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Tonight's Game

Bill Bunker has resigned as Florida State's Sports Information Director to assume a position with the Florida Development Commission. He will be replaced by St. Petersburg Times sports writer Lonnie Burt who is expected to begin his new duties soon.

Houston has been a most frustrating word in the Seminole vocabulary for the past six years.

Florida State has never beaten Houston. The series record stands at 3-0-2, with both tie games coming in the last two meetings.

Despite the record, the Cougars have probably been one of Florida State's most underrated opponents as far as Seminole fans are concerned. How this reasoning developed is hard to say since Houston began intercollegiate football a year prior to Florida State's entrance, played a major college schedule several years before the Seminoles, has had the twin advantages of a booming metropolitan area in which to be located and the tremendous wealth of the Texas high school football talent pool from which to recruit.

This year the situation is reversed. Houston's credentials are undeniable, and Florida State's young Seminoles begin their 20th football season as underdogs.

Last year's 16-16 tie slightly scarred a proud Seminole record upon which the Cougars had already placed two blemishes. Beginning with the 1960 season, the Seminoles have lost only seven football games here in Doak Campbell Stadium. Two of those losses have come from tonight's opponent.

This year's Houston team has seven returning starters on offense and an equal number on defense. Two of the Cougars who will see action tonight are old enemies, and these same two rank among the greatest stars ever to play for Houston.

Quarterback Bo Burris set seven school passing and four total offense records in a losing season last year. Halfback Dick Post has gained 1158 yards rushing in two seasons and ranks third among Houston's all-time career leaders with a year left to play.

There's also Warren McVea who returned a kickoff 92 yards for a touchdown in this stadium last year. Other top targets for Burris passes are Ken Hebert and Tom Beer, both legitimately outstanding football players.

Florida State will go into tonight's opener with a green defense. Sophomores will man the deep secondary where McVea and Hebert are wont to ramble, and untried linebackers will attempt to stop the thrusts of Post.

Offensively the Seminoles are hopeful with a veteran line, powerful runners, excellent receivers and three promising, if unblooded, quarterbacks.

Last year's home finale was the most exciting game played in Campbell Stadium all year. Tonight's renewal of a tough rivalry promises to be no different.




Seminole Boosters, Inc. is an organization devoted entirely to the support of the Florida State University athletic program with emphasis on football.

Things Were Different in '47

Former Head Football Coach Florida State University



As Florida State begins its 20th season of intercollegiate football, we begin a nostalgic series of articles written by former Seminole coaches. Tonight, Ed Williamson, Florida State's first head football coach, gives his impressions of that initial year. Williamson is now Director of Health and Physical Education for the State Department of Education.

Some will contend that football really started at Florida State University in the early 1900's rather than in 1947. Actually, there was a football team at Florida State College located in Tallahassee that won the state title in 1904. This may have been the forerunner of what is now Florida State University. On the other hand, for forty-three years prior to 1947 the institution was a girl's school and was known as Florida State College for Women. There is no record of there having been a women's football team at Florida State College for Women so at least the 1947 team marked the reinstatement of football at the Tallahassee institution after a lapse

at the Tallahassee institution after a lapse of forty-three years.

At the close of World War II and with the advent of the G.I. Bill of Rights there were more applications for admission to the University of Florida than could be accommodated on the campus at Gainesville. As an emergency measure, arrangements were made to house 500 of these applicants at an old air base in Tallahassee and allow them to attend classes at Florida and allow them to attend classes at Florida State College for Women. The male students

were registered in what was called the Tallahassee Branch of the University of Florida. When this branch of the University of Florida was opened no thought was given to having an interscholastic athletic program during the first year. Stress was to be placed on intramural sports and I was employed as intramural director. Alwas employed as intramural director. Although original plans did not anticipate interscholastic athletics, in order to satisfy student needs abbreviated schedules in basketball, tennis, and swimming were developed and teams in these activities were

veloped and teams in these activities were fielded during this period.

In the spring of 1947, the state legislature passed a law that made both the University of Florida and Florida State College for Women co-educational. The name of Florida State College for Women was changed to Florida State University.

Early in the summer of 1947, university officials began to explore the possibility of developing an interscholastic athletic program at Florida State University. The first step was to create a department of physical education in the school of education. The faculty of the department of physical education would then serve as coaches of the various sports. A search was immediately started for a head of the department of physical education and for department of physical education and for a football coach. Since I was already on the scene, I actively engaged in the search for the football coach since this would be the first interscholastic activity to be started. Many potential candidates were brought to the campus and interviewed, but all were rejected primarily because the search was centered on individuals who had a Master's and preferably a Doctor's degree so that they could also fulfill their responsibility as the faculty of the new department of physical education. Because of the pressure of time and the necessity of making plans for the coming football season efforts were abandoned to try to locate the coach with the qualifications sought, and I was drafted to fill this new position.


