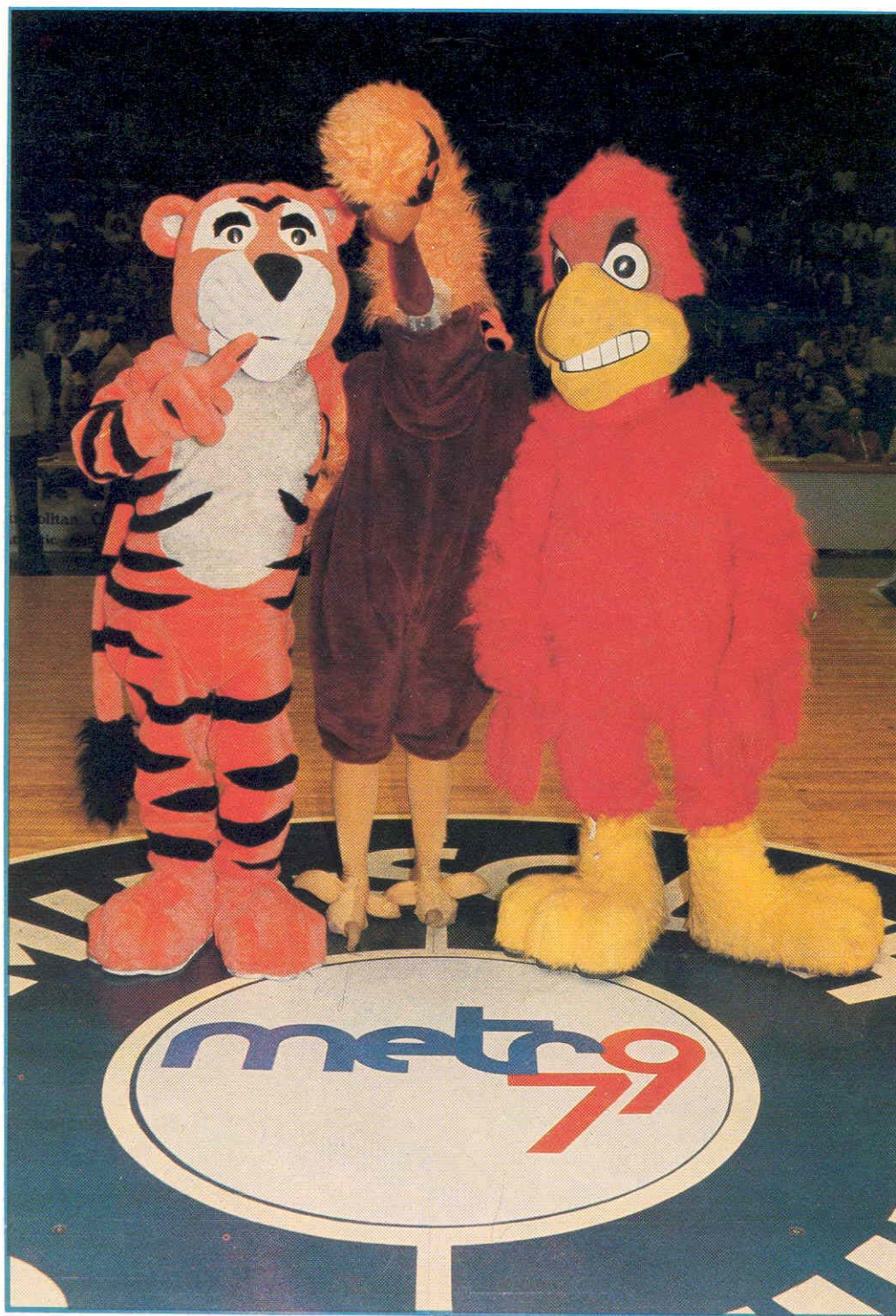

Scouting Report

GAME X - FLORIDA STATE

In the full-court vision of a basketball fan's mind, who could shut out the night of March 4, 1978. With nine seconds remaining, and Florida State leading Louisville 93-92, freshman Roger Burkman was inserted in the Cardinal lineup to replace Darrell Griffith, who had just fouled out. The play was designed for Bobby Turner to take the shot. No matter. Burkman took the in-bounds play, glided downcourt, and glanced quickly at Turner. He then went behind his back, drifted to the left baseline, and fired a jumper from 18 feet.

