

GAME PREVIEW

OKLAHOMA VS. FLORIDA STATE

Two of the country's best offenses will square off in the Cheez-It Bowl when Oklahoma plays Florida State at Camping World Stadium. This will be the seventh meeting between the two historic programs, with Oklahoma holding a 6-1 advantage in the series. In the last matchup, in 2011, the Sooners defeated the Seminoles 23-13 in Tallahassee. Florida State won the first game, the 1965 Gator Bowl, 36-19. The Sooners have also picked up three wins in the Orange Bowl, with the third coming in the 2001 BCS Championship game.

Oklahoma will be making its 56th bowl appearance in program history, the 4th-most of any school in the nation, and the 24th in a row. Oklahoma's previous trips to Orlando came in the 2014 Russell Athletic (now Cheez-It) Bowl and the 1989 Citrus Bowl, both against Clemson. With a 31-23-1 all-time bowl game record, Oklahoma has won its last two bowl games. From 2015-19, the Sooners appeared in four out of five College Football Playoffs.


First-year coach Brent Venables returned to Oklahoma after 10 seasons at Clemson, where he served as defensive coordinator and led a top-ranked defense that won National Championships in 2016 and 2018. Venables previously coached at Oklahoma for 13 seasons in a similar capacity, winning the National Championship in 2000, the school's seventh title. His teams appeared in eight National Championship games.


The Sooners lead the Big 12 and are ranked 13th nationally in rushing, amassing 216.6 yards per game. Running back Eric Gray averaged 6.4 rushing yards per carry, currently ranked 13th in the country, and racked up 1,366 rushing yards, the ninth-best single-season total in school history. Oklahoma also ranks second in the Big 12 and 17th nationally in total offense with 472.2 yards per game. Big 12 Newcomer of the Year Dillon Gabriel leads the conference in passing yards per game with 265.9, and six of his 24 touchdown passes went to Marvin Mims Jr., who earned First Team All-Big 12 honors with 56 receptions for 1,006 yards. Offensive tackle Anton Harrison and punter Michael Turk joined Mims on the All-Big 12 First Team.

Florida State arrives in Orlando riding a five-game winning streak after a dramatic 45-38 win over Florida, the most points the Seminoles have scored on their rival since 1992. Ranked 13th in the latest College Football Playoff poll, Florida State has a 29-17-2 bowl record and has won eight of their last 11. The Seminoles last played in the Cheez-It Bowl (then the Champs Sports Bowl) in 2011, defeating Notre Dame. Florida State also played in the 2008 Champs Sports Bowl, the 1990 Blockbuster Bowl, the 1984 Citrus Bowl, and the 1977 Tangerine Bowl. The Seminoles are 15-5-2 in bowl games played in their home state.

Under third-year coach Mike Norvell, Florida State is one of only three teams in the country to average over 250 passing yards and 210 rushing yards per game. The Seminoles lead the nation with 88 plays over 20 yards and are second in the nation with seven touchdown drives over 90 yards and 15 touchdown drives over 80 yards. In addition to possessing the country's fourth-best third-down conversion rate (51.9 percent), the Seminoles also rank third nationally with 158.9 passing yards allowed per game. Including his four seasons at Memphis, Norvell's teams averaged 37.7 points per game from 2016-2021, the 3rd-highest in the country. This season, FSU is averaging 36.2 points per game, 17th in the nation.

Running behind 2022 Wuerffel Trophy winner and First Team All-ACC guard Dillan Gibbons, Trey Benson rushed for 965 yards on the season, an FSU top-20 single-season total, and his 6.84 yards per carry ranks fifth in the country. Quarterback Jordan Travis has 22 passing touchdowns, seven rushing touchdowns, and one receiving touchdown, which makes him the fourth FSU quarterback to account for 30 touchdowns; the others were all Heisman Trophy winners. His career 43 passing and 24 rushing touchdowns makes him the only FSU player to rank in the Top 10 in both categories. The Florida State defense is led by two-time First Team All-ACC safety Jammie Robinson, First Team All-ACC defensive end Jared Verse, and ACC Defensive Rookie of the Year Patrick Payton.

GAME HISTORY

YEAR BY YEAR

Originally titled the Blockbuster Bowl, the Cheez-It Bowl was born in Miami in 1990 and thrived in its first year with a marquee matchup between Penn State and Florida State that drew more than 74,000 fans. Over the next 11 years, however, the game's attendance dwindled, and it became apparent that the game would not survive in South Florida.

