An unearned run in the eighth inning turned the trick against Georgia's Bull dogs yesterday. FSU second-sacker Billy Campbell, a real thorn to the Bulldogs all afternoon, opened the inning with a walk, skipped to second on Cooter Mills' sacrifice hit, and tripped all the way home on Tom-

There was more to it than that.
Campbell had tagged up on the
fly and raced to third safely.
Bulldog Shortstop Reggle Andrews threw wild on a relay to
third and Campbell moved home
on the error.

Georgia had jumped to a 3-0 lead in the second inning on a hit batter, a walk, Sonny Saye's two-run triple and Jim Farris' sacrifice.

FSU rocked Bulldog starter
Jimmy Harper in the bottom of
the second with a five-run
splurge. The five came on walks
to Bob Hudson, Bob Bondi, Mills
and Campbell, coupled with sin-

gles by Carlee Hendrix and Tommy Moore. Moore's blow was the big one, for it chased three runs across.

When football quarterback Harper walked the first man in the third, Georgia Coach Jim Whatley lifted him in favor of Leon Houston.

Georgia got a single run in the third on Bobby Sherrer's double and Jim Callaway's one-baser.

The Bulldogs bounced to a 7-5 lead in the top of the sixth with a three-run splurge wrought by singles off the hats of Save Andrews and Farris.

FSU promptly railied for two in the bottom of the frame to knot it at 7-7. Pitcher Max Long's single. Campbell's, triple and Mills' sacrifice turned it.

That set the stage for the clinching score in the eighth.

Long was a little below-his pitching par, yielding nine, hits

that fell at telling moments, but he kept himself out of more trouble by rationing only one base on bails. It was his second victory in as many starts for the Seminoles, and he has gone the distance both times. Georgia Coach Whatley said his boys were hurting from not enough practice. He conceded that his team might be better than last season's rave outfit "if we get the pitching." Georgia won 19 of 24 a-year ago, including 12 of 16 in the SEC.

Carlee Hendrix continued his speciacular fielding at third base for the Seminoles, handling nine chances with one miscue. Bob Hudson was FSU's best at bat, with two of the 'seven hits notched off Georgia. Saye was the big Bulldog stroker with three hits.

The victory was FSU's third in four starts.