Swish.

And Louisville became Metro Conference Tournament champions.

It has been nearly two years since that game, but the rivalry between Louisville and Florida State survives. Tonight, these two teams meet for the first time this season, and once again they are the top choices for winning the title.

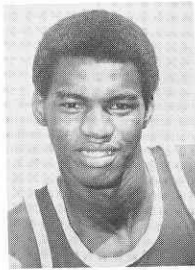
Louisville still has several participants left over from that memorable contest of two years ago, including Burkman, whose game-winning shot was the only two points he scored that night. Darrell Griffith scored 10 points in that one, as did Tony Branch, who made 5 of 8 shots from the floor.

Florida State also has a few veterans who recall that loss to Louisville, if the coach does not. Joe Williams, who went 19-10 last year, is back for his second season. This is the same Joe Williams that led Jacksonville University to a 27-2 season in 1969-70, and the NCAA championship game against powerful UCLA.

In what was supposed to be a rebuilding year, the Seminoles advanced to the conference tournament's cham-

pionship game again last year, and lost again, this time to Virginia Tech, 68-60. They were fueled by a duo that came to be known in Tallahassee as "Jackson-Brown."

They did not run on empty.

"Jackson," is Tony Jackson, a 6-foot senior guard from Lexington's Bryan Station. He always seems to play well against Louisville, with a 14-point, nine-assist performance in the 1978 title game being one example. He enters tonight's contest averaging under five points per game, but leads the club in assists, handing out over seven.

Brown, as in Murray Brown, is a 6-8 senior forward from Tampa. He averaged 21.7 points per game last year, and shot an incredible 69.1 percent from the floor to lead all NCAA players. His average this season is nearly a carbon-copy of last year, and he is shooting right at 67 percent, with an excellent chance of becoming the leading percentage shooter in the history of the NCAA.

"We should be right in the thick of things if our players can stay healthy and we get some breaks," said Joe Williams prior to the start of the season. "This is an experienced team with

several quality players who are true leaders. There is plenty of room for improvement from last season."

Improvement can be alternately spelled D-I-L-L-A-R-D. Mickey Dillard, a quick-as-a-cat 6-3 guard, was one of only two returning starters from the 1977-78 season. Dillard, however, broke his leg following the second game of last season and sat out 27 games. He enters tonight's battle as the Seminoles leading scorer, averaging slightly below 22 points per game on 55 percent shooting from the field. In the two 1978 regular season victories over Louisville, Dillard scored 24 and 11 points respectively, not to mention 13 points on 6 for 10 shooting from the field in the Metro Tournament finale.

The starting center is Elvis Rolle, a 6-10, 216-pound junior, who sat out last season after leaving Oral Roberts University, where he was a starter. Rolle averages nearly 17 points per outing and, like Murray Brown, is shooting over 60 percent from the field. He is also the team's leading rebounder.

Bobby Parks, last year's sixth man, starts at guard this year, averaging nine points on 60 percent shooting from the floor (FSU is successful on over 57 percent of its field goal attempts). Rodney Arnold, a 6-4 sophomore transfer from Furman, who became eligible on December 20, comes off the bench to chip in nine points.

Louisville has won eight of its 11 games against Florida State in a series that dates back to December 16, 1968. Two of those losses came in 1978, the year Louisville beat the Seminoles for the Metro Tournament title. The Cardinals took both games last year, winning 67-65 in Tallahassee, and 84-71 at Freedom Hall.

New Track For Indoor Meet

Florida State returns as defending champion, but Virginia Tech and Memphis State are ready to dethrone the Seminoles.

It's not difficult to notice the optimistic enthusiasm in Virginia Tech track coach Russ Whitenack's voice. Very shortly, Whitenack will be able to show off his brand new indoor track at the second annual Metro Indoor Championship, scheduled for Feb. 23 and 24 in Blacksburg, Va.

Late last year, the Virginia Tech Athletic Association purchased the Madison Square Garden's indoor track. It was delivered and installed in the modern Rector Fieldhouse the first week in January and will be the only indoor facility of its kind in the Metro Conference.