Sensing a unique opportunity to bring a second bowl game to Orlando, former Florida Citrus Sports executive director Chuck Rohe and the Board of Directors initiated a process of obtaining the bowl's certification. The first Orlando game, played in 2001, was called the Tangerine Bowl, a tribute to the name of Camping World Stadium's original bowl game (now the Vrbo Citrus Bowl).

With each successive year in Orlando, the bowl has continued to make strides, at one point posting eight consecutive years of attendance increases (a standing record among bowl games). That growth reached a crescendo in 2011, when Florida State and Notre Dame played before a sold-out crowd of 68,305. Over the past 10 years, the bowl has averaged nearly 50,000 fans per game.

The game's place in the postseason lineup has also improved significantly over its time in Orlando. In the College Football Playoff era, the bowl has matched the top selection from the ACC (inclusive of Notre Dame) outside of the CFP series against the second selection from the Big 12 outside of the CFP series.

During the summer of 2020, Kellogg's signed a multi-year agreement with Florida Citrus Sports to make Cheez-It the new title sponsor of the game.



NOTABLE GAMES



12/28/1990

1990 | Florida State vs. Penn State

In a matchup between coaching legends Bobby Bowden and Joe Paterno, Florida State quarterback Casey Weldon completed 22-of-36 passes for 248 yards to lead the Seminoles to a 24-17 win over Penn State in the inaugural Blockbuster Bowl in Miami.



12/30/1995

1995 | South Carolina vs. West Virginia


South Carolina held off West Virginia 24-21 in the 1995 Carquest Bowl, earning the first bowl win in Gamecocks program history. The Mountaineers scored with 44 seconds left in the third quarter to cut the lead to just three points, but South Carolina shut the West Virginia offense down on each of its three fourth-quarter possessions to lock down the victory.



12/20/2001

2001 | Pittsburgh vs. North Carolina State

The 2001 season marked Orlando's first as a two-bowl town, as Pittsburgh beat North Carolina State 34-19 in the Visit Florida Tangerine Bowl, the first iteration of the Cheez-It Bowl to be played in Central Florida after a decade in Miami. The Panthers were led by game MVP Antonio Bryant, who had seven catches for 101 yards and two touchdowns.



12/28/1991

1991 | Alabama vs. Colorado

The Crimson Tide topped defending AP national champion Colorado 30-25 in a game that featured seven lead changes. After falling behind 19-16 early in the third quarter, Alabama scored back-to-back touchdowns to take a 30-19 lead with 8:10 to play in the fourth. Colorado cut the lead to five with 3:30 left then took over with a chance to win with 1:49 to go, but Alabama's defense came up with a stop on fourth-and-1 at its own 33 to end the Colorado threat.



12/28/2000

2000 | North Carolina State vs. Minnesota

NC State completed the biggest comeback in bowl history, climbing out of a 24-0 second-quarter hole to top Minnesota 38-30 in the bowl's final game in Miami before relocating to Orlando. Wolfpack quarterback Philip Rivers completed 24 of 39 passes for 310 yards and two touchdowns, and Ray Robinson scored twice on the ground to lead the comeback.



12/28/2007

2007 | Boston College vs. Michigan State

Matt Ryan threw for 249 yards and three touchdowns as the Boston College defense held off a Michigan State rally in a 24-21 Champs Sports Bowl victory. After falling behind 11 midway through the fourth, the Spartans scored to cut the lead to three with 6:04 to play, but the Eagles escaped Orlando with a W.



12/29/2015

2015 | Baylor vs. North Carolina

Baylor and North Carolina combined for a bowl-record 1,243 yards of offense, including 889 rushing yards, in one of the most thrilling offensive outbursts in game history. The game rewrote the bowl record books, setting new marks for individual rushing yards (299, Johnny Jefferson, Baylor), team rushing yards (645, Baylor), individual rushing touchdowns (three by Jefferson) and combined points scored (87), among others.



12/28/2018

2018 | Syracuse vs. West Virginia

Quarterback Eric Dungey threw for 303 yards and a touchdown during an emotional final college game as Syracuse defeated West Virginia 34-18 in the 2018 game. The victory improved the Orange to 10-3 on the year - the team's first 10-win season since 2001.



