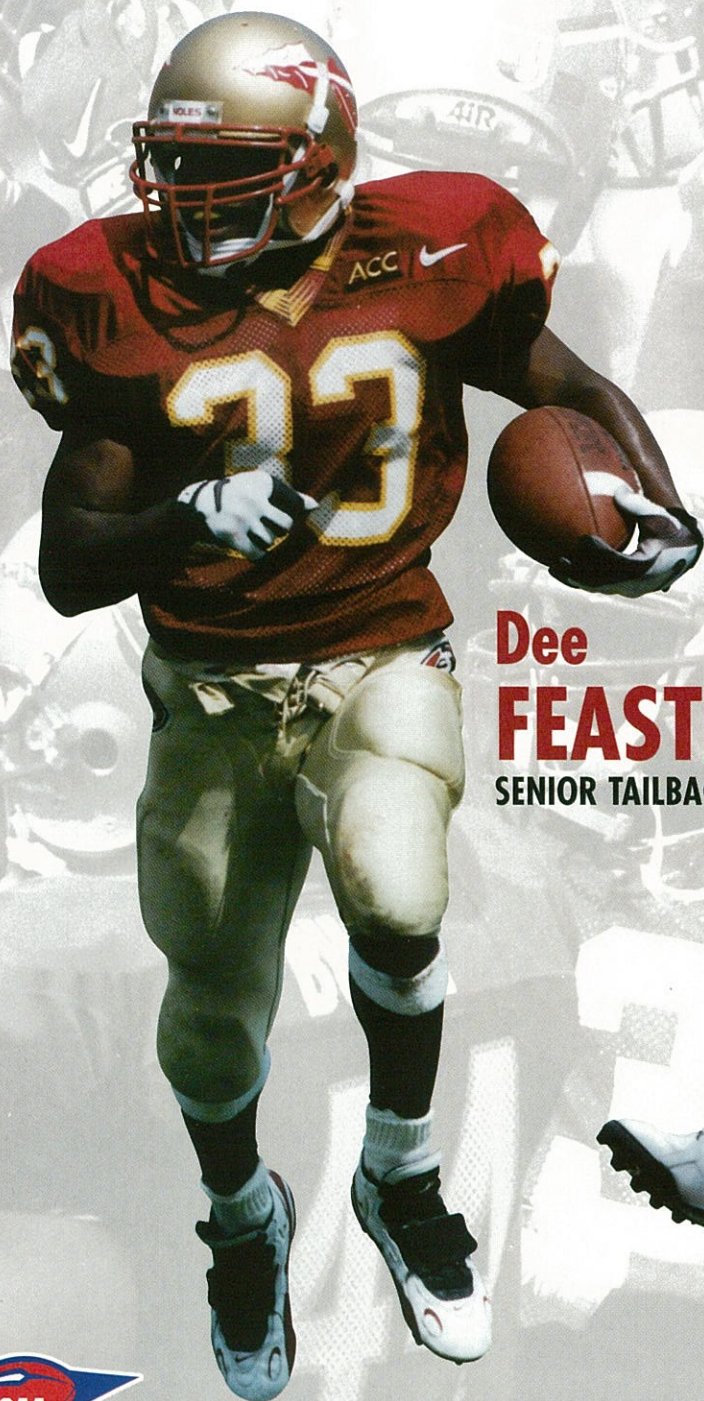


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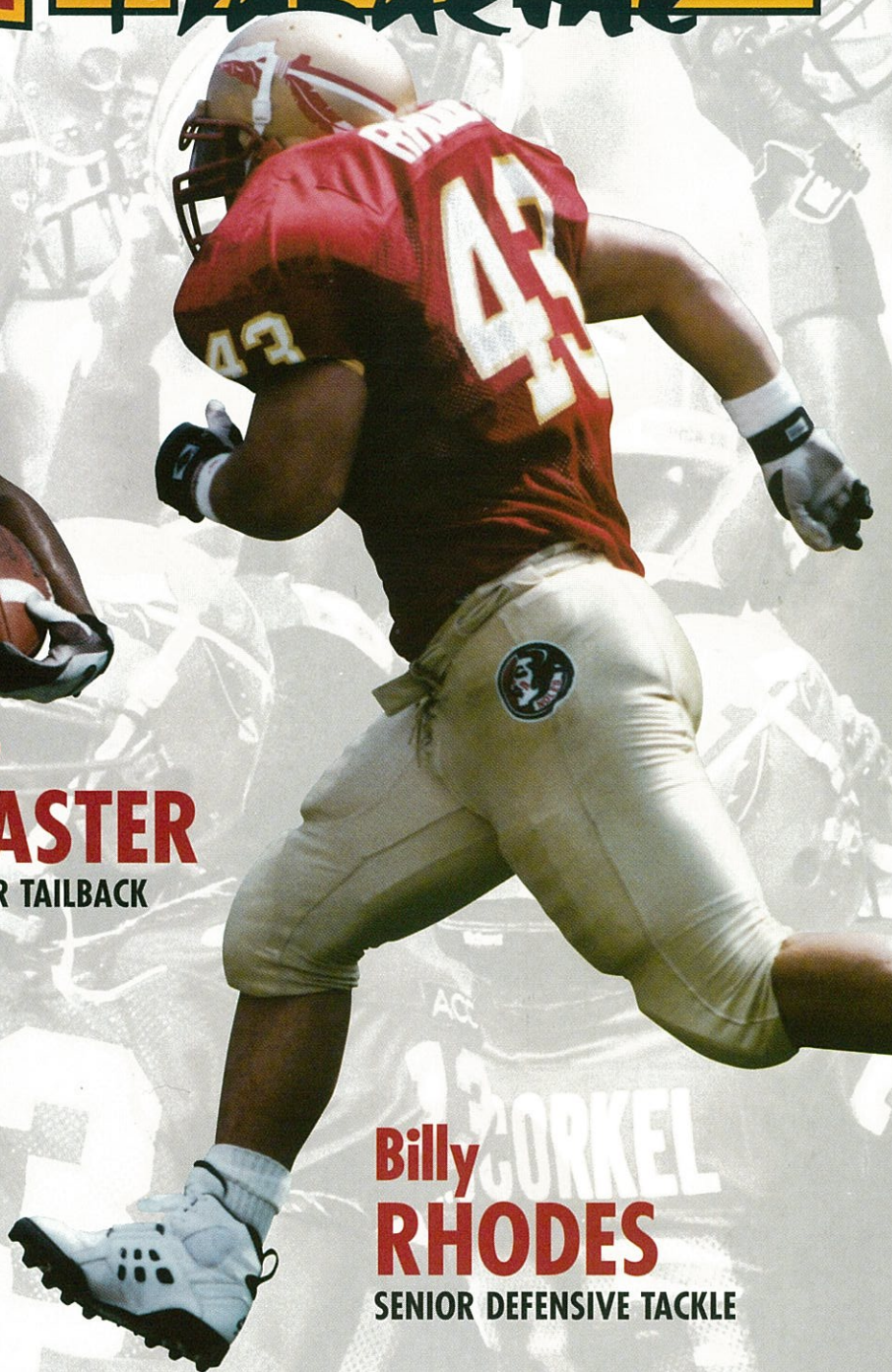

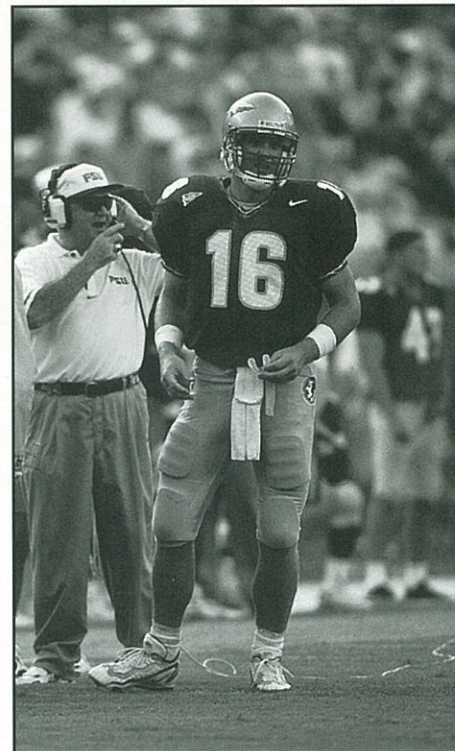

Q&A WITH DEE FEASTER

Dee Feaster came to Florida State in the fall of 1995 from Rock Hill, S.C. He has contributed in several areas during his time at FSU and currently leads the ACC in punt returns. Chris Walker of the Florida State sports information office sat down with Feaster to look back on his career as a Seminole.

What made you decide to come to Florida State while you were being recruited?

I was always a Florida State fan growing up. I would watch FSU on TV all the time and I fell in love with the way the defense played. On TV, the atmosphere of home games looked really exciting. I came on my official visit for the Florida game in 1994 and the atmosphere was unbelievable. I really wanted to be a part of that. Then when we got down 24-3, then 31-3, I was saying to myself, "Do I really want to come here?" (Laughing). When we came back in the fourth quarter that sealed it for me. It said a lot about Florida State. That they would not quit or give up and I thought I would fit in. I also got along really well with the players on my visit.

What is something that most Florida State fans don't know about you?

I am extremely shy. I have always been that way my whole life. I don't know why, but I am. I have gotten better about it since coming to FSU.

What is it like to play for a legend like Coach Bowden?

Coach Bowden is a special man. All the good things that people say about him are true. He is so genuine. My high school coach, Jimmy Wallace, was a legendary high school coach in South Carolina. Playing for Coach Bowden is kind of like that but on a much bigger scale. Both of those men treated their players well and treated them like people and not just athletes.

Describe your position coach, Billy Sexton.

(Laughing) He is certainly excitable. He is fun to play for because of his expectations. He expects great things of his players and that gives them confidence. You can't argue with his track record of all the great players he has helped produce. Another thing about Coach Sexton is that he gets his players to improve. When I came here, I was a terrible blocker. I have improved a lot in that area and am now a decent blocker.

