maintained his reputation by dunking 18 points through the cords. But last night the Bruin ace was overshadowed by teammate Rudy Stewart who put on a brilliant set-shot show. Stewart Gets 24

The stocky, southpaw ball handler who looked more like a middieweight wrestler than a cage star, hit nine times from the field and six times from the free throw line for a 24 point total that dominated the night's individual scoring. . In addition he engineered most of the Bruins floor work, and set up plays with his deft passing and ball handling.

With Wilkes, who operated under the hoop as "Mr Inside," and Stewart pouring set shots through as "Mr Outside," the Bears displayed a potent one-two punch

that was tough to stop.

When Wilkes and Stewart were both momentarily shackled early in the second half Reeder hit a hot streak and slipped in six quick field goals to offset the Seminoles' counterattack.

Little Lee Benjamin and oig Tom McLaughlin paced the indians with 18 and 17 points respectively, and when Benjamin fouled out with FSU trailing 61-55 the ball game was over.

McLaughlin led the Seminoles in their play off both boards, and twice picked them up when they were lagging badly by slipping in braces of field goals.

The victory was Mercer's sixth in eight starts this winter, and the setback was FSU's fifth against six wins. The Bears have lost once in Dixie circles, while last night's setback was the Indians' third within the loop against five wins.