12/29/2011

2011 | Florida State vs. Notre Dame

The Seminoles fell into a 14-0 hole early, but rallied for an 18-14 win over Notre Dame in front of 68,305 - the largest crowd in game history since the game moved to Orlando in 2001. The following season, Notre Dame reached the BCS national championship game, while Florida State won the Orange Bowl; the year after that, the 'Noles went undefeated and won the BCS title.



12/28/2016

2016 | Miami vs. West Virginia

Miami snapped a six-game bowl losing streak in head coach Mark Richt's first bowl game at the helm of his alma mater, defeating No. 16 West Virginia 31-14. After falling behind 7-0 in the first quarter, the Hurricanes rebounded to score the next 28 points, as game MVP Brad Kaaya threw four touchdowns to four different receivers in the win.



12/29/2021

2021 | Clemson vs. Iowa State

Clemson head coach Dabo Swinney took a Cheez-It bath at the 50 and defensive back Mario Goodrich took home the inaugural Cheez-It Bowl MVP belt after the Tigers topped Iowa State 20-13 in the cheeziest edition of the game yet!

Florida Citrus Sports – a not-for-profit event management organization – has roots dating back to 1947 with the establishment of the original Tangerine Bowl. The inaugural game was organized by Elks Lodge #1079 in an effort to benefit a local hospital for disabled children. More than 75 years later, the mission of Florida Citrus Sports has changed only in scope. The goal remains putting on the best bowl games in America while working to serve those in need in Central Florida, particularly in the neighborhoods surrounding Camping World Stadium. The organization strives to accomplish these goals through world class sporting events, including:

- the Camping World Kickoff, a neutral-site game in college football's opening weekend formed in partnership with ESPN Events. Our next Camping World Kickoff will be Labor Day Weekend 2023, when Florida State and LSU return to face off to open the fall campaign.
- · the Cheez-It Citrus Bowl, the current incarnation of that original Tangerine Bowl game, which has evolved into a New Year's Classic matching top teams from the SEC and Big Ten
- . the Cheez-It Bowl, an additional bowl game staged in Orlando since 2001, featuring the top non-College Football Playoff selection from the ACC (inclusive of Notre Dame) and the second non-CFP pick from the Big 12 in late December in one of the top matchups of the postseason
- the Florida Blue Florida Classic, an annual November showdown between in-state rivals Florida A&M University and Bethune-Cookman University that is regarded as the nation's premier HBCU football game
- · the FC Series, an international soccer festival featuring clubs from around the world

Through these events, Florida Citrus Sports strives to be an industry leader in generating economic impact and exposure, providing the best customer experience and establishing Orlando as the nation's premier neutral-site venue for sporting events.







ABOUT

CAMPING WORLD STADIUM



In 2016, Camping World became the new title sponsor of Orlando's football stadium and Florida Citrus Sports' kickoff game series. When the naming rights were announced, the landmark formerly known as the Citrus Bowl became known as Camping World Stadium thanks to an exclusive, long-term agreement. Originally constructed using a Works Progress Administration grant approved in 1940, Camping World Stadium was rebuilt into a state-of-the-art venue in 2014, capable of hosting world-class events. About 90 percent of the stadium was demolished and replaced in less than 10 months, including portions that have stood since the stadium gates first opened. Only the upper decks, which were added in 1990 and remain viable as part of a modern facility, remained. The new Camping World Stadium offers an enhanced fan experience at every level, with wider, chair-back seating, new concessions areas and restrooms, and new club and premium spaces throughout the building.

In its first year after the renovation, the stadium hosted its traditional calendar of events, including the Vrbo Citrus Bowl, the Cheez-It Bowl, the Florida Blue Florida Classic and Monster Jam. It also previously served as the home venue for Orlando City SC, which memorably kicked off its inaugural MLS season in front of a sellout crowd in 2015.

Other soccer events include international friendlies between Mexico and Costa Rica, the final stop of the United States Women's National Team's "Victory Tour" against Brazil in 2015, three Copa América matchups in 2016, Orlando's first International Champions Cup match between Tottenham Hotspur and Paris Saint-Germain in 2017 and a World Cup qualifying match between the U.S. Men's National Team and Panama.

Back on the gridiron, Camping World Stadium hosted its first NFL Pro Bowl in 2017 and is also the former home of the FHSAA state football championships and a third bowl game — the Cure Bowl — in early December. The Camping World Kickoff featured a pair of then-Top-10 teams in Florida State and Ole Miss in 2016, followed by Louisville and defending CFP national champion Alabama in 2018, and a highly anticipated game between in-state rivals Florida and Miami in 2019. The next installment in the series of kickoff games will be in 2023 when the Florida State Seminoles face the LSU Tigers.

