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School Records Go Down; Florida Date Tomorrow

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More impressive defensively than offensively, strange as it sounds, Florida State's basketball team busted some records here last night as it put down Tampa 121-57.

Now 3-0 for the young season, the Seminoles, who have had only home-cooking thus far, play at Florida tomorrow night.

Norman Sloan, the UF coach, was among the 3,000 who left Tully Gym scratching their heads over what manner of team these Seminoles are.

He probably wasn't able to put much together. Before halftime every one of Florida State's 13 varsity players had been in action, and all had scored. FSU Coach Bud Kennedy also substituted heavily in the last half.

It is not too uncommon for opponents to score 100 points against offense-minded Tampa, but it is rare that any foe holds the Spartans to less than 80, for so. Tampa lost only two players off a team that FSU had trouble handling 71-64 last season.

Those 121 points were a home-floor record for FSU, topping the 110 that the Tribe got against Rollins in 1962. But FSU scored more away from home in a memorable 123-92 victory at Tampa in 1962.

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Two Seminoles, guards

The 64-point margin of triumph for Florida State was the biggest for the school anywhere any time. Old record was the 57 by which FSU beat Rollins 110-53 in 1932.

Tampa, now 0-3 after playing its first three away, appeared leg-weary and slow. In contrast, Florida State was most quick, alert, aggressive. So tight was FSU's defense in the first half that Tampa was permitted only six field goals.

The Seminoles repeatedly stole the ball, blocked shots, dogged full-handlers, and controlled the boards.

FSU was credited with 72 rebounds, another school record (old one 66 against Jacksonville in '32).

But the Seminoles fell behind at the start. Tampa led 2-0 and 4-3.

Then Florida State, led by Jim Lytle's eight quick points, streaked in front 15-4 before Tampa got on the board again. More than seven minutes elapsed between Tampa's first field goal and its second.

By halftime it was 15-23. The Seminoles at that point had hit 61 per cent of their floor shots, led in rebounds 25-7. FSU ended the game with 56 per cent from the floor, 75 per cent from the foul line (versus Tampa's 28 per cent from the floor and 60 per cent on free throws). FSU's final rebounding lead was 72-43.

Six Seminoles scored in double figures, with Bill Peacock leading with 17. Bill Glenn, a Tallahassee sophomore, got 15 points, led FSU's versatile rebounding effort with nine recoveries.

Gary Schull and Lytle got 12 points each, Bill Phillips 13, Charlie Fairchild 10.

Fairchild was the only Seminole not having one of his better nights, and the crowd "adopted" the slender 6-3 senior with chants of "we want Charlie, we want Charlie!"

Darrel Stewart and Brian Murphy fouled out as FSU was charged with 27 infractions. Three Spartans, 6-8 Wayne Harden, 6-6 Ron Stone, 6-4 Chris Wacenske, also fouled out.

Tampa scoring was led by 6-2 forward Aaron Adams, who got hot late and managed 12 points. The Spartans' 6-6 Dick Pising, heralded by some as one of the best guards in the South, had rough going, made no first-half field goals, ended with eight points.

Glenn put in a layup for Florida State's 100th point with 6:23 left in the game.
