Florida State staged an 11run fifth inning Tuesday afternoon to rout Kentucky for the second straight day by a 19-3 margin.

In two games against the Wildcais, the Seminole sluggers have rapped out 34 hits in 79 times at bat for a .430 batting average. They have scored 27 runs and knocked 10 doubles, one triple and two home runs.

Maury Hopkins again led the Tribe attack. The senior third baseman from Palmetto rapped a three-run homer and a run-scoring single in three official trips for five runs batted in. He scored four himself.

Tommy Thomas rapped four hits including three doubles, while Mike Martin and Jim Lyttle each got three. Lyttle smashed an inside the parkthree-run homer.

Chuck Hawkins survived a rough fourth inning and went on to go the route for the Seminoles. He is now 1-0 for the campaign. It was the second straight complete game for Florida State as Marv Stringfellow went all the way Monday afternoon.

Randy Brown opened the fifth inning by being hit by a Larry Sheanshang fast ball. He stole second and went to third on a double by Thomas.

To the surprise of the crowd, Sheanshang intentionally passed Pete Sarron to pitch to Hopkins. Hopkins also walked to force in Brown. Martin ripped a single to score Thomas and Fernandez sacrificed Sarron across.

Sheanshang then walked pitcher Hawkins to load up the sacks again. Gary Sprague slashed another single to score Hopkins and Martin. Lyttle lined a shot that bounced over center fielder Bill Rhea's head and rolled back to the fense. By the time Rhea could retrieve the ball Lyttle had an inside-the-park home run.

Second baseman Steve Rubia leaped to make a stab of a liner off the bat of Brown for the second out. However, Thomas and Sarron hit back to back singles and Hopkins unleaded one over the right field fence 350 feet away.

Martin grounded out to end the inning.

Hawkins faced the minimum nine men in the first three innings of play. Rick Anderson reached on an error by Sprague, but was cut down attempting to steal by Brown. The Wildcats got to Hawkins in the third for all three runs on successive singles by Anderson, Hank Degener, Rhea and Ron Taylor with two out. He settled down and was in no further trouble. Hawkins struck out eight and walked four.

The Seminoles will again face Kentucky this afternoon at Seminole Field. Sophomore Wayne Vincent from Birmingham, Alabama will be the starting pitcher for Florida State. The game will start at three.
