Play Three Games Here This Week

Basketball takes over immediate possession of Tallahassee's sport scene as Florida State University gets the local cage campaign off to a flying start with three games this week,

The Seminoles, who just completed their football season Saturday afternoon with a 33-12 triumph over Tampa, open the hoop season Tuesday night in the West Campus gym against Mississippi College's Choctaws. The game is a Dixie Conference affair.

Friday and Saturday nights the Indians will entertain the Florida Southern. College Mocs in the West Campus gym in a two-game series.

Southern opened its season last Saturday night by bowing to the University of Florida Gators 83-51.

Kennedy Is Coach

The Seminole cagers who will be guided this year by J K "Bud" Kennedy, face a 21-game schedule this season that will run until the Dixie Conference tourney late in February and early in March.

Kennedy, who is at present better known for his activities as athletic business manager at the local school, succeeds Donald Loucks at a the helm of the Indian hoopsters.

The change in coaches was brought about by an FSU ruling which prohibits a coach from handling more than one varsity sport. Loucks elected to guide the Seminole tennis squad.

Kennedy handled the Seminole "B" squad last season. He has had a long, successful career in the cage game.

The Indians have been drilling for over a month, and have given indications of fielding a tail, aggressive five this season.

FSU Wins Title; Kratzert Ruled Ineligible

BIRMINGHAM. — The Florida State University Seminoles were officially crowned Dixie conference football champions here yesterday, but the joy of their triumph was somewhat tempered by the loss of Bill Kratzert, allaround FSU athlete.

Kratzert, first three-letterman in FSU's brief athletic history,

was ruled ineligible for further athletic
competition because of a professional baseball contract
which he signed
several years
ago. After signing Kratzert
suffered an injury that kept
him out of actual play, but



tual play, but Bill Kratzert the loop members ruled against

his eligibility.

Kratzert's less will be a severe blow to the Seminole basketball squad. Last year he paced the Indian scoring brigade, and his floor work has stood out in the three games played this season

three games played this season.

He was also a mainstay of the Seminole tennis team. His third letter was gained in football in 1947. He did not participate in the grid sport during the Indians' championship season just past.

Other Action

In other conference action taken at the two-day meeting participation in post-season football bowls was approved, providing the team to oppose the loop member meets the conference's amateur standards.

The circuit baseball title will be decided on a percentage basis. Teams must play a minimum of seven games against four different loop fees to qualify

loop foes to qualify.

The basketball tourney was awarded to Jackson, Miss, Feb 26-Mar 2. And the track, tennis and golf meets went to Mercer in Macon, Ga May 21-22. The application of Florida Southern College, Lakeland, was approved for membership, raising the loop teams to 10.

A ruling regarding transfer students was passed, requiring them to wait through a calendar year before becoming eligible.

The conference also became allied members of the National Collegiate Athletic association.
