

From our past relationships, this is recommendation, indeed, that there will be some interesting and colorful football displayed before our eyes today.



FRANK TOOMEY Backfield Coach

Thirty-four year old Frank Toomey of Niagara Falls, N.Y., is in his fourth season as one of Coach Nugent's right hand men.

Like Nugent, a graduate of Ithaca College in New York, Toomey is the guy who has a lot to do with making the Seminole backfield go.

Nugent regards him as one of the best defensive coaches in the business.

Serving four years with the Marine Corps, he won a Purple Heart and a presidential citation.

HERBERT HUGHES Graduate Assistant

Herb Hughes, a former University of New Mexico quarterback, is one of Florida State's two graduate assistants in coaching this year.

Hughes lettered in football and baseball at the New Mexico school and showed an early inclination to become a football coach.

During the four years he spent in the Air Force as a flyer, he managed to coach two years.

Hughes played under Coach Dudley DeGroot at New Mexico and shone on his offensive ability.

PAUL ODOM Freshman Coach

The fellow who is responsible for turning out the high-powered freshman football teams FSU has fielded recently is Paul Odom, another new member of the FSU staff.

Odom was a tackle for Rollins College in 1947-48. After Rollins dropped football, he switched to Stetson and captained the Hatters during 1950.

BOB HARBISON Line Coach

The "old man" of the FSU coaching staff is Bob Harbison, though he's just 30 years old. Harbison begins his tenth full season with the Seminoles.

Back in his playing days, Bob was an outstanding guard for the late "Bo" McMillin at Indiana University in 1945 through 1947.

A native of Evansville, Ind., Harbison is credited with developing All Americans Bill Dawkins in 1951 and Hugh Adams, an All American in 1949. Adams is now with the FSU coaching staff.

HUGH ADAMS

As a Little All America tackle on Florida State's 1949 team, it's only proper that Hugh Adams ends up a coach with the Seminoles.

And his winning personality and way with the FSU squads has made his coaching success a virtual certainty. His "come on, fella" is a common practice field sound.

CHARLIE LaPRADD Line Coach

The newest full-time member of the FSU coaching staff is Charlie LaPradd, an All America tackle at the University of Florida in 1952.

A tall, impressive person, LaPradd is expected to develop into an excellent football coach, primarily because of the way the young Seminoles respect him.

Because he was so well-known during his playing days at the Gainesville school, Charlie is expected to become an outstanding recruiter, especially in Florida.

HUGH TAYLOR End Coach

Anyone who's followed professional football for any time has heard of Hugh "Bones" Taylor, the "old reliable" of Washington's Redskins for many a year.

At 34, Taylor is now entering his second year on Florida State's coaching staff. His addition is already paying dividends.

FLORIDA STATE UNIVERSITY

(Director of Sports Publicity Florida State University)

Located in Tallahassee, Florida State University is one of the fastest growing universities in the country. Already, it is literally busting at its seams with an estimated 10,000 students expected by 1960.

The campus consists of 297 acres, the older part of which overlooks the capital city.

The new portion of the campus follows a 50-year master plan developed by well-known architects. It stretches westward along Highway 90.

Growing by leaps and bounds, the campus has an 11floor dormitory with three more just like it expected in the near future. A million dollar physical education plant is less than a year old as is the multi-million dollar library building.

Other new buildings include a new Geology Building, a new Science Building, a new School for Home Economics, a new Zoology and Botany classroom building and a new student center.

A recent act of the legislature granted the University \$2,300,000 for devloping basic nuclear studies which will put FSU to the fore in the nuclear field.

In 1851 the legislature passed an act establishing two seminaries of learning to be situated upon the east and west sides of the famous Suwannee River.

The Florida Institute, then established at Tallahassee on the site of the present Florida State University, was offered to the state. During the next 54 years the institution was known as the West Florida Seminary, Florida University and Florida State College.

The Buckman Act of 1905 made the school into Florida State College for Women, which it remained until it became the present Florida State University on May 15, 1947.

Florida State University's recently named new President -Dr. Robert M. Strozier—is professed as an avid football

Dr. Strozier, who took over the post just in time for football season, was named FSU President late in June after the beloved Dr. Doak S. Campbell retired after 16 years.

At 51, Dr. Strozier is one of the youngest University Presidents in the country. It was Governor Collins' expressed desire that the new FSU President should be a "young man with the vision and foresight" to go with growing Florida State University.

Though coming to Florida State from the University of Chicago, where he was Dean of Students, Dr. Strozier is a native southerner. He was born and raised in nearby McRae, Georgia, and attended Emory University in Atlanta. He was on the faculty of the University of Georgia at one time.

His brother, newsman Fred Strozier, is a former resident of Tallahassee and headed the local Associated Press Bureau for three years. Fred Strozier is now the AP's chief executive in its Latin American Bureau.

If there's anything "unique" about Florida State Univer-

sity's newly created Department of Football, it's the simplicity and logic with which it operates.

Many writers have referred to the somewhat revolutionary setup as "unique" in the collegiate circle. FSU officials have no way of verifying that angle.

But the administration, recognizing the position football has attained in college life and recognizing the tremendous amount of business involved in running a football program, has set up the Department of Football.

At the head of this department is the Head Football Coach, Tom Nugent. Nugent handles his own budget, does his own scheduling and, in general, handles all business which affects his organization.

