For the second straight season, Florida State's brilliant junior basketball standout, Dave Fedor, has made virtually a clean sweep of Seminole statistical honors.

But FSU Coach Bud Kennedy, quite naturally, is pleased that his 6 Zephyrhills prize—named last week on both the Associated Press and United Press International All-America honorable mention lists—has company at the top. Fedor's company is Ray (Swish) Swain, 6-4 Jacksonville junior who turned in one of the most improved seasons of play in FSU history.

Final FSU statistics reveal Fedor and Swain, scoring leaders, finished 23 of the Seminoles' 24 games, finished 1-2 in both scoring and rebounding and teamed to lead in every category. The Seminoles won 14 of 24 games, best FSU basketball finish since 1956.

Fedor, the state's leading major-college scorer and rebounder, finished his junior season with 53 points (19.0 average) and 336 rebounds (14.0). He scored 12 or more points in all 24 games to end a phenomenal two-year string of double-figure scoring to 49 consecutive games.

Swain, more than doubling his sophomore output of 206 points in 25 games, scored 418 points this season for a solid 17.4 average. He pulled down 188 rebounds.

More outstanding, Swain cashed 168 of 313 field goal attempts for a school-record shooting percentage of 53.7. Swain had to be content to break Fedor's 1959-60 record of 47.2 per cent, because Fedor improved his own shooting accuracy this year to 50.7 per cent.

With that high-scoring pair hitting

more than half their shots, FSU recorded its best team shooting record ever. The Seminoles canned 672 of 1,467 shots from the floor for a 45.7 percentage that ranked them among the top 15 teams.

As a team, the Tribe hit 50 per cent or more of its shots in six games, and poured in a school record 66.7 per cent of its field goal attempts in a 99-57 win over Furman. Using a new "Seminole Shuffle" offense, the Seminoles set a school one-game record in a 116-95 victory at Tampa.

Fedor, who has pulled down 12

or more rebounds in 40 of his 49 games, recovered 16.2 per cent of all rebounds in FSU games this season, a figure that may rank him among the nation's top 10.

In two seasons, Fedor has scored 983 points (20.1 average) and grabbed 736 rebounds (15.0). Fedor this season also led in free throw percentage (80.4), making 86 of 107. Over the last 13 games, Fedor dropped in a sizzling 58 of 64 free throws.

Sophomore Charlie Long finished the No. 3 scorer with 193 points and an 8.8 average. Junior guard Jack Davis, whose defen-

sive spark and floor ability helped FSU win 10 of its last 14 games, was fourth with a seven-point average.
