Cincinnati • Florida State • Louisville Memphis State • St. Louis • Tulane • Virginia Tech oe Williams is just the fourth head basketball coach in the 32-year history of the sport at Florida State University. But like his predecessors, Williams has proven that he intends to leave his mark at the Tallahassee school.

The likeable native of Morton, Miss., accepted the task of guiding the highly-respected Seminole program in 1978 after previous coaching stints at Jacksonville and Furman, where his teams combined for a 243-148 record.

In his first season at the helm of the Garnet and Gold, Williams was faced with the task of rebuilding Florida State's program with only two starters returning. He finished the 1978-79 campaign with a 19-10 record, picking up his 250th career win, advancing to the finals of the Metro Conference tournament in the process and narrowly missing a chance to play in the NIT tournament.

Williams' career coaching mark now stands at 253-158 over a 15 year span.

Florida State was Williams' first collegiate coaching assignment in 1962 when he was freshman coach for the late Bud Kennedy. He advanced to Furman in 1963 as an assistant coach before taking the top job at Jacksonville in 1964.

During his first season at Jacksonville, the Dolphins advanced to the NAIA national playoffs in Kansas City. Five years later, Jacksonville found itself in the NCAA championship game against powerful UCLA and finished with a 27-2 record. In a six year span Williams had molded the Dolphin program into one of the country's most respected, achieving a 92-61 mark.

He returned to Furman following that banner 1969-70 season at Jacksonville, and was to become the school's winningest coach. In seven of eight seasons, the Paladins had winning records and Williams' mark was 142-87. Five times Furman was able to win the Southern Conference title.


Williams played and learned basketball under Abe Lemmons (now head coach at Texas) at Oklahoma City College. He received his bachelor's degree from SMU in 1956 and later earned his master's from Florida in 1968.

GENESIS 1+

THIS IS FLORIDA STATE

Florida State University — the home of more than 20,000 Seminoles — has a campus that starts at the top of one of Tallahassee's famed seven hills, and rolls gently downward and westward across 340-odd acres of pines, palms and pecan trees.

Founded in 1857 as the Seminary West of the Suwannee, its heritage is evidenced in the wide range of architectural struggles to preserve history and keep up with modern times and air conditioning. Yet it still ranks as one of the South's last, few bastions of campus greenery — the kind that combines the blossoms of camellias, azaleas and dogwoods with moss-hung oaks that are, in some cases, as old as the University itself, if not older.

From the Gothic towers of Westcott at the eastern entrance to the campus, to the modern glass and steel structures of its Science Complex to the west, Florida State University has moved foward in time and growth more rapidly than many of its newer counterparts in the State University System. Its enrollment has quadrupled since it became coeducational in 1947, following nearly half a century as the Florida State College for Women.

Today, its 14 schools and colleges are spread through \$179 million worth of buildings, its annual budget exceeds \$100 million and it attracts more than \$17 million a year in research contracts and grants. Students can pick and choose from more than 100 career options offered in arts and sciences, business, communication, criminology, dance, education, home economics, law, library science, music, nursing, social sciences, social work, theater and visual arts programs.

The University is a member of the Academic Common Market and has overseas study centers in Florence, London and the Panama Canal Zone. Summer programs of study are offered in law at Oxford, in hotel and restaurant administration in Switzerland, and in comparative studies of economic and social systems in Yugoslavia.

The location of FSU in the Capital City of Florida offers unusual opportunities for study and research in the social and policy sciences, and an optimum environment for internships and on-the-job learning experiences for students in many fields of study.

The Center of Excellence in Policy Sciences is one such program at Florida State that combines teaching and research in politics, economics and other social sciences to provide information and analysis for state government leaders, including the Governor, the Legislature and agency staff members. Already achieving national prominence, the Center studies and evaluates such topics as taxation, economic development, population, land use, family planning and human resources. An annual survey conducted by the Center helps legislators to assess trends and changes in public opinion.

The University operates major laboratory facilities for nuclear, marine and computer research. The Florida State nuclear physics laboratory is ranked one of the top four in the nation by the National Science Foundation. Because of this ranking, it has been recommended for higher funding during the next five years.


Florida State is also the home of the Flying High Circus, the only collegiate circus in the United States. The Circus has delighted audiences the world over with breathtaking, highly-skilled performances that rival professional circuses. The student performers have earned a national reputation as a high-caliber student troupe. Their traveling show is primarily an aerial and stage presentation with approximately 90 students performing during a two-hour show.

A city within a city, Florida State has 1,200 faculty members, more than 6,000 additional employees and a construction program that will exceed \$50 million between now and 1981. The construction of a new civic center and a center for continuing education — both near the State Capitol — are destined for completion by the fall of 1980.



r. Bernard F. Sliger, Florida State University's president since 1977, is one of the most ardent fans in Seminole sports history. Known as "Bernie" to nearly all of the student athletes, Dr. Sliger makes

Known as "Bernie" to nearly all of the student athletes, Dr. Sliger makes no secret of his sentiments about athletics at Florida State University. He says he wants a "spot in the Top Twenty" for every Seminole team, including those who compete in the arenas of academe. And there's no one on campus prouder than he is of the records set in honor of that tradition last year by more than one team in each category.

In the men's intercollegiate seasons last year, the football, basketball and baseball teams were definitely "up there" and track, cross country, golf and swimming teams won Metro Conference Championships. The Lady Seminoles proved to be state champions in basketball, volleyball, tennis and softball; won the regional championship in volleyball and tennis; and earned the national indoor championship in track.

Although President Sliger now classifies himself as "an energetic spectator," during his high school days in his hometown of Trout Creek, Mich., he was a member of the basketball, track and football teams. He later returned to coach the latter two teams and teach math there, following a three-year tour of duty with the Army during World War II.

Dr. Sliger, who came to FSU as its executive vice president in the late spring of 1972, was formerly executive director of the Louisiana Coordinating Council for Higher Education. His background as an educator includes 19 years as a faculty member and administrator and sports fan at Louisiana State University.

An economist and scholar in the special fields of economic theory and public finance, he frequently serves as a consultant to private and public commissions, most recently as chairman of Gov. Reubin Askew's Economic Advisory Council. He was a member and chief consultant of the Governor of Louisiana's tax study committee in 1968, and served a year as Louisiana Commissioner of Administration and Chief Budget Officer. In the latter capacity, he had to oversee the costs of constructing Louisiana's Superdome.

Dr. Sliger is the author of a text on "Public Finance," first issued in 1964 and revised in 1970, and presently used in a number of colleges and universities.

He and his wife, Greta, have two sons, Paul and Sten, and two daughters, Nan and Greta.


s sports information director, Mark Carlson is responsible for all publicity and public relations matters concerning the Florida State athletic department.




