

INDIANS TAKE 47-39 VERDICT

55 Fouls Called During Evening

The Florida State University Seminoles snapped Sewanee's winning streak at six straight last night as they tugged a 47-39 decision away from the Purple Tigers in a rough and tumble brawl at the West Campus gym.

If the football squads of the two schools display as much zest and zeal when they meet on the gridiron next October, the game should be something to remember for last night's tilt was rough-rough-rough.

A total of 55 fouls were called during the evening, and the steady stream of penalties turned the

tilt into a procession which paraded from one foul line to the other.

Four men, McLaughlin and Nettles of FSU and Logan and J. Hall of Sewanee fouled out during the fray, and the number of men who were on the verge of fouling out is far too numerous to set down here.

Russell's Puzzle

One man, the Seminoles Dick Kendall, was ejected for a scuffle with Tiger center Jim Russell late in the second half. But Russell, who apparently got the festivities started, was allowed to remain in the game.

With the two teams crowding close and jostling like fat men in a phone booth, both teams were forced to do most of their shooting from outside. And neither squad displayed any marked accuracy.

At the end of 40 minutes of playing time they had each amassed a total of 12 field goals, and FSU grabbed the decision by virtue of its proficiency from the foul line. The Seminoles hit 23 out of 31 attempts from the free

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throw line, while the Tigers were able to cage only 15 out of 38.

In between the constant fouls and steady din of whistle-blowing there were flashes of fair basketball. But they were too brief to make a lasting impression on the 600 fans who sat in on the foul-filled affair.

Benjamin Garners 14

Little Lee Benjamin, who spent half the night picking himself up off the hardwood where some Tiger had deposited him, topped the FSU scoring parade with 14 points. But he yielded game honors to Sewanee's Capt. Vernon Waddy, who compiled four field goals and eight foul tosses for 16 points.

Bill Weigle was the only other player reaching double digits, hitting for 10 points.

With Benjamin hitting for FSU and Waddy connecting for Sewanee the two teams battled to a 9-9 deadlock through the opening minutes. But the Seminoles started cashing in from the foul line at that point and hit the halftime ahead 22-16.

Weigle hit a hot hand right after intermission to up the Indian edge to 32-23, and from the point the teams traded foul shots fairly evenly.

Sewanee dropped behind 46-35 at one point, but were narrowing the gap when the final whistle blew.