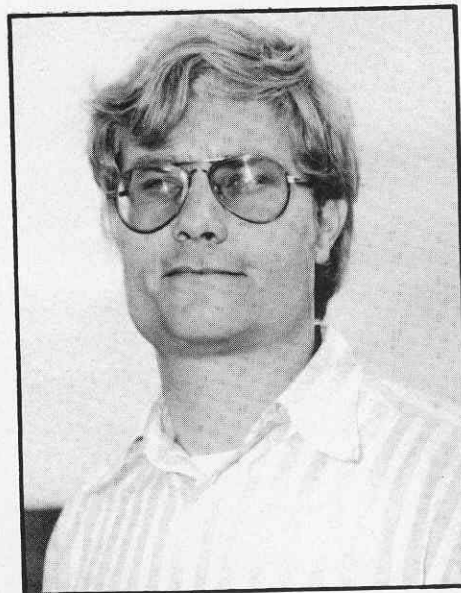
"It's a super track, Whitenack said, "one on which many world records have been set. This is a big boost to our track program at Tech. It gives us one of the best indoor facilities you will find anywhere."

The equipment Tech purchased is 12 years old and consisted of one oval-banked running track (11 laps to the mile); one sprint runway for 60-yard sprints; one shot put circle and landing area; and a set of infield sections for high jump takeoffs. According to Madison Square Garden officials, 36 meets were run on the track during its 12 years in New York.

More importantly for Whitenack and his Hokies, the new track should be a decided advantage during the Metro Championship. "It will give us," Whitenack stated, "a big advantage."

The question remaining, is, will the Hokies be able to take full advantage of the situation and unseat last year's champion Florida State. "Indoors will be the best place to overtake them," Whitenack added. "If we're going to do it, this will be the time and place."

Last year, Dick Roberts' Seminoles nosed out a victory with 165 points. But runner-up Memphis State was only six points back at 159 and the Hokies were only 9½ points behind the front-runner with 155½ points. There was a considerable drop-off after that with Louisville (34½), Cincinnati (34), St. Louis (4) and Tulane (0) trailing the field.

Roberts will be without Mike Roberson, who tied for the fastest time in the World University Games held in Mexico City last summer with a clocking of 10.07 in the 100 meter, because the senior doesn't have any eligibility left indoors. He will race outdoors, though.

Even without Roberson, the Seminoles appear to be poised to make a strong bid to retain their title. "Our biggest strength," Roberts said, "is our depth. We have someone to contend in just about every event."

A welcomed addition to the team, though is Kevin Johnson, who missed all of last year with a disease resulting from the Swine Flu vaccine--Guillione Brarre Syndrome. Johnson, a track All-America in 1978, will be counted on heavily in the sprints and the long jump.

Ken Lanier, the indoor and outdoor shot put champion last year, returns as does sophomore Joe Moss who captured the long jump also indoors and outdoors in the Metro a year ago. Palmer Simmons and Ron Nelson ran 1-2 in the indoor 440 last year and sophomore Herb Willis is back to defend his 5,000

meter title.

Reggie Ross, the Florida state high school 440 champion last year, Dusty Harmon, the Florida prep pole vault king and Melford Boodie, the junior college 600 indoor champ from Sante Fe, N.M. Junior College, head up an impressive list of newcomers that also includes Lynn Brown, Mark Triggs, Leon Hutchins and Brett Hoffman.

"The biggest difference with our team is the fact that the indoor squad will be minus Mike Roberson," Roberts said. "But we still should be fairly strong."

Besides having the home-track advantage, Whitenack has a bundle of talented performers. "We lost some talented people, and we're still a pretty young team," the Hokie coach said. "We're looking forward to the challenge. We're pretty balanced."

Whitenack will have at least one top-notch individual in all the events, but the pole vault may be the single strongest event. Bob Phillips, who was runner-up indoors, but outdoors champion is back and is backed up by a very capable duo of Bob Lytle and Tom Donnelly.

Kenny Lewis, who was a mainstay in the sprints and hurdles, should be ready to run after participating in the Blue-Gray football all-star game. Freshman David Read could be a standout in the sprints.