What is one game in your career that stands out in your mind?

The one game that stands out to me was

our game with Clemson in 1996. I was knocked out of the game on a punt return early in the game, but I came back and returned a punt for a touchdown. It was special because it was against Clemson but it also showed that I am a tough person and I can overcome things.

What is it like to return punts and describe the process of a run back?

It is an extreme feeling. You are back there all alone with 11 guys trying to come get you. We usually call the return to a particular side. The most important thing is to catch the ball whether you are going to run it back or fair catch it. If you let it bounce, you can lose a lot of yardage and the coaches will get on you. I usually take a look at the defense right before I catch the ball and try to make the first man miss. If you can get by him and get to your wall, you have a chance to make a lot of yards.

What will you miss most when your playing days are over?

I will really miss the friendships on the team and the fans in Doak Campbell Stadium. I have met a lot of great guys on our team. Our fans are also great. They have really stood behind me and the team during my time here.

What will it take to get back into the national championship hunt?

We need to take care of ourselves first and foremost. We have to win the rest of our games. After that,

fate will have a lot to do with it. We need a couple of teams in front of us to slip up. If that happens and we take care of our business, we can get back up there.

What do you want to be doing 10 years from now?

Man, I'll be 32 years old. That is hard to imagine (Laughing). Really though, I think I would like to own my own business. Maybe a sporting goods store. Whatever I am doing though, I want to take time to help kids. I am really appreciative of the adults who helped me when I was growing up and I would like to do that for kids when I get older.

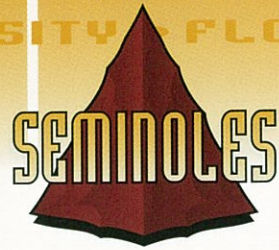

Are You Drinking Enough?

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Q&A WITH BILLY RHODES

Senior defensive tackle Billy Rhodes has been through a lot of changes since he came to Florida State in the fall of 1994. He entered the FSU football program as a walk-on and has earned a scholarship. He began playing on the defensive line, was switched to offensive line, then to fullback and now back to the defensive line again. Craig O'Halloran of the Florida State sports information office sat down with Rhodes to reflect on his family, his time in Tallahassee and much more.



The versatile Billy Rhodes has changed positions three times in the last year.

What was the biggest reason you chose Florida State University?

The biggest reason was that my dad played here. He told me that he had such a great time playing football and going to school here. I remember sitting down each Saturday and watching FSU on the television ever since I was 7 or 8 years old playing Pop Warner football.

How big has the adjustment been moving from defense to offense and now back to defense?

The biggest problem playing defense is the stamina. Defensive line is much harder than playing any of the offensive positions. For example, while playing fullback, the biggest guy that I would have to go against is maybe 240 pounds, while playing defensive line it is common to go against 300-pound guys all day long. Defensive line is one of the most physically challenging positions, along with quarterback and linebackers. There are so many things that we have to look for as far as technique is concerned. When I switched back, the technique came to me real quick. We are running a few different things from last year, but the base of the defense is the same.

Do you have any preference as to which position that you like to play?

While playing fullback, it is you against your opponent one-on-one. When playing defensive line, something happens because it is a couple of you working as a group. It seems like you have a teammate on defense that you are working with and you have to collaborate with each other to make the play.

What did your father tell you when you decided to go to Florida State?

He told me to always remember my upbringing. Never sacrifice what you stand for. It was even better with my situation, because my dad went through the same thing that I am going through right now. He has lived the same situation, dealing with the pressures and demands of playing football and going to school. He knows all about the fish bowl effect that happens to student-athletes, where you can't get away from anything.

Talk about the relationship that you have with your brother (Bobby, an FSU linebacker)?

It has grown ever since we started playing football at FSU. We talk in practice about what we are doing wrong. He sees a lot of what I am doing because he is playing right behind me. I knew that he had the ability to play all along. Bobby is a tough kid and he is a completely different person since he walked on campus here. He was never fully developed when he left high school and that hurt him.

Away from the field, what do you like to do in your spare time?

I am executive chaplain of the Sigma Alpha Epsilon fraternity house. I try to help people with their problems and their belief in God. They can turn to me with their struggles and I do my best to help them. On a lighter note, I am a big time hunter. It has always been a family thing and it keeps my sanity. It is a chance to get away from everything and just relax. It is

just you and nature and nobody to bother you. You don't have to worry about a thing.

Being named captain, do you consider yourself a leader on this year's very young team? If so, are you vocal or do you lead by example?

I consider myself a leader. I have always considered myself a leader, but captain gives you a title of recognition. It makes me feel a lot better knowing that somebody has recognized how hard I work and try to be a leader. At least, I am not going unnoticed.

What will you remember most from your playing days at FSU?

I think that it will be the Florida game at the end of this season. I think that every player remembers their last game in Doak Campbell Stadium. I plan to make my last game a good one and something to remember for a long time.

