach; at Oklahoma State, he started out as wide receivers coach, took over as quarterbacks coach in 1992 and was elevated to offensive coordinator in 1994.

During his four seasons as a starting QB at Oklahoma State (1986-89), Gundy established most major school passing records and finished his career as the Big Eight's all-time leader in total offense. A three-year team captain, Gundy led the Cowboys to a cumulative record of 29-14 as a starter. Major school records set by Gundy included passing yards in a game (429) and season (2,203); career (58.3 percent) and season (64.8 percent) completion percentages; and completions in a game (27) and season (170).

Gundy, who shared the same backfield with two of football's greatest tailbacks (Barry Sanders and Thurman Thomas), helped lead the Cowboys to back-to-back 10-2 seasons in 1987 and '88.

Gundy and his wife, Kristen, have one

son, Gavin. Gundy's brother, Cale, was a fouryear starting quarterback at Oklahoma.

#### BOB HEFFNER Tight Ends/Offensive Tackles

Bob Heffner, whose father, Fred, played for the Terps' national championship team in 1953, is in his second season on Maryland's coaching staff. The Terps' tight ends coach in 1997, he had his duties expanded in the offseason to include the offensive tackles.

Heffner, who brought 17 years of coaching experience with him to College Park, joined the Maryland staff after serving as offensive line coach at Northern Illinois in 1996. Heffner coached at Lafayette College for a total of five seasons on two separate occasions prior to Northern Illinois. He was Lafayette's offensive coordinator and offensive line coach from 1993 to 1995 and offensive line coach in 1988 and '89. During his time at the Easton, Pa., school, Lafayette claimed Patriot League championships in 1988 and '94.

Between his coaching stops at Lafayette, Heffner spent four years in the professional ranks. He served as the director of player personnel and offensive coordinator for the Arena Football League champion Tampa Bay Storm in 1993 and as offensive line and running backs coach for the British Columbia Lions of the Canadian Football League.

During his time with British Columbia, the Lions' Doug Flutie was voted the CFL's Most Valuable Player after setting the league record for passing yards in a season, and Jim Mills was named the league's Most Valuable Offensive Lineman in 1990 and '91.

Heffner began his full-time collegiate coaching career with Illinois State as the interior defensive line coach in 1981 before taking over as offensive line coach during a seven-year stay with the Redbirds.

Heffner and his wife, Nancy, have three daughters, Katie, Molly and Shelby.

#### MIKE LOCKSLEY Running Backs/Recruiting Coordinator

Mike Locksley, who took over as the Terps' recruiting coordinator this past spring, is in his second season in charge of Maryland's running backs. Last season, he tutored freshman LaMont Jordan, who broke most major Maryland freshman rushing standards on his way to finishing runner-up for ACC Rookie of the Year honors.

Bom on Christmas Day, 1969, in Washington, D.C., Locksley is a 1992 graduate of Towson University, where he was a three-year starter in the Tigers' backfield from 1988 to 1991. Locksley, who started one year at cornerback and two at safety, was named his team's defensive MVP as a senior. He finished 19th on the school's all-time tackles list. Locksley also was a member of Towson's basketball team during the 1991-92 season.

A graduate of Towson in business administration, Locksley began his coaching career overseeing special teams and defensive backs at his alma mater in 1992. He moved on to the Naval Prep Academy in Newport, R.I., where he served as defensive coordinator, defensive line coach and head track and field coach.

In 1995, Locksley was named an assistant coach at the University of the Pacific in Stockton, Calif., where he oversaw the outside linebackers and special teams. He then returned to the East Coast, accepting a position coaching the wide receivers and tight ends at Army. During his one-year stint at Army, the Cadets defeated rival Navy and appeared in the Independence Bowl. At Army, he helped develop tight end Ron Leshinski, who earned All-East honors.

Locksley and his wife, Kia, have three sons, Mike, Meiko and Kai.



#### DOUG MALLORY Defensive Backs

Doug Mallory, an honorable mention All-America safety during his playing days at Michigan, joined the Maryland coaching staff in 1997 after spending the previous three seasons coaching the defensive backs and special teams at Indiana University.