When this decision was made no equipwhen this decision was made no equipment had been ordered, no schedule had been made, the University had no stadium, there was no field house, no assistant had been named and many other details had not been attended to. It should be recalled that this was right after the War and athletic equipment was scarce, but through diligent efforts, a minimum amount of equipment was ordered and delivery promised to the opening of school. I procured an NCAA Football Guide which lists all the schedules of universities and colleges and began to look for open dates of teams in the area. After an exhausting search a five game schedule was arranged. We would begin with Stetson University on October 18, and of the schedule. By the middle of scheduler of the schedule. By the middle of scheduler of the scheduler of September, the physical education department staff consisted of four people: Dr. Howard Danford was head of the department, I was head football coach, Jack Haskin, assistant football coach, and Dr. Donald Loucks, director of intramural sports and later basketball coach. As mentioned before, these individuals were not only coaches but members of the faculty of the department of physical education. They were paid as instructors in physical education and coaching was an extra load. An interesting comparison might be made with the salary of the first football coach which was \$4200 with that of a head coach today. The coaches in 1947 also carried a full teaching load in the department of physical education.

Male students began to arrive on campus around the middle of September and the first practice was held September 20. Almost one-hundred strangers reported for opening drill on that date. Within two weeks the squad had been reduced to forty-five men, either through voluntary drop outs or cuts

by the coaches.

None of these players were on scholarship, there was no training table and many were unable to afford the quality or quantity of food needed for the vigorous activity of football. Neverthless, most of them stuck with it and it can truly be said this was a group of players that were playing for the love of the game and for no other reward. This spirit somewhat compensated for inexperience and a lack of spring train-

The first game was played in the old centennial field against the University of Stetson on Saturday, October 18. Stetson had played two games prior to the one that was to be the beginning of F.S.U. football. They were definitely listed as the favorites, not only because of experience but also because of weight and speed. Much to the

amazement of the seven thousand football fans, seeing their first intercollegiate game to be played by the new Tallahassee in-

to be played by the new Tallahassee insituation, Florida State University led by a score of 6-0 at the half. This was the result of a pass thrown by Don Grant to Charles McMillan in the end zone.

The day following the game, Fred Pettijohn, then sports editor for the Tallahassee Democrat, filed a list of football firsts compiled by Florida State University. Excerpts from this article are reproduced as follows:

"This is a sports writers report to the far-

"This is a sports writers report to the farflung football future.

"It's written particularly for the intraspace sports series of the supersonic 1970's and '80's, who some day are going to dig back through the files in search of informa-tion on the "old gaffers" who played in Florida State University's first football game against Stetson back in 1947!

"The honor of handling the first F.S.U.

play and receiving the first kick off went to Don Grant of Perry. He took Stetson's kick on his own three and returned to the thirty-one.

the thirty-one.

"The first running play from scrimmage was by Wyatt 'Red' Parish, Chipley, right half-back who broke over his own right tackle and moved from the thirty-one to the forty-nine yard line almost breaking into the clear for a score. Parish also racked up the initial FSU first down on the play.

"Don Grant threw the first FSU pass

and had it intercepted when Byron Brasington grabbed the oval on the Stetson 33.

Jim Costello made the first FSU tackle Grant's pass was intended for him and when Brasington plucked it out of the air in front of him, he promptly flopped the Hatter safety man on the Stetson 35. Gerry 'Bo' Manuel, Newberry, who came in as full-back to replace Jack Watson, Pensacola, after the ninth play was the first substitute.

"The Garnet and Gold's first goal line stand was put up midway in the first period

when they rose up to halt the Hatters in their tracks. After the green and white gridders had first and goal from the 8 yard

gridders had first and goal from the 8 yard stripe FSU took over on the 4½.

"Leonard Gilberg former Leon High Lion star, got off the first FSU punt. The big tackle kicking from the end zone booted out to his own 38 yard line.

"Chris Banakas, big Pensacola flankman, recovered the first fumble for his team when he dropped on a bad pass from a center that got away from Hinkley of Stetson on the FSU 39 yard line.

"Philip Rountree Chipley left-half and

"Philip Rountree, Chipley, left-half and one of the student body presidents, hit full-back Ken MacLean, Quincy, with the

first completed pass in FSU's brief history early in the second period.

"Harry Hughey, tiny Pensacola quarterback, made the first punt return taking Brasington's boot on his own 48 and moving

over into Stetson territory on the 47.

"Ralph Chaudron, Pensacola tail-back, made the first pass interception when he nabbed Brasington's stray toss on the three

and ran it out to the 11.

"FSU's first lateral went from Charles McMillan, Quincy, to Chris Banakas on the Stetson 41, and Banakas battled his way down to the enemy 24.

Charles McMillan scored the first FSU touchdown with a leaping miracle catch in the end corner of the southern end zone."