What are some of the things that you do in your pregame preparation?

Every Saturday I wake up and watch ESPN Outdoors. No matter where we are playing, I have to watch it. It is usually on until 11 a.m. I also like to watch other football games before we go to the stadium. I always go to chapel before the game. I also always wear black eye paint regardless if it is a night or day game. It started after the loss to NC State this year.

What is something that FSU fans don't know about you?

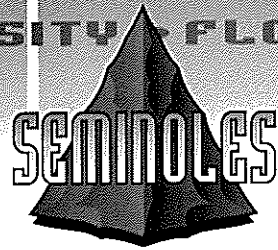
I am very religious in my beliefs. I was born and raised that way and I am very proud of that. There are many tough challenges that each athlete faces in college football. You can rely on the Lord with your troubles.

What would you like to do after leaving FSU?

I would like the opportunity to play at the next level. Possibly as a blocking fullback. I am not really worried about the future, but rather what I can do to make this team better and to accomplish our goals. I am getting my degree in political science and that is something that I can fall back on.

GAME NOTES

WEINKE TOPS WARD'S RECORD

Quarterback Chris Weinke has thrown 175 passes (six games) without an interception since the NC State loss. Heisman Trophy winner Charlie Ward put together a similar run during the 1993 national championship season. Ward had 160 attempts without an interception with 1,278 yards and 11 touchdowns during his streak. Weinke passed Ward's record total during the Georgia Tech game for attempts without an interception and has currently thrown 175 passes without a pick for 1,556 yards and 14 touchdowns. Ward's only edge is in the completion category (110 to 92).

STEPPING IT UP IN THE SECOND HALF

Florida State has outscored its 1998 opponents by a margin of 139-28 in the

second half, including an 80-10 total in the third quarter. The Seminoles own a 115-64 scoring edge in the first half this season. Over the last two games, the FSU defense has given up just one score (first quarter TD vs. Georgia Tech) while the offense has piled up 82 points (51 in the second half).

MAKING THE MOST OF LIMITED OPPORTUNITIES

The Florida State offense had the ball for only 10 drives in the Georgia Tech game (not including the end of each half) and scored on six of those. They scored on each of their last four drives with three touchdowns and a field goal. Of the four drives that resulted in a punt, three were stalled by either long penalties or sacks.

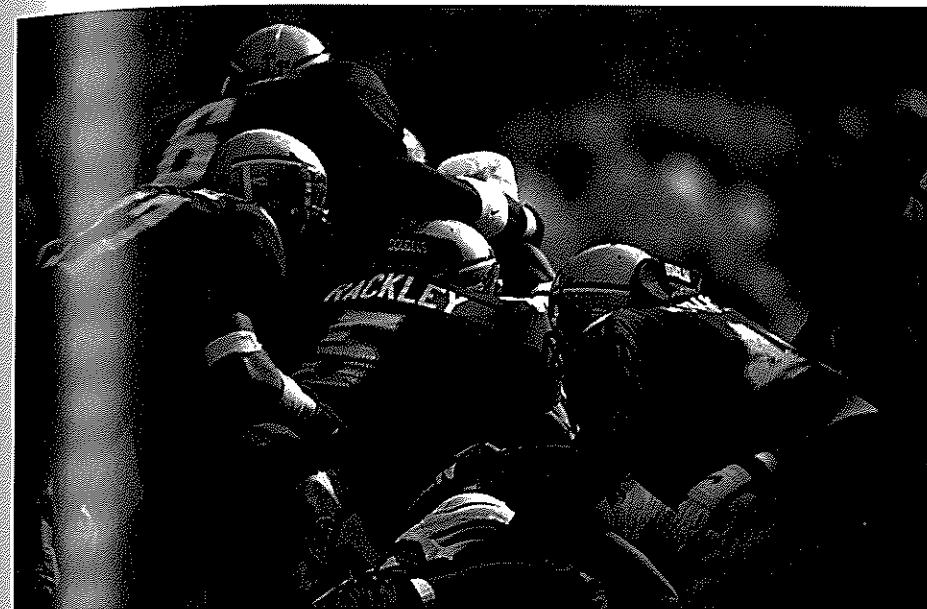
EDWARDS IS ONLY SEMINOLE TO SCORE TD VS. UNC

Junior cornerback Mario Edwards is the

only player on this year's FSU roster to score a TD in previous games against the Tar Heels. Edwards blocked a punt and scored from 24 yards out in 1995. Since no current offensive player has ever scored a touchdown against North Carolina, place-kicker Sebastian Janikowski is the only other Seminole to put points on the board in the series.

WARRICK DOES IT ALL

The Seminole coaching staff is finding as many ways possible to get playmaker Peter Warrick the ball. Against Georgia Tech, Warrick scored the Tribe's first three touchdowns with two on passes from Chris Weinke and the other on a 16-yard reverse. Warrick finished the day with six catches for 82 yards, three rushes for 24 yards and two punt returns for 20 yards. On the season, the junior is averaging more than 140 all-purpose yards per game and has a total of 10 touchdowns.