The son of former Indiana head coach Bill Mallory, Doug Mallory is in his 11th season coaching at the collegiate level. He began his coaching career in 1988 as a graduate assistant at Indiana before taking an assistant coaching job for one season (1989) at Army. He then moved on to Western Kentucky for a four-year stay, spending his last two seasons as defensive coordinator. Under his guidance, the Hilltoppers' defense finished 18th nationally in final statistical rankings in 1993.

As a player, Mallory totaled 182 tackles and six interceptions at Michigan during his four-year career. The Wolverines played in four major bowl games — the Sugar, Holiday, Fiesta and Rose — and shared the 1986 Big Ten championship during his five-year stay. 

#### WALLY AKE Defensive Coordinator Inside Linebackers

Wally Ake, who has been a part of 12 bowl teams during an 18-year major college coaching career, is in his second season as the Terps' defensive coordinator. Ake, who handled defensive ends last season, is overseeing the inside linebackers in 1998.

Ake joined Ron Vanderlinden's staff in 1997 after a three-year stint as defensive coordinator at Rice University where he helped lead the Owls to a 7-4 record and a second-place Western Athletic Conference Mountain Division finish in 1996. In 1994, Rice's defensive unit finished among the nation's top 25 in four categories as the Owls captured a share of the Southwest Conference title. In addition to coordinating Rice's defense from 1994 to 1996, he coached the Owls' defensive line (1996) and the inside linebackers (1994 and 1995).

Ake previously worked in the Atlantic Coast Conference when he served as Clemson's inside linebackers coach from 1990 to 1993. Under Ake's defensive leadership, the Tigers participated in the 1993 Peach Bowl, the 1991 Citrus Bowl and the 1990 Hall of Fame Bowl. Clemson's 1990 squad ranked first in the nation in total defense, while the 1991 team was ranked No. 1 against the rush.

Prior to his stint at Clemson, Ake spent six years on the coaching staff at University of Arkansas, where he coached the defensive line from 1984 to 1988 and the line-backers in 1989. During his time in Fayette-ville, the Razorbacks captured two consecutive Southwest Conference titles (1988)

and 1989) and played in bowl games all six seasons, including the Orange Bowl (1986) and the Cotton Bowl (1988 and 1989).

He and his wife, Chris, have one son, Aaron.

#### CRAIG JOHNSON Offensive Coordinator Ouarterbacks

Craig Johnson, who coached alongside Ron Vanderlinden during the resurgence of Northwestern's football program, is in his second season as the Terps' offensive coordinator and quarterbacks coach.

A former starting quarterback at the University of Wyoming, Johnson last year tutored Brian Cummings, whose completion percentage (60.4%) was the seventh-best in University of Maryland history. At Northwestern, he oversaw the Wildcat quarterbacks for five seasons, including quarterback Steve Schnur, who was the Big Ten's pass efficiency champion in 1996, and Len Williams, who finished his career as the fifthleading passer in conference history. All told, he coached three Wildcat quarterbacks to All-Big Ten honors in five seasons.

Johnson has coached on four teams that advanced to bowl games, including Northwestern squads that played in the 1996 Rose and 1997 Citrus bowls. He also coached in the 1985 Peach Bowl while at Army and the 1984 Liberty Bowl while at Arkansas.

Prior to his stint at Northwestern, Johnson served as offensive coordinator and quarterbacks coach for three seasons (1989-91) at Virginia Military Institute. During that time, the VMI offense ranked fifth nationally in total offense in 1990 and first

nationally in rushing offense in 1991. VMI's quarterback, Tony Scales, ended his career as the second-leading rusher among quarterbacks in Division I-AA history.

Johnson and his wife, Darlene, have two daughters, Shelby and Sydney.

#### RUBIN CARTER Defensive Line

Former NFL lineman Rubin Carter, who played for the Denver Broncos from 1975 to 1986, is in his second season as Maryland's defensive line coach. Carter joined the Terrapins' staff in 1997 after spending the previous two seasons in a similar capacity at San Jose State under John Ralston.