Now entering his fifth year as the propelling force behind the Seminoles, Nugent has attained a record of 42 wins, against 35 defeats and three ties.

He's also become nationally known for his bright innovations. It was Nugent who invented the typewriter huddle, the double quarterback and the "I" formation used so effectively by his own Seminoles.

A native of Lawrence, Mass., the 44-year-old coach came to Florida State in 1953 after completing four highly successful years as head coach at Virginia Military Institute.

Within three years after Nugent joined the obscure VMI Keydets, he had won a Southern Conference crown and had pulled an upset victory over mighty Georgia Tech.

Nugent graduated from Ithaca College in 1936 and coached the frosh team there while he continued with graduate work. Later, he returned to Lawrence and directed the Essex Training School teams in football, basketball and baseball. Four years at Essex produced two undefeated football teams and a 35-3 record.


After serving with the Air Force from 1941 to 1946, Nugent became Head Football Coach at Williamsburg, Va., High School, where he won nine in a row. He then moved to Hopewell, Va., High and won 15 of 19 games.

CONDENSED RULES FOR RECORDING FOOTBALL STATISTICS*

(Issued by the N.C.A.A. Football Rules Committee's Sub-committee on Football Statistics)

(Continued from back of Form 347-A)

SECTION 6-PUNTS.

Article 1: Punts are measured from the line of scrimmage to the point of ultimate advance, if the ball remains in the field of play or goes out of bounds. (Note—"Ultimate advance" is the point where ball goes out of bounds, is downed, or is recovered by the defense to attempt a runback.)

(Note—"Ultimate advance" of the punt shall be construed to include also any distance which a receiver of the punt may retreat toward his own goal before attempting to return up field. This interpretation gives greatest benefit to both the punter and the receiver, since excellence of the punt normally is responsible for retreat by the receiver. Thus "minus yards" should NOT be recorded under "punt returns".)

Article 2: When a punt goes over the goal line (a touchback), distance of the punt is measured from the line of scrimmage to the 20-yard line only, since this is the limit of the punt's value to the kicking team.

Article 3: If a receiver muffs a punt and the ball continues toward his goal line, the punt is measured to the point of recovery or ultimate advance, as defined above. If a receiver muffs a punt and the ball bounds back toward the kicker's goal, the punt is measured to the point of the muff (the point of ultimate advance), and the receiver is credited with a punt return and with the yards from the point of the muff to the point of recovery, regardless of which team recovers the fumble.

Article 4: Punts blocked are included in "times kicked", and the yardage of a partially blocked kick is included in "yards kicked". If the ball travels toward the kicker's goal, and is recovered by the blocking (defending) team, the yardage is treated as a punt return by the player who blocked the kick. If the ball travels toward the kicker's goal and is recovered by the kicking team, the yardage is treated as a kick return by the player who blocked the kick, but the blocking team is charged with a fumble lost.

SECTION 7-KICK RETURNS.

Article 1: Only the number of punts and kickoffs which the receiving team actually attempts to return are included under kick returns. (Exception—Blocked kicks which travel toward the kicker's goal. See Article 4 of Section 6.)

Article 2: The return will be measured from the point where the returning player actually gains control of the ball to the point where the ball is declared dead, or is lost by fumble. There are no "minus yards" under kick returns (see note under Article 1 of Section 6).

Article 3: The return of an attempted field goal, which falls short and is returned by the defending team, is treated as a punt return.

SECTION 8-FREE KICKS.

Free kicks are recorded as kickoffs if made from placement, and as punts if the ball is punted. The receiving player is credited with a kickoff return, or a punt return, respectively.

SECTION 9-GOALS FROM THE FIELD.

Successful goals from the field are measured from the scrimmage line to the goal line, plus ten yards, since the goal posts are ten yards behind the goal line. The distance of such kicks is recorded only under "principal individual plays" on the reverse side of the Summary. The distance of a field goal attempt is not recorded under "punting".

SECTION 10-POINTS AFTER TOUCHDOWNS.

Article 1: A player attempting a try-for-point-after-touchdown by kicking is not charged with an attempt when a bad pass from center, or a fumble by the ball holder, precludes an opportunity to kick. Such an unsuccessful attempt is charged to the "team", rather than to any individual player. However, if the ball is momentarily fumbled and then kicked, an attempt is charged to the individual kicker, regardless of the success or failure of the effort.

Article 2: When a try-for-point-after-touchdown by forward passing is successful, the receiver is both charged with the attempt and credited with the point scored. When such a try is unsuccessful, the passer is charged with the attempt.

SECTION 11-SAFETIES.

No individual credit is recorded for any player on either team when a safety is scored. The team benefitting from the score is credited.

SECTION 12-FUMBLES.

On any play terminated by a fumble, the yards involved to the point of recovery are credited or charged to the player who fumbled, regardless of which team recovers the fumble.

(Approved Ruling—On rushing play, ball carrier of Team A fumbles at the line of scrimmage and the ball travels 5 yards toward Team B goal line, before it is recovered by Team B. Player of Team A who fumbled is credited with rushing gain of 5 yards and Team A is charged with a fumble lost.)

WILD PASS FROM CENTER.

Any loss resulting from an **obvious** wild pass from center is charged to "center pass", and not to any individual player.