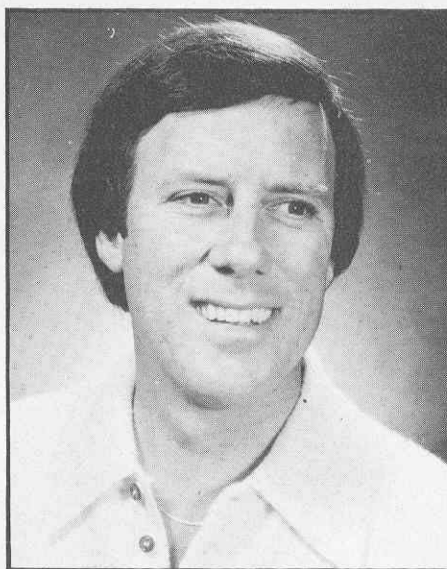
Mike Burns, the returning 880 champ, will be back and the Hokies will depend a lot on the distance events that will be manned from the cross country team which finished second in the Metro cross country championship last November.

If...

Glenn Hays' Memphis State team may have had the best chance to dethrone Florida State had not two outstanding distance runners--both from England--gone home. Before the cross country season even began, Gerald Helms went home and just a day after winning the individual Metro cross country trophy, Tony Blackwell also packed up and headed for home. Helms, who would have been a freshman, was thought to be even better than Blackwell.

"We've still got a good solid running team, but the field events are woefully lacking," Hays said. "We've got no throwers at all; no pole vaulters. Just zero."

One field events person returning, however, is senior Larry Jenkins who won the high jump title. Geoff Cooper, in the 1,000 and 1,500 meters, Steve Anders in the 10,000 meters and the two mile relay team of Doug Miller, Chris Daffin, Otis McKinney and Guy Dwelly

all are returning to defend Metro titles.

Also, Terron Wright, who won three events outdoors will be trying to improve on second place finished in both the 60-yard dash and the 60-yard high hurdles.

In early December, Wright won the 60-yard high hurdles in the LSU Open in Baton Rouge, La. and anchored the mile relay team that finished in 3 minutes 16.2 seconds with Wright being timed in 47.7 in the anchor leg.

Lansing Holman's Cincinnati team should definitely improve its position in the standings. Last year, Holman split his team, sending half to the University of Illinois for an open meet and the other half came to the Metro championships.

This year, the entire team will be in Blacksburg. "Our kids usually come through real well for us in the Metro Championships," Holman said, noting that in the outdoor affair, 11 Bearcats scored 89 points.

"I don't think we'll have the depth to compete for the conference title, but we should come home with a couple of Metro individual titles," Holman added.

The bulk of Holman's talent revolves around Wayne Mason, Bernie Weber, Larry Payne and Chris Gilbert. All four will be participating in a number of events and should do most of the team's scoring.

Mason, who has been bothered off and on by leg problems, will be a threat in the high hurdles and also run a leg on the mile relay team. Weber and Gilbert will be counted heavily on in the long distance, while Payne will be a 440 or 600 man and also run on assorted relays. The Bearcats, as has been the case in recent years, are weak in the field events.

Louisville coach Bob Strong has no visions of winning the team title and "we'd be tickled to death to finish fourth again. We just don't have the manpower to stay with a Florida State or a Memphis

State. We do want to improve on our personal best and qualify a relay team for the NCAA."

Bill Lowry in the 880, and Rick Brill in the 1,500 and sprint medley and two mile relays are the Cardinals to watch. Dennis Sensenbrenner and Larry Veech, also in the longer races, should perform well.

A transfer from Western Kentucky, Donnie Pogue, has run a 48.5 in the quarter and will be a key in the mile relay. Antonio Green will be in the 440 and mile relay and Billy Hampton will be in the sprints.

Tulane didn't score last year, and will send only a handful of athletes to the meet for the second year in a row. "We'll just take the best that we have to offer," Green Wave Lenny Culicchia said.

The Green Wave are hurt most by lack of money that holds down not only scholarship money, but also travel expenses. Thus, "we don't have a rip roarin' indoor season," Culicchia said.

One Wave runner to watch, though, is senior Chauncy Brinn in the longer races. Freshman Shannon Allison has looked good to this point. Hurdlers Brian Daley and Danny Milulak, sprinter David Tate and weight man Nat Dorsey have the ability to be present for the championship.

St. Louis coach Al Schmidt will be coaching in his final Metro indoor championship. Last year, Schmidt announced he was retiring at the end of the 1979-80 school season.

The Billikens have healed a bit from the cross country season, and the team's distance runners have the best chance of scoring--especially George Griggs. Again, a lack of funds will limit the size of the team Schmidt will bring to Blacksburg.

One thing is for sure, though: The second annual Metro Indoor championship will be a dandy.