The Seminole defense leads the ACC in four categories — total defense, rushing defense, passing efficiency defense and scoring defense.

BLOCK PARTY

Over the last three seasons, Florida State has had great success in blocking kicks against North Carolina. The Seminole special teams have recorded seven blocks in that span (five punts, one field goal, one extra point). Dexter Jackson has three of those with two blocked punts in 1996 and a blocked extra point in '95.

THE SERIES WITH NORTH CAROLINA

Florida State enters tonight's game with North Carolina leading the all-time series 8-0-1. The only blemish on FSU's otherwise perfect series resume came in 1986 when the two schools played to a 10-10 tie in Doak Campbell Stadium. The Seminoles have won six in a row against the Tar Heels after that game, all since 1992 when Florida State joined the Atlantic Coast Conference. In its six-game winning streak against North Carolina, FSU has outscored the Heels by an average margin of 26.8-8.8.

DEFENSE HAS BEEN SOLID AGAINST THE HEELS

Florida State's defense has not allowed a touchdown in its last two meetings with North Carolina. The Seminoles shut out UNC 13-0 in Tallahassee in 1996 and turned back the Heels 20-3 last season in Chapel Hill. FSU has held North Carolina

to just 260 total yards the last two seasons, an average of 130 per contest.

20TH ANNIVERSARY OF CHIEF OSCEOLA AND RENEGADE

In honor of the 20th anniversary of Chief Osceola and Renegade, six former riders will participate by playing the part of Osceola for a game. Tonight's rider is Jeff Ereckson of Atlanta, Ga.

HALLOWEEN HAVOC

Tonight's game marks the sixth time that Florida State has played on Halloween. The Seminoles are 4-1 in their previous five trick-or-treat night contests and 3-0 under Bobby Bowden. The last time FSU played on Halloween was in 1992 when the Tribe won 13-3 at Virginia.

HOME SWEET DOAK

Florida State enters tonight's contest with a 37-game unbeaten streak in Doak Campbell Stadium and has won 20 straight contests in its home facility. The Seminoles last loss in Doak was a 17-16 setback in the 1991 home finale against Miami.

AGAINST THE BEST

The Seminoles are 55-61-4 against teams ranked in the Associated Press Top 25. FSU

is 31-10-1 (.764) against the AP Top 25 in the 1990s. The Seminoles have defeated three top-20 teams so far this season — then No. 15 Texas A&M, No. 18 Southern California and No. 20 Georgia Tech.

RACKING UP THE YARDS

With his 208-yard passing performance against Georgia Tech, Chris Weinke is the only quarterback in the ACC to throw for 200 yards or more in every game this season. The FSU record for consecutive 200-yard passing games is 11 by Gary Huff (1971-72). The record for the most in a season is nine by Charlie Ward ('93), Peter Tom Willis ('89) and Gary Huff ('72).

ON THE TUBE

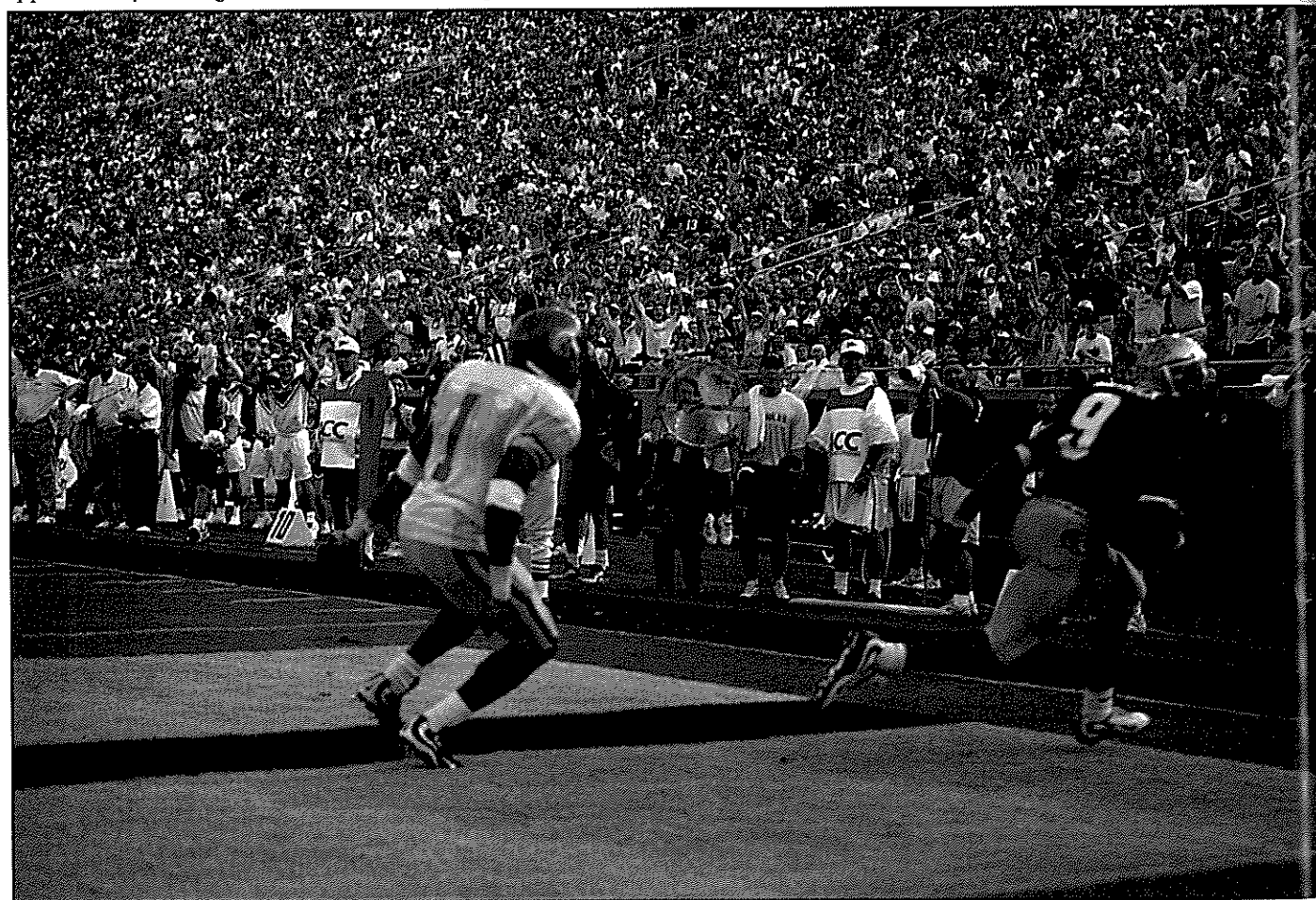
Florida State is 25-4 when televised by ESPN. The North Carolina game will be FSU's third nationally televised game in a row and the fourth of the season. The Tribe is 62-27-4 when playing on national television.