Outside the sports world, the stadium has been the scene of many memorable entertainment events, as well, including the Rolling Stones' only Florida stop on their 2015 Zip Code tour — a return 34 years in the making after a 1981 appearance at the old Citrus Bowl — WrestleMania 33 in April 2017 and bigtime concerts that had Metallica, Jimmy Buffett, the Eagles, Jay-Z and Beyonce gracing the Camping World Stadium stage in recent years.

In 2020, Camping World Stadium received Global Biorisk Advisory Council STAR Facility Accreditation — a seal of approval affirming the venue's commitment to cleaning, safety and training.

An additional \$60 million in construction was completed before the 2021 bowl season, including new north end zone bowl seating, new restroom and concessions areas and a brand new club level.





stablished in 1890, the University of Oklahoma is the state's flagship public research university and a leader in research, health care, and creative activity impacting the state of Oklahoma, nation and world. Guided by its fundamental purpose of changing lives, OU upholds its core traditions of creating opportunity for the leaders of tomorrow, building a culture of inclusivity, and advancing society through cuttingedge research discoveries. For well over a century, generations of students have found purpose and meaning through an OU education, and Oklahomans and people across the world have benefited from the university's ingenuity and resourcefulness.

Over the last two years, the university has ambitiously pursued the fulfillment of the "Lead On, University" Strategic Plan - a comprehensive strategy that positions OU as one of the nation's leading public research universities marked by a transformative student experience. Since the Strategic Plan's unveiling in July 2020, remarkable outgrowths have been seen across the spectrum. In fall 2022, OU welcomed its largest, most diverse and highest academically qualified class in the school's 132-year history - more than a guarter of whom are first-generation college students.

Supporting Oklahoma's workforce is one of OU's key priorities in the Strategic Plan. OU announced the launch of the OU Polytechnic Institute, a new school in Tulsa with bachelor's completion and graduate degree programs. The school's cutting-edge curriculum - developed with industry partners - will focus on applied knowledge, quickly making the region a hub for growth and new jobs. OU significantly expanded the size of its Bachelor of Science in Nursing class this school year by accepting all qualified applicants, allowing more students the opportunity to pursue a nursing career and, in turn, building up the state's nursing workforce.

OU's world-class graduate-level education has been redesigned and expanded to meet the needs of adult learners at a distance without sacrificing quality. Since launching in June 2020, OU has built a portfolio of 45 professional programs focused on state and regional economic needs. What truly distinguishes OU from other online providers is the 81% term-to-term retention rate. Over 3,000 students are currently enrolled and on track to graduate.

In October 2022, OU embarked on the public phase of the largest philanthropic campaign in the history of Oklahoma higher education. With a historic goal of raising \$2 billion, "Lead On: The University of Oklahoma's Campaign for the Future" supports OU's core traditions of providing an unparalleled, affordable education; generating real-world impact through pathbreaking research and innovation; delivering world-class health care across the state; and creating a welcoming place for learning and belonging. "Lead On" is the university's first comprehensive campaign in over 20 years and comes on the heels of back-to-back record fundraising years for OU.

An abundance of other successes have come to life since the Strategic Plan's introduction two years ago - the addition of premier freshman housing, strategic research growth, the merger of OU Health, joining the SEC, and more. Altogether, these endeavors are sparking a new era of excellence at OU.

place where excellence is the norm, the University of Oklahoma has won 41 national championships after women's gymnastics won its fifth last March and softball won its sixth in June. That extended a streak of eight consecutive years with at least one team national title (excluding the COVID-canceled spring 2020 season).

Under the leadership of Joe Castiglione, more than half of the Sooners' team national championships (22 of 41) have come during the tenure of the 25th-year OU athletics director. The Sooners have won 15 national titles over the last 10 years (five each in softball and women's gymnastics, four in men's gymnastics and one in men's golf).

OU's three 2016 NCAA titles (men's gymnastics, women's gymnastics and softball) were claimed in a span of 53 days. It marked the first time in school history that the Sooners had won three team national championships in the same semester. Oklahoma bettered the feat in 2017 with four national titles in 52 days – women's gymnastics, men's gymnastics, men's golf and softball.

The environment of excellence and its consistent nature created at Oklahoma has caught the attention of the sports world. OU's 2015-16 athletics program was named the best in the nation by CBS Sports.

