

Florida State's baseball team completed the demolition of Kentucky here yesterday afternoon.

The 20-1 victory gave the power-hitting Seminoles a four game sweep over the Wildcats.

Kentucky played Tennessee at 11 a.m. today, and FSU was scheduled to take on the Volunteers at 3.

The Seminoles are now 4-0, with 55 runs behind them.

For Kentucky, it was the worst of tragic days. The Seminoles bombarded three pitchers for 17 hits, though only two were for extra bases.

Eight Kentucky errors helped give FSU 12 unearned runs.

Righthander Jim Ward

started for the Seminoles and was relieved by Chester Cole in the eighth — seemingly for no reason other than to give the Brevard Junior College graduate some experience. Ward was in control from the start, had given up only four hits.

The Seminoles started typically, picking up two runs in the first inning in routine fashion. FSU added another in the fourth, and three more in both the fifth and sixth before the roof caved in.

Wildcat starter Ed Stanko gave way to Nelson Faris in the sixth, and Coleman Howlett came in with the bases loaded and none away in the seventh.

Gary Sprague began the eighth with a walk, and advanced to third on Jim Lyttle's 400-foot double to center. Randy Brown walked to

load the bases, and Faris left the game.

Tom Thomas lofted a sacrifice fly to center, scoring Sprague, then Pete Sarron hammered a single to drive in Lyttle, and advance Brown to third. Wildcat second baseman Steve Robida, a defensive standout all afternoon, nabbed Sarron at second on a throw from right, but threw into the FSU dugout in an attempt to catch Brown at third and the Seminole catcher was awarded home plate.

Maury Hopkins kept things going with a single, and Mike Martin drove one into the far reaches of center field and rounded the bases for the second FSU inside-the-park homer of the season.

Substitutes dotted the Seminole batting order in the eighth, but things got no better for Kentucky. Pitcher Cole

led off with a single, but was forced at second on Bill Ziegler's grounder. Lyttle flied to center and it appeared as though the Wildcats would be out of the inning when Bill Hammond grounded to third.

However, Rick Anderson overthrew first and Ziegler came all the way home. Successive singles by Roy Mewbourne, Sarron, Gary Lawrence, Martin, Fernandez and Cole chased five more runs across before Fernandez was caught sliding into third for the third out.

Lyttle and Martin led the attack with three hits each. Martin drove in four runs, Thomas and Sarron two each.

Kentucky's only run scored in the seventh on singles by Anderson, Hank Degener, and William Rhea. Anderson led the Wildcats with two singles.
