

FSU Sweeps Reb Tilts; Plays Bears, Petrels

Fresh from two victories over the University of Mississippi Rebels, the Florida State University Seminoles open Dixie conference play this weekend with single contests with Mercer University today and Oglethorpe University Saturday.

Both games are scheduled for 3 p.m. at the West campus field. FSU Coach Charles Armstrong is expected to send righthander Royce Burt, Tallahassee, against the Mercer Bears this afternoon. Roger Drohan, righthander from

Jacksonville, is slated to face Oglethorpe's Petrels tomorrow.

Yesterday the Seminoles again came from behind to hang up their second straight win over Ole Miss, 6 to 5. Just as they did in the 7 to 3 verdict Wednesday, the Seminoles staged one big inning to turn the trick.

Come To Life

Trailing 2-0 going into the bottom of the fifth, the Indians suddenly came to life to score six tallies off Pitchers Jim Dupuy and Kenn Terry. Terry is the son of ex-New York Giant manager Bill Terry.

First sacker Bob Lanigan struck out to open the fifth, but Dupuy walked pitcher Sam Cox and Emory Maddox. Ray Senn came in to pinch hit for John Coarsey, second baseman, and produced. He punched a single between third and short to drive in Cox and send Maddox to third.

Outfielder Rip Collins immediately followed with another one-bagger to score Maddox. Senn took third on the play and tallied on an error. Then Ronald Melton, Tallahassee, who sparked the opening day win, ripped a single between first and second and Collins crossed the plate. Dupuy went out and Terry came in to stop the rally.

Lamar Brown, home run hitter of the day before, slashed a double to right field and Melton advanced to third. Billy Parker walked to load the sacks, and Melton stole home.

Cook's Error Hurts

The final run came in when Cook again overthrew third and Brown dashed home.

Mississippi jumped into the lead in the third inning after two scoreless frames. Big Barney Poole, All-American football great, broke the ice when he powered one of Cox's pitches far into leftcenter for a home run. The Rebels annexed one more run, but their lead was short-lived.

Left-hander Sam Cox, Quincy, who doubles as a first baseman, went all the way for FSU. The stylish moundsman sprinkled eight hits, walked two, and struck out four.