The Learfield Director's Cup recognizes overall program excellence in intercollegiate athletics departments. Evidence of OU's commitment to success is 19 top-25 finishes in the last 24 years.

During the spring 2022 semester, OU student-athletes posted a record 3.20 cumulative GPA, marking a school-record 21st consecutive semester of a 3.0 or higher. Sooner student-athletes have finished eight of the previous nine semesters with a cumulative GPA of at least 3.10.

OU Athletics, one of the few remaining self-sustaining departments nationally, has been a model of fiscal responsibility and closed the books in the black in each of Castiglione's first 22 years, including the pandemic-shortened 2019-20 season, and again in 2021-22. Its responsible approach has also benefited the general campus. Through direct and indirect support, the athletics department provides more than \$9 million annually to the university's academics budget.

Through developing leaders and inspiring champions, OU creates Sooner MAGIC. The athletics department's core values are Masterful, Accountable, Gracious, Inclusive and Competitive.

BRENT VENABLES HEAD COACH

13-year University of Oklahoma assistant coach who won a national championship with the Sooners and two more with Clemson University during an ultra-successful 10-year stint as defensive coordinator, Brent Venables was named OU's 23rd head football coach Dec. 5, 2021.

The 52-year-old Venables served as co-defensive coordinator and linebackers coach at Oklahoma from 1999-2003 and as associate head coach, defensive coordinator and linebackers coach from 2004-11 under former head coach Bob Stoops. Venables has coached in eight national championship games between his

time at OU and Clemson, winning titles with the Sooners in 2000 and Tigers in 2016 and 2018. In 26 years as a full-time assistant coach, Venables' teams posted 26 winning seasons, won 13 conference titles, went to 30 bowl games (includes four College Football Playoff National Championship games) and won at least 10 games 22 times.

Since joining Clemson prior to the 2012 season, Venables constructed one of the nation's top defenses. Over the last 10 years, the Tigers ranked first nationally in sacks (445; next most was 392), tackles for loss (1,159) and opponent third-down conversion percentage (30.2%), second in opponent pass efficiency rating (111.1) and takeaways (244; tied), third in scoring defense (17.8 ppg) and opponent completion percentage (53.3), fourth in total defense (311.4 ypg) and pass defense (190.5 ypg), fifth in interceptions (148) and sixth in rushing defense (120.9 ypg). They won conference titles each year from 2015-20.

Since 2000, Venables has coached eight national award winners and 18 consensus All-Americans. In that time, 57 defensive players under his guidance have been selected in the NFL Draft (12 first-rounders), including 15 linebackers, two of whom were first-round picks.

As a defensive coordinator and linebackers coach, Venables has produced winners of three Butkus Awards (OU's Rocky Calmus in 2001 and Teddy Lehman in 2003, and CU's Isaiah Simmons in 2019), two Nagurski Awards (OU's Roy Williams in 2001 and Derrick Strait in 2003), two Thorpe Awards (Williams in 2001 and Strait in 2003) and one Bednarik Award (Lehman in 2003).

Venables has received national accolades for his coaching and recruiting. He received the Frank Broyles Award in 2016 as the nation's top assistant coach after being named a finalist in 2015. He was named FootballScoop's Defensive Coordinator of the Year in 2014 and Rivals. com's Recruiter of the Year in 2015.

Venables' defensive units have been remarkably consistent over the last decade. Each of the last eight Clemson defenses have ranked in the top 15 nationally in yards allowed and seven of the last eight have ranked in the top 20 in points allowed.

Venables' 2020 Clemson defense tied for the national lead with 46 sacks, despite no player producing more than 4.5 sacks individually. His 2019 unit allowed fewer than 300 yards of total offense in each of its first 12 games of the season, the first defense nationally since at least 1996 to accomplish that feat. Clemson held 16 straight opponents to

20 or fewer points across the 2018-19 seasons, the best streak at the school since the 1937-40 seasons.

Under Venables, Clemson defenses ranked among the top 10 nationally in sacks each year since 2014 and ranked in the top 10 in tackles for loss from 2013-20. The units led the nation in TFLs every year from 2013-16.


From 1999-2011, Venables helped Oklahoma to the 2000 national championship, three other national championship game appearances (2003, '04 and '08) and seven Big 12 titles. He was a finalist for the Broyles Award in 2006 when OU led the Big 12 in total defense and scoring defense.