Readers will recognize many of the names listed in this series of firsts as FSU's supporters today. The final score of the Stetson game was 14-6 in favor of Stetson. The next game, three weeks later with Cumberland, in Lebanon, played in the rain, was the second loss for FSU—this time by a score of 6-0. Troy State College defeated the Seminoles 36-6, Tennessee Tech won by a score of 27-0, and in the final game of the season, the undefeated, untied Jackson-ville State. Teachers, managed to also out ville State Teachers managed to eke out a 7-0 decision over the Seminoles. This game marked the end of the first football season. Although according to the scores it was an all losing season, according to the assessment of many, it was a winner all the way for a band of ex-G.I.'s.

Enduring hardships that present football players and coaches cannot imagine, they started a pattern on which tradition is built and which has led to a great athletic future of the Florida State University.

CONDENSED RULES FOR RECORDING FOOTBALL STATISTICS*

(Originated by the N.C.A.A. Football Rules Committee's Sub-committee on Football Statistics)

SECTION 1 - FIRST DOWNS.

A first down shall be recorded whenever the yardsticks are ordered forward by the officials, and when a touchdown is scored from scrimmage (by rushing or passing) within a series of downs starting 10 yards or more from the goal line. A first down is **not** recorded on a touchdown runback, regardless of the distance of the scoring run.

SECTION 2 - RUSHING.

- Article 1: All offensive running plays are to be classified as rushing plays, not as "plays from scrimmage," since any play begun with a snapback from center actually is a play from scrimmage.
- **Article 2:** Rushing yardage is measured from the line of scrimmage to the point where the ball is declared dead, or is recovered by opponents in the case of a fumble.
- Article 3: The rushing total is a net figure. All rushing losses must be recorded so as to account for the net figure.
- **Article 4:** All gains on lateral passes which originated or grew out of a rushing play are included in rushing yardage. (See Article 1 of Section 4.)

SECTION 3 - FORWARD PASSING.

- Article 1: Forward passing gains or losses are measured from the scrimmage line to the point where the ball is declared dead (or is recovered by opponents in the case of a fumble), so as to include both length of pass and running advance after completion. All yards gained or lost on each completed pass play are credited to both the passer and the receiver.
- Article 2: Loss from a completed forward pass which did not advance the ball to the scrimmage line is a yardage charge against passing gain.
- Article 3: Any loss by a player apparently intending to pass, but thrown behind the line of scrimmage, is recorded as a *loss by rushing*. He is **not** a passer until he has thrown the ball, and he retains at all times the option of running.
- **Article 4:** Interception returns are measured from the point of interception to the point where the ball is declared dead (or is recovered by opponents in the case of a fumble).
- Article 5: There is no pass completed by penalty. A gain through interference on a passing play is a penalty against the defending team. The passer is not charged with a pass attempt, nor credited with a pass completed or yards gained; nor is the intended receiver (or the

player interfered with) credited with a pass caught. The passing team is credited only with a first down by penalty. The defensive (offending) team is charged with a penalty, and the distance from the line of scrimmage to the spot of the penalty under "yards penalized."

Article 6: The forward passer is charged with a forward pass attempt when a forward pass is ruled intentionally grounded.

SECTION 4 - LATERAL PASSING.

Article 1: A lateral pass is always a component of the ultimate play, whether it precedes or follows that play, since the lateral is merely an extension of the original or ultimate play, in effect.

(Approved Ruling — Player A receives a forward pass for a gain of 10 yards, then throws a lateral pass to Player B, who gains an additional 5 yards. Player A is credited with one pass caught and 10 yards under "receiving." Player B is credited with NO pass caught and with 5 yards under "receiving." Player who threw the forward pass is credited with 15 yards under "forward passing.")

(Approved Ruling — Player A catches punt and return 10 yards before throwing a lateral pass to Player B, who returns another 5 yards. Player A is credited with one return and 10 yards under "punt returns." Player B is credited with NO return and with 5 yards under "punt returns.")

- Article 2: Incomplete lateral passes are scored as fumbles, and yards lost are charged against the player who, in the scorer's opinion, was responsible for the failure of the pass.
- Article 3: Intercepted lateral passes are scored as fumbles, the offensive team being charged with a fumble lost.
- Article 4: The official scorer rules on whether a completed pass to a flanker or man-in-motion is a forward or a lateral pass. If the latter, the play is recorded under "rushing." If the pass is incomplete, the subsequent action of the officials reveals whether the pass was a forward or a lateral.

SECTION 5 - TOTAL OFFENSE.

- Article 1: Total offense is the combined result of rushing and forward passing only, since these two are the only methods by which legal advance can be initiated while retaining possession of the ball.
- Article 2: Total offense yardage is the total of net gain by rushing and net gain by forward passing. "Receiving" yards gained are not included in total offense.
