Florida State Baseball Season Wrap-Up

*****Who Returns:** Every position starter on the '89 club has eligibility remaining. Only senior righthander Clyde Keller and bullpen catcher Matt Clements is lost to graduation. A total of 20 of 22 roster players also return. In addition, only junior Tim Nedin was drafted by a professional team.

*****Florida State, under Head Coach Mike Martin won 50 or more games for the 10th straight season.** A Martin-coached team has never won less than 50 games in 10 seasons under his direction. Previous to his taking over the program in 1980, a Seminole team had never won 50 games in a single season.

*****Little question exists that the 1989 team was made up of overachievers.** Not single FSU player was named to a All-America squad, as the Seminoles were the only team in the CWS that did not have one player on the Baseball America AA team.

*****FSU Head Coach Mike Martin has emphasized pitching and defense over the last three years.** In no prior season has that been more evident than in '89, when FSU hit a decade-low 55 homers, but yielded a decade-low team ERA of 3.06. On defense, FSU held a fielding percentage of .962.

*****When junior Gar Finnvoild was selected to the GTE-Academic All-America team, he became the sixth Seminole baseball**

player selected to that prestigious team. Finnvoid holds a 3.50 GPA in his major of pre-denistry and held a 10-4 record with a 2.61 ERA. He led the staff in a number of categories, including starts (19), innings pitched (134.1) and strikeouts (114).

***Florida State Head Coach Mike Martin won his 500th game as fast as any coach in the nation, when the Seminoles defeated Arizona State in the second game of the year. Martin finished his 10th season at FSU with a 552-189-3 career mark. Martin closed out the decade, leading the Seminoles to four College World Series appearances--the most trips to Omaha in any of the four decades that the FSU has played baseball.

***What else can be said about Clyde Keller-- one of the stabilizing forces on the team over the last two seasons? Keller went 13-1 during his senior season with a 2.78 ERA in '89 to run his two-year victory total at FSU to 23. After winning his first 13 games in '89, Keller did not lose a game from May 29, 1988 to June 9, 1989. A JuCo transfer from Sac City CC, Keller won 52 games during his college career.

***Florida State is one of only two schools (Arkansas is the other) to appear in a New Year's Bowl Game, at the NCAA Basketball Tournament and the College World Series in the 1988-89 school year. The Seminoles had one of their most successful seasons ever, finishing third in football, spent most of the year in the top 20 in basketball and finished 3rd in the nation in baseball.

***FSU's double play combination of shortstop Brian Gilliland and second baseman Rocky Rau went unheralded for much of the season, but the two combined for a prosperous post-season. Gilliland raised his average close to 50 points during the final 1 1/2 months of the season, finishing third on the team with a .330 average. He also stole 15 bases and drew a team-leading 51 walks. Rau came on to win the second base job in the last week in April and batted .242, but timed his hits perfectly through Atlantic Regional and CWS play. Rau was FSU's only selection to the College World Series All-Tournament team, as he matched his regular season RBI total in eight regional and CWS games. The junior from LaGrange, TX finished with 18 RBI--10 coming in the postseason.

***Junior Bob Reboin (Carmichael, CA) became only the second player in Seminole history to lead the team in hitting in only his first year with the program. Reboin batted .353, but even more amazing was his hit breakdown. Of his 67 hits, 57 were singles.

***Freshman figured heavily during the 1989 season. Catcher Pedro Grifol (Miami) was one of the top FSU batterymen during the decade. The Columbus High product batted .256 with six homers and 48 RBI. Another freshman who won a starting job was Longwood Lyman graduate Chris Brock. Brock, a sterling defensive player, led the outfielders in assists with nine, while also leading the outfielders in hitting with a .333 average.

***Only two Seminoles were drafted in the recent MLB free-agent draft. Senior righthander Clyde Keller was selected by the St. Louis Cardinals in the 32nd round, while junior lefthander Tim Medin went to the Minnesota Twins in the 21st round.

***Mirror, Mirror on the wall, who's the streakiest hitter of them all? -- Brad Parker --. Parker, a sophomore from Tallahassee, assembled a 28-game hitting as a freshman and followed up that streak with a team-leading 19-game streak this season. Parker, when he's hot is tops in the college game, but did go through a drought in the CWS, when he went 1-for-9 in the first three game of College World Series play.

***Florida State signed two players to play on the 1990 team. Freshman lefthander Chris Roberts of Middleburg said last week that he will honor his commitment to Florida State and play for the Seminoles next spring. Roberts, a second round choice by the Philadelphia Phillies and a first team AAA all-state pick, is the highest draft choice to sign with the Seminoles. Rising junior Ricky Kimball, a fifth rounder in '87, was the highest, before Roberts. FSU quarterback signee Kenny Felder also announced his intentions to play baseball at Florida State, when he signed in February. Felder was a second round selection by the San Diego Padres.

***FSU's Baseball Media Guide was selected by CoSIDA as the "Best Guide in the Nation" by a panel of judges. In all, the FSU SID office finished first with its basketball guide, third with its football guide and first with baseball. The '89 baseball guide also was selected as the best baseball cover in the nation.

***FSU pitching tossed the second most shutouts in history this year, when the staff posted 12 shutouts. The team missed the 1973 team record of 15. Keep in mind that the school record was set in the pre-aluminum bat days.

***The Seminoles got hot at the right times this season, at the club assembled a 12-game winning streak in their last two regular season games, four Metro Conference Tournament, four Atlantic Regional Tournament and two College World Series games. The streak was the first 12 game streak since the 1986 club won 12 twice.

***One streak that did end was Florida State's NCAA record for most consecutive games without being shutout. The streak that began on April 29, 1984, when Tulane's Barry Grunnells blanked the Seminoles 1-0. South Florida's Jim Jawaki tossed a four-hit shotout to end FSU's streak at 336 games, spanning 4+ seasons. The Seminoles would go on to be shutout twice more during the year.

***The much-talked about gold uniforms worked their magic again in '89. FSU won 12 of 14 games in their traditional Sunday uniforms. In all, FSU also won 15 of 17 contests on Sunday with its only losses coming in a pair of one-run road losses to Florida and South Carolina.

***The Tribe swept through its Metro Conference schedule with

a sparkling 14-4 mark to win the regular season title and then marched the the Metro Conference Tournament to win its seventh straight Metro crown.