STOPPING THE PASS

Florida State has now held four of its first eight opponents to fewer than 100 yards passing this season. The Seminoles have held five of the last six opposing quarterbacks to under a 50 percent completion rate with the exception being Georgia Tech last week. Last year's dominating defense held just two of 12 opponents to less than 100 yards passing and gave up an average of 189.5 yards per game. This year's unit is allowing only 119.1 yards per game through the air.

KICKING IT

Place-kicker Sebastian Janikowski tied an FSU record with five field goals, in six attempts, in the win over Maryland. The sophomore leads the nation in field goals per game with an average of 2.3 after booting two field goals against Georgia Tech last week. In the Maryland game, he matched Bill Capece's record set on Oct. 11, 1980, against Pittsburgh. Janikowski is now 18-of-22 on the season on field goal attempts. He needs just five more three-pointers to tie the Florida State season record of 23 set by Derek Schmidt in 1987. His 53-yard field goal against Clemson was a season long. Additionally, Janikowski has put 30-of-51 (58.8 percent) kickoffs in the end zone for touchbacks this season.

Perspectives from the past and present

GRETA BAHN — SOFTBALL PLAYER 1982-86

What it meant to be a Lady Seminole ...

As far as being a Lady Seminole, I came into a program that had just won a national championship and had a lot of positive things that went behind it. I was really happy to be able to play for a program like that and there was a certain prestige that went along with it.

How the experience at FSU prepared her for life ...

What it means to be a Lady Seminole ...

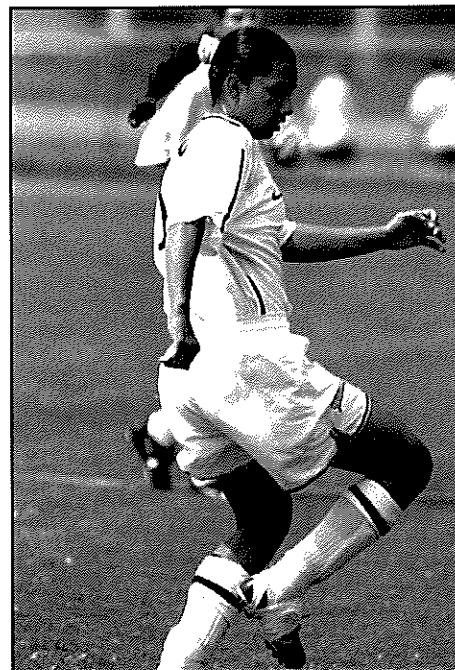

What it meant to be a Lady Seminole and to now coach them ...