A prototype nose tackle during a long and successful career in the National Football League, Carter was a durable pro who appeared in 166 games over the course of his 12-year NFL career. At the time of his retirement, he played in more games (152) at nose tackle than any other NFL player in history, and his 166 games played tied for the fifth most in team history. He totaled 1,036 tackles, including 33 sacks, during his professional career. Carter, who was featured on the cover of Sports Illustrated in 1977, missed just two games from 1975 to 1985, a remarkable achievement for a nose tackle.

After retiring from pro football in 1986, Carter remained in the Broncos organization as a defensive line coach from 1987 to 1989, where he tutored four All-Pro defensive linemen: Simon Fletcher, Rulon Jones, Karl Mecklenburg and Greg Kragen. He was a part of three Super Bowl teams while with Denver — as a coach in Super Bowl XXIV and as a player in Super Bowls XXI and XII.







#### PROPECIA\*\* is for use by MEN ONLY.

Please read this leaflet before you start taking PROPECIA. Also, read the information included with PROPECIA each time you renew your prescription, just in case anything has changed. Remember, this leaflet does not take the place of careful discussions with your doctor. You and your doctor should discuss PROPECIA when you start taking your medication and at regular checkups.

#### What is PROPECIA used for?

PROPECIA is used for the treatment of male pattern hair loss on the vertex and the anterior mid-scalp area,

#### What is male pattern hair loss?

Male pattern hair loss is a common condition in which men experience thinning of the hair on the scalp. Often, this results in a receding hairline and/or balding on the top of the head. These changes typically begin gradually in men in their 20s.

Doctors believe male pattern hair loss is due to heredity and is dependent on hormonal effects. Doctors refer to this type of hair loss as androgenetic alonecia.

#### Results of clinical studies:

For 12 months, doctors studied over 1800 men aged 18 to 41 with mild to moderate amounts of ongoing hair loss. All men, whether receiving PROPECIA or placebo (a pill containing no medication) were given a medicated shampoo (Neutrogena T/Gel\*\*\*\* Shampoo). Of these men, approximately 1200 with hair loss at the top of the head were studied for an additional 12 months. In general, men who took PROPECIA maintained or increased the number of visible scalp hairs and noticed improvement in their hair in the first year, with the effect maintained in the second year. Hair counts in men who did not take PROPECIA continued to decrease.

In one study, patients were questioned on the growth of body hair. PROPECIA did not appear to affect hair in places other than the scalp.

#### Will PROPECIA work for me?

For most men, PROPECIA increases the number of scalp hairs, helping to fill in thin or balding areas of the scalp. Men taking PROPECIA noted a slowing of hair loss during two years of use. Although results will vary, generally you will not be able to grow back all of the hair you have lost. There is not sufficient evidence that PROPECIA works in the treatment of receding hairline in the temporal area on both sides of the head.

Male pattern hair loss occurs gradually over time. On average. healthy hair grows only about half an inch each month. Therefore, it will take time to see any effect.

You may need to take PROPECIA daily for three months or more before you see a benefit from taking PROPECIA. PROPECIA can only work over the long term if you continue taking it. If the drug has not worked for you in twelve months, further treatment is unlikely to be of benefit. If you stop taking PROPECIA, you will likely lose the hair you have gained within 12 months of stopping treatment. You should discuss this with your doctor.

#### How should I take PROPECIA?

Follow your doctor's instructions.

- Take one tablet by mouth each day.
- You may take PROPECIA with or without food.
- If you forget to take PROPECIA, do not take an extra tablet. Just take the next tablet as usual.

PROPECIA will not work faster or better if you take it more than once a day.

If a woman who is pregnant with a male baby absorbs the active ingredient in PROPECIA, either by swallowing or through the skin, it may cause abnormalities of a male baby's sex organs. If a woman who is pregnant comes into contact with the active ingredient in PROPECIA, a doctor should be consulted. PROPECIA tablets are coated and will prevent contact with the active ingredient during normal handling, provided that the tablets are not broken or crushed.