Oklahoma linebackers under Venables' direction earned three Big 12 Defensive Player of the Year awards, five Big 12 Defensive Newcomer of the Year accolades and six first-team All-America honors. Ten of his OU linebackers — and 31 defensive players overall — were taken in the 2000-12 NFL Drafts.

While Venables was at Oklahoma, the Sooners ranked among the top 16 nationally in total defense eight times (including each year from 2000-06) and among the top 20 in scoring defense eight times. OU led the Big 12 in scoring defense on four occasions (2000, '04, '06, '11) and topped the league in total defense three times (2003, '04, '06).

Prior to joining Stoops' first staff at Oklahoma, Venables coached linebackers at Kansas State (1996-98) under Bill Snyder, holding the title of defensive running game coordinator in 1998.

A native of Salina, Kan., Venables earned a bachelor's degree in political science from Kansas State in 1992.



OKLAHOMA PLAYER SPOTLIGHT

DILLON GABRIEL

New Year, New School, Familiar Locale for Dillon Gabriel by Claudia Benge

Quarterback Dillon Gabriel has leaned on an opportunistic mindset and close relationships to navigate his first year at Oklahoma, which will culminate with a Cheez-It Bowl showdown against Florida State on Dec. 29 at Orlando's Camping World Stadium.

Gabriel will return to familiar territory in Orlando, Fla., where he spent his first three collegiate seasons playing at UCF. The Mililani, Hawai'i, product is most excited about the chance to lead the Sooners in the program's 24th straight bowl, which represents the longest streak in program history and the second-longest active streak nationally.

"It's just another opportunity," Gabriel said. "That's the best part about it."

It should be no surprise that Gabriel is most excited about another opportunity.

Playing quarterback at Oklahoma carries some weight and a certain historic precedence, and Gabriel is part of a long line of successful signal callers. Instead of dialing in on uncontrollable factors, Gabriel works to follow an opportunistic mindset.

"I knew coming in that playing quarterback was a huge responsibility, but it was also a challenge that I looked at as a very positive one," Gabriel said. "To be a quarterback at Oklahoma is exciting. There's a lot that comes with it, but for me, I wouldn't want it any other way."

Gabriel also stepped into the role of helping usher in a new era of Oklahoma football under the direction of first-year head coach Brent Venables. But Gabriel is focusing on current opportunities.

"It means a lot," Gabriel said. "I think time will only tell. We are in the moment and trying to seize the present. Down the road, I can look back. As of now, I'm just grateful to be surrounded by great people. That includes Coach Venables and all the coaches and support staff who have helped us."

One person who wants to see Gabriel at his best is Oklahoma's offensive coordinator and quarterbacks coach Jeff Lebby.

Lebby, also in his first year at OU, coordinated some of the top offenses in the nation at Ole Miss (2020-21) and at UCF where he tutored Gabriel in 2019. Gabriel attributes some of the ease of his transition and success at OU to his familiarity with Lebby.

"Coach Lebby, he's just been family to me," Gabriel said. "He pushes me. I think because of how close we are, he can push me more. I know he wants to make me better in every single way."





Gabriel was named 2022 Big 12 Offensive Newcomer of the Year and earned second-team All-Big 12 recognition from the league's media after passing for 2,925 yards and 24 touchdowns in his first season with the Sooners. He leads the league in passing yards per game (265.9) and ranks second in several other categories, including passing efficiency rating (154.2), yards per completion (13.5), yards per pass attempt (8.5) and passing touchdowns (24). He ranks 15th nationally in total offense (472.2 yards per game).

Gabriel accomplished this despite missing nearly two full games with an injury sustained early in the second quarter at TCU on Oct. 1. He also rebounded this year after missing all but the first three games of UCF's 2021 season with an injury. Even so, Gabriel takes an opportunistic mindset.

"Last year was last year," Gabriel said. "This year, it was a big hit. It was a freak play. That's football. I'm just grateful for every opportunity to step out there knowing it's just football and it's an aggressive sport."


Gabriel also sees opportunities off the field. In fall of 2022, he started a five-year partnership with Mililani High School and BSN Sports to supply Nike athletic gear to all of the high school's sports.

It was a point of Gabriel's to focus on all youth sports, not just football.

"I'm a big believer in youth sports," Gabriel said. "In this world, we tend to stick to the most popular sport. I've quickly realized that peoples' experiences are very diverse in youth sports, whether it's boys or girls, baseball, softball, basketball. I think it's important to be diverse with boys and girls and make sure that we put emphasis on all of it, because I know how big of an impact it had on my life. I think that's just something I'm really passionate about and think we need to put an emphasis on."