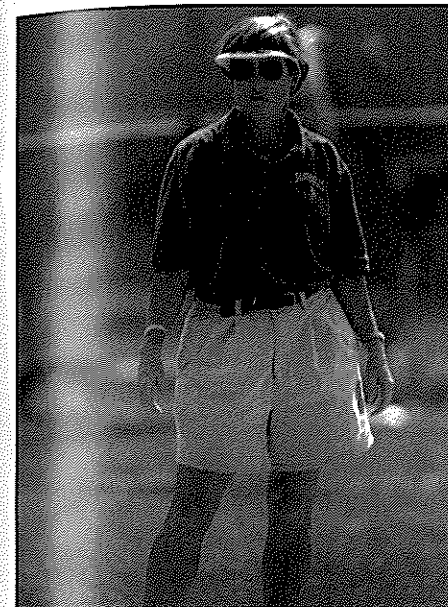

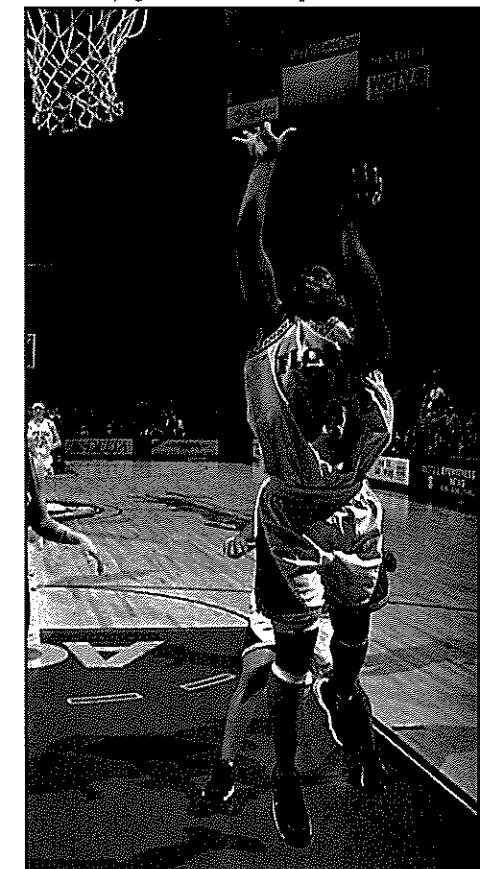
with traveling and keeping up with your studies. It's a hard job and requires a lot of discipline.

One of her funny memories at FSU ...

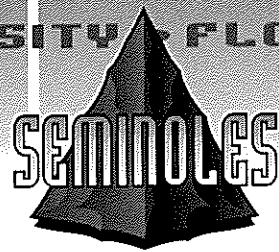

FALL SPORTS UPDATE

Seminole teams open '98-99 with success

The 1998-99 academic year is under way and several Florida State athletic teams have begun their seasons. Here is an update on how each of those fall sports teams have fared to this point in the year.

VOLLEYBALL

The Florida State volleyball team was the preseason choice to win the Atlantic Coast Conference and the Lady Seminoles are right in the thick of the conference race. Just past the midway point in the season and entering the weekend, FSU owns a 17-7 record, including a 7-3 mark in ACC play that leaves them a game out of first place in the league.

The Lady Seminoles have peaked in the AVCA Coaches Poll with a No. 19 national ranking. Florida State has also won a pair of tournaments — its own Florida State Classic and the South Florida Classic hosted by the University of South Florida.

Individually, Jennifer Weerick and Aisha Thornton have each earned ACC Player of the Week honors while Norisha Campbell has earned ACC Rookie of the Week honors.

Thornton and Susan Hawks are first and second on the team in both hitting percentage and total blocks.

Entering the weekend, Florida State is a perfect 10-0 in Tully Gym and has swept eight of its 10 opponents.

COACH CECILE REYNAUD SAYS:

"I really think we are heading in the right direction. I thought we really played well early in the season then slipped a little bit at the start of the conference schedule. We are starting to get back on track for the stretch run."

SOCCER

The Seminole soccer team is 6-9-2 entering the final week of the regular season. The highlight of the season has been the program's move into the brand new Seminole Soccer/Softball Complex. In its first game there, FSU almost pulled off its biggest win in the program's four seasons. The Seminoles led No. 6 Virginia late in regulation but lost 4-3 in overtime.

Freshman Maren Vik Edvardsen leads FSU in scoring with seven goals while sophomore April Murphy has found the

back of the net four times. Vik Edvardsen set Florida State records in her first collegiate game with four goals and eight points.

"Our program is making strides. We

have been competitive against some of the best teams in the country."

CROSS COUNTRY

The highlight of both the men's and women's cross country seasons to this point

was Florida State's victories in the Seminole Invitational on Oct. 12. The FSU women finished first, besting nine other teams, while the men topped 12 squads to win. Additionally, both the men and women posted top 10 finishes at the Auburn Invitational a week later.

Senior Aaron Scheer has been the men's top runner, winning ACC Performer of the Week following the Seminole Invitational, while sophomore Cynthia Campbell has led the women. The ACC Championships are Monday in Charlottesville, Va.

COACH SCOTT IRVING SAYS:

"Both of our teams have made a tremendous amount of progress. We have really improved from the start of the season. I am really looking forward to see how we fare at the ACC Championships."

GOLF

The Florida State women's golf team is off to a solid start this season. FSU has a pair of second-place finishes in their two starts this season. Amy Bond has led the women individually with a ninth-place finish at the Lady Seminole Invitational and a sixth-place finish at the Auburn Invitational. Bond leads FSU with a 72.8 stroke average. Amy Spooner, coming off of a victory in the U.S. Amateur Public Links Championship last summer in Kapalua, Hawaii, is second on the team with a 74.2 stroke average.

