

Miami's basketball team thumbed its nose at the shooting ability of a pair of Florida State guards and paid a precious price here Saturday night. Florida State won 80-70.

Coach Bruce Hale told his Hurricanes, an insider said, to all but ignore guards Pete Gonzalez and Bobby Lovell, and to concentrate on stopping 6 - 6 Gary Schull, the Seminoles' top all-around performer this season.

Schull, double-teamed much of the way, managed nine points and nine rebounds.

Meanwhile, Gonzalez, a 6-1 junior, and Lovell, a 6-1 senior, ripped the nets like they never had before.

Gonzalez, averaging 7.1 points per game this season, socked in 24, hitting 9 of 14 from the field, 6 of 6 from the foul line.

Lovell, who had scored all of 59 points in two seasons-plus, an average of a bit over 2 per game, slammed home 18 points, including some big ones in the late going. It was the first game the Chattanooga, Tenn., lad ever started for the Seminoles.

It was a thriller from the opening whistle. A capacity-plus crowd of 5,000 saw a lulu that was tied 19 times. Biggest lead ever held by either team was four points, by FSU in the first half, Miami in the second.

For the Seminoles, still unbeaten at home, it was their fifth triumph in 12 starts. Miami is now 9-4.

Miami's highly talented Rick Barry, a 6-6 junior, was sensational until halftime, was only slightly less than that after. He dropped in 8 of 10 field-goal attempts in the first half, 6 of 14 in the second, ended with 32 points.

But Barry was far off his 16-per-game rebounds pace, grabbing only 8. Teammate Don Patrican bagged a game-high 13 as Miami outrebounded the Tribe 38 to 31.

FSU was hot from the field, sinking 32 of 64 for 50 per cent, versus Miami's 32 of 67 for 44.7 per cent. The difference, in the last analysis, was 16-of-19 by the Seminoles from the foul line, contrasted with Miami's 14-of-20.

Patrican contributed 16 points to the Miami cause, play-making guard Bernie Butts 14. UM's John Dampier toled a 20-plus scoring average into this one, was met with a defensive blanket that limited him to 8; he hit only 3 of 12 from the floor.

as more than two in the first half.  
FSU's biggest lead was 23-19.  
to It was a 36-36 deadlock at half-  
for time with Butts getting a 2-  
ler pointer just before the gun to  
he tie it.

The Hurricanes went in front  
47-43 after four minutes of the  
last half. But Gonzalez—a Mi-  
ami High product, incidentally  
— hit a jumper and Rogers  
added one from the top of the  
key for a 47-47 tie.

Miami pushed in front again  
53-50. Butts fouled Shirley, ar-  
gued about it, got a technical  
called on him. Shirley sank the  
two free throws to cut Miami's  
lead to 53-52. A bit later Rogers  
tied it again on a long jumper  
54-54.

The Hurricanes' last lead was  
73-72 with 3:31 left when Butts  
stole the ball and dribbled in  
for a layup. Bob Ek's long  
jumper, that bounced off the  
rim, then fell back in, quickly  
sent FSU back ahead 74-73.

Miami tied it on a free throw  
by Berry with 2:46 to go but  
that was as close as it got. Lov-  
ell maneuvered in for a layup.  
Gonzalez made a free throw for  
77-77 with 1:39 to go.

Butts' long jumper cut it to  
77-76 at 1:05. Lovell missed a  
free throw, in a 1-and-1 situa-  
tion, that could have virtually

clinched it. But seconds later  
Lovell made two shots count in  
an identical 1-and-1 situation  
and FSU led 79-76 with 15 sec-  
onds to go.

Miami called time with the  
clock showing 12 seconds. A  
scramble soon followed and  
there was a jump ball. Four  
seconds now. FSU called time  
as Coach Bud Kennedy instruc-  
ted his Seminoles to let Miami  
shoot if it got the rebound,  
avoiding a foul that might per-  
mit Miami to tie.

Barry got the rebound and  
hit a fielder unmolested for 79-  
78 as the gun sounded.

Coach Hale raced to argue  
with officials. He insisted he  
had been ignored trying to call  
time with two seconds to play,  
just as Barry hit his field goal.

A technical foul was called  
on Miami. Shirley made good  
for it for the final margin.

Florida State's freshmen  
team swept to 89-73 victory ov-  
er Pensacola Junior College as  
Ron Malmen poured in 34  
points for the yearlings.