#### What are the possible side effects of PROPECIA?

Like all prescription products, PROPECIA may cause side effects. In clinical studies, side effects from PROPECIA were uncommon and did not affect most men. A small number of men experienced certain sexual side effects. These men reported one or more of the following: less desire for sex; difficulty in achieving an erection; and, a decrease in the amount of semen. Each of these side effects occurred in less than 2% of men. These side effects went away in men who stopped taking PROPECIA. They also disappeared in most men who continued taking

The active ingredient in PROPECIA is also used by older men at a fivetimes higher dose to treat enlargement of the prostate. Some of these men reported other side effects, including problems with ejaculation, breast swelling and/or tenderness and allergic reactions such as lip swelling and rash. In clinical studies with PROPECIA, these side effects occurred as often in men taking placebo as in those taking PROPECIA.

Tell your doctor promptly about these or any other unusual effects.

■ PROPECIA can affect a blood test called PSA (Prostate-Specific Antigen) for the screening of prostate cancer. If you have a PSA test done, you should tell your doctor that you are taking PROPECIA.

#### Storage and handling.

Keep PROPECIA in the original container and keep the container closed. Store it in a dry place at room temperature, PROPECIA tablets are coated and will prevent contact with the active ingredient during normal handling, provided that the tablets are not broken or crushed.

Do not give your PROPECIA tablets to anyone else. It has been prescribed only for you. Keep PROPECIA and all medications out of





lived a storied NFL career with the Bengals, New York Jets and most recently, the Arizona Cardinals.



#### **HE PLAYS BECAUSE HE LOVES TO PLAY**

the only reason I play it." So says University of Maryland linebacker Eric Barton who leads the Terrapins in tackles and who, with linebacking mate Kendall Ogle, is undoubtedly the heart and soul of the Terp defense.

Barton is understandably hopeful of a career in professional football. Why not? Most college players begin their careers thinking that way. A difference for Barton, though, is that he still thinks in that regard. On schedule to graduate next spring, his football aspirations are justified.

Since his earliest days playing football for the fourth grade "Steelers" in Alexandria, Va., Barton has always been among the best in his league. He was an all-everything running back and linebacker in high school, and was courted by numerous colleges including Nebraska, Virginia and Maryland. And now with the Terps, he is among a preseason list of national candidates for the Butkus Award which honors the nation's top linebacker. Even noted NFL draft guru Mel Kiper, Jr. has muttered Barton's name, mentioning him in a recent column as his pick to be the third linebacker chosen in the upcoming professional draft next spring.

So what does Barton think of the attention and the accolades?

"It's nice," he says, shrugging his shoulders. "Of course it's nice. But I have to become more of a complete player to compete in the pros. There are still some things I'd like to do here at Maryland."

Noted for his prototypical linebacker size at 6-3 and 229 lbs., Barton is regarded most highly for his speed and instincts.

He darts past oncoming blockers with reckless abandon, and handles most ball carriers or quarterbacks either by delivering a decisive blow or catching them from behind.

"I guess my speed is one of my strengths. But I know I can't rely on it all the time," said the Terp senior. "To be a more complete player, I have to learn to shed blockers better and become more physical."

Grinning, he adds, "I don't suppose I'll always be able to get around them just by being faster."

Barton credits his parents, Thomas and Christine, with influencing his life and his play most. Dating to his little league days and later at Edison High School, "they have always supported me in everything I do. They always helped me when I was down. They always told me to have fun, play your hardest, the score doesn't matter."

Well, maybe now the scores matter to Barton who patterns his play after another hugely intense linebacker, Junior Seau of the San Diego Chargers.

"I have always liked his intensity," says Barton of Seau. "He plays like he has fun out there. He's not out there just for the money. He really enjoys playing the game and he's really dominant."

Similarly, Barton contends he wouldn't play football if it weren't for his passion for the game. "Some people might play for the money, or even a chance at a scholarship in college. Not me. I play just because I love it. I wouldn't play the game if I didn't."

He has always loved it, even during his freshman season at Maryland when. he concedes, for the first time in his life he was concerned at not being one of the best.