For now though, Gabriel, who received his bachelor's degree in multidisciplinary studies in mid-December, is focusing on leading the Sooners in the Cheez-It Bowl and the experiences that come with a bowl appearance.


"My personal goals are obviously to win," Gabriel said. "But also, continue to get close with the team. That's the point of emphasis every second."



FSU has ranked among the 20 best overall athletic programs in 16 of the last 17 years and has been among the 10 best five times over that period. The Seminoles have won 18 National Championships in nine different sports, with the most recent coming last year when women's soccer won its third title.

FSU's storied football program has won three National Championships (1993, 1999, 2013) and has reached the national title game six times. The Seminoles hold the college football record with 14 consecutive seasons ranked among the top five in the final Associated Press poll. HEAD COACH



MIKE NORVELL HEAD COACH

ike Norvell is in his third season at Florida State after being named the 11th full-time head coach in program history on Dec. 8, 2019.

Norvell has implemented his CLIMB philosophy – focused on daily improvement, maximizing every opportunity and responding to all circumstances – into the program and the results are evident on the field. Florida State has won nine games this season and returned to the postseason for the first time since 2019. The Seminoles finished second in the ACC Atlantic Division, the program's highest finish in the division since 2015, and

enters the Cheez-It Bowl on a five-game winning streak. Paired with a 4-0 start, the 2022 season is the first year FSU has recorded two winning streaks of at least four games in the same season since 2012.


He has led Florida State to five 30-point wins this season, the most in the ACC and trailing only Ohio State and Tennessee among Power 5 programs, and FSU has scored at least 38 points in each game during its current five-game winning streak. The Seminoles entered bowl season as the only team nationally in the top-10 in yards per play on offense and defense, ranking ninth in the country with an average of 6.86 yards per play on offense and 10th holding opponents to an average of 4.73 yards per play.

Norvell places as high of a premium on academics and community service as he does success on the football field. When he was hired, Norvell implemented the Seminole Scholars program for the 2020 season to recognize players who have graduated or earned a 3.0 GPA, and 184 Seminole Scholar patches have been displayed on jerseys over the last three years. Florida State boasts 19 college graduates on this year's roster, the highest total among all schools in Florida and the second-highest in the ACC, and has earned the highest semester grade-point average in program history under his leadership.

Norvell's offenses are averaging 37.5 points per game during his seven years as a head coach, which is the third-highest average in the country among head coaches active each year from 2016-22. Norvell is one of only three head coaches to produce a top-7 rushing offense and top-7 passing offense since 2016. His offense has showcased 58 individual 100-yard rushing games, 36 individual 100-yard receiving games and 22 individual 300-yard passing games. In addition to his high-powered offenses, Norvell's teams have also scored 13 defensive touchdowns and 12 kickoff return touchdowns.

In his seven seasons as a head coach, Norvell has guided the development of 83 all-conference performers, four conference Players of the Year and six All-Americans, including four first-team selections. In the last six NFL Drafts, 18 Norvell pupils have been selected, including first-round pick Jermaine Johnson II in 2022.

Norvell earned two degrees from Central Arkansas, completing his bachelor's degree in social science in 2005 and his master's degree in training systems in 2007. Norvell and his wife, Maria, have a daughter, Mila.




Dillan Gibbons Wins Wuerffel Trophy

Before traveling to Orlando for this year's Cheez-It Bowl, Florida State offensive lineman Dillan Gibbons made a pit stop in New York City, where he was awarded the 2022 Wuerffel Trophy, presented annually to the FBS player who best combines exemplary community service with leadership achievement on and off the field.

Gibbons is the first winner of college football's premier award for community service from the ACC and only the second from a Florida school, joining 2008 winner Tim Tebow. Gibbons was recognized during the Heisman Trophy festivities earlier this month in New York City and will be officially presented his trophy in February at the All Sports Association Awards Banquet in Fort Walton Beach, Florida.

Gibbons, who was voted captain of the 2022 Allstate Good Works Team and winner of this year's Jim Tatum Award as the ACC's top senior football scholar-athlete, has established a non-profit foundation to raise funds for those in need. His foundation partners with collegiate ambassadors across college football and connects with charitable causes they are passionate about, including those with special medical needs, shopping with children in the community and repairing damage caused by natural disasters. His efforts have resulted in nearly \$500,000 being raised to support meaningful causes throughout the college football community.