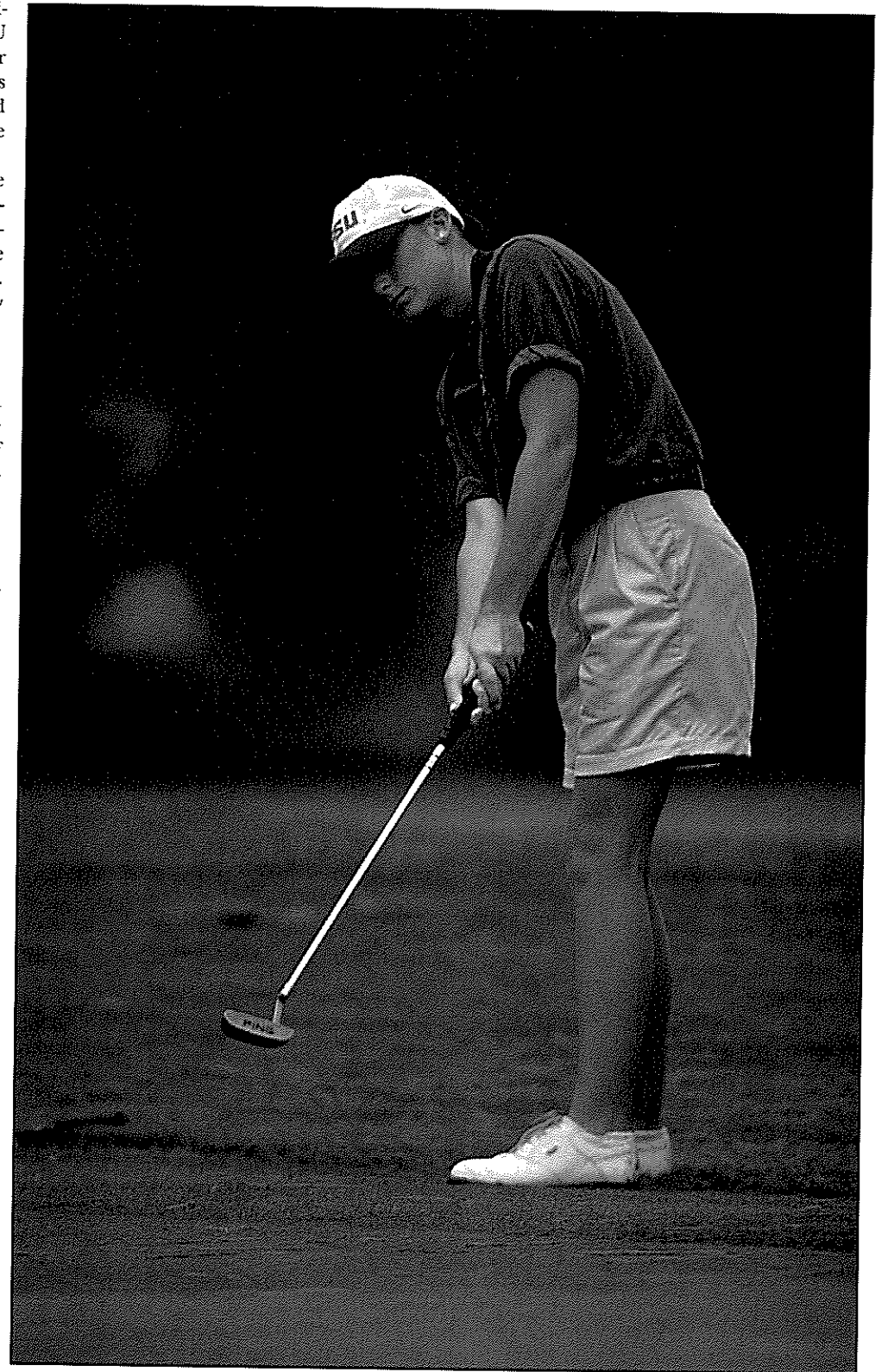

"We have a very young team but we have a lot of ability. I am looking forward to these guys putting it together throughout the year."



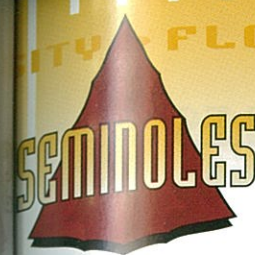
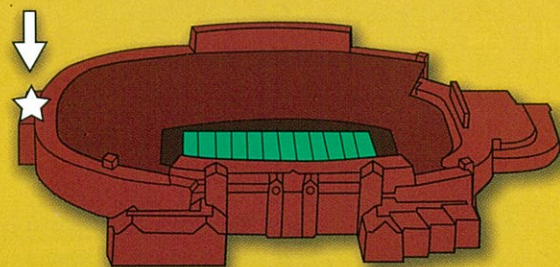