Gibbons earned first-team All-ACC accolades as he blocked for one of the most explosive and efficient offenses in the country this season. Florida State leads the nation with 88 plays of at least 20 yards and is second nationally with seven touchdown drives of at least 90 yards and with 15 touchdown drives of 80-plus yards.





The Seminoles also lead the ACC and rank third nationally in third-down percentage, converting 51.9 percent of their opportunities. They have scored on 26 of 28 red zone possessions during their current five-game winning streak while ranking second in the conference with a 70.5 touchdown percentage this season in the red zone. FSU is one of three teams in the country, and the only team in the ACC, averaging at least 250 passing yards and at least 210 rushing yards per game.

The St. Petersburg native, who was named the ACC's Offensive Lineman of the Week following Florida State's 45-3 win at Miami, has helped pave the way for Florida State to rush for more than 200 yards in a school-record-tying seven consecutive games, the longest active streak in the nation and FSU's longest streak since 1987.

The Seminoles lead the ACC in yards per rush and rushing yards per game, averaging 5.50 yards per rush to rank 10th in the country, and gaining 217.8 yards per game, the 12th-highest average nationally. Florida State's offense also is ninth in the country with an average of 6.86 yards per play, 13th gaining an average of 475.7 yards of total offense per game and 17th with an average of 36.2 points per game. FSU also is first in the ACC and 11th in the country, averaging 13.94 yards per completion and third in the ACC and 20th nationally in pass efficiency.







CAMPING WORLD STADIUM A-Z GUIDE

ANIMALS

Camping World Stadium welcomes guide or assistance dogs utilized by the disabled or visually impaired. All other animals are prohibited.

ALCOHOL

Alcoholic beverages are sold in the stadium until the end of the third quarter. Proper age identification will be requested.

CAMERAS AND VIDEO EQUIPMENT

Cameras with detachable lenses and/or lenses 3 in. or longer are not permitted in the stadium.

CHILD TICKET POLICY

All children who have reached their second birthday by the date of the event must have a ticket for entry.

CLEAR BAG

Florida Citrus Sports has implemented an NFL-style 'clear bag' policy that limits the size and type of bags that may be brought into the Camping World Stadium. Fans will be able to carry the following style and size bag, package or container at stadium plaza areas, stadium gates or when approaching queue lines of fans awaiting entry into the stadium:

Bags that are clear plastic, vinyl or PVC and do not exceed 14" x 14" x 6" $\,$

One-gallon clear plastic freezer bag (Ziploc bag or similar)

Small clutch bags that do not exceed 4.5" x 6.5" can be taken into the stadium in addition to one of the clear plastic bags.

An exception will be made for medically necessary items after proper inspection at a gate designated for this purpose.

MOBILE TICKETING

Mobile ticketing greatly improves the fan experience at Camping World Stadium by making stadium entry quick and easy. The ability to manage your tickets from your smartphone will provide a more convenient experience, while drastically prohibiting the risk of counterfeit tickets. NO RE-ENTRY POLICY

Once admitted, patrons may not leave and re-enter the stadium.

PARKING OPERATIONS

On game day, all stadium parking lots are manned and reserved for permit parking, recreational vehicles, chartered buses and disabled parking. Parking lots open at 12:30 p.m. on gameday. Public parking permits can be purchased in advance at cheezitbowl.com/game-day. Fans are encouraged to use the City of Orlando's downtown shuttle service on game day if they do not have a parking permit.

SMOKING

Smoking is prohibited within Camping World Stadium except in designated smoking areas. Designated smoking areas outside of the seating area are available and are subject to change.

Field Level - Near East Breezeway by 119; North Concourse by outer wall across from Sec.145

Plaza Level - North and South of elevator landings

Terrace Level - Sections 208 & 234 (behind center stairwells, between inner and outer walls)

STADIUM SHUTTLE

The City of Orlando will offer FREE downtown shuttle service to Camping World

Pick-Up Location: Division Avenue & Church Street

Drop-Off Location: Nashville Avenue & Church Street

Time: Buses will run to and from the stadium throughout the day from 12:30 p.m. until 1 hour after the game.

STROLLERS

Strollers are permitted into the stadium but must be checked into guest services near section 148 (north box office).

TAILGATING POLICIES

Tailgating is allowed in all Camping World Stadium lots EXCEPT Jones High
